

U.S. Entrants In Miss Universe Contest 'Nervous'

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Foreign entrants in the Miss Universe contest slept late today but the tension that has already shown itself gripped the United States entrants as they prepared for preliminary judging.

Judges will select 15 of the 43 entrants from the 24 tonight as finalists in the Miss U. S. A. contest. The winning American girl will be chosen Thursday night and will compete with the foreign beauties for the Miss Universe title.

At Tuesday's rehearsals before the girls were led at a formal dinner at the Brazilian consulate, imperious few short and the pace of nearly a week of hard partying was apparent.

Miss Switzerland and Miss Louisiana were confined to their hotel rooms because of minor illnesses.

Miss Florida, Nancy Wakefield, was sent back to her room after she fainted on stage twice. The blonde charmer had undergone a rigorous three days at a local health resort to lose weight. Miss Brazil, Gina McPherson, slept through half the proceedings leaning on her chaperone's shoulder. She, too, was sent to her hotel.

Miss Kansas, Peggy Sue Peterson, fell asleep sitting on the stage of convention hall but managed to make it through the run-through.

Moments after newsmen had interviewed Miss Sweden, Birgitta Oefling, she burst into tears and asked, "Why can't we go back to New York?"

"We had so much fun there," she whispered. "We haven't had time to meet anyone here and they keep us going all the time. I'm so tired."

A pageant official said, "She's just homesick, homesick and scared. Birgitta is one of the more high-strung girls and she's feeling the pressure a little earlier than many."

The girls hurried to the beauty parlor after rehearsals ended. "I've been unable to have my hair done yet," said Miss England, Joan Boardman. "And I so wanted to get a suntan."

Contest officials have forbidden the girls to sunbathe because of possible sunburn and also because one of the main sponsors makes suntan lotion.

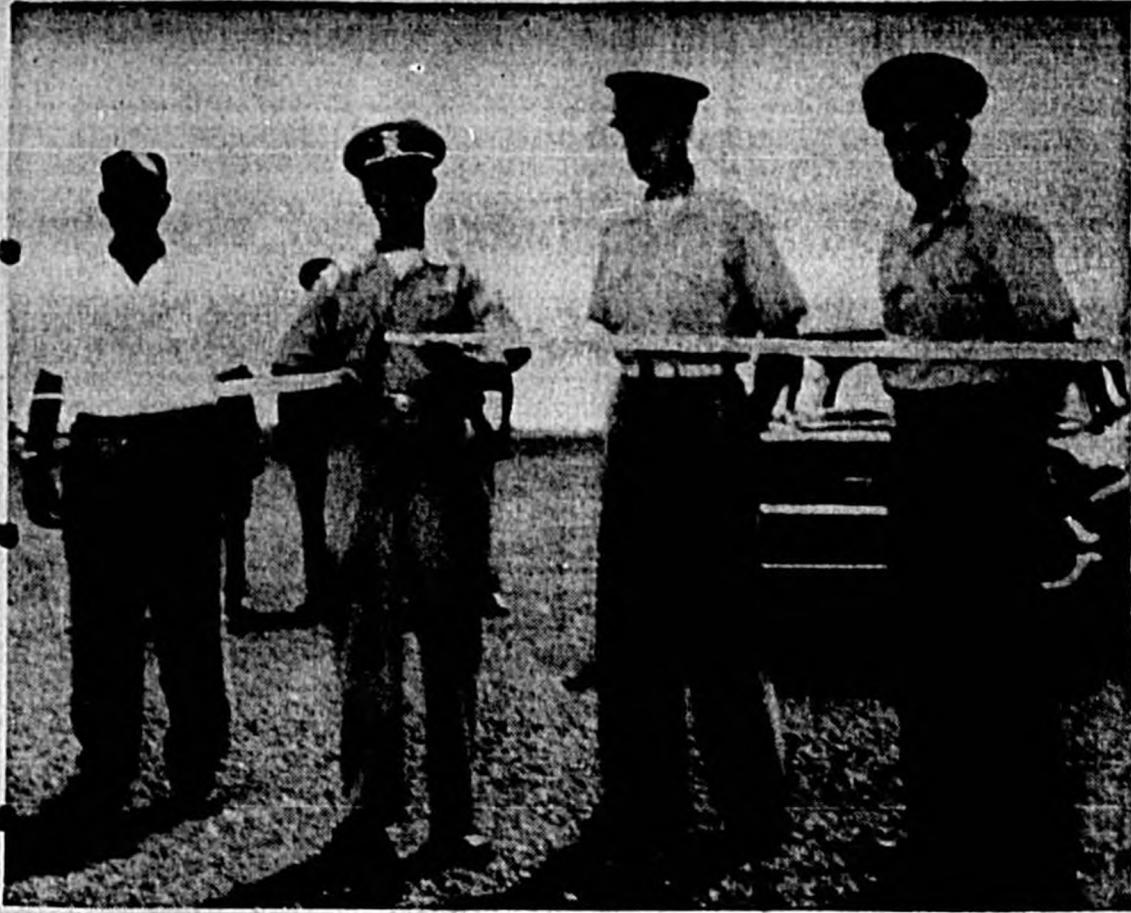

SHS Rooms Ready By Fall

Architect John Burton told the County School Board today that rooms at the new Seminole High School will be ready by the fall term.

With Burton's announcement, Supl. of Schools R. T. Milwee told board members that "at this time there is no indication of double sessions being held at the new school to be located on Lake Jennie."

Rumors had circulated throughout the county that the classrooms wouldn't be ready by fall and that the board would be forced to hold double sessions until the rooms were completed.

However, Burton reported that there is a possibility that work on the cafeteria, gym and auditorium may not be completed in time for the school's opening the first week in September.

The new school is expected to house 1,050 students. Work on the school started last November.

In other school business, the board started its preliminary work on the new budget and hopes to have it ready by the end of the month.

Milwee said that next year's budget would be somewhat higher than the current one because of the large increase in enrollment.

New Principals Named At Lake Monroe, Oviedo

The County School Board today appointed Carlton Henley to replace W. H. Deshazo as principal of Oviedo High School and named Morris Ruby as the new principal of the Lake Monroe School.

The board made the appointments on the recommendations of the board of trustees.

Deshazo was appointed earlier as supervisor of secondary education for all county public schools, while John Angel, former principal at Lake Monroe, was named principal of the new Longwood school.

Teacher appointments made by the board today were Mrs. Lila Ruby at the Lake Monroe School and Bettie Jo Palmer and James Edward Palmer at the Oviedo School.

Lyman School will have three new teachers, Miss Elizabeth Frim, Thomas Leroy Eichel and Junior Rae Cole.

South Seminole will have the greatest number of additions to the teaching staff. The five new appointments are Mrs. Ollie Kirkland, Mrs. Vivian Nemecek, Walter J. Nemecek Mrs. Joyce West.

Key Italian Cities Hit By Red Strikes

ROME (UPI) — Communist-led unions called general strikes in key Italian cities today in a campaign to crush the neo-Fascist resurgence and topple the government of Premier Fernando Tambroni.

Italy, torn by strikes and demonstrations, is having its worst trouble with the Communists since the violent days of 1948.

Police kept riot squads on the alert in Rome following a massive street fight Wednesday night in which more than 90 persons were injured. The area around the ancient gate of St. Paul's was littered with cobblestones and debris used by the angry mob against police.

Harriman Says Kennedy Will Win

NEW YORK (UPI) — Former New York Governor Averell Harriman predicted a second ballot victory today for Sen. John Kennedy before departing by plane for the national Democratic convention in Los Angeles.

Harriman said that he felt that the exchange between Kennedy and former President Harry S. Truman over the past weekend "strengthened" Kennedy's chances. He said that the young senator demonstrated "poise, judgment and maturity under attack."

Named To Board

Mrs. Donald Jones of Sanford today was appointed to the Seminole County Welfare Board by Gov. LeRoy Collins. She succeeds Mrs. Mary Holler, who resigned.

Khrushchev Tones Down After Protest

VIENNA (UPI) — A sharp U. S. protest to the Austrian government apparently caused Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev to tone down his anti-American diatribes, diplomatic sources said today.

U. S. Ambassador H. Freeman Matthews protested verbally Wednesday afternoon that Khrushchev had been allowed to attack "friendly nations" in the presence of Austrian government officials.

In the presence of Austrian Chancellor Julius Raab Saturday Khrushchev had termed U. S. foreign policy "sheer piracy." Sunday night he told Austrians not to rely on the United States because it "wastes no pains on small nations."

Wednesday night, in a speech at Klagenfurt after the U. S. protest, Khrushchev dropped from his prepared text a remark about "influential Americans who wrecked the Paris summit."

He changed a reference to "American rocket bases in Italy" to "foreign bases."

It was obvious that the Austrian foreign ministry had acted on the complaint.

The opening ceremonies of the new university will be held on September 8, 1960, at the Seminole County Welfare Board building at the school located in Tampa, announced.

Congo Mutiny Spreads To Prison

LEOPOLDVILLE, Congo (UPI) — Violence flared again today in the newly-independent Congo republic when prisoners at the Stanleyville central prison revolted, broke through the prison gates and raced through the town.

The prison break came on the heels of a mutiny by the one-loyal "Force Publique," the Congolese national army, which revolted against European and the day-old government.

The mutiny, which spread through the country, was marked by demands for better pay, combined with a system of promotions within the force and the discharge of Europeans holding commands.

Reports of the prison-break reached police headquarters in Leopoldville, which is approximately 831 miles southwest of

Stanleyville, the capital of the eastern province.

There were no details on how many prisoners were involved. Reports said the prisoners ran out shouting "independence" and headed for the provincial government building.

In Leopoldville, Belgian paratroopers stood guard to protect Europeans.

Outside the capital Europeans were banding together in groups for common defense against the possibility of widespread violence.

They were thrown into near panic by a statement by Prime Minister Patrice Lumumba that European officers and non-coms of the "Force Publique" were responsible for the trouble and would be punished severely.

Lumumba and President Joseph Kasu Vubu left the capital by

road Wednesday night to try to quiet mutineers at Thyville, about 80 miles away, where 1,000 armed rebel troops sealed off the town.

A radio appeal from Lumumba for the rebels to lay down their arms and a promise that they would get better pay and ranks failed to improve the situation.

The 100 Belgian officers at Thyville were reported to have taken refuge on two hillsides inside the camp along with their families and 300 native troops who remained loyal to them.

In Leopoldville, several hundred African troops demanded that Maj. Gen. Emile Janssens, commander in chief of the 30,000-man Force Publique, leave the country. Janssens announced his resignation and several of his top aides followed suit.

Seaside Rest

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower flies to Newport, R. I., today to begin a seaside vacation which he will interrupt July 26 for a trip to Chicago to address the Republican national convention.

Legal Action Nears

ATLANTA (UPI) — An official of Northwest Airlines indicated his company may take legal action to recover its pilots from taking part in a possible tie-up of airline passenger service in eight southeastern states. The Air Line Pilots Association announced Wednesday its members have voted 293-3 to honor picket lines of Southern Airways pilots, who have been on strike since June 8.

Kennedy's Bodyguard

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A burly former policeman who has fought gun battles with hoodlums resigned today as a Senate investigator to take the job of guarding Sen. John F. Kennedy (D-Mass.) of the Democratic national convention in Los Angeles.

Stone Sober

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A bipartisan pair of passengers said today that Louisiana's national committeeman was stone sober and not drunk, as charged, when he arrived in Los Angeles aboard an airliner last Friday night. One of Camille Gravel's fellow passengers, a Republican, even reminded him, and not Gravel, was the mysterious Martin pilot of Delta-American Flight 981.

Ready For Attack

BENSON, Ariz. (UPI) — About 100 members of a small religious sect remained hidden today in bomb shelters and cellars of their sealed homes, fearful of a Russian nuclear attack within two days. Two men, women and children went underground Monday night and refused to answer their telephones or open their doors to visitors or newsmen because: "We're afraid the Soviet Union is going to attack the United States by Saturday."

Murder Charge

WETUMPKA, Ala. (UPI) — A would-be lawyer who kept powerful German rifle at his lake-side cabin was charged with murder Wednesday night in the mysterious death of a 9-year-old girl. John Wilbanks, 41, of Sarasota, was arrested in the death of blonde Barbara King. The child's skull and face were shattered Sunday as she was shooting firecrackers just a few feet from where her father, Birmingham insurance man John L. King, was sitting.

Freak Accident

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — John Henry Knight, an automobile body shop employe, was electrocuted Wednesday while using an electric drill to make a hole in the side of a car. Investigators said the ground was damp where he was standing and his clothes were wet from perspiration.

Yanks Ready To Pull Out Of Cuba; Castro Says Fight Just Beginning

HAVANA, Cuba (UPI)—A growing number of Americans were reported preparing to pull out of Cuba today in the face of probable seizure of all remaining U. S.-owned property and the possibility of increasing anti-Americanism.

Cuban Premier Fidel Castro underscored the deteriorating situation with another wild-eyed denunciation of the United States for slashing Cuba's sugar quota Wednesday.

There has been a big exodus of American residents from Cuba in the past year, reducing from 6,000 to about 3,000 the number left here. But in the face of worsening relations, the exodus is being stepped up, with private companies getting their employees and families out of the country. The U. S. embassy is not urging Americans to leave.

In an angry post-midnight two-hour speech before the closing session of the metal workers union

congress, Castro said the United States slashed the Cuban sugar quota in a "frenzy of hate."

This was his first public reaction to President Eisenhower's action. Castro declared that the "real fight" is just starting with the United States. He charged that Washington was trying to run Cuba and ruin its economy.

But Castro surprised some observers by failing to announce specific reprisals for the sugar cut. It was believed that he may wait until a scheduled television address Friday night, or a monster protest rally Sunday afternoon.

Castro did not go into any details on what plans he has for seizing U. S.-owned property in Cuba. His cabinet gave him and President Osvaldo Dorticos authorization late Tuesday night to appropriate such property by decree.

Addressing himself to the United States government, the young revolutionary leader declared: "We will resist your aggressions."

We now understand that the real fight is just beginning. How many years we may have to suffer your aggressions! But how heroic our people is and how geared to meet this long moving and heroic struggle!"

Castro appeared for his midnight speaking stint at CTC Labor Federation headquarters in fine spirits. He showed no sign of the strain brought by weeks of cold war with the United States and recent stunning defections within the ranks of the Cuban foreign service.

Although he was fully prepared for the cut in the sugar quota, observers believed the size of slash came as a shock to him.

Eisenhower lopped off 86,000 tons from the amount of Cuban sugar that was to have been assigned for American domestic consumption during the remainder of this year. Experts estimated this would cost Cuba more than 70

million unless it could find other markets.

Castro, in an obvious appeal for world sympathy, condemned those who "in a frenzy of hate want to sink a people in hunger and ruin." He maintained that Cuba's "reason" made it stronger than the United States, with all its "physical strength."

The president's decree cutting Cuba's sugar quota threatened today to bring new seizure of American property by Castro's government.

It sent the United States shopping around the world for some 900,000 tons of raw sugar to meet domestic needs in the next six months.

It brought a sudden boom to other sugar producing nations.

And it raised doubts that Cuba, even with a change of heart in its "little cold war" against this country, could ever fully regain its preferential spot in the U. S. sugar market.

Spy Ring 'Brains' Named As New Red Ambassador To Cuba

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sergei Kudryavtsev, who masterminded a widespread Soviet spy ring in Canada during World War II, was named today as Russian ambassador to Cuba.

That news agency reported in Moscow that Kudryavtsev, now minister counselor of the Russian embassy in Paris, had been appointed to the Havana post by the Supreme Soviet Presidium.

His new assignment was viewed here as a move to set up a Soviet espionage net at the doorstep of the big U. S. Guantanamo Bay naval base and less than 100 miles from the Florida coast.

The appointment was sure to put a new strain on deteriorating U. S.-Cuban relations and add support to the view of some congressmen that Fidel Castro's anti-American regime is rapidly becoming a Communist satellite.

As first secretary of the Soviet legation in Canada between 1942 and 1945, Kudryavtsev was one of the early bosses of the espionage ring in that country.

The operation was exposed when Igor Gouzenko, a code clerk, defected to the West on Sept. 5, 1945.

The Canadian royal commission that studied the spy ring, said Kudryavtsev was "the first head of the military intelligence espionage system in Canada" after the Soviet Union opened a diplomatic mission in Ottawa in 1942.

One of the spies who fed the Russian secret information was Dr. Allan Nunn May, a British nuclear scientist who worked on the U. S. project that developed the A-bomb and Canada's atomic energy project.

In June 1947 Kudryavtsev came to the United States as an advisor to the Soviet delegation to the United Nations. His presence in this country in the wake of the Canadian spy disclosures stirred up such a storm of press and public opposition that he was recalled four months later.

Clue To Mystery?

SANTA ANA, Calif. (UPI) — Word was awaited today on whether a generator found in the bay of Salpan was from the airplane in which aviatrix Amelia Earhart disappeared in 1937.

Paul Mantz, a Santa Ana air service operator who outfitted Miss Earhart's plane for an around-the-world flight 23 years ago, Wednesday positively identified a coral-encrusted generator as identical to one he ordered for the missing craft.

He refused to definitely say it was from the plane, however, pending a check of the serial numbers with the Bendix Corp. in New Jersey, maker of the generator.

Mantz said the generator returned here from Salpan was taken apart and showed discernible numbers on the back. He said there was no doubt it was the model E5 Bendix Eclipse generator, the kind he ordered for the Earhart-Fred Noonan flight.

Possible solution of the 23-year-old mystery of what happened to Miss Earhart and her navigator, Noonan, was offered last week when a radio newsmen said he believed the aviatrix and Noonan crashed in the bay of Salpan, opposite a Japanese naval base, and were executed as spies.

Extensive Search On For Blimp Victims

BARNEGAT LIGHT, N. J. (UPI) — Promen were sped today to the wreckage of the giant Navy blimp ZP-3W in a desperate effort to retrieve bodies of 17 men presumed dead in its gondola before heavy seas break up the crashed airship's remains.

The cause of the crash Wednesday during a mercy mission off the New Jersey coast remained a mystery. One of the three survivors denied any explosion occurred.

Navy authorities feared the gondola might break up within hours and the bodies of the trapped men might be claimed forever by the sea, along with clues to what brought the disaster.

Even as investigations were begun into the cause of collapse and sinking of the lighter-than-air ship, a long-time veteran of such flights charged the tragedy was "undoubtedly related to the questionable wisdom of building such large airships on the non-compartmented or blimp principle."

Retired Adm. C. E. Rosendahl said in New York: "This is not just another airship accident to be swept under the rug with another condemnation of airships in general."

Rosendahl blamed the tragedy partly on "the Navy's continued blind refusal to properly evaluate, admit and benefit from the right airship lessons of the past and so build compartmented structural airships." He demanded a congressional or other "neutral" investigation.

The Reliance class airship collapsed and went down 18 miles off the Jersey Coast, south of Barnegat Light on Long Beach Island. One man who escaped from the wreckage and was picked up, died. There were three known survivors. Eight officers and 13 enlisted men had been aboard.

The eyewitness account of one of the survivors, aviation electrician 3C Antonio Contreras of Germantown, Tex., said: "We were cruising at about 300 feet. I heard a loud noise, but it was not an explosion. We hit the water within seconds at about a 45-degree nosedown angle. No ditching alarm was sounded. I exited through an aft door.

The blimp had taken off from the Lakeland Naval Air Station on the Jersey shore Wednesday morning to search for two vessels reported overdue in the Newport, R. I.-to-Bermuda yacht race. Both yachts turned up safe.

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Negro spokesmen and southern student "sit-in" leaders demanded today that the Democratic Party write front-rank civil rights guarantees into its 1960 platform and expel segregationists from party ranks.

They placed their demands before the 108-member Democratic platform committee as liberals on that group declared intentions to press for a plank supporting the southern sit-ins and calling for further federal action in the civil rights field.

The explosive issue was the main one before the committee in its third day of public hearings leading to actual drafting of the platform on which the Democratic national convention will meet next Tuesday.

However, a variety of other issues was scheduled for presentation by witnesses ranging from Walter Reuther, president of the United Auto Workers Union, to a representative of the World Population Emergency Campaign Committee.

The American Council on Judaism, a non-Zionist group, asked for a statement saying Israel does not speak for American Jews. Alaska's Committeewoman Helen M. Fisher, urged a plank recognizing the 4th state's great hydroelectric power potential. And the textile industry asked for support of its efforts to curb imports.

Tractor Crushes Car; 2 Killed

GRiffin, Ga. (UPI) — A 49-year-old woman and her 13-year-old son were killed Wednesday when their car was crushed beneath a tractor-trailer near Griffin.

Officers identified the two as Mrs. Leta Bellburn and Dennis Bellburn, a 60-year-old passenger in the same car, was reported in critical condition in the hospital where he was taken.

Brown Expected To Back Kennedy

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown of California is expected to endorse Sen. John F. Kennedy for the Democratic presidential nomination by Sunday or earlier and to carry with him a majority of the state's 13-vote delegation, highly placed California Democratic informants said today.

In this terming convention city there a new wave of kingsmakers is today, Brown was receiving calls and callers variously urging him to declare for the Massachusetts senator—and to hold off.

Brown, a favorite son candidate of the delegation, was expected to announce his support of front-running Kennedy as a personal choice, and release the delegation from voting for himself on the first ballot.

Although figures can change quickly in the heat of the political race, the latest poll of the California delegation by a man in close touch with all the delegates showed 33 votes would be cast for Kennedy if Brown gives the Massachusetts senator his support.

Speaker Sam Rayburn arrived today to take charge of the campaign to win the nomination for his fellow Texan, Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson. Other arrivals will be the uncommitted Gov. David L. Lawrence of Pennsylvania, who may hold the key to the course of the convention, and Mayor Richard J. Daley of Chicago.

Gov. G. Mennen Williams of Michigan, who declared for Kennedy a month ago, arrived Wednesday along with pro-Kennedy leaders of the New York Democratic organization and Sen. A. S. (Mike) Murray of Oklahoma, leader of the campaign to draft Adlai E. Stevenson for a third nomination.

Monroey spent more than an hour with Brown at Sacramento Wednesday making his pitch for Stevenson and trying against an endorsement of Kennedy. Brown was reported to have given no commitment.

Congo Troops Block Mutineers

Convict Testified He Saw Fellow Inmate Gassed Unconscious

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Convicted robber Frank Beck testified Wednesday he saw convict Talmadge Sellers, who died in prison of a "circulatory collapse," tear gassed into unconsciousness "two or three times" in an airlock room.

Beck, 36, serving a 30-year sentence, was the second convict witness against 14 former guards accused of mistreating convicts at Raiford Prison's maximum security building in 1958.

Two to four more convicts are expected to testify at the trial today.

Beck said his cell was at the end of a block across from a storage room. He said he saw Sellers taken in the room two or three times and tear gas shot into the room after all the cracks had been sealed. Sellers was carried out unconscious, he said.

The guards are accused of depriving 31 convicts, including Sellers, of their constitutional rights

by unusually severe punishments.

Beck testified he was once shackled to his cell bars, with cuffs on his wrists and shackles on his ankles, for 42 hours. The first of the convict witnesses, Thomas Jack Shaw, 30, who has since been released and now works at a Hawthorne filling station, said he was once hung up naked for 22 hours and hoisted down because guards found an unauthorized cereal bowl in his cell.

Beck said he was hung up and hoisted because he threw a towel to James Smith, who had also been shackled and hoisted. After the first two or three hours, Beck testified, "I was in continual pain."

Beck said a medical technician once came by while he was shackled. He said he told the technician he was in pain, but that the technician advised him he had orders not to offer any help to any convicts who were shackled.

Congo Mutineers March On Capital

LEOPOLDVILLE, Congo (UPI) — A group of well-armed mutineers from the native Congolese army was marching toward this capital today in a move that threatened the security of the six-day-old republic.

The mutineers rose up at their station at Hardy Camp, Thysville, about 124 miles south of here. They overpowered and arrested their white Belgian officers, commandeered trucks and cars and headed for Leopoldville.

Latest reports said the mutineers had passed through the town of Madimba, about 48 miles from the capital, after persuading loyal troops sent out to head them off to join in the march on this city.

Premier and Defense Minister Patrice Lumumba ordered an armored column of so-far loyal troops to head off the mutineers. The rebels apparently want more pay, better living conditions and their Belgian officers fired and replaced by native Africans.

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Beauty is truth, shocked officials of the Miss Universe contest cried today. The Miss U. S. A. who will be chosen tonight from among 15 finalists will have to win on her own attributes without "falsies" or "waist cinchures."

A watchful official of Catalina swimsuits, which owns title to the contest, looked closely at the American girls preparing to go on stage Wednesday night and made a startling discovery.

"I made those swimsuits," she said. "I can tell when there's something there that's not supposed to be."

Sure enough, 20 of the contestants were found to be cheating. They had on falsies.

The Catalina official, who asked to remain anonymous, said she demanded that all such artifices be removed, but six girls tried to go on stage without doing so. They were stopped.

"I let them get away with it for photographs," the Catalina lady said, "but I couldn't do it in the contest."

She said one girl was found to be wearing a "waist cinchure," something similar to a corset, and "I don't think it's fair for the girls to wear such things. It's cheating."

The 16 U. S. finalists include Corrine Huff, 19, of Youngstown, Ohio, the first American Negro to compete in the Miss Universe contest.

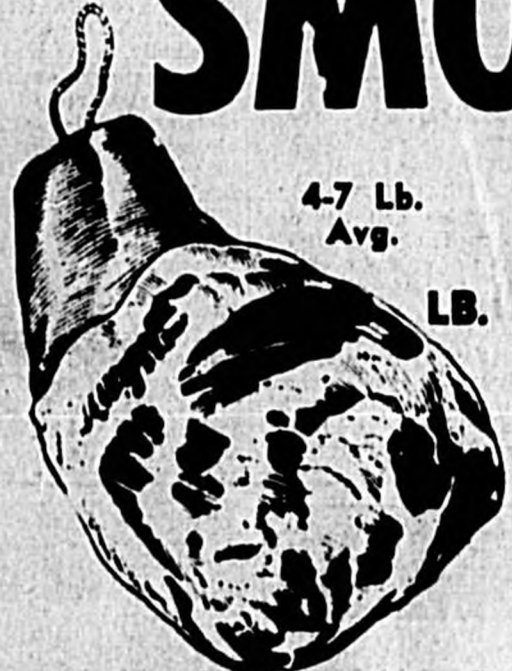

WASHINGTON CALLING by Marquis Childs

GLACIER NATIONAL PARK, Mont.—Once a year the governors of America's 50 states come together for the kind of outing they have just had here. Like princes of the blood they assemble with their entourages to get the full ceremonial treatment and to discuss in solemn conclaves their mutual troubles.

But a great deal of the time, when they are not on public display, they lament over what a rough, tough life a governor leads. And they give convincing evidence of the hazard of holding public office under a system that with the overlapping and duplication of federal, state and local levels of government is perhaps as wasteful as any history has ever seen.

It is not the fault of these men. Given all the penalties attached to running for office, the average seems fairly high. They have inherited the system in which they seem inextricably tangled and they struggle from day to day to survive.

The premiums all seem to be on inefficiency, indifference, waste and even graft. Where the term is for only two years the governor, once elected, must begin immediately to campaign for re-election. Where the state constitution provides that

a governor may hold only one term there is little incentive to do more than get through the job. With a career interrupted the governor, once a term is ended, must somehow rehabilitate himself and get back into private life. If he has tried to be honest and has refrained wherever possible from dispensing favors he may find this extremely difficult.

What, above all, this conference has shown, as have others in the recent years, is that the states are increasingly dependencies of the federal government. The federal government has pre-empted the great source of tax revenue and virtually every governor must scratch for funds to scrape by on. With more and more services to provide the consequence is that almost everything is skimmed, and vital institutions, such as mental hospitals, are constantly being exposed as little better than dungeons.

Gov. Orville Freeman pointed out, the squeeze gets worse with the federal share of all government spending for domestic purposes decreasing from 47 percent in 1948 to 35 percent in 1957. The states must fill in most of this gap. So the pressure on the governors is to step up the sales tax, pushing the cost of government onto low-

er-income families. Since sales taxes are notoriously unpopular, the harassed governor shrinks from this expedient, knowing it may well defeat him.

The dependency is political as well as economic and that has been evident in this presidential year. The fate of many governors, or so they believe, hangs on the national ticket.

Gov. Christopher Del Sesto of Rhode Island, who as a Republican squeaked into office two years ago, is fearful that if Senator Kennedy is the Democratic nominee the Republicans will abandon New England and he will go down to defeat. In Iowa Gov. Herralb Lovelace, a Democrat, running for the Senate, is afraid that neither Kennedy nor any Democrat can carry his state and so quite understandably he is out to save himself, as he did in 1956 when he ran 250,000 votes ahead of Adlai Stevenson.

In Michigan Gov. G. Mennen Williams has played out his string after six two-year terms as governor. Much of the time he spent in mortal combat with a Republican legislature—one of the interesting obstacles in the way of any government at all being the division of powers between legislature and executive. All out for Kennedy, Williams is now looking to the national scene for public office. He is fortunate in being a rich man.

Gov. Robert B. Meyner of New Jersey, serving his second term which expires at the end of next year, faces the problem of so many governors—what to do next? He is rated an able governor, but having to make so many tough decisions on taxes and services a governor is bound to make more enemies than friends. If no Senate seat is open, then a political career comes to a full stop.

Under the Eisenhower administration the unrelenting pressure has been to push onto the states a greater share of the cost of government. And without too much success the states have fought back. This kind of general problem which is the proliferating burden of an impenetrable jungle of government. The very fact of so many states—six, for example, in the tiny area of New England—is an anachronism.

There was not the slightest sign here that anyone is about to face up to the central problem. But it is perfectly obvious that the longer this is postponed the greater will be the deterioration at almost every level.

WORRY CLINIC by Dr. G. W. Crane

Norman says he wishes to get his hands around his wife's throat. Not to hug her! No, he wants to strangle her. He says he is going berserk because of her selfish, slovenly habits. Wives, take care that you aren't unwittingly driving your mate away from you by carelessness in household duties.

CASE F-110: Norman G., aged 36, is a dentist who recently married.

"Dr. Crane, I'm desperate," he speaks morosely. "Maybe it isn't gallant to criticize my wife when she isn't here to defend herself.

"But I literally feel like strangling her, and I'm not joking! She irritates me so much that at times my fingers just itch to take her by the throat and choke her.

"And I'll tell you why. I was a bachelor until the age of 35. I had my own apartment and did much of my own cooking.

"Maybe I'm too finicky, too, for I always was scrupulously neat in my household, as well as in my dental office.

"Let me give you some specific cases. After I take a shower, I always hang the wet towel neatly on the towel rack so the edges are even.

"My wash cloth is likewise hung in precise fashion. I methodically put the soap in the soap container and also wipe off the spots of toothpaste from the mirror after brushing my teeth.

"My wife was a beautiful woman from a fine family. But she is the sloppiest female I ever saw inside her own home.

"When she takes a bath, she may leave the soap on the bottom of the tub. And she'll drape her wet towel over the side of the tub.

"Her wash cloth will be left in the wash basin or dangling over one side.

"She also spills face powder on her dressing table and leaves it. It doesn't seem to disturb her at all to pare an apple and leave the peelings on the drain board to stain the enamel over night.

"Well, for a year I've cleaned up after her, as if she were a child. And maybe I might have continued without protest.

"But she is mentally slovenly, too. For she refused to join the choir in our church, though she has a good voice.

"She was asked to teach a Sunday school class, too, which she declined, though her parents spent nearly \$8,000 giving her four years of college.

"And she belongs to no constructive organizations except a canasta club where a bunch of idle women gossip away their afternoons.

"It was brought up with the idea that to whom much is given, much will be expected. In other words, if a person has occupied valuable desk space in college for four years, he should return something to society in repayment of that specialized training.

"And playing canasta doesn't justify four years in college! So I have become so nauseated by the sight of my wife that I literally can't kiss her anymore or even be civil to her. She disgusts my soul!"

Norman's wife was a spoiled, only child whose mother waited on her hand and foot.

She wasn't taught the simple A-B-C's of household chores, such as cleaning out the tub after her bath, hanging up wet towels, etc.

And because she had gotten away with her inconsiderate actions for 30 years, she didn't even realize she was now a selfish, thoughtless wife.

Her case shows that many parents are accessories to the divorces which their children later enter.

For if parents don't train their children to carry their proper share of duties and family chores, then those parents are negligent.

It isn't enough to vaccinate your child against diphtheria and small pox. You should likewise inoculate him against divorce by house-breaking him for domestic responsibilities while he is still a teenager.

"The dogs bark, but the caravan moves on" is an age-old proverb that has a valuable lesson for those bothered by unfair criticism. When the big caravan stops even momentarily to argue with the little dogs, it suffers two losses. Progress is held up and the barking is usually increased rather than lessened.

WASHINGTON by Ed Koterba

IN TEXAS—As the traveler moves westward along routes of the Democratic South, he finds—as the political attitudes change like the scenery.

For 2,000 miles and 10 days I've grabbed hold of the grocer's pulse while Doty took her change; I put my ear to the ground while she hung clothes in the trailer parks; and I siphoned opinions while the gas station man siphoned gas.

And from this has emerged a loosely glued mosaic of political America. Perhaps it will hold through next week's convention. And perhaps not.

But, summed up, the roots of the Southern grasslands have sprouted this consensus: There will be a Democrat in the White House—unless Sen. John F. Kennedy is the Democratic nominee. In that case, the new President will be a Republican—Richard Nixon.

Now, the folks who've told us this are not political professionals. They expressed opinions as one does around the family dinner table. They were not speaking for any specialized polls—or clubs or sticks, for that matter. In fact, they had no idea they were speaking "for the record," for no notes were taken in their presence.

We had found strong Kennedy sentiment in the states of the Southeast, especially so in Florida. But now we find largely deep-seated misgivings about Kennedy's fast approach to the finish line.

Perhaps the off-duty postal clerk lumped together best the expressions we've heard the past several days.

"There are three things that's going to defeat Kennedy if he is nominated," the man said. "He hasn't had enough experience in leadership that I can see, and what makes this wear so badly on Kennedy is he's so young-lookin' to boot."

The man paused and eyed me, as if to check whether I was worthy of being confided in. Then he leaned over and said, "I'm not anti-Catholic, but the third point is religion. They say the religious issue was licked in West Virginia, but I know it hasn't been in our section. Folks just don't talk about it on the surface. . . . If nothing else, defeats Kennedy, his religion will."

If Kennedy has his "anti's" in the South, so does Sen. Lyndon Johnson. And what's more—right in his own state of Texas.

One newspaper editor put it this way: "Johnson is too conservative for the ultra liberals, and too liberal for the ultra conservatives—and we have a lot of both in Texas."

Actually, to my surprise, there is almost as much moral support for Adlai Stevenson in this Lone Star State as there is for the lanky Senate majority leader, who heads to the convention as the "favorite son."

But you can't be too certain about politics in Texas. I recall four years ago Cactus Jack Garner sitting down at his table at his home in Uvalde and proposing: "Tell you what I'll do. I'll bet you a case of Jack Daniel that Stevenson will carry Texas."

Well, like Texas in '56, and I've been kicking myself ever since. I had declined the bet.

That will be true. The product of good quality will, if properly cared for, last indefinitely. Proper care means it must be kept out of the hands of unskilled persons who do not know how to use it. It must be constantly rescued from being left out in the rain. It must at all times be thoroughly lubricated.

The product of good quality should not be endangered by being lent to neighbors. Because of its good quality there will be greater temptation not to return it. Since it is not theirs neighbors will be careless with it. Thinking up excuses for not lending it to them will tax the imagination of the owners. Even if they succeed in keeping it away from the neighbors they will get a reputation for being stingy.

As the years go by the product of good quality will survive while those of poor quality disappear and are replaced. Styles will change and the product of good quality will remain the same. Critical persons will look at it and smile derisively.

Repairmen will scorn working on it. Then it will be found that the product is not made any more and it is impossible to get spare parts. Even the owners will get tired of it.

They will conclude it's better to be like everybody else and buy products of poor quality that last no more than a couple of years before having to be replaced by something nice and new.

Pirates Dominate N L All - Stars

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI)—Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals broke still another record today when he was named to the National League All-Star squad for the 17th time, but the Pittsburgh Pirates dominated the team with eight members.

The 30-year-old Musial was breaking his own mark for the greatest number of All-Star selections. Ted Williams of Boston, who was named to the American League squad this week for the 16th time, holds the AL mark.

Musial's selection this time appeared a heavy sentimental choice, for the once-famous "man" has only a .279 batting average with just four home runs.

The Cardinals star was among 22 pitchers and reserves named

to the team by manager Walter Aiston of the world champion Los Angeles Dodgers, who will manage the squad against the American League in the two games at Kansas City July 11 and at New York July 12.

The eight starters for each league were picked by ballot of the major-league players, and were announced last Sunday.

The Milwaukee Braves dominated that array by landing four starting berths, but the Braves received only one more place today and thus top honors went to the Pirates, as befits the league-leading team.

Boesha Bailey, the grizzled Hound leftie, had his usual luck—another extremely rough though pretty well pitched first inning. In the National League, the Phillies humbled the Braves, 6-5, in 10 innings, the Dodgers waloped the Giants, 10-0, and the Cubs crushed the Cardinals, 10-1.

Roy Sievers' two-run homer in the ninth inning and Gerry Staley's neat relief chore enabled the White Sox to defeat the Indians. Rookie left-hander Jack Kralic hurled the Senators to their victory over the Red Sox with a four-bitter. Washington won the game with a four-run rally in the first inning.

Knuckleballer Bud Wagon won his 12th game for the A's by limiting the Tigers to six hits. Kansas City erased a 4-3 deficit by scoring two runs off loser Frank Lary in the eighth.

Little Known Jungle Tribe Returns Home After Taste Of Civilization

ASUNCION, Paraguay (UPI)—Twenty pale-faced Guayaki Indians have returned to the trackless jungles of Eastern Paraguay after a six-month taste of civilization. Their stay gave scientists a rare opportunity to study the little-known tribe whose only culture has not moved beyond the stone age.

The Guayakis appeared early this year at the village of Torin, 200 miles east of Asuncion, with a request for shelter and supplies. They were cordially received by the official Indian Protective Association, but appear to have decided to prefer their own primitive ways to modern civilization.

A long history of mistreatment by the white man has made the Guayaki extremely wary, and members of the tribe seldom venture outside their forest strongholds. The tribe is dwindling and is now believed to number no more than 1,000.

The little that is known of them indicates they are nomadic hunters who roam the jungles in small parties, subsisting on the game they can kill and the highly-prized honey of various species of bees.

They do no farming, nor do they domesticate animals except for an occasional parrot or coati (South American raccoon) which serves as a watchdog for their hunting camps.

They build no permanent shelters, although they occasionally interlace branches to form a protection against heavy rain.

The art of pottery, characteristic of the most ancient cultures of the new world, is unknown to the Guayaki. They have mastered ropemaking, and fashion cords of palm fibers and monkey hairs to use in transporting heavy loads like tapers or wild boars.

Some tribal chieftains wear conical caps of jaguar skin trimmed with monkey tails, but for the most part the Guayakis roam the forests nude.

Paraguayan ethnologist Oscar Ferreiro describes the Guayakis as "short (averaging about 5 feet in height) but extraordinarily strong, happy, with attractive faces and peculiarly white skin, probably accentuated by their life in the sunless depths of the jungle."

"The men go about nude, with no adornment other than blue-tinted tattoos on their shoulders and arms..." Ferreiro says. "The women paint themselves blue, and commonly wear necklaces of monkeys' teeth, strung by the hundreds on palm fibers."

'Diagnosis Unknown' Suffers From Too Much People, Padding

NEW YORK (UPI) — Roll up the sleeves of my lab coat, push aside some test tubes and place "Diagnosis Unknown" under my little old microscope.

My finding: This one-hour mystery-detective series, which opened on CBS-TV Tuesday night with a story called, "A Case of Radiant Wine," suffered from an overdose of informality, people, detachment and plot-padding.

The series, a summer replacement for Garry Moore's variety hour, aims at showing how civilian pathologists, working in a well-equipped laboratory, can help the police solve sticky cases through science.

It's probably a gripping real-life occupation but in Tuesday night's show, there was too much evidence that curlicues were inserted simply to kill time, display cuteness and, I suppose, to hypnotize the viewer. What came out was a long, drippy funnel of molasses.

The star of the show is Dr. Daniel Coffee, played by Patrick O'Neal who sports a little leaguer's Fidel Castro beard, speaks softly, ambles around with impressive authority, has a pleasing smile and a quiet sense of humor. And he's handy with der duker, too.

He is assisted by the pretty young lab assistant, played by Phyllis Newman; Martin Huston as a teenager who does odd jobs in the lab and comes on like "Kookie"; and Cal Bellini as an exchange pathologist from India named Motilal Mookerji. There's also Det. Capt. Max Ritter, played with authority by Chester Morris.

These five comprise the regular cast and in Tuesday night's story, the five regulars were provided with enough material to slow down the story substantially. Live a crowd, I'm afraid.

The cast is, however, made up of attractive performers. And the videotaped production managed to include some outdoor scenes—once in an auto-wrecking lot, then to a highway for variation of the "chicken" game, and to a rambling suburban-type lab. This attribute of the show gave it a fresh, unusual look.

Written by Joel Carpenter and directed by Fielder Cook, the plot dealt with the death of a young play-girl, a would-be black-matter who was found dead in her bed. Was it murder? She had lots of boy-friends. Was it suicide? The policeman Ritter calls it murder and Dr. Coffee is hired to prove it was suicide. However, he soon learned it was murder and after taking us down some wearisome blind alleys, brought in the guilty party—a delicatessen owner with the soul of a poet who fired of the girl's munching a pastrami sandwich while he whispered sweet nothings to her. Rounding out the case were Tom Bosley, Patricia Barry, Murray Matheson, Millette Alexander and Larry Hagman. All performed their roles well.

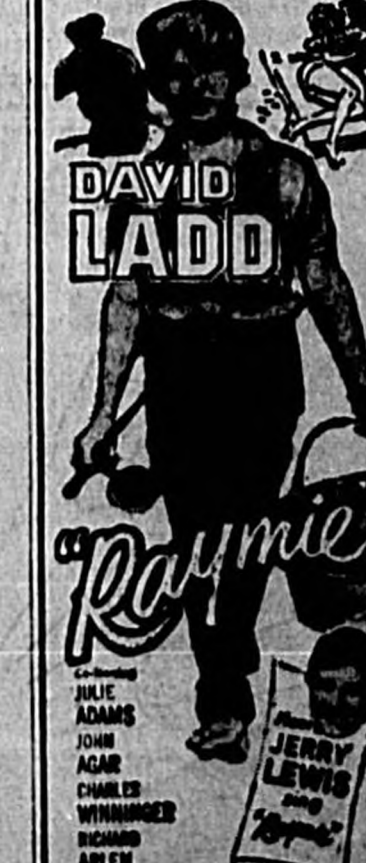

Many Readers Request Repeat On Low-Cost Water Front Home

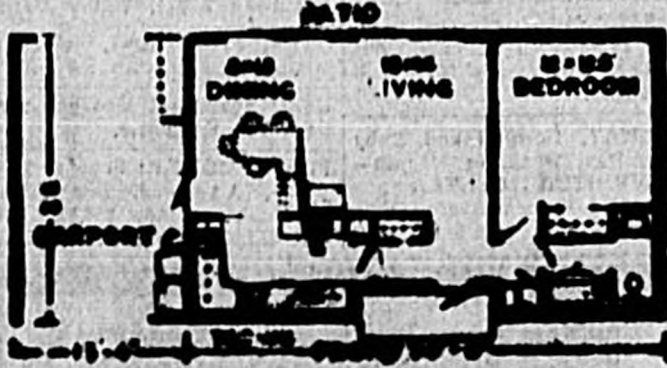
BUILD IT YOURSELF OR BE YOUR OWN CONTRACTOR — PLANS AVAILABLE

This one-bedroom home which contains only 790 square feet, boasts deluxe features customarily expected in high-priced residences. For instance, there is the decorative corner fireplace anchored in the midst of the 21-foot long living-dining area; there is the masonry barbecue pit centered in the 7 by 14 foot kitchen; there are the two sets of sliding glass doors which connect the living area with the terrace and the garden (see picture above); and there is the well-lit entrance foyer (with a coat closet) from which all rooms are accessible without crossing the living room.

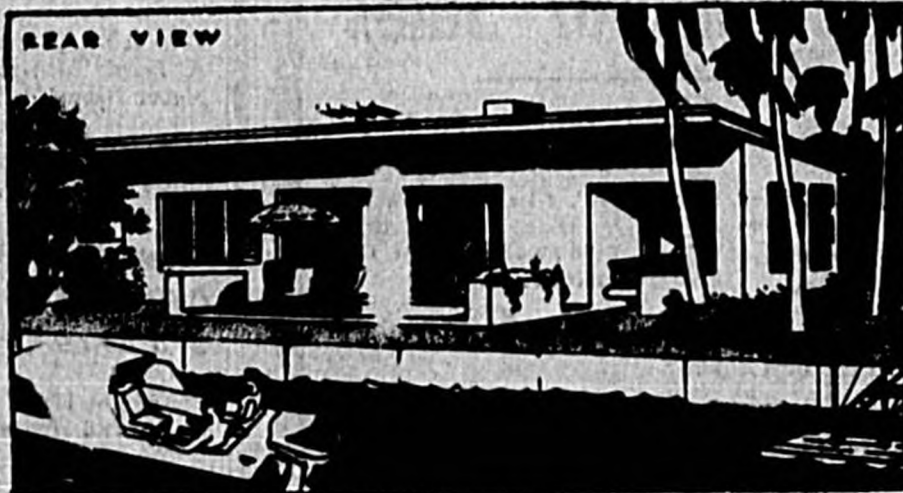
Another "Plus" of this 28 by 36 1/2-foot retirement home is its shed roof. This is the cheapest roof one can build today, and yet it offers a unique design bonus—a 8-foot high ceiling for the spacious living-dining area, and an 8-foot ceiling for the smaller kitchen and bathroom (making them look more "in scale").

Optically, the brick barbecue is "connected" with the built-in dining table by the storage cabinet mounted on the brick wall (shown dotted on the floor plan) but, from the practical point of view, a folding door (see arrow on floor plan) separates the kitchen from the dining area. Incidentally, the refrigerator is just half way between the kitchen sink and the dining table a welcome item in a small family.

Cuban, U.S. Tensions Heat Up

HAVANA (UPI)—Cuba's revolutionary government, bolstered by support from Red China and Russia, heated up its diplomatic and economic war with the United States today by an angry rejection of U. S. complaints about seizure of American-owned property.

A 10-page note issued by the Foreign Ministry Thursday night rejected as "false, hypocritical and malevolent" a Washington protest against expropriation of the Esso and Texaco oil refineries.

"World opinion mobilizes justly indignant against the shameless economic aggression planned, organized and effected by the government of the U. S. A. against Cuba," the note said.

Premier Fidel Castro's government also rejected a British protest over seizure of the Shell refinery but in what appeared more moderate tones.

Castro was scheduled to make radio-television speech tonight at which time he may announce retaliatory measures for President Eisenhower's \$56,000,000 cut in purchases of Cuban sugar. Castro now has authorization to seize any and all U. S.-owned property in Cuba by decree.

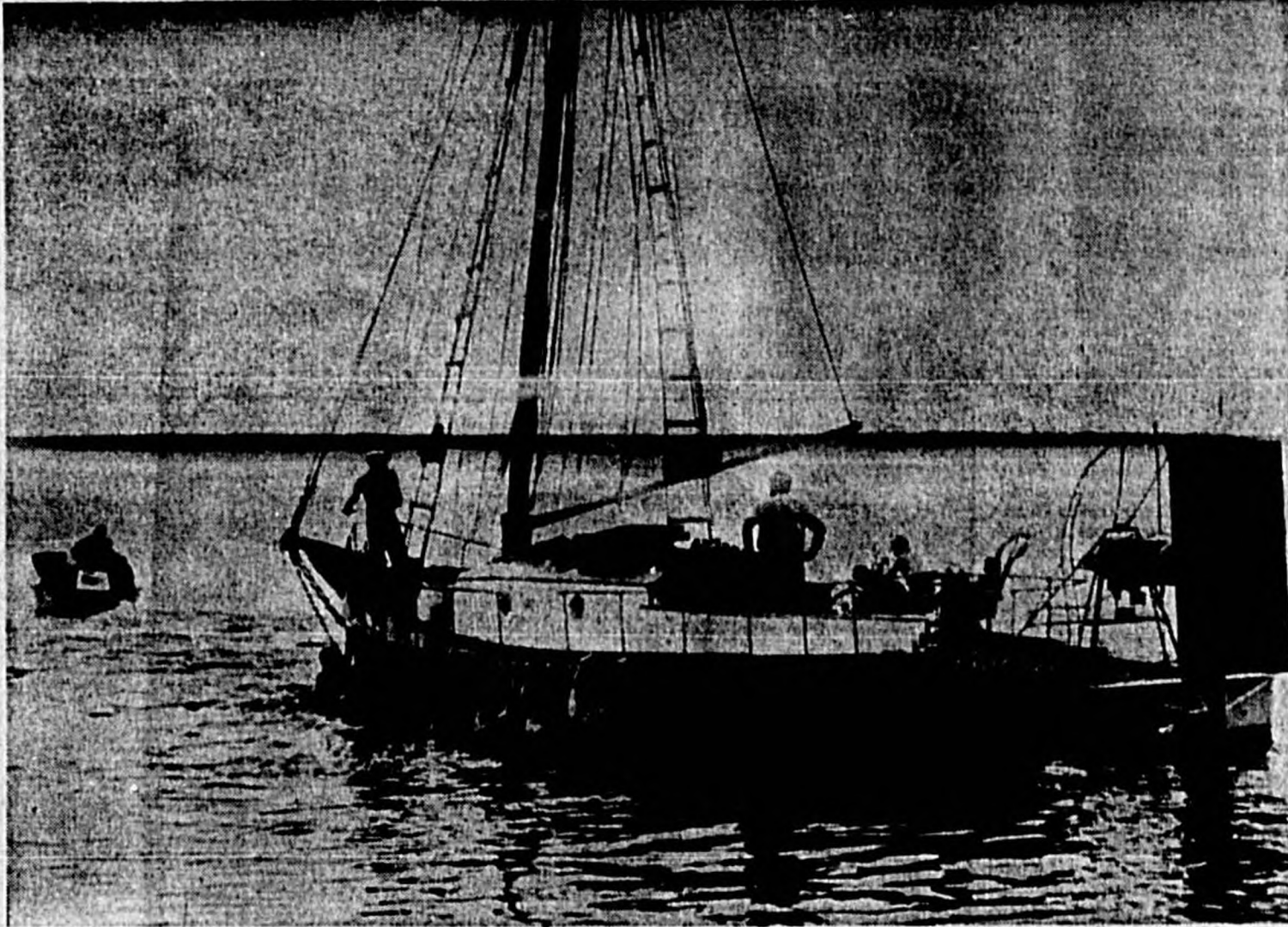
Communist China today branded the U. S. sugar cut a "dirty and shameful act." The Soviet mass news agency and Radio Moscow accused the United States of exerting "rude pressure."

The first Soviet tanker arrived in Havana Thursday with a load of crude oil to help the Castro regime stave off a fuel shortage brought on by the refinery seizures.

Two anti-U. S. demonstrations broke out in the provinces.

About 150 persons milled outside U. S. Information Service headquarters in Santa Clara for two hours shouting "Yankos, out!" in Plaza Del Rio, high school students paraded with placards reading "Cuba, Yes! Yankos, No!" before the approving eyes of Education Minister Dr. Armando Hart, a one-time card carrying member of the Communist Party.

The demonstrations, plus the increasingly militant tone of the Cuban press and radio, were expected to spur the exodus of American residents, already departing in large numbers. General Electric Co. was among the American firms which have sent the wives and children of Cuban-passed personnel packing.

Europeans Flee Congo

BRUSSELS, Belgium (UPI)—Mutinous African soldiers roamed through the Congo capital of Leopoldville today shooting at automobiles and almost anything else that moved. Europeans fled for their lives.

Reports received here through the semi-official Belga news agency said the new mutiny broke out shortly after midnight, among native troops in two camps near Leopoldville.

It said they surged into the town with arms, firing at European cars and other targets. A body of troops camped near the Leopoldville golf course and started ambushing any-

"The council took that stand because it did not want to show favoritism, as another group is attempting to organize a bank in the same area," Mayor A. R. Lormann said.

Councilman, R. C. Carlson's motion to have Orange Ave. paved died for a lack of a second from either councilmen, E. C. Williamson or E. B. Hopkins. H. A. Scott, the only other councilman able to second the motion was absent from the meeting.

Orange Ave. is presently a clay road running from Hwy. 17-92 through the town of Longwood.

County School Supt. R. T. Mills could not be reached for comment on the issue.

Carlson, following the death of his motion, asked Williamson and Hopkins if they are willing to accept "full responsibility for Orange Ave. not being paved."

Hopkins replied that he didn't like the "paving the town was getting." Williamson made no comment on the question.

Nikita Apologizes For Anti-U. S. Talk

VIENNA (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev today apologized publicly to his Austrian hosts for making anti-American remarks during his nine-day "goodwill" visit and then promptly attacked U. S. "monopolists" for blocking world disarmament.

But the Soviet Premier reserved his harshest comments for West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer at a press conference before flying back to Moscow.

He warned Russia might sign a peace treaty with East Germany if the West German Parliament convened in West Berlin this fall. He hinted at Soviet determination to react forcefully to any "violation" of Austrian neutrality. He said Russia could not remain "indifferent" and would "take such measures we then think necessary."

Khrushchev said that Adenauer, like Hitler, outlawed the Communist Party when he came into power and added, "If Adenauer would touch the Socialist countries with one finger, we would smash him."

There was a brief echo of Khrushchev's tumultuous Paris conference in the wake of the summit collapse at his news conference today.

Navy Recovers 1st Body In Disaster

BARNEGAT LIGHT, N. J. (UPI)—The first of 17 bodies believed trapped in the gondola of a Navy blimp that crashed in the Atlantic was recovered today by salvage crews.

The body was identified as that of Air Controller Henry V. Godbold, 19, of Conway, S. C.

The Navy said a request for 16 body bags had been received from the salvagers.

It was not immediately known whether the body had been found in the blimp gondola resting on the ocean floor about 60 feet below the surface.

The men were presumed entombed in the broken gondola when the airship collapsed Wednesday and plunged into the ocean 15 miles off Barnegat Light.

A spokesman said some parts of the cabin had been recovered, but thick folds of the airship's rubberized envelope hampered divers.

Convict Slashes Self As Trial Recedes

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—The brutality trial of 14 former Raiford State Prison guards recessed for the weekend Thursday with violence outside the court room causing more stir than the testimony inside.

Convict Robert Mott, about 30, slashed his arm with a razor blade Thursday afternoon while in court waiting to testify.

A U. S. deputy marshal told the court that another convict witness, Frazier Peterson, had "obviously" been beaten up by other prisoners at the jail Wednesday night. Defense attorney Chester Bedell said Peterson was beaten because he did not want to testify against the accused guards.

Peterson, about 31, denied he was beaten. He said he suffered cuts

Commies Threaten Italian Premier

ROME (UPI)—Italian Communist Leader Palmiro Togliatti today demanded that pro-Western Premier Fernando Tambroni resign or face a massive lead campaign of strikes and rioting.

The ultimatum appeared to represent an open bid of the largest Communist party in the free world to seize power from a government already shaken by mob violence that has left five persons dead and hundreds injured.

Togliatti, just back from a trip to Moscow, issued his challenge as the huge Red-led General Confederation of Labor called a 10-hour strike to protest police action Thursday night against mobs in Reggio Emilia.

The Christian Democratic mayor of the town of Villa Litterna near Naples was assassinated today. The reports said that the murder had nothing to do with the present turbulent political situation.

Four demonstrators were killed and 20 wounded in the town as police opened fire for the first time since rioting flared on a nationwide basis earlier this week.

Stevenson OK's Draft

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Adlai E. Stevenson said today he would "of course" accept a draft for the Democratic presidential nomination. He promised to campaign with vigor and a sense of real purpose "if he gets a third try at the White House."

Stevenson's pledge and renewal of his statement to accept a draft were read to a news conference by Lt. Gov. Glenn Anderson of California, who endorsed the former Illinois governor two days ago.

Anderson quoted Stevenson as having told him by telephone: "Under circumstances which are understandably difficult, I headed the Democratic national ticket in two campaigns. I have, therefore, felt that it would be presumptuous and arrogant for

me to claim squatter's rights or to seek actively a third nomination. "However, if selected by the convention, I will, of course, accept the draft and campaign with vigor and a sense of real purpose since the issues we face are of such great importance."

Anderson said he obtained the statement in a telephone conversation with Stevenson Wednesday from the Stevenson's home at Libertyville, Ill., and was authorized to make it public.

The Californian appeared at a news conference flanked by Sen. A. S. (Mike) Monroney of Oklahoma, leader of the draft-Stevenson organization, and James E. Doyle, director of the Stevenson headquarters.

The statement appeared to be the strongest yet from Stevenson indicating an interest in the 1960 presidential nomination.

California Gov. Edmund G. Brown is expected to announce Sunday that he will withdraw as

a favorite son candidate and throw his support to front-runner Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts.
