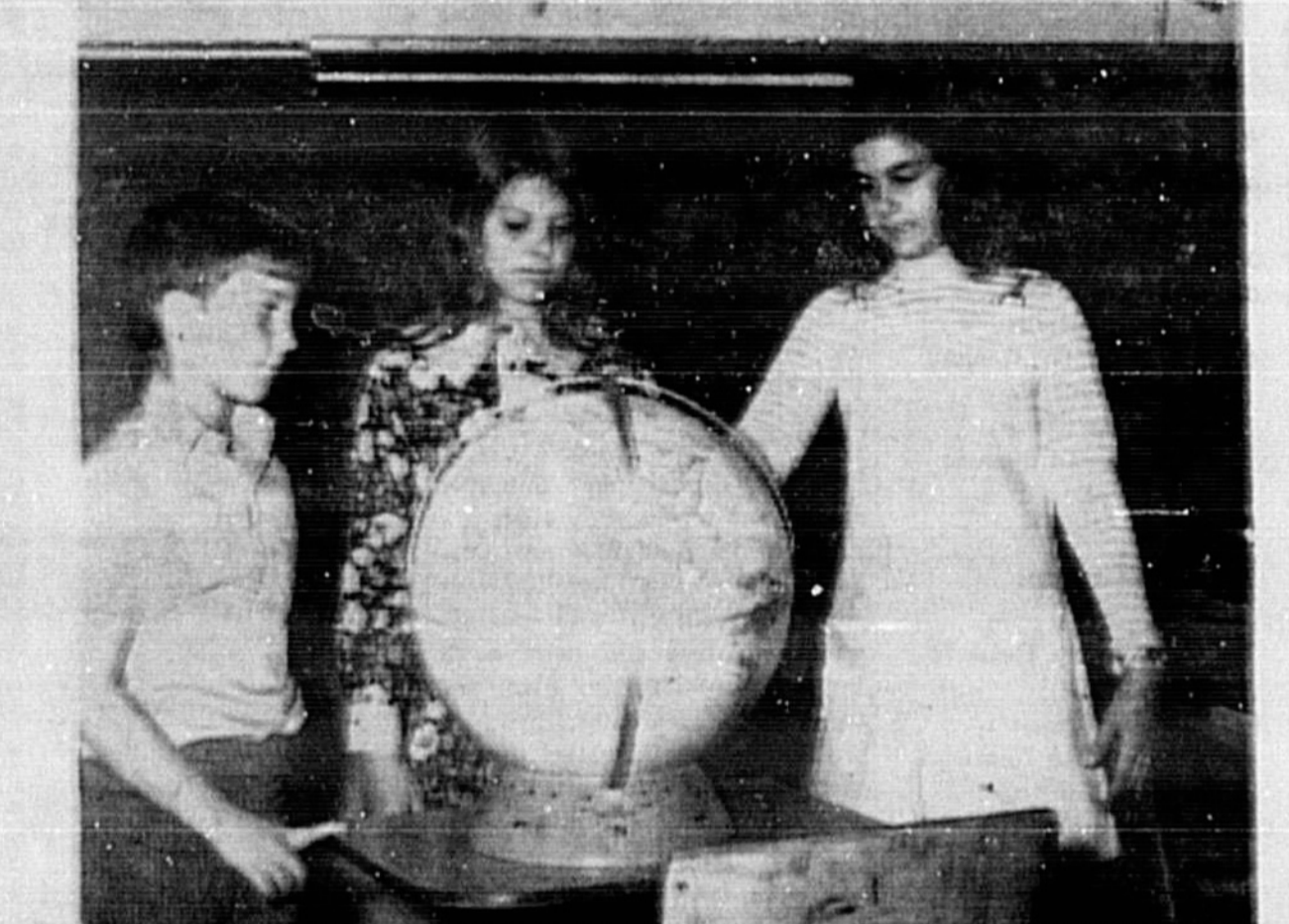

### Capital Punishment Is Debated

**LONDON (AP)**—The British House of Commons voted nearly 2 to 1 Tuesday night to abolish capital punishment, but the outcome in the House of Lords is in doubt.

The Lords open a two-day debate on the issue today, with many Conservative peers favoring the return of the hanging. Two amendments were proposed to delay a decision until next summer and until postscript: the decision for at least another year.

Parliament in 1965 suspended the death penalty for a trial period of five years. The House of Commons voted 333-185 last night to make the suspension permanent.

It was a free "vote of conscience," unrestricted by party instructions.

Home Secretary James Callaghan had introduced the resolution although it was not a government bill, and he threatened to resign if the measure was defeated.

One public opinion poll showed 65 per cent of those questioned in favor of restoring the death penalty, and a pollster, with one million signatures supporting this view was delivered to the House. But Callaghan



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## Mayor Under \$25,000 Bail

NEWARK, N.J. (UPI)—Charged with extortion, conspiracy and income tax evasion, Newark Mayor Hugh J. Addonizio left federal court under \$25,000 bail Wednesday to return to his office to conduct the city's business. "We will have our day in court," he said.

The mayor and 14 other persons—including three city Councilmen and a reputed Mafia figure—were charged Wednesday with tax evasion and conspiracy in an alleged \$352,000 extortion plot. The federal grand jury actions followed by a day the indictment of 25 persons on conspiracy and gambling charges in a widespread probe of organized crime and government corruption in New Jersey.

The 14 were charged with counts of extorting payments of \$500 to \$7,000 from the City of Newark, an engineering firm doing business with the city, Paul Rigo, an officer of the firm was reported to be an informer in the investigation.

Twelve of the defendants, Newark Wednesday. Assistant U.S. Attorney Herbert J. Stern handed Judge Robert Shaw a manila folder. Shaw informed Stern he hadn't yet ruled whether the mayor had used the Fifth Amendment properly when he refused to answer questions before the grand jury last week. Stern replied: "The grand jury having just indicted him..." and newsmen jumped.

U.S. Attorney General John N. Mitchell formally announced the indictments in Washington.

## Federal Funds Urged For City Improvement

Sanford Zoning and Planning Commission at last night's meeting approved asking City Commission to seek federal funds for urban renewal survey and matching funds for financing five beautification projects proposed by the Scenic Improvement Board.

Lynn Risner, city building official, said the urban renewal grant is necessary if city is to proceed with the renewal program as approved by voters in Dec. 2 election.

Planners also recommended that city seek from U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) matching funds for the estimated \$108,000 cost for five beautification projects, which can be accomplished by using city labor.

These include: Beautifying two entrances into city, old baseball now called Memorial Park, building of an elderly park between Park and Oak Avenues, beautifying Crooms High School and along the lakefront.

Thomas Walla, landscape architect employed by the Scenic Improvement Board, appeared to explain each project and give estimated costs.

A public hearing for zoning lakefront property north of Fulton Street from Park Avenue to French Avenue from M-1 (light industrial) to C-2 (general commercial) was set for Feb. 5 meeting.

This includes the so-called "tank farms" used for oil storage and all property owners therein will be asked to furnish long-range plans for developing the area. These time-tables are requested before the public hearing.

Zoners also recommended an airport zoning ordinance to City Commission, that will fit with an ordinance to be brought to County Commission to cover zoning requirements at Sanford Airport and in surrounding county areas.

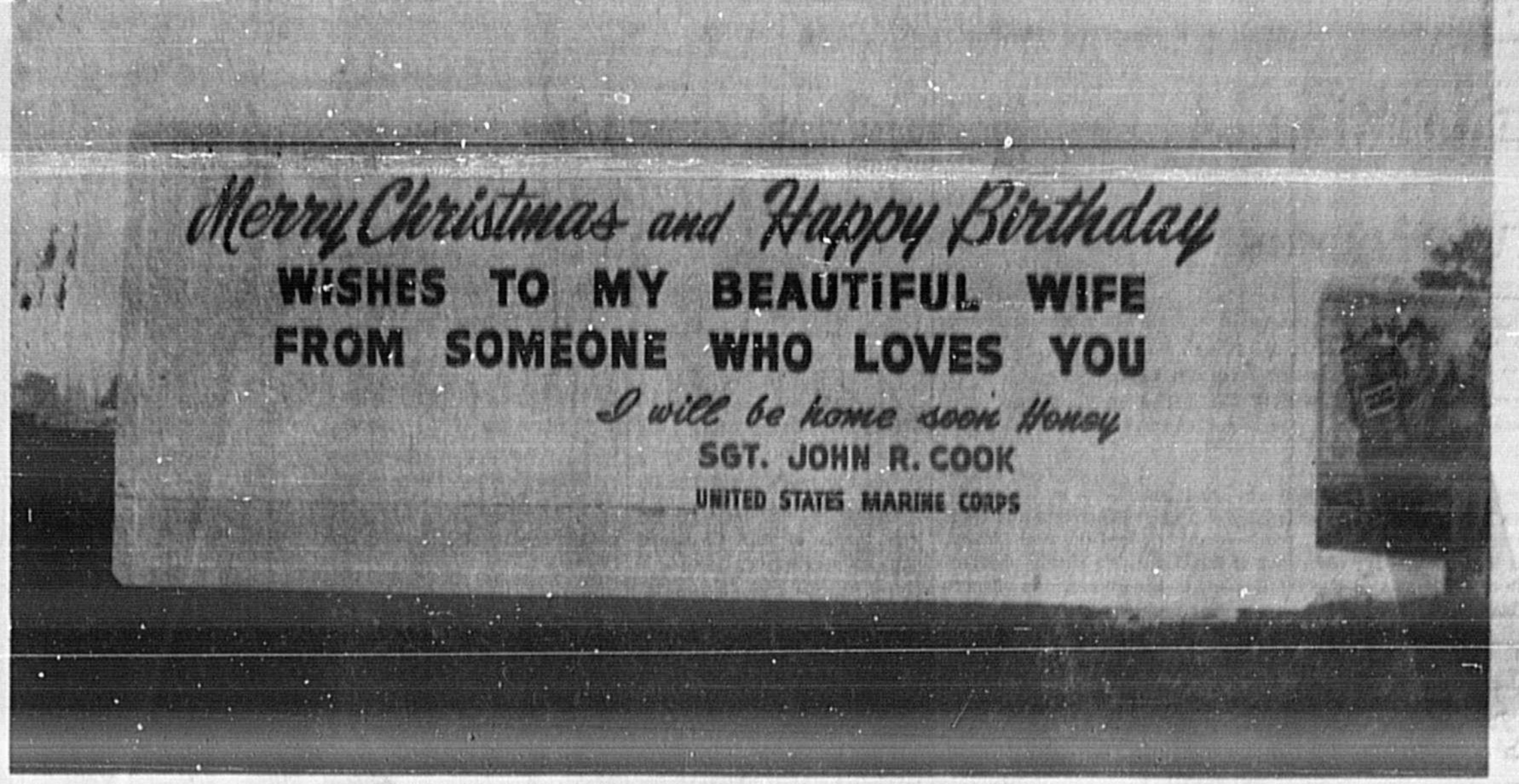

## Mayor Moore Looks To Vacancy 'New Blood' For City Urged

Sanford Mayor Lee P. Moore has some definite ideas on what kind of man should fill his one-year unexpired term on the City Commission beginning Jan. 6, when Moore resigns his commission seat to become "Mayor of the Town" for a three-year term, having just been elected by a popular vote of the people.

The mayor's ideas were discussed Thursday at a noon luncheon of the Sanford-Seminole Jaycees.

"He should be someone who has served Sanford but not in a recent position," was Moore's suggestion, which dispelled rumors that M. L. Raborn, former city commissioner and father of the law, should succeed Moore to a three-year term and stopped the practice of having the commission select one of their own for the honorary

job each year, would be named to the post.

The mayor failed to mention any names in his discourse on what every good commissioner should know and do but said he favored a man who would be willing to serve out a single year and stand for election to a three-year term.

"When I got home Tuesday night after hearing the election verdict, I received a telephone call from an individual, who volunteered to serve on the commission," Moore advised.

He indicated that this person would be considered along with others some time before the Jan. 6 date when an appointment will be made by vote of four remaining commissioners.

"At this time I don't think any one of us knows just who is being considered by the other commissioners," he added.

Regarding the city zoo, the mayor opined it should be for Florida animals only, since this was the original intent of Floyd Palmer and the Jaycees upon founding the attraction some 40 years ago.

Moore said all three zoo items on the straw ballot were approved by voters and commission could do almost anything with it but he favored keeping present site with renovations.

On urban renewal, also approved on election ballot, the mayor said, "The main objection to the program seemed to be a feeling that someone is taking something away from you but the government has been doing this for a long time under the eminent domain."

Moore stated use of federal money is the only way possible to rebuild the city's blighted areas.

Touching on the recent incursions in water and sewer rates by the city, the mayor said some of the funds would be used to help finance the cost of drainage for Georgetown area of Sanford, since that is the section to receive first attention due to a paving program already set for the area.

**Police Hunt For Rapist**

Seminole County sheriff's officers are searching for a man about 30 years of age, who yesterday raped a 15-year-old Orlando girl on the way to school after giving her a lift in his car.

County officers would not disclose the area where the attack is alleged to have occurred but it is believed the incident happened just over the county line near Forest City.

Duane Harrell, chief deputy, stated the girl was on the way to school when a car containing a lone male drove alongside and offered her a ride.

Harrell said the girl told authorities she was grabbed as soon as she entered the vehicle and covered by a pistol, which the man drew from the front seat.

The scared girl said the man drove to a wooded area in Seminole County and there assaulted her.

After the alleged attack, the girl said she was left near a road by the man who sped away in a late model car.

Harrell said the girl related walking to a nearby store where she contacted her parents and authorities, who removed her to a hospital for medical examination by Dr. Thomas Hegan. He confirmed the girl had been assaulted.

Detective L. J. Kriz today declined to give exact locations of the incident saying it would hamper the investigation.

### Senate Taxing Leader A Basic Conservative

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wilbur Mills is given to a quiet life, dark suits, white shirts, conservative views and the strict exercise of political power.

"I never vote against God, motherhood or Wilbur Mills," a liberal colleague once said of the Arkansas Democrat who chairs the House-Senate conference committee seeking a compromise on tax reform.

In the conference efforts to settle the many differences between the House and Senate versions, Mills carries more weight than his affable, soft-spoken manner might indicate.

Over the years and as chairman of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, he has built up an acknowledged expertise on tax and fiscal matters that critics are hardpressed to match.

In his bid to get a conference report that comes as close as possible to his views on tax reform, Mills doesn't intend to waste time. "If we don't start making progress, there's no use sitting around," he says, "and making his position clear in an interview."

At the same time, the courtly southerner kept to his longtime policy of never publicly criticizing the Senate or disclosing what he expects to give or take in the conference.

There is much to give and take about in the two versions before the conference—the Senate made 700 amendments to the House tax reform bill with about 100 of the changes consid-

NEW YORK (UPI) — Schwab-Carter & Co. says it is "reasonable" to expect the market to remain "within a relatively narrow channel" in the early part of the new year. But it says that "another bearish bout" may be encountered with the approach of spring but "subsequently, a steady and vigorous recovery can be witnessed."

The stock market is now in the process of ending "its longest period of generally declining stock prices" since the 1920s, Wright Investors' service says. Noting that the longest interval between new stock market highs was 46 months in 1949-50, the analyst adds: "Since 46 months have now passed since the stock market topped out at 992 in February 1968, it is apparent . . . a new post-war bear market record is being set this month."

It is "obvious" that stock prices will fade away, the Neill Letter of Contrary Opinion says. It notes that bearishness has been spreading rapidly and adds that "it does not appear smart . . . to become bearish now."

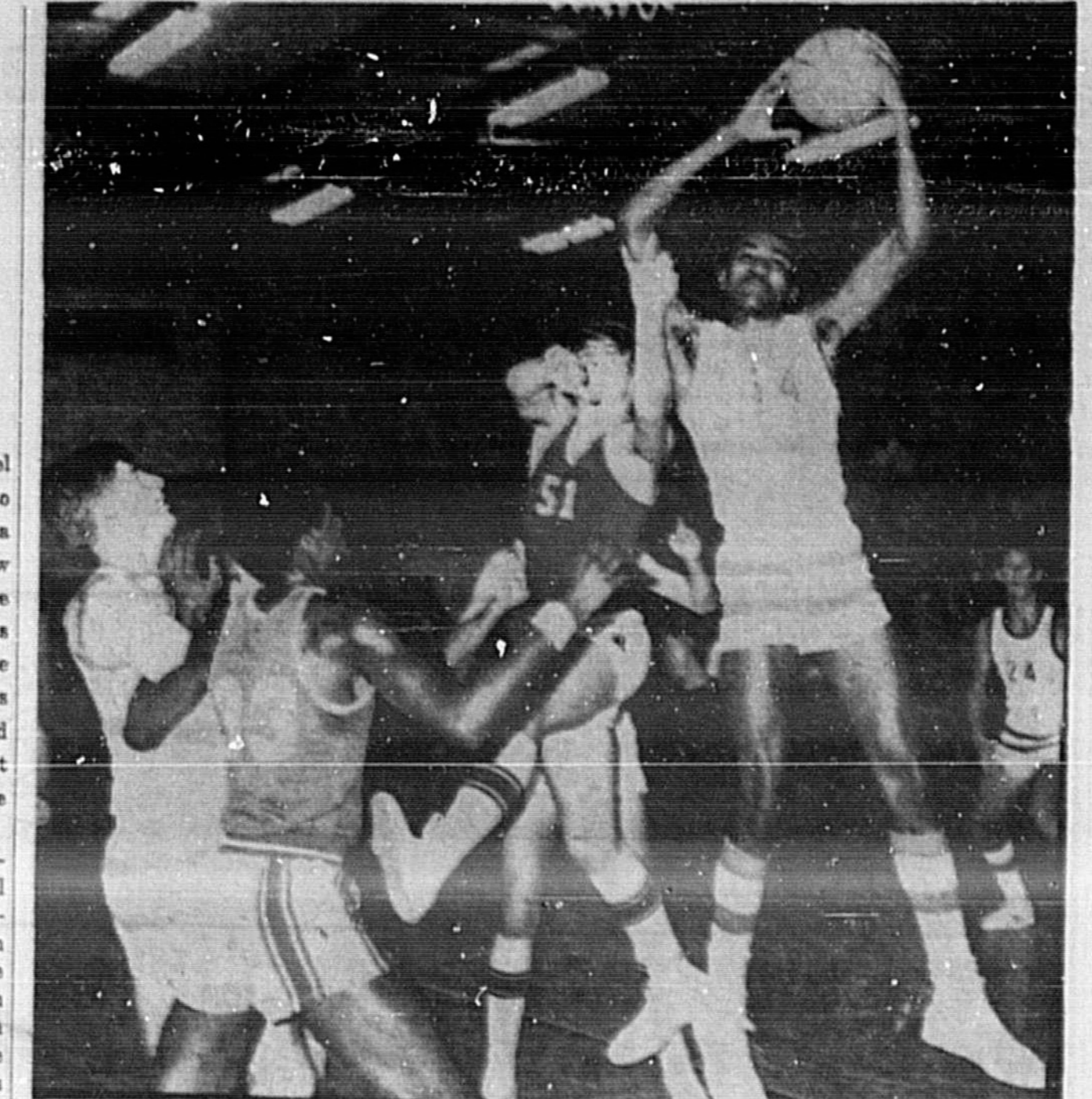

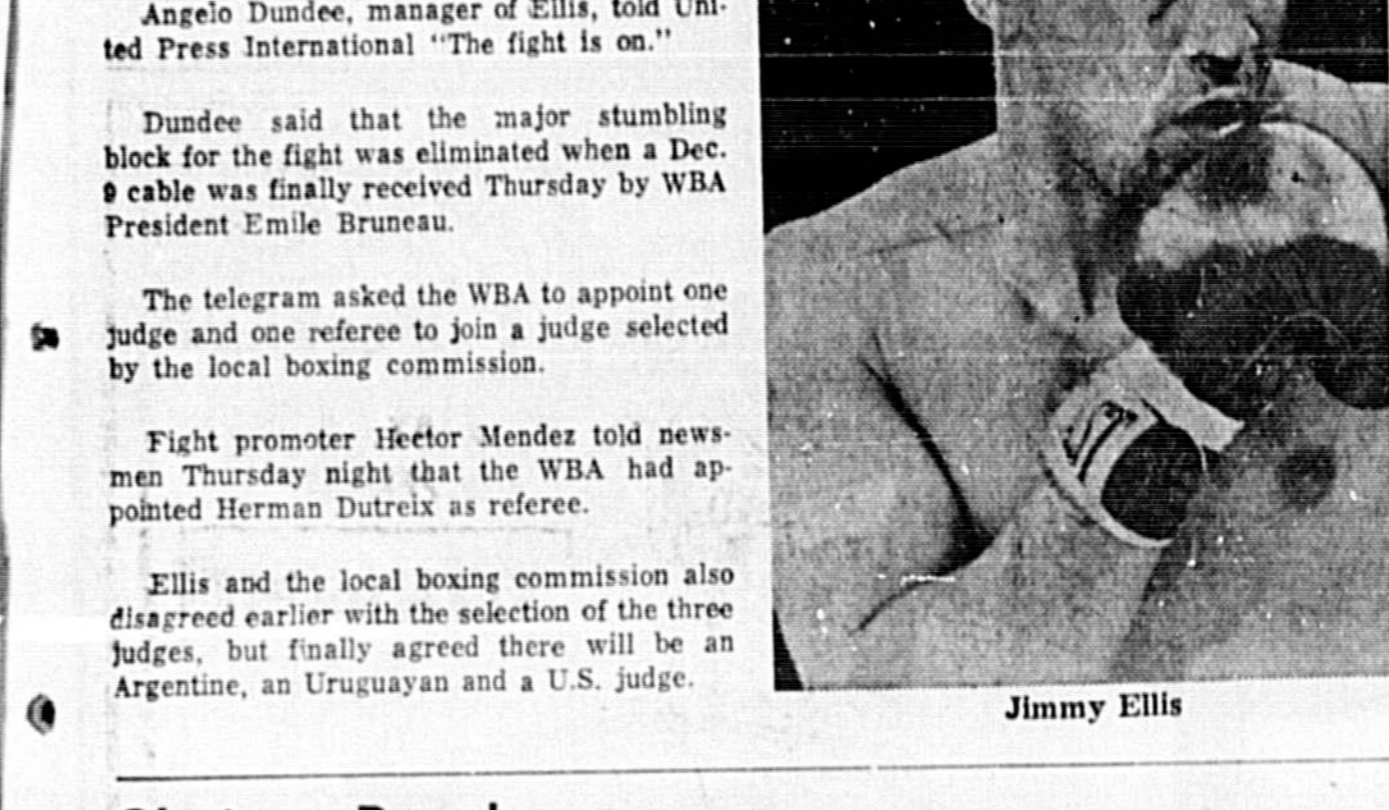
Angelo Dundee, manager of Ellis, told United Press International "The fight is on."

**Tourists Mystified By Weeping Picture**

TARPON SPRINGS, Fla. (AP) — Tourists flocked to St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church Thursday and watched in hushed reverence as dozens of women—including Greek grandmothers and hippy girls—kissed the picture of the church's "weeping saint."

Charter buses brought school children from Roman Catholic schools along the West Coast of Florida. Other charter buses brought church groups from as far away as Miami, 300 miles to the southeast.

The painting of St. Nicholas, patron saint of this sponge diving town, is exhibited in a glass case in the foyer of the church.

Father Elias Kalaritios, pastor, says small drops of liquid—"that look like tiny crystals"—have been flowing steadily since Sunday.

The droplets form on the inside of the glass about a half-inch from the surface of the painting, slide down a few inches, then disappear.

Father Kalaritios said a carpenter had checked the frame to see if condensation could be the answer and ruled out that possibility.

He also said the painting also has been exposed to sunlight in an attempt to make the drops evaporate, but that the droplets refused to disappear.

"We continue to say it is a phenomenon and beyond human understanding," the priest said. "We still would like to have a qualified chemist examine the liquid and see if he can tell us what it is."

Father Kalaritios said he was awaiting the arrival of a representative of the Greek orthodox archdiocese in New York.

Some of the women of the church fear that the weeping picture is a bad omen, the priest said. "but I think St. Nicholas is trying to tell us something. I only wish we could know what it is."

The moisture was first noticed by a cleaning woman Dec. 4. Two days before St. Nicholas' holy day of obligation, Father Kalaritios said. He said the painting was seen to weep on a few occasions after that, but since Sunday has been producing the moisture steadily.

Hundreds of the pious and the curious passed through the church Thursday.

Amateur photographers squatted at awkward angles, trying to find a position that would make the droplets show up on their negatives. Several young men and women in hippy dress entered the church during the day. They filed reverently by the painting, and some of the girls leaned over to brush the glass with their lips.

"I wish we could get more of them inside the church," Father Kalaritios said of the youths. "I'm glad to see they want to come."

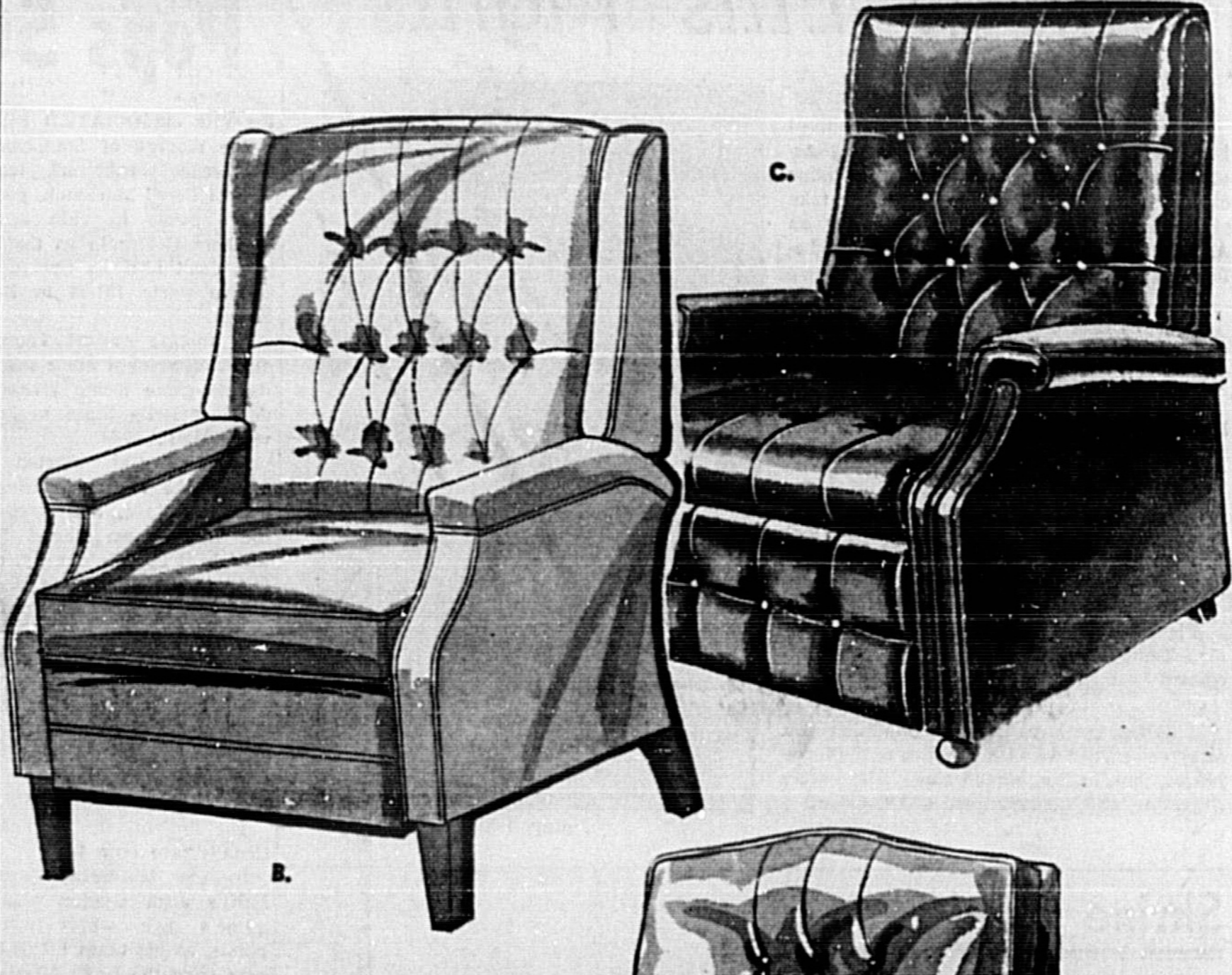

Only a fifth of the nation's accidents occur in industry, while nearly half take place in the home, she points out. At this time of year Christmas trees and decorations, the flood of toys and gifts and the many visitors and parties present especially dangerous situations.

Mrs. Howe, who regularly preaches safety for the home and family through talks before women's clubs, civic groups and school audiences and is treasurer of Howe Services here, a firm that specializes in industrial safety programs, has been active for 20 years in the field of accident prevention.

"We're trying to teach you, husband safety in his plant," she tells women. "We want him to come home and spread the word there."

She advises women to make sure the Christmas tree has been well soaked in water and that the stand in which it is placed also is filled with water. "Make sure that cords, plugs and lights are in good working order," she adds. "Remember, the cord that was good last year has spent 12 months in the closet. It could be dried out and dangerous. Don't overload outlets, and always turn out the tree lights when you leave."

"Don't let your kitchen become a danger area," says Mrs. Howe. "Too many pots on the stove, with handles sticking out, potential troublemakers. Wipe up spills before you slip on them. Toys can be dangerous if they have sharp points or if they are inflammable."

She also suggests removing ice from walks and steps and other places where guests come from outside.

### 3 Persons Held After Hot Chase

Three persons, two men and a 12-year-old girl, are being held in Seminole County jail after an early Saturday morning chase from Seminole into Lake County.  
Chief Deputy Duane Harrell said Clifford Redding, 21, 36 William Clark Court, and Eddie Hollis, 19, 1710 Alexander Avenue, both Sanford, were charged with contributing to the delinquency of a juvenile and several automobile violations after a chase, started when Deputy George Hughey spotted a car stolen earlier from Tropkeys Construction Company at Sanford, and ended in a wrecked vehicle on SR 42 at Clearwater Reservation in Lake County.  
Harrell said the juvenile had a small caliber pistol in her possession, when arrested by Deputy George Myers.  
She was charged with possession of a concealed weapon and accessory in an auto theft and turned over to juvenile authorities, Harrell added.  
Hollis managed to escape minutes after the wreck, but was apprehended with the aid of bloodhounds by Lake County sheriff's officers and released to Seminole County authorities.

# It's That Time Of Hope

Christmas is a time of hope, a season of the belief in the goodness of mankind and compassion for our fellowmen. Most of us, busy with shopping and a myriad of details often forget the real meaning of Christmas, but the poignant faith of Mrs. Bea Coffee, whose husband, Lt. Col. Gerald Coffee, is a prisoner of North Vietnam, gives real meaning to "peace on earth."  
Mrs. Coffee has just returned from a visit with President and Mrs. Richard Nixon, where she heard the present policy of the government toward the prisoners of war discussed. The wives were selected from a cross section of the country and from representation of different branches of service. Some had loved ones who are among the 1,400 prisoners in North Vietnam, who are mostly air crewmen and pilots, and others are relatives of prisoners held in South Vietnam, who are helicopter and ground troops. Transportation and expenses were arranged by the government.  
Upon arrival, the group of wives were honored with a dinner and reception at Bolling Air Force Base officers club attended by the Secretary of State, Secretary of Defense, Secretary of the Air Force, Army, and Navy, Chiefs of Staff of the Air Force and Chief of Naval Operations, Commandant of the Marine Corps and the military aid to the President. Altogether there were 56 top military advisers on hand to meet the wives, and Mrs. Coffee and the other wives were "very impressed to see so many people of prominence to reassure them about the welfare of their loved ones."  
The wives, who arrived in Washington on Dec. 11, were then invited to the White House on Dec. 12. They met in the library, and were first introduced to Mrs. Nixon, after which the president arrived and gave a 25-minute speech. He assured the women that it is the policy of the government to have the prisoners returned to the only two alternatives to the POW situation, total withdrawal, with the massacre of the South Vietnamese, or the pro-



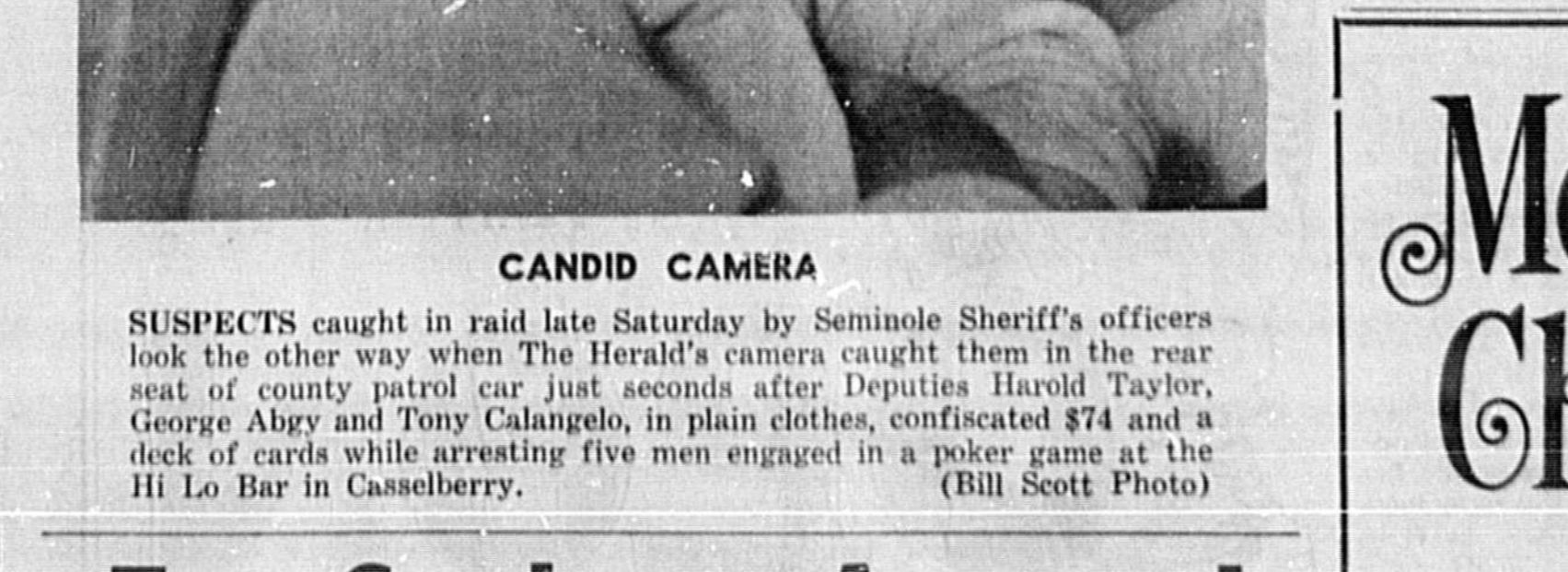

### Sanford To Seek \$ Grant

Sanford city commission will meet Monday at 8 p. m. for the last time this year, and under present organization, to hear four recommendations from the city's zoning and planning commission, one of which is a request that city seek a federal money grant for an urban renewal study.  
This will be the last meeting for Commissioners Earl Higginbotham and A. L. Wilson, incumbents who lost in recent city election. Gordon Meyer will succeed Wilson at Jan. 8 organizational meeting and Mayor Les P. Moore, winner over Higginbotham for other position, will be presiding for the last time under present organization.  
He will assume the mayor's office for three years in January and someone will be appointed by the commission to fill Moore's last year on his present three-year commission term.  
Commission will face a long agenda dealing with complex subjects, including the urban renewal request from zoning board.  
Voters approved the federal rebuilding program in Dec. 2 elections, and zoning board is moving at a fast pace to insure that city acts to receive a U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) grant to fund costs of surveying city's blight to determine what areas should first feel the bulldozers blade in an expected residential rebuilding program.  
Other zoning requests for commission approval include:  
—Amend ordinance to allow "new car" lots as a conditional use in a C-1 zone;  
—Amend zoning, ordinance to adapt Sanford Airport zoning regulations and map;  
—Proceed with beautification plans and apply for federal matching funds for those plans presented by the Scenic Improvement Board.  
A report from the State Attorney General regarding the Airport Authority Act by William C. Hutchison, city attorney, is also on the agenda.  
Other matters to receive commission attention include:  
—First reading of ordinance prohibiting junk cars in commercial zones; annexation of five lots on French Avenue; annexation of two lots on West 18th Street and Peach Street; annexation of five lots on Oncola Drive in the Dreamwood Subdivision.
