



**FRENCH FINANCE MINISTER LEAVES FOR VISIT TO U.S.**

Joseph Calliaux Coming With Full Power to Negotiate Funding Agreement; Debt Over Three Billion Dollars

PARIS, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Joseph Calliaux, finance minister, will leave Paris for Washington, Wednesday, to negotiate a funding agreement with the United States governing France's war and post war debt.

Premier Painleve's instructions to Mr. Calliaux are of a broad character. What he does will be subject only to the ratification of parliament.

Before receiving these instructions, M. Calliaux acquainted the premier and the leading members of the ministry with his general idea as to the terms of the settlement of France's debt with the United States but he did not take his fellow members of the debt commission, which will go to America into his confidence when they met in brief session yesterday.

One of the most important documents in regard to the American government's views of the debt question that M. Calliaux has in his portfolio probably four lines of typewriting that Jules Jusserand, former French ambassador to the United States, brought back from Washington early this year, as a concrete result of his prolonged conversations in January with Charles Hughes, then secretary of state, and Andrew Mellon, secretary of the treasury.

According to this document France's debt to the United States is to be treated as including \$400,000,000 owed for American army supplies left in France.

The principal of the French debt includes these supplies, would be therefore about \$4,100,000,000, to which might be added accrued interest amounting to \$200,000,000 on the debt contracted prior to the armistice.

### STATE HIGHWAY FINISHED IN 1924 TOTAL 275 MILES

### Percent Estimate of Florida Bureau of Public Highways Places Total Mileage of Roads At Present at 3,503

ALLAHASSEE, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Two hundred and seventy-four nine-tenths miles of state highways of Florida were surfaced during 1924, according to an estimate out by the Bureau of Public Roads, of the United States Department of Agriculture.

Of the 3,503.5 miles in the state of Florida, 1,901.8 had been paved at the end of 1923, the estimate states.

The total mileage of highways to be graded, or surfaced on the roads of the state throughout United States in 1924 was 23,000, the report adds, with 17,000 miles surfaced.

At the end of 1923, according to the bureau's estimate, there were 100 miles of surfaced roads in state systems of the country, of a mileage of 251,610.9.

Illinois leads among the states total mileage surfaced during 1924, with 1,999.2, with Arkansas second, with 1,316.0.

New York led in total mileage paved at the end of 1923, with 11.3. Texas has the largest mileage of this state system, 68.0 being recorded.

### WOLK COUNTY HAS THE LARGEST NUMBER OF ORANGE TREES IN ANY COUNTY IN THE STATE

Wolk county has the largest number of orange trees of any county in the state. There are 1,032 orange trees not of bearing age and 1,574,344 orange trees of bearing age. It has 10,800 lemon trees not of bearing age and 24,988 trees of bearing age. It has 1,682 grape trees not of bearing and 21,000 of bearing age.

## Middies To Get Air Training Next Year At Pensacola, Fla.

PENSACOLA, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Three hundred midshipmen of the naval academy may be sent to Pensacola next June, July and August for the aviation training which is now required of all Annapolis graduates; if the recommendations of Captain Harry E. ## Insurance Company Is Warned Against Law Violation in Florida

TALLAHASSEE, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Warning has been issued the Palmetto Insurance company of South Carolina, by State Treasurer J. C. Luning, who is ex-officio insurance commissioner of Florida, that unless the issuance of certificates on automobiles in the state under an agreement with the manufacturer of a car of a well-known design, is discontinued, the company's license, expiring October 1, will not be renewed.
