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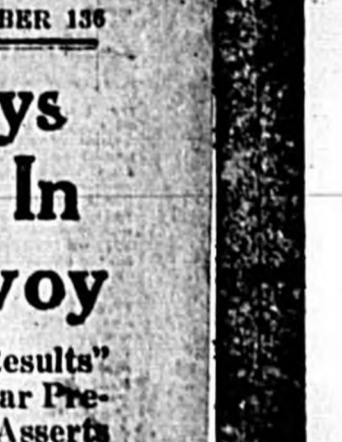

Not So Bad

The Herald has been subjected to some criticism during the last few days for taking the current freeze too lightly. Apparently we do not realize that some growers have been completely wiped out, the entire citrus crop for this year destroyed, and even in some cases the trees damaged to such an extent that it may be several years before they will again produce a sizeable crop.

One farmer calls up to say that his entire field of lettuce is ruined. Another reports that out of a half dozen vegetables he was growing last week, only his celery remains of any value. Still another asks if we do not think this is the worst disaster this state has ever faced and declares his belief all the citrus fruits in the state and 50 percent of the celery in Seminole County is ruined.

While there is no intention on our part of minimizing the effects of last week's cold weather, we still have seen no official estimates of the extent of the loss and until we do we are inclined to believe that the early reports are not as bad as they sound. We can well understand how a person who has lost 50 to 75 percent of his crop may feel that the world has come to an end and it is he who is likely for the moment to do the most talking; while another farmer who may have escaped uninjured is pretty sure to keep quiet about it.

Until some official report is made we can only guess at the damage to the citrus crop. Undoubtedly the losses here are great. Most Seminole County groves, where the temperature ranges four or five degrees higher than in similar latitudes, were badly hit and it naturally follows that groves in most other parts of the state probably suffered more. It may well be that 75 percent of this year's citrus has been destroyed.

But the outlook for celery does not seem to us to be so bad. Early estimates of the loss here vary from ten to 50 percent. It should be recalled, however, that for several years we have been plowing under about one-third of the total crop because we had more than we could sell. If we have lost 50 percent by the freeze we are not much worse off than we would have been if we had plowed it under.

Furthermore, the freeze has wiped out most competing vegetables from other parts of the country. A New York newspaper reports, "Produce dealers are in a buzz of excitement over the big freeze in the South. Spinach suffered in the freeze and wholesale prices have advanced 50 to 75 cents a bushel. Bunched beets and parsley are hurt and prices move higher because of the freeze. Other items averaging higher this week are peppers, eggplants, broccoli and lima beans."

All of this means that celery will be in more demand than ever and that prices will be higher. When farmers plow under a third of their crop, they still couldn't get the cost of production for the rest because competing vegetables were as plentiful as ever. But when a freeze takes part of their crop, their prices go higher because the freeze also reduces the quantity of other fresh vegetables on the market. In fact, since celery is an unusually hardy crop, a freeze means that the crop reduction runs infinitely higher among other vegetables than with celery.

Instead of lamenting that half our celery has been destroyed, let us rejoice that half of it has been saved. We are rather inclined to the belief that 90 percent of it has been saved, and that will serve the same purpose, as far as prices are concerned, as if we had plowed under 50 percent of the crop. Remember that a pessimist is a person who looks at a bottle and says "It's half gone"; an optimist rejoices that "It's half full."

A German Treaty

Adolf Hitler and other prominent Nazis have been telling us for several years what a wicked and vicious treaty was made at Versailles following the last World War. Undoubtedly it did have its imperfections, but the Kaiser was allowed to retire in peace and comfort to the safety of his Doorn estate in Holland. Von Hindenburg returned home, later to become president of the new German republic, and no other German leaders faced the firing squads.

Some indemnity was asked of the Germans for the destruction wrought in France during the war. We believe this ran as high as \$400,000,000 a year. But the Germans never made more than a pretense at paying it. They borrowed the money from England and America for a few years to make the first payments and then discontinued making them altogether. They were required to turn over their navy to the Allies, but scuttled it before doing so.

They lost some of their territory as a result of the war, but complaints against this loss have come from residents of Berlin and Munich rather than from anyone living in the provinces turned over to the Allies. The only parts of continental Germany taken away from her were Alsace-Lorraine, which were in reality French anyway, and have been acknowledged so even by Hitler; and the Polish Corridor, which was peopled largely with Poles and which gave Poland its only possible access to the sea.

The question is being asked many times these days as to what are the present war aims of the Allies. In other words, what kind of a treaty will be made this time if the Allies win. It has been suggested by French and British leaders that Poland should be restored, that the Czechoslovaks should be given back their independence, that Austria should be recreated. Beyond this, not much has been said.

But there is not much question about what the war aims of the Nazis are, or what sort of a treaty will be made at the close of this war if Hitler is victorious. Fortunately, or unfortunately, from the Polish point of view, we have a splendid illustration of what Nazi war aims are like in the reconstruction of Poland following that 18-day struggle last Fall. Poland has been literally wiped off the map.

Part of it was given to the Russian communists, and the other part was incorporated within the German Reich. All Polish leaders who were unable to escape the country were lined up before firing squads. Most other leaders, including business men, bankers, landlords, and farmers, were shot or placed in concentration camps. Other Poles were drafted in the labor battalions and put to work on German projects of one kind and another without pay and regardless of physical fitness.

Polish priests who have sought to give aid or comfort to their suffering fellow countrymen have been considered. 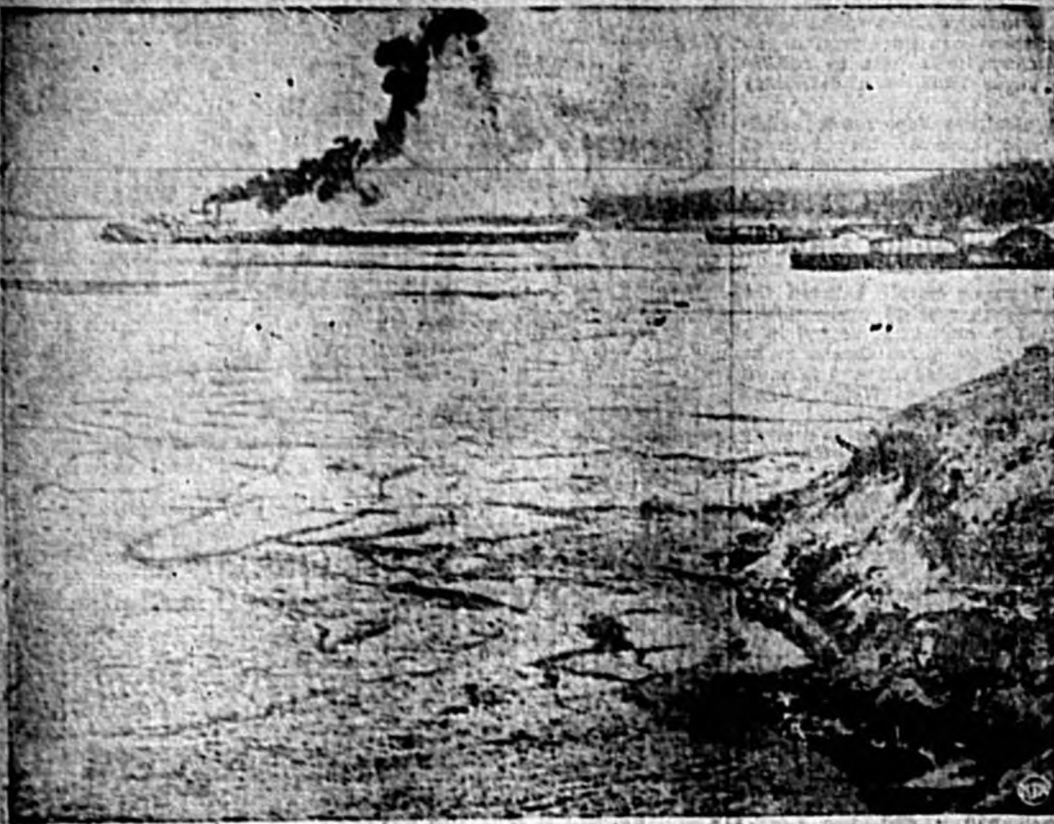

Indians Fail Merchandising Shrimp, Oysters

SARASSEE, Jan. 31.—There is nothing wrong with the merchandising of Florida oysters and shrimp, thinks R. L. (Bob) Williams, state supervisor of oyster and shrimp authorities in Florida. Laying far to the west of four other southern states in furnishing the nation's oysters with canned shrimp oysters.

Commenting on the U. S. Dept. of Fisheries report for 1937, with a coast line of about 13,000 miles, furnished but \$41,000 worth of canned oysters. 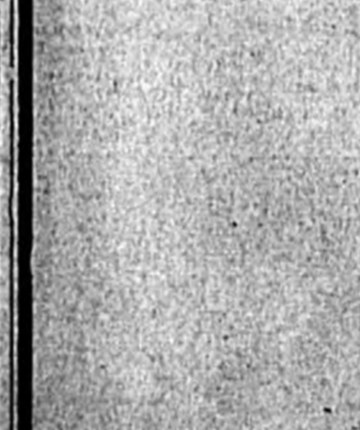

Russia Launches New Attacks On Finns At Salla, Petsamo

Interest shifted today from battlefields of the world's three wars—in Finland, China, and on the Western Front—to center on parliaments of two of the empires involved, Britain and Japan.

The Japanese heard sweeping statements of their foreign policy, expressing the hope for renewed treaty relations with the United States and district of Russia while the British House of Commons prepared to debate demands for inclusion of an economics minister in the war cabinet.

Japan's army and navy asked Parliament to approve a new seven-year arms program costing about \$675,000,000 after the war minister declared the army "is not relaxing its watch" along Soviet Russia's borders.

On the Western Front in Europe, France reported four patrole had penetrated German lines, some to a distance of two miles and brought back valuable information. The Germans said some patrole had been destroyed.

Additional restrictions will be placed on the Japanese in Tokyo. The latest curtailment, the fifth in five months because of an acute power famine, was ordered for an additional ten days in 14 percentages of which Osaka, Japan's chief manufacturing center, is the largest. Other principal industrialized areas affected included Kobe and Kyoto.

Despite the fact that there are 218 cars of Florida celery being held on the tracks in 16 principal markets over the nation, Florida celery brought a top price of \$4.00 in several large markets yesterday and the market was generally steady to stronger.

Some of Sanford's celery which was moved during the cold weather was frozen in transit and although there have been no reports that any of this celery has been dumped, the prices received were naturally lower.

Market Manager H. J. Lehman reported some cabbage sales high as \$75 per ton in small quantities but the prevailing prices ranged from \$15 to \$60 per ton.
