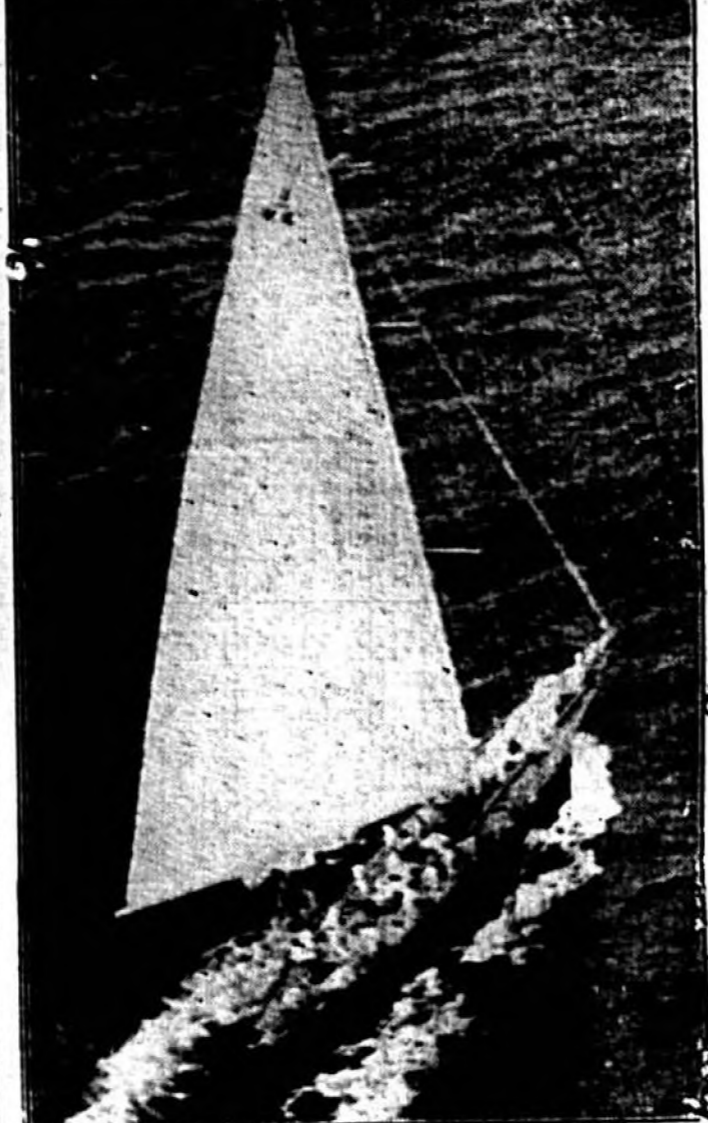

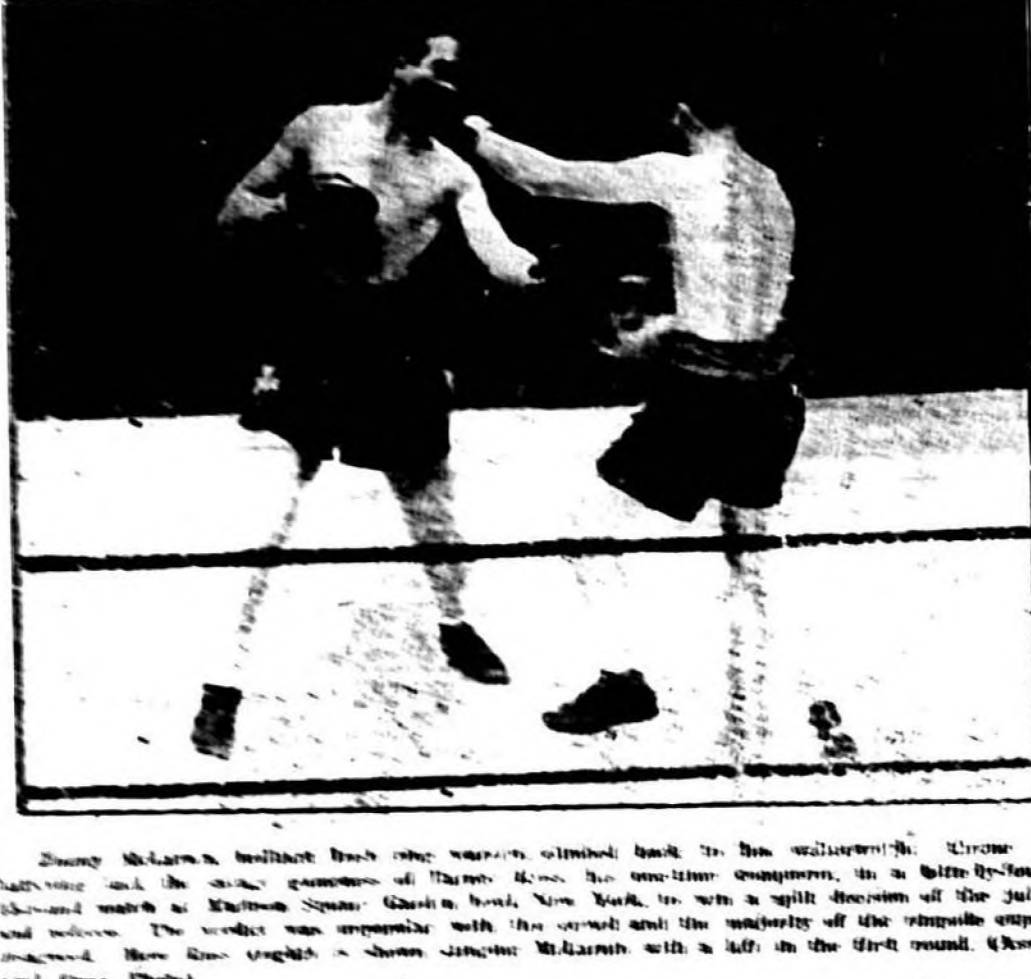

1-8 teaspoon salt  
1-8 teaspoon paprika  
4 tablespoons salad dressing  
Mix and chill ingredients. Serve on lettuce.
- BAKED DATE PUDDINGS**  
(Serve Warm or Cold)  
1 cup chopped dates  
1-2 cup broken nuts  
1-2 cup flour  
1 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1-4 teaspoon salt  
2 eggs  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
2 tablespoons cream  
Mix ingredients. Fill buttered custard cups. Set in pan of hot water and bake 30 minutes in moderate oven. Unmold and serve with cream or lemon sauce.

# GROCERS FEATURE VALUES

## Prices Are Rising But Local Buyers Look For Bargains

Now that "costs" are at hand, food with a substantial amount of "beauty" factor may be expected to appear. Despite the ever slight for long hours of baking is no longer a menace to the housewife's comfort and she may expect to serve rich roasts and succulent desserts. Here are some suggestions for fall that fit in with the mood of the season.

- Lentil Soup**  
Wash 1 cup of lentils, parboil in 4 cups of water; add 1 cup of whole wheat and continue slow simmer. Simmer 2 large onions sliced in 2 cup oil till browned; add to lentils and add salt, simmer over slow fire until reduced to two-thirds and serve in deep plates.
- SPANISH POT ROAST**  
4 lbs. of chuck beef, rolled 1-2" of salt pork  
1 small bottle stuffed olives  
1 large onion  
2 tablespoons fat  
2 cups canned tomatoes  
1 teaspoon salt  
1-2 teaspoon pepper  
Make small slits on each side of the meat, using a sharp knife. Cut salt pork into small strips and stuff holes with these and with the stuffed olives, arranging them alternately. Slice the onion and fry in oil fat. Then remove the onion and brown the meat of all sides. Add the tomatoes, salt and pepper and cover closely and simmer until the meat is tender about 3 hours. Strain and thicken the gravy in the pan, adding a little water to dilute it if too thick.
- BAKED SQUASH**  
Cut a small squash in pieces, and cook in boiling salted water until tender. Drain, and add to the pieces 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 1-2 tablespoons chopped parsley, a little butter for sautéing. Add this to the squash and season with salt, pepper, paprika to taste. Spread in a greased baking dish, with fine crumbs and a hot oven until brown and through.
- MARSHMALLOW WHIP**  
1 cup currant or grape jelly  
1 cup whipped cream  
1 cup crushed pineapple  
1 cup whites  
vanilla wafers, crumbled  
marshmallows  
Spread bitter chocolate over the egg whites until foamy

and add the jelly. Continue beating until stiff but not too dry. Fold the whipped cream into the mixture and then the pineapple, vanilla wafer crumbs, and marshmallows cut in tiny bits. Chill and serve in sherbet glasses.

If you are serving a cocktail before the following dinner try these Swedish cocktail croutons which are made by cutting small round pieces of white bread and spreading with a thick layer of butter. Place on each two fillets of anchovy, crossed, and sprinkle with grated Parmesan cheese. Just before serving bake croutons to a golden yellow in a hot oven. Stick a toothpick in each and serve hot.

- SMOTHERED CHICKEN**  
In the morning clean and disjoint a roasting chicken. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and roll in flour. Heat enough fat to cover the bottom of a deep frying pan. Put in the chicken and fry on both sides until a delicate brown. Add more fat as needed. Do not finish cooking. When cool place in the refrigerator. Before dinner pour a little water into the pan containing the chicken, cover tightly and cook slowly about 50 minutes or until it is tender.
- ORANGED SWEET POTATOES**  
Parboil 6 medium size sweet potatoes, then peel and slice lengthwise. Arrange the slices in a baking dish, sprinkle generously with brown sugar and dot with bits of butter and 1 tablespoon of grated orange peel. Pour over 1-2 cup of orange juice and scatter 2 tablespoons of brown sugar and a little paprika over the top. Cover and bake 30 minutes, then remove cover and continue baking till brown and well caramelized.
- MOLDED CABBAGE SALAD**  
2 tablespoons gelatine  
1-4 cup cold water  
2 cups hot water  
6 tablespoons vinegar  
3 tablespoons sugar  
Green vegetable coloring  
3 cups shredded cabbage  
1 teaspoon salt  
Soften gelatine in cold water. Dissolve in hot water. Add vinegar and sugar and stir till the sugar is dissolved. Tint a delicate green. Cool until lukewarm. Put cabbage in a ring mold and sprinkle it with salt. Pour gelatine over it and chill. Serve garnished with lettuce and mayonnaise in the center of the ring. Individual salads may be made if desired.
- BAKING POWDER BISCUITS**  
2 cups flour  
4 level teaspoons baking powder

Sift flour once before measuring

Cream 1-3 cup of butter, add slowly 1 cup granulated sugar, 3 tablespoons flour and 1-2 teaspoon baking powder. Then add 3 eggs lightly beaten, 1 cup of milk and 1 cup of dates, washed, stoned and cut in pieces. Bake in a plate lined with unbaked pastry and serve with whipped cream.

**Time For Canning Pickled Beets Is During This Week**  
Now is the time to take advantage of all the wealth of the summer harvest of fruits and vegetables, and with "sugar and spice and all things nice" create a supply of preserves and pickles for next winter's use.

First let us consider the pickle and relish angle of the canning question. While these piquant and aromatic relishes furnish little food value they do add flavor and zest to the meal and so play an important part in food planning.

A foundation pickling syrup is made by heating together 4 cups of sugar, 2 cups of water, 1 lemon, sliced thin; 2 cups of vinegar, 1 teaspoon all-spice and 1 tablespoon cinnamon.

1 3-4 cups prepared beets.  
1 pint sharp vinegar.  
Green pepper  
2 lbs. brown sugar.  
1 tsp. salt.  
1-8 tsp. pepper.  
1-8 tsp. paprika.  
Boil and peel the beets as usual. Slice them or cut in quarters. Bring vinegar to the boiling point,

add sugar and seasonings. Arrange the beets in jars, alternating with bits of green pepper. Pour boiling liquid over beets and seasonings and seal jars.

### Hauptmann Has 10-Months-Old Son Of His Own

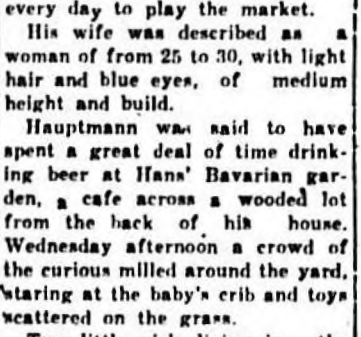

### New Jersey Seeks To Have German Put On Trial For Homicide; Bail Is Denied Him

(Continued From Page 1) following his arrest last Tuesday morning, was taken from the Bronx county court house to police headquarters.

The more sinister angle of the Lindbergh case—the worlds most horrifying crime it has been called—appeared today to be unraveled. That is the actual kidnaping of baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh from his crib in his Hopewell, N. J., home the night of Mar. 1, 1932.

Whether authorities believe that the ransom payment and the kidnap-murder were the work of separate groups was not disclosed. The fact that Hauptmann, 35, was turned over to Bronx county authorities after being held at New York headquarters many hours was seen by some as an indication that authorities have not been able to connect him with the original crime.

If there was sufficient evidence to hold him for kidnaping and murder he most likely would have been turned over to New Jersey authorities.

The only crime in connection with the Lindbergh case that concerns the Bronx is one involving the payment by Colonel Lindbergh's intermediary, Dr. John E. Condon, of the \$50,000 ransom to the person now named as Hauptmann.

NEW YORK BANK ROBBERD NEW YORK, Sept. 21. (AP)—Three robbers held up a Corn Exchange Bank and Trust Company branch on Tenth Street today and escaped in an automobile with over \$50,000. The robbers slugged a porter into unconsciousness and with drawn guns forced the branch manager to hand over a sack of money.

### When 'Jafsie' Arranged Ransom 'Payoff'

The picture at the left shows Dr. John F. (Jafsie) Condon about the time he was conducting secret negotiations that led to him paying \$50,000 of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's money to a stranger in a futile effort to recover the colonel's kidnaped baby. At the right is a want ad "Jafsie" placed in a New York newspaper, advising the kidnapers or the men he was in touch with that the money was ready.

Letters exchanged by the Young brothers showed that Paul, while working among Ecuadorian Indians, demonstrated gas bombs to officials of Ecuador. John Young said his brother was a member of the "Christian Missionary Alliance."

"Are we to understand," asked Senator Homer T. Bone (D-Wash.), "that the old hymn 'Onward Christian Soldiers' is to be given a new meaning in 'Marching As To War'?" Paul Young wrote to his brother on Apr. 31, 1932:

"Six or eight Indians showed a desire to follow the Lord and I prayed with them. 'Yesterday I saw the Minister of War again and made arrangements to demonstrate today. The minister, two generals, the head of the police of Quito and a number of officers and soldiers were present. I used the 'Billy' (presumably a type of bomb) first, but I am sorry to say it did not prove a success. I shot it at two soldiers, but they were able to stand the gas and get me. 'Then I shot the grenades into a room and poked the men to go in. This was a real success and helped to gain what I had lost through the failure of the 'Billy'. The War Minister asked me to quote prices on 100 Hillies and 200 grenades. 'Some of the Indians had made previous beginnings, but had been pulled down by sin. Indian work needs a great deal of prayer. 'Was the munitions work a sideline with your brother,' asked Senator Gerald P. Nye, committee chairman, 'or was the missionary work a sideline?' Young said he thought conditions in Ecuador 'needed introduction of humane weapons such as tear gas for police use,' and added: 'My brother has helped me on numerous occasions. 'What would the Missionary Alliance think,' asked Bone, 'of the picture of your brother with a tambourine in one hand and a gas bomb in the other?' 'That is not a complete picture,' Young protested.

## Hauptmann Signed Note 2 Years Ago Planning Kidnaping

### Ohio Prison Warden Says Unidentified Prisoner Received Code Letter In Jail

NEW YORK, Sept. 22. — (AP) — The dramatic story of a note in code, allegedly sent by Bruno Richard Hauptmann to an unidentified prisoner in Ohio penitentiary and stating "Will kidnap Lindbergh baby," was injected into the case against Hauptmann today.

Warden Preston Thomas of the Ohio penitentiary disclosed the tip in the Lindbergh case immediately prior to a sensational attempted break from prison by two convicts.

The warden had summoned newspapermen to his office and reported they were just cast when the alarm bell rang.

The two prisoners, sentenced to the electric chair, attempted the break with the aid of an imitation pistol made of soap. Charles Makley was killed, and the other Harry Pierpont, was seriously wounded. Both are members of the Dillinger gang.

The note was sent to the unidentified prisoner late in 1931 or early 1932. The warden said it was signed by Bruno Hauptmann.

Meanwhile, the mysterious figure who was the subject of the note, was killed at a nearby airport after successfully refueling Cobham's plane to allow a press association reporter to disembark.

### Funeral Service To Be Held Tomorrow

Funeral services for Mrs. J. E. Jones, 78, resident of Sanford since 1904, will be held from the Erickson Funeral Home at 4:00 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Burial will be in Lakewood cemetery opposite the home of her late husband, J. E. Jones, prominent elderly grower.

Mrs. Jones died in Madisonville, Ky., last Saturday. She was born at Princeton, Ky., and she came to Sanford in 1904. Her survivors include step-children, Mrs. Mahalia Wright of Sanford and W. W. Jones of Fort Worth, Texas, and three grandsons.

## Condensed Statement In Which German Denies That He Kidnaped Lindy's Boy

NEW YORK, Sept. 22. — A condensation of the statement made in police lineup yesterday by Bruno Hauptmann, suspect Lindbergh kidnaper, follows:  
I came into possession of the ransom money now in the hands of the police as true and correct. "I have been in this country 13 years. I came here as a stowaway on the steamer Fortia. I sailed from Bremerhaven, Germany, and when I arrived in New York I jumped ship.

"I did not know anybody in New York. I went to live in Amsterdam Avenue between 97th and 98th Streets (in upper Manhattan Island.) I stayed there until I got married. That was in 1925. I then moved to Park Avenue, where my wife and I started housekeeping. I stayed there about a year. Then I moved to the Bronx. I lived on Needham Avenue, until I moved to the address where I now live in East 222nd Street, Wakefield section, Bronx.

## EUGENE BLACK IN OPTIMISTIC MOOD OVER CONDITIONS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22. — (AP) — A bright picture of business conditions was placed yesterday alongside an assertion that "uncertainty" is retarding recovery.

Eugene R. Black, governor of the Atlanta Federal reserve bank and liaison man between the Administration and bankers, told reporters that things are looking better than they have in three years.

Just back from conferences with businessmen and bankers in St. Louis, New Orleans, Birmingham and Nashville, he said that not only was business improvement apparent but that agriculture in the section he visited was in "fine condition."
