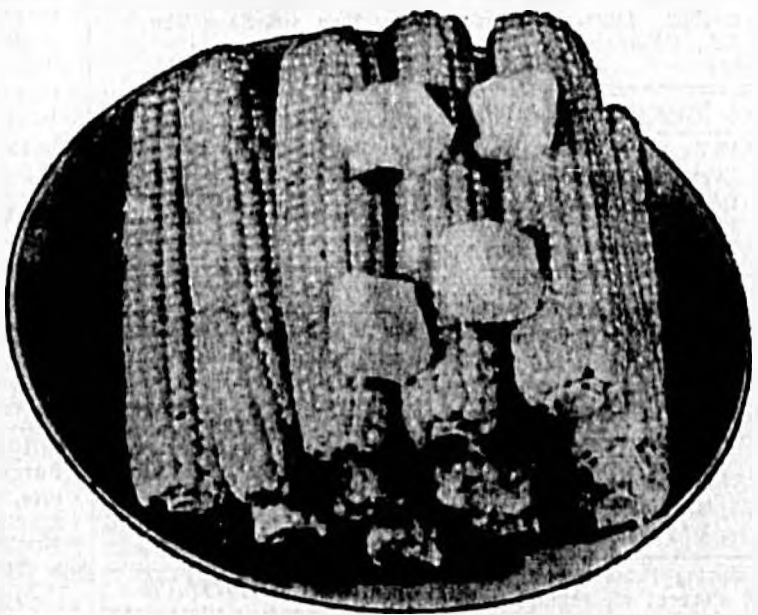

Kelly Concedes Then Refuses To Take Sides

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—State Sen. Scott Kelly of Lakeland, third man in the first primary campaign for governor, conceded his defeat today but made it clear he is not retiring from politics.

Kelly told a news conference here that he will accept the decision of the state canvassing board which yesterday declared that Mayor Robert King High of Miami had outpolled Kelly for the second berth in the May 20 runoff with Mayor Haydon Burns of Jacksonville.

"We will not go to court," Kelly said.

With his pretty wife, Margie, by his side, Kelly walked into the news conference room in the sub-basement of the capitol and faced the glare of the television cameras with a grin.

He laughed and joked and did not appear the least disgruntled.

"I'm not mad at anybody and I don't think anybody's mad at me," he said.

Kelly said he will not endorse or publicly support any candidate in the runoff.

He said he will not even tell his friends who he personally is going to vote for.

Kelly said he will meet with his statewide organization shortly to determine his future in public life, including a possible re-run for governor in 1966.

He also mentioned that there will be a number of statewide offices coming up in 1966 without singling any out.

Because of a switch in Florida's elections away from the presidential election years, the governor and cabinet elected this year must run again in 1966 rather than serving the usual four-year term. This will give the next governor a chance to serve six years.

Burns has already indicated he will run for the four year term.

"Squalor" Found On LBJ's Farm

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Two Republican congressmen said today they found shocking squalor on Alabama farm land owned by Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson.

"If the President is sincere in his poverty program, he should have demonstrated his sincerity a long time ago by assisting these people who are living in such deplorable conditions on the Johnson land in Alabama," Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, (R-Ill.), said today at a news conference.

"We saw people living in deplorable poverty with little evidence of concern by their millionaire landlords," Rep. M. G. Snyder, (R-Ky.), said.

"We saw nothing here that could not easily be corrected by the Johnsons themselves without a nickel of federal funds or a single federal program, if of course, they really cared."

A resident of Sanford for the past seven years, he retired from the U. S. Navy in 1956 after 30 years active service. He graduated from U. S. Naval Academy of Annapolis, Md., with the Class of 1927. He was a member of Holy Cross Episcopal Church.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Merle Moss Johnston of Sanford; a daughter, Mrs. Stephan Rusk of Newport, R. I. and three grandchildren, one of Newport; a brother, Elton Johnston of Coroydon, Iowa; two sisters, Mrs. H. A. Shay of Clarendon Hills, Ill., and Mrs. Donald Henry of Grundy Center, Iowa.

The admiral will be buried at a later date in Arlington National Cemetery.

FRIDELBURG, Germany (UPI)—The Communists have sent back an American agent seeking asylum in East Germany, the U. S. Army announced today.

European headquarters here announced medical specialist Conrad Yumang, 43, was returned at the West German border by East German officials Tuesday night.

McNamara Sees Long, Hard War

Sanford Civic Club Members Tour SNAS

An estimated 200 members of Sanford's civic clubs visited the Sanford Naval Air Station Wednesday noon, listened to briefings from two captains, ate a typical Navy dinner and then toured the base for a first hand look at the facilities.

Members of the Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions and Jaycees were on hand for the program, a prelude to Armed Forces Day to be held at the base Saturday.

Also heard was Capt. Robert M. Ware, commanding officer of the Sanford station, who outlined his part in maintaining the base at peak efficiency.

Both captains used colored slides to emphasize their remarks.

Capt. Mayo told of the expanding operations of the Wing and told his listeners that "when you go to bed tonight, you can be assured some of the planes stationed here are in the air somewhere in the world."

Capt. Ware told of the expansion plans of the base and listed the various projects which are scheduled through 1969. The immediate project and the one of most general interest to the community, he noted, is the extension of the north-south runway.

This, he added, will allow planes to take off and land in a pattern which will curtail the noise over the populated areas of the city when weather conditions permit.

Both captains applauded the cordial relations shown by city residents and base personnel.

After the briefings, club presidents and the two captains led the chowline to the mess hall where steaks were served to all.

An outline of things to see on the base, including the usually "secured" compound, was given to the club members, and they were allowed to drive to those points of interest to them.

Nikita Pushes Button To Divert Nile

ASWAN, U.A.R. (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev and N.A.R. President Gamal Abdel Nasser advanced the Aswan Dam project another step today by pressing a button to divert the Nile River.

Khrushchev said the dam presented a victory over colonialism.

The two leaders were cheered wildly when they returned to the dam site from Aswan city for their second ceremony in two days. Khrushchev and Nasser acknowledged the acclaim by clapping hands and raising them above their heads.

By pushing the button, Khrushchev and Nasser set off dynamite that blew up a sand barrier and sent the river waters through six giant tunnels carved in the rocky banks. Soviet and Egyptian engineers blasted another sand barrier at the downstream end of the tunnels to return the river to its normal course below the site of the future dam.

Today's operation cleared the way for the construction of the second stage of the billion-dollar hydroelectric and irrigation project which the Russians are helping to finance and build.

Khrushchev said Soviet aid to the Aswan Dam marks "a tremendous moral and political victory, a victory over the forces of imperialism and colonialism." He charged that Western nations exploit the developing countries through foreign aid.

Ike Neutral In GOP Campaign For Nominee

HARRISBURG, Pa. (UPI) — Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower today proclaimed his strict neutrality in the Republican presidential race and said he would not try to "dictate" a choice for the party's nomination.

Returning to Pennsylvania after a five-month winter stay in California, the general said it would be neither "practical nor wise" to pick a candidate "and expect all the Republicans, just like a herd of sheep to run that way."

At an impromptu news conference held as he alighted from the private railroad car which had carried him from the west coast, Eisenhower pledged support to the choice of the GOP national convention, rejected speculation he would become part of any "stop movement" and said President Johnson could be beaten with the "right combination" of platform and candidates.

Summing up his position, the former chief executive said: "I just know whoever is nominated I am going to support. And I don't want to be after all, I am an ex-politician—I should not be in the position of trying to dictate to the Republican party what it should do. I am going to support it in its decisions and do whatever I can—I can't do very much."

Dr. Allen Armstrong, medical director, said that "Respiratory Diseases are the principal causes of absenteeism from school and work." He added, "new active cases of tuberculosis reported in Florida last year showed an increase, and tuberculosis is still a major health problem."

The current average length of hospital stay is eight months, according to Dr. Armstrong. Improved drugs and treatment techniques have reduced the time required for TB patients to stay in the hospital. Seminole County has 21 patients hospitalized.

Goldwater Lays It On The Line

WASHINGTON (UPI) — GOP presidential hopeful Barry Goldwater, in an unusual nationwide television appearance Wednesday night, discussed views which he said "don't go too well on a platform or in a crowd."

During the half-hour program, Goldwater repeated his opposition to civil rights demonstrations, offered to participate as president in summit meetings with Russian leaders, and urged a greater defense effort.

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Castro Admits Raiders Destroyed Mill's Sugar

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime said last night yesterday's refugees raid on a sugar mill in eastern Cuba was a bombardment by an armed launch "belonging to the (U. S.) Central Intelligence Agency."

(Refugee sources in Miami said two refugee-manned torpedo boats from a Central American base, attacking in conjunction with anti-Castro guerrillas from the hills, seized the town of Pilon and held it for some time. They

withdrew after sabotaging the sugar mill and wounding "many" of the 170 militiamen guarding it, the refugees said.

(Edgar Sopo, spokesman for the reguice MRR organization, said the raid marked the "beginning of the war" against Castro long promised by the refugees.)

(The Soviet Union, without mentioning the raid, warned again today that an attack on Cuba would bring immediate retaliation with "the most serious consequences for the aggressors.")

A government communique said the only casualties of the attack were a woman and an 8-year-old girl.

"A pirate ship... belonging to the CIA, operating from bases in Florida, Puerto Rico and Central America, attacked the sugar mill in the port of Pilon with cannon and machineguns..." the communique said.

"As a consequence of the shots the sugar deposits ignited, causing the loss of 75-

000 sacks of refined sugar... "Several workers' houses were hit by bullets. A woman, Ofir Guerrero, and 8-year-old Mario Ortega were wounded."

The communique added that Castro would be "hard and implacable" with his enemies as a consequence of such raids.

The attack on Pilon was the first refuge attack since Jan. 17, when a patrol boat in a west Cuba harbor was sunk by a plastic mine.

Hit-run attacks on Cuba by boat virtually ceased early in 1963, when the Kennedy administration announced a crackdown on refugee use of bases in the United States.

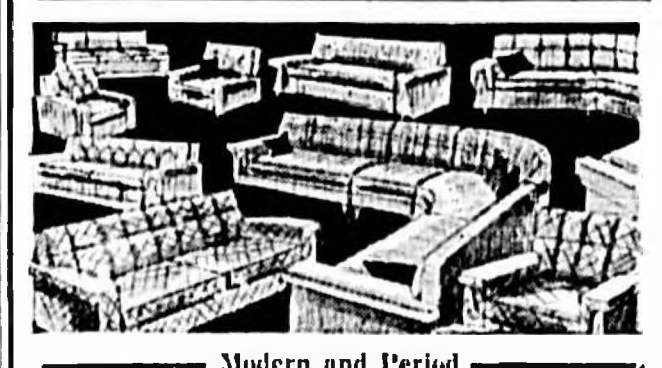

Ken Johnson must figure he's on candid camera because he keeps right on smiling even though everyone has him pegged as the unluckiest pitcher in baseball.

The Houston knuckler, who pitched a no-hitter against Cincinnati on April 23 but lost the game, 1-0, pitched perfect ball against San Francisco until the seventh inning Wednesday night and was gone from the game in the eighth.

"I'm not complaining one bit, though," grinned the 30-year-old right-hander. "We won the game, and that's the only thing that counts."

The Colts beat the Giants, 2-1, and although Johnson was credited with the victory, his third against as many losses, Hal Woodeshick had to rescue him when the Giants rallied in the eighth. Jesus Alou broke up Johnson's bid for a perfect game and a second no-hitter when he doubled to lead off the seventh.

Johnson retired Willie Mays three straight times, striking him out once and getting him twice on grounders before the San Francisco centerfielder stretched his hitting streak to 20 consecutive games with a single off Woodeshick in the ninth for the last of the Giants' five hits. Mays' one hit in four trips dropped his average to .468.

The Colts pushed across what proved to be the winning run in the bottom of the seventh on singles by Bob Aspromonte and Staub and a wild pitch by reliever Ron Herbel.

The Giants kayoed Johnson in the eighth when Duke Snider's pinch double and a single by Jesus Alou accounted for their only run.

The Mets defeated the Braves, 5-2, in the only other National League game played Wednesday. Rain washed out games between the Cubs and Dodgers, the Cardinals and Phillies, and the Reds and Pirates.

In the American League, the White Sox topped the Twins, 5-1, with the help of Dave Nicholson's three-run homer. The Indians shut out the Red Sox, 8-0, in a game limited to six innings by rain, which also washed out the Orioles-Senators contest and halted the Yankees-Tigers game after six innings with the score tied at 1-1.

Barry Lutzman hurled the Angels to a 9-0 win over the A's in the opener of a twin-nighter but Kansas City evened matters with a -0 victory in the nightcap.

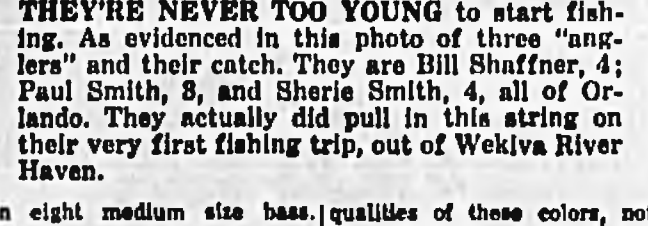

In eight medium size bass, quillies of these colors, not the colors, themselves.

But color is not the only way to achieve a false impression. There are other ways to pad out the girth of a lure without actually adding bulk.

Ordinary flyrod bugs with stiff hackles attached so that they stick out at right angles can create the effect of a larger apparition. The same feathers placed on the tail give the appearance of a long or lure. Neither alteration affects the casting or fishing abilities to any degree, but both create an entirely different impression on fish.

So head the hues and pad the plugs—a phony line has been the downfall of many a lunger.

Indy Time Trials Start Saturday; New Record Set

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI) —Clear skies and cool temperatures today meant perfect driving weather for speedsters testing their cars in preparation for the 500-mile race time trials.

The time trials start Saturday, and as of the close of Wednesday's runs Bobby Marshman of Pottstown, Pa., continued to set the pace on the Indianapolis Speedway.

Marshman, who set a new unofficial Speedway record of 137.178 miles an hour Tuesday in his rear engine Lotus-Ford, had consecutive laps of 156.549 mph. and 156.794 mph.

The unofficial speeds were clocked on the Speedway's electric eye timer but members of Marshman's crew clocked him on stop watches at an even better 157.2 mph. Chill winds and the threat of rain held down the action. The oval was closed for more than two hours when engines blew on cars driven by 1962 winner Roger Ward and 1963 winner Parnelli Jones.

Burleson Tunes Up For Season With 3:57 Mile

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI) —Dyrrol Burleson, with an "easy" 3:57.5 mile behind him, today was looking forward to his first race of the year against Tom O'Hara.

Burleson, the defending AAU mile champion and former collegiate champion at Oregon, ran the spring's first sub-4 minute mile Wednesday in a special three-event meet set up to give him a strenuous workout and at the same time collect some money for the U. S. Olympic fund.

"This was a training session; I wanted to run something easy under 4 minutes before I started my racing schedule," the tall 24-year-old insurance salesman said.

"It was faster than I thought because it was so easy." Paced by four other runners, Burleson turned in the first lap in 61 seconds, the half-mile in 1:50.5 and reached the three-quarter mark at 2:58.8. His time for the Olympic distance or 1,500 meters was 3:42.1.

Hill Rise, owned by the El Peco Ranch of George A. Pope, was listed at 8-to-5 by the track handicapper and Willie Shoemaker was again listed as his rider. Northern Dancer, the Canadian-bred colt, owned by the Windfields farm of Edward P. Taylor was 2-to-1. Bill Hartack, who has yet to win the Preakness

with the way he has been training for the Preakness, was 4-to-1 with Hank Moreno replacing Manny Yaca as his jockey. Quadrangle, with Baulio Beza up instead of Bobby Ussery, and Roman Brother, with Jockey Wayne Chambers again in the saddle each were 8-to-1. Big Pete was the outsider as 20-to-1 with Joe Culmone riding.

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Homemakers Corner

Have had requests for recipes using oranges, juices or flavorings of oranges. Here are several we can try. First here is a BASIC PASTRY pie crust recipe as requested. We will use this in the ORANGE FRIED PIE recipe.

sifted enriched flour, 1 crust 1 1/2 cups; 3 crust, 2 cups; salt, 1 crust 1/4 tsp.; 2 crust, 1 tsp.

all purpose shortening, 1 crust 1/4 cup; 2 crust, 1/2 cups cold water, 1 crust, to 6 tbsps.; 2 crust, 4 to 7 tbsps. Sift together flour and salt. Cut in shortening with pastry blender or two table knives, or rub in with fingertips, until mixture is crumbly and particles are size of small peas. Sprinkle water by tablespoonful over one portion of mixture at a time, mixing with fork and pushing moistened dough aside. Add only enough water so dough sticks together. If desired, chill dough while preparing filling. Roll out 1/4 inch thick on lightly floured board.

ORANGE FRIED PIES one recipe basic pastry for 1 crust pie 1/4 cup sweet orange marmalade 1/4 tsp. lemon juice

confectioners sugar Prepare pastry through step of flattening with rolling pin. Divide dough in half. Roll out each half 1/4 inch thick and cut out six circles from each half with 4 inch round cutter. Combine orange marmalade with lemon juice. Place 1 tsp. orange marmalade mixture in center of each circle. Fold each circle in half, press edges together and seal securely with fork. Prick through top of pastry 3 times. Fry in ungreased moderately hot skillet, 7 to 8 minutes on each side or until golden brown. Remove from skillet. While warm sprinkle with confectioners sugar. Serve warm or cool. Makes 12 little pies.

ORANGE MARMALADE ROLLS 1 1/2 cups orange marmalade 1 cup (2 sticks) softened oleo 1 1/2 cups warm water 2 pkgs. or cakes of yeast 1/4 cup sugar 1 tsp. salt 1 tbsps. grated orange peel 3/4 cups unsifted flour Combine marmalade and 1/4 cup oleo. Cook over medium heat until oleo is melted. Spoon into large ungreased muffin cups. Measure warm water into large warm mixer bowl, sprinkle or crumble on yeast, stir until dissolved. Add sugar, salt, remaining oleo, eggs, orange peel and 2 cups flour. With mixer, blend at low speed, beat 2 minutes at medium speed. Blend in remaining flour, beat one minute. Spoon into muffin cups. Let rise in warm place, free from draft, for 30 minutes. Bake in moderate oven 20 minutes (at 375 degrees), or until golden brown. Remove from pan at once.

From several high school girls we have a request for something simple for a party get-together. Let's try these FANCY FRANKS.

1/4 cup margarine 1 clove garlic, crushed 1/4 cup chopped green pepper

2 tbsps. brown sugar 1 lb. frank, sliced lengthwise 1/2 cup raisins 1 8 1/2-oz. can pineapple tidbits, drained 1 cup apple juice 1/2 cup cider vinegar 1/2 tsp. salt 1 tbsps. cornstarch 1/4 cup cold water Melt margarine and saute garlic and green pepper. Stir in brown sugar. Add frank and cook until tender, about 10 minutes. Add raisins, pineapple, apple juice vinegar and salt. Mix well. Stir cornstarch into cold water. Add to frank mixture. Simmer, stirring occasionally 15 minutes or until raisins are soft. Serve on Ritz crackers.

Another idea for that party. SUPER DUPER SPLIT Crunch Topping: 1/2 cups quick oats, uncooked 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar 1/4 cup melted butter 1/2 cup chopped salted peanuts 2 bananas, cut in strips strawberry, toffee swirl and chocolate ice cream For topping, mix all ingredients together until crumbly. Place in shallow baking pan, toast in preheated oven 350 degrees, for 15 minutes, stirring occasionally. Cool 15 minutes, then toss lightly with fork. Store in covered container in refrigerator. Stir with fork before using. For peanut butter sauce, combine 1/4 cups sugar, 1/2 cups milk, 1/2 cup peanut butter, 2 tbsps. light corn syrup and a dash of salt in medium size saucepan. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Reduce heat and simmer about 10 minutes or until thickened. Stir in 2 tbsps. butter. Cool.

For each split, place banana strips in dish. Top with scoops of the ice cream. Drizzle peanut butter sauce over ice cream, sprinkle with 3 or 4 tbsps. crunch topping. Top with sweetened whipped cream and a marachino cherry. Makes 6 splits.

And still another party pie. Family Therapy Beneficial In Treating Mentally Ill

NEW YORK (UPI)—A new trend in treating the mentally ill puts both patient and the rest of the family in the hands of the psychiatrist.

The theory behind treatment of the whole family: The mentally ill person is a product of a troubled family situation.

"The family is much like an organism, an intricate mechanism," says George Thorman of the Family Service Association.

"A specific symptom such as a child's habitual tantrums may indicate that the family itself is disturbed." "Family therapists sometimes refer to the family as the 'unit of treatment' and some psychiatrists may use the term 'schizophrenic family' instead of the term 'schizophrenic patient' to emphasize this view that tensions and conflicts exist within the family as well as within the patient," Thorman continues.

Thorman, who is with the Indianapolis FSA, is a writer on mental health and discusses recent developments in treating the emotionally sick in "Family Therapy—Help For Troubled Families."

It is a new publication by the Public Affairs Committee, New York, a non-profit educational organization founded in 1935.

Thorman says that in the last 10 years psychiatrists have begun to experiment with family sessions. Psychiatrists in child guidance clinics had long recognized the importance of working with mother as well as the sick child, he said. Gradually, therapists began to work with both parents and then look in the whole family. By 1934, he says, a few psychiatrists were experimenting with use of family group sessions as the principal method for treating the seriously mentally ill patient.

But family therapy still is experimental. Thorman writes, and "certainly it is not a standard form of therapy in most mental hospitals." But he adds that those who have been using it believe it holds great promise.

Family therapy encourages all members to express their feelings and thoughts freely since some conflicts can be removed once they are more clearly understood; it encourages communication—to talk to one another instead of about one another; and attempts to reduce conflict, a part of any family, to "fairly normal proportions."

Why do families become sick? Thorman writes that many troubled families, like schizophrenic individuals, appear to be in a state of confusion. They are less able to devise a plan of action for something as simple as organizing a picnic than are healthy families. Part of the difficulty in such households stems from lack of effective leadership—or if one member indicates leadership, other members ally to undermine him.

Researchers have developed the theory, he says, that the members of such families "are actually afraid of close ties to one another."

DEAR ABBY: Please print this. Maybe it will spare some other mother the heartbreak I suffered.

I am the mother of a retarded son. When he was very young, my family and my doctor tried to get me to put the boy in an institution, but I loved him so dearly I could not bear the thought of putting him away. I thought I could give him the care he needed, so I kept him at home. I didn't know how wrong it was. As the years passed, he developed normally physically, and he began to take notice of the girls. One day he grabbed a little 11-year-old neighbor girl and tried to rape her. The outcome was so terrible for our family. My boy is now in an institution, branded as a "rapist." If I had only listened to my family, this would not have happened. Please advise mothers of retarded children to learn all they can about their problem.

Spring Engine Overhaul Good For Seasickness

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (NEA) — A long-range cure for seasickness is a marine engine overhaul right now.

No says engine expert Richard (Sketch) Carroll. Trouble-shoot a balky engine in a rolling boat offshore, he has observed, and you can sabotage almost any stomach.

Head down in a damp, smelly bilge is a good place to renew resolutions about proper engine maintenance.

Carroll doesn't get seasick himself. As a Navy explosive ordnance disposal officer, the technical name for the rough and dangerous duty of underwater demolition, he is at home above or below the surface.

Now he is a service manager for boat engines in the southeast section of the country, an area where pleasure craft see year-round service and tune-up doesn't come only in the spring. All that running is good for a boat's engine, Carroll reports.

Long winters like the ones he remembers back up in his home town of Winchester, Mass., give a marine power plant time to corrode inside and out. Moist air is the major hazard. The well-maintained engine gets extra attention both fall and spring.

Right now some chores any amateur skipper can handle:

New spark plugs should be installed. Battery checked and charged if necessary. Fuel filters cleaned; valve oil added to the gasoline and clean-out mixture fed through the carburetor.

All engine fittings should be examined and tightened. Safety-tying them. Sketch advises, if there is any chance they might work loose.

But modern engines need some expert attention as well for the final tune-up, Carroll recommends.

Recent Events Boost Spirits Of Exiles

MIAMI (UPI) — Laggard spirits in Miami's exile colony soared today in the wake of Brazil's diplomatic break with the Fidel Castro regime and Wednesday's successful ex-raid on a Cuban sugar mill.

Exile leaders assailed Brazil's break with Havana as a "devastating blow" to the Castro regime and international Communism which opens the door for hemisphere action against the Cuban government.

The jubilation was further heightened by a U. S. Commerce Department decision to tighten restrictions on the sale of food and medicine to already ration-plagued Cuba.

Wednesday's successful ex-raid by the Revolutionary Recovery Movement (RRM) on a sugar mill in Oriente Province was seen by the exiles as the first move in a campaign to step up raids on the Communist controlled island.

Brazil's break with Cuba leaves only four Latin American nations—Uruguay, Chile, Bolivia and Mexico — maintaining diplomatic ties with the Castro regime.

Former Cuban President Carlos Prío Socarras said that "with this action by Brazil, the aggressive plans of international Communism not only suffer a devastating blow, but the prospects for the cause of Cuban freedom are now opened."

Three other Cuban exile groups who have announced plans to increase guerrilla warfare against Castro—Alpha 606, Second Escambray Front and the People's Revolutionary Movement — shared the optimism surging through the exile colony.

Agencies participating include the American Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Children's Home Society, Family Counseling Service, Girl Scouts, the Good Samaritan Home, Mental Health Association, the Salvation Army and the USO.

The figure is based upon cash on deposit in January. The final disbursement in October will be adjusted according to payment of unpaid pledges at that time, fund officials declared.

Salute To SNAS Program For Armed Forces Day Slated

But due to the efficient and expeditious work of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce and the abilities of our state and federal legislative delegations the base is still here — an integral part of our area's economic makeup.

So, to the Army, Marines, Navy and Air Force — welcome aboard!

Union Disputes Railway Claims

Inception to a statement Thursday that Atlantic Coast Line Railroad will let out only three firemen under the "featherbedding" action, was taken today by the Sanford local of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers.

H. A. Stoffer, grievance chairman of the local, said 13 Sanford men "stand to lose their jobs as firemen." He added that 10 Sanford firemen will be out of a job within the next few days; three men already have been fired.

An ACL spokesman at Jacksonville reiterated today only three men have been discharged, that nine other firemen have been offered comparable paying positions within the ACL system. He explained that should the new jobs pay less than the firemen have earned in the last year, they will receive bonus pay monthly to equal their past earnings for a period covering the next five years.

"As of this date," said Stoffer this morning, "the Coast Line has not offered these men comparable jobs as required by the Award 282. The jobs offered are not jobs but..."

While the ACL spokesman said only three firemen have been let out, Stoffer named the three already discharged and 10 more who face "a deadline at midnight tonight."

Stoffer continued: "Do the people of this free country realize that a restraining order by U. S. District Judge Alexander Holtzoff, of Washington, D. C., restrains the union and its members from even thinking or talking or discussing any action whatsoever of trying to dispose of the dispute in any manner? The Coast Line to this date has refused to hold the question in dispute at a status quo until the men affected have a clear view of the company's position of the Award, and are being forced to make a decision for the future under these tactics."

Program For Armed Forces Day Slated

Also to be shown throughout the day are rockets, models, flight gear and other equipment in Buildings 4 and 5. These will include:

Inert bombs and rockets including a 1,000-pound bomb, five-inch shells, small arms, and bomb-lifting equipment; a cutaway of a J-47 jet engine; survival equipment including a Mark-7 life raft with equipment, a pressure suit, an ejection seat, a parachute and life vests.

Also a model ASA Vigilante; an RCPP-103 jet starting unit and miscellaneous aircraft aircraft ground support equipment; a training panel for the A3B and ASA aircraft; aerial cameras and photographs.

Included in the vehicle display will be a crash truck, crash crane, air-rescue boats, and a jet aircraft compressed air starter.

Buildings open for inspection will include the station chapel, northwest wing of the mess hall and the south wing of Barracks 140.

Movies to be seen are "ASA Cavalier Qualification," "Launch 'Em," and "Ejection Seat Procedures."

This is the 15th annual observance of Armed Forces Day.
