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Orlandoan Guilty Of Manslaughter

William Harris Palmer, 33, of Orlando, was found guilty of manslaughter by a Seminole County Circuit Court Jury Wednesday evening. Ten hours of deliberation by the six man jury culminated the two day trial. This is the second conviction on a manslaughter death in Seminole County in the past ten years, reports the State Attorney Office in Sanford.

Harris was declared guilty of driving while intoxicated, an action which resulted in the death of Paul Theodore Mouchon.

The 34 year old Bear Lake resident was standing in front of a gas station on the corner of Bear Lake Road and Highway 426 in Forest City when, according to testimony, Harris' car crossed two other vehicles on the wrong side of a solid yellow line "at a high rate of speed", hit another vehicle making a left-hand turn in the intersection, glanced off that car, and hit Mouchon.

Mouchon's grandson, nine-year old Loren Brent Mouchon, standing beside his grandfather, was seriously injured, according to the same testimony.

Circuit Court Judge Tom Waddell remanded Palmer to the Seminole County Jail pending a presentence investigation. The maximum penalty is 30 years in prison for manslaughter.

The case was tried by Assistant State Attorney Fred Leone and Assistant Public Defender Ned Julian, both Sanford attorneys.

In other action Wednesday, Zell Gilmore of Apopka, pleaded guilty of discharging a firearm in a public place. He is in custody pending a presentence investigation.

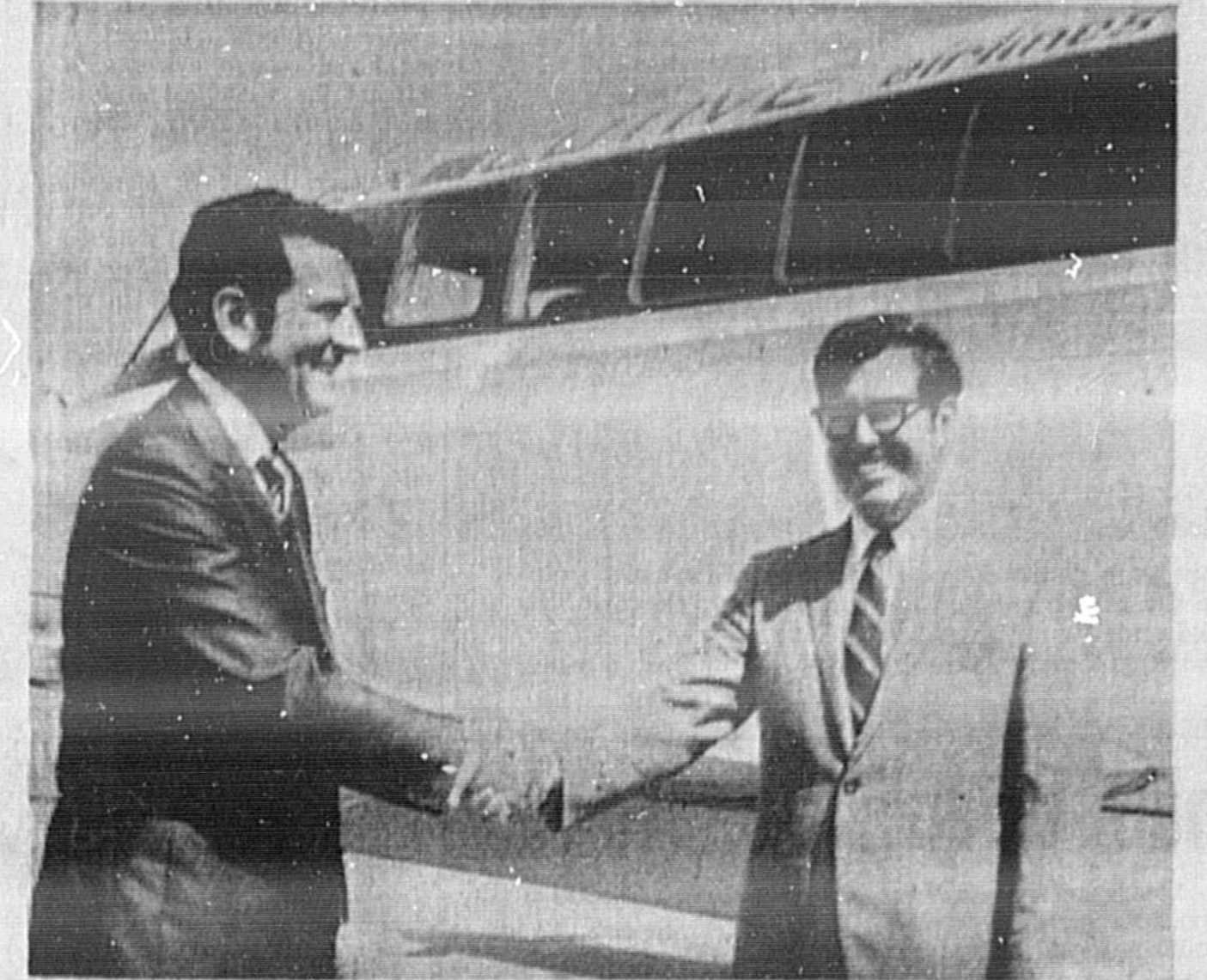
Forced Busing Coming?? Seminole Out Of Compliance

 Since the Seminole County freedom of choice school plan now in effect is expected to be declared out of compliance with the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) edict on what constitutes a unitary school system for black and white students, what are the alternative plans under consideration by the school board in the event litigation such as that threatened by U.S. Justice Department forces a retreat and the board is made to change to another acceptable plan?

Coming on the heels of a letter dated July 2 from the Justice Department to State Education Commissioner Floyd Christian, that threatened 14 counties, including Seminole with court action unless an acceptable plan is filed by August 31, opening of new school term, is a request from Pat Bule, school board member, that other integration plans be discussed at this afternoon's board meeting.

Presumably these plans contain some form of pairing and zoning of schools and some forced busing may be necessary if the county is to keep its federal funds and open the doors of learning to students for the 1970-71 term.

The school board staff and Andrew Braeken, administrative aide, has said that plans (Cont. On Page 1B, Col. 4)

Budget Review Continues

 The Board of County Commissioners met Wednesday at the Seminole County Courthouse, to review the new County budget.

The Board is faced with the monumental problem of cutting down a budget that is estimated to be exceptionally greater than the total income of the County. Board member Sid Vihlen stated, "Many people will feel like we are a group of Simon LeGree because of the corners that we will be forced to cut, but there is no other way of making ends meet."

"Inflation is one of the main factors causing the problem. A good example of this is last year's telephone cost. Due to rate increases, last year's cost for local service was as high as the money allotted for local and long distance service. This caused a deficit in the budget because of the long distance calls that had to be made."

Board Chairman, John Alexander stated that the present distribution of phones he surveyed before any further money is allotted.

"Inflation is not the only other major cause of the money problem. The Department is not run solely by the County as the Federal, State and County Governments, all allot money to the Health Department.

The employees of the Health Department are responsible to the State Government, not the County Government.

Mr. Vihlen stated, "The Federal State Government will implement a new program without consulting the County Government. New employees have to be hired and more equipment bought, therefore the costs rise. The County allotment grows and we don't even know where the money goes. It is nearly impossible for us to keep track of the Department under the present set up."

"Another factor that burts us is our lack of a present Health Director, who don't have anybody to explain where or why the money is needed. Mr. Robbins, the Head of Sanitation, is doing his best, but just does not know enough about the Department to be able to explain fully."

Irate Osceola Residents Protest Proposed Dump

 Irate residents of the area appeared en masse at a meeting of the Seminole County Planning and Zoning Board last night to protest the use of Osceola Airfield as the county's central sanitary landfill and possible collection depot for junk cars.

Representing the County Commission, County Sanitarian Val Robbins made a presentation to the board explaining the use of the site. Robbins said that preliminary approval had been granted by the State Board of Health, and that soil borings had been made. In answer to a query by board chairman, Glenn McCall, Robbins said that he did not know the results of the soil borings. He further stated that there had been no final approval of the site by the state, and that he was aware that residents of the area were concerned with the pollution aspect.

McCall then directed his questions to burning at the site of auto bodies and the detriment to ecology. Robbins said that the public would be unable to set fires with the site closed unless attended, and that he had no present information on the junk cars.

ENGINEER'S REPORT READ
 County Road Superintendent J. C. Lavender told the board that he had read an engineer's report stating that the water table was three feet beneath the surface, that no pollution would result of lakes or rivers, and that no garbage would be buried below the water table. Lavender also cited that it would be necessary to raise the elevation for a 10 foot landfill.

McCall continued his probe by asking what would hinder garbage from washing into the rubbish, and Lavender replied that there would be a layer of dirt. Lavender further stated that the operation would begin at the north side of the runway and that the present runway would not be disturbed for a "long while."

In answer to a query as to the ultimate disposition of the \$1 million runway, Lavender said the concrete would "be buried." He went on to say that for the next 7-10 years the site would be visible from the highway, but after the proposed use as a sanitary landfill for 20 years, would be reclaimed and utilized as a park.

McCall defended the landfill operation with the contention of "this is apparently today's answer to garbage." Lavender cited such operations in Tampa and West Palm Beach. McCall mentioned that the proposed site is on the fringe of the green belt area of the county's plans.

Residents interrupted proceedings with caustic comments about living next to a dump, and one resident suggested it be placed in the back yard of "the county commissioners."

McCall shot back that he did not blame the residents for their feelings but that the "dump" had to be located somewhere as the ultimate answer to the landfill situation. However, he said, no one seemed to be in favor of Osceola "but the county commission."

 John Sewell, attorney representing Forrest Products Inc., owners of 1,000 acres of contiguous property, questioned the landfill being permitted in an M-1 industrial area with the fact that the county had no authority to "set a graveyard for cars in an agricultural or M-1 area. McCall replied that the county was granted this authority under an enabling act passed by the state legislature. Lavender again interjected that the county has not said that it would accept junk cars at the site, but if such were the case there would only be 100 at a time, which would be mashed and removed.

Sewell countered that the county has not submitted any specific proposal or specifications for the landfill nor any governing regulations. He continued that he could not ascertain how the board could make a decision without state and county reports, and concluded that "there is more to a landfill than digging a hole in the ground and dumping it."

Barb Peterson, realtor, told the board that several investors were interested in the area, who would be discouraged with a landfill. He also said that he had spoken with a reputable engineer" who said the site would take "months of study" and that no reputable engineer would hazard a guess as to pollution, etc. until the operation, said, "If elected I will spare no efforts to bring to each Seminole County child, the best education it is possible to provide."

He continued, "this county's educational program should not take a back seat to any county in the state and if I am elected, I will work toward that end."

Agge pledged he would be available to hear suggestions and complaints from the citizenry concerning the school operations.

"We believe we have some of the best teachers in the state and we will do whatever we can in keeping with good county school operation to keep them," Agge stated.

Father of two boys, ages 8 and 10, Agge said he had looked at the school situation for some time before deciding to seek office.

Agge is the second person to announce candidacy for the educational board in the past two days; John Evans, board chairman from Oviedo, Tuesday told The Herald he would seek a third four year term.

Missing Snowman Sought

MIAMI (UPI) — A team of Florida scientist-adventurers, just back from a trek through the dense mountains of the Pacific Northwest, believes it has found enough evidence to warrant the attempted capture of an American-variety "Aomori Snowman."

Explorer Robert W. Morgan, a bald and bearded former desk jockey for the Federal Aviation Administration, said today he and his colleagues plan to return to the Cascade Mountain Range to try to make contact with one of the creatures known in Indian legend and pioneering folklore as Sasquatch, Suck Indian or Bigfoot.

"Based upon accumulated data," Morgan said, "the group has decided that enough tangible evidence exists that warrants a second full-scale scientific expedition to attempt to contact or live capture of the legendary Aomori Snowman."

In early June, Morgan and his associates set out for the Northwest on what he called the first phase of a planned two-phase "American Yeti expedition of 1974."

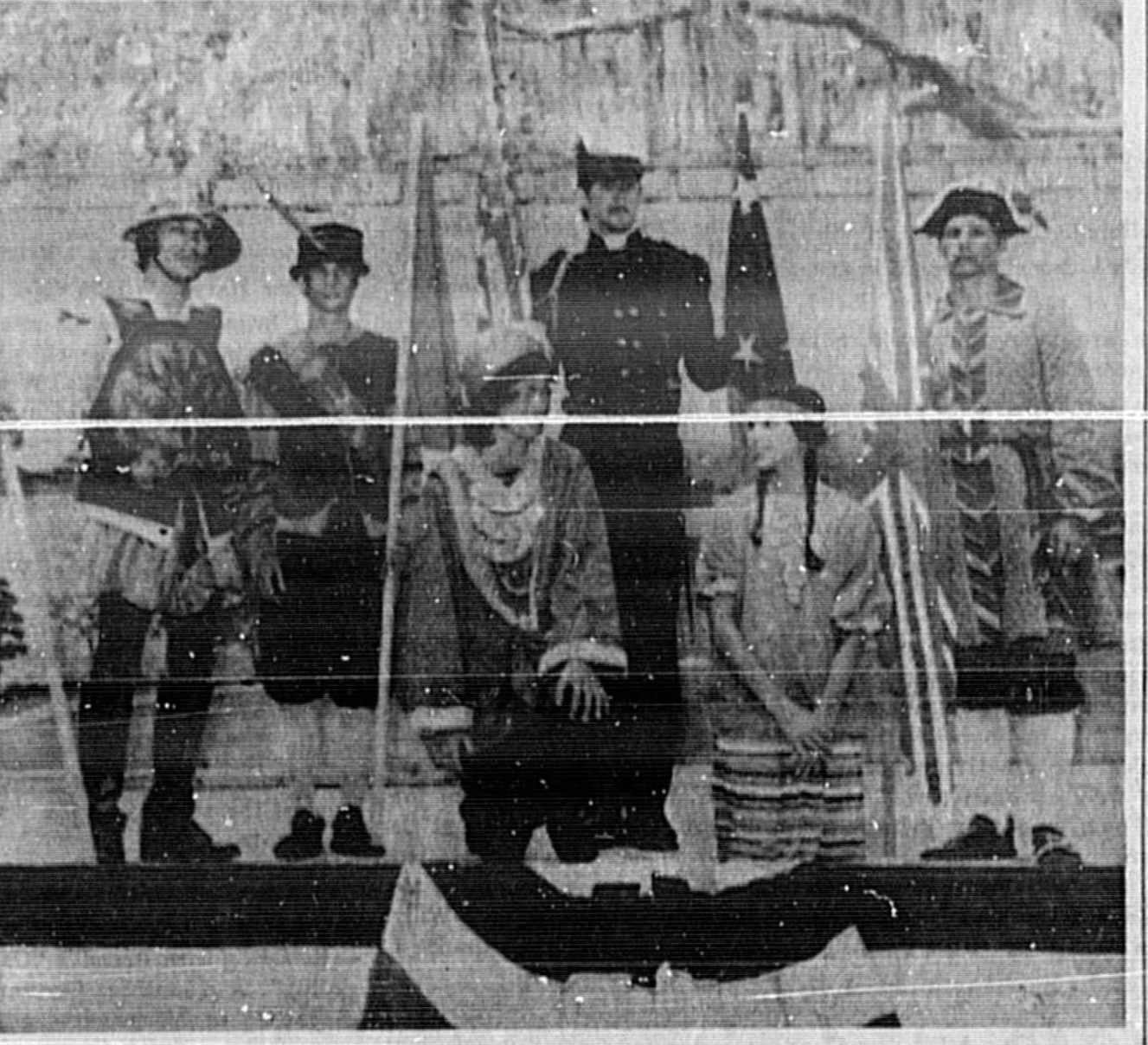

CATV Moves From Horse And Buggy

The 1970s will be, experts say, "the era of communications." The biggest system movement in that field now is cable television, which could bring 40 or more channels to the home with programming ranging from network specials to an ad from the butcher down the block for choice sirloin that the housewife could order on another channel of her home communications center, provided by the same cable. Here is a look at the present state of emerging CATV and its possibilities.

In the present governmental climate, the people are going to get it. The FCC in a wide-ranging report June 25 proposed that cable systems be allowed to import signals from a country-line adjustment in a main highway of communications. The decade promises a commotion.

In addition to seeing the opportunity for unparalleled service in the coming of the cable, many are eyeing a growing pot of gold.

Business Week, noting that the average subscriber pays \$69 a year, that operating expenses rarely exceed half of that, concluded: "Depending on an amortization policy, the pre-tax profit of \$30 per subscriber—which is good business indeed." Standing before the 19th annual National Cable Television Association (NCTA) Convention on June 8, its president, Donald V. Taverner, said that "we are ready to become the fourth dimension in communications." The other three—the printed word, radio, and over-the-air television.

Not long before that, an article by Dean Burch, chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, had said: "When something has arrived, it's arrived. If it's ready, people should have it."

Armed with a wide range of services, CATV is a multi-channel system that offers a wide range of services, from news and entertainment to educational and business programming. It is a system that is growing rapidly and is expected to become a major force in the communications industry in the years ahead.

Candidate Ceiling Ahead On Broadcast Advertising

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House commerce subcommittee is expected to put the final touches on a bill today which would put a ceiling on broadcast advertising in general elections by candidates for federal office.

The Senate already has passed a similar bill but the House panel reportedly is considering expanding the measure to include primary elections.

The subcommittee also might write in some provisions to cover state offices, or give states some type of options to come under the program, sources said.

The bill apparently would not affect this fall's elections. The subcommittee is said to be leaning toward an effective date of Jan. 1, 1971, for the legislation.

The bill, as passed by the Senate last April, would set a limit on the amount which candidates for president, vice president, Senate and House could spend for radio and television advertising. It also would require that broadcasters charge political candidates no more than the lowest amount paid by any commercial advertiser for the same time period.

The Senate bill also would require the equal time requirements for presidential and vice presidential candidates.

The amount candidates could spend would be 7 cents per vote cast in the latest general election for that office, or \$20,000, whichever is higher.

Doctor Becomes Friend To Wildlife

PLEASANT HILL, Calif. (AP) — Dr. Jim Navaux is a veterinarian who specializes in horses but once fixed up a snake which had a broken back. Didn't charge him a dime, either.

He also has succeeded wounded possums, foxes, raccoons, owls, seabirds and other free-roaming creatures which lacked the wherewithal to meet a doctor's bill.

He figures mankind owes something to the living nonhuman things injured by today's technology.

Dr. Navaux, who is 38, is the founder and sole staff of the National Wildlife Health Foundation.

The foundation is two years old and so far, the doctor says, running it has cost him about \$3,000. He says he hasn't had any help from the other animal lovers of the world, and he has a wife and four sons to support.

"The trouble is," said Dr. Jim in an interview Tuesday, "I'm just not an organizer. This sort of thing takes promotional ability."

The 38-year-old Nebraska, born horse specialist said somebody anonymous once deposited a large king snake on his doorstep. He found it had some broken vertebrae.

CATV Moves From Horse And Buggy

(The 1970s will be, experts say, "the era of communications.") The biggest upstart movement in that field now is cable television, which could bring 40 or more channels to the home with programming ranging from network specials to an ad from the butcher down the block for choice sirloin that the housewife could order on another channel of her home communications center, provided by the same cable. Here is a look at the present state of emerging CATV and its possibilities.

 NEW YORK (UPI) — At the age of 21, cable television is making the transition from a country lane adjacent to a main highway of communications. The decade promises a commotion.

In addition to separating the opportunity for unparalleled service in the coming of the cable, many are eyeing a growing pot of gold.

Business Week, noting that the average subscriber pays \$60 a year, that operating expenses rarely exceed half of that, concluded: "Depending on an amortization policy, the company has potential for pretax profits of \$30 per subscriber, which is good business indeed." Standing before the 19th annual National Cable Television Association (NCTA) Convention on June 8, its president, Donald V. Taverner, said that "we are ready to become the fourth dimension in communications." The other three: the printed word, radio, and over-the-air television.

Not long before that, an article by Dean Burch, chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, had said: "When something has arrived, it's arrived. If it's ready, people should have it."

In the present governmental climate, the people are going to get it. The FCC in a wide-ranging report June 25 proposed that cable systems be allowed to import signals from other viewing areas into a main highway of communications. The report says that cable systems which comprise 90 per cent of the country's population.

With the blessing of President Nixon, the Sloan Foundation on June 10 granted \$500,000 to cable to commission a study on communications to find how they can be used in cities for health, welfare, employment, community development, and education.

Addressing the NCTA Convention, Burch said technical standards must "assure the possibility of interconnection of systems through microwave or satellite communications." This would be the long foreseen "wired country" with home communications centers using the multiple-channel services of television cable.

Armchair shopping, dial-a-sirloin, soapbox channels for politicians and community activists, video telephones, burglar alarm channels, fire alarm channels, advertising on almost a block-by-block basis, meter reading, newspaper and billing — even mail-by facsimile in the living room, medical diagnosis, terminals hooked to computers. These and much more are promised. You'll pay extra to get each one, probably.

Irving B. Kahn, the enthusiastic and enterprising head of Teleprompter Corp., which will soon have systems in 27 states from Honolulu, Hawaii, to Horseheads, N.Y. (and Manhattan), believes that within five years 85 per cent of the 60 million American television homes will be on cable.

Kahn is working with a large Eastern hospital in testing the possibility of wiring homes with the capability of diagnosing illnesses.

He thinks the coming two-way systems open a greater opportunity for education than anything since television itself. The New York Times reports that one major school system in the East believes it also could use to advantage 40 cable TV channels.

The FCC, in a move to foster added diversity of choice to television and have CATV "act like local stations," has ruled that by next April 1 all CATV stations with 3,500 or more subscribers must originate programming as well as pick it up from over-the-air stations. "Operate to a significant extent as a local outlet."

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Candidate Ceiling Ahead On Broadcast Advertising

 WASHINGTON (AP) — A House commerce subcommittee is expected to put the final touches on a bill today which would put a ceiling on broadcast advertising in general elections by candidates for federal office.

The Senate already has passed a similar bill, but the House panel reportedly is considering expanding the measure to include primary elections.

The subcommittee also might write in some provisions to cover state offices, or give states some type of options to come under the program, sources said.

The bill apparently would not affect this fall's elections. The subcommittee is said to be leaning toward an effective date of Jan. 1, 1977, for the legislation.

The bill, as passed by the Senate last April, would set a limit on the amount which candidates for president, vice president, Senate and House could spend for radio and television advertising. It also would require that broadcasters charge political candidates no more than the lowest amount paid by any commercial advertiser for the same time period.

The Senate bill also would spend the equal time requirement for presidential and vice presidential candidates.

The amount candidates could spend would be 7 cents per vote cast in the latest general election for that office, or \$20,000, whichever is higher.

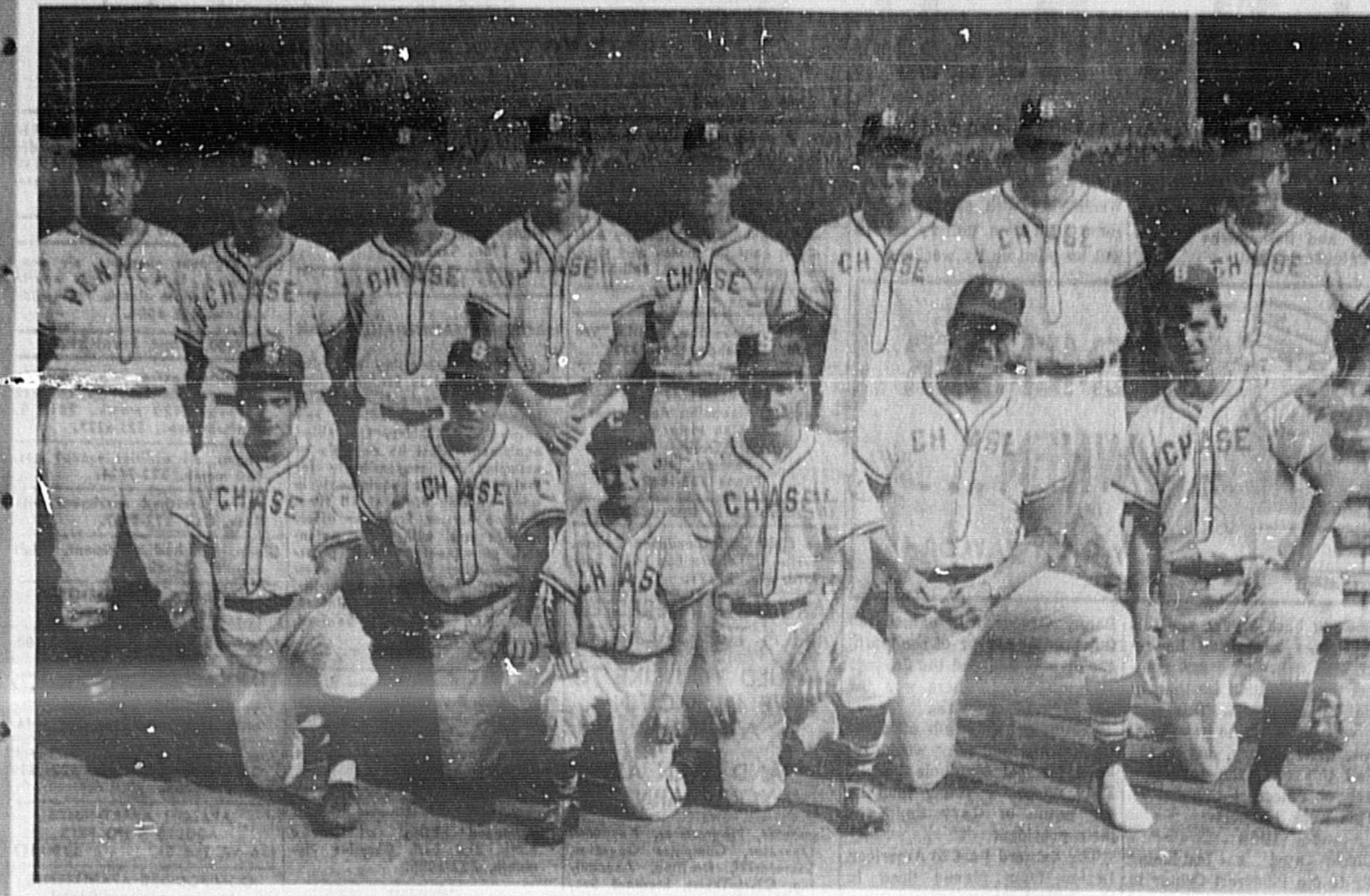

To Comrade Editor, Pravda, Moscow, U.S.S.R.
Dear Comrade Editor:
What's so tough about writing for Pravda?
After many, many years of reading your paper, one concludes you have a snap.
All you must do is familiarize yourself with rules. It's like having a salt-shaker on your desk full of the boss's favorite words and phrases, for sprinkling into the paper wherever needed. How can you miss?
You needn't worry about producing rich, beautiful prose. All you've got to worry about is passing on messages from the Kremlin to the Joe in the party ranks and keeping the nonparty readers from knowing what you're talking about.
You have plenty of tools at your disposal for getting the message across, be it on domestic, foreign or Communist affairs. For a starter, let's take an editorial domestic problem.
Let's say, for example, there's something smelly going on in the fish industry. Well, you begin with something bland: "The Soviet state expands, great efforts for the welfare of the people." You go on like that for five or six paragraphs. Nobody will start reading until a key word shows up.
The key word is "however." You also may use "but" or "re-pretably" for variety. Any of these will rivet the attention of the scribe bureaucrat on what you have to say. You then proceed to clobber the "serious wrong-thinkers in parties" abroad. It is wise to comment on the "unshakable solidarity of the socialist camp and the international workers movement."
If the editorial is aimed at wrong-thinkers in parties abroad, it is wise to comment on the "unshakable solidarity of the socialist camp and the international workers movement."
All Soviet allies are either unshakable or invincible. You can vary this by referring to "immaculate character" and in this way, "Most pernicious in its consequences is the granting of so-called freedom of speech in the bourgeois sense. This amounts in fact to vilification of all the Czechoslovak people's socialist conquests and the leading role of the Communist party."
That was very clever of you, Comrade Editor. You got in a really important key word, something Western that sounds attractive must be preceded by "re-called." You also made a notable contribution by saying that the Kremlin gave the Czechoslovak "friendly advice based on Marxist analysis."

Zoning Scuttles Rock Fest

The problems which have plagued other areas in the country will apparently not be prevalent in Seminole County relative to "rock" festivals, due to the caution exercised by the County Commission in its stipulation to promoters of the proposed musical concerts which were scheduled to be held at Sandlot Springs.
Commissioners have denied a special entertainment permit to the Seminole Blues, Inc. on the basis of reasoning of the site as residential, and content of the argument of operations under a non-conforming use. Commissioners said that this was applicable only to an existing operation, but not an expansion to another type of use.
Roland Marshall representing the promoters gave an impassioned argument for outdoor entertainment citing concerts he had attended in other areas of the United States, and said that these concerts were an American tradition, with the recent unfavorable incidents generated by a minority of the American people.
Alexander replied that there was no sufficient information submitted in the application relative to security, traffic control, sanitary and medical facilities. He cited his argument with the statement that "Pure and simply, Sandlot cannot be utilized for this activity." He continued that the Board would have no choice but to deny the special entertainment permit.
Marshall, in final rebuttal, said that he hoped to avoid legal action because of the publicity which would ensue but that the County's ordinance was an incomplete one, would not hold up in court, and that "We will have to contest its legality."
He continued that the non-conforming uses in past activities would bear investigation, and that the promoters would probably contest the legal validity of the ordinance.
Alexander shot back that he was not satisfied with the application which was submitted and that the Board was not able to make an honest appraisal, and that the application was improper relative to zoning.
Commissioner Greg Drummond queried as to what would happen if people appeared at the scheduled July 15 concert. Marshall said that he had been publicly reported, no tickets had been sold to the event and the promoters have no intention of creating chaos. He said that he doubted that anyone would show up. But if they did show they would soon leave upon seeing the deserted area.
The Commissioners then moved to deny the special entertainment permit at Sandlot, and the motion was carried. Resolution of the matter would now seem to be the legal validity of the ordinance.

House Study Reveals Asian Countries Unprepared For Pact

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 12-man House study team says the non-Communist nations of Southeast Asia are ill prepared psychologically or economically to set up a mutual defense pact and continued U.S. aid is essential to their survival.
The report was issued Monday following a two-week on-the-spot study in which 400 political prisoners and criminals crammed in small cages in a South Vietnamese prison on Con Son Island.
Rep. Augustus F. Hawkins, D-Calif., said the trip convinced him the U.S. should pull its troops out of Indochina, cut off military aid and let the North and South Vietnamese set up a coalition government that would not be dominated by Communists.
"United States policy based on using these nations as our front line against the threat of Red China seeks military victory instead of a peaceful settlement," Hawkins charged.
Hawkins and Rep. William H. Anderson, D-Tenn., said they found some 400 political prisoners and criminals crammed three to five in 5 by 8 foot cages in the Con Son Island prison.
Eye had been thrown in some of the cells, Anderson said, adding that male prisoners related they had been cramped so long they could not stand up, and female prisoners' cages were filthy.
Hawkins said the jail situation reflected South Vietnamese suppression of citizens who seek peace. He said U.S. authorities help cover up the treatment of prisoners.
Anderson did not agree with that characterization.
"But I'll tell you this, if these people weren't Communists when they went in, they'll be Communists when they get out after the treatment they've received."
The 70-page report said Thailand is willing to add its combat troops to South Vietnam's in Cambodia with U.S. military aid. It added some Southeast Asian leaders have suggested a common strategy including military equipment grants, mutual combat training, and use of neighboring countries' forces to repel invasion.
"Before one becomes intrigued by the potentials for close and continued military association of the countries of Southeast Asia," the report continued, "it is well to recall that hostilities that run deep into history cannot easily be erased."

Polly's Pointers

DEAR POLLY—I would like to tell Abbie how I cleaned that Venetian blind for the eight years I had them. Vacuum to remove loose dust, leave blind open to full-length, remove from the window and put in the bathtub with warm sudsy water and let it soak for 15 minutes, then scrub lightly back and forth over the slats with a brush. Drain water from the tub, rinse with clear water and hang over the clothesline to dry. In the summer I rinsed mine outdoors by using the garden hose. This is a quick method. As the mother of seven active children every short cut helps me save time and energy.—HELEEN

DEAR POLLY and Abbie: The doctor's office I have cleaned for several years has wood-slat Venetian blinds. I clean them real good with a cloth and liquid ammonia, then apply liquid wax. They are then easy to wipe off and stay shiny. I have set blinds in my

own home and do them the same way.—MRS. W. M.

DEAR GIRLS—Do not soak wood blinds if they are removed for washing. To be on the safe side, I would always put a rubber mat or some bath towels in the bottom of the bathtub before washing blinds in it, particularly steel blinds, to prevent any scratches. Many immerse blinds to wash them simply because of soiled tapes and cords. Cloth tapes get to the state where no amount of washing does much good and replacement with new, perhaps easily wiped-off, plastic ones may be the best solution. Be sure any brush used for scrubbing blinds will not scratch and mar the paint.—POLLY

Bill Fulford Seeks House Re-election

State Representative Bill Fulford announced that he will seek re-election to the House of Representatives, District 46, Orange-Seminole Counties. Fulford, one of the new legislators who voted and worked against the legislative pay raise and also voted to uphold the Governor's veto, pointed to the achievements in aquatic weed control legislation during the past two sessions. The aquatic weed import law which he introduced and passed in the '69 session and the aquatic weed research and control law which he introduced in the House became law June 25, 1970. "This law, for the first time, places the responsibility of research and control of aquatic weeds in one state agency," said Fulford. "Hopefully we will now have a concerted state-wide effort in finding a solution to the aquatic weed problem that has been plaguing and destroying our lakes for fishing, swimming and boating. These individuals weeds have taken lives through drinking in Orange County and depreciated the value of waterfront property. Fulford, long known for his efforts in conservation in Florida, also sponsored and handled, in the House, the algal bloom protection package to prevent the extraction of the Florida alligator. In addition he co-sponsored three important bills that became law that will prohibit the indiscriminate dredging and filling of sub-subsiding lands and require biological reports to be made prior to any sale or dredging and fill permits. As Chairman of the House subcommittee on Air and Water Pollution, his Committee helped enact into law six bills strengthening water pollution laws and a constitutional amendment to enable local gov-

South Seminole Mansion Robbed

A South Seminole mansion was robbed over several thousand dollars worth of furs and jewels in a Thursday afternoon burglary, according to Seminole County Sheriff John Polk. Sheriff Polk said the Spring Valley Estates home of Ralph Kennedy, an Orlando food company executive, was entered and family jewelry and furs amounting to several thousand dollars were removed. The home, located on Live Oak Lane, is considered a luxury showcase and had been robbed of household items last February. County Investigator George Abby reported the entry was made by a side window and said the entire house was ransacked, which indicated more than one person was involved. The robbery occurred sometime between 5 p.m. and 6 p.m. and was discovered by Mrs. Kennedy upon arriving home. She immediately called sheriff's officers who launched an intensive investigation. In other county reports, the home of Mrs. Edna Norman at 504 Wylie Avenue was entered and a \$400 plus value tape recorder stereo unit was taken. Sheriff Polk also reported that Thomas N. Wiloughby, wanted in connection with the burning of a truck owned by the company which employed him, had voluntarily turned himself over to authorities and was placed in lieu of \$10,000 bonds for destruction of private property and grand larceny charges in the county jail.

Osteen Bridge Funds Approved For 1971

By CHARNER LEONE Money for the preliminary engineering of the bridge spanning Orange, Seminole and Volusia Counties at a junction at the Villa Nova Thursday to the 30 or so gathered. He stated that the preliminary engineering for the new bridge has been authorized and will proceed as soon as conferences with the U.S. Corps of Engineers and the U.S. Coast Guard establish the vertical clearances (the distance from the water to the bottom of the bridge) are established. Costs for the bridge, depending upon the distance of the clearance (35, 45 or 65 feet) varies from one and a half to two and a half million dollars, said Mueller. Mueller promised to set up conferences with the Corps of Engineers and the Coast Guard "as soon as possible" in an effort to establish the necessary height of the bridge. Future uses of the St. Johns River, which the bridge spans, will determine the height. Bill Bennett, a DDT engineer, has been authorized to draw up the preliminary plans for the bridge. This engineering must be done before the budget for the 71-72 year can be amended to include funds for the actual construction of the bridge, said Mueller. At that point the county will be called upon to establish the rights of way. John Krider, executive manager of the Greater Orlando Chamber of Commerce noted at this point that the right of way could be obtained for \$12-15,000, and would not be a problem. "The engineering will take six to eight months," said Mueller. Mueller said that it was his aim to join the bridge with State Road 46, probably with a T-intersection, with a road yet to be built. That would forge the union between highway 415, two and a half miles east of Sanford nearly at the foot of the new bridge, and SR 46.
