Overpass For S.R. 46 Another **Step Closer**

The State Department of Transportation (DOT) has inched another step toward the construction of the State Road 46 overpass west of Sanford - with assistance from the county commission. The commission this week approved the deeding four intersections along that stretch of highway to the state to further the DOTs effort to acquire necessary right of way for the improvement.

Bill McKelvey, DOT deputy district engineer, said the intersections conveyed by the county include Airport Boulevard, Bell Avenue, Second Street and Brown

McKelvey said about 40 percent of the right-of-way necessary for the \$3.7 million overpass of the railroad tracks that serve Amtrak and Auto-Train have been acquired.

Eleven parcels of land must yet be acquired and some of those acquisitions will be through condemnation proceedings, he said.

"Perhaps 30 percent of the necessary property will be acquired through condemnation," McKelvey said. He said four businesses are located in the proposed right-of-way.

'The Minit Market and the service station on the south side of the highway will be complete takings," McKelvey said. "We will need only a strip of land where the auto auction and a diesel repair service are located," he said.

Chrysler Loan Guarantees OK'd WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Chrysler loan guarantee board, as expected, gave final approval today to an additional \$400

million in loan guarantees to the ailing automaker - but the grant could be overshadowed by a huge 1980 corporate Treasury Secretary Donald Regan, the

loan board's chairman, said it is now "clearly the sole responsibility of Chrysler's senior management to achieve or exceed the results projected in the company's operating and financing

Regan said there are no plans to provide further federal loan guarantees to Chrysler. He urged the automaker to work as fast as possible to find a suitable merger partner and to infuse new capital into the company

Chrysler had to satisfy 21 different conditions set by the board to qualify for the latest guarantee. It has already drawn down \$800 million in federal loan guarantees.

Congress has approved \$300 million more, but the treasury secretary recently said he does not think the Reagan administration is committed to approving the entire amount.

New Suit Against City Filed By Fired Officer

Tommy Sands, fired as a Sanford probationery police officer two years ago, has filed a new law suit against the city of Sanford seeking damages.

His original suit against the city, City Manager W.E. "Pete" Knowles and Police Chief Ben Butler was dismissed for lack of prosecution in January.

Before his new lawsuit against the city can proceed, he must pay a cost judgment, ordered by the circuit court, totaling

After the January dismissal, Speical City Attorney Bill Hutchison and the attorney for Knowles' insurance carrier received the cost judgment from Circuit Judge Kenneth

Leffler against Sands. Hutchison said today the costs were for depositions and not for attorney fees.

Judge Leffler ordered that any additional lawsuits filed by Sands against the city on the same issue would be stayed until

Judge Rules Rolf To Die

Calling it one of the most distressing cases he has ever had to decide, Seminole County Judge Alan Dickey Thursday ordered a rogue German shepherd named Rolf be put to death for a series of unprovoked attacks on people and animals.

Robert McMillan said it would probably be "no sooner than March 10." That would give Rolf's owners, Richard and Joann Russell time to appeal the decision. Their attorney, Gary Stump, said

No date was set for the execution. However, County Attorney

his clients have made no decision on the matter. "They don't want the dog back," Stump said. "They have gone through a lot this last year. But they still feel killing the

animal would be inhumane and unnecessary." The Russels had asked Rolf be given the K-9 dog training school in Orlando to be used as a guard dog within an enclosed area. But Dickey said he couldn't allow that because "once they cross the county line, this court would lose jurisdiction" in the case and have no control over what is done with the four-

year-old shepherd. In ordering Rolf's destruction, Dickey said he "had never had a case that created such controversy and emotion within

the community.'

"But people's opinions and newspaper editorials can't be considered by this court," he said. "As one who has had an animal in the house ever since I can remember, this has been a most distressing case to me.'

Barring an appeal, Dickey's ruling effectively ends seven months of legal maneuvering over the dog's fate since the county's animal control board in August declared him too

dangerous to live. The board based its finding on testimony from several of the Russell's Oviedo neighbors who claimed Rolf killed their pets and poultry, and bit at least two people without provocation.

In August, the board recommended the dog be killed and

Dickey agreed. A month later, however, bowing to the Russell's pleas, Dickey gave Rolf a reprieve and sent him to K-9 to undergo several weeks of obedience training. Rolf flunked. So, in January, the board again asked Dickey to order the animal put to death. The case was delayed while the Russells were tried for taking Rolf from the county animal control

Helicopter Plucks 2 Inmates

From Parisian Prison

PARIS (UPI) - Two men landed a hijacked helicopter in the center of one of Europe's most modern prisons today, picked up two prisoners, evaded pursuing police helicopters then landed at the edge of Paris and escaped, police said.

Prison guards gave the alarm instantly and police helicopters took off for a cops-and-robbers chase but the two prisoners and their rescuers vanished. Police said two men rented the helicopter at a heliport at suburban Issy les Moulineaux early today, saying they wanted to be flown to the city of Orleans.

After the helicopter took off, the pair threatened the pilot with a hand grenade and a submachinegun. They told the pilot that accomplices had seized his wife and children as hostages and would harm them unless he

While the helicopter blades twirled and one of the armed men stood guard at the foot of the craft, the two escaping prisoners hopped inside. They were veteran criminals Gerard Dupre, 33, and Daniel Beaumont, 34, in prison for numerous armed hold-ups during which they seized hostages.

Evading persuing police helicopters, the hijacked craft landed in the middle of a soccer stadium near the Porte d'Orleans, on the south of Paris. The two prisoners and their two rescuers leaped into a waiting car and vanished, police said.

3 Britons Leave Tehran

LONDON (UPI) - Three British missionaries held in Iran for six months on espionage charges flew out of Tehran today, Iran's official Pars news agency said. Pars said the three Britons who had "finally been cleared of the espionage charges against them" left Tehran on Iran Air Flight 761 at 4:25 a.m. EST, accompanied by the mediator who worked to free them,

An airport official said the flight was delayed for nearly 30 minutes before it took off for Athens en route for Rome and Madrid.

The freedom flight for Dr. John Coleman, 57, his wife Audrey, 56, and Jean Waddell, 58, came after two frustrating days in which the three tried to leave the Iranian capital but were prevented from departing because of passport problems. Their release left only one Briton still imprisoned in Iran - businessman Andrew Pyke, 57, facing possible trial on charges of spying and embezziement.

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An Anniversary They'll Never Forget

It was an anniversary that Seminole sheriff's Capt. Jay Leman and his wife Sandra won't soon forget. It wasn't supposed to be any big deal; just a private dinner together. But before Wednesday evening was over they had landed smack in the middle of a double shoplifting.

Leman said things began normally enough; he and Sandra had a pleasant meal and headed over to the Fern Park K-Mart about 8:30 p.m. to pick up a few odds and ends. Innocuous enough. But while doing their shopping, they stumbled over three men who they felt were trying to steal some canvas

Leman made the mistake, however, of going to the shoe rack to find the old shoes he figured the trio had probably left behind. By the time he found his evidence - a torn shoe string and price tag - the men were gone. "They had apparently hit the front door running and disappeared before I could catch up," he said.

Oh, well. Win a few, lose a few. Reminded by the incident that their daughter needed a new pair of shoes, the Lemans headed back into the store only to be corralled by a security guard into a chase of two men who had just stolen a pair of "Conway Twitty" vests — \$14.95 each. Leman, his wife in tow, had only slightly better luck this time. "They had parked in the store fire lane so they could make a quick getaway, and we got to them just as they jumped in their car." he said.

"I held my badge to the window and ordered them to stop, but they raced away, out into heavy traffic with no headlights. I thought sure they were going to smash into somebody." They

"I had a gun with me, but I'm not going to shoot somebody for shoplifting," Leman said. The bandits didn't get away Scott free, however, Leman got the license tag number on their car "so it's just a matter of time before we get them." When they do, the crooks face a whole litany of charges - shoplifting, parking in a fire lane,

reckless driving, and failure to obey a lawful order. As for the Leman's plans for next year's 16th wedding anniversary? "Maybe we'll just have a nice quiet dinner at home," Jay said with a grin.



POLK CITY, Fla. (UPI) - A multi-vehicle chain reaction accident in early morning fog and heavy smoke from a wild fire killed at least one person, injured at least 10 and closed down a five-mile section of busy Interstate 4 in Polk County

The accident occured just west of the U.S. 27 interchange and involved between 15 and 20 trucks and cars. One of the trucks involved contained radioactive material

but a state official at the scene said there appeared to be no danger of leakage. At about the same time, another chain-reaction accident occurred about 15 miles north on U.S. 27, west of Walt Disney World, also in morning fog and smoke.

The Florida Highway Patrol reported it involved 10-15 cars and trucks. There were no fatalities but at least one person was reported hospitalized. Troopers were able to keep one lane of traffic open each way at that accident site But on I-4, traffic was detoured around the accident scene

between U.S. 27 and State Road 557. Hours after the accident, victims remained trapped in and under the wreckage and rescuers were hampered in locating the victims because of the dense smoke. A witness at the scene said he could hear screaming coming

"Visibility was zero," said Polk County ambulance supervisor Dale Davis. "The wreckage was end-to-end. There were a few cars that had overturned and were in the ditches." Davis said ambulances transported 10 persons to Winter Haven Hospital and to Heart of Florida Hospital in Haines City. The fatality was taken to Lakeland General Hospital. The wildfire, one of many plaguing Central Florida, was burning on both sides of the interstate linking Orlando and

The FEC Surely **Out Of Order**

The Federal Election Commission was created in the wake of the Watergate scandal to clean up the mess in campaign financing. The last time we checked, hounding the press and encroaching on First Amendment rights was not a part of the commission's charter.

So, why is the commission investigating Reader's Digest magazine? The answer, it seems, is that over zealous FEC officials have stretched their statutory mandate far beyond anything Congress intended or the courts are likely to permit.

At issue is a promotional campaign waged a year ago by Reader's Digest editors to draw attention to a featured article questioning Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's account of the Chappaquiddick accident.

The commission, responding to a "citizen complaint," is probing the magazine's promotional expenditures on the suspicion that these advertising expenses might somehow constitute a campaign contribution to Sen. Kennedy's opponents in last year's Democratic primaries.

Really now, folks! If portions of the Reader's Digest advertising budget qualify as campaign contributions, so might similar expenditures made to promote political reportage in hundreds of other periodicals, newspapers, newsletters and interest group bulletins.

And what about the money spent by publishers to spur sales of countless books defending or attacking politicians? Are these to be viewed as de facto contributions to somebody's campaign as

If so, the First Amendment and unfettered political reporting are in obvious peril. Reader's Digest has gone to court in an effort to block the FEC investigation. Should this fail to restrain the commission's gumshoes, Congress ought to waste no time in amending the FEC's

JACK ANDERSON Why Mike Wallace Shot Down Probe

Minute" fully deserves its reputation as a bold investigative show that specializes in the butchery of sacred cows. It has championed the abused against institutionalized greed and

Yet one of the program's superstars, Mike Wallace, killed an expose of conditions in the poverty-stricken dictatorship of Haiti because he has in-laws living there. His wife, Lorraine, owns a home in the hills above Portau-Prince. Her first cousin, Nancy Chenet, lives on the island with her Haitian husband and their three children. The family also owns a small Haitian arts and crafts store, called

"Ambiance." Over his wife's objections, Wallace did a tough, no-punches-pulled report on Haiti several years ago. But when he learned that his co-star, Morley Safer, was planning an update a few weeks ago, Wallace protested to his colleague and the story was dropped. In a 1972 edition of "60 Minutes" Wallace treaded fearlessly on the toes of the late Francois "Papa Doc" Duvalier, and his son Jean-Claude "Baby Doc" Duvalier, who became his successor. There were some "unlovely facts" that needed reporting Wallace said. And he went on to report them. He used words like "savagery" and "bloody"

to describe life under the Duvaliers. Then, a few weeks ago, Safer prepared a prospectus for a new report on Haiti. He planned to go to Haiti himself to film the show. Wallace learned of his colleague's proposal and implored Safer not to do the

As Wallace remembers the incident, his wife had told him: "I beg you, don't do one of Haiti. Because of my family. You have the

rest of the world. Lay off Haiti." He said his wife's relatives were subjected to "pressure" from the Haitian government after his 1972 "I can't ask you not to," Wallace said he told Safer, "but the family asked me not to." He said Safer replied, "No contest. Forget it." Wallace told my associate Les Whitten

that the family problem was "the sole

reason" for his appeal to Safer.

Safer would not comment, but

derstood he felt he had been "leaned on very hard" and had been "put in a difficult position" by Wallace. Safer also told friends that Wallace seemed concerned about his wife's family's business interests and his own liking for Haiti vacations, saying "I would never be able to go back" if the show were

There the matter stands. The proposed expose of Baby Doc's Haiti is in limbo. CBS network officials are keeping hands off, but would be willing to run such a report if "60 Minutes" schedules it. Safer is reportedly pondering whether to let the sleeping Doc story lie, or revive it despite Wallace's ob-





Beginning Guitar Is Pure Enjoyment

By CINDY MOOY **Herald Staff Writer**

'It's a plain old, B-flat, learn-to-play-foryour-own-enjoyment class."

That's how Ron Gilotti describes the beginning guitar course he is teaching for the Leisure Time Program at Seminole Community College (SCC).

The 10-week course in "Class Guitar" for adults with little or no previous experience starts from scratch — how to hold the guitar to reading music to building chords. By the end of ten weeks, students are able to accompany themselves in song.

Most of his students take the course for that


