The Navy Goes Modern

Even the navy admits times have changed. The sailor suit, with its blouse, bell-bottom trousers, pancake hat and all, is to give way to a modern uniform modelled after army dress, including the popular "General Ike" belted jacket. In fact, the new attire is now being tried out by 2,500 sailors acting as fashion models in the Atlantic and Pacific fleets and in shore stations.

Trousers that were bell-like for ease in rolling up for deck swabbings, are to be regular style since dungarees are now donned for ship cleanings. The blouse so unbecomingly to the plump was tight to avoid tangling with sailing vessels' rigging. The square collar was evolved from a hub worn for protection against greased pistons of open days. The substitute is a modern army style shirt. The knotted necktie is said to be a survival of a morning dress detail adopted by the British at Lord Nelson's death and carried over into American ranks. The new style tie retains the black color, but will still be the ordinary four-in-hand. The old plate-shaped hat comes from brimmed straws worn as sun protectors in the tropics and will be replaced by the Admiral Mitscher work cap and visored head gear like that of petty officers, with the brim white cap retained for summer. Silhouettes of sailor and soldier will be practically identical, but blue will remain the seaman's color and khaki the army's.

With the tradition-conscious navy going in for such radical innovations, it looks as if the only thing one can be sure won't change is change itself.

RURAL SENSE

While it will be some time yet before things return to normal from the hurly-burly conditions that existed during the war, evidence already exists that the trend toward normal is beginning. This is true in the farm field as well as in industry.

Because the need for food and fiber and other farm products was so great during the war, farmers were able to sell practically anything they could produce at a profit, and to get a good price for it. With ceiling prices limiting the top amount that could be paid for numerous farm products, the tendency was to pay near the ceiling for all goods, whether they were good, bad or indifferent. The price gap that exists today exists between high and low quality products was largely closed.

Fine-cured tobacco growers, for instance, could get much higher prices for good, long or middle leaf tobacco than they could for only a few years ago, the only stages that left the field were 'No. 1 quality' or at least the quality of the year.

That the situation is already changing is indicated by the Quincey chairman of the State AAA Committee, said recently, Florida farmers are apt to find the grade and quality price situation in 1946 considerably different from what it has been for the quality of the year.

Farmer themselves, while they have taken pains to produce good crops, they have not paid for their poor quality products, did not like the situation that existed, and the something else near a realistic price. They believed that as they have for years, that the better products should bring the higher prices. And it seems that

NEW YORK, Jan. 8. (AP)—Several years ago the New York Yankees had a relief pitcher named Henry Johnson who was pretty easygoing and nonchalant about his approach to the diamond game. With Henry it was just another day's labor when he was called into action.

One day he was in the bull pen and had just bought a hot dog when the Yankee bench wiggled him to start warming up. He was a little put out that the word had come at just that moment—he hadn't even taken his first bite of the frankfurter.

But duty was duty and Henry carefully wrapped the dog, put it down on the bench and as he reached for his glove, he said: "Don't nobody touch that. If I have to go in I'll be back before it gets cold."

Henry Pickard Is Rated Best Sports Comeback In 1945

NEW YORK—When Henry Pickard, the gentleman farmer-golfer, shot a sizzling seven under par 63 to smash the course record and win the \$10,000 Miami open golf tournament, he climaxed one of the greatest sports comebacks in 1945.

It was just 12 years ago when Henry was 25 that he got himself a national reputation by defeating Walter Hagen for the Carolina open championship.
