Turlington said Thursday he personally investigated testimony by Clyde E. Hart in which the Sumatra ranch-lobbyist said he bribed present House Speaker E. C. Rowell, Sen. Mack Cleveland and Rep. Gordon Frederick to influence race track legislation.

Turlington said Hart told him he did not give the racing company stock directly to Rowell, but sent it through Fred Nelson in the name of Nelson's brother.

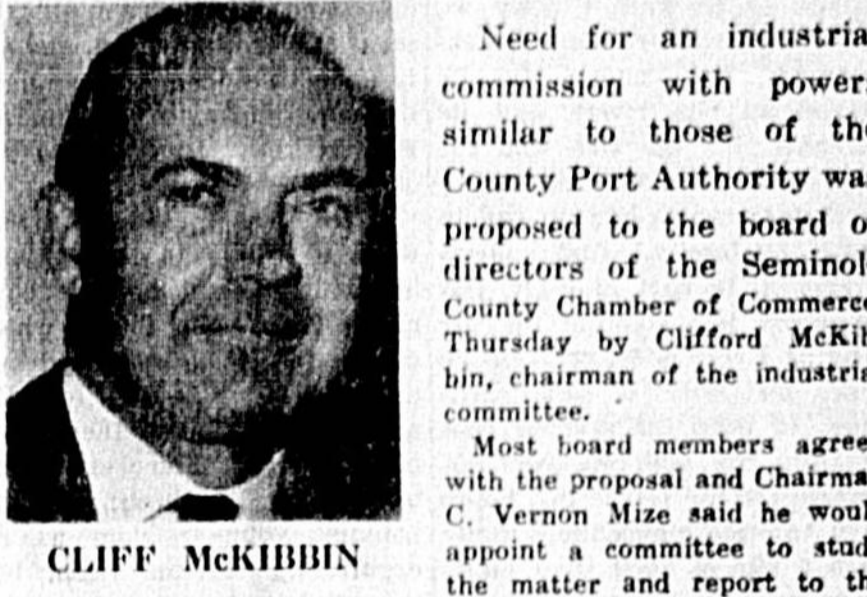

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Maverick Ousts Democratic Appeals Judge

OCOE (AP) — A political maverick who ran third in a field of three for the state legislature in 1965 scored a stunning upset in Tuesday's election when he was named judge of the Fourth District Court of Appeals, the second highest court in the state.

Spencer Cross, a 44-year-old bachelor city attorney in this tiny West Orange County community, rode a Republican wave of votes to oust incumbent Judge Sherman Smith of Vero Beach.

When the votes were counted, Cross' public income jumped from \$200 a month in Ocoee to \$20,000 a year as Appeals Court Judge.

Running in the new 10-county district, created by the 1965 legislature, Cross defeated Smith 154,026 to 129,375.

The Appeals Court District covers Brevard, Indian River, Ocala, Okeechobee, Palm Beach, Martin, St. Lucie, Seminole, Broward and Orange Counties.

Smith, a Democrat, had been considered a shoo-in for election and was supported by the Bar Association in each of the district's counties.

Cross was named city attorney of Ocoee in 1963 following his graduation from the University of Miami Law School.

A native of Butler, Ga., he moved to Ocoee in 1963 and attended Rollins College prior to earning his law degree.

He was registered as a Democrat until 1955, then switched to the Republican ranks in the 1967 election.

He tried to qualify as a GOP candidate for the state legislature in 1958 but was turned down when he could not qualify under a party oath that required candidates to swear they had been a member of the party for at least two years.

In May 1962, he ran for State Senate in the GOP primary and lost to Orlando attorney Claude Edwards.

In February 1963, he entered a special election for a State House seat in Orange County and ran last in a three-man field.

Cross' campaign in the Appeals Court race was limited to a few personal appearances. His campaign managers were the appearance of about 25 billboards in the district which simply gave his name, picture and the office he sought.

3 Rapists Get Electric Chair

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — A teenage girl who requested the death penalty for three accused rapists got her wish.

An all-male jury Wednesday night decreed the full penalty — death in the electric chair — for three youths charged with rape. The decision took four hours.

In earlier testimony, the Miami Beach girl told jurors: "They should be fully punished for what they did. I want them to die."

Sentenced to death were John F. Smalley, 18, Sanibel Choice, 26, and Robert Gissendanner, 18, all of suburban West Hollywood.

The sentence was automatic as the jury did not recommend mercy.

The pretty, 18-year-old victim said the youths forced her into a car while she was walking down a street the night of Jan. 13. While she screamed and fought, she said, they drove her to an empty house and assaulted her.

CAIRO (AP) — The American message on Viet Nam is being ignored or is not getting across in Cairo, one of the major capitals with ties to both East and West.

Talking about the lapse of the last U.S. food-for-peace grant in June — an agreement which has not been renewed — Egyptian requests for a new long-term deal — a qualified Egyptian source said: "How can the United States expect political stability with bread? When the United States involves political pressure with wheat, I have to think: 'This is my bread you're talking about.'"

Actually, the United States has not closed the door on wheat allocations. But new legislation in Washington basically has changed the old food-for-peace program under which wheat was supplied for 10 years through soft-currency agreements.

Future food grants are almost certain to be on a hard-currency basis but with provisions for long-term repayment.

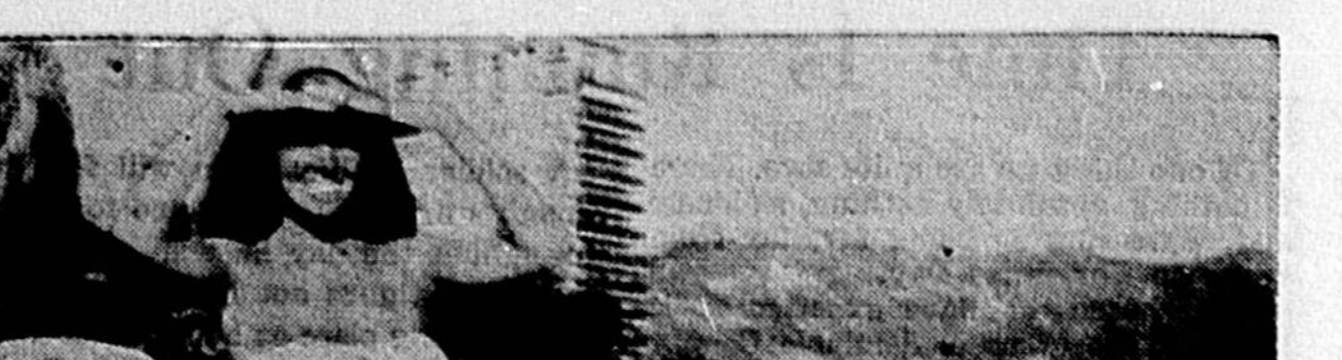
