WALTER F. GEORGE WINS GEORGIA DEMOCRATIC VOTE FOR NOMINATION U. S. SENATOR

Out of 160 Counties in State George Carries 125 of Them

(By The Associated Press.) ATLANTA, Oct. 18.—Walter F. George, former justice of the Supreme Court, with a total of 304 county unit votes, overwhelmingly nominated as successor to the late United States Senator Watson in yesterday's special Democratic primary according to complete unofficial returns compiled by the Atlanta Constitution. Of 160 counties in the state George carried 125, giving him ninety-six more convention votes than 208 required for nomination. Governor Hardwick carried twenty-eight counties with seventy-six union votes; Seaborn Wright seven counties with 22 unit votes and John R. Cooper none.

JUDGE REVERSES DECISION APPLICATION TO STAY RESTRAINING ANY ACTION

Government Officials to Put Into Effect Lignor Ruling

(By The Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Federal Judge Leiford Hand today reversed decision on applications by American and foreign owned steamship lines to make permanent the stay-restraining Government officials from putting into effect the Daugherty ruling that vessels must not carry liquor inside the three mile limit, even under seal, when touching at American ports. Meanwhile Judge Hand extended the stay he had granted last week until he should reach a decision. This decision, he indicated, probably would be rendered before October 21, the latest date on which the Daugherty ruling has been ordered into effect. Extension of the stay affects both American and foreign lines. Judge Hand made known his intention after he has listened all day to arguments presented by a large array of counsel representing ten of the most important trans Atlantic steamship companies, and a number of attorneys representing Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and the federal prohibition enforcement headquarters. The continuation of the stay, he made clear, would hold, even if he failed to announce his decision on the injunction before October 21. The foreign lines affected by the extension of the temporary stay were the Cunard, Anchor, White Star, French, International Navigation, the Holland-America, Scandinavian-American and Royal Mail steam Packet.

BUILDING ACTIVITIES SHOW INCREASE OVER LAST YEAR'S TOTAL

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Total building expenditures in 133 of the principal cities of the United States in September were \$193,211,650, a decrease of 9.1 per cent from those for August, but a gain of 30.6 per cent over figures for September, 1921, said a report made public today by Bradstreet.

The report added that while the peak of the 1922 building boom had been passed, cumulative effects of the year's enormous monthly preparations would keep the building trades busy until winter weather set in.

Total expenditures for the nine months of the year were \$1,181,319,162, a gain of 60.1 per cent over the previous record year 1921.

FLORIDA LUMBER INDUSTRY FACES A RECORD SEASON

(Tampa Tribune)

Florida lumber business, which annually turns into the state many millions of dollars, is not "sitting atop the world" so to speak, according to E. C. Harrell, secretary of the Florida Saw Mill Association, who declared a South Florida district meeting of the Association Thursday afternoon at the fact that the nation's lumber shortage in history, the largest in Florida never before known to the world so optimistically, as said Harrell, and that was the 21st of his inspiring reports before the district meeting held at the Hillsborough Hotel.

Harrell declared that the meeting brought together more lumber men than have attended a recent meeting, virtually every producer in the district being present.

"I can give you a good many evidences for this feeling of optimism in the lumber industry," he said, "the greatest single business in the state." Said Secretary Harrell, "It only hit the high spots. In the first seven months of this year the announcement of new construction aggregating \$2,041,067, a 60 per cent increase over the corresponding period of 1921.

New construction announced for August amounted to \$350,081,000, the highest of any month of the present year with the exception of April and May. In the first seven months of the year the construction announced for the month of July was \$141,000,000, more than double that of July, 1921.

"The year's activity in the lumber industry is the greatest since 1921. The central and most of its lumber materials West Florida and Alabama.

Figures indicate only one confidence has returned to the lumber business. It is going on where it has been few in the past several years, and the judgment of economists and financiers throughout the country and east is that the next year will be the greatest construction year in the history of our country.

Florida's saw mill industry is being benefited by the railroad movement of lumber from the sections, Louisiana, Texas, Mississippi and other producing sections dependent upon what is known commonly as coal carrying have resulted from the shopmen's strike and the recently ended coal strike; which covered a period of six months, have virtually made impossible the procurement of cars for any extensive movement of lumber from these states. Result is that the big construction program in the east and north must depend largely upon Florida for its supply. Florida's mills will not be able to supply the demand. Even the projects already contracted for and announced for this year cannot be fully supplied by Florida. The mills of this state are able to ship to the seaboard and from there by ship to the market centers. The same cars which carry the lumber from the Florida mills to Jacksonville, Tampa or Savannah will be returned to the mills. Reconsignment abuses, which is happily small in this state, has resulted in fearful congestion at junction points throughout the country, but Florida's roads, we are glad to

say, can deliver to ship-board without letting their cars get off their own lines.

"Florida must benefit immensely by the situation which is unhappy for the producers in other big producing states. Our mills are going to employ full forces of labor, providing employment for many thousands of men, and the product will bring into Florida substantial prices. The lumbermen of this section have every reason to look to the future with confidence. It is a well known fact that the states of Minnesota, South Dakota and North Dakota, after their disastrous crop failures of two years ago, have had virtually no new construction. The crops this year will bring stupendous returns.

"North Dakota's grain crop in 1921 amounted to \$110,483,000, and for this year \$274,722,000, a gain in value of \$164,239,000. South Dakota's gain over the previous year is \$162,372,000 while that of Minnesota is \$171,449,000. This is typical of the entire grain belt. Many millions of feet of lumber will be required to make repairs to the barns, fences and buildings generally which have been permitted to get into a more or less dilapidated condition during the past several years. This will open up new markets for the lumber. They will have the money to buy and make needed repairs and extensions.

"Roads of the country are in the market for great quantities of lumber. They haven't been buying for some years. Equipment is in the worst condition in years and many millions of feet of lumber is being purchased and more will be purchased now that the strike conditions are clearing up."

Secretary Harrell emphasized that all this meant a great deal to South Florida. He declared that the most of the pine lumber produced in the state today comes from South Florida. Most of the naval stores produced in the state is manufactured in South Florida.

With the market frore than it has been in years so far as Florida's industry is concerned, he declared that buyers are in the field in larger numbers than never before in normal history. These emissaries of the Federal Reserve bank, which have been in the field for some time, are being set up, he said, in the hope of getting sharply for the production.

The national Retail Lumber Dealers Association in its August bulletin, Mr. Harrell declared, impounded its members to place orders immediately.

Do not, he said, and the big yards of the state and north have been very large quantities are being produced.

SULPHURIC ACID USED TO MAKE LIQUOR

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 18.—Evidence that sulphuric acid is being used in the manufacture of moonshine whiskey was disclosed today, when Houston Mewher and Jack Strickland, deputy sheriffs uncovered two fortip gallon moonshine stills on the property of the late W. A. Hudnell near Largo. In the distilling house the officers found two gallon bottles of sulphuric acid, partly used, and four empty acid bottles near by. The most consisted of corn syrup and meal. Sheriff Lindsey reported that a druggist of Clearwater had sold Hudnell large quantities of the acid during the summer. Hudnell and his son were killed here two weeks ago by state and city officers in a battle after Hudnell was surprised in the act of delivering moonshine whiskey in the negro quarters.
