## Motorcyclist dies following traffic accident

A traffic accident on State Road 46A Tuesday resulted in the death of a 36-year-old Sanford man. Dudley J. Howell, 2002 Elizabeth Court died early Wednesday morning at Orlando Regional Medical Center, said Cleo Cohen, a spokeswoman for the Sanford Police Department. Howell was traveling in the eastbound lane of S.R. 46A on his motorcycle, and had stopped for traffic. Peter J. DePhillippo of Palm Bay came from behind and failed to stop, colliding with Howell, according to the accident report.

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# Crooms gets \$5 million face-lift

**SANFORD** — The Seminole County School Board this week agreed to fund improvements at Crooms Academy in Sanford.

Under revisions to the School Board's Five Year Capital Improvement Plan, approved Tuesday, \$5 million will be spent on renovations to Crooms Academy during the 2000-2001 school year.

To fund the Crooms Academy renovations, the School Board agreed to reduce

the budgets for equipment replacement, technology upgrades, and in the contingency fund for the 2000-2001 school year.

Crooms Academy, an historically black school in Sanford prior to 1970, now serves as a school for "at-risk" middle and high school students. Details on the renovations have yet to be determined.

"This is a commitment," said School

Board member Larry Furlong. "We recognize these are things that need to be done. This isn't a set of specs."

There are 20 portables on the Crooms campus, and the portables will not meet state portable standards that will take effect in July of 2001. The school is located at 2200 W. 13th Street.

In the spring of 2001 the school-district

will seek funding for programs at Crooms Academy through Magnet School grant applications. The magnet school funding cannot be used for construction. The school-district will also seek state historic preservation funding for the more than 70 year old school.

"I think it is a historic school," said school-district Superintendent Paul Hagerty. "There may well be some historic preservation funds."

Crooms Academy parents and graduates have been lobbying for the alternative school to add vocational and technical programs. See Crooms, Page 5A

# Van Der Weide leads candidates in fund raising

**SANFORD** — If campaign finances are all they're cracked up to be, Seminole County Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide is favored to win a third term. Van Der Weide's latest campaign treasurer's report summary indicated he has \$71,825 in contributions.

District 3 Commissioner Van Der Weide is far ahead of all other commission candidates. His latest backers include Lake Kathryn Estates and Frank Bullard, a Real Estate officer from Columbus, Ga. Winter Park business executive Donald McIntosh, Jr. also sent \$500, the maximum contribution.

Van Der Weide has spent \$11,156 — his war chest still above \$60,000.

Van Der Weide's rival for the District 3 seat, Altamonte Springs Mayor Dudley Bates began his campaign only four months ago. Bates has collected \$9,950. Bates received a \$500 contribution from Mears Transportation in Orlando and \$500 from City Cab Services.

Bates has major support of the Seminole County Republic Executive Committee. Political insiders say he'll be picking up major endorsements in the coming months.

District 1 Commissioner Grant Maloy, finishing his first 4-year term, has accumulated \$40,230 in his bid for re-election. Challenger Tom Hagood of Oviedo, has \$7,860. Altamonte Springs Attorney Monte Shoemaker contributed \$500 to Hagood. So did Charles Meissner, a construction executive from Orlando. Stephanie C. Smith, another District 1 candidate, has collected \$200.20. James Coakley has \$600.

District 5 Commissioner Daryl McLain, who has served two terms, has collected \$40,100 in his bid for a third. This is more than his three challengers together — Bob West (\$13,750), Don Nicholas (\$5,385) and Dean Ray (\$100). County Chairman Carlton Henley threw \$100 into the Nicholas campaign. Charter Review Chairman Doug Elam also gave \$100 to Nicholas, a Sanford resident who unsuccessfully ran for mayor. See M oney, Page 5A

## Race Relations: Moving forward or standing still in Sanford?

**SANFORD** — Thirty years ago, Sanford's community swimming pool at Fort Mellon Park was closed as part of the city's resistance to desegregation.

Next month, a new \$1 million community swimming pool facility will open near Seminole High School. City officials say the pool is a symbol of progress made in human relations within Sanford.

However, the city is still plagued by an undercurrent of racial tension. The tension appears to be escalating, especially after statements made Monday by Jean Metts, director of Seminole Volunteer Enterprises, that accused the City Commission of fostering racism.

"I really thought we were moving in a positive direction prior to about three to four months ago," said Velma Williams, the lone black member of the City

Commission.

In recent months, Sanford officials have addressed three issues that have raised racial tensions: approval of parking waivers for a free meal program to be operated within the historic district; a proposed ordinance that requires incoming social services to seek approval from the Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Commission; and the submission of a federal HOPE VI grant by the Sanford Housing Authority.

Though none of the three issues deal directly with race, there is a feeling among some in the community that the city is trying to push out low-income residents, especially blacks. James Purdy, a Sanford

attorney and long-time civil rights activist, said he does not believe those are the city's intentions but notes open communication has been lacking regarding these issues.

"There is only one sure way I know to improve the relationship, and that is communication," Purdy said. "There is no short cut."

Purdy said city leaders need to work on improving relations with members of the black community by, for instance, holding discussions with the Elks Celery Lodge, or local black morticians.

"It's better than it has been, but there is room for improvement," Purdy said. Regarding the proposed zoning ordi-

nance, Purdy said that he thinks the ordinance represents a good plan.

"There's nothing wrong with that at all," Purdy said. "Government has the right to say where something can and cannot be located."

Opponents of the ordinance say that it is part of an effort to limit social service agencies for the needy in Sanford. Those in favor of the ordinance say that it represents good planning, enabling the city to prevent the clustering of agencies in areas such as Goldsboro and the residential historic district. Other programs affected by the zoning ordinance would include churches within the historic district, temporary labor services, day care facilities for six or more people, residential care facilities for 15 or more residents, outdoor non-commercial amusement facilities, retail sales and services, pawn shops and bail bond companies. 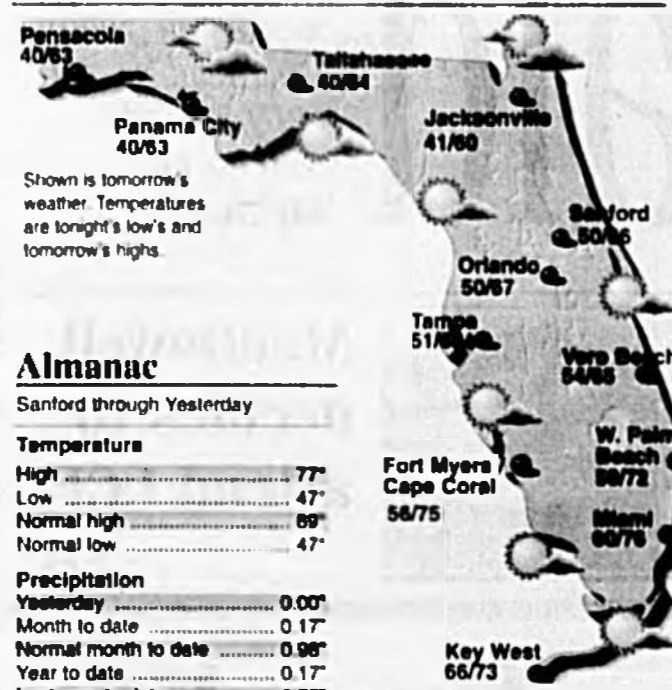

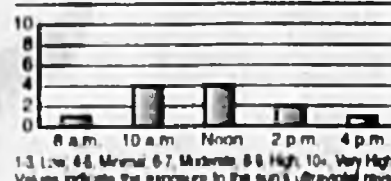

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# Our lives are enriched by Martin Luther King's Dream

He was a fascinating preacher, who called down fire and brimstone on sinners. Sooner or later, he asked that people discover a way to live together in peace. He won a Nobel Prize for his efforts to bring the races together by non-violent means.

At 39, The Rev. Martin Luther King was gone, cut down by an assassin's bullet on April 4, 1968 in Memphis, Tenn. Saturday, millions will celebrate King's birthday.

How significant was the life and teachings of M.L. King? So much that Presidential hopeful George W. Bush said one of the items he would put in a 20th Century time capsule would be King's "I Have a Dream" speech. The other was a microchip.

There were 200,000 at the Lincoln Memorial when stout, serene Mahalia Jackson sang, "I Been 'Buked and I Been Scorned." The 1963 March on Washington program began at 9 a.m. Joan Baez sang "We Shall Overcome." Bob Dylan also said, "Anxiously, King crossed

out phrases, substituting others in his speech.

It was 3:30 p.m., King began his address.

"He sent chills up my back," James Purdy of Sanford said. Purdy knew King from earlier days in Boston. Coretta Scott King was enrolled in the New England Conservatory of Music. Purdy was in law school at Boston U. and later served as Executive Secretary to the Massachusetts Governor's Council.

Through the years, Purdy and King would see each other a number of times. Purdy vividly recalls a meeting at Shiloh Baptist Church in Trenton, N.J.

"Everyone had concerns about him," Purdy said. "There were threats to his life. It was a dangerous time. I asked him if the dangers worried him. He said, 'Jim, let me tell you a story. I woke up one night, sweating. I called to Coretta. I told her I had just seen the brightest light anyone could imagine. So bright. But more

not as incredible as the silence. A beautiful, beautiful silence.'

"Dr. King said he then went back to sleep, knowing he would never fear death or any one who threatened his life. My God, he had a vision. He had seen the other side. That's why his 'I Had a Dream' speech sent chills up my back. It still does."

Incredibly, the morning after what was undoubtedly the greatest civil rights speech in history, the reporter covering the March for the Washington Post did not mention King's speech. Zilch. The Post noted the orderly turnout, and eloquent statements by A. Philip Randolph, the Florida-born head of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters.

More surprising is that 37 years later there are those who don't comprehend King's words and deeds.

"He was very young to have shouldered such an awesome responsibility," James Purdy said. "He set a force into motion that no one is going to stop. His words still cry out — we must learn to meet hate with love. Like he did."

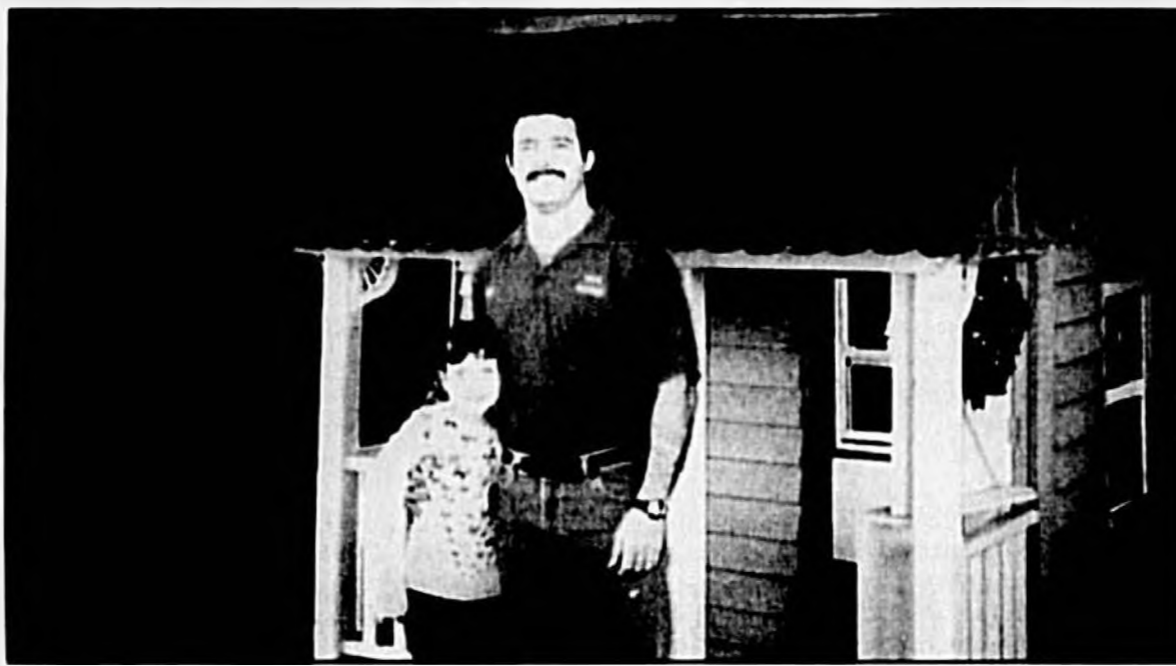

## 'The Story of Sanford' reveal Lake Mary, Longwood history

I have found some more notes that I had taken from Mary Leffler Strong's book "The Story of Sanford;" here is some of her information from the communities of Lake Mary and Longwood.

#### Lake Mary

The Sjoloms, a Swedish family, at one time owned most of Lake Mary, although the Farmers and Snyders owned groves between the two lakes. Mary and Crystal. The Adams family lived in a grove on the south side, which was later bought by Dr. Evans of Boston. After making a fortune in the manufacture of dyes during World War I, one of his sons, Frank Evans, came back to the lake and invested largely in real estate. A brick block, a community house, a church and school were built. Mr. Evans built Evansdale Park with a bathing beach, bath houses, tables and benches, and it was open to the public free of charge.

The local PTA built a bath house and bathing beach on Crystal Lake. At one time, there was a pavilion for dancing, which became very popular.

#### Longwood

Mr. Demos, Mr. Campbell and Mr. Cotter operated the first sawmill in Longwood. Later Mr. Dinkle also owned sawmills, as did Mr. Ensminger, who once represented Seminole County in the state legislature.

There were three railroads which had their beginnings in Longwood. There was also a golf ball factory as well as a boat-

works. For several years, frog farms dotted the low country and poultry raising had been a profitable industry. Mr.

Bistline had won many prizes for his fine birds in shows around the county. There were also orange groves, which had come back after the Big Freeze.

The Seminole Race Track, where trotting horses received training, was nearby. It was built for racing meets, and citizens of both Sanford and Orlando

and surrounding areas dressed in their best attire and drove out to the races each day.

Among early citizens were M.F.H. Rand, who established his home in 1878 and delivered a fine orange grove. All but one of his large family was born in that home. He was largely responsible for the building of the Little Episcopal Church and also conducted services there.

Other early Longwood families were the Singletons, Lewises, Flansburgs, and Dinkles. A mile west of the railroad station was a small settlement of mid-western people who built their homes around Greenwood Lake and called it West Longwood. They had their own community house, where they held suppers, concerts, etc. Among the residents was the Walker family. Dr. Walker was the attending physician for most of the area. His daughter, Flora, once taught in the Sanford schools. Other families owning groves in West Longwood were the Greenwoods, Motons, Tetherluts and Phipps.

Still farther west on the Orange Belt Railroad was Glen Ethel, a small community of families originally from Louisville, Ky. Among these were the John S. Arnolds, Millers and the Dicksons. A few miles beyond was a large and very exclusive hotel called the Pinecrest Inn, which operated for several years. It was finally demolished and the lumber was used to build a residence in Sanford.

The road to Sanlando Springs was built over the right of way of the old Florida Midland Railway. The Tribby Branch of the ACL Railroad passed close by the entrance to the Springs and it was there that a black man was lynched. The body was left hanging on the limb of an old oak tree which was later called the "lynching oak." A special train, very hush-hush, had taken the mob with the victim from the Kissimmee jail.

Palm and Sanlando Springs were near Longwood, the early settlers held their picnics at these resorts. Palm Springs was the first to be developed, then fell into decay. Sanlando Springs, originally named Hoosier Springs, was renamed for a land development company that owned it during the land boom.

"Most people who have come to me about the ordinance are from churches, as well as agencies for children and the elderly," Williams said. "They want to know why they should have to prove they are not detrimental to the community. People stop me in stores and on the street about it."

Tension has been festering among public housing residents regarding a Sanford Housing Authority proposal to demolish 170 deteriorating public housing units and replace them with affordable apartments and condominiums while supplying job training programs and housing vouchers under a federal HOPE VI grant.

Although the 1999 application to the Department of Housing and Urban Development was not accepted, the Sanford Housing Authority plans to reapply this year. Out of 80 HOPE VI grant applications in 1999, 21 were accepted. The city supported the grant application.

Williams said there is a perception that city leaders do not adequately address the problems of

the city's newly residents, and that distrust of city leaders is mounting. "It's not a good time right now," Williams said.

Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said he is also concerned about an escalation of racial tension.

"Racial hatred is very dangerous," Dale said. "There still is a big racial divide on both sides in Sanford. I hope everybody pulls together and realizes this is our community, and stops trying to divide it."

According to the 1990 census, Sanford's population of 32,387 consists of 22,287 whites, 9,228 blacks, and 1,586 Hispanics. The population has since risen to

nearly 37,000 people, according to 1998 estimates. The 1990 census also reported that 16.3 percent of the city's population lives below the poverty line.

Fourteen out of Seminole County's 20 social service type of agencies are located in Sanford, according to city records.

Lurlene Sweeting, an educator and Sanford resident who has served on the Human Relations advisory board for the city, said

that as an African-American woman she is primarily concerned with making sure that children receive the education needed to

compete in the marketplace. "This is the education age," Sweeting said. "If we could just love each other as Christians and individuals and not judge based upon outside qualities, we would be better off. We should be judged by the content of our character."

Sweeting said she is not sure why the city has proposed the new zoning ordinance.

"I don't see how we get so exercised about so many things when the basic thing is scenic improvement," Sweeting said. "There are more basic things if you want to improve the appearance of Sanford."

Meanwhile, Williams said she has not given up on the idea of a community forum to discuss the ordinance and how the city intends to address social services in the future. Her proposal to hold a forum failed Monday without a motion following accusations by Metts that the city has allowed race to influence policy.

"I would not want us to have a forum that could result in further attacks," Williams said. "I do still feel, I am more reassured now, that we need to do something."

Williams said the racially charged statements by Metts,

aimed at the City Commission and residents of the historic district who oppose her agency's proposal to open a meal site for the needy, may stir an increase in tension.

"There are a lot of questions now that maybe might not have been here before," Williams said. "There were feelings and perceptions out there already. These kind of things can escalate. I know there are people out there who are very mean spirited. People use these kind of things."

City officials point to the community swimming pool near Seminole High School, ongoing drainage improvements at Mill Creek, renovations to Coastline Park, and increased sewer lines and lighting in the Goldsboro area as evidence that the city is attempting to address the needs of the black community.

Hopper Academy in Sanford, an historically black school, is being renovated using \$320,000 in state funds. The city also has a program of awarding economic incentives to companies who bring jobs into the city, and has used state grants to rehabilitate dilapidated housing.

In addition, an on-going clean-up project at the historically black Pace-Jackson Cemetery has uncovered details about the city's history, including several black soldiers who served in the Civil War.

"This is our community," Dale said. "It is not us and them. We're trying very hard to provide opportunity for everybody."

Charles Rowe, director of community development and Sanford's first African-American department head, said that he has seen substantial progress in race relations in the city and nationwide in the last 15 years.

"I think the city of Sanford as a whole has made more progress in the last 15 years than in a long time," Rowe said. "I won't say we've made the most progress ever, because we used to be slaves. We still have work to do."

cal training courses to the current curriculum serving 400 students in grades six through 12.

"I want it to be a first class school that also serves at-risk students," said Sanford City Commissioner Velma Williams, a Crooms Academy graduate. "I am concerned about it being labeled as an at-risk school."

A letter from the United States Justice Department, released in December, recommended that the Seminole County school-district improve conditions at Crooms Academy. The letter was based upon and inspection by Kathleen DeVine of the Justice Department.

Since 1970, the United States District Court has had supervisory jurisdiction over the Seminole County School Board in matters such as school site purchases, school construction,

and student attendance zones.

Seminole County school-district officials are hoping to convince the U.S. Department of Justice that court oversight is no longer necessary. Seminole County would be declared a "unitary" school-district once the requirements of the Justice Department are met.

In addition to improving conditions at Crooms Academy, the letter also recommended the hiring of more black teachers, and said it is concerned about low black representation in higher level academic courses at the high school and middle school levels.

Other areas of concern include a low number of black students identified as gifted and an apparent tendency at certain schools where black students appear to be disciplined more often than non-black students.

As of June, 1999, only 8 percent of the new teachers hired for this school year were black. The percent of teachers hired in Florida is 15 percent black, the Justice Department said.

If the school district is found in compliance and granted unitary status, meaning that a dual system of education for blacks and non-blacks no longer exists, it would be released from the supervisory authority of the U.S. District Court.

Seminole County and other Florida school districts were sued in 1970 by the Justice Department for operating a "dual system" which separated schools for black and non-black students.

In 1970, the school district was ordered to dismantle the dual system, and to merge black and non-black students into a unitary system.

# There's more to marriage than obtaining a license

A few months ago we discussed the age requirements for marriage. As discussed then, a county court judge or clerk of the circuit court will issue a license upon application and pay-

ment of the applicable fees if the parties are 18 years or older, or fall under any of the age exceptions and there appears to be no impediment to the marriage. Following is an explanation of what must be done once a marriage license is issued, to render a marriage legally binding in Florida. Upon issuance of a marriage license, the parties to whom the license issued must have the marriage solemnized among the people called "Quakers," or "Friends," in

the manner and form used or practiced in their societies, according to their rites and ceremonies, shall be good and valid in law. Moreover, the words "minister" and "elder" will be held to include all of the persons connected with the Society of Friends, or Quakers, who perform or have charge of the marriage ceremony according to their rites and ceremonies. Furthermore, Florida law provides, for purposes of solemnizing a marriage, that the term "regularly ordained

minister" is solely dependent on the several religious societies. Thus, if a religious society has determined that a particular individual was an ordained minister under its creed, then that person may solemnize marriages in Florida. Once the marriage is solemnized, the person solemnizing the marriage shall certify, on the license, that he or she solemnized the marriage. Then, that same person must, within 10 days of sol-

emnizing the marriage, transmit the license to the office of the county court judge or clerk of the circuit court from which the license is issued, the county court judge or the clerk of the circuit court must enter it into their record books, which contain a correct record of all marriage licenses issued, with the names of the parties and the date of issuing, the name of the person solemnizing the marriage and the date of marriage and of the return. In sum, before a marriage is

rendered legally binding, the parties seeking to be married must apply for a marriage license, pay the applicable fees, have the license issued, have the marriage solemnized, have the license certified by the person solemnizing the marriage, and ensure that the person solemnizing the marriage returns the license to the office issuing the license for record keeping. In the coming weeks we will discuss other legal issues involving marriage as well as other aspects of family law.

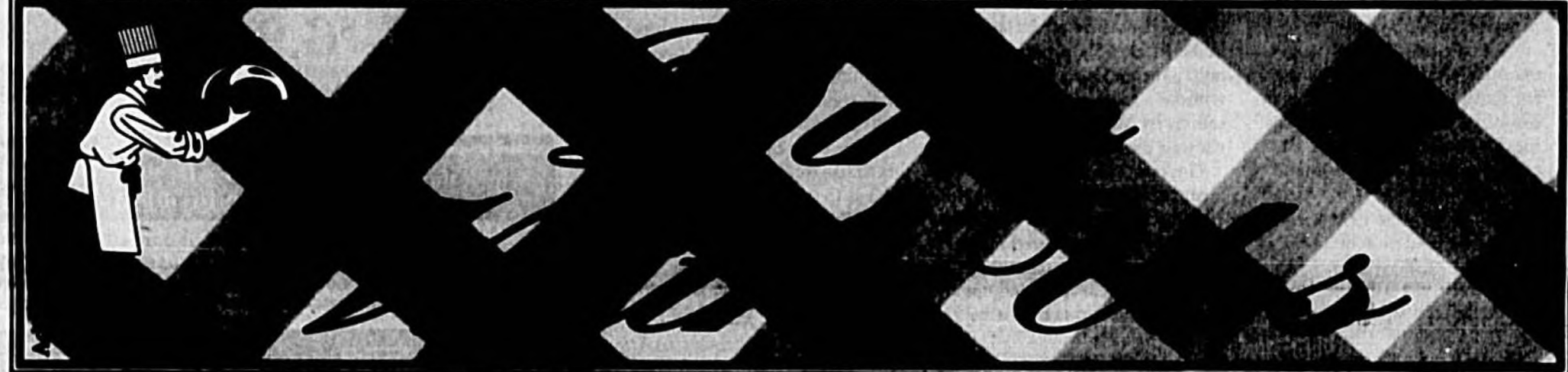

## Four drivers named for True Value IROC 2000

TINTON FALLS, NEW JERSEY - NASCAR Winston Cup driver Jeff Gordon, Indy Racing League's Eddie Cheever, Jr., and NASCAR Winston Cup teammates Bobby Labonte and Tony Stewart were announced Wednesday as participants in the 24th running of the True Value International Race of Champions.

The series begins on Feb. 18 with race one at Daytona International Speedway and will air on ABC Sports Sunday, March 12 at 5 p.m., immediately following coverage of the NASCAR Winston Cup Atlanta race.

The series continues with race two at Talladega Superspeedway on April 15th and airs the next day, April 16 at 5 p.m. on ABC Sports. Race three will air live from Michigan Speedway on June 10 at noon on ESPN, and race up the championship on August 4, at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, which airs the next day, August 5 on ABC Sports at 4:30 p.m., following the Brickyard 400.

Three-time Winston Cup champion and 1999 Daytona 500 winner, Jeff Gordon will make his sixth appearance in the series. Gordon garnered seven NASCAR Winston Cup victories in 1999, as well as a win in the Busch Grand National series; he finished sixth in Winston Cup points. His best year in IROC competition came in 1996 with a win at the Daytona opener and third in the final point standing. In 1999 he finished fifth in IROC points with a great second place finish at the Indy finale.

The Indy Racing League's Eddie Cheever, Jr., from Orlando, will make a return to the True Value IROC series in 2000. This past season the 1998 Indy 500 winner repeated victory in the IRL season opener at Walt Disney World Speedway. His best IROC race finish was an impressive third at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Of his rookie year in IROC, Cheever said, "What I came to realize was that the IROC series was a championship of the best oval racers in the world and even though, I was racing the NASCAR drivers on their turf and in their cars, it was still possible to win. It was more fun than I imagined it could ever be."

The 1996-97 Indy Racing League champion and 1999 NASCAR Winston Cup Rookie of the year, Tony Stewart will make his sophomore appearance in IROC competition. In 1999, Stewart swept the Winston Cup rookie competition with three victories, 21 top-ten finishes, of which, 12 were top-fives and finished fourth in NASCAR Winston Cup points. On May 30th, 1999 he competed in both, the Indy Racing League's Indianapolis 500, finishing ninth and NASCAR's Coca-Cola 800, finishing fourth. Stewart competed in the 1998 IROC series finishing sixth in points, his best IROC race finish was third at Michigan Speedway.

The 1999 NASCAR Winston Cup runner-up, Bobby Labonte has accepted his well-earned invitation to compete in the True Value IROC series. In 1997 IROC competition, Labonte was a single-race substitute driver for the injured Robby Gordon at California Speedway with a second place finish. Last year Labonte replaced Al Unser, Jr. in the series at Daytona when Unser's daughter Cody became suddenly ill with transverse myelitis. Labonte finished third in

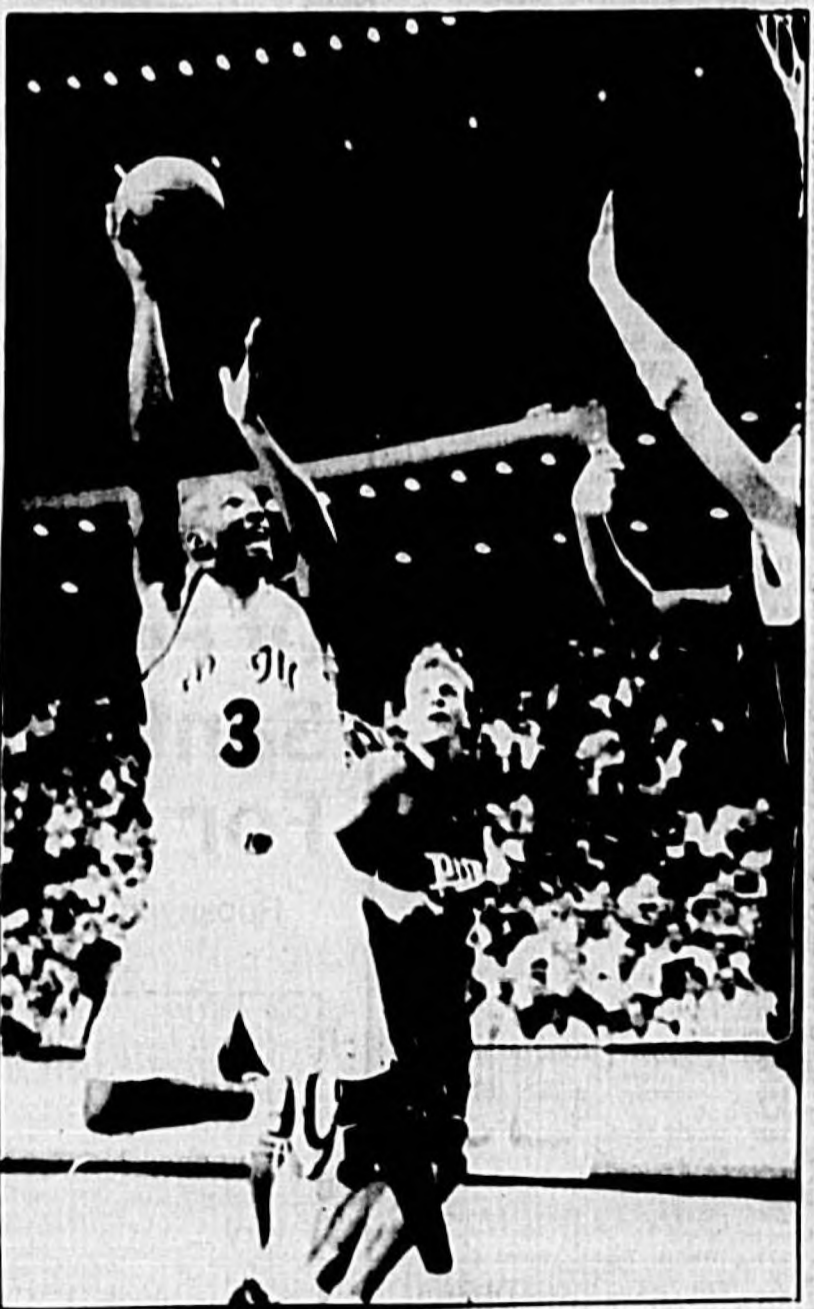
Williams (6-foot-8, 225-pounds, age 28) signed with Orlando as a free agent on September 17, 1999. He was originally a first round selec-

tion (24th overall) by the New York Knicks in the 1994 NBA Draft.

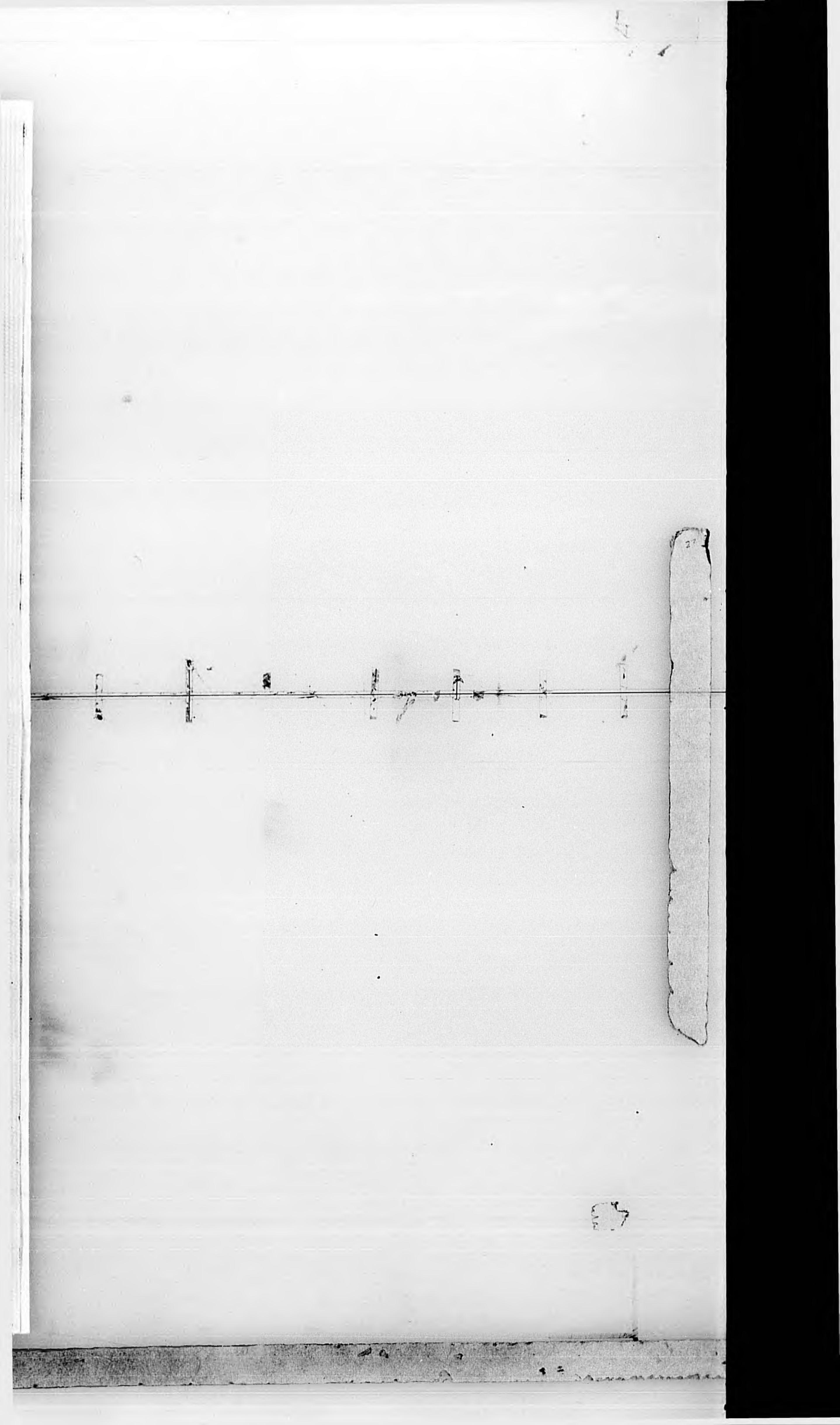
Before this season, he played in 210 regular season games during his NBA career with New York, San Antonio and Denver.

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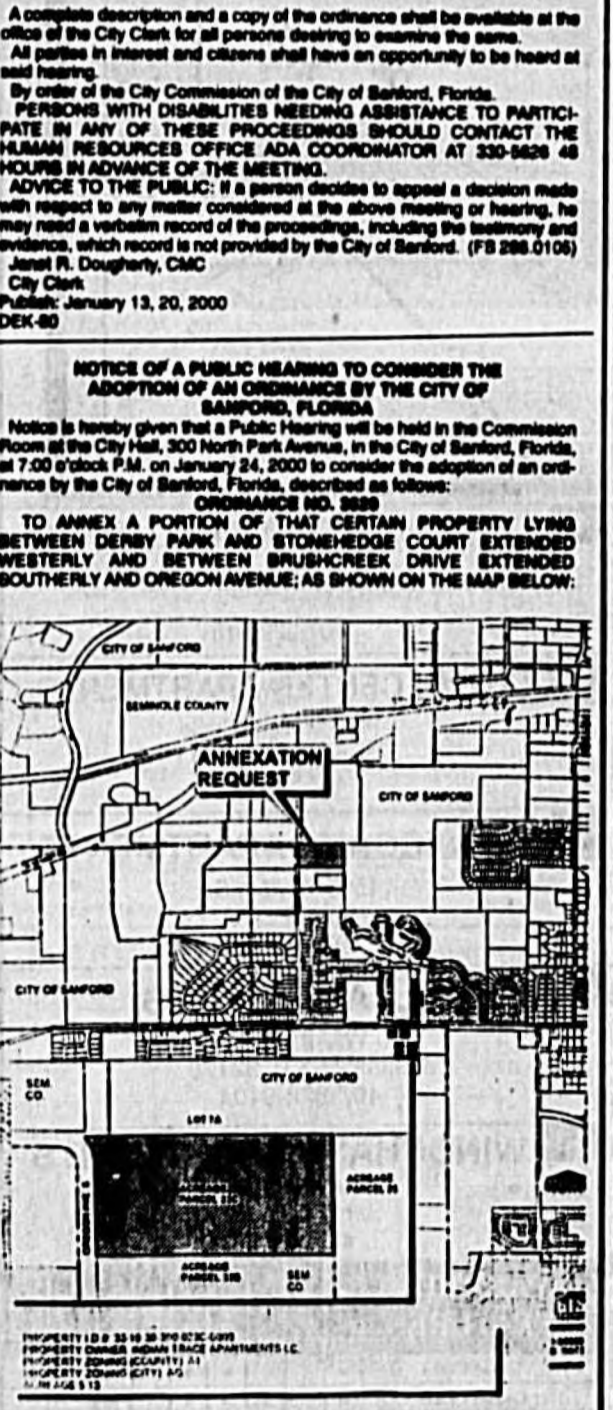
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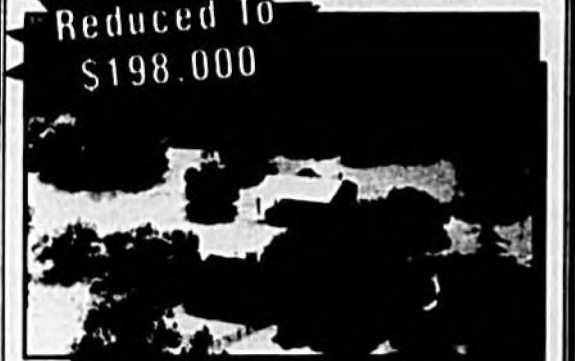
