# DEFENSIVE ON SHANGHAI

## 20,000 Kiangsu Troops Gather at Sunkiang

Early Last Night and Begin to Fight  
Defenders Forced to Change Position

Heavy Fighting Will Take Place Within 15 Miles Shanghai

SHANGHAI, Oct. 3.—The offensive for which the invading Kiangsu forces are preparing to take Shanghai has been gathering men for at least three days, started last night southwest of Sunkiang, at a point 35 miles from here.

The defending Chekiang troops were forced to retreat two miles to new positions after an intense night of fighting, in which they employed artillery.

Twenty thousand men under command of the Kiangsu province are being massed on the Shanghai-Hangchow railway line of Sunkiang, it was reported.

This information was contained in apparently authentic reports from Sunkiang, normally a city of 60,000, received here this morning. The Chinese defense forces south of Sunkiang, entrenched and waiting for the Kiangsu attack, were reported to number about 6,500.

Interest centered Thursday on the expected outbreak in the Sunkiang sector, the other fronts near the city, and to the west and north. Fighting continued actively as they did Wednesday. Only a few machine guns and rifle troops showed that the rival armies were increasingly vigilant.

Two Spies Killed.  
SHANGHAI, Oct. 3.—Two spies employed by the Kiangsu forces attempting to take Shanghai, were shot to death Thursday by Chekiang troops as they fled from the town of Lotien, 10 miles from here. Letters on the spies' heads were announced, and instructions to burn them.

Reports of the attempt to capture the city by incendiary means resulted in a move on the part of the settlement authorities to guard property in the active district, contiguous to the main quarter, believing that Kiangsu troops may be here now. Chinese authorities have been in touch with the foreign settlement forces.

For a quiet night on all fronts, trickled into Shanghai Thursday morning that Kiangsu forces reported rushing reinforcements to the Fongtai district, in the north of Shanghai, 15 miles west of here on the line of Shanghai-Nanking railway.

# BETTER BUSINESS IS DISCUSSED AT ATLANTA MEET

Latin-American Congress Discusses Better Relations Between Countries Concerning Imports, Exports of Nations

ATLANTA, Oct. 3.—The diplomatic session Thursday night of the Pan-American congress closed the second day of the four-day program of the gathering here of representatives of 21 Latin-American nations and delegates from all over the United States, meeting with the object of promoting better commercial relations between the Americas.

At the afternoon meeting, which was a discussion of the relation of railways, highways, shipping and inland waterways to the commercial progress of a country, Benham Cameron, president of the Bankhead Highway Association, gave an address on the relation of the highways explaining that by improved roads the ports and railway centers were opened to all sections for greater import and export. He praised the highway association programs undertaken in many of the South and Central American republics recently, according to their delegates, J. A. Roundtree, of Birmingham, Ala., director general of the United States Good Roads Association, explained to the congress the working of the United States federal aid for natural highway systems.

Lincoln Dixon, western Democratic manager, declared charges of William F. Butler, National Republican chairman in Washington today that there is a Democratic and LaFollette coalition to force the presidential election to congress were not only "absurd but untrue."

There is no foundation for such a statement, said Mr. Dixon. "It is in desperate circumstances and is trying to make the business men believe that LaFollette has a chance for the presidency in order to scare them to the support of Coolidge."

LAKELAND, Oct. 2.—Approximately 250 of Lakeland's most prominent citizens will leave here Monday morning, Oct. 13 on a five day motorcade to the East Coast and intermediate points. The motorcade, which is being staged by the Lakeland Chamber of Commerce, will be the largest that has ever left Polk county and one of the largest ever held in Florida.

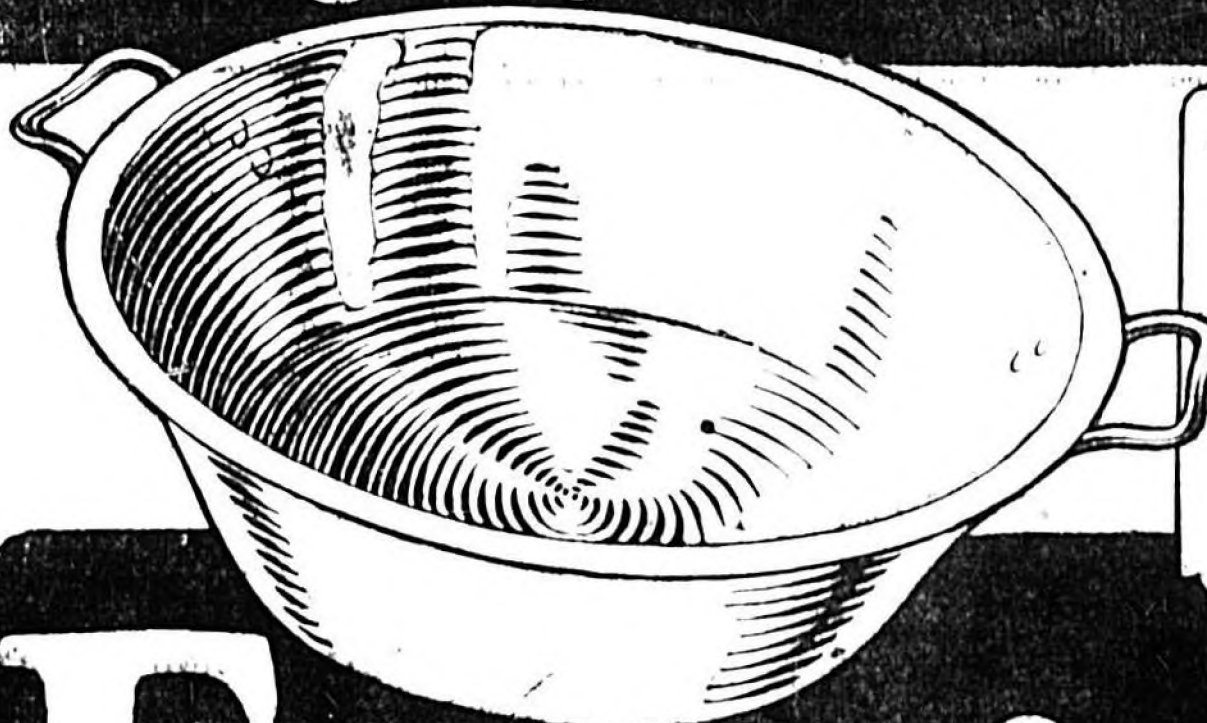

# In the World of Sport Scandal Will Not Halt Series

### Commissioner Landis Says Senators And Giants Will Play Big Games Anyway

### O'Connell, Dolan Banished Forever

### Two Players Attempt To Implicate Several of Team-mates

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—The 1924 world series will go on notwithstanding that baseball was shaken to its foundations Thursday by a whirlwind succession of developments growing out of the attempt of Jimmy O'Connell, young New York outfielder, to bribe Heinie Sand, Philadelphia shortstop, in the game that decided the National League pennant race for the Giants.

This was the declaration last night of Kenesaw Mountain Landis, high commissioner of baseball. It was made after a hectic day during which fresh charges were flung by O'Connell, who has been banished for all time from the game, together with Cozy Dolan, Giant coach, accused of instigating the bribery plot, and during which prominent baseball officials, including President Johnson of the American League and President Barney Dreyfuss of the Pittsburgh club, asserted the series should be called off as a result of the scandal.

Unmoved, apparently, by the day's developments, and declining to amplify the statement he issued late Wednesday night in New York, disclosing the plot and debarring Dolan and O'Connell, the commissioner declared he saw no prospect of developments that would prevent the start of the championship battle Saturday between Washington's first pennant winning team and the Giants.

Furthermore, the commissioner indicated he had no new evidence calculated to widen the scope of the attempted bribery deal, a possibility brought to the fore Thursday by O'Connell's reiteration that the Giants were "in it" and the specific mention of three veterans—George Kelly, Frank Frisch and Ross Young.

Giants and Senators Saturday. "So far as I am concerned, no cloud now hangs over any member of the Giant team eligible to play in the world's series," the commissioner declared. "They will go into the world's series with the Senators on Saturday."

Waving aside as ridiculous reports that the Giants would be debarrred as a team and Brooklyn the runner-up, selected to represent the National League in the series, the commissioner emphasized that so far as he could foresee, no further finger of suspicion pointed to the National League champions.

Smashing his fist on a table when pressed by newspaper men to comment on the day's developments, the commissioner declared:

**Clear Case of Bribery.** "It seems to me that those persons not clothed with responsibility should keep their shirts on. There was a clear case of bribery. It proved abortive, the guilty men have been punished. Why call off the series?"

Although John A. Heydler, president of the National League, in a long conference with newspaper men had asserted his belief that the case was closed, Commissioner Landis refused to commit himself as definitely on the subject.

"I have nothing further to add to my statement, but I will say that in my opinion a case is never closed so long as interest in it remains," he added.

Pressed to make public the written confession of O'Connell and the testimony of Dolan and others mentioned in the case, the commissioner said he would not do so unless and until he was convinced such a course would serve a useful purpose.

**Charges Fly Thick and Fast.** New charges and counter charges flew thick and fast throughout the day, obscuring the real playing scene of the world's series and throwing the pre-championship atmosphere into turmoil. They culminated in the declaration at Chicago of Ban Johnson, American League executive, that the "series should have been called off and that he would demand a federal probe to purge the game of its alleged crookedness."

In New York, O'Connell, former \$75,000 "beauty" and center of the storm that has shaken the game since the Philadelphia White Sox scandal of 1919, reiterated the charges he had made before Commissioner Landis implicating others of his teammates besides Dolan and asserting he was being made the "goat."

O'Connell not only insisted that Dolan was the instigator of the scheme of approaching Sand, Kelly and Ross Young, "regulars," but that Frank Frisch, "a regular," made it plain to him that "all going to chip in and make up the purse of \$500" the sum offered Sand.

### Star Hurler



Here is Zachary, star southpaw of the Griffins, who was a valuable man to the team in its sensational fight for the pennant.

The veteran coach declared he "wouldn't cover up for anybody" and that no one could point to a "dishonest" thing "I ever did, in baseball or out of it."

Dolan, however, was made the target of a broadside by Barney Dreyfuss, who in a statement at Pittsburgh charged the coach had tampered with "the" Traylor, star Pirate third baseman, a year ago, inducing Traylor to "hold up" Dreyfuss for a \$15,000 salary this season.

**Were Warned.** Calling off the world's series "would not be too far to go to get the right results," Dreyfuss declared, adding that he had brought before Commissioner Landis his charges against Dolan in 1923 and that both Dolan and John J. McGraw, manager of the Giants, "were warned at the time to keep away from other clubs."

McGraw's answer to this, made just before the game, entrusted at New York for Washington was that "Dolan, simply command of Traylor upon the big year he was having and earned that he ought to be worth \$15,000 next year."

Baseball men from all parts of the country, gathering here for the world's series, were stunned by the sudden development of scandal on the eve of what promised to be one of baseball's most brilliant seasons. It came as a particularly hard blow to the capital city's fandom, keyed to high pitch of enthusiasm by their club's first pennant triumph in 10 years and to the Washington players.

**Back of Motive a Mystery.**

The most mystifying aspect of the whole situation, in the opinion of observers, is the motive back of O'Connell's action, coming at a moment when the Giants, at the height of a sensational finishing spurt, appeared certain to win the pennant. They had just taken three in a row from Pittsburgh, eliminating the Pirates from the race, the remaining contender, providing the Red Sox took their remaining two games with Boston.

The McGrawmen were a game and a half ahead of Brooklyn before they took the field Saturday against the Phillies. That they clinched the pennant that day was due to no loss to the rival victory than the fact that Brooklyn lost to Boston. Had Brooklyn won the Red Sox still would have had a Mathematical chance to overbid the Giants.

Thus, it is pointed out, the game Saturday was not figured before hand as the crucial test, a fact that was declared to make all the more unexplainable O'Connell's overtures to Sand. Even if beaten, the Giants would have remained in a formidable position.

Baseball writers here who "reported" the game said Thursday there was no question in their minds it was played on the level. Sand, they pointed out, played an excellent game, scoring the only run for the Phillies who were beaten, they added, "because they were outplayed and unable to solve Jack Bentley, southpaw, who held them to four hits."

### White Sox Winners Of 2nd Game From Cubs

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 3.—Fort Worth, Texas League pennant winner, won the baseball championship of the South Thursday by defeating Memphis 8 to 2 in the deciding game of the post season Dixie series for the title. It was the fourth time Fort Worth has won the title in the five times the Texas League and Southern Association pennant winners have met in post season battles.

The Sanford High School football eleven is primed for its opening game of the season when it journeys to Palatka tomorrow to play the fast Putnam High grid team. A squad of 15 men accompanied by Coaches Hart, Welchell and Stines and a large crowd of rooters will leave in cars early tomorrow morning for the neighboring city.

For the past two weeks the coaches have been putting the "glory feet" through the traces until it is declared that a well rounded team has been moulded from the husky bunch of material which has been available.
