Our Sewerage Problem

An important meeting will be held at the Court House next Wednesday night when Dr. Abel Wolran. professor of Sanitary engineering at Johns Hopkins University and one of the leading authorities in the country on the problem of sewage disposal, will make a report on a survey of Sanford's sewerage requirements.

The public has been invited to attend this meeting and certainly all those who are interested in public health matters as well as property owners, taxpayers and commercial enterprises should make it a point to be present or to send representatives.

Most of Sanford's sewers were laid during the boom of the 1920s when the material which went into them was not of the best, and they have long since been found to be deteriorating badly. Not much has been done to them since then except for one or two repair projects during the WPA days and a few minor repairs which have been made by the City from time to time.

Meanwhile, Sanford has made considerable growth New subdivisions have been opened up and hundreds of new houses built. Whole areas which ten years ago had no need for sewerage facilities are now using septic tanks which in some cases are not regarded as either safe or adequate. Much must be done in the next few years toward extending Sanford's sewerage system into these neighborhoods.
