



(Since news is the hot ticket in broadcasting now. larger stations usually consider their newly emphasized news dapertments as an additional major area of work; still other stations may consider station promotion, community affairs or another function as a separate area.) Production falls within programming; the head man or woman of a program or series is called a producer-director. In larger stations and net-

works, the job is usually split; the producer handles the business aspects and the director is more concerned with the creative performance. The producer-director plans and supervises the production

of programs and commercials, both in rehearsal and in the one-the-air presentation. Du ties include the selection of material and performers, gen eral planning of sets, lights and props, and the determination of the sequence and angles of camera shots. He di rects the performers, studio tecanicians and production workers and coordinates the various elements of the program, including film, scripts and music selection, and maintains budgetary controls. The general manager is the station's chief executive. He determines policies and directs




