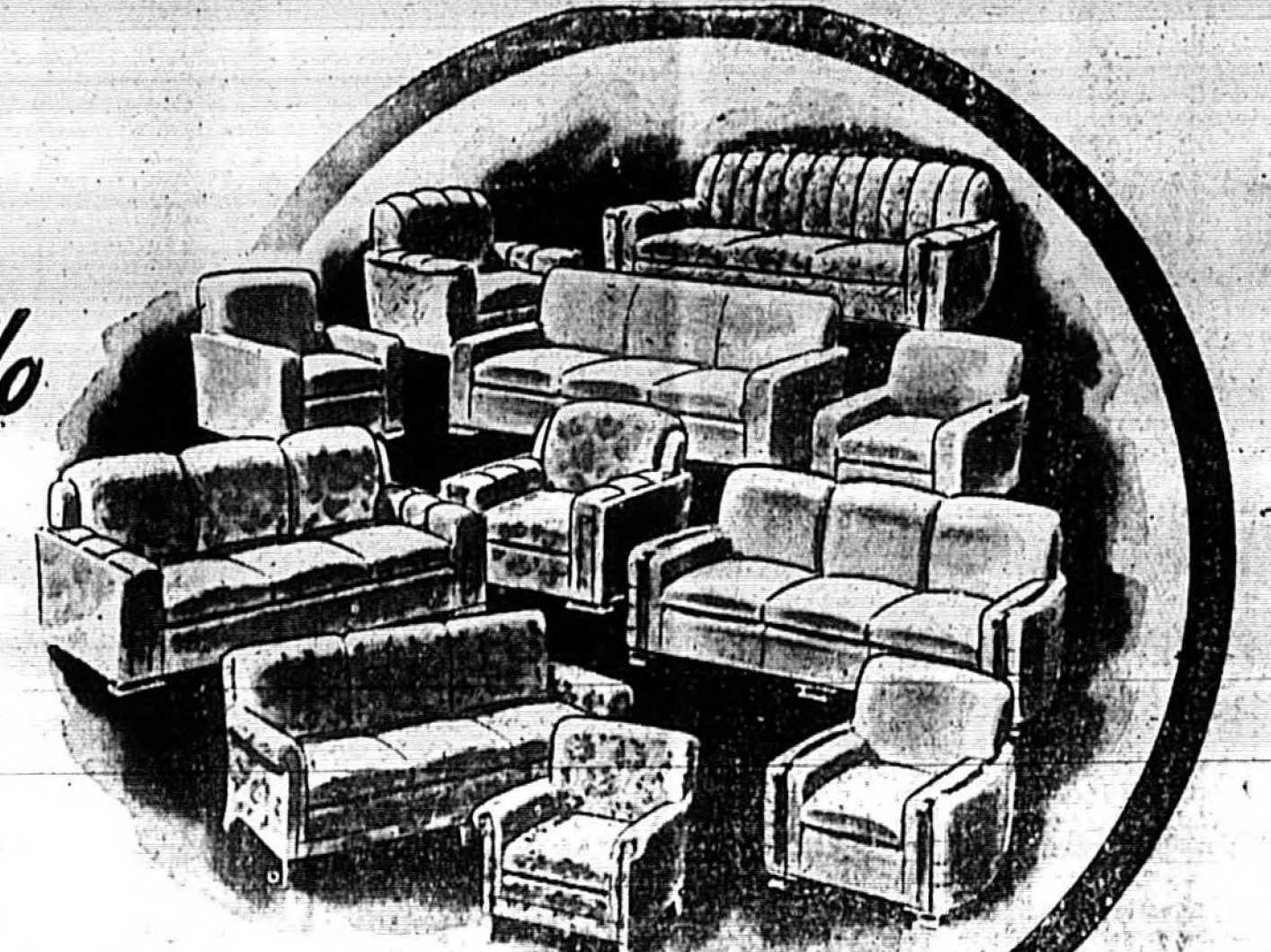

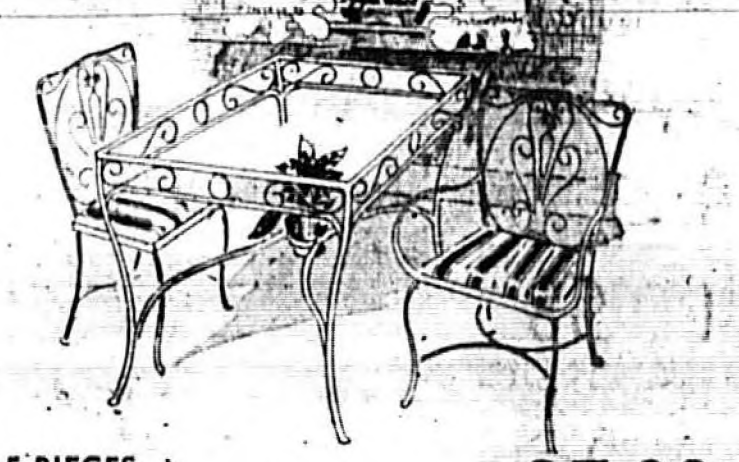

## Industry Hits Back At CIO's Pay Demands

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—(AP)—The C-I-O arguments of a new round of wage-creep have been described by the National Association of Manufacturers as "a gross work and statistical nonsense." The N. A. M.'s chief economist, Dr. Ralph H. Avery, spoke for the association when he asserted today that higher wages will force prices again.

He is a newsman and magazine writer on finance and is well known as an economic adviser to Republican candidates for the 1936 presidential election. The N. A. M. economist criticized assertions made for the CIO by Robert Nathan, a private economist who cost the production program. Nathan told the CIO earlier that present business profits are high enough so the industry could afford pay boosts up to 25 percent within rising prices or reducing profits below wartime peaks.

However, Avery asserts that Nathan's report to the CIO is pure guesswork and that the industry will not accept any such proposal. He estimates that the industry would reach \$200,000,000 in 1946.

Avery's criticism was industry's second hit today against labor's wage demands and calls for back pay. The United States Chamber of Commerce announced earlier in its weekly publication that it will call upon Congress for a thorough study of the entire wage-hour law and its economic effects. The article said the action was prompted by the mounting total of partial pay demands.

## New Jersey Boys Held In Murder

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—(AP)—President Truman made two important appointments today. He named Carroll Wilson to be general manager of the Atomic Energy Commission and Dr. M. W. Wiggins to be undersecretary of the Treasury.

Wilson's appointment, says the White House, was made after an exhaustive inquiry throughout the country for a man to fill the job. He is a 46-year-old engineer who was chief of the Manhattan Project near Bush during the war in developing scientific instruments. Wilson has been a consultant to the commission ever since it was created in October. In great part his duties will be to carry out the commission's program of research and development.
