#### Countdown to launch nears

CAPE CANAVERAL — With a last-minute repair job complete, NASA managers Wednesday cleared the shuttle Discovery and its five-man crew for blastoff Monday on an oft-delayed mission to launch a \$100 million satellite.

Discovery's countdown to launch on the third post-Challenger flight, the first of seven missions planned for 1989, is scheduled to begin at 12:01 a.m. EST Friday leading to a launch attempt Monday at 8:07 a.m.

The ship's crew — commander Michael Coats, 43, co-pilot John Blaha, 46, James Baglan, 37, Robert Springer, 46 and James Buchli, 43 — plans to fly to the Kennedy Space Center Friday for final launch preparations.

#### Four die when planes collide

WATKINS, Colo. — Two light planes, one of them a homemade aircraft, collided in flight between two small airports and crashed in a field Wednesday, killing all four people aboard the planes, authorities said.

Three of the victims were discovered in the wreckage of a single-engine Cessna 172. The fourth was found about a half-mile away in a homemade fiberglass airplane, said Arapahoe County sheriff's spokesman Bob Allen.

The victims were identified as the Cessna's pilot, Frederick Lee Wright, 37, of Akron, Colo.; his brother-in-law, Craig Andrew Willcace, 34, of Otis, Colo.; his father, Harold Lee Wright, 67, of Akron; and the homemade craft's pilot, Robert M. Bucy, 41, of Aurora, said coroner Jim Stork.

#### Gun ban bill draws death threat

TALLAHASSEE — A House committee working under tight security because of death threats against a gun control bill sponsor Wednesday was asked by law enforcement officials to outlaw "assault rifles" and repeat-action pistols.

"Thanks to weapons such as this, our emergency rooms are becoming urban M-A-S-H units, with doctors and medical personnel treating wounds once only seen on a battlefield," said Attorney General Robert Butterworth.

#### End appears near for Tower

WASHINGTON — A desperation proposal to let John Tower run the Pentagon for six months to prove he has quit drinking was all standing Thursday between him and his becoming only the ninth Cabinet nominee ever rejected by the Senate.

Democratic leaders in the Senate were surprised when Republican leader Robert Dole of Kansas suggested the trial period Wednesday night. They decided to consider it overnight.

But the Democrats appeared skeptical, and they held enough votes to reject outright Tower's nomination as defense secretary.

#### Stetson falls in TAAC tourney

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. — Arkansas-Little Rock and Centenary emerged Wednesday night from some of the worst shooting in the history of the Trans America Athletic Conference tournament to advance to Thursday's championship game.

Arkansas-Little Rock, playing on its home court, beat Stetson, 60-59. In one semifinal despite shooting a tournament record-low 32.3 percent from the field. Centenary, meanwhile, capitalized on a record-low 0-of-1 performance at the free-throw line by Houston Baptist to take a 76-69 victory.

## New classrooms OK'd

### School board changes plan for Sanford Middle School

SANFORD — A building housing eight classrooms will be erected at Sanford Middle School instead of renovating two existing structures, the Seminole County School Board decided Wednesday.

The new classrooms at the school, 1700 French Ave., can be built for less than the cost of gutting and renovating the older buildings on the campus that used to be Seminole High School, according to the school board.

The old buildings will be left intact, and other new structures also will be added, but the decision

Wednesday does not change the decision last year to demolish the original school building.

School Board Chairman Ann Neiswender had expressed concern that the historic flavor of the buildings would be lost in the renovation, but she was assured that elements of the original 1926 building would be incorporated into the new design.

The main reason for building the new classrooms is because several board members were concerned that students would be disrupted if

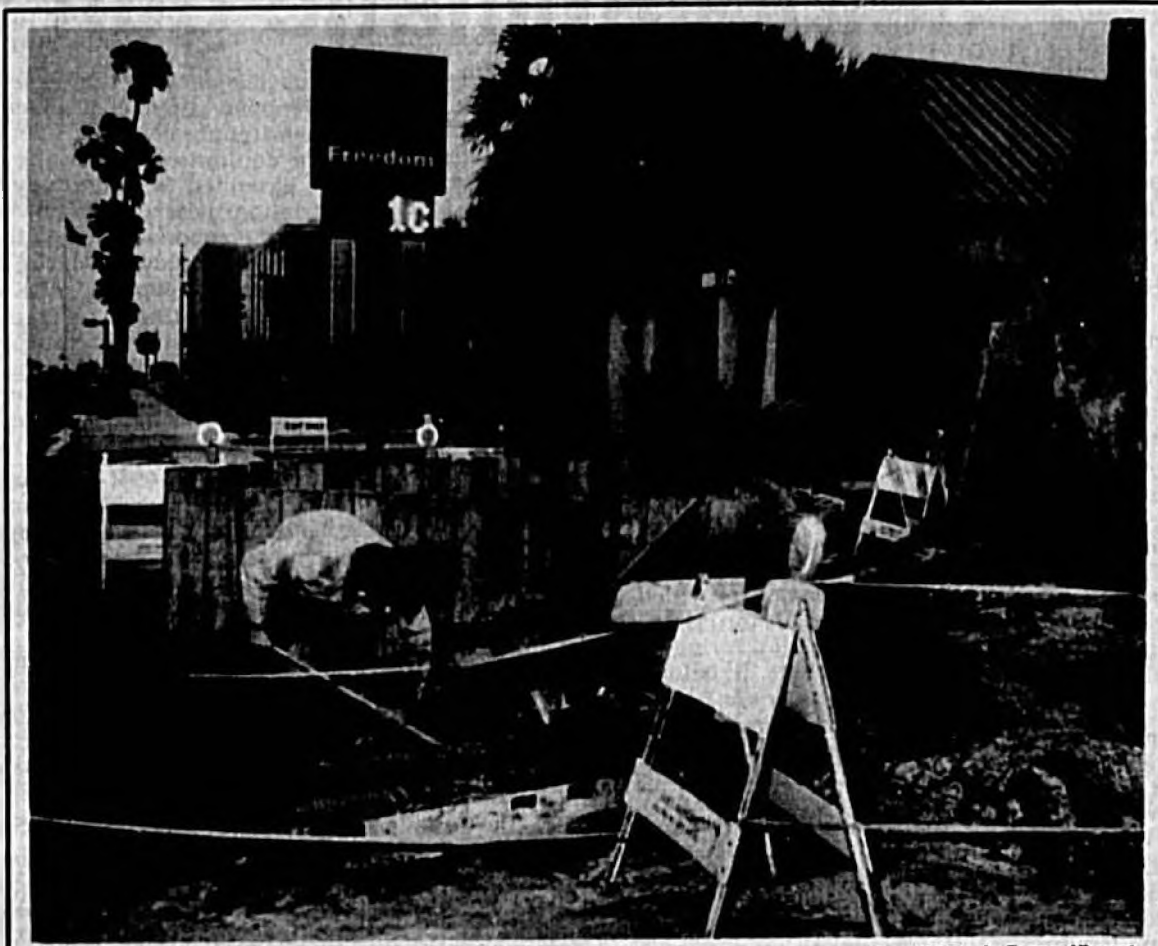
they were forced into portable classrooms at mid-year so the renovation could be done.

The new plan would eliminate the need for "portables".

The cost of the new classrooms is \$320,000.

Construction of other new classroom buildings has been approved previously. But Board member Pat Telson wanted to be convinced Wednesday that the placement of the new buildings at an angle from the administrative

## P&Z denies industrial use rezoning plan

SANFORD — Seminole County Planning and Zoning Commission members turned down a request by former county commissioner Sid Vihlen to rezone 15 acres north of Bookertown from rural to industrial land uses.

Although Vihlen promised to have only commercial uses on the site, immediately west of the Port of Sanford, zoning commissioners agreed with residents that intensive uses should be restricted to the port, which still has land available for development.

The site is west of Kansas Street and south of Nebraska Avenue. A similar request for the site was turned down by the county in 1984. County staff had opposed the change, saying industrial uses should be restricted to land east of Kansas Street, closer to Interstate 4, and north of Orange Boulevard.

Vihlen said Burk Farms located west of his proposed Portside Commerce Park is busy and his development would help buffer the residential areas from the port.

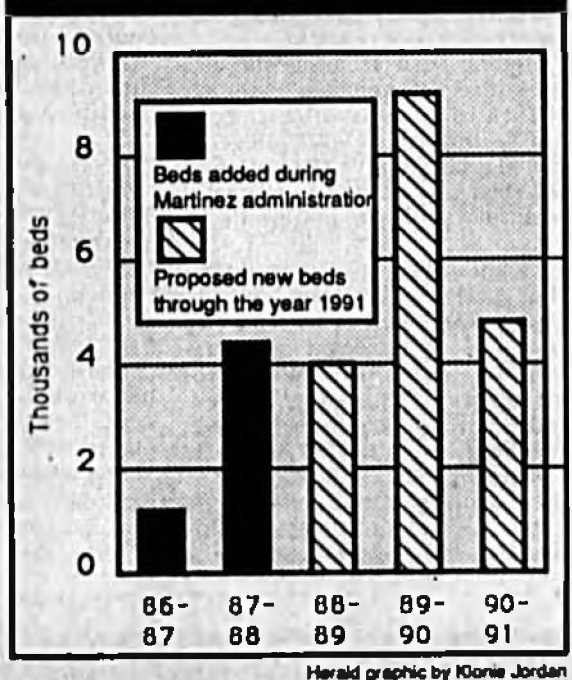
"I've tried to soften the request and not have a continuation of the industrial uses," Vihlen said.

But residents wanted no more intensive uses in their neighborhood. Carlton Edge, president of the Bookertown Community Improvement Association, said the development would reduce property values in the community they are trying to upgrade and would increase traffic in the area.

Jean Melts said, "We do not need any more industrial development in this area. It could start a

## Privatized prisons proposed

TALLAHASSEE — Senate President Bob Crawford proposed a privatized prison experiment for up to 1,500 minimum security inmates Wednesday as Florida's sheriffs came out against a proposal to build regional prisons.

Crawford met with Gov. Bob Martinez to discuss ways out of the state's prison population crisis, as a House committee debated Speaker Tom Gustafson's proposed regional correctional authorities.

"I'm in favor of a mandatory sentence to fit the crime," Sanford Police Chief Steve Harriett said today. "If that can be accomplished by privatization or by putting a medium security prison in each judicial circuit district, then I'm all for it."

Harriett said some legislative action is needed to address early release of felons. Because of prison overcrowding, he said, criminals serve only about 17 percent of their sentences.

Crawford said his proposal would be an experiment to see if private industry can do the job better than the Department of Corrections — or provide a few pointers for the DOC.

"It would probably help the DOC to have some competition, to know everybody's in full stride," Crawford said. "There's no better place than the private sector to develop that competitive spirit."

Crawford said such a privatized prison or prisons could hold between 1,000 and 1,500 on a trial basis.

Martinez, who has proposed spending \$152.4 million in the budget year that begins July 1 to construct prisons to house an additional 8,843 inmates, did not rule out Crawford's idea.

Martinez expressed some reservations, such as "whether a private guard can have the same sanction of law as somebody certified as a law enforcement agent."

But he added, "I think we are both thinking the same way, which is if there is a better way of doing it, it should be done."

Private businesses already operate the Bay County Jail and state facilities for youthful offenders. Private contractors have also been brought in to run medical facilities at three state prisons.

The state is so short of prison space that

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## Lake Mary may be close to filling vacancy

LAKE MARY — The city may be close to hiring a new manager.

A special meeting is tentatively set for 7 p.m. next Wednesday at Lake Mary City Hall. At that time, The Curtiss Group of Plantation, Fla., will

introduce the candidates to the commissioners and mayor. The Curtiss Group is the executive search firm hired by the city to find the appropriate individual to manage a city exploding with commercial and residential growth.

City commissioners in January interviewed three favored candidates which they selected from more than 40 applicants across the country. They found none of them suitable and decided to

raise the salary range for city manager and to use an executive search firm to recruit someone for them.

Last month, the city hired The Curtiss Group, which conducted local interviews this past weekend, according to Acting City Manager Charles Lauderdale.

The Curtiss Group President William E. Frank

## New clerk: We've saved county \$224,000

SANFORD — Seminole County Clerk of Courts Maryanne Morse announced Wednesday she has saved taxpayers \$224,000 since taking office in November, including \$156,000 in annual salaries through a staffing shake-up the first week she took office.

Morse said the savings were part of an effort to bring a businesslike sense to running the Clerk's Office.

"I think it's a different focus," Morse said. "My mindset has always been with the private sector. I don't think there's ever been a concerted effort to look at these areas."

Morse said she is planning to use the savings to purchase a unified computer system for the clerk's

office. The current system is split between the criminal and civil divisions, she said.

Morse fired employees in November by firing several top clerk's office administrators and department managers without notice in a top-level reorganization. Some positions were replaced and others were consolidated into new positions.

In her effort to make clerk's office operations more efficient, Morse said that starting April 1, departments that receive money from the public would be closed at 4:30 to allow clerk's employees to prepare deposits without interruption.

Departments to be closed earlier are probate, child support, circuit and county civil, traffic, land records, county commission records, marriage licenses and passports, and juvenile. The Casselberry and Altamonte Springs branch offices will continue to remain

# Missing McGoldrick officially fired

SANFORD — Albert McGoldrick, a former teacher at Goldsboro Elementary School, was officially fired for "misconduct in office, specifically lewd and lascivious behavior on a child" during Wednesday's Seminole County

School Board meeting.

McGoldrick, who had been found guilty on child molestation charges in February, has been missing since he disappeared from the Seminole County Courthouse the day of his sentencing.

Until his termination, McGoldrick had been on unpaid suspension since charges were

first filed against him. Notices regarding his dismissal and his right to a hearing on the subject have been mailed to his last known address.

A reading and math instructor, he had been employed by Goldsboro for less than a year when he was charged with fondling some of his female students between October 1987

and May 1988.

A warrant has been issued for the arrest of McGoldrick who maintained his innocence throughout the trial. He had been employed as a substitute teacher in Orange and Seminole Counties prior to receiving a full-time assignment at Goldsboro.

## Construction up by \$1 million in Sanford

SANFORD — Construction here is up nearly \$1 million over last year, according to city building department records released this week.

Last month the city issued building permits for \$713,105 in construction, raising the figure to \$2.6 million for this year. Last year the city issued permits for \$1.9 million in construction.

Four permits for single-family homes valued at a total of \$153,424 were issued last month. Permits for one triplex valued at \$35,000 and one eight-unit residence valued at \$182,000 were issued.

The city issued one permit for a \$60,000 commercial structure. No industrial permits were issued in February.

A total of 179 permits were issued last month for construction, repairs and mechanical installations.

One residential and one industrial structure were demolished in the city last month.

## Wounded man in serious condition

ORLANDO — A rural Winter Park man who was wounded when his wife was shot to death at their house early Wednesday was in serious condition in an Orlando hospital early today following surgery yesterday.

Seminole County sheriff's deputies said Daniel R. Ballias, 41, of 5521 Garden Grove Circle, is not under guard at the hospital, although Lt. George Hagood said it is still not clear to sheriff's investigators just how Cecile T. Ballias, 38, was killed and her husband wounded.

"I've got no reason to guard him. He's not going any place. He's not considered the only person involved in this. I don't know if they were alone," Hagood said of the victims.

Deputies said both victims suffered multiple gunshot wounds, but Hagood said he would not comment on that or any other aspect of the case, even after knowing the finding of an autopsy scheduled today in Sanford for Mrs. Ballias.

"I'm going to keep a lid on it," Hagood said. "It's a mess. If I let it out it's going to ruin everything we have... until we make a determination of what hap-

pened."

The shootings occurred between 1 and 2 a.m. The wounded Ballias went to the house of a neighbor for help. That neighbor, Louis A. Diaz, 35, said he was watching television at the time of the incident. He did not hear shots fired. Diaz said he didn't know the Ballias well, but said they had lived in the neighborhood for about two or three years.

Sheriff's deputies said Mrs. Ballias worked for Barnett Bank and that the couple was getting a divorce. Hagood said deputies aren't authorized to discuss the case.

## Lake Mary Boulevard needs beautification

The wheels of democracy grind exceedingly slow, but exceedingly fine.

Nowhere is that more evident locally than in the deliberations about improving the design and appearance of Lake Mary Boulevard. A study committee has spent months refining a plan now known as the Lake Mary Boulevard Model Gateway Concept. It sets standards for landscaping and imposes controls on signs among other things.

Public meetings have been held, some opposition has surfaced, and some but not all of the objections have been incorporated into revisions.

Not everyone, including some of the property owners affected by the proposed controls, are satisfied. But the free expression and compromise have been well-served in this democratic process.

Randall Morris, the chairman of the committee, and all of its members did their work carefully and well.

Now, it is time for the plan to be adopted by all three jurisdictions traversed by the nearly eight miles of road: Sanford, Lake Mary and Seminole County. And it should be used as a model for other primary roads in the county, as well.

A broad spectrum of support for the plan has been expressed, including the Lake Mary City Commission and the Seminole County planning and zoning commission.

However, new opposition has cropped up among Sanford City Commissioners who this week expressed concern about the cost and whether the city would derive sufficient benefit from the proposal.

Fiscal caution over the \$3.7 million project is well-advised and if additional economies can be identified without scarring the proposed beautification, we would approve. But we believe the concept is sound as is.

For motorists traveling along Interstate-4, the heaviest-traveled road into and out of the Sanford-Lake Mary area, Lake Mary Boulevard, State Road 46, and U.S. 17-92 are the only three exits.

First impressions and aesthetics are important considerations in assessing an area's quality of life. And that is important in attracting new business and residents. It is, therefore, necessary that the entrances to Sanford and Lake Mary be attractive as well as free of congestion and safe.

It may be too late to beautify 17-92 but there is time to do something about S.R. 46 and Lake Mary Boulevard.

## License revocation idea is costly in several ways

The bill to deprive high school dropouts of drivers licenses, approved Wednesday by the Florida Senate Transportation Committee, is, in academic jargon, a bonehead idea.

The bill's sponsor, Sen. Curtis Peterson, D-Lakeland, said, "We need an incentive, a very dramatic incentive, to keep young people in school."

Well, there is little, if any, credible evidence that the so-called incentive of keeping a license would have any effect on the 30,000 or so students who drop out each year because they cannot read, or for some other academic or even social reason.

The solution to the dropout problem is not to further punish poor academic achievers by taking something away from them.

Equally so, the solution should not saddle already overworked, if not inefficient, drivers license workers and school teachers with the paper work that would be required to administer such a worthless program.

And, in this era of inadequate finances for state and local government, where is the money to come from to pay for the extra work?

Last, but not least, cops and judges have more important problems to attend to than enforcing a dumb law.

# Tower battles hypocrisy on the Hill

Hypocrisy, thy fondest home is the U.S. Congress.

Whatever your opinion of the now hapless creature who was once the imperious John Tower, you have to admit that senators have judged him by standards they refuse to apply to themselves.

Many of the righteous puritans on Capitol Hill rubbed shoulders with Tower for years during the period he admits to imbibing too much Scotch and when unnamed sources claim he may have been slurping a bottle a day. Given the nature of Senate business, which drags sometimes into the night, it is simply inconceivable that Tower's colleagues could have missed his drinking if it were as bad as all that.

Yet did any of these grim Torquemadas step forward and complain about Tower at the time? Of course not. Has even one of them, a decade later, graced us with a personal recollection of a drunken Senator Tower? No, not a single senator has had the courage for such forthrightness. They'd rather use other people as instruments of Tower's destruction.

Senatorial concern over the "appearance of impropriety" in Tower's employment has been equally hypocritical. Yes, Tower accepted consulting fees from defense contractors after

serving as chairman of the Armed Services Committee and negotiating for this nation with the Soviet Union. But how does that behavior

differ ethically from the congressional practice of accepting campaign funds and honoraria from similar special interests?

Sen. Tim Wirth, D-Colo., doesn't fault Tower for his past employment so much as for possessing a public relations problem. "Leadership in our society is a matter of perception as well as reality," Wirth said. But then why doesn't Wirth suffer from a fatal public relations problem for accepting more than \$20,000 in contributions from executives of Drexel Burnham Lambert (which has since pleaded guilty to defrauding investors) while serving on a House committee empowered to regulate

junk-bond activity?

John Breaux of Louisiana is another senator who spies ethical lapses everywhere except in Congress. Senators serve at the pleasure of voters, he recently reminded us, as if they somehow granted them immunity from the standards they demand of everyone else. Or was Breaux implicitly confessing that voters made a mistake in putting people like him in office?

By the way, whatever happened to the redemptive power of altered behavior? Tower has said he drank too much in the 1970s, but cleaned up his act since then. If he's right, we should applaud his resolution. If he's lying, he should be barred from any post in government at all. Yet rather than search for the truth, some senators decided they don't care.

"We want someone with no record of alcohol abuse whatsoever," intoned Sen. Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C.

Breaux went Hollings one better. Rather than cite proof (if he had any) of Tower's heavy drinking during the 1980s, he damnably referred to the pledge Tower took to avoid alcohol if confirmed as secretary of defense. Such a pledge, said Breaux, is an admission that a man has a problem. Sen. Richard C. Shelby, D-Ala., concurred.

# Trying to deal with the debt

WASHINGTON — What a mismatch. The Democratic minority on the National Economic Commission met the Republican majority in a thinking contest. The result should mortify Republicans who read the results. The power of the Democratic report is increased by the contrast with the thin, pedestrian, almost perfunctory Republican report.

But the party-line division obscures significant agreements. Neither side took the "Deficit? What deficit?" view advocated by those who say better bookkeeping turns the deficit into something benign. Neither side is of the school that says the deficit exists but doesn't matter. And, amazingly and splendidly, both sides agree that the task is not merely to balance the budget but to run a substantial surplus for many years.

The Republicans, allowing the virtue of loyalty to require the vice of illogic, toe the party line. They say that with \$82 billion in new revenues anticipated in fiscal 1990, spending restraint without tax increases will suffice to balance the budget. But then there is this remarkable Republican commitment: "We support the enactment of legislation to establish deficit or surplus targets whose purpose would be to eliminate gradually the non-Social Security deficit."

So the commission came to a consensus far more significant than all its disagreements. The Democrats say: "The surplus goals are readily identifiable: They should be approximately equal to the combined surpluses of the Social Security trust funds."

The non-Social Security deficit is what the budget deficit would be were it not now masked by the trust-fund surpluses, which today are approximately \$60 billion and are growing by \$1 billion a week. How do the Republicans propose to hit the "surplus target" they endorse while their party is tirelessly inflaming the nation's taxophobia?

To the Republicans' Grammy-award winning pop-music economy policy ("Don't Worry, Be Happy") the Democrats respond that, "Optimism is no substitute for responsibility." The nation needs a decades-long program to deal with what is by now a decades-old decline of economic vigor.

From colonial times to the 1960s, say the Democrats, a balanced budget was a norm. Deficits were produced primarily by wars, and the national debt generally was reduced expeditiously. In 108 of the last 200 years, the budget was in surplus. But in the peaceful Reagan years, the national debt increased almost as much in constant dollars as it did during World War II.

Even the much maligned (by conservatives)

Keynesian doctrine holds that in times like these — sustained growth near full employment and capacity — the budget should be in surplus, not counting the trust funds. One consequence of huge deficits in a country with a small saving pool is underinvestment. The consequence of that is economic anemia.

In 1973 something un-American — or is it still? — happened. Median family income stopped growing and began declining. Only in 1987 did it reach the 1973 level. Nothing like that had happened here before: 14 years when family income was below the previous high.

This has been called "the quiet Depression." It coincided with meager growth of productivity and the flood of baby boomers into the labor market. As the Democratic report says, "The unprecedented size of this cohort had given the impression of unprecedented power and influences" — it had its own political, musical and commercial culture — "during its adolescence and early adulthood, when it stormed or frolicked through various institutions of the social order. Now it found itself in a notably unenthusiastic, much less indulgent institution, namely the labor market." The baby boomers were a glut depressing the price of their services.

Today the hourly pay, measured in U.S. dollars, for production workers in Japan, West Germany, Italy and France is higher than for U.S. workers. Today's nearly full employment is partly a result of demographics (the baby bust after the baby boom) and partly a result of low investment. The Democrats argue that in Japan robots are doing tasks still assigned in America to workers.

The Democrats on the commission argue, and the Republicans seem to agree, that the Social Security surplus should be used to retire the federal debt, thereby freeing trillions of dollars for productive investment. This could make American capitalism what it has not recently been — a system of strong productivity growth. If the debate about the deficit can begin anew from the consensus, the commission will have been a historic success.

# New Angolan airstrips puzzle U.S. intelligence

WASHINGTON — Analysts at the Central Intelligence Agency are scratching their heads over two airfields being built in Angola. Unless the mystery is solved to their satisfaction, the airfields could hurt relations that are finally on the mend between the United States and Angola.

The oil-rich nation on the southwest coast of Africa has been in turmoil since achieving independence from Portugal in 1975. A Marxist government was installed with the help of Cuban troops, causing the United States to break diplomatic relations with Angola.

Since then, Angola has been a surrogate superpower battlefield. The Soviets, using Cuban airplanes, pay the price of keeping the Marxist party in power. The United States, along with South Africa, funds the rebel group.

But successive American administrations have tired of the war. Last December, assistant secretary of state Chester A. Crocker brokered a peace agreement for Angola, Cuba and South Africa. Keeping an ace in the hole, the United States was not a party to the agreement. President Bush has vowed to keep funding the rebels until the Marxist party reaches a political settlement with them.

The airfields may be the Soviets' ace in the hole.

Recent top-secret CIA reports, relying on satellite photography and spies on the ground, have confirmed that two airfields are taking shape at Bengala and the capital city of Luanda. Adding to the mystery, the Angolans are dredging a larger port on the coast at Namibe.

The port may be to attract commercial shipping, but why does Angola need the airfields when it already has adequate commercial airports?

One faction of the CIA has tried to put a happy face on the mystery: The Angolans need the airfields to move 50,000 Cuban troops out of the country by the peace pact's July 1991 deadline. But the Cubans didn't need extra airfields to get into Angola in 1975 and haven't needed them since then to ferry more than 300,000 soldiers in and out of the country.

More cynical minds in the CIA think the Marxist government is building the airfields to welcome AN-24 "Condors," the large transport planes of the Soviet Union. A massive airlift could quickly restock Angola with troops.

The Soviets, although financially strapped at home, have spent enormous sums to keep Cuban soldiers in Angola. According to one intelligence estimate, they spent up to \$1.5 billion last year for military equipment. At the same time, Mikhail Gorbachev scaled back aid to other African nations, trimming the list of charity cases from 22 in 1983 to seven today.

With a dash of chutzpah, Angola's Marxist President Jose Eduardo dos Santos has secretly asked the United States to help finance the Cuban withdrawal. Our sources say Gen. Antonio dos Santos Franco, head of Angola's general staff, has estimated the cost of the troop withdrawal at \$800 million.

Bush isn't giving Angola much hope of a handout. He is too busy backing rebel leader Jonas Savimbi who has vowed to keep fighting. Covert U.S. aid to Savimbi's group has averaged \$15 million a year since 1986. It has been funneled through Zaire.

CIA sources predict Bush will increase the funding to make up for the loss of support Savimbi had from South Africa. Under the peace pact, South Africa had to stop funding the rebels.

Also credited with lifting prices were computer-assisted buy programs, which pushed the Dow up almost 20 points in early afternoon trading.

The programs kicked in shortly after midday when stock futures in Chicago rose sharply compared with actual stock prices.

**Dollar higher, gold down**

The dollar was slightly higher Thursday in light trading on most major foreign currency markets. Gold was slightly lower.

In New York, the dollar was slightly lower against key foreign currencies in early, dull trading. Traders said the currency market lacked clear direction, as most traders feared central bank intervention, which prevented the dollar from moving higher.

Jr. said Wednesday afternoon that the firm has spoken to about 175 people so far. They have conducted interviews nationwide. Frank said that as they proceed with the interviews, they have run into "one or two bumps" along the way due to "extenuating circumstances."

"We're closing in. I don't know if we're ready yet. We're still in the process of recruiting. We've done a pretty good scouring of the state of Florida. We need to know who's who," Frank said.

The commissioners had expressed that they wanted an individual who was successful where they were and not looking for another job.

Frank said they were seeking candidates who weren't on the job market or on the "short list for the other organization."

"I want to present people as close to the exact fit as humanely possible. I want to identify people who are solid citizens with the capability of doing the job," Frank said.

"Every one of these gentlemen are currently employed," Lauderdale said.

When the firm was hired Feb. 2, Frank told the commissioners that they could expect to interview a candidate within 90 days or as little as

45 to 60 days.

"I'm going to try and have the final candidates sorted out. What I'm trying to do, because of the sense of urgency, is to get it wrapped up as fast as we can," Frank said. However, he stressed he did not want to present people who were selected only because of the time element.

Although, the commissioners favored a candidate from Florida, Frank said it was not an "absolute" and that they have identified viable candidates from out of state and by March 15 he hopes to "obviate the need of location."

Frank said although they haven't had the need to travel elsewhere to locate candidates, if the need should arise for travel, they will cancel the meeting set for next Wednesday.

Although the number of candidates to be interviewed is still unknown, Frank said they hope to present one or two finalists.

The city will pay the firm 25 percent of \$45,000, the mid-point range of the city manager's salary, to be collected in three parts. The initial payment was made when the firm started the job.

Lauderdale has served as acting city manager since last August when former manager Bob Norris left to take a position in Neptune Beach.

The site is surrounded by rural homelots and vacant land. The site is west of the proposed county Grantline Road, a two-lane western I-4 bypass between State Roads 46 and 46-A.

- Approved a request by Cabot Cabot and Forbes to change the land use from suburban estates to commercial for 11 acres northwest of Paola Road and the proposed Grantline Road.

Although one homeowner said the commercial development would encroach in the rural residential areas west of the property, commissioners agreed with the project's architect Wayne Bennett that it would provide a buffer between the residential areas and high-intensity commercial and office development east of Grantline Road.

Commissioners did deny Bennett's request for retail zoning, saying a planned commercial development was preferred.

Morse said the earlier closing hours, while inconvenient to some, would allow the clerk's office to make deposits by 11 a.m. the following day and

receive the benefit of an additional day's interest.

Morse said she also plans to change the clerk's bank from Southeast to Sun Bank and couriers from Wells Fargo to Brinks because delays in deposits caused by frequent late

pick-ups have cost the county added income from interest on deposits. Through negotiations, Morse said she expects to gain \$15,000 more this year in interest with Sun Bank.

Morse said she hopes to save \$35,000 by adopting a uniform

overtime policy for clerk's employees.

Morse is currently looking at methods to collect more than \$4.5 million in uncollected fines and penalties, some dating back to 1982. She said the clerk's office itself would receive a small share of the uncollected fines, the added money would benefit the county and local law enforcement budgets.

Morse said she has also used the state Recording Trust Fund to purchase two new cameras for the micrographics department and five microfilm readers, saving about \$10,000 already but cited for those items by the county commissioners. ### Mayor pleads innocent to extortion

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — Former Danbury Mayor James E. Dyer pleaded innocent in federal court Wednesday extorting more than \$30,000 from a local bank in exchange for helping to arrange a \$2 million real estate deal.

Dyer entered his plea to seven counts of extortion before U.S. District Judge Jose Cabranes and was released on \$100,000 bond. Asked if he had taken the money, Dyer replied, "No, I absolutely did not, no."

Dyer, 42, was indicted March 2 by a federal grand jury in New Haven in a municipal corruption case that a federal prosecutor has called unprecedented in Connecticut.

The former Democratic mayor was charged with obtaining money from Charles Bruno, the former president of the Danbury Savings and Loan Association, and the bank, while he was mayor, U.S. Attorney Stanley A. Tward said.

Cabranes scheduled jury selection for April 18. If convicted, Dyer faces up to 20 years in prison and \$70,000 in fines.

Bruno, 47, who has pleaded guilty to filing false tax returns in the case, has admitted he arranged cash payments of more than \$30,000 to Dyer while he was mayor in 1984 and 1985, Tward said.

### Tutu campaigns for Harvard board

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — South African Archbishop Desmond Tutu will run for a spot on Harvard University's Board of Overseers in an effort to bring the Ivy League school into the struggle to end apartheid in his homeland, an alumni group said Thursday.

Tutu, winner of the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize, and four other nominees sponsored by the Harvard and Radcliffe Alumni Against Apartheid, were to announce their candidacies at simultaneous news conferences in Cape Town, South Africa; Bogota, Colombia, and Cambridge.

The group said all its nominees were committed "to rapid and complete divestment of Harvard's \$230.9 million still invested in companies doing business in South Africa."

"The time has come for Harvard to become a moral leader as well in the worldwide struggle against apartheid," Tutu said in a prepared statement.

Robert Wolff, a spokesman for the anti-apartheid group, said Tutu's "moral authority" and stature as a world leader could be used to pressure the school into divesting.

He said if a university of Harvard's stature decided to divest, other institutions would follow suit.

A Harvard spokesman confirmed that the university has \$230.9 million invested in companies dealing with South Africa. The Harvard Board of Overseers is one of two governing boards at the university.

### 911 dispatcher tips intruders

PORTLAND, Ore. — A 911 dispatcher who made two follow-up calls to a former police officer reporting a burglary at his house ended up talking to the intruders and tipping them off that help was on the way.

"She was just doing what she was trained to do," Portland Police Bureau spokesman Dave Simpson said Wednesday. "He (the caller) said two men were breaking in the front door."

"In a case like that, it is normal for the dispatcher to call back and find out where they are in the house so the officers headed to scene can respond appropriately," Simpson said.

But Bob Shire and his wife Robin have served legal notice of their intent to sue the police. He charges the police failed to respond to the couple's request for help in a timely fashion.

Shire told The Oregonian newspaper two men posing as police officers came to his door in the middle of the night and began questioning them about a prior burglary.

After admitting them into his Portland house, Shire, a former police officer, became suspicious that they might be the burglars, returning to get what they didn't take the first time. He said he went to another room and called 911 and asked for help.

# Tower nomination nears defeat

WASHINGTON — A desperation proposal to let John Tower run the Pentagon for six months to prove he has quit drinking was all standing Thursday between him and his becoming only the ninth Cabinet nominee ever rejected by the Senate.

Democratic leaders in the Senate were surprised when Republican leader Robert Dole of Kansas suggested the trial period Wednesday night. They decided to consider it overnight.

But the Democrats appeared skeptical, and they held enough votes to reject outright Tower's nomination as defense secretary.

Dole made the offer — with Tower's knowledge — when it became clear only three of the five needed Democrats could be swayed to join with the 45 Senate Republicans and save the Tower nomination.

Tower's fate was effectively sealed Wednesday night when the last two undecided Democrats — freshmen Joseph Lieberman, D-Conn., and Charles Robb, D-Va. — opposed the former Texas senator, who spent four of his 24 years in the

Senate running the Armed Services Committee, which recommended his rejection.

Senate Democratic leader George Mitchell of Maine said he would announce Thursday whether there was any sentiment among Democrats for Dole's unprecedented suggestion or whether Tower's nomination — the most controversial of President Bush's young administration — would go to a straight up-or-down vote.

Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., said the proposal deserved "serious consideration" but, added it also raised "serious questions" such as whether it would destabilize the Pentagon, whether a person "who is on probation" should be in the nuclear chain of command second only to the president, and whether anyone could assure "that we're not going to have a crisis in the next six months. I don't think anyone can do that."

Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., termed it "a desperation move" and added that the Constitution "doesn't say to give any nominee a tryout period."

"We owe this nominee a vote,"

Byrd said. "We ought to cut it clean. We ought not leave some hazy never-never land out there, leave this thing hanging in the balance for six months."

Dole made the startling proposal only after Mitchell rejected Dole's call to let Tower come before the Senate to answer questions. Dole said his six-month proposal would give the Senate "a second opportunity" to pass judgment on Tower after half a year, give Tower "a second chance" with his career and give Bush "his choice for secretary of defense."

He said it would take "a miracle" to win and proposed that Tower give Bush a letter of resignation dated Oct. 1, and return in the fall for a second confirmation hearing.

Tower left the Senate in early 1985, spent 14 months as an arms control negotiator and then worked as a defense consultant. In addition to Tower's drinking habits, senators questioned the "revolving door" nature of his jump into consulting work from the negotiating table, and questioned possible conflicts of interest.

Tower has admitted drinking

to excess in the 1970s, but denied being an alcoholic or abusing alcohol. He pledged to abstain from even wine with dinner if confirmed.

LOS ANGELES — A major people-smuggling ring that used commercial airlines to fly illegal immigrants to Eastern cities has been broken, but authorities say there may be hundreds more like it throughout the nation.

Immigration and Naturalization Service officials said Wednesday that with the arrests of four "coyotes" — who guide the illegal aliens across the border and to their destinations — they had broken up "one of the nation's largest and most sophisticated smuggling operations."

The INS described the reputed smugglers as key suspects in a ring that has apparently made \$500,000 in the last two months. Agents said they also obtained information during a recent crackdown that may lead to the arrest within a few days of the ringleaders, who are believed to live in New York.

Ernest Gustafson, the INS Los Angeles district director, said the crackdown has so far resulted in the arrests of more than 500 aliens nationwide.

"These smugglers, in my opinion, are the most despicable group of people around," Gustafson said. "These people in essence are selling dreams and giving nothing but nightmares."

### Koreans hurl firebombs at U.S. ship

SEOUL, South Korea — Four dissident students in a provincial city hurled tear gas and firebombs Thursday in a port area where U.S. naval forces were preparing to take part in a joint military exercise with South Korea, news reports and officials said.

There were no reports of injuries in the morning attack in the port city of Pusan, 205 miles southeast of Seoul.

The state-run Korea Broadcasting System said the aircraft carrier USS Midway was in the port to take part in the annual Team Spirit military exercise beginning March 14.

A spokesman for the U.S. Military Command in Seoul said the four Koreans entered the port area and threw several tear-gas canisters and firebombs in the direction of the Midway.

The devices fell short of the carrier, but caused minor damage to two U.S. military vehicles, including one scorched by a firebomb.

The protesters were detained by South Korean soldiers and turned over to Korean police. No injuries were reported.

### Volcano forces thousands to relocate

GUATEMALA CITY — Authorities evacuated thousands of people from villages near the Pacaya volcano after an eruption Tuesday, officials said Wednesday.

The Pacaya volcano, 12 miles south of the capital in an area of about 10,000 residents, spewed lava, smoke and fire into the air Tuesday afternoon. Authorities said the volcanic activity subsided Wednesday morning.

Guatemalan authorities said no casualties were reported but some houses were destroyed by volcanic rock. They said a majority of the 10,000 area residents had been relocated by firefighters.

Fuego, another volcano in Guatemala located 35 miles southeast of the capital in Chimaltenango province, is also active but poses no threat to nearby villages, authorities said.

Twelve years ago, Santiaguito volcano, 80 miles west of the capital in the Quetzaltenango province, destroyed several villages and caused several hundred thousand dollars worth of damage.

### Vice president reviving Marcos' party

MANILA, Philippines — Vice President Salvador Laurel formed an alliance Thursday with supporters of ousted ruler Ferdinand Marcos at the revival of the political party that brought the exiled dictator to power in 1985.

The ailing Marcos, hospitalized for respiratory and lung ailments in Hawaii since Jan. 15, was invited to attend what organizers called a "reunion" meeting of the Nacionalista Party.

Laurel, who was among the leaders of the political opposition during the later Marcos years, and President Corazon Aquino have split over Aquino's handling of the communist insurgency and other issues.

Most of those who attended Thursday's affair were supporters of the 71-year-old Marcos.

On Wednesday, Congressman Emigdio Tanjaton Jr., an Aquino cousin, charged in a speech in the House of Representatives that Laurel's UNA had hired a Washington public relations firm under a \$900,000 contract to wage a campaign to discredit the Aquino government.

Tanjaton said the campaign would be aimed at the U.S. Congress, the White House and other influential sectors in the United States.

One of those in the crowd was opposition Sen. Juan Ponce Enrile, Marcos's defense secretary who co-led the revolt that drove the former president into exile in Hawaii after 20 years in power.

# Afghan rebels closing in on Jalalabad

PESHAWAR, Pakistan — Afghan rebels say they captured the airport and suburbs of the strategic eastern city of Jalalabad, and the leader of their interim government declared the guerrillas are "on the verge of a final victory."

Sources in the Pakistan-based Afghan rebel alliance said Wednesday that guerrillas attacked Jalalabad, a city of about 700,000 people 70 miles east of Kabul, from four directions simultaneously beginning Monday.

The fall of Jalalabad, a city full of refugees from the 10-year-old

civil war, would deal a powerful morale blow to the forces of Afghan President Najibullah following last month's withdrawal of Soviet troops backing his government.

Rebel sources said that after fierce fighting the guerrillas seized Samarkhel, 6 miles southeast of Jalalabad, and other suburbs Tuesday night. Nine guerrillas were killed and 200 wounded and a large amount of weapons seized, the sources said. They gave no indication of casualties suffered by government forces.

A Western diplomat in the Pakistani frontier city of Peshawar confirmed the rebels

had captured the Jalalabad airport and the suburb of Samarkhel, but provided no details. Official Kabul radio reported fighting in Samarkhel, but did not say the town had fallen.

Witnesses said hundreds of Afghan men were pouring across the border from refugee camps in Pakistan to the Jalalabad area, where rebel commanders struggled to prevent looting.

Sibghatullah Mojaddidi, president of an interim government the rebels hope will replace the Soviet-backed communist government in Kabul, told reporters in Peshawar that the guerrilla advances were a major victory.

"Our mujahideen brothers have today captured Jalalabad airport and are already infiltrating the city," Mojaddidi said. "This is a big boost for the interim government."

Mojaddidi also addressed Afghan residents for the first time on rebel-run Voice of Afghanistan radio, saying in a brief speech the rebels were "on the verge of a final victory."

A Western diplomat said in Jalalabad Tuesday the resistance was poised to launch offensives against other key towns and cities held by the government.

# Soviets accept world court jurisdiction

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union announced Thursday that it recognizes for the first time the authority of the U.N. International Court of Justice to interpret and apply six key international human rights treaties.

The new Soviet stand was outlined in a letter dated Feb. 28 from Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze to U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar. The letter was made public Thursday in Moscow and Wednesday in New York.

Shevardnadze's letter acknowledged that acceptance of international jurisdiction over the treaties would allow the

world court to supersede Soviet internal law, a move Moscow had resisted for more than 40 years.

It also allows other nations to contest the Soviet Union at the world court regarding those pacts. The world court, the principal judicial organ of the United Nations, was established at The Hague, Netherlands, in 1945.

Until the emergence in March 1985 of Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, who is a Moscow University Law School graduate, an interpretation giving precedence to international rulings was seen as an infringement of Soviet sovereignty.

Shevardnadze's letter, accepting as binding any international

court ruling regarding the treaties, said:

"The Soviet Union, which attaches much importance to enhancing the role of the U.N. International Court of Justice in world affairs in present day conditions, has begun considering the issue of withdrawing its earlier-made reservations to a number of international treaties concerning the jurisdiction of this legal body."

"A Feb. 10 decree by the Presidium of the Supreme Soviet (parliament) recognizes the compulsory jurisdiction of the U.N. International Court of Justice over the interpretation and application of (the) human rights agreements," the letter said.

"In advocating the primacy of international law, we consider that international legal norms and obligations of states supersede their internal regulations," Shevardnadze wrote.

The treaties in question are the 1948 convention against genocide, the 1949 convention against slave trade and prostitution, the 1952 convention on political rights of women, the 1965 convention barring racial discrimination, the 1979 convention forbidding discrimination against women, and the 1948 convention against torture and other cruel punishment.

Finally accepting the jurisdiction of the world court represents another step by Gorbachev

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# Witness claims North was obsessed

WASHINGTON — Former fund-raiser Carl Channell testified that with the help of Oliver North, he persuaded wealthy private Americans to chip in millions of dollars that illegally purchased weapons for Nicaraguan rebels.

North, Channell said Wednesday, was so caught up in the crusade for the Contras that he once told a potential contributor, "I don't care if I have to lie to Congress" about activities for the rebels fighting in Nicaragua.

But that September 1985 statement was made just six days after the White House aide drafted a letter to a House panel denying he was involved in private efforts to arm the rebels at a time when Congress banned official U.S. assistance.

Channell was scheduled to return Thursday for a third day of testimony at North's 12-count felony trial.

The conservative fund-raiser brought in millions of dollars for

the Contras' military needs through his tax-exempt National Endowment for the Preservation of Liberty — mainly through huge contributions from wealthy Americans.

He said he knew in late 1986 his fund-raising may have "varied" with his tax-exempt status; contributions were not to be used to buy weapons. But he said he assumed that because of his "extraordinary work," the White House might help him when the time came to face the Internal Revenue Service.

President Ronald Reagan was so pleased with his efforts, Channell testified, that he telephoned once with his thanks — but also berated his inability to understand Thomas O'Neill, D-Mass., then the House speaker and a staunch opponent of aid to the Contra rebels.

Channell is awaiting sentencing for his April 1987 conviction for conspiracy to defraud the government and testified with immunity from further prosecution.

North, a retired Marine lieutenant colonel and an ex-aide on the National Security

Council, is charged with lying to Congress, destroying official documents, tax fraud and accepting an illegal gift. If convicted of all 12 counts, he could face 60 years in prison and \$3 million in fines.

Channell, who has named North as a co-conspirator, described how he and North raised money for the rebels. In spring 1985, he asked North to give "briefings" about Nicaragua to prospective contributors.

North then would leave the room, leaving Channell to make the pitch. Barbara Newington of Connecticut gave several thousand dollars through 1985, and Ellen Garwood of Texas once wrote a check for \$30,000 to buy the rebels an airplane.

Channell said one exclusive pitch to Garwood persuaded her to give more than \$2 million to Channell's organization in April and May 1986.

Channell also made a stunning revelation about North's attitude during the time when Congress banned aid to the rebels.

Channell said he made an appeal for the Contras to Texas oilman Bunker Hunt Sept. 11, 1985, in which North flew to Dallas from Washington for dinner at the Petroleum Club with Hunt.

After an extended briefing, North left the table "saying something like, 'You are going to talk about money, and I can't take any money,'" Channell said.

In the club's lobby, Channell said, Hunt and North chatted briefly within hearing range of Channell and, "One thing that stuck was that Bunker said to him, 'Do you mind getting in trouble about this?'"

"And Colonel North said, 'I don't care if I have to go to jail about this, and I don't care if I have to lie to Congress about this,'" Channell said.

That revelation goes to the heart of the government's case — that North lied to Congress in 1985 and 1986 when he was questioned by lawmakers about his efforts.

## Canadians to rule on abortion

OTTAWA — Canada's highest court is set to rule on whether the unborn have a constitutional right to life in a landmark decision expected to give politicians guidance while drafting a new abortion law.

The Supreme Court of Canada was to rule Thursday on an 8-year-old case involving the country's leading anti-abortion crusader, Joe Borowski, who sought a declaration from the court that the unborn have the right to life, liberty and security of person contained in the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

Canada has been without an abortion law for more than a year after the Supreme Court struck down a 19-year-old law allowing abortions only in cases of medical necessity.

In January, the court ruled in a case involving abortionist Dr. Henry Morgentaler that women had a constitutional right to decide whether to terminate a pregnancy. The court also said any new abortion legislation must strike a reasonable balance between the rights of pregnant women and those of the fetus and that it was up to legislators to decide at what age a fetus can survive outside the mother's body.

The Borowski case strikes at the heart of fetal rights. Lawyers involved in the case are uncertain if the court will decide at what stage the fetus should be considered a person. The court could also decide it has no jurisdiction to rule on the case.

Thursday's ruling was expected to be one of the rare times when the Supreme Court provides guidance to politicians on a new law.

## Minimum wage may be raised without training wage

WASHINGTON — A Senate committee voted to increase the federal minimum wage to \$4.65 an hour but not with a lower "training wage" endorsed by President Bush, setting up a potential veto confrontation.

If adopted by the full Congress, the raise from the current \$3.35 per hour would be the first boost in the minimum wage since 1981. Supporters contend the current wage's buying power has eroded by about 40 percent since then.

Bush last week recommended an increase to \$4.25 an hour but insisted it be coupled with a sub-minimum "training" wage of \$3.35, which would be paid to new hires for as long as six months.

The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee voted 10-6 Wednesday to reject Bush's plan and then approved, 11-5, a Democratic alternative that would raise the minimum wage in a three-year period to \$4.65

for all workers.

Republican Sens. James Jeffords of Vermont and David Durenburger of Minnesota voted with the majority Democrats on the second ballot.

At the White House, spokesman Marlin Fitzwater promptly told reporters Bush considered the \$4.25 proposal "our last offer," but the apparent veto threat was brushed aside by the committee chairman, Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass.

"My own hope is that the administration may still be brought around, but if it's the judgment that they're going to

veto it I believe we'll override it," Kennedy said, citing the "very strong vote" in committee.

At the same time, Kennedy indicated there was room for compromise on the issue of the training wage. He said Labor Department statistics indicate the training period for most entry-level jobs is one month rather than the six months referred to in the administration plan.

If the administration proposed a 30-day sub-minimum wage, accompanied by specific training requirements, Kennedy said, "I'm glad to listen. ... I'm open to listening to that, but it has to have the educational components."

Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah, ranking Republican on the committee, argued that the lower training wage is needed to offset a loss of jobs projected if the minimum wage is increased.

"Senator Kennedy's proposal could cost 650,000 jobs," Hatch asserted.

Median family income hits \$30,850

WASHINGTON — The nation's median family income in 1987 reached \$30,850, rising one percent from 1986 after inflation and narrowly exceeding the previous high mark of 1973, the Census Bureau said.

At the same time, however, the increase was concentrated among white families while the medians for black and Hispanic families remained stagnant at \$18,100 and \$20,310, respectively, the bureau reported Wednesday.

Moreover, the annual survey found median household income — that of single earners as well as unrelated persons in a household — was \$25,990, essentially unchanged from 1986 after adjusting for a 3.7 percent inflation rate.

Median income is a line at which half the

homes earned more and half earned less during the year, the last period for which figures were available. The bureau's report is a more detailed look at numbers first released in August.

"The change in overall real median family income between 1986 and 1987 represents the fifth consecutive annual real increase," the report said, apparently reflecting one result of the recent economic expansion.

In 1982 — as now measured in 1987 dollars — the median had slipped to \$27,591 amid the last economic recession, down from the comparable level of \$30,820 in 1973, the bureau noted. The 1973 figure stood as the all-time high before the current figure topped it by \$30.

## Tourists tell of 'atrocities' in Tibet

BEIJING — American and other foreign travelers just out of Tibet Thursday accused police of firing indiscriminately at Tibetans during three days of anti-Chinese rioting and blamed the carnage on "the incompetence of the authorities."

"Shootings by the authorities have been excessive, unpredictable, indiscriminate, and have on occasion been atrocities," 34 foreigners evacuated from the Tibetan capital of Lhasa said in a statement issued Thursday in the Sichuan Province city of Chengdu. They vowed to send copies of the statement to the United Nations and other foreign governments.

Twelve people have been officially reported killed since the rioting erupted Sunday, but credible foreign reports put the death toll at up to 75. Official death tolls have been low in three previous major disturbances in Tibet since October 1987.

Lhasa was reported calm Thursday for a second day, but armed police were still searching homes and buildings and rounding up hundreds of Tibetans to be arrested, foreigners reached by telephone said.

Lhasa was placed under

martial law Tuesday after thousands of Tibetans protesting Chinese communist rule stoned police, set fires and ransacked buildings in three days of the worst unrest in the Himalayan region since a rebellion against Beijing 30 years ago.

Uniformed Chinese soldiers armed with automatic weapons were reported to have ringed the city and were backing up police and paramilitary units in a crackdown ahead of Friday's anniversary of the March 10, 1959, uprising.

About 40 foreigners, including Americans, Europeans and Japanese, were evacuated Thursday morning by plane to Chengdu, the nearest major Chinese city. All foreign travelers were ordered out of Lhasa under the martial law order.

In their statement, 34 of those evacuated, including six Americans, sharply assailed Chinese and Tibetan authorities for employing "draconian measures," including the imposition of martial law.

"While the Tibetan demonstrators became violent and destructive in expressing their anger and frustration, we feel that the magnitude and bloodiness of the crisis has been caused by the incompetence of the authorities," the statement

said.

Foreigners and Tibetans have reported that on Monday and Tuesday, police snipers fired on rioters from rooftops. There were unconfirmed reports of police dragging Tibetans off and shooting them summarily.

"A Tibetan I have known for years told me he saw two people running away from the police Monday, and the police just filled them full of bullets," said Steve Marshall, 37, of New Orleans, who was among those evacuated from Lhasa.

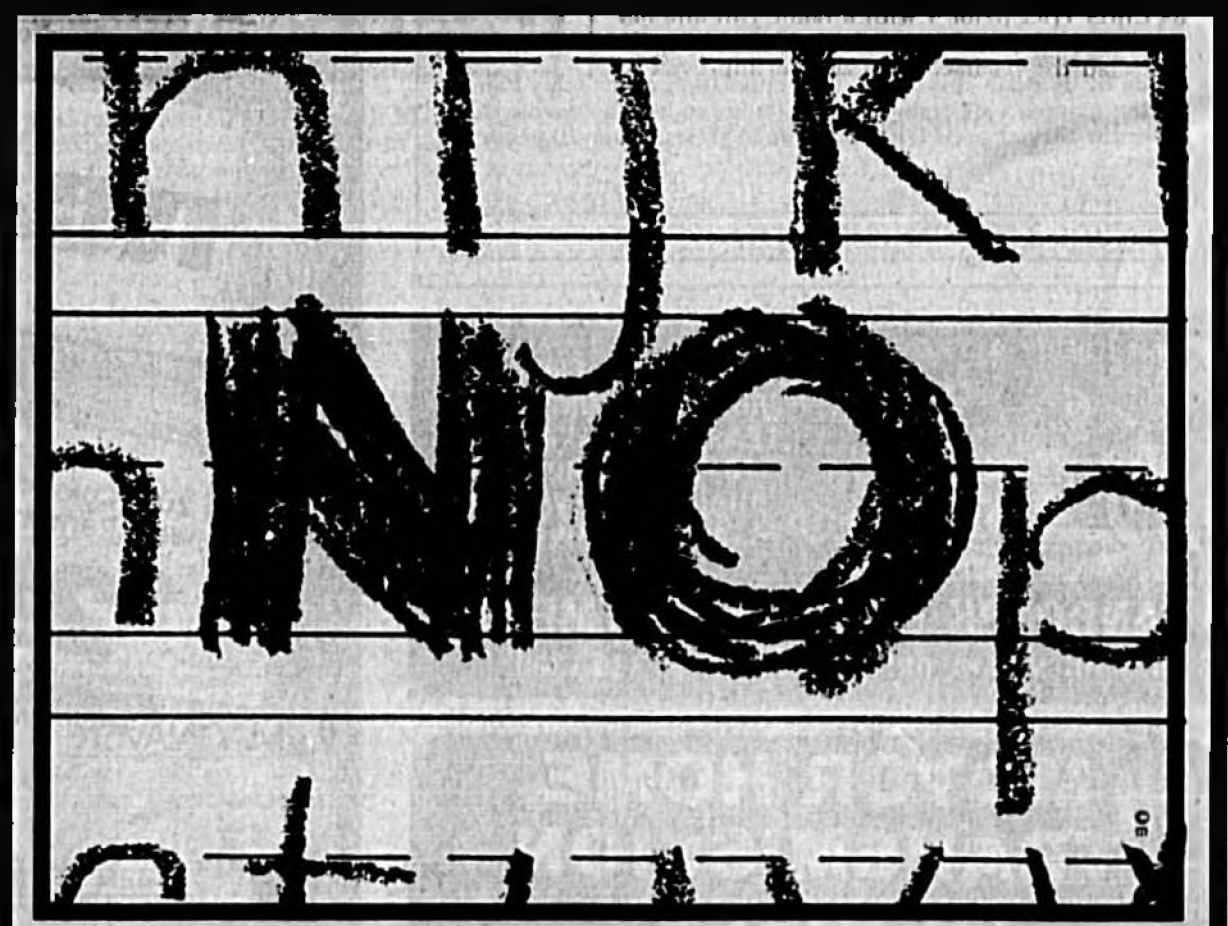
Marshall, who witnessed the eruption of the violence Sunday, said he wrote the statement issued by the foreigners.

He said several Tibetans had told him police shot fleeing citizens and cited reports that police entered at least three private homes and shot occupants to death.

Marshall denied Chinese allegations, repeated late Wednesday in a commentary on the Xinhua news agency, that the Tibetans were armed.

"The Chinese are liars," he said. "The Tibetans have not shot at the Chinese."

Witnesses said police and paramilitary units were out in heavy force in Lhasa, stopping citizens and vehicles as often as every 100 feet.

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## Iranians expelled; Australian stores threatened

LONDON — Britain, citing security concerns, announced the expulsion of "a number of Iranians" and ordered the closure of Iran's consulate in the crown colony of Hong Kong.

The moves Wednesday came one day after Tehran broke diplomatic ties with London in the continuing controversy over British author Salman Rushdie's novel, "The Satanic Verses," which Muslims consider blasphemous.

Police in Sydney, Australia, were guarding bookstores Thursday following death threats and a televised warning from a Pakistan-born Muslim who demanded that publisher Penguin Books pull the novel from store shelves by Friday.

The owner of Abbey's bookshop in Sydney said his store was under 24-hour police surveillance following death threats. The owner, who requested anonymity, said he had sold 250 copies of "The Satanic Verses."

"The threats were quite

blunt," he said. "The caller simply said he would kill me if the book continued to be sold."

In a television interview Wednesday, Pakistan-born Javed Chaudry demanded that Penguin pull the novel from circulation by Friday and pledged support for Iranian spiritual leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's death sentence on Rushdie.

"I am a very violent man and the people who are helping me are violent," Chaudry warned. "If someone wants to put me in jail, they can. If they want to kill me they can. But they can't take away my obedience to the ayatollah."

Prime Minister Bob Hawke said Thursday he was personally offended by Chaudry's threats.

"If any Australian individual or group infringes the law, then the law should take its full course," Hawke said.

In London, British Foreign Secretary Sir Geoffrey Howe said the decision to deport an unspecified number of staff from the Iranian Embassy and other Iranians was made because

Khomeini refused to lift his Feb. 14 death decree against Rushdie.

"We have made clear throughout that as with any other country, normal relations between Britain and Iran must depend on Iran's fulfillment of her international obligations, in particular by renouncing the use or threat of violence against our citizens," Howe told the House of Commons.

"We are keeping the activities of other Iranians under very close review and further action will be taken as necessary," he said.

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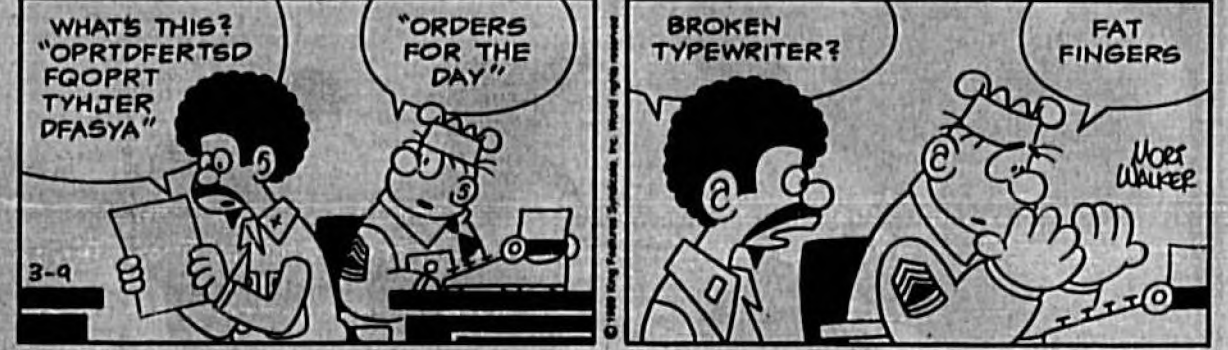
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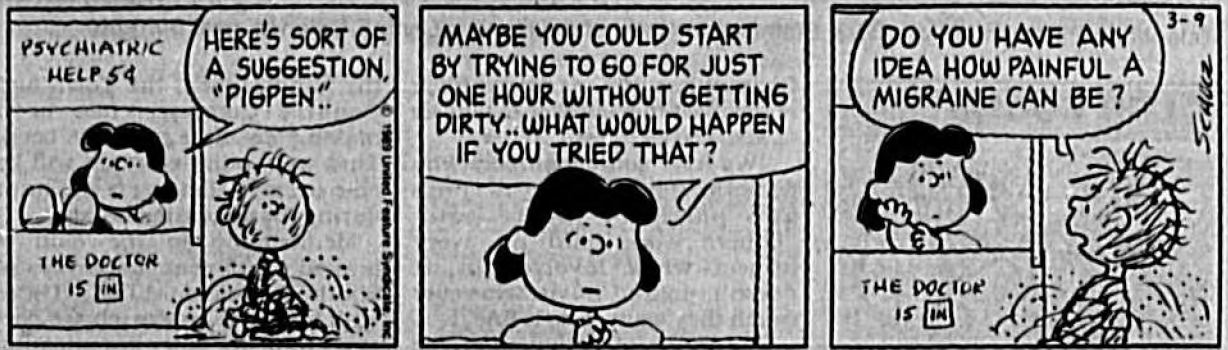

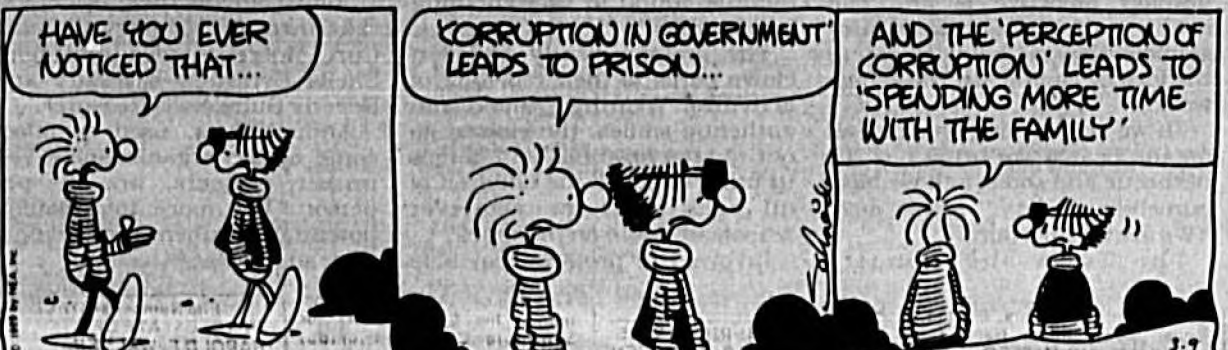

# Medical diagnosis needs explanation



**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Our son, 29, had a pre- and post-operative diagnosis of giant multilobe aneurysm of basilar artery. He had a craniotomy with clipping of basilar aneurysm. I'm not allowed in the medical library so am unable to find out what this all means. Can you help?

**DEAR READER:** The basilar artery is one of the large arteries supplying the base of the brain at the back of the head. When a weakened portion of the arterial wall balloons out from the pressure within the vessel, the condition is called an aneurysm. Aneurysms can rupture, causing bleeding into the brain. Therefore, once discovered, they are usually surgically treated. As you can imagine, this is a delicate operation during which the skull must be opened (craniotomy) and the diseased artery identified. Then it is clipped or tied so that it cannot burst.

I think that your son was fortunate to have had a successful outcome from such dangerous surgery. Ask the neurosurgeon to explain in detail exactly what he did during the operation and what, if any, precautions your son should take to avoid further difficulty.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I've been getting insectlike bites on my scalp, forehead and legs. I thought fleas might be the problem but I'm the only one in the family affected. They appear in the morning or evening and last two to three days. Should I call a dermatologist or a fumigator?

**DEAR READER:** Fleas often preferentially attack one or two members of a family. Therefore, while you could be suffering from the tiny, raised, itchy lesions caused by these para-

sites, you should first see a dermatologist. If he agrees that fleas are the problem, you can then call an exterminator to kill the fleas in your living quarters and on your animals.

On the other hand, your "bites" could be due to an allergy to something in your

environment. The dermatologist can advise you.

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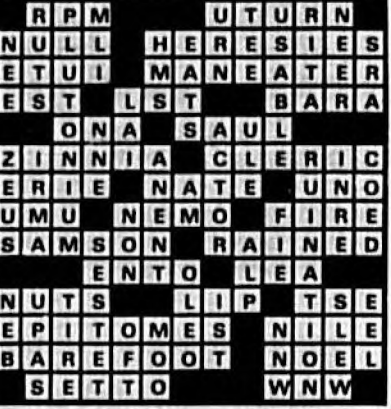

## WIN AT BRIDGE

**By James Jacoby**

Neither North nor South could bid no-trump with only three small hearts. So the bidding went round and round until North belatedly raised South to four spades. Since the East-West hearts were divided 4-3, three no-trump would have been an easy contract. But it was up to South to make four spades.

The defense began with West taking the A-K-Q of hearts and then switching to a diamond. Declarer won the ace in his hand, cashed the ace of spades, guarding against a singleton queen in West's hand, then got to dummy with a diamond to take the spade finesse. That

worked, but unfortunately West showed out. There was no longer any way to avoid losing a trick to the queen, so declarer was down one.

Declarer's safety play was ill-conceived. Sure, laying down the ace protected against the singleton queen being with West, but if West held a singleton spade, it was much more likely to be any one of the other four missing spades. Here the right play is to take a first-round finesse, hoping the East has the queen. When it works, the finesse can be repeated, and East can be denied a spade trick even when he holds four to the queen.

Sullivan: 'I'm a lot wiser'

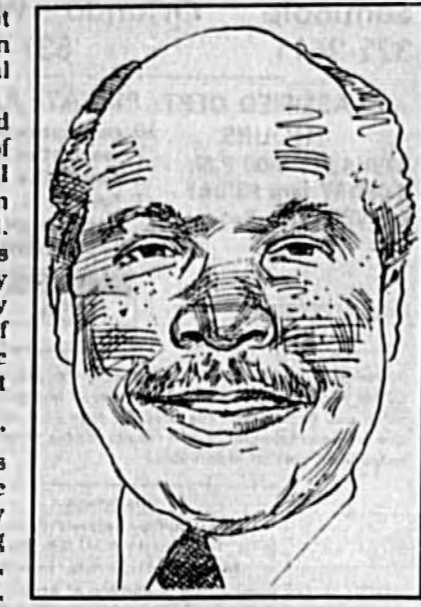

WASHINGTON - Health Secretary Louis Sullivan emerged from the controversy over his abortion views, which nearly derailed his confirmation, "a lot wiser" but with "too much to do ... to be bitter."

plaining that Sullivan had not taken a strong enough position against abortion and medical research using fetal tissues.

"I was very much surprised with the vehemence of some of the opposition and I thought I did not recognize the person they were attacking," he added. "In fact, there were some things that were said that were patently untrue. In that sense I was very disappointed by those kinds of tactics that were used by those people who preferred that I not be the secretary."

"I'm simply moving head," said Sullivan, who listed as his key priorities maintaining the solvency of the Social Security trust fund, implementing welfare reform legislation, promoting preventative health, improving minority health status and advancing biomedical research.



Louis Sullivan

earned his bachelor's degree from Morehouse and his doctorate from Boston University. He completed his internship and medical residency at New York Hospital, Cornell Medical Center, and is founding president of the Association of Minority Health Professionals.

As a black man, Sullivan confidently stressed that "what I think I bring to this position that's unique is a perspective about the significant part of our society that has suffered from a whole host of disadvantages from prejudice of race and also the prejudice against poor people."

"It's not my nature to be bitter," said Sullivan as he relaxed in his huge private office. "But I'm a lot wiser."

Sullivan, 55, became embroiled in controversy almost as soon as President Bush began to consider him for the Cabinet post. Opponents focused mainly on his abortion views and then on Sullivan's request to receive sabbatical pay from Morehouse College's School of Medicine in Atlanta, where he served as president.

After several delays, the Senate Finance Committee finally held the confirmation hearings, allowing Sullivan to state for the record his opposition to abortion except when the life of the mother is in jeopardy. The committee gave its approval.

The Senate approved Sullivan 98-1, with only conservative Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., com-

Poll: Americans oppose broad taxes, could favor some others

WASHINGTON - Most Americans oppose broad-based tax increases but could support new taxes aimed at the wealthy and on cigarettes and alcohol, along with major cuts in the Pentagon to reduce the deficit, according to a survey.

toward the economy, used one-hour, face-to-face interviews with 2,000 people to reach its conclusions. It was conducted in late January and early February.

The survey indicated that concern about international military conflicts is as low as it has been in 40 years and showed that 79 percent of the public believes tensions with the Soviet Union have been reduced.

At the same time, the study released Wednesday from the Gallup Organization and the Times-Mirror Co., showed people hold a number of cynical views. Although most believed their personal economic futures were bright, they expected the nation's economic problems to grow; while most opposed new taxes, 78 percent expected taxes to be raised this year.

Those feelings, combined with impressions of massive waste in government, may explain why the survey showed that most of the public wanted half of federal spending cuts to come from defense. On average, those surveyed favored a 9 percent reduction in Pentagon spending.

The poll also indicated that the drug problem has grabbed the attention of the public. Drug abuse led the list of the nation's most important problems, named by 22 percent of the respondents, compared to 19 percent who cited the deficit. Sixty-nine percent of those polled said they believed the United States was losing the war on drugs and 65 percent favored spending more money on the problem.

Concerning Americans' personal economic outlook, 54 percent said they expected to be better off next year, while 28 percent predicted no change. However, people appeared to be far more pessimistic about the nation's economy, with about two-thirds of those polled predicting increases in both inflation and interest rates.

Nearly six in 10 Americans believed the gap between the rich and poor was widening and most said they thought the massive 1986 tax changes made the federal tax code less fair. Majorities also said they thought the nation was losing ground in the fight against crime and poverty and at least half also suggested spending more on health care, homelessness, AIDS, programs for the elderly and schools.

Andrew Kahut, president of the Gallup Organization, said those numbers may have revealed a "don't worry, be happy" attitude that led most Americans to care less about national problems.
