COMMENTS From The SIDELINES

MUNICIPAL PARK TAX
The City Commission next Monday will consider passage of an ordinance to place a 10 cent tax on each white adult and a 5 cent tax on each colored adult admission ticket to future athletic events at the Municipal Park. The ordinance has already been given its first reading.

All proceeds of the tax will be put into a special fund to construct a new municipal stadium to replace the present ball park.

All other members of the Florida State League have decided to increase the price of admission to their parks for the coming season. Recently, Carl Hubbell, director of the New York Giants farm club, was contacted by Business Manager John Ganzel about the price to be charged at the local park this year. Hubbell said that he had planned no increase for Sanford for the 1949 season. Ganzel pointed out that Deland, Daytona Beach, St. Augustine, Palatka and Orlando have all boosted their prices to 70 cents, while Leesburg and Gainesville will have 75 cent tickets.

To make a long story short, Sanford was asked to increase prices for Florida State League games. Hubbell, knowing the desperate need here for a new grandstand, press box and player quarters, decided that, if the City would take the extra 10 cents and put the money derived therefrom into a special fund to construct the buildings, he would refrain from any further increase in the admission price.

Hubbell immediately contacted City Commissioner John Kridler and Mayor Andrew Carraway concerning the plan, and they agreed that this would be an ideal way for Sanford to start a fund to construct the buildings. The Giants are in effect making this 10 cent per ticket a gift to the people of Sanford. They could have taken the money themselves, but they want to help us build the needed facilities. Commissioner Kridler declared. In simple words, the price advance would have been increased even if the 10 cents tax were not invoked.

Kridler revealed yesterday these monthly reports on the number of tickets sold will be made by the City of Sanford. The tax on the admissions will be handed to the City. All of the money will be placed in a special fund to be used for the park. At the end of each month the Giants must report to the government on the number of tickets sold in order to pay the 20 per cent federal amusement tax. Monthly reports must be made to Florida State League office in Gainesville on the number of tickets sold at the local park. Sanford citizens have the right to investigate the records kept at the City Hall, and among these records will be accounts of these special funds.

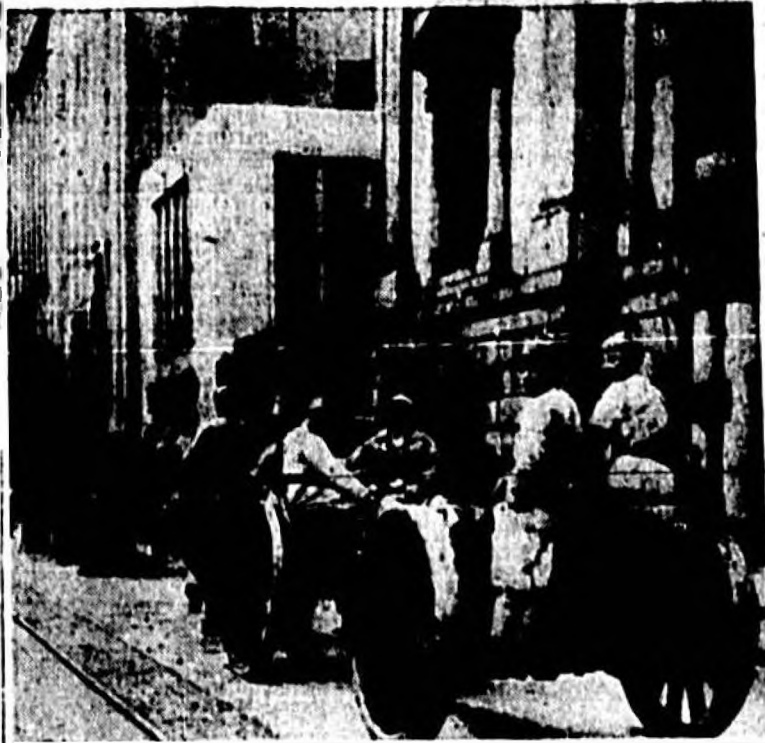

Lewis Orders Miners To End Strike Monday

UMW President Says Union Members Are To Be Praised For Insight On Issues

PITTSBURGH, Mar. 24.—(AP)—John L. Lewis today ordered his 463,000 idle coal miners to return to work Monday.

An executive order to district officers said:

"The present memorial period will terminate Monday, Mar. 28. Production may then be resumed in all mines and all members should make themselves available for work on that date."

The order was directed to miners east of the Mississippi, who have been idle since Mar. 14 in a work stoppage Lewis said was meant as a memorial to dead and injured workers. Lewis said it also would protest appointment of Dr. James Boyd as head of the U. S. Bureau of Mines.

The mine closings, have cost the diggers some \$30,000,000 in wages. During the mine shutdown, coal-carrying railroads laid off more than 70,000 employees.

Lewis declared the UMW membership should be congratulated "for their understanding of the important issues involved in the present policy," and added:

"The volume of abuse and denunciation of the miners and their officers, released by the coal operators, financial interests and hostile political elements, has rarely been exceeded in magnitude or malignancy. This has been short of its mark, as will future efforts (Continued on Page Eight)

HALTS RATIONING

STOCKHOLM, Mar. 24.—(AP)—Sweden abolished rationing of butter and other fats today, after more than eight years. Meat in restaurants also goes off the ration list, but remains on coupons in the stores.

The government ordered a slight increase in the butter price and a decrease in the price of margarine, to keep down the demand for butter.

BLIMP OPERATION

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 24.—(AP)—Blimps have successfully operated over carriers to naval maneuvers.

Capt. G. W. Mills, chief of naval airship training and experimentation at Lakehurst, N. J., told a naval reserve group last night that K-type blimps, 250 feet long, were operated from carriers with "great success" in recent maneuvers off the West Indies. He said they were very effective in convoy duty and anti-submarine patrol.

Sen. Connally Opens Battle To Help ECA

Texas Says Economic Aid Comes Ahead Of Armament Program For Europe

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—(AP)—Europe's economic recovery has the right-of-way over any military program to support the proposed North Atlantic Security Pact, Sen. North Connally (D-Tex.) said today.

"I should like to make it clear," Connally told the Senate, "the basic policy of the United States government is to accord economic recovery a clear priority."

The veteran chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee opened debate on the \$5,580,000,000 program to aid Western Europe in the next 15 months. Some Senators have suggested chopping from \$1,000,000,000 to \$2,280,000,000 from the total.

But Connally urged his colleagues to approve the authorization bill in full. It puts a limit on the amount to be spent by the Economic Cooperation Administration, but it does not provide for appropriation.

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Newman Seeks School Of Wildlife Officers

TALLAHASSEE, Mar. 24.—(AP)—Coleman Newman, Florida's new game and fish director, today proposed establishment of a training school for wildlife officers.

He said he will suggest to the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission tomorrow that efforts be made to obtain a deactivated Army camp somewhere in Central Florida for use as a school.

Waitress Awarded Large Damage Suit

MIAMI, Mar. 24.—(AP)—A federal jury yesterday awarded \$15,000 to a waitress for injuries sustained in an automobile accident in Hollywood Feb. 11, 1946.

The judgment was against Roy Grierson of Fort Lauderdale, with whom Mrs. Guert was riding at the time of the accident. She had sued for \$35,000, claiming Grierson was intoxicated and drove recklessly.

PRISONERS TAKEN

ATHENS, Mar. 24.—(AP)—The Greeks today announced more than 100 guerrillas were killed or taken prisoner in a two-day battle in Epirus.

An official statement said 10 were killed and 33 were taken prisoner in central Greece.

Senate Amendments On Rent Controls Refused By House; Compromise Sought

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—(AP)—The Administration's labor bill was cleared for action today in the House as well as the Senate.

The House Labor Committee recommended passage of the labor bill, H. R. 10 Chairman Levenski (D-Mich.) indicated he would press for its consideration by the House ahead of minimum wage legislation.

The bill would repeal the Taft-Hartley Law and reenact the old Wagner Act, with some modifications approved by the administration.

The Senate labor committee already has cleared a similar bill.

The House refused to accept Senate amendments to its bill containing rent controls. The decision will send the measure to a Senate-House conference committee to work out a compromise.

Rent controls will expire a week from today, unless a compromise can be reached and the bill put on Truman's desk at that time.

Neither Senate nor House bill makes rent controls a permanent law. The Senate bill continues them as long as President Truman asked.

But Democratic leaders on Capitol Hill described as a "pretty good job" the amended bill approved by the Senate last night.

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Mississippi Rips Forrester Asks More Power For Part Of Louisiana

BATON ROUGE, La., Mar. 24.—(AP)—The Mississippi River broke through a levee today and sent resident farmers from their homes.

The break occurred about 4:10 A. M. (CST), about three miles north of Port Allen, across the river from Baton Rouge.

Within three hours the water had moved three miles in from the river. Highway 190 was covered to a depth of three feet.

Sherrill's deputies and volunteers patrolled the roads, knocking on doors and urging residents to leave their homes. The Red Cross set up a reception center in Port Allen to care for refugees.

The break occurred at a large bend beside the Wilkinson sugar plantation. The river washed directly against the levee at that point.

The break came as a complete surprise as the river stage had not been considered dangerous. Deputy Sheriff H. J. O'Neal, Jr., said the water was "just high enough to come through the break."

Yesterday's river stage at Baton Rouge was 34 feet, a foot below flood stage. The river had fallen half a foot in the previous 24 hours. It has been falling for several days, following a crest reached as the result of the Ohio River flood coming down the Mississippi (Continued on Page Four)

Forrester Asks More Power For Head Of Defense

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—(AP)—Secretary of Defense Forrester, urging tighter unification of the Armed Services, said today that Congress should give his successor more authority.

Forrester appeared before the Senate Armed Services Committee in support of an Administration bill to overhaul 1947 legislation which grouped the Army, Navy and Air Force under the Department of Defense.

He will be replaced in his Cabinet post next week by Louis A. Johnson, whose nomination was confirmed yesterday by the Senate.

Forrester said "a beginning" has been made on unifying the Armed Forces but that "certain weaknesses and inconsistencies" in the act have prevented full realization of the goal.

Vote Kills Legislation For This Congress, Rankin Says; Two Ballots Taken

WASHINGTON, Mar. 24.—(AP)—By a one vote margin, the House today shelved the Rankin veterans pension bill.

A roll call vote of 208 to 207 sent the measure back to the Veterans' Committee for further study.

It is possible for the Veterans' Committee to write a new bill and send it back to the House at a later date.

But Chairman Rankin (D-Miss.) told the House the vote to recommend that the bill be dead.

"That kills this legislation for this Congress," Rankin said.

Rankin's bill already had been so amended that it bore little resemblance to the original proposal for a new World War One and World War Two veterans.

The vote to throw it back to committee followed a series of amendments on the floor.

Rep. Taylor (D-Tex.) made the motion to send it back.

The roll call vote was first announced as 209 to 208 against the motion. Then on a recount, it developed that the tally had erred on the first count. There were no vote corrections on the recapitulation.

Rep. McManuck (D-Miss.), presiding in the absence from the city of Speaker Rayburn, ordered the recount on his own initiative.

The House sat in tense silence as the names of each member and the way they voted were called out by clerks. It was so quiet the automatic counter used by the (Continued on Page Four)

Two ACL Trains Crash At Jessup, Killing One Man

JESSUP, Ga., Mar. 24.—(AP)—A passenger train and a freight train collided head-on today, killing one crewman. Several others were hurt, one so badly that he may die.

Three coaches of the Atlantic Coast Line passenger train were derailed, but passengers received only minor injuries. The train was enroute from Montgomery, Ala., to Savannah, Ga.

The freight crashed in a heavy fog about 7:30 A. M. two miles west of Jessup in Southeast Georgia. The passenger train engineer was killed, the fireman seriously injured and the conductor was slightly injured. Passengers were brought to the Jessup hospital for examination.

The engines killed was James Paul Parrish, 51, of Savannah. He was hit under coal by the collision's impact.

There was no information about the cause of the wreck. Sheriff George O'Quinn said a fireman badly scalded, was believed to be the only one seriously injured.

Policeman Tom Mathis said the mud and baggage coaches overturned and that possibly several other cars may have been derailed.

St. Johns River Channel Surveyed By U. S. Engineers

The channel in the St. Johns River from Woodruff Creek to Lake Hovine is being surveyed with a 100-foot meter, an echo sounding device which is towed between two skiffs which records the depth of the water. H. E. Williams, chief of a survey party of U. S. engineers, is conducting the soundings. It was revealed today by Edward Higgins, manager of the Seminole County chamber of Commerce.

This work was initiated, he said, by Roy E. Wetmore of the U. S. Engineers' office, Jacksonville, and is intended to determine the amount of dredging necessary to bring the channel to a project depth of 5 feet. Six feet would be a better project, now under way. The location of 60 beacons in the channel from Astar through Woodruff Cut. This work, Mr. Higgins explained, was contracted by the Coast Guard Division of Aid to Navigation, and calls for completion in 15 days. The beacons, with the exception of those to be placed in Woodruff Cut, will be removed when the channel was deepened.

Commie Trial Hears Objectives Of Reds

NEW YORK, Mar. 24.—(AP)—The final objective of the American Communist Party is to establish a Soviet Socialist republic in the United States, said a party manual introduced by the government today in the Communist conspiracy trial.

The manual, read to the jury by U. S. Attorney John F. X. McGohey, said such a republic was to be established through revolution in which party members "must be ready to sacrifice their lives."

The "Manual of Organization of the Communist Party" was admitted to evidence after vociferous defense objections.

McGohey read one passage from the manual which said "our task is to make every party member a professional revolutionist."

R. D. Hawkins Dies In Charleston, S. C.

Word was received this morning by Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Hawkins of the death of R. D. Hawkins, formerly of Sanford, which occurred at his home in Charleston, S. C., early this morning. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Mr. Hawkins was captain of the police department for the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, Jacksonville District, for many years. He lived with his family on East Twenty-first Street before being transferred to Jacksonville where they lived for several years. At the time of his death he was Train Master at Charleston, S. C., where he was recently transferred from Waycross, Ga.

Besides his widow he leaves a son and daughter. The body will be sent to Jacksonville where funeral services and burial will take place.

OKAYS A-MACHINE

LIVERPOOL, Mar. 24.—(AP)—The Vatican has authorized Liverpool University to build an atom-busting machine on the grounds of a new Roman Catholic cathedral under construction here.

Officials of the university's nuclear physics laboratory found the only suitable site for their synchro-cyclotron was a corner of the cathedral site. Roman Catholic canon law says Vatican authority cannot be given before a building other than a church can be erected on land acquired as church property.
