## Economic director involved in credit card flap

Abuse of a county credit card has landed Seminole County Economic Director Bob Turk in trouble. Seminole Clerk of the Court Maryanne Morse found what she considered "significant abuse" in Turk's charges on his county VISA card.

Morse notified County Manager Kevin Grace on Thursday.

**"As of today, Mr. Turk is still employed."**

Grace was in attendance at the County Commissioners meeting that began at 9:30 a.m.

Morse said that only 11 county employees have VISA travel cards. These cards, she said, must be signed off each time they are used and signed in after each trip.

"No one keeps them in his or her possession," she said.

Turk was authorized to use his card for trips and to entertain visitors to the county. Morse said he had the card often but didn't always return it right away.

"This showed up in the spot check," she said. "We haven't got down and dirty over this."

Turk and John Jones work together in Economic Development and have helped create a number of successful partnerships with businesses that have been built or relocated in the county. There have also been significant partnerships with governments and businesses in other countries.

The county's economic development incentive has been questioned by some, especially Commissioner Grant Maloy who refers to the policy as "Corporate Welfare." Maloy has voted against all economic incentive plans for nearly four years.

Morse docked Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide's pay checks two years ago when he failed to produce receipts for a business trip to Europe. Turk testified to the authenticity of Van Der Weide's business on that trip. Van Der Weide sued Morse and the case has not been resolved.

# Seminole scores high on FCAT

SANFORD — Reading and math scores for the 2000 Florida Comprehensive Achievement Test are up in Seminole County.

Meanwhile, students throughout the state made gains in math scores. Elementary school students also improved in reading. However, reading scores for middle school and high school are down statewide.

Seminole finished 5th out of 67 school

## Schools rank in top 10 of all districts and first among the state's largest

districts in the mathematics portion of the test, and 10th in reading, according to results released Monday by the state Department of Education.

Among 10 school districts with at least 4,000 students, Seminole ranked first in both reading and math FCAT scores.

In math, the Seminole County's average score improved from 315 last year to 326 this year, while the state's average score is up from 303 to 314.

Seminole's average score for reading is up from 302 last year to 309 this year, while the average state score in reading

improved from 288 to 293. Scores on the test are used by the state as a key portion of grades given to schools under the state's A-plus education plan.

The FCAT results are reported as scale scores ranging from 160 to a high of 500 at each grade. These scores are divided into five achievement levels with level five being the highest.

## Chief Tooley says Ladoczky trial hurt police image

SANFORD — An investigation into allegations made in the Darlene Ladoczky trial indicates other Sanford police officers may have violated department policies, but did not break any laws.

Sanford Police Chief Brian Tooley said he met Monday with investigators from the federal Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) concerning testimony by convicted

Antonio Holley, 26. Holley claims he maintained relationships with several other officers in addition to Ladoczky.

"While we are just beginning our investigation, I feel a little better about the actions of certain police officers than I did a week ago," Tooley said. "A preliminary look at information provided by the DEA indicates possible department policy violations, but not as severe as I earlier had thought."

Three Sanford police officers and a community service officer are under internal investigation for their association with

Holley, who accused Ladoczky of providing him with sex, crack cocaine and confidential police information.

Following a six-day trial, Ladoczky was cleared last week of all charges except two counts of providing false statements to federal agents. Tooley admitted the image of the police department has suffered because of the trial.

"In the short term, some of our female police officers have been subjected to some negative comments from some people

they've been in contact with," Tooley said. "However, by and large, the public is aware of the fact we identified the problem and we took care of it."

Holley claimed to have relationships with several police officers and a Seminole County deputy sheriff. The sheriff's office is also conducting an internal investigation.

The officers described their relationship with Holley as distant. Holley did not accuse the officers of providing information or assistance in his drug

## County invests in welcoming signs

Motorists entering the county at four locations are now seeing attractive monuments at the entrances to the county.

One of the new monuments is located at the intersection where Celery Avenue ends at CR-415. Each morning, hundreds of motorists, often bumper-to-bumper on their way to work from the Osteen and Deltona areas, will be officially welcomed and notified of their arrival in Seminole County.

Other monuments have been erected on SR-46 at the Wekiva River crossing west of Sanford, to greet motorists from the Mount Dora area, and west of the new Howell Branch Road at the entrance to Aloma Avenue to welcome the Orange County visitors.

Seminole County Engineer Frank Van Pelt said a fourth

welcoming monument is to be installed on SR-434 at Forest City Road.

"A committee was formed about this two years ago," he said. "They were to select some alternative plans for the signs,

and the County Commission subsequently approved the ones we are now installing."

He said the signs are granite, on a concrete foundation. The actual signs were shipped in from Georgia.

## City may form special tax district to fund street lights

SANFORD — Sanford is seeking to increase street lighting in the historic district.

However, residents would need to agree to be part of a special tax district to pay for the street lights to be installed.

The historic district is generally located between 3rd Street and 15th Street, and between US Highway 17-92 and Sanford Avenue.

Three options for installing specialty lighting were developed by a four-person committee consisting of historic district residents. The commission may consider the options by the committee for the purpose of discussion.

"Let's place this on the agenda as an example of where we

could go, and see where we get with it," said Mayor Larry Dale.

The City Commission agreed by consensus during a work session Monday that before the lights are installed, a petition would need to be presented with a majority of neighborhood residents willing to be part of the special tax district.

"There's no doubt we need increased street lighting in the historic district," Dale said. "But, this could turn into a battle."

The committee recommended the city consider the installation of 130 new lights in the historic district, at a total cost of \$700,000. This plan would include using 12-foot, black

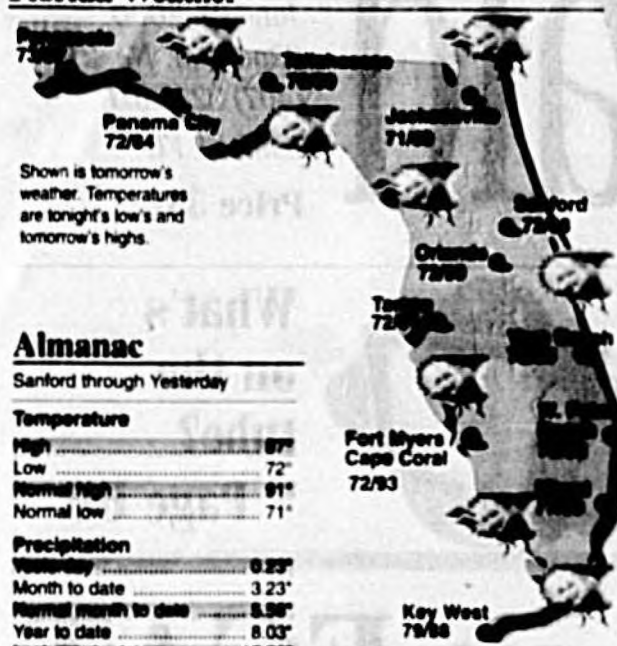

est. Six percent of Seminole students scored in level 5 on reading, compared with four percent statewide. Seven percent of Seminole students scored in level 5 in math, compared with five percent statewide.

Seminole County has been making efforts to improve FCAT scores through the use of reading and writing specialists, after-school tutoring, and by encouraging small-group activities.

"I think this is a reflection of our excellent teaching," said Sandra Robinson, chairman of the Seminole County School Board. "The teachers are working hard, and the students are responding."

Statewide, math mean scores for each grade level tested revealed increased student performance when comparing average scores from 1999 to 2000. Grade 5 improved 11 points from 303 to 314, grade 8 declined five points from 295 to 290. Grade 10 also declined four points from 302 to 298.

This past school year, school districts have stressed fourth-grade results because of new requirements regarding promotion for students struggling with their reading skills.

"We will see more improve-

ment in reading in middle and high schools as elementary students move into these grade levels," said Florida Education Commissioner Tom Gallagher.

Governor Jeb Bush's A-plus plan provides for schools to receive letter grades based primarily upon standardized test scores measuring math, reading, and writing achievement. Other factors include school attendance, discipline, and high school graduation rates.

Although no Seminole County school received an "F" in last year's report, 78 schools received grades of "F," including 67 elementary schools.

Florida's elementary schools showed the greatest increases in math and reading scores. The 67 F-graded elementary schools rose an average of 13 points in reading scores compared to an average five point increase for all elementary schools.

Nearly 80 percent of all F-graded elementary schools saw rising scores in each of the three areas tested by the FCAT: reading, writing, and math, and all F-graded schools improved by at least one letter grade.

"These figures are clear examples of what our schools and students are capable of achieving," Bush said. "It is clear that the state's unprecedented attention to children in low performing schools is resulting in remarkable results."

The 2000 data released Monday includes all students tested, while data released by the Department of Education in prior years included only stan-

ard curriculum student scores.

The FCAT achievement levels were adopted by the State Board of Education in November 1998 and will be increased in 2002 to a more rigorous standard of performance in reading and math.

Individual student results are being delivered to districts this week. Parents will receive score reports which show the achievement levels for their child as well as total scale scores for each subject area.

Beginning in 1999 and continuing this year, 10th grade students scoring 315 on FCAT Math and 327 on FCAT Reading are exempted from taking the corresponding sections of the High School Competency Test (HSCT) as a high school graduation requirement.

In the 2002-2003 school year, the FCAT will replace the HSCT as a requirement for graduation. Passing scores required for graduation will be set in the fall this coming school year.

During the week of March 6, students in grades 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 9 took the field test for the new FCAT being developed for these grade levels. Students who took the field tests will not receive score reports.

The tests were given only to assist with test development. In the spring of 2001, students will take the first complete versions of the test. However, the results are to be used to set achievement levels during the summer and fall of 2001 and not used for school grading purposes.

Washington poles with single acorn 175 watt metal halide lights.

A less costly option considered by the committee was the installation of 70 lights at a cost of \$357,000. The more expensive option was to install 201 lights at a cost of \$1.03 million.

The lights can be funded through a Florida Power & Lighting (FPL) specialty lighting program in a 10- or 20-year pay-off for installation and materials. Engineering design costs must be paid up front.

A Special Assessment District can be established through city

resolution to reimburse the city for engineering costs and to collect the FPL repayment. At the end of the 10-year period, property owners would be responsible for the energy and maintenance costs.

The committee consisted of historic district residents Robert Cassels, David Kelly, Claudia Webber, and Linda Kuhn.

Roger Doughty, who resides at Grandview Avenue North, said additional street lighting throughout the city would be a deterrent to crime.

"Our streets are not well lit," Doughty said.

## King Sago remnant of time dinosaurs roamed the Earth

The King Sago, often referred to as a palm, is really a Cycad, a remnant of the distant dinosaur age when Cycads were a dominant form of vegetation.

The King Sago is perhaps the most commonly cultivated species in Florida. Most Cycads unfurl fern-like leaves that gradually stiffen to resemble palm foliage. Sometimes they are also called seed-ferns.

Other common Cycads are the native Countie, the Queen Sago, Prince Sago, and the Cardboard Palm.

Cycads are slow growing plants usually under 10 feet tall that can be used in the landscape as a specimen, accent, and border planting.

### Reproduction

Cycads are dioecious, male flowers and female flowers occur in different plants. They do not produce flowers typical

of many garden plants. The male plant produces the pollen in tall, pale cone-like structures. The female plant produces a flattened, wide-spreading, brown and fuzzy structure where the seeds are borne.

After pollination, the seeds ripen to a bright orange-red color and enlarge to the size of golf balls.

Mature Sago produce new offshoots (called pups) at the base of the trunk. These can be removed with a smooth cut at the pup to produce a new plant. Pups removed from a plant will always be of the same sex as the parent plant.

Treat the cut end with a copper fungicide, and let the new plant sit for a week before planting so the wound can heal. Use a potting mix to grow the new plants.

### Plants From Seeds

Collect seeds from female plants in late summer or early fall. Place them in a plastic bag with air holes in the vegetable drawer of your refrigerator for three to four months.

After the cold treatment, remove the outer seedcoat that has likely turned brown. Rub the coat off or soak in water until it softens and can be peeled away. Place the seeds flat side down in a potting soil mix, pushing each seed into the soil so half of the seed is exposed.

Keep the seeds moist and germination should occur in two to four weeks, though some seeds may take several months to germinate.

### Culture

Cycads are slow growers that like a slightly acid and well-drained soil. They grow well in full sun or partial shade.

Fertilize lightly several times a year with a palm fertilizer. The fertilizer must contain magnesium and manganese to avoid

common deficiency problems.

Manganese deficiency appears in the new leaves as yellow spots that can progress to a browning of leaf sections and eventual dead of the leaves. This deficiency can kill a plant.

Magnesium deficiency appears as yellowing of the border of the older leaves. Plants are drought tolerant once established. The King Sago is the most cold tolerant of this group of plants.

### Toxicity

This plant is known to contain several toxic glycosides, the principal one being cycasin. The seeds have been found to be highly carcinogenic when fed to rats and other animals.

Other Cycads have similar toxic compounds.

### Native Zamia

The common native plant known as countie can be found in the state pineyards and coastal regions forming clumps

of vegetation to three feet in height. Their stony roots have been an important source of arrow-root starch, a yellowish-white flour utilized by early Florida inhabitants.

Fresh harvested Zamia roots are poisonous containing the toxin cycasin also found in the seeds and foliage. Processed countie starch was one of the staples of the Seminole Indians diet.

It was an excellent substitute for wheat flour and a product for the pioneers used for trading.

### Plant Problems

Scale insects and mealybugs can occasionally damage the leaves.

Use a combination of insecticidal oil and soap to control them.

DEAR RANDI: It's true that the temperature inside an automobile can build up quickly in these summer months—and the "just a minute" can result in a tragedy.

While I'm on the subject of pets and climate, outdoor pet houses should be placed in the shade, and plenty of cool, fresh water should be provided in bowls that cannot tip over. Hint: Metal bowls cause the water to heat quite rapidly; conversely, in the winter, they chill the water to the point that it may freeze, making it inaccessible to the animal.

Thousands of readers responded to the letter in my column about pets being listed in obituaries, and volunteered that their pets are special friends or a part of the family.

A final thought: Please neuter or spay your cats and dogs. Neutered animals make better pets, and this act of love will alleviate the tragedy of thousands of unwanted animals being euthanized each year. Read on:

# Bone-scan results are likely normal

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Before undergoing extensive surgery in 1996, I had an enormous number of X-rays. Recently, I had a severe accident that crushed

parts of my body, and I had a bone scan. The scan revealed areas of increased uptake in my spine and ribs. The report comments on the possibility of metastatic disease.

**DEAR READER:** When a bone scan is performed, the patient is injected with a tiny dose of radioactive substance (isotope) that is carried to all the bones in the body, where it is deposited for a time. Once this has occurred, the body is scanned. The resulting X-ray films show the extent to which the isotope has entered the bones, its concentration, distribution and uniformity.

The isotope is selectively absorbed by the bone that is undergoing change. In such instances, "hot spots" will be evident. In the presence of these areas of increased uptake, radiologists are usually unable to provide a definite diagnosis. All they can say is that portions of bone show accelerated metabolism. Common causes include healing fractures. Paget's disease (a condition marked by rapid and spotty bone turnover), infection and metastatic disease (the presence of abnormal cells invading bone from a distant cancer). The scan must always be correlated with the patient's "clinical state"

(general health and medical history) for the test to be useful.

I cannot speculate on the cause of your abnormal bone scan. Most likely the test showed healing bone fractures from your accident. This seems to me to be a more realistic impression than the assumption that you have a hidden cancer that spread to bone. However, you need a diagnosis. I do not believe that your previous X-rays play any role at all — unless they triggered a cancer somewhere in your body. In general, an abnormal bone scan after trauma indicates normal healing bone. Ask your doctor about this.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** My 19-year-old daughter has a lump on the side of her neck that has been present for three months. It is hard, non-tender and increasing in size. Two doctors offer no solutions. Can you?

**DEAR READER:** Certainly. A hard lump that enlarges, no matter where on the body, deserves scrutiny, because it could be a malignancy. Your daughter should have a biopsy, in my opinion. If her doctors are stumped, seek a third — or even a fourth — opinion. Keep look-

ing. Eventually, you will find a doctor who will be able to diagnose your daughter's ailment — and treat it. To give you related information, I am sending you a copy of my Health Report "Choosing a Physician." **DEAR DR. GOTT:** I'm 16 and am becoming progressively bow-legged. Could I have rickets?

**DEAR READER:** If your legs are truly bowing as you grow, you should be examined by a doctor to discover why. Rickets, bone softening from lack of vitamin D, is very unusual in this country because most people consume well-balanced diets. Moreover, many foods — such as milk and grain products — are fortified with vitamin D. Nonetheless, rickets has to be a consideration in any growing youngster with abnormal bone development. A doctor can perform the necessary tests and advise you.

trafficking. He said the officers shopped in his Park Avenue specialty CD store, Jamland Music, that they played softball together, and two school resource officers invited him to play music at school dances.

When he assumed office in August 1999, Tooley told police officers they would be terminated if they lie, steal, engage in police brutality, or associate with known criminals. However, Tooley said he will wait until after the investigation is complete to determine whether officers will be fired for associating with Holley.

It is against department policy to associate with a known drug dealer or anyone suspected of criminal activity.

"If a police officer plays softball with Holley as part of a league with 100 different members, I don't think that's very serious," Tooley said. "We'll wait for the investigation to find out to what degree they associated with him."

Two Sanford school resource officers testified they asked Holley to be a deejay at dances at the request of teachers, under the impression he had stopped dealing drugs on the street. The officers testified the functions had security, and there was no drug dealing.

On two other occasions, Holley also claimed to have asked a Sanford police officer

and deputy sheriff to run warrant searches for him. It is legal for an officer to run a warrant search upon request. The officer testified he did not recall running the warrant search, while the deputy said he found no active warrant.

"Sometimes in a small town, there is some sort of relationship between police officers and convicted felons or unsavory characters that goes back a long time," Tooley said. "But, it's better to avoid all contact altogether. If you don't, you could be called to task as to why you are associating with that person."

The police department and DEA conducted a six-month investigation into Ladozky's actions before her arrest on March 22. Tooley said a key tip during the initial phase of the investigation came from a resident of the Goldsboro community, who complained about an officer spending time with a drug dealer.

Ladozky, 34, admitted to carrying for Holley during an 18-month relationship. The relationship peaked in August and September 1999 when they talked on the phone daily, and went on two dates. Although they touched in a sexual manner, she testified they never had sex.

However, she did have sex on one occasion in 1996 with convicted drug dealer Julian Wimberly, 24, while serving as

his case agent on a charge of selling crack cocaine. He pled guilty to the charge.

"We've made a commitment to maintain high standards of conduct for the community," Tooley said. "Every officer I have spoken to has expressed being heart broken by her (Ladozky's) conduct."

Meanwhile, the US Attorney's Office is investigating Longwood Police Officer Clint Gosill regarding allegations by Holley that he sold the officer crack cocaine on three occasions.

Ladozky is living in her Sanford home with her husband, Longwood Police Officer Robert Ladozky, 31, until her sentencing on Sept. 25. She faces a maximum sentence of 10 years in prison and \$500,000 in fines, and can resume her duties as a police officer because of the felony conviction.

According to federal sentencing guidelines, she is likely to serve a few years in prison. Federal District Judge Patricia Fawcett is expected to consider that this is Ladozky's first offense. However, Fawcett may also raise the sentence because the crime represents a breach of public trust in a law enforcement officer.

Because of his testimony against Ladozky, Holley may receive a reduction in his sentence of 92 months in federal prison for selling crack cocaine to undercover agents.

## Outdoors-Woman Workshops scheduled

OCALA - Women who want to learn how to fight a big fish, bag a wild turkey or canoe a river will want to make a note of this.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) will host two "Becoming an Outdoors-Woman" (BOW) workshops this fall.

Instructors - most of them females - will conduct the workshops Sept. 8-10 at Ocala and Nov. 17-19 at West Palm Beach. The FWC prefers to use female instructors for BOW workshops to help participants feel more at ease and to eliminate the "never-mind-I'll-just-bait-the-hook-for-you" style impatience women sometimes encounter when they try to learn outdoor skills from their husbands, boyfriends or brothers.

"I think that's the main reason the BOW program has been so successful," said Lynn Hawk, director of the program. "Nobody is there to intimidate or rush the participants. Instructors take the time to guide participants through the activities."

During the six years the FWC has offered BOW workshops, nearly 2,000 women have signed up for them, and the reviews have been raves.

The FWC will begin accepting applications July 1 for this year's workshops, and organizers expect all the available slots to fill up with reservations within a few weeks.

The cost is \$125, which includes food and lodging at the FWC's conservation camps, plus materials and instruction. The workshop is limited to 100 people.

A limited number of partial scholarships are available for low-income females who would like to take part in BOW workshops. Scholarship information is available on workshop applications.

"The program is primarily for women, 18 or older, who want to learn outdoor skills associated with hunting and fishing, but it also includes training that is useful for many other outdoor pursuits," said Hawk. "Participants will be able to choose four of the 19 topics offered and will spend four hours on each topic they choose."

Topics include: Introduction to panfishing, basic flyfishing techniques, introduction to bass fishing, outdoor cooking, boating basics, canoeing/kayaking, deer hunting basics, small-game and duck hunting basics, turkey hunting basics, introduction to the shooting sports, introduction to handgun shooting and hunting, developing

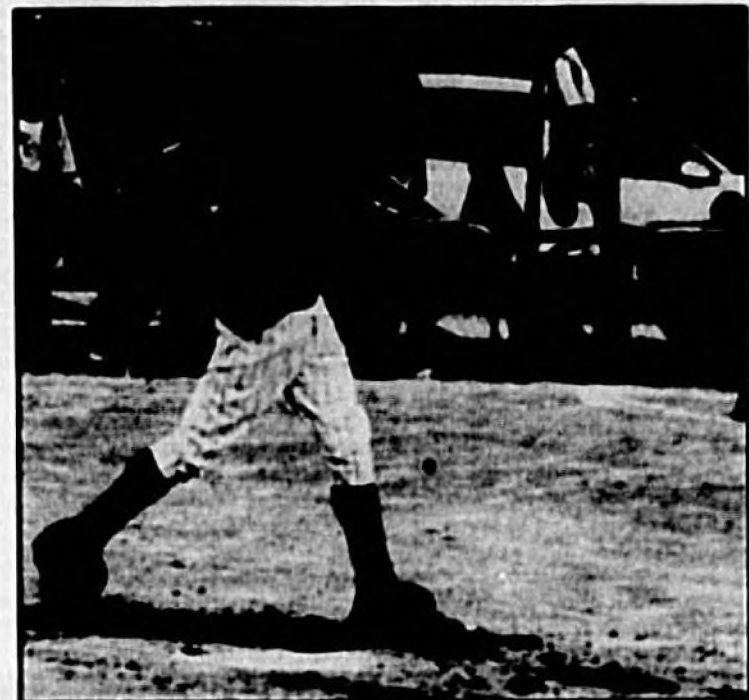
Michael Prusak drove in the Longwood All-Stars' final run in the sixth inning.

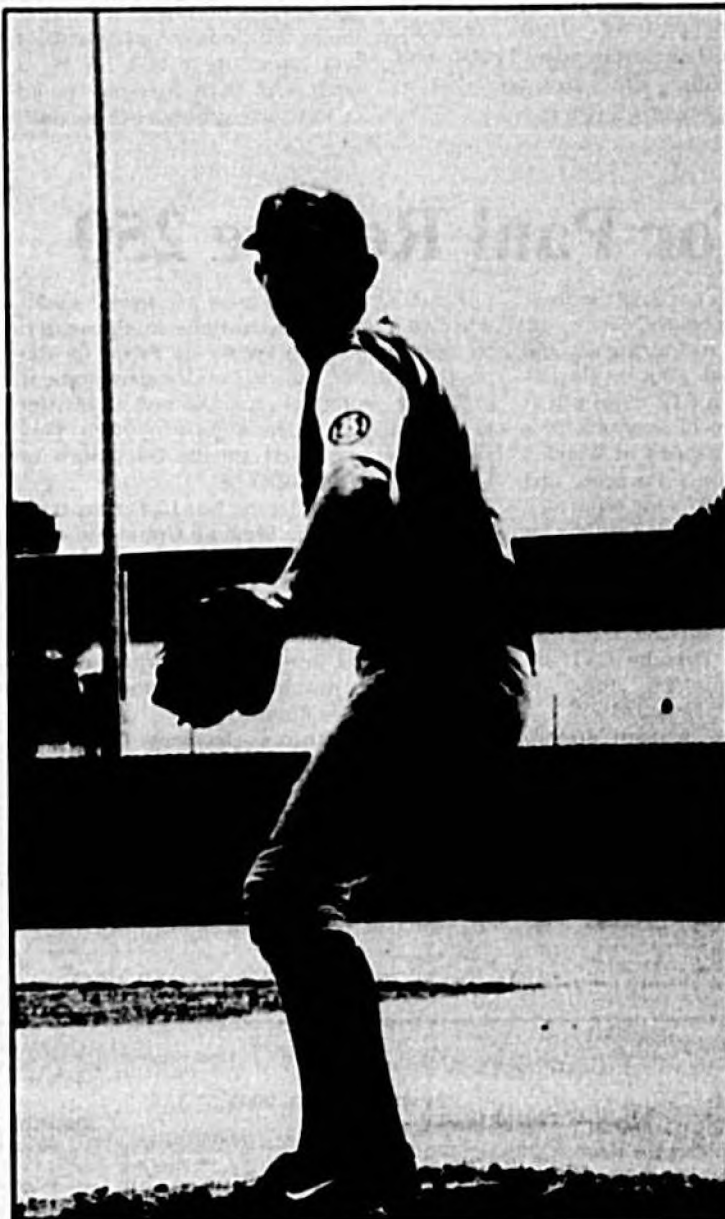
But it is doubtful that anyone thought it would be this good.

# Risi Competizione set for Paul Revere 250

DAYTONA BEACH - The No. 12 Risi Competizione Ferrari 333 SP enters the inaugural Grand-Am Paul Revere 250 at Daytona International Speedway on June 28-29 with high expectations, seeking its first win of 2000, after claiming three Top Five finishes in the last four events on the Grand American Road Racing Association circuit.

Though the initial outing at Daytona this season was not ideal, when the team retired from the Rolex 24 Hours during the night, they have since built momentum for the remainder of the Grand-Am season.

Risi pilots Ralf Kelleners and Mimmo Schiattarella return to the world center of speed to avenge the season opening disappointment and hope to capture the top podium spot for the famed Ferrari.

"I have a good feeling about returning to Daytona because I believe in the team," said Kelleners. "We received a slightly bigger restrictor that will hopefully lighten the gap between the fastest cars and us. We have a

very good package with the car and the tires, so I am looking for a good result."

Kelleners has competed in touring car and road racing since the mid 1980's. He has experienced success with a GT2 class win at the 1997 Rolex 24 Hours of Daytona in a Porsche 911, GT1 class victories at Watkins Glen and Petit LeMans in a Porsche, and competed with the Toyota GT-One team as a factory driver at the 24 Hours of LeMans for two seasons. Last season he competed in the Porsche Super Cup, two races in ISRS competition piloting a Kremer B Sportscar, and made three appearances on the American LeMans Series tour in a Porsche GT1. He recently competed at the 24 Hours of LeMans, driving in an ROC Reynard VW.

"The team is building momentum, and we all feel confident about returning to Daytona," said Schiattarella. "We had a good start to the 24 hours in February but had some bad luck during the race. I feel confident that we will do better this time out."

Schiattarella is a former open-wheel driver with stellar performances in CART and

Formula One, the two most prestigious open-wheeled racing organizations in the world. He has competed in sports car racing for the past four years, working on the development of BMW's prototype racer, as well as driving in the American LeMans Series in 1999. This season he competed at the 24 Hours of LeMans in a Lola B2K/10.

The Risi Competizione No. 12 Ferrari took second place at the Phoenix Grand-Am outing, followed by a seventh in class at Homestead. The past two runs have shown the prowess of the team as the Ferrari started on the outside of the front row in Lime Rock Park and finished third, while a fifth-place starting position in Mid-Ohio resulted in a fourth-place finish.

Risi Competizione, formerly Doyle-Risi Racing, is owned by Ferrari of Houston principal Giuseppe Risi and Technical Director John McLoughlin, who campaigned the Ferrari 333 SP for the 1998 and 1999 seasons. Sponsorship for the team comes from Enron and Coolink.com. The car competes on Goodyear Eagle racing tires.
