

Grid Rule Committee Will Probably Decree Fumbled Pigskin To Be Dead Ball

Football Group Will Meet Over Week-End And Will Discuss Changes Which Are Slated To Be Very Few

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—The 29 yard run in the wrong direction with a fumbled ball probably is to die with Roy Riegels: the old cry of the ray nineties, "fall on that ball," probably will resound through the land again; Sam White may well flatter himself that he wasn't born 20 years too late. It is my information today that the football rules committee, scheduled to hold the annual autopsy over the coming week-end, is likely to declare all fumbles, recovered by the defending team, "dead" at the point of recovery.

This, in any case, is said to be about the only step contemplated by the rule surgeons at this immature moment, three days before the family is ready to call in the specialists to survey the patient on his bed of agony. It is declared that major operations and amputations will be strictly taboo in all probability.

The "dead" fumble by the way, is not regarded as a radical gesture, since it already is in the code as affecting fumbled punts and lateral passes. That being the case, it is felt, particularly by the coaches, that a fumble is only a fumble no matter how you arrange to make it and that one should have uniformity, even in error. It is the insistence of the coaches on this point, as a matter of fact, that seems making this particular item of business look the part of a probability.

The coaches committee, which has gone on record in favor of this change, will be sitting in on the meeting in an advisory capacity when the rules committee goes into session at the Sea View Country Club, Absecon, N. J., on Friday night. The meeting will carry through Saturday and Sunday, ending the lunch system throughout. Details of the committee's findings, in other words, will not be available until Monday.

This procedure was introduced for the first time last year and was found to be highly satisfactory to all concerned, which means the committee. It came up with an innovation this year when it held "secret practice" in a New York hotel two months ago for the purpose of deciding what it would do when it did it.

At that time, sentiment for the return of the posts to the goal line had been rather insistent in some quarters but the belief is general now that the posts are where they belong and, if ever they are moved again, it will have to be done by Mrs. Maybourne's daughter, Kathleen, who when interviewed said: "It may be for years and it may be forever."

SUCCESS OF BIG BATTLE ASSURED, DECLARES CAREY

Ticket Orders Come In Fast To Guarantee Against Losses

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 12.—Bill Carey, vice president of the Madison Square Garden Corporation, declared today that the gamble, has ended in nothing over Tex Rickard's last big boxing enterprise, the Sharky Stalling light here on the 27th.

"The gamble is over boys," he said. "We're out of the red now although we haven't made a close check-up. We can gauge the demand pretty well by the way the orders are coming in. It looks now as if we may sell the ring sides back to the limit of 30 rows."

"I can't tell you what the profit might be, but I know there will be no loss. When I left New York to come down here, I would have presented anybody with a check for \$25,000 who could guarantee me we would break even on this proposition."

Carey estimates the gate would exceed \$350,000. He says it may go as high as \$500,000. Yesterday's receipts were more than \$11,000. As it now stands the arena can seat 33,000 persons. There is lumber on the ground for 2,000 more seats. In addition to that Carey has placed an order for enough dressed long leaf pine to build 10,000 additional seats.

HELEN WILLS HAS GAINED FAME BY SKILL AT TENNIS

Court Star Possessed Qualities Which Aided Her Popularity

BERKELEY, Cal., Feb. 12.—(INS)—When tenacity is coupled with feminine charm, and beauty with ability, physical and mental,

it is quite natural that a goodly number of lesser Ludwigs have found it agreeable to extoll the possessor of those qualities.

Consequently, Helen of Berkeley, in the past eight years, has received more publicity than did Helen of Troy in a number of centuries. The latter, however, did not serve as a prototype for the former and should be understood that their respective biographers were inspired by altogether different motives and did not attempt to draw any parallels.

In fact, it was youth, dashing beauty, an unperturbed demeanor and extraordinary skill with a tennis racket which first started the flow of printer's ink for Helen Wills.

First Championship

It was a thin, black stream back in 1921 when she won her first championship of importance, but since then the stream has widened with each victory, interspersed with occasional defeat, until today her publicity has reached a flood tide in which many of the ladies of Hollywood would willingly im-

Helen's first publicity was modest enough and did not forecast the banner lines which were to follow. It read something like this in the weekly paper published at Centerville, Cal.

Dr. and Mrs. G. S. Wills today were receiving the congratulations of friends following the birth of their daughter. The new arrival weighed a few pounds. Mother and daughter are doing fine.

This event occurred on Oct. 6, 1906. At that time Dr. Wills was practicing medicine in the small town of Centerville and the advent of Helen was a pleasing topic for the women of the community. It was a few days and then they allowed her to go about the business of growing up.

Helen, like the other youngsters of Centerville, had free access to the current sunshine and climate, of which there was a great plenty, she developed into a sturdy lass. Even at this early date she had a certain reserve which later was to be responsible for her being dubbed "Little Pok'r Face."

Learning To Play

When Helen was six years old, Dr. Wills was in charge of the county hospital at San Leandro, and it was here that Helen was to play her first tennis about two years later.

She first amused herself by batting around balls with a racket which was almost as big as herself but finally her competitive instinct came into being and she demanded opponents, not drawing the line at age, weight or prev-



one condition of servitude, if any. Helen, according to her father, would play with anyone, the kids of the community, the nurses, in fact, and the doctors, including her own.

"When not in school, Helen was always taking around the tennis courts," said Dr. Wills, "and we would have to shut her off sometimes in order that the older folks might play."

The relationship between Dr. Wills and his famous daughter has always been a close one. In those days he used to take her on hunting trips with him, and Helen became quite adept in handling a gun. She was an excellent shot for a youngster and her father recently asserted that she could easily have become an expert with firearms. 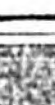
