Here's a 'Wag The Dog' story



A year ago a no-name, stray chihuahua came to the Seminole County Animal Control Center hoping for a new start in life. "I need a job," the chihuahua yapped.

"You've come to the right place," said Mary Beth Lake, Animal Control Supervisor and friend of chihuahuas.

The chihuahua felt very lonely at first. There were no others like him at the county shelter. There were golden retrievers, dalmations, collies, boxers, poodles, news hounds and a depraved pit bull. But no chihuahuas.

What happened next, is part of chihuahua history. Kathleen Prince from Miniature Pincher Rescue purchased the chihuahua for \$45 - the standard fee for a dog neither spayed nor neutered.

Turns out this was a pretty good deal. Prince turned the pooch over to a man who was making a movie in Miami. The man is now in the process of making a fortune with two very special chihuahuas.

The stray chihuahua from the Seminole shelter has become a TV personality and now lives in Hollywood. His name is Taco.

Taco is one of the Taco Bell TV spokescanines. Bridgette is chihuahua No. 1 and Taco is a smart and classy No. 2.

"Bridgette is the one you see on the close-ups, but Taco is there on some of the wide-angle and stunt shots," Lake says. "I'm one of the few who can tell them apart. Boy dogs are different, you know."

Throughout the country, the Taco Bell ads have prompted folks to go to shelters to acquire chihuahuas. Sadly, a number of these people are disappointed that the chihuahuas they bring home are not as wonderful as Bridgette or Taco. Some are returning or abandoning the dogs.

Lake said there is a waiting list for chihuahuas in Seminole County. "There was a waiting list even before the Taco Bell ads," she said. "Most dogs have a half dozen or more in their litters but chihuahuas have only one or two. As a result, there are less chihuahuas."

It thrills Lake that Taco is doing so well. The Chuluota chihuahua is one of the most successful four-legged legends of Hollywood. His little paws made soon be imprinted in the sidewalk near Hollywood and Vine.

"We're very proud of Taco," she said, noting that it isn't everyday a stray dog gets to be a TV star.

Police search for clues in hairdresser's killing

SANFORD - The Sanford police are searching for details on the killing of a hairdresser known to frequent gay bars, whose body was found Friday with a single gunshot wound to the head.

Two young boys found the body of Sabastian Durgins, a 26-year-old black man, under a carpet while they were playing near the railroad tracks at Seventh Street and Jessamine Avenue, Cpl. Randy Smith said.

Smith said the boys called the police, and the body was "still in good condition" when the

police arrived at the scene at 5:40 p.m. The police identified the body Monday with the assistance of the victim's a niece, who lives in Orlando, Smith said.

"We are trying to get any information we can on his friends or acquaintances," Smith said. "We are trying to find out as much as we can about him. We're still trying to get more details about his death."

The police are treating the case as a possible homicide, Smith said. Durgins lived at 825-D Ivey Lane in Orlando.

Land fight could end soon

OVIDO - The city council voted unanimously to ask Winter Springs to cease voluntary annexation east of Toll Road 417.

The special meeting was held Monday to discuss a settlement agreement, which would end fighting between the two cities, over the proposed Battle Ridge subdivision.

Oviedo has opposed the annexation of land from Seminole County and filed suit to stop the process after the Florida Department of Community Affairs found the annexation and proposed land use change to be in compliance with Winter Springs' comprehensive plan.

The council amended the agreement presented to them

by Winter Springs, adding language proposed by Oviedo homeowners adjacent to the Battle Ridge property.

Speaking for the MacKinley's Mill Homeowner's Association and Regina Bereswill, Valerie El-Jamil asked Oviedo officials, "What is Winter Springs giving up?"

The homeowners have asked for densities to be limited by a developer's agreement that would remain with the property regardless of a change in ownership. Homeowners asked to have one lot of the 110 proposed to be set aside for a park and for no additional annexation east of the expressway.

El-Jamil and Bereswill reviewed the agreement and submitted a letter to Oviedo's attorney, Catherine Reisch-

mann, citing weaknesses in the agreement.

The homeowners wanted the words "due east of" changed to "contiguous to" with regard to properties adjacent to Battle Ridge.

Reischmann said she had had only an hour to review the correspondence from the homeowners, prior to the meeting, and had consulted by telephone with Battle Ridge attorney Tom Cloud.

Reischmann said Cloud seemed willing to accept some of the changes asked for by the homeowners, who are petitioners in a separate suit, but neither Winter Springs or the developer has agreed to no annexation east of the expressway.

Environmental groups file suit against county

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Conservationists are suing Seminole County to halt the development of environmentally sensitive land just outside Sanford.

Representatives from the Sierra Club, Friends of the Wekiva River, and Seminole Estates last week filed suit in circuit court to stop plans to develop 130 acres, known as Astor Farms.

Mary Slater Linn of the Sierra Club said the suit was filed last week.

The land is in the middle of the Wekiva River Protection Area, and home to many species of wildlife such as the Florida Black Bear and sandhill cranes, environmentalists say.

Astor Farms is located north of State Road 46 and west of Orange Boulevard. The land, owned by six parties, is zoned agricultural in the county's comprehensive plan. Applicants Dan and Rebecca Pelham are requesting rezoning of the land to single family

residential. That would increase the amount of dwellings permitted per acre from one to five. The property is bordered by Seminole Estates and Sanford Farms.

The applicants say that with more businesses moving to north Seminole County the area is prime land for residential development.

Environmentalists claim development would harm threatened species living on or near the property.

The Florida Group of the Sierra Club, Friends of the Wekiva, and Seminole Audubon Society are sponsoring a benefit spaghetti dinner and "animal encounter" at the Central Florida Zoo Pavilion in Sanford on Tuesday, Nov. 17 at 7 p.m. The dinner will be \$10 for adults and \$5 for children, with all proceeds applied to the coalition's legal expenses.

Those attending the dinner can see some of Florida's native species, such as the red-shouldered hawk, screech owl, gopher tortoise, indigo snake, and opossum.

Saving the St. John's

DEBARY - The Volusia-Flagler Sierra Club, and several other environmental groups, are leading a tour by boat Wednesday to a proposed 428 home development site along the St. John's River. The proposed development would be the largest housing development along the river in Volusia County.

Bobbie Billy, the spiritual leader from the Independent Traditional Seminole Nation of Florida will narrate the tour sponsored by the Sierra Club, Audubon Society, Defenders of Wildlife, Save the Manatee and the Seminole Indian Tribe.

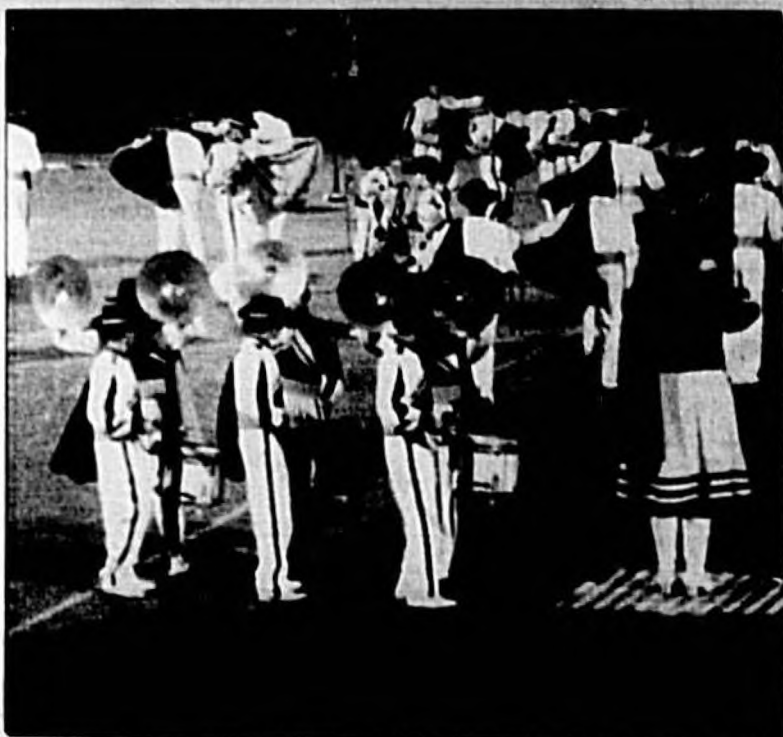

requested that change in an executive session held Oct. 19. "They're going to pick up every piece of property that they can," Benson said of Winter Springs. "I can't support this agreement."

Oviedo decided to amend the agreement and send it back to

Winter Springs, specifying a response from the city by Nov. 3. Oviedo call expert witnesses to defend its case should the matter reach the administrative hearing on Dec. 14.

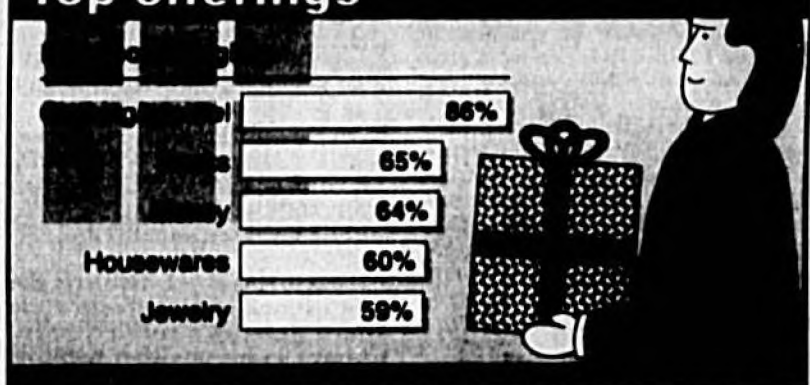
If Winter Springs responds by the deadline, Oviedo will call another special meeting to vote on the acceptance of the agreement.

"We will give it one more week with serious negotiations," said Chairman Tom Hagood. "It's fish or cut bait time next Monday."

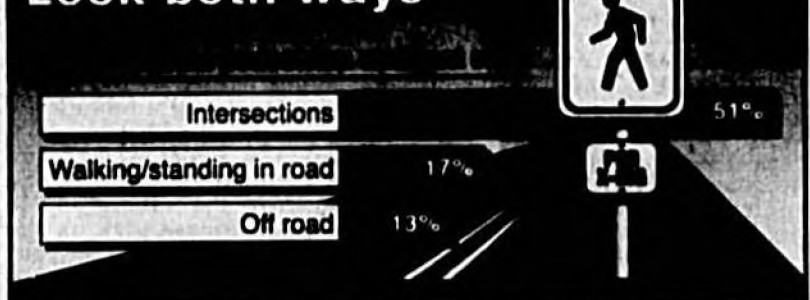

Florida grasses grow by season

In Central Florida, lawn grasses such as bahiagrass, bermudagrass, and St. Augustine grass, go dormant in the late fall and winter. During this period, these grasses grow very slowly, lose color, and turn completely brown with the first frost. In order to get an attractive green lawn during the winter, a temporary grass is seeded into the permanent lawn. This practice is called "overseeding".

Winter grasses: Several cool season grasses can be used for overseeding, but by far the most common temporary grass used in Florida is ryegrass. There are three types of ryegrass, annual, intermediate, and improved (perennial). Ryegrass has a fast seed germination, a good initial growth rate, has wide adaptability, and is relatively low cost. It can grow well in either sun or shade, and tolerates close and frequent mowing. If seeded heavily and mowed closely, ryegrass can provide a very dense and beautiful lawn throughout the winter. By the time the ryegrass dies, the permanent lawn grass should be actively growing again, and will provide color and cover the rest of the growing season. Ryegrass needs to be overseeded every

year.
Timing: Seeding time in Central Florida is from mid-November to early December. It is recommended that seeding should be done when daytime temperatures are in the low-to-mid-70 degree F range. If seeding occurs during the warmer periods, water stress and diseases will reduce the stand.

Seedbed preparation: To prepare the lawn for overseeding, the grass should first be raked to remove all debris. Then, mow the lawn closely, catching or removing by raking the grass after mowing. If the lawn has excessive thatch, it should be dethatched with the proper equipment, to produce a uniform bed. Remove any additional material from your lawn before overseeding.
Overseeding: A seeding rate

of 10-20 lbs/1000 sq. ft. is used for annual or common and intermediate types of ryegrass. A seeding rate of 10-20 lbs/1000 sq. ft. is used for perennial or improved ryegrass. Use a mechanical seeder and sow half the seed as you walk in one direction, and the remaining by walking at right angles to the first. After seeding, rake the ground with a stiff broom to ensure the seed gets through the grass and is in contact with the soil.

Watering: Water should be applied lightly and carefully to the seeded lawn once or twice a day until the seeds have germinated. Watering should continue until seedlings are well established. Water only as needed once plants are well established.

Maintenance: Winter lawns will require the same maintenance practices as the permanent lawn, such as mowing, watering, fertilizing, and pest control. Mowing can be done after plants are 1-2 inches high. Under normal conditions mowing should be done weekly. Mower blades should be sharp to avoid damaging the seedlings. Water only to keep the grass from wilting. Use a complete fertilizer such as 6-6-6 at a rate of one half pounds ni-

trogen per 1000 sq. ft. initially, then monthly applications of a nitrogen fertilizer such as ammonium nitrate, at a rate of one half pounds of nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft.

Diseases: Ryegrass is very susceptible to the fungus *Pythium* which can cause damping off or a disease called cotony blight. Over watering and over fertilizing promotes the development of the disease. This disease is more severe during warm, humid conditions. If cotony blight is present, a fungicide should be applied immediately because this disease can kill the entire winter lawn in 24 to 48 hours. Plant only fungicide-treated seeds to prevent seedling infections.

Reestablishing permanent grass: Ryegrass will normally die out in late spring, but if the weather is cool, and the lawn watered frequently, it can remain for a longer period of time. As warm weather sets in, discontinue fertilization and water as infrequently as possible to weaken the winter grass. **Al Ferrer is Seminole County Urban Horticulturist. It's time for the Buccaneers to make a change

SANFORD - Don't let it be said that Tampa Bay Buccaneer coach Tony Dungy isn't a patient man.

That's what has made him one of the NFL's brightest young coaching stars, a man who led an overachieving team to the playoffs last season one year after turning the entire franchise around after an 0-5 start.

Dungy got there by believing in his team, enough to erase a history full of ugliness.

No Monday Night Football games in 13 years.

Double-digit losses for nearly the same amount of time.

That's what the Bucs were as the few fans who showed up at the Big Sombrero sat through the coaching regimes of Leeman Bennett, Richard Williamson, Ray Perkins and Sam Wyche and quarterbacks Chris Chandler, Steve DeBerg and Craig Erickson.

Then Dungy showed up two years ago with his patience and his ability to calm down the weirdness.

It worked, at least for a while. Last year was a special year, but still, did anyone actually believe (except for Sports Illustrated) that this was a dynasty in the making?

It's a team that needs a jump start. It's a team too talented, at least defensively, to be losing 9-3 to New Orleans and struggling at home against the wretched Carolina Panthers.

Dungy's patience is getting the best of him and letting the potential for a successful season turn into a new 10-plus losses per season streak.

It's time for a change and Dungy has to be the one to do it. His patience in quarterback Trent Dilfer is admirable.

But Dilfer has been a disaster for most of his career in Tampa. Last year, remember, the Bucs still had one of the most anemic offenses in the NFL. Defense took the Bucs to the second round of the playoffs, not Dilfer.

This year, the defense is still doing the job, but Dilfer has been inept along with the rest of the offense.

It's time for a change.

And the answer certainly isn't number two man Steve Walsh.

It could have been former Carolina quitter, now New Orleans Saints' backup Kerry Collins, but the Bucs were content to go with Dilfer and ignore Collins' huge contract.

But Dungy also has an answer on his own bench, Scott Milanovich, who hasn't seen a regular season snap in his four years in the NFL, has a cannon for an arm and unlimited potential.

Milanovich is a fiery leader who may be just the man to bring some spark to the Bucs' woeful offense. Dungy can't lament his team's receiving woes any longer. Bert Emmanuel, Reidel Anthony and Jacques Green provide the team with its best receiving trio since Dilfer came to town, and the Bucs still can't score.

Linda Tripp, in fact, would have a better chance scoring in a singles' bar than the Bucs near the goal line.

It's time for a change. Dungy has never been one to rock the boat, but the boat needs some rocking before it gets to late.

It's time to make a change.

Pryce sat on the bench most of last year, but he absolutely dominated the Jags.

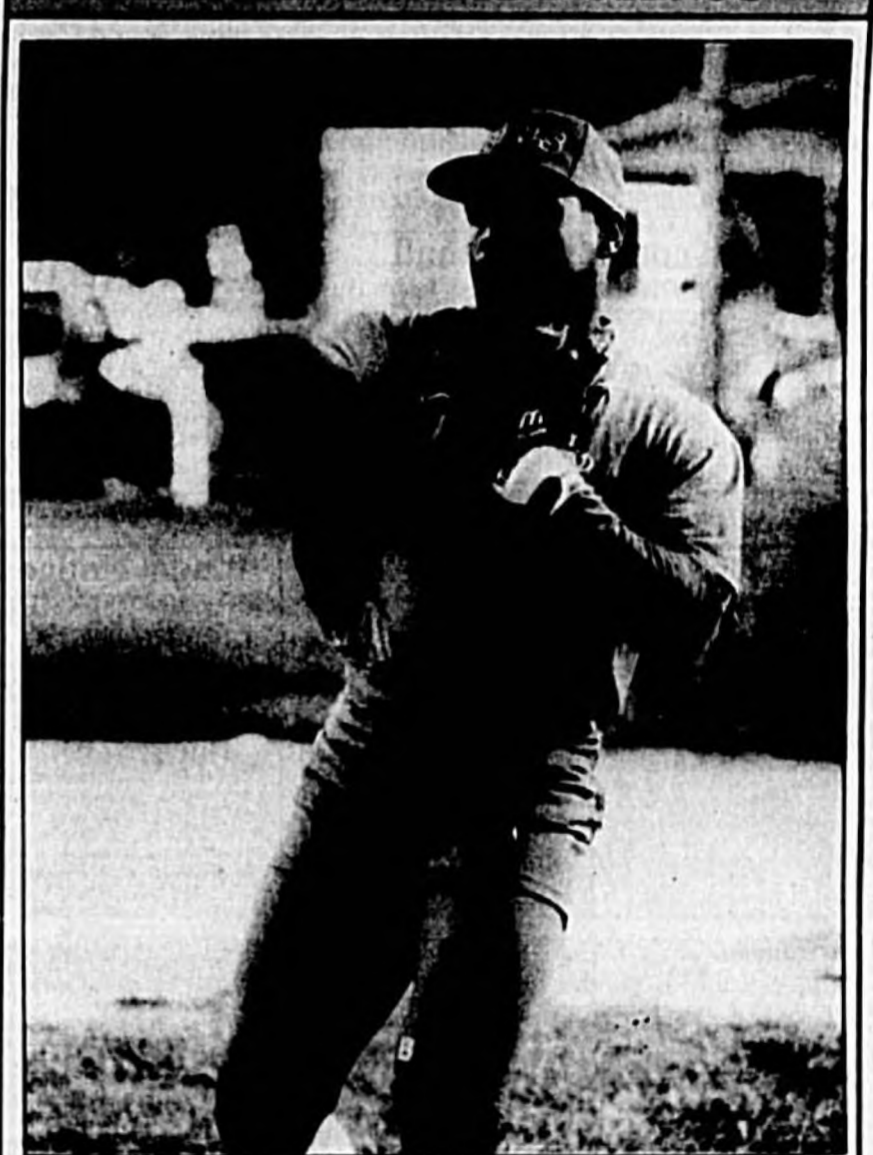

GFC "TEAM" efforts on Lake Istokpoga

SANFORD - Lake Istokpoga in Highlands County was, is and, hopefully, will continue to be a Mecca for fisher people.

A popular site for both tournament and non-competitive anglers, this 27, 480-acre eutrophic body of water, located southeast of Sebring, is now under the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission's (GFC) TEAM (Team Effort Accomplishing Management) banner.

GFC Biologist Tom Champeau, Istokpoga's TEAM project leader, rates bass fishing as superior, crappie output as better than average and bream (bluegill/shellcracker) activity just a tad below the .500 mark.

If everything is going along so well, why these intensive TEAM initiatives?

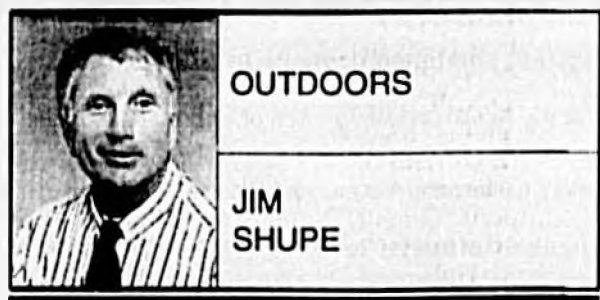
"Simple, says Champeau. "It's good now, and we want to make it even better."

Current plans for Istokpoga call for the establishment of a Fish Management Area and to optimize sportfish production and recruitment through expanded littoral habitat strategies.

Also needed is greater coordination by various government agencies as current water level fluctuations have been significantly altered from historic natural cycles.

Limited fluctuation levels in any freshwater environment will result in degraded fish and wildlife habitat as sediments, noxious weeds and nutrients build at alarming proportions.

Plans are already underway at Istokpoga to remove an abundance of tussocks, making way for the planting and expansion of desirable macrophytes throughout the lake.

TEAM meetings last July and August between the GFC, the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), South Florida Water Management District (SFWMD), the Army Corps of Engineers (COE), Highlands County officials, and interested members of the public were helping to explore methods for obtaining funds to control future hydrilla growth.

Immediate and long-range goals for Lake Istokpoga include finding suitable sites for the installation of a public fishing pier, boat ramp repair, installation of docks at R-51 and R-52, plus work with DEP and the county to maintain access to all launch areas, fishing piers, and fish camps by using contact herbicides to control choking weed expansion.

Early last year, Lake Istokpoga was treated with the chemical Sonar to knock back hydrilla growth.

According to Champeau, the project was "very successful." "But," he added, "we can expect the hydrilla to return in about three years, which will necessitate another massive treatment."

Sonar is a plant-specific chemical that works well and exclusively on hydrilla, especially in long-contact situations.

"Unfortunately," Champeau explained, "sonar is very expensive and we'll have to find some alternative funding sources to continue with these eradication programs."

Costs for the 20,000 acres treated last year totaled \$2-million, or \$1,000 per acre. A lakewide treatment in 1991-92 was followed by the stocking of 125,000 grass carp, a fish that feeds on aquatic weeds.

Regrettably, the grass carp experiment proved unsuccessful, due largely to their migration downstream, and scientists are now back at square one in an attempt to find an effective and economical solution to a burgeoning hydrilla dilemma on Istokpoga.

Lake Istokpoga, which is fed mainly by Arbutic Creek, has no headwaters, thus ruling out a lake drawdown, which could control weed growth and expose bottom sediments for easier removal.

"Compared to many other lakes through-

out Florida, Istokpoga is in pretty good shape," Champeau enthused.

"It'll be our job to see that it stays that way."

SHUPE'S SCOOP

Big bass are on the prowl, and the time to put that lunger on the wall is now through April. Think BIG and use large lures and large shiners. Discourage small bass and target big fish.

FISHING FORECAST

Expect good snook action at Sebastian Inlet. Large live shrimp or small baitfish are top picks for snook to 25 pounds. One-ounce jigs or Rapala-type lures also work great. A few redfish, flounder, trout and tarpon can also be caught.

The St. Johns River is getting better by the day for bass action. Successful anglers are anchoring near feeding and holding areas and fish areas thoroughly before moving to another spot. River bass tend to concentrate in certain areas rather than being randomly distributed.

The game, was however, closer than the score showed. DeLand scored its final touchdown in the last ten seconds of the game.

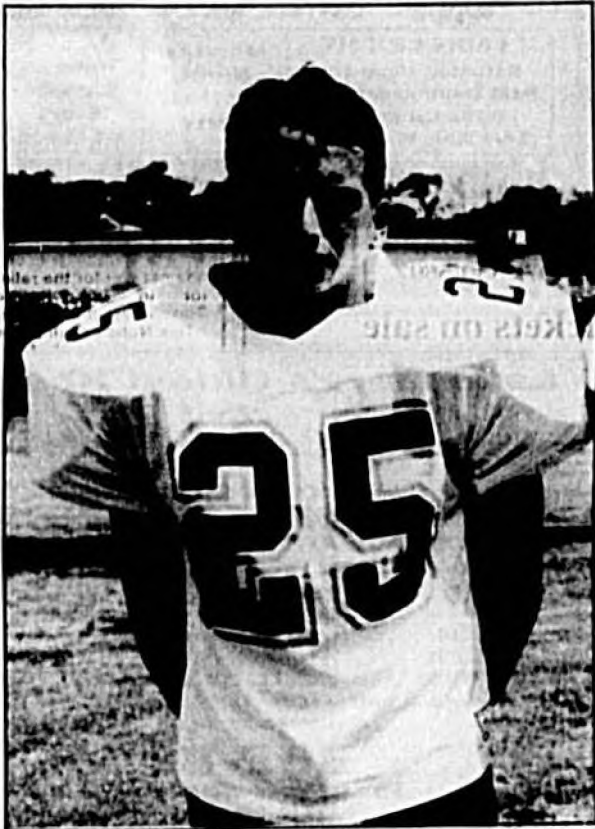

Then they have a "must win" district game at home against Mainland which will determine if this has been a good, or a great, season.

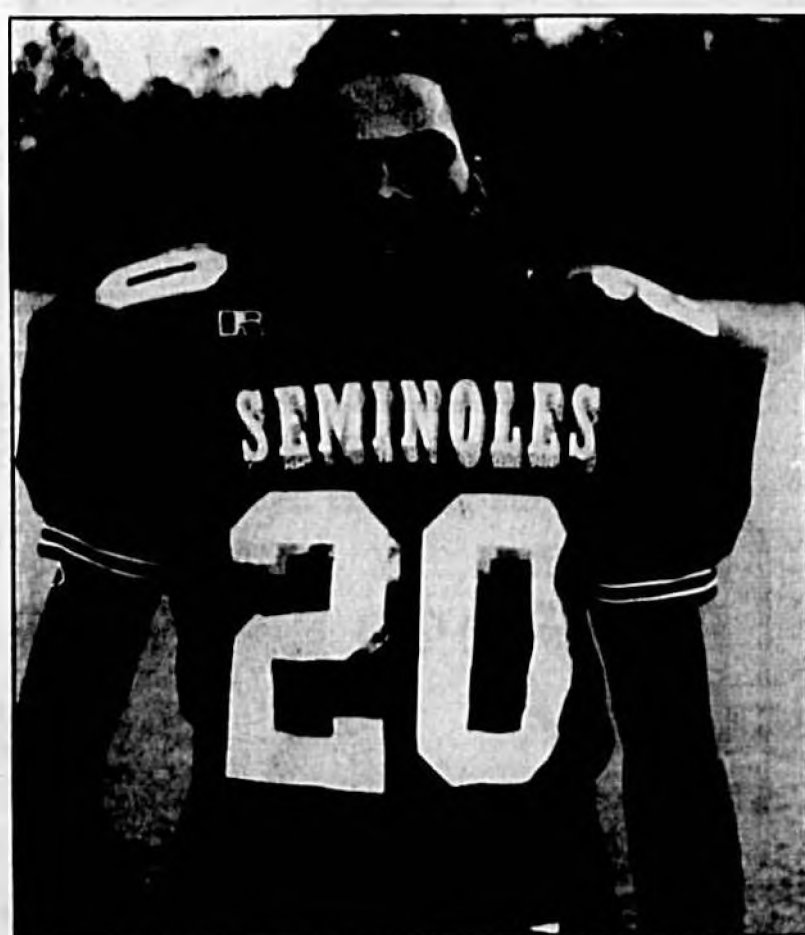
The Tribe will then finish the regular season by hosting rival Lake Mary.

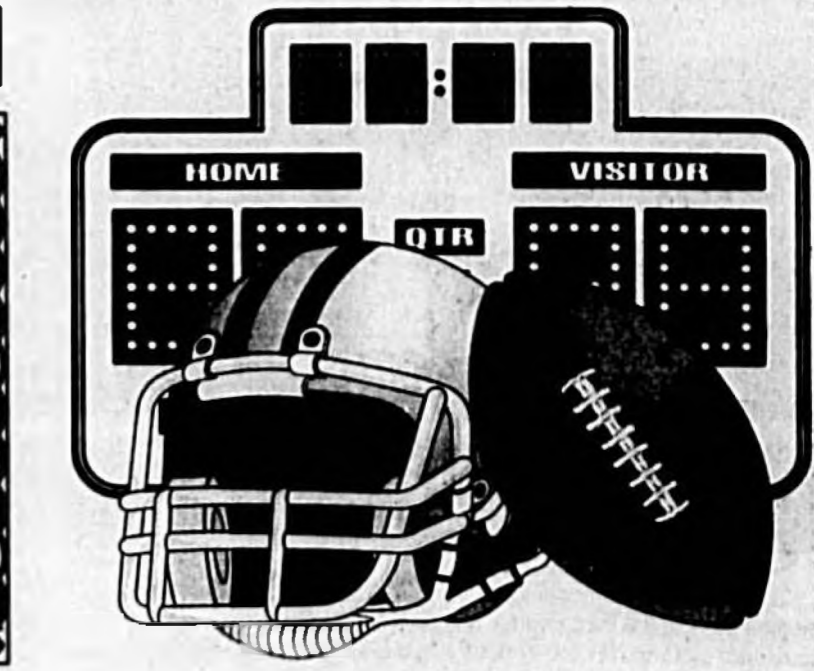

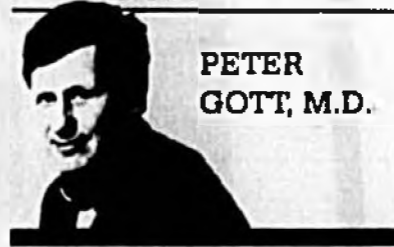

IHSS makes heart work too hard

DEAR DR. GOTT: I was recently diagnosed with idiopathic hypertrophic subaortic stenosis. What is this?

DEAR READER: IHSS is an inherited disorder marked by enlargement of part of the wall (septum) of the left ventricle, the major cardiac chamber. Blood is pumped directly from the left ventricle into the aorta, where it fans out to supply oxygen to various parts of the body. In patients with IHSS, a portion of the outflow tract is obstructed, forcing the ventricle to work harder during each beat. This leads to shortness-of-breath on slight exertion, fainting, palpitations, a murmur (extra heart sound) and cardiac enlargement. Treatment must be given, or the heart will literally work itself to death.

Two types of drugs (beta-blockers and calcium-channel blockers) help relieve the obstruction and reduce cardiac work. In the 10 to 15 percent of patients who do not respond to medical therapy, removal of the obstruction may be necessary.

Most patients with IHSS are free of symptoms for years. Treatment is not necessary until a person develops the symptoms of this disorder.

DEAR DR. GOTT: What is "organic brain syndrome?"

DEAR READER: This term means that a patient's mental powers, memory and judgment are diminished because of physical changes in the brain. Multiple strokes, senility, senile dementia and many degenerative diseases of the nervous system — including Alzheimer's disease — are classed under the broad heading of organic brain syndrome, which is a chronic condition.

Patients with organic brain syndrome usually show shrinkage of the brain. Because this change is permanent, they suffer progressive loss of cognitive function, eventually needing nursing care and assistance with the activities of daily living.

In contrast, there are acute brain syndromes, such as drug or alcohol
