Man dies at Geneva home construction site

An Altsmonte Springs man is dead after he reportedly fell from scaf-folding at a Geneva home. The Seminole County

Sheriff's Office is investigating the Thursday afternoon death of 48-year-old Richard Washington. According to authorities, witnesses stated Washington struck his head on some cement below when he fell an estimated six feet off scaf-folding at 650 Valley Steam Drive. It is believed that

Washington may have had a previous medical condition that could have been a factor in his sud-

After his fall, two employees of Willison Yates Stucco Man, located in Altamonte Springs, reportedly carried Washington to his vehicle, called 911 and transported him to entrance of Seminole Woods to meet with county rescue personnel. He was then transported to Central Florida Regional Hospital where he was pronounced dead.

The sheriff's office investigation continues as authorities await the results of an autopsy report. An Occupational Safety and Health Administration investigator was also scheduled to investigate the scene Priday.

City leaders seek removal of attorney

LONGWOOD — A legal opinion on election signs could cost the Longwood city attorney his job.

Last month, Richard Taylor filed a memoran-fum regarding the political signs of District 5 candidate Brian Sackett. Sackett, a Seminole County Public Schools educator, was the lone candidate to qualify for the seat left Commissioner Paul vacant by Lovestrand.

that Sackett remove his signs since he was the commissioner-elect with no opposition, and therefore was no longer a candidate.

Taylor regarded the two main issues in the matter as 'when is a candidate no longer a viable candidate' and 'when is an unopposed candidate

Several commissioners had asked elected to office.' He cited several opinions from the state attorney general, division of elections office and

the city's sign regulations.

Commissioner Steve Miller, who is being opposed by Mike Holt and George McKenzie for the District 3 seat, is contending Taylor erred in this matter and is calling for his resigna-

tion at the Oct. 6 meeting of the Longwood commissioners. Local municipalities are allowed to govern their own elections if, as in the case of Longwood, elections are addressed in the charter.

Our city code specifically states that a person that runs unopposed is deemed to be elected at the end of the qualifying period because he is deemed to at least voting for himself," Miller said. "Therefore, he is in fact

A Mailland man accused of committing two murders Wednesday at an Altamonte Springs hotel was "calmly" awaiting police investigators with blood splattered on his white T-snirt less than two miles away at a

Dunkin Donuts store.

After calling 911 from his cell phone, Michael James Mather, formerly of Sanford, was taken into custody for killing two hotel guests with an 11-inch Bowie knife.

According to Eric Weils, public Information officer for the Altamonte Springs Police Department, when officers responded to the 3:25 p.m. disturbancs call at Homestead Village Guest Studios Hotel at 302 Northlake Bivd, they found a grussome scene. A blood-Northlake Bivd, they found a gruesome scene. A blood-ied Johnnie Frank Realford lay in the hotel's lobby as his hotel roommate Juanece Hopwood was in the sec-ond-floor room clinging to

Sanford marina is designated 'clean'

Hidden Harbour Marina in the Port of Sanford is the newest and only freshwater marina in Central Florida to become part of the state's Clean Marina and Clean Boatyard programs.


There are almost 2,000 marinas in the state and 69 are considered environmentally clean marinas, while only 10 are designated clean boatyards.

"You're really part of an elite group," said Vivian Garfein, central district director for Florida Department of

Environmental Protection (DEP), at a presentation for the marina at Otter's Restaurant Riverside

Wednesday. The Clean Marina Program teaches environmentally sound, best management practices to owners and staff. The program focuses on 10 critical areas of operation and in doing so helps owners comply with about 125 regu-lations. The program is part of the Clean Boating Partnership Program that includes DEP division of law enforcement, Marine

hospital without resistance and "discharged" her. It was hardly a commando rescue. They even video-taped it for immediate release to the press, since when do we carry a cameraman on a raid?

"We had a nice, long meeting." Millie said. "(Grieshaber) said he talked with the lat Street merchants and they were ready to kill him because we had left."


Grieshaber may be the one with the law degree, but Millie is no slouch when it comes to legal matters.

for Petey. After returning to the hotel, the two departed before lunch with the understanding that Mather would return at 1 p.m. with the money. At about 2 p.m. Realford began calling

Mather's cell phone.

A half-hour later, Mather returned to the hatel without the money, but he did slip the knife into his shorts'

pocket with his T-shirt concealing the handle. When Mather entered Realford's room, the victim reportedly patted him down and found the knife.

Mather stated to investigators that Realford said, "Now I got to get my gun." When he turned around, reportedly Hopwood blocked the doorway so "he stabbed and slashed her, but couldn't remember how many times." He then attacked Realford and then exited holding the knife.

Mather said he discarded

the murder weapon, and police have been unable to ocate it. Mather is being held in the Seminole County Jail on two counts of first degree murder.

My job is to ensure Iraqi law is followed according to the manual and to monitor and evaluate the Iraqi police. I went to the Al Jazaer police station to check on nine prisoners that I had in the jall cell there. I had five in there for assault, one for murder, one for suspected theft, one for assault with a deadly weapon, and a little-bitty short guy for burglary. The jail cell is an open room with one barred door with a big padlock on it. There are no single cells and once a day a guy comes in with buckets of food to feed the prisoners.

I had my interpreter call for one of my prisoners that had shot at the Iraq police, who returned the favor by shooting him in the leg. So I called for the one with the shot leg, but two guys hob-bled to the cell door both with shot legs, one of whom was unknown to me. I pointed at the mystery

prisoner and said "Who the hell is this guy?" I then yelled for the cell keeper who came and explained that the unknown guy was a murder suspect and was put in there because the jail at the substation was boing repaired. I

said that's fine but anytime you put someone in this jail 1 need paperwork, or else in a court hearing it could be considered wrongful Imprisonment which could result in a murderer walking free on a legal technicality. I chewed their tails about that, I don't like to chew them out, but

they have to learn. Anyway, I had to call the other station and get some paperwork on that detainee. My duty involves all aspects of running a police force, set-ting up files, chain of evidence, station security, prisoner accountability, and so on, but in addition I'm having to train, through an interpreter, the Iraqi police these same procedures and that isn't casy.

I see things like unauthorized people wandering the halls, you can't do that in a police station. I only give the all keys to the cell keepers and I have to know every time they open the cell, whether it's to feed the detainees or put somebody in. In the past ten years, I've worked with ATF, been a special agent, secret service, worked homicide, computer crime, FBL worked with a '/

dozen or so police depart-ments around the world, you name it, but this is the most difficult yet. Heck, if I can successfully do police work in Iraq I can do it anywhere.

At times I feel like Judge Roy Bean because in some situations I'm stuck with deciding on cases arrested by the IPF. One guy that the IPF was holding was an Iranian that was suspected of stealing money, but without sufficient cause to hold him. So I facilitated his release. He kissed my hand and promised me a Persian rug. It turns out he owns a Persian rug company in Iran. So I gave him my address and he is going to send me a medium size Persian Rug. I'll see it when I get it.

6 Sept. 2003 I'm doing my best to get these IPF up and going Just call me "Judge Roy Bean," the "Law East of the Tigris." Right now there is a dog laying at my feet and a 1969 Iraqi Law Code Book on my desk.

We've put numerous sta-tions back together and got them up and running with a police force. In each case we

with a bunch of empty rooms and have gone through all stages up to where we are now, which is about the level of how I remember police stations down in Panama.

I have two interpreters, "Fez" and "Cheech" so named by me since they look like those characters from TV

and the movies. Today I put a guy in jail for stabbing his father. I found out that out of five detainees that were transferred in here, that the fifth one was slipped-in by an IPF officer who just wanted to put him in jail for punishment. The guy's mother and brother came in and complained. I looked into the matter and ordered the guy released. His mother and brother were very thankful and kept shaking my hand

over and over. I held a conference with the senior IPF officials here to discuss some disciplinary issues in regards to some "bad seeds" within the police force. You get a few of those in police departments everywhere. Luckily the chief was really serious about these matters. We want to get a good clean operation going and cannot afford such problems.

I had an LTC [lieutenant colonell of the Iraqi police request a letter from me allowing his sick mother and two others to accompany her, to cross the traqi border into Jordan so she could get medication. I had my interpreter to translate everything so it was in both English and Arabic. I then signed each letter, my signature is so bad that it looked just like the

writing on the Arabic letter. Our job at this station will be finished today and we'll turn it over to another platoon and move on to the next mission.





Saving the president from himself

"A preventive war, to my mind, is an impossi-bility," said the presi-dent of the United States. "I don't believe there is such a thing, and frankly I wouldn't even listen to anyone seriously that came in and talked about such a thing."

That was President Eisenhower, answering a press conference ques

tion in 1954. Times change. We don't really have many press conferences anymore. We have just fought — or are still fighting — a pre-ventive war. And we do now have a definition for such a thing in the Department of Defense Dictionary of Military Terms: "A war initiated in the belief that military conflict, while not imminent, is inevitable and that to delay would involve greater risk." The White House does not

like the term "preventive war," at least as it pertains to Iraq. President Bush and his team prefer "pre-emptive war." But that is a different thing, according to the DOD dictionary: "An attack initiated on the basis of incontrovertible evidence that an enemy attack is imminent."

What we did in Iraq, where the threat to us was neither inevitable nor imminent, is only the fourth war in two centuries that might be considered "pre-ventive." That, at least, is the judgment of the Correlates of War Project at the University of Michigan, which since 1963 has been studying the conditions that lead to war and lesser military crises. The project identifies 85 wars and 2,000 military crises around the world going back to the beginning of the 19th century. Only three other wars had "some" preventive motivation.

Those three, identified in a book still unpublished. The Behavioral Origins of War" by Dr. Scott Bennett of Pennsylvania State University and Allan Stam of Dartmouth College, are Germany's attack on Russia in 1914, the Japanese attack on the United States in 1941, and the Israeli attack on Egypt in 1956.

So we are breaking new ground historically. It is poisoned ground, a pitfall that



They told you Iraq would Iraq — and over the coming cost another \$87 billion, but years the Iraqi occupation like so much of the information that the Bush administration passes on to the American public, it's not quite true. The White House actually needs something on the order of \$140 billion


Still, no matter the cost of stabilizing and rebuilding

They'll have no trouble getting their calls to the White House and the Pentagon returned.

they can't get their federal government to spend that \$87 billion at home. While the president is seeking \$5.7 bilion for Iraq's electric grid, for example, America's aging grid is barely holding together.

The president wants \$856 million to upgrade three Iraql airports, a seaport and rail lines, while Amtrak is starved for funds and our ports remain vulnerable to attack. The White House has a miserly proposal for road-building at home but wants to spend millions building roads and bridges in Iraq and Afghanistan. This is not the sort of news Congress wants to take out on the campaign trail.

President Bush, who, despite his Harvard MBA. seems to have trouble with basic numbers-crunching,

continues to insist that he can make the tax cuts permanent and still pay the billions needed in Iraq. That's not arithmetic, that's alchemy. He continues to distort and dissemble. That's how we ended up in Iraq in the first place.

Now, we need to hear the cold, hard truth: No matter whether you opposed the war or supported it, all Americans need to get prepared to support reconstruction, no matter how costly it ends up being. Leaving Iraq as it is - frac-tured and lawless - will be far more costly.

"(We realized) that there's a bigger issue out there than just pump sewage, said Jan DeLaney, program manager of the Clean Marina Program. "We realized we needed to bring DEP in together to

make a change."

Del aney and Garlein say Don Borum, general manager of Hidden Harbour Marina, has always had a mindset of keeping the Sanford marina environmen-

tally sound. Two major improvements to the marina the past several years include a \$40,000 upgrade of the sewage pumping system and a \$4,500 addition of a closed, recycled system for the boat

washing area. "We've always been environmentally sensitive here," Borum said, "and this is just following with our business

The Hidden Harbour sewage pumping system is unique as it is only found in Central Florida. A sewage pump is provided to every two slips, which encourages boaters to use the system rather than illegally dump. Typically, most sewage pumps are found only at the

"That's something the marina doesn't get money from," said George Wakefield, harbormaster at the Halifax Harbor Marina at Daytona Beach, about the Hidden Harbour sewage system. "That's really a capital investment without any returns other than making sure the water

been a charter member of the DEP Clean Boating Partnership board. Although the Daytona Beach marina was designated a Clean Marina before Sanford's, Wakefield said it's because he doesn't perate a boatyard, which makes it a

"You just have to step up to the plate and get it all done," Borum said about the desire to become designated a Clean Marina and Boatyard which took him about four years to complete.

According to Delaney, the Clean Marina and Boatyard flags that now fly over the Hidden Harbour Marina are quickly becoming recognized as a symbol of excellence as they attract quality boaters. The marina is about 95 percent full, Borum said, with a total of 235 wet

slips and 250 dry slips.

"It's a progressive step and they're not going to stop here," said Dennis Dolgner, administrator of the Seminole County Port Authority. "But, they're going to be continually successful because of this. clean."







Petition drive aims to give public land use power

Recently, an item has crossed my desk on several different occasions, sent by several different parties. I have studied it out carefully and found no reason not to pass it on to readers, with the caveat that I do not necessarily endorse this particular item, but neither do I think it should be discounted or ignored. Rather, I include it this week that those interested may pursue the course it sets forth.

The item I am referring to is the Florida Hometown Democracy Amendment - the core document in a movement to put back into the hands of Florida voters the right to decide for themselves the land use changes that affect their communities.

Citing over-development and bad development as an issue that is ruining Florida communities, and the powerless position citizens often feel they are in with these development decisions, the Hometown Democracy movement hopes to do for Florida's growth what they say present comprehensive plan-ning and land development regulations

have failed to do — put the people in charge of the places where they live. Stated on the Web site www.florida-hometowndemocracy.com: "Florida's Constitution allows citizens to amend the Florida Constitution. Florida's Hometown Democracy Political Action Committee has drafted a petition to change the Florida Constitution to

land use plans and proposed amendments.

"Floridians for Hometown Democracy knows that people care about the place where they live and trust the people to make decisions that

community's future. Florida's Hometown Democracy Amendment seeks to take this faith in the people and make the current land use system more democratic by giving the power over certain land use changes (comprehensive plan amendments) to the voters. Because land use decisions are just about the most important decisions that local governments make, the voters should have the final word about decisions that can make or break their community's future."

In answer to the question 'Why Is Florida's Hometown Democracy Amendment important and how does it work?' the site offers these three points:

1. Each town, city and county has a comprehensive plan that is designed to make sure uncontrolled, bad development does not ruin Floridia's quality of life and the environment. Comprehensive plans are also designed give citizens the right to approve or to make sure that adequate roads,

reject comprehensive schools and other basic social services are not strangled and overwhelmed. Comprehensive plans can't work if they can be easily changed. That's what has happened in Florida. Comprehensive plans are being changed ... by vote of city or county commissions to accommodate development that shouldn't happen.

2. Florida's Hometown Democracy Amendment replaces county or city commission votes to adopt or change a comprehensive plan with votes by the citizens in a referendum election to be held at the same tinte as the general election. No special elections will be necessary. Florida's Hometown Democracy Amendment gives greater stability and certainty to comprehensive plans by locking in existing land use categories and giving the keys to the voters. The voters will decide if a proposed change will make their community a better place to live. If the majority votes yes, the change happens. If the majority votes no, the change

doesn't happen.
3. The United States Supreme Court and the Florida Supreme Court have both ruled that referenda are a perfectly acceptable way to make land use

munity is facing a continuous onslaught of many comprehensive plan changes?,'
'What is Florida's Hometown Democracy Referendum going to cost

us as taxpayers?,' and many more.

Obviously, there is more to this issue than can be covered in this column. Bottom line for this non-partisan grass-roots movement is that they need to gather about 500,000 petitions igned by registered Florida voters to get this amendment on the November 2004 ballot. Volunteers are needed in every county of the state. The eastern portion of Seminole County faces many such changes in the not-so-distant future. Residents here need to be a part of the process in one way or another. I offer this as one possible way. Key for Mississippi: Try to find a way, any way, to stop the pass. Florida doesn't quite have the aerial attack that Texas Tech (661 yards, 6 touchdowns) does, but you can believe the Gators will be testing that secondary, especially after all the criticism that Ron Zook doesn't take enough chances downfield. The best way to help your secondary is to get some kind of pass rush on freshman quarterback Chris Leak, making only his second start. Defensive end Charlie Anderson needs to get an upfield surge; when he did break through the line last week he forced an interception for a touchdown. More of that would

go a long way toward getting above 500.

Key for Floridar Show more discipline on offense. After being flagged five times for illegal procedure and three times for linemen standing up early, the Gators need to cut back on their mwn mistakes and not help Mississippi. They also need to learn to make adjustments on the fly, especially offensive coordinator Ed Zaunbrecher. The Gators usually decide before the game whether they will run or pass in that game, and they refuse to adapt. After finishing with only 93 yards last week, the Gators will come out and insist on establishing the run, just to prove they can do it, rather than go with what the Rebels give them.

Alabama at Georgia

Key for Alabama: Find a way to eat up some clock. There are always times in a game when you have to be able to just hold onto the ball and keep the opposing offense off the field. Last week against Arkansas, that time would have been with a 21-point lead midway through the third quarter. Allowing the opponent to have the ball for 28 minutes more than you do is unacceptable. Shaud Williams had 19 carries for 135 yards in the loss, so maybe a few more carries would lead to more points and, more importantly, boost the Tide's time of possession. Head coach Mike Shula koves to stretch the field, but he has to realize where these games are won and lost.

Key for Georgia: Put pressure on 'Hama quarterback Brodic Croyle, who has shown that he can find the open man when given the opportunity. He should see a lot of defensive end David Pollack this week. Take advantage of team speed and stretch those corners to prevent Shaud Williams from breaking a big run, as he usually does at least twice a game. Stack the box and rely on the quickness of your linebackers to wreck the short passing game.

Key for Anburn: The matchup between corner Carlos Rogers and Volunteers wideout James Banks could docide this game. Banks is by far the Volunteers' top option through the air, and has four touchdowns. If Auburn's thin secondary isn't careful, Banks might have four more touchdowns by the end of this game. All the talk is usually about Tennessee's running game, but with the Tigers moving offensive players around to fill holes in the secondary, you can bet Tennessee will test that possible Achilles heel early and often.

Key for Tennessee: Facing another athletic defense could

Key for Vanderbiltt Get the running game back on track. Quarterback Jay Cutter does a fine job of avoiding the rush and picking up yards when running lanes open up, but he should not be the leading rusher on a team with two talented tailbacks. Cutter finished with 15 carries for 61 yards in the overtime loss to Georgia Tech, which was more than either Kwane Doster (15 for 60) or Norval McKenzie (12 for 43). McKenzie did have two touchdown runs, but the Commodores need to do a better job of getting their backs involved, even if it means a little creative play

Key for Mississippi State: The Bulldogs need to keep plugging away and improving on defense every week. They came into the game against LSU ranked next-to-last in the nation in total defense, and last against the pass. They allowed only 191 yards passing to the Tigers' potent air attack, and they also got their first interception of the season by cornerback Odell Bradley. If they can continue to chip away on defense and give Vanderbilt its yards without allowing any long plays, they have a shot at removing the goose egg from the win column.



"Our kids are hard workers," said Oviedo coach Greg Register. "This group has the best character of any team I've ever had. They earned this win with hard work and determination."


