Although we think a welfare
fund as advocated by John L.
Lewis but with proper safeguards
to prevent its dissipation would
be a good thing, the fact should
not be overlooked by the people
that they will pay for it in
higher prices for coal. It is a
good thing for the miners, not
so good for the poor devil in
some big northern city who has
to buy coal to keep warm.

The sub-commission on the
Status of Women of the Com-
mission on Human Rights of the
United Nations Economic and
Social Council debated for four
hours last week in the midst of
the coal strike and finally came
to the momentous decision that
"woman is, as such, a human
being." Throughout a large
segment of the world, how-
ever, the subject will probably
remain for some years to come
a matter of debate.

At the University of Vermont
Alpha Xi Delta sorority has been
suspended by national head-
quarters for admitting a negro
girl to membership. The girl
lives with the other girls in
their dormitories, gets better
than average marks, is one of
the most popular girls on the
campus. But a rule of the na-
tional sorority prohibits the ad-
mission of negroes. It is inter-
esting to note that the first
place where this rule was broken
was in a state university in the
rock-ribbed Republican state of
Vermont.

The need for more hospitals
in the United States is illustrated
by Life Magazine which reveals
there are 1,300,000 persons in
the United States who are hope-
lessly handicapped because of
stuttering. As a rule nothing
whatever is done about it because
the stutterer has neither the
money nor the knowledge to do
what is needed. And for most
of them there is nothing which
could be done about it anyway
because there is only one hospital
in the entire country devoted ex-
clusively to the study of speech
disorders. This paper each
week will be filled with proper
advertisements.

Safety in the Water

Pointing out ten precautions which should be taken
by everyone going into the water, Warren Smith, YMCA
athletic director, adds significantly that everyone should
learn to swim. The list of countless drownings among
persons who never learned to swim strongly indicates that
merely not going swimming is no adequate safeguard.

Too many boys who can't swim go sailing, canoeing
or rowing. Too many more fall into the water from
docks, bridges, or large boats. Too many go wading in the
ocean, only to step into a hole, get dragged out to sea
by the undertow. By far the best precaution against
drowning is to learn how to swim well, and then observe
the following rules:

- 1—Never go swimming alone. Even a good swimmer can get into trouble—and if he is alone, there will be no one to aid him or go for help.
2—Never go swimming at an unguarded spot. The safest swimming places are beaches or pools adequately protected by skilled lifeguards. The most dangerous are docks, piers, river banks or other unguarded spots.
3—Never dive into strange waters. You don't know what is on the bottom and might crack your head on hidden rocks, get stuck in the mud or run into other dangers. Slip into strange water carefully and explore it before doing any diving.
4—Don't show off in the water. Many an innocent prank has had fatal results, particularly if in deep water or swift currents. Besides being dangerous, a showoff is annoying to other swimmers and spoils their fun.
5—Don't attempt a rescue unless you are a strong swimmer. Every year many lives are lost because weak swimmers' noble impulses overcome their discretion.
6—If you have been exercising or working, be sure to cool off before plunging into cold water. Cramps result from over-exertion or sudden changes of temperature.
7—Don't rock the boat. This is old advice, but it is still sound. Fooling around in a small boat or canoe is a frequent cause of accidents. If you can't swim, stay out of small boats.
8—Pay strict attention to all warning signs. They were not put up by busybodies, but by authorities who had your personal safety in mind. Don't go beyond the safe limits marked by ropes or other boundaries.
9—When swimming or rowing with the tide or current, keep 'em mind that it will be "uphill" and twice the work coming back.
10—Know your limitations. Don't try to swim across a lake or river just because someone dares you.

Better Mental Care

This nation, calling itself greatest in the world, stands indicted for the way it operates its mental hospitals and prisons. While allaying distress abroad, its 100,000 insane in state institutions are in many cases receiving care not much better than that in Nazi concentration camps.

In a recent number of Life Magazine, shocking statistics gathered by the National Mental Hygiene Association, are revealed as to public insane hospitals of 20 states. Conditions in these institutions show unbelievable crowding; inadequate staffs; attendants whose only qualifications are those of bullies; food often little better than garbage; human beings living naked in filth with no occupation, or, at best, useless or forced labor. The facts were obtained by 3,000 conscientious objectors who served under Selective Service in these institutions instead of the armed forces. Their findings have been corroborated by disinterested and qualified authorities.

The federal government collected more than 11 billions of dollars in taxes in 1940. It should be possible to devote a reasonable share of these funds to care of its mentally ill. Insane asylums should be more than places of confinement. They should be operated for the rehabilitation of as many as possible of the human beings so consigned.

Prisons also need looking into. Present penal theory is not too sound.

A Thin Army

The general attitude in this country about the recent war seems to be that it's all over, over there, and there's nothing for victorious Americans to do except what we've been doing—stomping back to normal life in "God's Country" and forgetting about the rest of the world. But that proved to be folly once, and might be still greater folly now. Here is what Paul Bellamy, editor of the Cleveland Plain Dealer, says after a trip to Europe.

"While convinced that there is no immediate danger of war with Russia, provided we are firm without being provocative, which we have not been up to date, I am forced to say that if Marshall Stalin were inimically disposed toward America, he could not have hoped, in his wildest dream, that that would have happened to our armed might which has happened since V-E Day.
"An armed force of over 10,000,000, on land and sea, will have been whittled down by Jan. 1 to 1,500,000, as far as the army is concerned, and according to Mr. Truman's own ideas of adequacy, it will be further reduced to 1,070,000 by July 1, 1947.
"if you get out a map of the world and spot the points which we have to garrison, you will see what I mean when I say the army is spread out too thin."

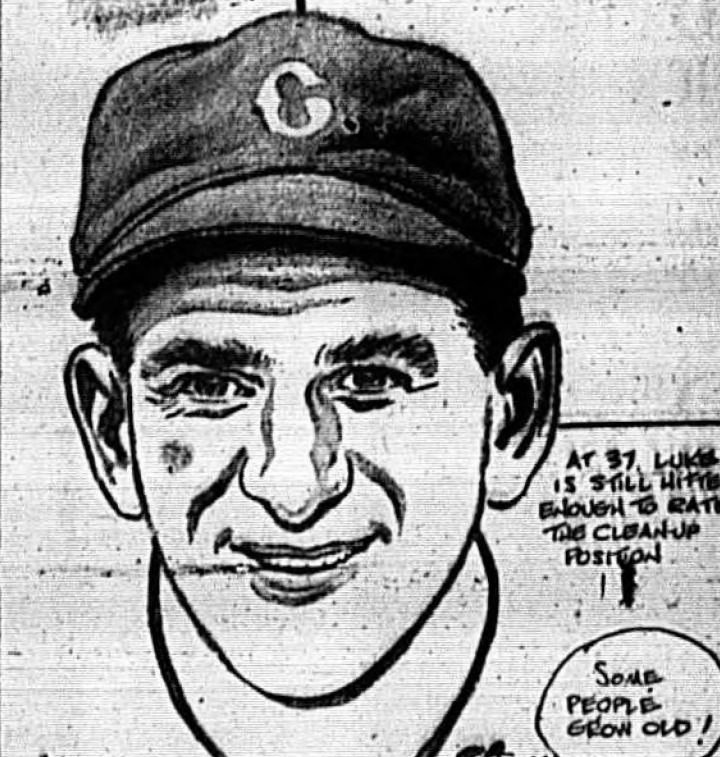

State Loop Votes For Program To Conserve Supply Of Baseballs

Circuit Also Adopts National Association Regulations Pertaining To Suspended, Disabled And Inactive Players

Officials and directors of the Florida State League held their regular monthly meeting last night in the hotel with an emphasis for immediate action on the part of the league president and loop umpires to aid in a program designed for conserving the supply of baseballs.

President Al Combs announced after a long discussion pertaining to the conservation of baseballs that he would instruct the umpires to cooperate with the clubs in using more playable balls rather than request a dozen new balls to be handed before each game.

League officials also discussed ground rules in each park and methods for making them known to clubs prior to each game. It was decided that each club would print copies of their ground rules and post them in each dugout and dressing room. John Krilow, local club president, announced that the Sanford club would also print them on score cards and post them in the stands so that in addition to ball players and umpires, the fans would be familiar with them also.

The league also voted to leave the scheduling of double headers to the clubs.

to have President Combs slap a \$5.00 minimum fine on each ball player ejected from a game by the umpire.

The league also voted last night to abide under the rules of the National Association relative to suspended, disabled and temporary inactive players. Players may be suspended only for ineligibility or for infraction of club rules. Players placed on the disabled list must only for temporary reasons and may not be removed from such list for three days unless they are actively playing.

Rules, clubs in the state league may have as many as 20 players under their control at any time. The interpretation of this rule also means that a club can have one player active under the "five-day" regulation.

end is achieved, just as it is achieved if producers are to go on production at a profit—and they will not go on very long if they don't produce at a profit. I feel, too, that the achievement of the goal is just as essential for the welfare of the consumer—if he and his family are to have an adequate, balanced diet.

Concentration of products in such centers as our Florida State Farmers' Markets appears to me to be a step in the right direction. I expect to see here and there of this concentration. In fact the growth of several of our markets in the last five years has been little short of amazing. Their concentrations of supplies should offer increasingly efficient points-of-origin facilities for shipments to the great consuming centers—and of course, more gradually, to the smaller consuming centers. We expect to make our facilities as efficient as possible, to expand and improve them as increasing business warrants. If it becomes possible to add a like degree of efficiency to the handling of our products all along the line from our plantations to the housewife's market basket, then the public will benefit, consumption will increase, our farmers will make more money, and even the "middle-men" will share to some degree by handling a greater volume of business.

Rural Common Sense

FUTURE AGRICULTURE ON SELF-SUSTAINING BASIS IS HOPE OF SECRETARY

An agriculture of the future in which farmers will be on a level with all other American groups and be able to work with business and labor on equal terms for the benefit of all is envisioned by Secretary of Agriculture Clinton Anderson. He lists the following six points for a self-sustaining agriculture of the future:

1. It would stand on its own feet, operating at a fair level of profit without benefit of consumer subsidies, price controls or price supports or income payments. Certain subsidies and price controls should be continued for the emergency.
2. It would operate on a basis of sustained yield, not obtaining current production and income through drains on future productivity. Under a self-sustaining agriculture farmers will put back into the soil each year as much fertility as they take out.
3. It would operate on the basis of a price level that is at least reasonably stable.
4. It would offer reasonable assurance of an adequate living to the families who depend wholly on farming for their incomes. Agriculture is not just one big industry, but millions of small enterprises. Averages don't always tell the story. If any large number of farmers are in difficulties and have nowhere else to go, we are going to have trouble.
5. It would operate with as little interference to the actions of individuals as is consistent with the welfare of farmers and the rest of the Nation. There will be times, of course, when common action clearly is in the general interest.
6. A self-sustaining agriculture must not only meet the needs of farm people but also the needs of the Nation by supplying adequate quantities of foods and fibers and good markets for the products of industry.

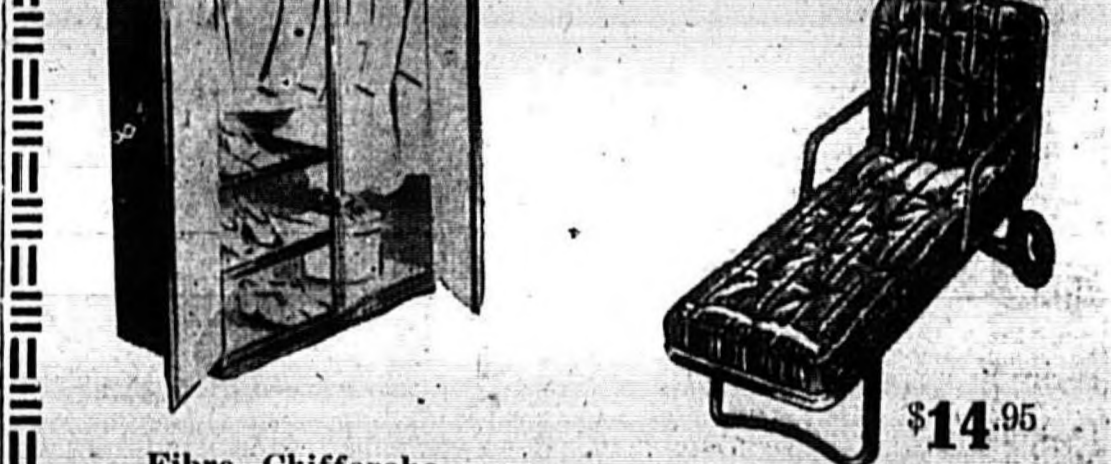

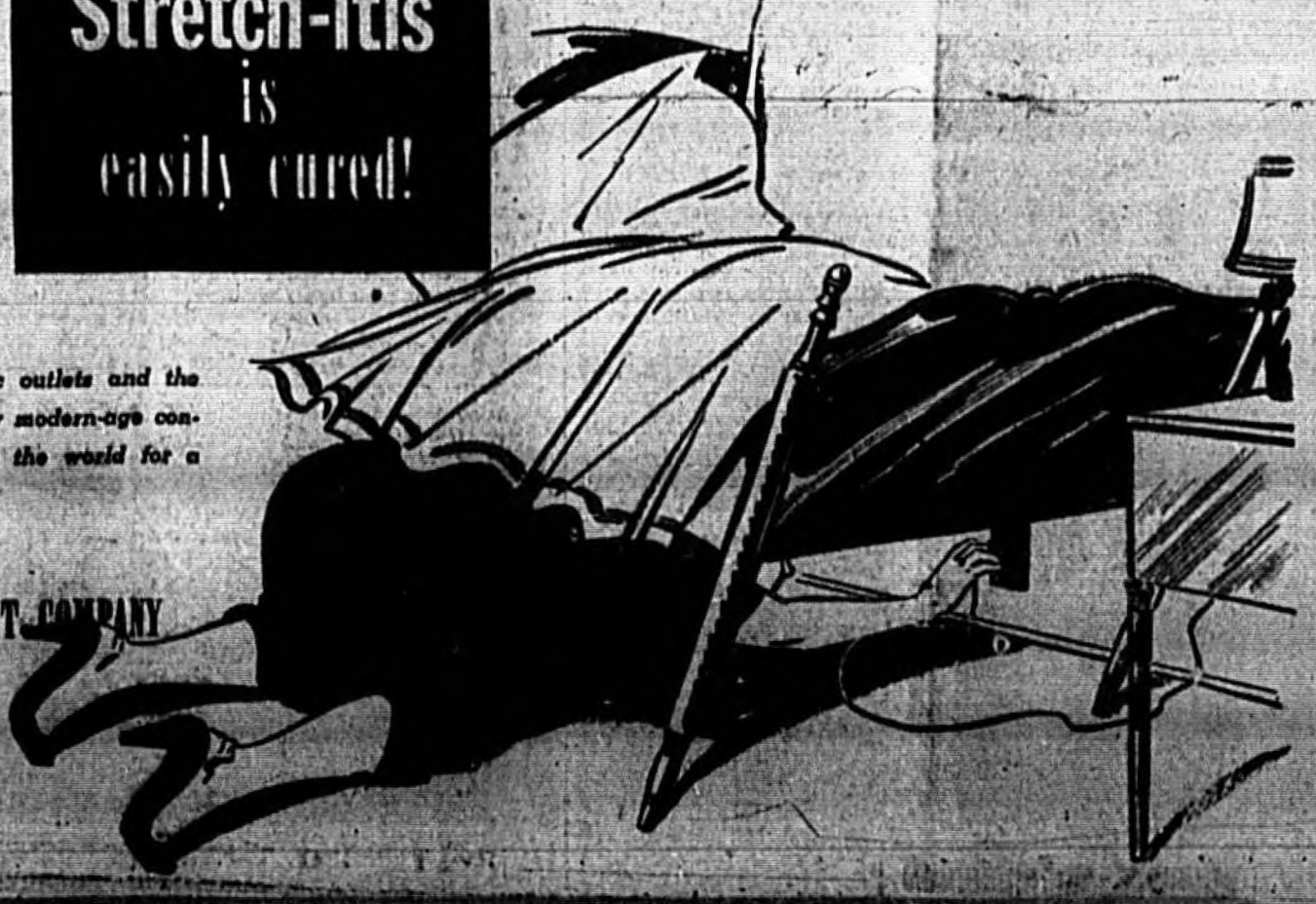

House Committee Authorizes 4 1/2 Billions For U. S. Navy

Appropriations Committee Criticizes Former Commander Of Maritime Service

WASHINGTON, May 21, (AP)—Senator Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan has delivered a first-hand report on the Paris Foreign Ministers Conference, which he attended with Secretary of State Byrnes. Vandenberg told the Senate that the Paris meeting developed what he called a positive, constructive, peace-seeking, bi-partisan foreign policy for the United States.

WASHINGTON, May 21, (AP)—The House of Representatives today received from its Appropriations Committee a recommendation that the Navy be given more than \$4,500,000,000 for the next fiscal year. That figure represents a compromise between what the Navy asked for and what the Budget Bureau thought it should have. The funds are intended to aid research program, and to finance an intensified training program to maintain the world's largest and most modern Navy.

In handing up its recommendations, the committee paid a special tribute to the Marines. With a sideways look at current Army Navy merger proposals, the committee said that the American people would never look with favor at any move designed to bring about any loss or impairment of identity of the Marine Corps.

In the next breath, the committee sharply criticized the former head of the Maritime Commission, Admiral Emory Land. It asserted that Land had failed to maintain accurate cost-accounting figures on construction of ships at various shipyards.

Dr. Frank Quillman of the Seminole County Health Unit today urged all parents of preschool age children to avail themselves of the opportunity for a thorough physical immunization to be given at the South Side Primary School Wednesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock.

All children up to ten, who are not having immunization against diphtheria or small pox will also be eligible for this service. "I cannot emphasize strongly enough the need for proper preventive measures especially where child health is concerned and school health so vitally affected. It is my sincere wish that every parent bring their child to this clinic and thus insure the health of their own child and all others who come in contact with that child day by day. Much needless suffering and often death could be averted if a more diligent care on the part of parents would be exercised," Dr. Quillman stated.

Damage Caused By Rain Storm Still Unknown

Heavy Flooding Reported In Zellwood, Weirsdale Vicinities

Growers were today taking stock of damage, yet undetermined, to local crops including corn, beans and peppers as a result of the sudden severe rain storm, which swept over the Sanford section last evening between 6 and 6:30 o'clock, accompanied by much thunder and lightning. Rainfall here was 1.56 inches. Some damage to crops in the Ocala-St. Johns region was reported by A. Duda and Sons, but the damage could not be estimated as yet. Heavy flooding has been reported in the Zellwood and Zellwood vicinity, according to reports reaching local reporters.

Heavy lowering clouds coming from the northwest darkened Sanford shortly after 5:00 o'clock. In the extent that downtown Zellwood and Zellwood vicinity, rain made a strike, as the clouds seemed to be moving in an erratic way in different directions. The down-pour that followed, however, was reported to be the heaviest in Sanford since the date set for the 1945-46 season. The rain was back pressure from a lower raised water flow into the rear of the storm which was flooded to a depth of two inches. Small damage to stock was reported.

Herbert Behrens, Lake Manatee grower, reported a heavy fall during the storm that had down and damaged field crops. Eggplants appeared to be withered by the excessive rain and today in places were being uprooted. Rainfall at the Central Florida Experiment Station was 1.72 inches, compared with the 1.95 inch precipitation reported by H. F. Wheeler, local weatherman. Dr. Rupprecht reported damage to corn, tomatoes and peppers at the station. The bean crop at the John Rumbler farm was said to have been damaged.

Lightning flashed off and on during the storm, but heavy rain caused by the excess electricity caused by lightning and to damage was reported to power lines, according to H. H. Coleman, local manager of the Florida Power and Light Company.

Now that you, at first hearing, thought it made enough sense to "Mr. Postman" to get the letter to the right place, Barrett, the capital clerk, accepted the letter as a citizen of "Washington's Town" who was in the official capacity to accept it.

Here is what he found: It was a letter, from Greece—from a man named Nicholas Cotroff who lived in the Greek town of Kavala. Cotroff and his family had been among the recipients of American gifts of clothing recently. For these gifts, they felt an immense gratitude — and the Greeks had a word for it even though the word was misspelled. Here's how Cotroff's letter read:

"Some days ago to me and my family it was done essential help by payment. This help came in the time because we have been in very critical position. We are not able to express our deep gratitude to the same person who clothes we wear now. — — — Please, sir, in your face, let us thank all citizens of great America for the help to the poor Greek population exceedingly suffered for about four years with Germans, Italians and Bulgarians. — — — Cotroff's sincere thanks to America. The citizens of America acknowledge the thanks just as sincerely. — — —"
