

Cities, the neglected children of state legislatures sometimes come by their own, but generally only by fighting for it. For years, according to the United States News, Michigan cities have run short of money because the state prescribed various expenditures and at the same time limited their sources of revenue. All the while the state was building up a large surplus. As the country districts are over-represented in proportion to their population, in Michigan as in many other state legislatures, city protests got nowhere.

Finally the Michigan worm turned. The cities put a constitutional amendment on the November ballot, requiring that one-sixth of the state sales tax be returned to school districts and another sixth to cities, villages and townships.
