## Nikita Pushes Button To Divert Nile

ASWAN, U.A.R. (UPI) Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev and N.A.R. Pres-Ident Gamal Abdel Nasser ad vanced the Aswan Dam project another step today by pressing a button to divert. the Nile River.

Khrushchev said the dam presented a victory over colonialism.

The two leaders were cheered wildly when they returned to the dam site from Aswan city for their second ceremony in two days. Khrushchey and Nasser acknowledged the acclaim by clasp; ing hands and raising them above their heads.

By pushing the button, Khrushchey and Nasser set off dynamite that blew up a sand barrier and sent the river waters through six giant tunnels carved in the rocky banks. Soviet and Egyptian engineers blasted another sand barrier at the downstream end of the tunnels to return the river to its normal course below the site of the future dam.

Today's operation cleared the way for the construction of the second stage of the billion-dollar hydroelectric and Irrigation project which the Russians are helping to finance and build.

Khrushchev said Soviet aid to the Aswan Dam marks "a tremendous moral and political victory, a victory over the forces of imperialism and colonialism." He charged that Western nations exploit the developing countries through foreign aid.

It seems that because the states rightists allowed themselves to be defended by the American Civil Liberties Union before the U.S. Supreme Court in a case involving their right to distribute handbills and hold a meeting in Alabama, Welch concluded they must be Communists. According to him the AC-LU defends only Communists.

Adding to the irony, the National States Rights Party asked the

ACLU for a list (it is a long one) of rightists it has defended. This will be used as ammunition against Welch.

The ACLU, which defends anybody when it is a matter of individual rights and constitutional liberties, also got mixed up with the Ku Klux Klan recently.

Thanks to intervention by the ACLU, the city of Atlanta dropped a demand that the Klan disclose its membership list and prove it was not affiliated with any group on the U.S. Attorney General's List of Subversive Organizations before it would be allowed to hold a public meeting. In return, the Klan denounced the ACLU as "too un-American for association with the Ku Klux Klan in any way."

Prisoners in the Dallas, Texas, county jail rioted recently, and one of the reasons given was that they didn't like the telephone service.

This was surprising, since you naturally assume that any first class jail provides first class phone serv-

What was wrong? Was the equip-ment outmoded? Was the switchboard service sluggish? Was it too far to a public phone? Were the prisoners' monthly bills too high? Or were teen-age prisoners thoughtlessly tieing up the lines with long, long conversations with other teenagers?

A checkup revealed it was none of these. It was simply that there were only a few phones available to take care of the telephonic requirements of all the prisoners. In other words, the jail was, as

the telephone ads so reproachfully put it, underphoned. Maybe you can't blame the prisoners for complaining. A jail that lets the phone service slip might permit furnishings in the lounge

room to become seedy, or offer slipshod room service, or even fail to provide color television. And it might not be too long before the average lawbreaker would just as soon stay free as go to jail. Those jailers had better get cracking with that phone service.
