MEXICO CITY (UPI) — An earthquake rocked a wide area of Mexico for 10 seconds early today, toppling several buildings and causing blackouts in a residential section of Mexico City. There were no immediate reports of casualties.

SALONICA, Greece (UPI) — A tourist bus collided head-on with a Yugoslavian tanker truck in a fiery explosion outside Salonica early today, killing more than 20 Greek tourists and seriously injuring another 30 persons.

Palestinians, Israel Swap

GENEVA, Switzerland (UPI) — Israel swapped 66 Palestinian Arabs for one Israeli soldier in the first exchange between Palestinian guerrillas and the Jewish state under the auspices of the International Red Cross.

The carefully orchestrated exchange was carried out at Geneva airport. The Israeli prisoner, Abraham Amram, 33, was flown to Tel Aviv. The Palestinian Arabs, including six women, were flown to Libya aboard a chartered Bulgarian airliner.

Todd Takes Pay Cut In New Analyst Post

Troy Todd, the county's ex-director of human services, is on the job today as a budget analyst in Seminole's Manpower office in the Room 100 Building.

His pay as human services director at \$19,386 is to be cut to about \$12,500 in keeping with his new position. The exact salary has not as yet been determined.

Two weeks ago, Todd asked for reassignment from department head to employee status, saying the pressures of the human services job had had an adverse effect on his health. In his new job, Todd will be preparing budgets, working on management problems and coordinating presentations to the county commission and Newlander.

Cablevision Gets Rate Hike

The Seminole County Commission, after a public hearing Tuesday night, approved an increase in monthly service charges for Orange-Seminole Cablevision from \$6.50 to \$7.50 monthly.

A 50-cent monthly increase in service charges was last granted by county commissioners, from \$6 to \$6.50 in December, 1975. In its latest service charge increase request, Orange-Seminole Cablevision had asked for \$1.50 more monthly to \$8. The commissioners approved \$1.

Roofing Bid Rejected

A new roof for the county health department building in Sanford will have to wait for new bids to be received.

Although it has been reported for some time the roof on the building is leaking during rain storms, county commissioners Tuesday rejected the sole bid for roof replacement when it was shown the bid is more than double the money budgeted for the repair.

The lone bid totaled \$9,800 for furnishing and installing a new roof for the health department building. The bid is more than double the money budgeted for the improvement is \$4,000 for the entire project.

Ocala National Forest, prior to that time complaints were heard locally several times yearly. The basis of the tremors at those times were always attributed to the test bombing.

Federal Aviation Administration officials, National Aeronautic and Space Administration officers at Kennedy Space Center, the control towers at Orlando International and Herndon airports and military air bases in Jacksonville, Cocoa and Tampa agreed the tremors were not sonic booms.

Spokesmen for the agencies said they knew of no activity by supersonic aircraft close enough to the Seminole-Orange County areas to cause the tremors.

"Very rare atmospheric conditions" could have carried rumblings from unusually long distances, other officials speculated.

One woman in the South Seminole area, said she counted at least 13 blasts between 11 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

Most of the calls to law enforcement in the county came in to the police department of Altamonte Springs and Longwood where more than 15 telephone calls on the matter were recorded.

Casselberry police department and city hall received about 13 calls and the Seminole County Sheriff's Department received calls from one end of the county to the other.

Yitzhak Mordechai. "The oil question has been settled." The compromise proposals, according to Israeli sources, dealt with the Israeli right to buy Sinai oil from Egypt and the drawing up of a detailed timetable for Israel's withdrawal from the desert peninsula within nine months after the treaty is signed.

Additionally, Israeli newspapers said part of the oil deal involved an American guarantee to supply Israel with oil for 15 years. "I believe our situation is much better and we are close to peace," Housning Minister David Levy said.

Mary Zarka doesn't mind not having a microwave oven. "I manage nicely without one. I'm afraid if I had one, it would just be too easy and we'd probably eat too much," she said.

After receiving a crepe maker for Christmas, Mary has been experimenting. "I love to make crepes. My ten year old daughter, Margaret, and I made crepes for friends recently. I encourage my children to cook. I learned to cook from my mother. There were seven children in my family, so it was natural I'd help with the cooking," she said.

Laughing, she said, "I like to try new and different recipes, but my husband and four children like all-American cooking, plain old meat and potatoes. However, when we have company, I do more fancy dishes." Mary's husband, Lewis, gets into the cooking act also. "He makes better soup than I do, especially French Onion," she said.

1 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 cup milk
2 eggs
2 Tbsp. sugar
1 Tbsp. cooking oil
1/2 tsp. salt

Place frozen spinach in large frying pan with 1 tsp. salt and water; cover. Heat breaking up spinach with a fork, just until thawed; drain well. Return to frying pan; add 3 Tbsp. of butter or margarine. Stir in ground round steak; sprinkle with remaining 1/2 tsp. salt. Cook slowly, stirring constantly, just until meat loses its pink color. Stir in 2 Tbsp. of flour; cook stirring constantly, 1 min. or until thick. Spoon about 1/4 cup meat filling on each crepe and roll up. Place in shallow baking dish.

1 28 oz. can tomato puree

Place all the above in pan. Bring to boil. Simmer for 1/2 hour or more. Stir in 1/2 cup of ground round steak. Sprinkle with 1/4 cup (4 oz.) grated mozzarella cheese. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 min.

NO-KNEAD OATMEAL BREAD
Combine:
2 cups boiling water
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup cold shortening
1/4 cup light molasses
1 Tbsp. salt
Cool 5 min. Warm, then add 2 pkgs. dry yeast. Mix well. Blend in 2 eggs and add 5 1/2 cups flour. Mix until well blended and place dough in greased bowl and cover. Put in refrigerator for at least 2 hours. Shape dough into 2 loaves. Place in greased bread pans and let rise til double in bulk, in a warm place about 2 hours. Bake in moderate oven (350 degree) for 40-60 min.

SWEET-SOUR PORK
1/2 lb. pork cutlet, or other tender lean pork, cut in 1 in. or smaller pieces.
1 tsp. cooking sherry
1/2 tsp. salt
dash of pepper
1/2 cup of flour
1/2 cup cornstarch
1/2 cup baking powder
1 Tbsp. beaten egg, plus water to make 1/4 cup
Sweet-sour sauce
Mix first 4 ingredients and let stand a few min. Meanwhile, mix the wettable pineapple mixture and fried pork. Serve over rice. Makes 2 servings. Note: Beef, chicken or shrimp can be substituted for pork.

It's the season, the fashion and the longest-lasting topic of conversation to talk about taxes from California's Proposition 13, a brave New York City monetary downfall of Cleveland to the many budget-balancing acts shown out by politicians. So, why not begin Income Tax Day observations to remind us of all the promised austere plans for fighting inflation, preventing a depression, and more important to remind all our government benefactors that we're hoping they are not just getting Pandora's box.

The first tote in April is April Fool's Day. Surprises in family — cook a meal that you normally go out to eat at specialty restaurants. Research the recipe in the many gift cookbooks received over the years.

Next comes Passover on April 12. To join the Jewish community in observing Passover, try a potato soup. Symbolic food on the Seder ceremonies table is a hard-cooked egg which is then roasted in the shell for life, symbolic of ancient temple offerings.

In South Florida in the Everglades farming region there are mile-square fields of parsley or Karpas. This is the parsley that is used in matzo ball soup. In the north, parsley is used to fill in the shell for life, symbolic of ancient temple offerings.

Next comes Good Friday on April 15. Along with the fish and vegetables complete the Good Friday dinner.

The Sunday following Good Friday is Easter Sunday. Beautiful flowers in dinner table centerpiece add the gala spirit to the Easter dinner. That spirit fits in perfectly with spring's beautiful flowers and the colorful and stylish clothes that ladies wear on Easter Sunday.

For an Easter dinner that will delight your family and friends, try our suggested menu:

PEANUTTY STUFFED CELERY
1 package (3 oz.) cream cheese, at room temperature
1/4 cup crunchy peanut butter
1 tablespoon chili sauce
1/2 teaspoon curry powder
12 to 12 pieces celery stalk, about 3 inches long

Blend together cheese, peanut butter, chili sauce and curry powder. Stuff celery with mixture. Chill until serving time.

Garnish with parsley, as desired. Makes 10-12 snacks.

SNOWY LAKELAND
2 cups bibb or Boston lettuce, torn
1 tablespoon salad oil
1 tablespoon lime juice
1 cup small curd cream-style cottage cheese
1 medium avocado, seeded, peeled, sliced
1/2 cup dill pickle, coarsely chopped
1/4 cup celery, chopped
1/2 cup green pepper, chopped
2 tablespoons green onion, sliced
2 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
4 slices bacon, crisply fried and crumbled

In large bowl, sprinkle lettuce with all ingredients and pepper. Toss lettuce with oil and lime juice. Add cottage cheese, avocado, dill pickle, celery, green pepper and onion; toss lightly to mix.

Garnish with egg slices and bacon. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

BAKING CHICKEN
1 broiler-fryer chicken (14-16 lbs.)
1 broiler-fryer chicken (11-12 lbs.)

basil, flavor enhancer and ground pepper. In bowl mix together soy sauce, garlic, onion, corn oil and paprika. Place the marinade in a small side up in shallow pan. Bake with sauce. Bake in 350 degree F oven, uncovered, basting frequently about 1 hour or until fork can be inserted easily. Serve with Poached Oranges. Remaining basting sauce should be mixed with water and served in separate bowl. Makes 8 servings.

Poached Oranges — 1/2 cup water, 1 1/2 cups sugar, 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour, 8 navel oranges, peeled, removing white membrane, cut in wedges, 2 tablespoons orange liqueur (optional). In saucepan mix water, sugar and orange rind over medium heat. Cook until slightly thickened, about 8 minutes. Place orange wedges in syrup. Reduce heat and cook on low about 3 minutes, until they are warm. Remove from heat; add liqueur and chill.

CORN BREAD
1-2 cup sugar
1 package Cornbread dressing mix
6 medium Florida tomatoes
Salt
Pepper
1-2rd stick butter

Prepare dressing following directions for stuffing. Scoop out centers of tomatoes; remaining pulp from 4. Salt and pepper inside of tomato shells and the reserved pulp. Combine baked stuffing and tomato pulp. Fill tomato shells. Top with pat of butter.

Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 20 minutes or until stuffing browns and tomatoes are tender. Serves 8.

FLORIDA EASTER EGG BREAD!
6 to 7 cups unbleached flour
1-2rd cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon grated orange peel
1 package active dry yeast
1/2 cup warm water
2 tablespoons margarine
2 eggs (at room temperature)
1/4 cup orange juice
4 teaspoon anise extract
5 hard-cooked eggs, colored
1 egg
1 tablespoon water

In a large bowl, thoroughly mix 2 cups flour, sugar, salt, grated orange peel, and undissolved active dry yeast. Combine water, milk, and margarine in a saucepan. Heat over low heat until liquids are warm. (Margarine does not need to melt). Gradually add to dry ingredients and beat 2 minutes at medium speed of electric mixer, scraping bowl occasionally. Add 2 eggs, orange juice, anise extract, and 1 cup flour, or enough flour to make a soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth & elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover, let rise in warm place, free from draft, until double in bulk, about 1 hour. Punch dough; knead and cut a 2 1/2 inch wide, 1/4 inch thick strip of dough into a rope about 30 inches long. On a greased baking sheet, shape into a ring that measures 11 inches across. (Measure from outer edges). Pinch ends to seal. Take 3-4ths of the remaining dough and divide in half. Make each into a rope, about 13 inches long. Place over dough crossing in the center. Tuck ends underneath dough and seal. Place a hard-cooked egg on top of rope where it rests on the ring; put remaining hard-cooked egg in center of dough. With the remaining dough, divide into 10 equal pieces and roll each into 6-inch strip. Place 2 strips over each egg making a cross; press edges into dough. Blend together egg and 1/2 cup water; brush on dough. Let rise in a warm place, free from draft, until double in bulk, about 1 hour. Bake in a 350 degree oven, about 35 minutes or until done. Remove from baking sheet and place on wire rack to cool. Yield: 1 large loaf bread.

cornstarch and sugar. Cook until thick (mixture should coat a metal spoon) stirring constantly. Add egg yolks to milk mixture and cook a few minutes longer. Add gelatin to cold water; when soft, add to milk mixture. Stir well and set aside to cool. When cold, whip cream and fold cream into gelatin mixture.

Out one end of lady fingers, stand the long pieces around the sides of an 8" springform pan. Arrange the cut off ends on bottom along side-long pieces.

Four half of milk and gelatin mixture into mold. Top with halved strawberries. Cover strawberries with remaining milk and gelatin mixture. Cool in refrigerator till firm. Unmold. Garnish with a few whole strawberries on top and around sides. Serves 8-8.

2 cups all-purpose flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 egg yolks

1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1/2 cup butter or margarine
In medium bowl, sift together flour, sugar and salt. Stir in egg yolks and lemon rind with a fork. Blend in butter with fingers until mixture holds together; press into a smooth ball. Wrap in waxed paper or plastic wrap. Chill 30 minutes, or until firm enough to roll. Roll out on lightly floured surface into a 12-inch circle (pastry will be fairly thick). Fit the pastry into a 9-inch fluted tart pan with removable bottom. Prick pastry with fork. Line pastry shell with foil and fill with dried beans or raw rice. Bake in 400 degree F. oven 8 minutes; remove foil and beans; bake 6 to 7 minutes longer, until pastry is lightly browned. Cool on wire rack. Gently remove from pan and place on serving plate.

Tart Filling:
4 oranges, peeled and sectioned
In small saucepan, melt jelly over low heat. Cool slightly. Brush bottom of cooled pastry shell lightly with jelly. Arrange orange sections in pastry shell; brush with remaining jelly. Makes 8 servings.

Strawberries Are A Gourmet's Delight

It's Florida strawberry season; time to take out your favorite recipes and make use of these delectable red berries. They heavily will turn your simplest of meals into a gourmet's delight.

Florida's vine-ripened strawberries are being rushed across the country under refrigeration so they can reach markets at the peak of their fresh flavor. Growers in Plant City, the strawberry capital of Florida, are even flying these culinary delights to cities throughout Europe.

Have you ever wondered how a bright red, heart-shaped fruit ended up with the name "strawberry"? There are several stories. One being told is that straw used to be placed

between the rows of berries to keep them clean and to protect them in the winter. Another of the stories says that berries were found under mowed hay in Europe, and "hay" in Anglo Saxon was "straw".

Regardless of how this fragrant red berry received its name there is no doubt that it's a favorite of millions and creation.

When purchasing strawberries, look for berries that are firm, plump, and bright red with a natural shine and that have bright green caps. Avoid those with decay or mold as well as overly small or extremely large berries, as the texture and flavor may not be the best. Refrigerate and leave

unwashed until preparation time. To serve, rinse quickly in cold water, dry, and then remove the caps. The caps prevent water from soaking into the berry, diluting the flavor and changing the texture.

Florida Department of Agriculture's Division of Marketing suggests you try easy to prepare "Elegant Strawberries 'N' Cream". Served in a stemmed sherbet glass and garnished with a whole strawberry, this yummy dessert is an eye appealing taste treat.

ELEGANT STRAWBERRIES 'N' CREAM
1 quart Florida strawberries
1/4 cup Florida orange juice
2-3rd cup dark brown sugar
2 cups sour cream

Wash strawberries and cut in half, reserving 4 whole berries for garnishing. Place halved berries in glass bowl with orange juice; marinate for 1 hour gently tossing several times. In the meantime mix together brown sugar and sour cream; refrigerate. At serving time drain berries, reserving juice, blend into sour cream mixture adding only enough juice to make desired consistency. Serve in stemmed sherbet glasses, garnishing each with a whole strawberry. Serves 8.

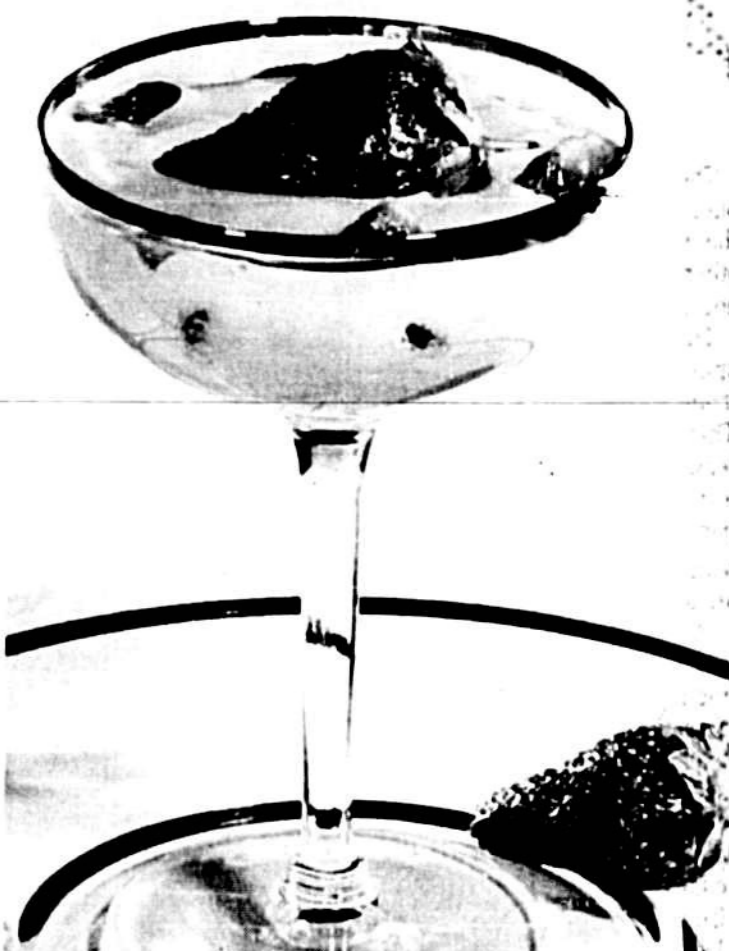
CRUNCHY STRAWBERRY COFFEE CAKE
2 pints fresh Florida strawberries
1/2 cup sugar, divided
1 cup butter
2 eggs

1 cup sour cream
2 cups flour, sifted
1 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup pecans, chopped
3/4 cup dark brown sugar
2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
red food coloring
whipped cream

Wash strawberries and slice into large bowl. Gently toss with 1/4 cup sugar. Set aside about 45 minutes to draw juice. Meanwhile cream butter with 1/4 cups sugar. Add eggs; beat well. Stir in sour cream. In separate bowl stir together flour, baking powder, baking soda, and salt; add to creamed mixture, mixing well. Spread half the batter in a greased and floured 13 x 9 inch baking dish

(It will be a thin layer.) Drain strawberries, reserving juice, and spoon over batter. Mix together pecans, brown sugar, cinnamon and 2 tablespoons granulated sugar; sprinkle half of mixture over strawberries. Cover berries with remaining batter, then top with rest of nut mixture. Bake in 350 degree preheated oven for 40 minutes. Serve warm or cool with whipped cream and Strawberry Sauce if desired. Serves 12.

Strawberry Sauce: In small saucepan combine 1 tablespoon cornstarch and the reserved berry juice. Heat and stir till thickened and bubbly. Add 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice and a few drops red food coloring. Cool.

School Board Asks More Views Pros-Cons Highlight Sex Education Meet

While the program recommended to the Seminole County District School Board was entitled "family life," the persons who crowded into the school board office meeting room Wednesday night seemed in on its sex education aspect. The Seminole County school board, heard three-hours' testimony from 30 parents, professional educators, medical doctors and others equally divided among proponents and opponents of sex education. Then the board indicated a decision on mandatory inclusion of the program as part of the official curriculum for kindergarten through 12th grade may be some time away.

Education in the Schools from Concerned Citizens asked the board where anyone got the right to decide who is capable of having children. "The school board has enough trouble trying to teach reading, writing and arithmetic."

Rev. John Butler Book of Northside Church of Christ identified himself as an obstetrician, said anyone who thinks kids are "not getting sex education are living in the wrong century." Insisting at least one major television network has announced its policy of emphasizing certain portions of the anatomy in its prime time programming, he said "the worst thing is to deny knowledge."

Interested citizens, some carrying placards announcing their opposition to sex education in the public schools and others wearing construction paper badges promoting the "International Year of the Child," waited patiently for as long as 45 minutes in the lobby area at the school administration office on Mellonville Avenue Wednesday

The crowd which had been orderly to that point began to murmur and asked that persons who were not from Seminole County be put out. School Superintendent William J. Layer ordered staff members to give up their seats to citizens and to leave the room. Among those leaving was Assistant School Board Attorney Ned J. J. Jr.

Baby First To Survive Birth Defect

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI)—A baby born Feb. 9 with his heart completely outside his body has undergone three operations and may be the first baby in medical history to survive the birth defect and be able to live a normal life.

Only one other—a boy in Philadelphia—has lived through the operation and subsequent complications that are part of ectopia cordis, or "outside heart." But, he must have artificial breathing assistance.

Five-week-old James Leake Jr., however, is breathing on his own and taking all food by mouth, doctors say. According to the child's mother, Rowena Leake, the boy is "doing fine."

Dr. Doane Williams, chief of cardiac surgery at the University of Arkansas Medical Sciences Campus who headed the surgical team, said Mrs. Leake's pregnancy had been normal and doctors had no warning of the birth defect.

Williams and Dr. J.B. Norton, a pediatric cardiologist, arrived at Doctors Hospital within 30 minutes of the child's birth. Using a new emergency van outfitted with medical equipment, he was moved to University Hospital and within three hours had undergone the first corrective surgery.

Egyptian Cabinet Unanimously Approves Peace Treaty

CAIRO, Egypt (UPI)—The Egyptian cabinet unanimously approved the Israeli-Egypt peace package today and President Anwar Sadat said he would fly to Washington as early as next week to sign a treaty that would end nearly 31 years of intermittent warfare with Israel.

At his residence on the Nile, Sadat said, "We have achieved peace, and it's Jimmy Carter who made it all possible."

Asked if Egypt was now awaiting approval of the package by the Israeli Knesset (parliament), Khalil said: "Sure, this is their procedure." The Israeli cabinet Wednesday approved the two key compromise proposals worked out with President Carter and the Israeli parliament was expected to approve the package next week although the cabinet was likely to be stormy.

Approved by the Egyptian People's Assembly in virtually assured as Sadat's party controls more than 200 of the 300 seats.

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
