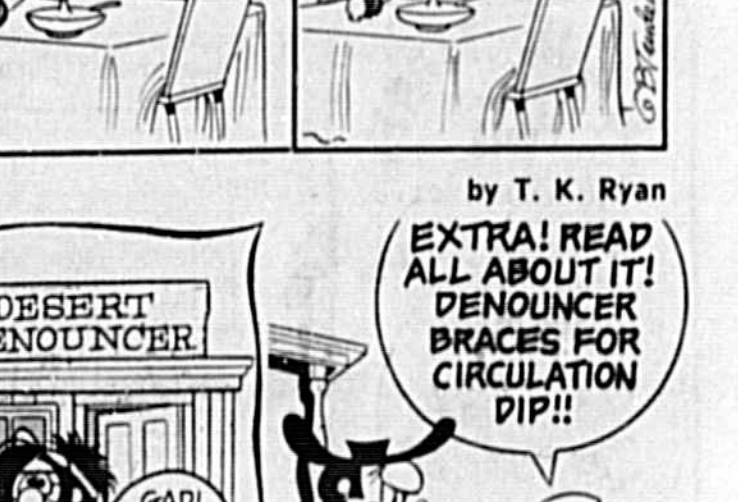
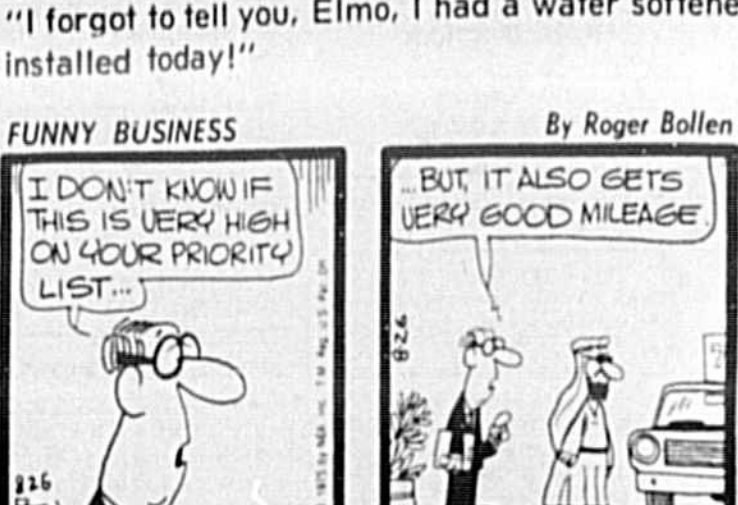

## WORLD IN BRIEF

### Timor Government Flees To Offshore Island

MACAO (AP) — The government of war-torn Portuguese Timor fled early today from the capital of Dili to the offshore island of Atauro, the Portuguese government of Macao reported.

A government statement said the evacuation was ordered by Portuguese President Francisco de Costa Gomes following a heavy bombardment of Dili on Tuesday. The report said the casualty toll was increasing but it gave no figures.

The Macao freighter MacDili, which was in Dili harbor to remove refugees, was used for the evacuation, and "the whole operation went off very smoothly," the statement said.

The skipper of the MacDili said in a message received in the Australian port of Darwin that his ship loaded a haul of gunfire to tow a flotilla of small boats containing the escaping governor, Lemos Pires, and his party to Atauro.

### Delegates Work Backstage

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Angry challenges to the industrialized nations are dominating the public sessions of the conference of non-aligned nations. But delegates and aides are hard at work backstage on the basic economic problems of the Third World.

Political and economic working groups raced against a Thursday noon deadline for completion of proposals for the 81 nations attending the conference to sponsor at the special economic session of the United Nations General Assembly in New York next week and at the regular General Assembly session opening later in the month.

One economic specialist predicted solid approval for a resolution calling for a giant development fund to be set up by the Third World nations themselves, with each pledging an equal initial amount and large voluntary contributions later.

### Army On Full Alert

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — All army units were put on full alert early today as a dispute over military participation in the government brought demands from top generals for the resignation of the army chief.

Some navy and air force units and the federal police in Buenos Aires also were alerted for trouble amid rumors of an impending military coup. But the professed goal of the critics of the army chief, Gen. Alberto Numa Laplane, was to keep the army out of the government, not to take it over.

Fading Peronist politicians and labor leaders and the leading opposition party closed ranks behind President Isabel Peron in a show of support for "the constitutional process."

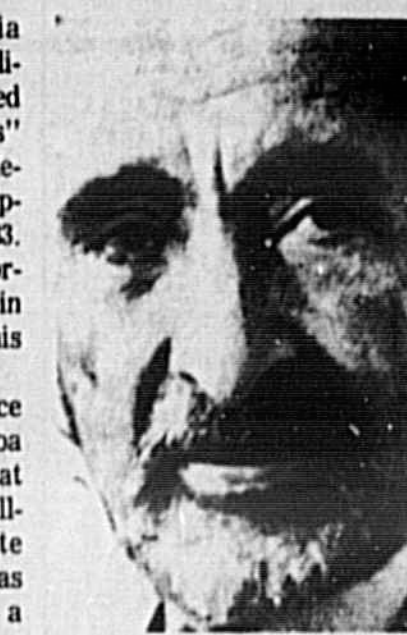
### Kissinger: 'Nuances' Remain

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt (AP) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger says only "nuances" remain to be resolved in a new Israeli-Egyptian agreement providing for another Israeli pullback in the Sinai Desert.

Israeli officials in Jerusalem said today a key part of the pact already is complete and ready for signing. They said the completed section obliged both sides to refrain from "the use or threat of force" and was to be signed directly between Israel and Egypt.

Kissinger reported "remarkable progress" in the negotiations after his arrival from Israel late Tuesday afternoon to confer with President Anwar Sadat.

## One-Time Ethiopian King Selassie Dies

ADDIS ABABA, Ethiopia (AP) — Haile Selassie, the diminutive strong man who ruled Ethiopia as the "King of Kings" for 58 years before he was deposed by the military last September, died today. He was 83.

The government said the former monarch was found dead in his bed by a servant early this morning.

In Washington, intelligence sources said an Addis Ababa radio broadcast reported that Selassie died as a result of illness affecting his prostate gland. Last May, Selassie was reported seriously ill with a prostate condition.

The sources said the broadcast gave no further details.

Since he was deposed last Sept. 12 Selassie had been confined in one of his former palaces in the Ethiopian capital, and access to him had been denied to outsiders.

Medical reports following his operation said he was making a normal recovery. But then there was no further word on his condition.

Today's broadcast said that following a deterioration Tues-

day, Selassie's only surviving daughter, Princess Tenagnework, had been permitted to visit him.

But there was apparently no fear his death was imminent, and the former absolute monarch of 27 million people died alone.

Taking the throne in 1928 when he was 36, he ruled for 41 of the next 46 years.

Mussolini's invading army drove him into exile in 1936. The British army brought him back to his throne in 1941 and he kept it until a slow-motion military coup culminated in his arrest last Sept. 12.

# Chili: 'Hot Pepper Courage Of Poor' Beats Prices

SAN ANTONIO, Texas — A robust pot warrior from the frontier past is joining the war against ever higher food prices in thousands of the nation's kitchens today.

It is chili con carne, conqueror of cheap meat cuts, all of the Southwest, and once the hot pepper courage of the poor.

There are many chili recipes, but all of them must trace their ancestry to the bi-cultural city

of San Antonio where the dish was born to sustain the lowly and to praise both God and Texas.

The great "bowl of red" they called it when the first padres built the first missions. Then, as today, in its primal versions, it beaded the brows of its eaters, formed dew upon upper lips, and stimulated an utterly reasonable desire among dinner partners to nibble each others ears.

San Antonio's chili, and subsequently the world's, is commonly held to be a Mexican concoction. It is true that it owns a parental Mexican heritage as does the city itself. But it is folk-fact that the dish did not come north across the border. It originated in the local 'dobe hats or jacals of the founding mission compounds. Any dates of origin are clouded, but in 1828, one J. C. Clopper, a rover from Cin-

cinnati, came through San Antonio en route to that wiregrass emptiness which was later called Houston. He wrote at length about chili con carne. He called it a stew made by the poorer classes "with nearly as many peppers as meat."

According to Santone historians, that "stew" consisted of "bite-sized beef cooked slowly with the pulp of chili peppers, crushed oregano,

ground cumin seeds and fine-chopped garlic cloves." There was debate concerning the presence of non-presence of suet.

There is always debate about chili. In some circles, the fall of the Alamo is attributed to a Mexican sniper whose lucky shot busted the last clay potful of chili in the mission fortress. By 1840, San Antonio enjoyed a lively export trade in chili. It shipped "big red" in brick

form. The brick, hard as the heart of a Mexican duena, was made of dried beef, fat, dried chili peppers and salt. It was made edible by boiling, and boiled it was wherever men travelled the long, harsh trails of the Southwest. Quite possibly, it was the predecessor of the U. S. Army's C-ration.

A famous San Antonio recipe known as Argyle chili makes a most courageous dish as

follows: "One pound each of lean beef and pork. Cut into cubes with salt, pepper and flour. Fry in bacon fat until brown. Remove from fat and fry two onions chopped with cut up green and red peppers. Add flour to same fat to make gravy. Add can of tomatoes, two teaspoonsful chili powder, one teaspoonful cumin seed. Add meat and simmer until tender. Additional water may be needed before done."

# Salmon Steaks With Hollandaise--A Good Choice

One of summer's best dishes is salmon steaks with Hollandaise Sauce. But with cholesterol-watchers in just about every house these days, lots of cooks are having second thoughts about serving Hollandaise with its plenitude of egg yolks and butter. If a substitute offering interests you, you might like to try the following recipe for Mock Hollandaise Sauce. It's much less rich than the real thing.

There's nothing new about "mock" dishes. Fannie Farmer gave a recipe for Mock Hollandaise Sauce in her "A New Book of Cookery" published in 1912, although I am sorry to say that the lady — whose cookbooks were utterly austere — did not give the reason for its inclusion. Since her mock creation contains the same amount of butter and egg yolks as does her earlier recipe for Hollandaise Sauce, I suspect that she thought the substitute, which is an enriched white sauce, would

be easier for cooks to make. Indeed her directions for preparing the true Hollandaise include this warning: "If left over the fire too long it will separate."

The following modern recipe for Mock Hollandaise calls for only a few tablespoons more butter than would be used in a standard white sauce and only one egg yolk. Quite a difference from Fannie's! But then in her time there weren't any cholesterol-watchers.

To broil or poach the salmon

steaks you may be interested in the following "rule of thumb." It comes from a booklet called "The Way to Cook Fish," a publication of the Consumer Services Division, Fisheries and Marine Service, Ottawa, Ont., Canada.

"Measure the thickness of the fish at the thickest part. For fresh fish allow 10 minutes cooking time per inch thickness; for frozen fish allow 20 minutes cooking time per inch thickness. Fish should be cooked only until the flesh be-

comes opaque and it flakes or separates easily when tested with a fork."

Better have a ruler in the house!

SALMON AND MOCK HOLLANDAISE PLATTER  
4 tablespoons butter or margarine  
3 tablespoons flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
Few grains cayenne pepper  
1 1/4 cups milk  
1 egg yolk

2 tablespoons lemon juice  
4 to 6 poached or broiled salmon steaks  
4 to 6 servings broiled tomatoes  
Watercress and ripe olives  
In a 1 1/2-quart saucepan over low heat melt the butter; stir in the flour, salt, paprika and cayenne. Off heat, gradually stir in the milk, keeping smooth. Cook, stirring constantly, over moderately low heat until thickened and boiling; remove from heat. In a small mixing

bowl, with a fork or a small whisk, beat the egg yolk slightly; beat in a little of the hot sauce; stir the yolk mixture back into the rest of the hot sauce. Cook over very low heat, stirring constantly, for a couple of minutes. Stir in the lemon juice. (Makes about 2 cups.) Arrange the salmon steaks on a platter; alternate with the tomatoes; spoon a little of the sauce over them and serve the rest separately. (If you like, you can add some sliced olives to the sauce.)
