# Tighten Up Time Again

NEW YORK (AP) - President Nixon's call for budget inflation has drawn guarded praise from conservative economists and condemnation from Nixon's traditional opponents. In his nationally televised address to Los Angeles businessmen Thursday night, Nixon said he is determined to cut the federal budget by \$5 billion to a level of \$300 billion for fiscal

"And we know who the budget cut will probably hurt - not On the other hand, Dr. Raymond Saulnier, a former Economic Council chairman under President Eisenhower, had

high praise for the Nixon address. "It was a good speech. If we'd heard it six years ago, and stuck to the policies contained in it, we'd have few of the problems we have now," he said.

"You didn't hear a word in the address about the full-employment deficit budget concept. That concept is a snare and an illusion, and I'm glad to see it's been abandoned.' Saulnier agreed with Nixon that responsibility for trimming inflation lies with consumers, businesses and government, all of whom must cut their spending plans.

One of Nixon's own economists, however, expressed little enthusiasm for the suggestion that consumers cut their According to Sydney L. Jones, deputy to Kenneth Rush, Nixon's economic coordinator, consumers are now saving 75

cents out of every \$10 in their paychecks.







#### Good News: Salt Fishing Hot, Local Bass Begin To School

Three sailfish were landed late last week by deep sea anglers fishing out of Inlet Harbor at Daytona Beach, two of them caught on the charter boat, "Finest Kind." the third one came in on the "Angler." Along with sails, several big dolphin and barracuda

were teased into striking by the trollers. Bottom fishermen trying their luck aboard the "Snow White 2" had their hands full as they hit into a school of amberjacks the same day. Broken tackle, burnt thumbs. and tangled lines was the story but 20 of the big bruisers were hauled in, many of them in the 45 pound class.

Red snapper were not as plentiful as they have been in the past two weeks but the size was running much better. Black sea bass and triggerfish also helped to fill the fish box to overflowing. Sebastian Inlet South of Melbourne Beach provided

Barry Brunelle and Lowell Hiley with some fine fishing this week but motor trouble cut their trip short. Hiley reported lots of mangrove snapper in the "good eating" size landed before they were forced to return to the dock. "Gator trout" in the eight-pound-and-up category was the best news from Main Street Pier in Daytona. They were particular in their choice of bait, preferring live menhaden minnows to shrimp according to Merle Keller,

Pier Operator. The ocean is full of mullet and menhaden minnows around the piers in this area and as a result, tarpon and king mackerel are coming in close to shore. Keller said none had been landed yet but many have been spotted sending the pier fishermen's blood pressure soaring. So far this week, the anglers have had to settle for the usual run of whiting, sheepshead, a few flounder along with the big trout mentioned

Wayne Brady at the "Fishin' Hole" Bait Shop confirmed the report of tarpon around the piers and stated that river fishing was "hot" right now. Trout are in the river for those who know how to find them; mangrove snapper, sea bass and snook catches have been excellent. Live bait shrimp, which have been somewhat hard to

get for a few weeks, are coming in once more A couple of entries in the Daytona Chamber of Commerce fishing tournament worthy of note were a 721/2 pound tarpon caught by David Leete as he fished behind one of the shrimp boats and an eight pound bluefish anded in the surf.

On the local fresh water scene, some good news, some bad. The bad news is that Bob King, operator of Marina Isle Camp on East S.R. 46, is in the V.A. hospital in Gainesville. He is undergoing extensive tests with the possibility of open heart surgery in the offing. The camp is closed for the present but I think I speak for all the fishermen in wishing Bob a speedy recovery. 





#### **GM Profits Dive**

**IN BRIEF** 

DETROIT (AP) - General Motors has blamed inflation following the energy crisis for the nosedive in its profits during the first six months of 1974 which nose-dived 73 per cent from a year ago. GM Chairman Richard Gerstenberg said the auto giant was unable to keep prices in line with soaring costs. Profits were 2.8 per cent of sales. compared with 8.4 per cent a year ago, he said. As a result, January-June earnings were \$426 million, compared with \$1.6 billion during the same period in 1973. It was the lowest profit figure at the halfway mark for GM in 16 years. Second-quarter profits of \$306 million were a 13year low, off 62 per cent from \$797 million last spring.

#### Hostages: No Go

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. (AP) - The leader of an armed band of convicts has refused to release 11 hostages in exchange for his freedom and has rejected surrender. Prison officials said Friday night the deal was refused by Fred Gomez Carrasco, the imprisoned underworld narcotics boss who has been identified as the leader of the seven rebel convicts. Talks were to resume later today. Prison authorities said none of the mostly middle-aged school teacher-librarians being held hostage were harmed. The standoff has been underway since midday Wednesday. Carrasco has threatened to kill the hostages unless prison officials provide the rebels with automatic weapons, ammunition and bullet-proof vests.







Finally, there is one important fact that needs to be driven home, particularly to the new veteran using his eligibility certificate to purchase a home.

The veteran must realize that he is obtaining a loan from a private lender which must be repaid just as any borrower must repay money he borrows. And, the borrowing veteran must also understand that if he fails to make the payments he will lose the home through foreclosure. Furthermore, he must understand that if the lender takes a loss the Veterans Administration must pay the guaranty to the lender and the amount paid by VA must be repaid by the veteran.

Consequently, veterans shouldn't be too disturbed in these days and times if they find homeowners not to anxious to sell their property under VA and FHA terms.

Perhaps the best place to start is to flatly state that just because a veteran has an eligibility certificate it doesn't mean that he can purchase any home he wants to buy which might be on

The veteran must qualify as to job stability and area stability. His income must be sufficient to enable him to meet the demands of a simple formula or the VA isn't going to guarantee him

In the second place, the VA-once a transaction is put together-isn't going to insure the mortgage the ex-GI gives to ecure the money he has borrowed. The VA does, however, guarantee the mortgage company that makes the loan. One of the benefits of the VA guarantee is that the governmental agency assures you that you'll get your loan-if you qualify-at the best possible interest rate available at the time of the purchase. Right

now that rate is set by the government at 8.75 per cent. Thirdly, the big factor involved in a VA-guaranteed loan to the veteran is the fact that he will not have to make a large down payment. As a matter of fact, he doesn't have to make any at all. But, hold on here. There are exceptions to that and here's one

Some Orlando friends of mine have told me that Jeane Dixon will appear before a meeting of the Orlando-Winter Park Board of Realtors during July. Can you tell me if non-Realtors will be able to attend this meeting? Dear Mrs. LAH:

Not officially can I tell you that non-members of the Realtors' organization will or will not be able to attend. However, since Jeane Dixon is such a prominent and nationally known psychic I have an idea that tickets for her July 25th appearance will be as scarce as they were recently when Kreskin appeared before the same group. Since this will be a luncheon meeting of the general membership I feel that tickets will not be available to the general public. By the way, there were only 400 tickets available for Kreskin's performance and they were being scalped the day of the meeting for \$20, so we heard. We were there and, believe me, Kreskin's performance was "amazing."

In the event a buyer purchases a house from the seller and later the buyer discovers a defect that the seller knew about and did not voluntarily reveal, does the buyer have any recourse? -

I know of no statute in Florida covering such a situation. However, in such a case I can only advise you to contact your attorney for his opinion and possible action. You might be interested to know, however, that the New Jersey Supreme Court recently ruled that a buyer of a home could rescind the purchase contract if the seller does not voluntarily reveal hidden defects. This ruling was based on a case involving a cockroach infestation. It supported the relatively new concept that "one may be guilty of fraud by his silence" in rea' estate transactions. The broker involved has his \$2,500 commission tied up until a trial court determines whether the buyer or the seller broke the sales contract. Several other states have made similar rulings in recent

Not too long ago I listed my property with Realter who, with my permission, submitted the listing to the Multiple Listing Service. My wife and I signed an exclusive listing contract with the Realtor for 120 days. The house was snown only one time during the first two months. Meanwhile, some friends of ours decided to make an offer on the house. We called our Realtor and asked if the listing could be withdrawn. He said that it could for the fee stipulated in the contract. However, he pointed out that if use were to be sold before the normal expiration date of the contract he would be entitled to his commission. I question this procedure since the Realtor had nothing to do with obtaining the buyer for my home. What can I do?

You could obtain the services of an attorney but the Multiple Listing Service contract you signed spells out the provisions in a rather plain and easily comprehended manner. Of course, you must realize that the Realtor who accepted your listing has no doubt advertised the home. He also paid the expenses connected with submitting it to MLS. Further, it is doubtful if the withdrawn fee stipulated in the contract would repay the Realtor for his out of pocket expenses. Now, if you sell the house prior to the date the contract normally would have expired you're breaking your contractual agreement and he is entitled to his commission.
