BUILDING ACTIVITIES SHOW INCREASE OVER LAST YEAR'S TOTAL

NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—Total building expenditures in 133 of the principal cities of the United States in September were \$193,211,650, a decrease of 9.4 per cent from those for August, but a gain of 30.6 per cent over figures for September, 1921, said a report made public today by Bradstreet.

The report added that while the peak of the 1922 building boom had been passed, cumulative effects of the year's enormous monthly preparations would keep the building trades busy until winter weather set in.

Total expenditures for the nine months of the year were \$1,181,319,162, a gain of 60.1 per cent over the previous record year 1921.

"I give you a good many confidence for this feeling of security in the lumber industry in the greatest single business state," said Secretary Harrell, "I only hit the high spots. SULPHURIC ACID USED TO MAKE LIQUOR

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 18.—Evidence that sulphuric acid is being used in the manufacture of moonshine whisky was disclosed today, when Boston Melker and Jack Strickland, deputy sheriffs uncovered two forty gallon moonshine stills on the property of the late W. A. Hudnell near Largo.

In the distilling house the officers found two gallon bottles of sulphuric acid partly used, and four empty acid bottles near by. The most consisted of corn syrup and meal. Sheriff Lindsey reported that a druggist of Clearwater had sold Hudnell large quantities of the acid during the summer. Hudnell and his son were killed here two weeks ago by state and city officers in a battle after Hudnell was surprised in the act of delivering moonshine whisky in the negro quarters.

Our mills are going to employ full force of labor, providing employment for many thousands of men, and the product will bring into Florida substantial prices. South Dakota's gain over the previous year is \$162,372,000, while that of Minnesota is \$171,449,000. This is typical of the entire grain belt. Many millions of feet of lumber will be required to make repairs to the barns, fences and buildings generally which have been put into a more or less dilapidated condition during the past several years. This will open up new markets for the lumber. They will have the means to buy and trade.

"Railroads of the country are in the market for great purchases of lumber in Florida never before having been so optimistically, as for some years. Equipment is in the worst condition in years and many millions of feet of lumber is being purchased and more will be purchased now that the strike conditions are clearing up."

POLITICS TO BE BARRED AT PAN-PACIFIC CONGRESS

(By The Associated Press)

HONOLULU, T. H., Oct. 17.—Only economic questions and no political matters will be discussed at the Pan-Pacific Commercial Congress which will hold its session here October 26 to October 31, according to a statement issued by the Pan-Pacific union, sponsor of the congress, replying to a special dispatch to the Nippon Jiji, Japanese language newspaper here, to the effect that the Japanese delegates would ask the conference to recommend abolition "of the discriminatory laws of the United States against foreign shipping."

The dispatch, from Tokio, was taken here to mean that the Japanese delegates would ask that the Congress recommend repeal of the present coastwise shipping laws permitting only vessels of American registry to engage in traffic between two American ports.

It is the settled policy of the Pan-Pacific union not to discuss, in the conference held under its auspices, matters which should properly be left to established governmental agencies,

Dr. E. F. Bunker, executive secretary of the organization said in commenting on the dispatch.

The program for the Congress, announced by the union, provides for an address on "Significant Pan-Pacific Commercial Problems of Mr Country" from one representative of each nation represented, on the opening day. "Transportation and Communication," divided into three subjects on the second day, and "Development and conservation of natural resources," the third topic for October 27.

Trade and investments will occupy the Congress on October 30. The closing day will be devoted to international relations in the Pan-Pacific area, including the discussion of the arbitration of commercial misunderstandings and the need for cooperation among the various agencies interested in Pan-Pacific problems. Results of special committees and the adoption of resolutions including recommendations for legislation will be the focus of interest.
