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## WAYBRIGHT SAYS CARLTON TALK HERE

Waybright says that Carlton is working together to defeat Folsom Hatfield and put in the governor's mansion at Tallahassee. Senator W. Waybright of Jacksonville last night launched counter-attack on the road department chairman's two principal opponents.

Waybright said Carlton was attempting to discredit Hatfield and swing the road chairman and receive to the DeFuniak Springs Baptist minister. Carlton, he said, is the second man in the race for the nomination of governor. Carlton is third in his district and the rest of the candidates struggle behind in uncertainty. Of course, the road chairman, he believes is ahead of them.

The senator's speech was delivered before the smallest political gathering this county has seen in the post primary race. Not more than 50 persons were in the hall and Carlton when he began his speech at 8:15.

The race now is between Carlton and Hatfield, said Senator Waybright. He said the fear that the governor might again sit in Tallahassee was keeping out of the race from being invited to the state and that four years of the would be four years lost in the progress of the state.

The senator ridiculed Carlton's attack on the constitution and county road tax. He said that the tax has increased from 6.5 mills to 12 mills during the Carlton's term in Tallahassee. He said that in reversing his stand in making a campaign for home rule, the former governor, he said, violated the state constitution in 1924 and 1925, but is now fighting for local option for the race tracks and gambling.

Carlton is pictured as a man who has campaigned by attacking opponents' records since he sought public office in 1916. He said Carlton was not running his own record but on the record of his predecessor, Governor Hatfield.

Waybright said that Carlton's own city government in Tampa, where he has been city attorney, was alleged by the senator in response to Carlton's charge of the same nature against the road department chairman. He quoted D. B. McKay, publisher of the Tampa Times and mayor of Tampa, in his story of waste in the city government there. He said that the indebtedness of Tampa had increased \$3,000,000 in the last two years while Carlton was the city's legal adviser.

During his talk, Senator Waybright once referred to the road chairman's two opponents as "Waybright, E. Catts and Sidney J. Carlton."

"Catts is going to be most liberal," said the senator, referring to Carlton's county home rule platform. "He'll let the people vote for highway robbery and race track gambling. Ask the parents of Deval County if they want race tracks again. See the boys now in the state penitentiary for embezzlement because of the Miami race track. But we must have this, says Mr. Catts to restore prosperity to Miami," continued Senator Waybright, "that more people this year than ever had when the race tracks were running there."

Waybright's travel service says that Carlton kept people away from Miami. Carlton has more tourists in Florida ever had and the legislature has refused to authorize the handling of this sort.

"Catts says we must support Carlton from race tracks licenses and taxes. When that time comes we had better close our capital at Tallahassee and admit to the world that we are incapable of governing ourselves." This statement was treated with a burst of applause.

The senator gave Hatfield's answers to several of Carlton's charges concerning the equipment of division of Gainesville and the routing of the Tamiami Trail. The

To set a new mark Thomas must stay up until 7:07 o'clock tomorrow night. The flyer dropped a note at noon. It said "Everything fine. Had a good night. Thomas also said he was confident of success."

## CENTRAL SECTION BEST IN FLORIDA SAYS BANK HEAD

Linton Allen Believes City And County Have Brightest Future After Seeing East And West Coasts Of State

After seeing the West and East Coast sections of Florida, Linton E. Allen this week returned to Sanford "more convinced than ever that the solid central section of the state will lead in the future development of Florida."

Mr. Allen, who left here early in April with his bride, the former Miss Helen Ives, of Orlando, to attend the state bankers' convention in Tampa and Havana, said today that on his trip he met a number of prominent bankers and other men who believe the development of Florida has only begun.

Among the men thoroughly convinced of the future of this state with whom he talked was Roy A. Young, governor of the federal reserve board of Washington. Mr. Young told Mr. Allen that he is fully convinced of the fundamental soundness of the state. Mr. Young was particularly interested in the Sanford section, interested in the district of Michigan near Kalamazoo. He knew of the Sanford district, the National Bank because it was the youngest bank in the federal reserve system.

John W. Mcintosh, comptroller of the currency at Washington, was another of the men who said he believed in Florida. He said that Iowa and Florida were admitted to the Union at the same time and that Iowa had become the center of mid-west agriculture. Florida, he thinks, will assume that place among the southern states within a very short time.

John T. Reid, treasurer of the Atlantic Coast line, who was a guest at the convention, told Mr. Allen that Sanford was one of the most important points in the Coast Line system. He said he was familiar with this section and believes it has a great future development in store for it.

The bankers met at Tampa and took boat to Havana where they were tendered a reception by the president of the Republic of Cuba. Mr. Allen said Havana was a modern city of 600,000 persons with beautiful American built boulevards lined with royal palms and tropical flowers. The old Spanish section, he said, is still dirty, has narrow streets and shows evidence of extreme poverty.

He said the national lottery in which almost every man, woman and child in Cuba takes part was drawn while he was there. The lottery is one of the principal sources of revenue to the government. The rural sections of Cuba, he said, have never recovered from the slump following the world war, in spite of efforts to restrict the output made by the government.

The price of sugar, Mr. Allen says, continues to follow the trend of world supply and demand.

Mr. and Mrs. Allen returned to Florida through Miami where they saw preparations for the National Shrine Convention. On his return to the bank, Mr. Allen said he found it at the high water mark in deposits. Local conditions, he believes, are brighter than conditions elsewhere in the state.

## Five Persons Die By Drinking Canned Heat

MOBILE, Ala., May 3.—(INS)—Five persons have died and a score more are ill as the result of drinking "canned heat" here in the last few weeks, police revealed today, announcing they would seek the aid of federal authorities to halt the sale of stuff containing wood alcohol.

Chief of Police Walter Burch pointed out that those who drink the "canned heat" disregard the printed warning that it is deadly poison. He told how three men gave a "party," and died the next day from drinking "canned heat."

## TAX LITIGATION PENDS BEFORE REVENUE BODY

Bureau Of Internal Revenue Faces Problem Of Adjusting Income Problem Due To Deflation Of Land Values

Experts Strive To Discover Solution

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(INS)—Tax litigation, involving millions of dollars, as a result of the Florida land boom, and subsequent deflation of values, is pending before the Bureau of Internal Revenue, it was learned today. The government is confronted by one of the most complicated problems since enactment of the income laws.

The sensational boom in land values, with profit taking that rivaled any real estate movement in history, and the aftermath when the bottom dropped out of prices has a tax reaction that involves small investors in every part of the country, and hundreds of large corporations and insurance companies which hold Florida mortgages.

"The year of 1921 witnessed large advances in the price of Florida real estate, but this was only a prelude to the phenomenal rise which occurred in 1925," said Edgar Graham, field audit expert of bureau. "The decline began in the early part of 1926; it is the tax returns for these three years that afford the problem."

"Elements involved are the basis to be used in the returns of profits for completed cases, deferred sales or installments, the basic cost of lots sold, in view of projected improvements not completed and the valuation of the sales contracts received in payment."

The bureau has adopted a general rule that the value of mortgages held in Florida land will be fixed on the basis of the value of the land prior to the boom, plus the amount of payments made in satisfaction of mortgages. Experts said that determination of mortgage values is the important factor in settlement of the contested cases.

For the first nine months of 1927 income tax returns in Florida amounted to \$29,654,000, while for the same period of the year ending June 30, 1928, the payment was but \$13,884,000.

Where land was sold for cash the seller must pay income tax on his profit. Conversely the purchaser is privileged to deduct from the price paid the loss in value of the land in making returns for subsequent years.

Officials said that it would be many years before the income tax returns of the Florida boom is adjusted. A special study of the situation is being made by experts at the direction of Commissioner D. H. Blair.

## Prohibition Agents Are Ordered Not To Investigate Jurors

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(INS)—Prohibition administrators were instructed today by Commissioner J. M. Moran not to make investigations of jurors who might be called to try dry cases. The action followed Congressional criticism of administrator John D. Pennington, of Pittsburgh, who sent out a questionnaire to determine the character, wealth, religion and political affiliations of prospective jurors.

## Aviator Reaches Gotham To Complete Plans For Flight Across Atlantic

NEW YORK, May 3.—(INS)—Mount Evans. Asked what he regarded as the main hazard in flying such an uncharted course, Hansell replied: "Very little is known of meteorological conditions in that region, and besides Greenland has never been crossed by airplane. Greenland was crossed by foot, however, by Nansen and Quvernan."

"If you examine the maps you will see that the water jump between Greenland and Sweden is narrower than any other point between the North American and European continents. After leaving Greenland we might conceivably pass over Iceland where in the event of an emergency, a stop might be made, although we do not intend to make one there."

"It was gratifying to me to read reports that Colonel Lindbergh has been studying the feasibility of flying this far north route to Europe. I have given this matter the closest study for over a year and have reached the conclusion that it is the most practical route. The chief reason is that you are able to fly over land most of the way. In fact at no time, even while crossing Davis Strait (northwest of Labrador) on the way to Greenland do you have to span a stretch of water that is longer than our American air mail routes."

## DIRIGIBLE ITALIA DEPARTS ON 2ND LEG OF POLE HOP

General Umberto Nobile Decides To Leave When World Is Received That Storms In Northern Land Had Subsidied

ST. LOUIS, Germany, May 3.—(INS)—The dirigible Italia, led by Umberto Nobile, left today on the second leg of its flight to the North Pole with King's Bay, Spitzbergen, as its destination.

General Umberto Nobile, commander of the gas airship, stated before his departure that the ice conditions before landing might be made at Vadsø, Norway, for refueling, if necessary, conditions permitted.

General Nobile decided upon starting this morning when he received word that the terrific storms over northern Norway which had prevented him from starting yesterday had subsided. Umberto, the former mascot of the Italia, accompanied Nobile and his crew of sixteen on the flight.

With searchlights playing on it from the field, the ship ascended rapidly and it was soon lost in the darkness. After a few moments, even the drone of its motors could not be heard. Mrs. Nobile and her daughter bade the general goodbye affectionately just before she jumped into the gondola of the ship. They smiled bravely and seemed confident of the success of his venture. They will return to Italy.

The dirigible is expected to cover the 1600 miles to King's Bay in between forty and fifty hours. Its cruising speed is about 80 miles an hour. The Norwegian Government is keeping men in readiness to aid the Italia to make a landing at Vadsø, if Nobile should decide to stop there. Vadsø is about 300 miles north of here.

## PLANE KILLS BOY

STURGIS, Mich., May 3.—(INS)—Fred H. Newman, 16-year old son of C. C. Newman, proprietor of the New Strand Theater, was killed when the plane in which he was a passenger crashed to the ground. Lieut. Gerald Sprad, the pilot, recently graduated from Kelly Field, Texas, was seriously hurt. Dewey A. Gross, 27, a passenger, was also probably fatally injured.

## FLYERS LEAVE CAPITAL AFTER BIG RECEPTION

Depart In Bremen's Sister Ship At Early Morning Hour For New York Where They Will Again Be Feted By Populace

Retire Late After Large Celebration

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(INS)—Three Aces Are Given Ovation Such As Washington Seldom Gives To Foreign Visitors

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(INS)—Glowing and happy over the warmth of the reception in the Capital, the Bremen trans-Atlantic flyers left here this morning for New York in the junkies man-of-war F-13, a sister to the famous ship which still lies marooned on Greenly Island.

The German trio took off from Bolling field at 8:28 A. M., bound for Miller Field, Staten Island, which they hope to make in about two and one-half hours.

The Capital was hardly astir when the F-13 rose in the early May sunshine. Only a group of army flyers, mechanics and newspaper reporters witnessed the flyers departure, a fact which was not unpleasing to Baron Von Huenefeld, capt. Hermann Koehl, and Maj. James Fitzmaurice, for crowds and mobs have been their lot since arriving in the United States.

It was early this morning before they got to bed, after a day such as Washington seldom gives to any foreign visitors. They were welcomed by the State Department, lunch and decorated by President Coolidge, greeted by both Houses of Congress, shown the sights of the capital, dined by their diplomats, the hectic day culminating last night with a magnificent government reception at which they were honored by more than 2,000 guests from the social and official life of Washington.

These have hardly had an hour's relaxation since they were taken off Greenly Island ten days ago and contained into a series of receptions and experiences such as only trans-Atlantic aerial flyers could merit.

The flyers arrived on the field shortly before 8 o'clock. Their big airplane was already on the line. Capt. Koehl got into the cockpit and took over the controls, with Major Fitzmaurice alongside him as co-pilot. Baron Von Huenefeld took up his usual group position in the back.

For nearly half an hour, the motor continued to purr while Maj. H. C. Davidson, commandant of Bolling Field, explained the route to Koehl, and gave him instructions concerning the weather he would likely encounter and the earliest method of landing at Miller Field. Also in the plane were R. R. Hlyche, who will assist the flyers on their American tour, and pilot Mechor, who flew the Junkers plane down from New York late yesterday.

Finally Capt. Koehl nodded his head and ejaculated "in, in" several times. Maj. Davidson climbed down, the mechanics pulled the checks, and the doughty German captain, taxied the F-13 out to the starting line.

With a faint wave of hands, the big plane lumbered down the field, gathering speed. Then Koehl "gave her the gun" and she soared off in the early morning sunlight.

Following their arrival from Washington, the flyers were to attend a luncheon given by the merchant's association at the Hotel Astor. In the afternoon they are to visit several newspaper plants, the National City Bank and the New York Edison Company's power plant at East River and in the late afternoon they will call on Lindsay Crawford, Irish Free State representative.

## Chinese Plane Tries To Destroy Arsenal

SHANGHAI, May 3.—(INS)—A hostile airplane attempted to bomb the National arsenal in Lung-hwa in the Southern suburbs of Shanghai today. Nearly a score of bombs were dropped, but the arsenal was not struck. A woman was killed.

## Many Japs Die In Chinese Fighting

TOKIO, May 3.—(INS)—A sensational report was current here this evening that 100 Japanese residents of Tsinan (Tsinanfu) have been killed by Chinese. The origin of the report was not given. Violent fighting developed between Japanese troops and Chinese Nationalists at Tsinan when Chinese began looting Japanese owned property. There were casualties on both sides. Tsinan is the Capital of Shantung Province.

## RED RUSSIA PAYS TRIBUTE TO KING OF AFGHANISTAN

For First Time Since Soviet Union Was Begun Homage Extended To Royal Pair On Tour Of Nations Of Europe

MOSCOW, May 3.—(INS)—Red Russia, ruled by a dictatorship of the proletariat, whose sole aim is to fight capitalism and monarchism, today paid homage to royalty for the first time since the Soviet was formed more than 10 years ago.

The royal personage was King Amanullah, of Afghanistan, who is the first ruling monarch to set foot on Russian soil since the Communists gained control of the nation. Immediately after the Afghan King and Queen and their big entourage arrived on a special train they were greeted by President Kalenin, a former peasant.

The King, then inspected two companies of Red Army infantry and two companies of cavalry. After this ceremony the King and Queen were whisked away to the Kremlin in a Rolls Royce motor car. Crowds of workers lined the streets and cheered the royal visitors.

A second official welcome was extended in the gilded Czardist Palace within the Kremlin walls. Both the railway station and the Kremlin were decorated in honor of the visiting royalty. A military band played the Afghan National Anthem. In addition to the Soviet President the greeting committee included Gen. Voroshiloff, commissar for war and marine; Georges Tchatcherin, commissar for foreign affairs, and N. A. Semashko, commissar for public health.

The King wore a brilliant uniform with medals, while Kalenin wore a sack suit.

## Pilot In Oklahoma Takes Off To Beat Endurance Record

CHICKASHA, Okla., May 3.—(INS)—Joe Hart, piloting a Ryan monoplane, had been aloft six hours at 11:43 A. M. today in his attempt to break the world's flight endurance record.

Hart, a former world war pilot, made his first successful takeoff out of a half dozen, at 5:43 this morning. He will have to remain in the air for more than 53 hours, 36 minutes and 30 seconds, in order to beat the present record held by George Haldeman and Eddie Stinson.

As Hart began his endurance flight, B. L. Human, a farmer living near town, shouted "Giddap, mules" and set forth behind a plow slicing a furrow down which he has said he would follow as long as the aviator stays aloft.

Human established a plowing record in 1919 at Sweetwater, Texas, when he plowed for 48 hours at one stretch.

## LEADERS SEE SMITH GAINING SOUTH'S FAVOR

Declare Southland Is Getting Reconciled To The Nomination Of Gotham Aspirant

Daniels Declines To Head 3rd Party

Many Believe He Will Switch Over To Side Of Tammany Leader

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(INS)—Indications that the South is becoming reconciled, perhaps reluctantly, but nevertheless reconciled, to the nomination of Gov. Al Smith were seen here today in the quick and emphatic refusal of Joseph Daniels to have anything to do with a third-party movement against Smith.

Daniels a former member of the Wilson Cabinet, and one of the most pronounced Drys in his party, has been opposed to Gov. Smith's nomination in common with most of the other leaders of his state and section. Yet he declared unequivocally his opposition to any third party movement against the New York Governor, and asserted that he would support the nominee of the Houston convention.

Inasmuch as the nomination of Smith is now believed inevitable by the leaders of Southern Democracy in the Capital, Daniels' announcement was interpreted here today as tantamount to a declaration that he would support Smith. The former Cabinet officer is now publisher of the Raleigh News and Observer, and influential Southern organ.

"I see no hope in any third party," said Daniels in a telegram to Wilbur Leggett, California campaign manager for Senator Smith of Missouri, who had asked Daniels directly if he would consent to become identified with an independent movement in November.

"The biggest issue in America today," Daniels added, "is to wrest the government from the hands of privilege and corruption. The only hope for that end is in a victory by the Democratic Party."

"I, therefore, expect to support the nominee of the Houston Convention. I expect the convention to declare without equivocation for the sacred enforcement of Prohibition and all other laws, and do not believe any man who will nominate will be as indifferent as Mellon has been under the Harding and Coolidge administrations."

"I would not accept a nomination on any third party ticket." It was also indicated today that Senator Reed's headquarters have been somewhat embarrassed by the threat of a third party movement, voiced by his California manager. No such intimation or suggestion has come from Reed himself. On the contrary, Senator Reed has conspicuously refrained from saying anything in his speeches over the country that could be construed as adverse criticism of the New York Governor. Reed and Smith supporters, in fact, have cooperated in some places, notably in Oklahoma.

There were renewed intimations in political circles here today that Senator Thomas J. Walsh (D) of Montana, may take himself out of the race before the Houston convention assembles. The overwhelming Smith victory in California, in which Walsh ran a poor third, is said to have convinced the Montanan that it is useless to continue the fight. It was reported today that Walsh may soon request his eight delegates from Montana not to present his name to the convention. They are the only delegates he has at present.

## Chamber Postpones Citizenship Meeting

The Citizenship Meeting called by the Chamber of Commerce for tomorrow night today was postponed until next Tuesday, when it will be held at the City Hall at 8 o'clock. S. O. Shinholser, president of the commerce body will preside. Among the speakers will be Dr. E. D. Brownlee, Mr. Shinholser, Frank P. Foster, Linton E. Allen and Fred R. Wilson. The meeting will last approximately an hour and a half, according to E. J. Trotter, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. The meeting was originally called to inform taxpayers of the financial condition of the city government.

## Boxing Commission Will Conduct Investigation Of Sharkey-Delaney Fiasco

NEW YORK, May 2. The proposed investigation by the New York Boxing Commission into the circumstances surrounding the Sharkey-Delaney knockout was proceeding today through a labyrinth of innuendoes, suggestive circumstances and allegations. These were of the type similar to those in circulation before, after and during the course of many fights, only this time they were deemed of sufficient plausibility to prompt chairman James A. Farley to order an inquiry.

Farley, however, did not take this action until the stories were consolidated into a chain of circumstantial evidence and presented by a local newspaper for his consideration in the form of a hypothetical case. The presentation apparently found the official in a receptive mood, for it came as the climax of a week of rumors, sufficiently plausible, in his estimation, to cause him to order a sharply worded warning to the fighters by the referee before the bout.

The stories, otherwise well-legended to have impressed Tex Rickard to the extent that his matchmaker, Jess McMahon, was supposed to have visited Delaney's camp in order to judge the young man's condition. It seemed, however, that it was an off day in the Delaney camp, as McMahon is said to have returned without specific information.

The boxes further were said to have caused a hurried conference between Rickard, Jimmy Johnson and Johnny Buckley, manager of Sharkey, an hour before the fight. The conference, it was said, threw no light on the situation.

If Farley's proposed investigation takes the usual form, those identified with the bout, will be haled before the commission at its next meeting on Friday. The chairman, however, had nothing to add to his original statements, contenting himself with saying that many rumors about the fight had reached his ears during the past week or more and that he considered that these were worth looking into.

Of the newspapermen congregated at the ringside, the vast majority saw only a remarkable come back on the part of Sharkey in the seventy-three second knockout of Delaney. Most of them said that Sharkey "looked great." The writer failed to see Sharkey in that light, it being his idea that the Boston entry looked good only because Delaney obviously was bad.

The latter, indeed seemed to be in a daze, for they had to ring the bell twice to get him out of his corner. Sharkey's punching was slovenly and poorly timed. He threw long right handers at random and that was the way they landed. Delaney didn't seem to be able to untrack himself and stood there, fascinated, as the punches came over to beat him down. He came up the first time without a count, took the fall nine on the next trip, and then leaped forward directly into the uppercut that finished him. Sharkey put everything he had behind that punch. It had all the following through of a long toe shot, with the shoulder snap imparted at just the correct instant to make the impact carry full authority.

This is what some 15,000 spectators saw. If Farley saw anything else, he was keeping it to himself today.

Pittsburgh, moving up fast in the National League standing again defeated the Chicago Cubs, 4 to 1. Carmen Hill allowed only five hits and George Grantham, the League's leading batter, had a perfect day at bat with three bingles.

Red Lucas outpitched Alexander the Great as the scintillating Cincinnati outslugger the St. Louis Cardinals, 6 to 3.

The Boston Braves made their hits count and handed the Phillies a 5 to 3 beating. The Back Bay boys passed the slipping Cubs and jumped to sixth place.

## Solon Introduces Bill To Regulate Diplomatic Corps

WASHINGTON, May 2.—(INS)—American diplomats would be forbidden to use the influence of their offices to secure introductions at European courts for American society women, under a resolution introduced in the House by Rep. Sabath (D) of Illinois.

The resolution was aimed particularly at the Court of St. James where American women fight for the honor of being presented to the King and Queen, Sabath indicated.

The demands upon American ambassadors and ministers by crazed American social climbers to be presented to royalty is so great that the efficiency of the diplomatic service is impaired, Sabath declared today.

"My resolution would direct the Secretary of State to inform members of the American Diplomatic Corps that their time not be used up in this way. No reason why they should go to the whims and social ambitions of ambitious and crazy men." The resolution was referred to the Foreign Affairs Committee. Sabath announced he would demand early action.

Shooting Straight Again

Tomorrow afternoon circuit court reconvenes in order that Judge Gray may pass sentence upon the two defendants in the bank case. Forrest Lake, convicted on five counts in four trials, faces a sentence not to exceed forty-five years in the penitentiary. A. R. Key might be imprisoned for ten years, or he might be released with the payment of a fine of two thousand dollars.

While not condoning in any respect Mr. Key's conduct either in making excessive loans to himself or in making false entries in effort to cover up both for himself and for Mr. Lake, we have been glad to note on Mr. Key's part, since the failure of the bank, a decided tendency toward repentance.

The testimony in the trials shows that it was at Mr. Key's insistence on August 6 that notes were placed in the bank which represented loans to these officials and which were prima facie evidence of their guilt. If these notes had not been placed in the bank, the shortages in the various city funds from which the transfers originally had been made, would have remained, and the city, and incidentally, the taxpayers, would have been the losers.

Mr. Key has further showed his good faith by refusing to perjure himself on the witness stand either in his own behalf or in behalf of Mr. Lake. The records verified his testimony and the juries by their verdicts registered their belief. We believe it took considerable courage to testify to such mistakes as he had made and that he did it, in our opinion, shows his desire to reform.

Judge Gray will in all probability take these facts into consideration when passing sentence and will quite properly award such penalty as will make a better man and aid him to steer a straighter course between Scylla and Charybdis should such an exigency arise again.

Speak For Yourself, Fons

Some weeks ago Dr. Fons Hathaway came to Sanford to speak in behalf of his candidacy for governor and disappointed several hundred citizens who had gathered in the City Hall in the hope that he might successfully refute the damaging charges brought against him by the candidate from Tampa. But Fons Alyce Hathaway did not convince his hearers that all is well on the Potomac, or the Ochlockonee, or the Withlacoochee, and his story about rats-pra, canvas, cabbages and kings only served to convince people more than ever that something is rotten in Denmark.

So the Doctor, blushing boyishly, said he was tired and promised to come back later when he felt better and tell the rest of the story. But one thing and another has interfered. His throat is sore and there are so many counties. He doesn't like to travel much anyway. And then his wife has been sick, and his official duties take a great deal of time. You know how it is. So last night Senator Waybright, one of the Doctor's boy friends in Jacksonville, turned up and spoke for him.

Now the Duval Senator is a conversationalist of the first order. He certainly knows his nouns, pronouns, and adverbs. And in dealing with his friend's adversaries he is as sharp as a rapier in his thrusts and as persistent as a horsefly. He ripped and slashed at Catts until that reverend gentleman was torn to shreds and was not sufficiently connected to even bury. Then he tore into Doyle Carlton and chased him around the ring with hooks and jabs and right crosses, driving him into the ropes and finally leaving him in a deplorably prone position on some of his own canvas.

When Senator Waybright resorted to argument, he was clear and concise, even logical at times. When he attacked, his words came in short sharp tones that served to startle his hearers. He allowed no one to sleep as he moved quickly from one subject to another, now charging, now refuting, now refuting, now charging. And when he chose to resort to oratory, he carried his audience lightly on the wings of vivid imagination, out of the City Hall and across the sparkling waters of lustrous Lake Monroe to far away Olympus where Zeus and Hera ruled and to the Elysian Fields where dwelt the souls of all departed saints. And then as deftly he brought them back again across the towering billows of broad Atlantic as far as the Gulf Stream's northward flowing waters and there he ducked them.

And as we struggled vainly to keep our feet on the concrete floor of the City Hall, we thought what a pity it was that Dr. Hathaway could not have said those things. How pathetic that when this candidate speaks he does not make sense! Had Senator Waybright been running for governor, we have no doubt that his appearance here would have made votes for him, but the people are inclined to want a man who can speak for himself, not necessarily an orator, but a man who can say what's on his mind at least.

The Doctor's dilemma reminds us very strongly of the predicament Captain Miles Standish found himself in when he discovered he was in love with the beautiful Priscilla of the Plymouth Colony. Standish was a man of action, not of words, and found himself as tongue-tied as Cyrano in delivering a message of love. He resolved to send his good and faithful friend John Alden to plead his case for him.

But Alden had secretly entertained a fond and lingering passion in his own heart for the fair Priscilla and she in turn, quite as secretly, preferred the less dashing, but more loquacious and romantic John Alden. The Captain did not know this, nor did Alden know Priscilla cared for him, and rather than offend his friend, he consented to deliver the Captain's message. We do not know what Alden said, but we have no reason to believe that he, being a loyal friend, might not have argued thus:

"Captain Standish sends me here to ask the favor of your hand for him. The Captain is a fine and noble man and bids me say that you would make a splendid wife. He sees in you all the beauty of a diamond of jewels and he says that Socrates called beauty a short-lived Tyranny; Plato, a privilege of Nature; Theophrastus, a sheet of lead; Theocritus, a delightful prejudice; Carnades, a solitary kingdom; Domitian said, that nothing was more grateful; Aristotle affirmed, that beauty was better than all the letters of recommendation in the world; Homer, that 'twas a glorious gift of Nature; and Ovid, alluding to him, calls it a favor bestowed by the gods."

"But I, Priscilla, my sweet," we have no doubt, he, being a man, continued, "say to you that beauty such as yours is a thing eternal, more divine than godliness, more inspiring than a word from heaven. It stretches forth like sheer effulgence illuminating the darkness of this earth like the stars that shine in the sky, but more enduring for the stars will fade at dawn with the coming of the sun. Such beauty was not meant to radiate alone or like an isolated rose to blush unseen and waste its fragrance on the desert air, but to fall into the arms of him who knows the freshness of such beauty, which is love. I come, I say, to ask your hand for him who could not come himself."

And Priscilla, that faint little lady of the Plymouth Colony, simply smiled and cooed, "Why don't you speak for yourself, John?"

THE PEOPLE WILL NOTE ST. PETERSBURG TIMES

Is a Catts-Carlton combination really dawning upon the people as the menace in the race for governor?

A front page editorial in the Okeechobee News brings the issue to the front in capital letters, under the caption: "Will Catts-Carlton Combine Succeed In Duping The People?" The News says in part:

"Why wouldn't Carlton sign a statement that he was opposed to gambling? Why does Catts solicit second choice votes for Carlton? Why is it that race track interests at Miami are supporting Catts and some of the same ilk in Tampa are supporting Doyle Carlton? Why is it that Carlton has never said a word against Catts, nor who believes that these two candidates are not running together to explain all this?"

The Palm Beach Independent gives a two-column spread to Joe Egan's survey of the political situation and dips into the question of the same menace of an alleged Catts-Carlton combination, with the suggestion that the evi-

dent harmony in Hillsborough county and Tampa, for the "first time in a millenium" has a reason a lot deeper than the still waters of Tampa bay. This is the way plain speaking Joe puts it:

"Old Catts is still a contender—yet he is. For the first time in a millenium, which means before Tampa or Hillsborough county existed, there is supposed harmony and all the boys are supporting Doyle Carlton for governor, including all of the newspapers. However there is some apprehension that we have just got to have some of the potential influential friendship of Florida's governor—middle, Catts at one end and Doyle are playing both ends against the other; whereby, if either of the other is elected they can grasp the hand of either of the other and say, with gusto, 'Didn't we give 'em hell?'"

Now, it is perfectly true that not all the wisdom or all the powers of observation, of all the ability to draw keen conclusions from observations, lie with the "big" newspapers. The lesser ones can

take notice quite as well, and sometimes they are closer to the actual truth than those that assume to speak for the whole state.

The belief that there is a Catts-Carlton combination did not originate in the pure blue sky. There have been some evident conditions that point to it, and there has been no authoritative word or move that could be expected to dispel it.

That more people are more carefully and seriously taking note as the campaign progresses, there can be no doubt. The campaigns of three of the four leading candidates for governor—those of Carlton, Catts and Hathaway—are campaigns of political practices only—and not the most creditable practices at that. The campaign of the other one—Senator John S. Taylor—in strong and creditable contrast to the campaign of a man of splendid qualifications and record who is standing solely upon those qualifications and upon that record, with no war upon any of the other candidates whatsoever, and no questionable political tactics to out-trick theirs.

There is no jockeying in the campaign of John S. Taylor. He is only offering the people of Florida in the most straightforward way the same character and ability and high performance as a governor that he has demonstrated in his active business and public life during the past 25 years.

And of all these things there is increasing evidence that the people will take note.

and the other candidates can't the rest of the votes," said J. Catts here last Monday. This is fair enough, but if there are others who had planned vote for Mr. Catts they may find it embarrassing to be placed in the company he frankly chose.—Jacksonville Journal.

Doyle Carlton made a political speech in Fort Pierce last week. He attacked Hathaway as usual but he did not utter one word against Catts. One could almost believe that Carlton is not afraid to tackle Catts, or else afraid of Carlton, or else afraid of Carlton's Catts, or else afraid of Carlton's Catts record. If Carlton prefers Catts, if he can find nothing wrong with Catts' record he is politically warped in that direction and is literally warped in the direction Hathaway.—Okeechobee News.

### JAMES M. CARSON TALKS TO CROWD AT FERNANDINA

**Throng Packs Courthouse To Hear Miami Candidate Deliver Scathing Attack On Gambling Candidate Catts**

FERNANDINA, May 3.—Nearly four hundred persons heard James M. Carson, candidate for governor, in an address in the Nassau county courthouse last night. Every seat was taken and many were standing when the Miami attorney began his address, which was devoted mainly to a scathing attack against Sidney J. Catts and race track gambling.

The audience cheered the speaker when he remarked that he had been in 44 counties and then addressed that if "my strength lasts and my voice holds out until June 5 I'll have the old Catts on the highest limb of the tallest pine west of the Appalachicola river."

Mr. Carson told his audience that "Catts is still high man despite the assertions of other candidates" and he declared that the reverend gentleman is the candidate that must be beaten by the successful aspirant for the governor's chair.

The minister candidate was denounced for capitalizing upon his profession in order to make money out of running for office. That he is "double crossing" the gamblers and the good people alike was the declaration of Mr. Carson, who substantiated the claim by showing records where Catts had bought secretly mortgages in Seminole county in the amount of \$24,760. The first of these was purchased less than three weeks after the close of the 1921 campaign and the last one two months after he told Burton Bank that he was a "broken man and could not make the race" unless Manly supplied the funds.

In opening his address Mr. Carson reminded his hearers that Fernandina is the "cradle of my family" since it was in 1743 the Col. William Eubank settled in this city as commander of the English garrison stationed here. Later Col. Eubank resigned his commission and lived here until his death. Col. Eubank was the earliest of Mr. Carson's maternal ancestors to come to Florida.

### Ten Persons Die In May Day Rioting Of Warsaw Socialists

WARSAW, May 3.—(INS)—Ten persons are dead here today, others are dying and more than 100 are suffering from wounds as a result of the worst May Day rioting in the history of Poland. Socialists took part in violent street fighting. Panic reigned over a large section of the city as the rival factions fired upon each other.

### Health HINTS

When the kidneys fail to eliminate the poisons, it is then called on the arteries, irritating them and causing them to become congested and inflamed, partially closing their caliber, and thereby raising their blood pressure, and throwing additional work upon the heart, which in time results in hypertrophy (enlargement) of that organ. After this goes on for some time and the blood pressure goes above two hundred millimeters of mercury, the patient begins to enter the danger zone and often many degrees in advance of such a degree in the shape of dizziness, ringing of the ears, and an aching and painful sensation in the back of the neck, and sometimes a feeling of pressure in the top of the head. If relief is not speedily forthcoming, the patient sinks what is known as a stroke, which simply means that the arteries of the brain, being unprotected by muscles as in other parts of the body, crack under the unaccustomed blood pressure and causes paralysis of some part of the body. If it is not treated at once, paralysis of the breathing or heart covers, death is instantaneous. If it happens in arm or leg center it results in paralysis of the limbs on that side, generally resulting in temporary loss of speech. Even after this, if a patient is properly treated and eliminative treatment is immediately instituted, there is a probability of restoring the patient to practically normal health.

Tomorrow afternoon circuit court reconvenes in order that Judge Gray may pass sentence upon the two defendants in the bank case. Forrest Lake, convicted on five counts in four trials, faces a sentence not to exceed forty-five years in the penitentiary.

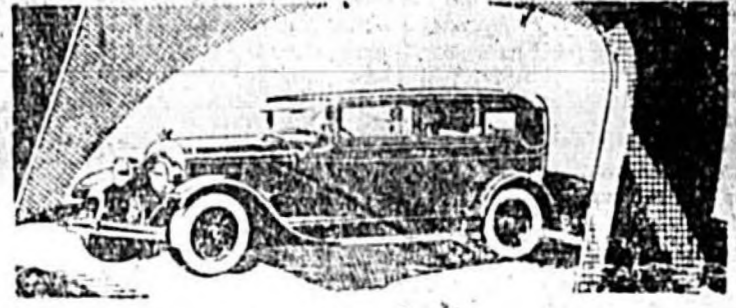

**Health HINTS**

When the kidneys fail to eliminate the poisons, it is then carried on the arteries, irritating them and causing them to become congested and inflamed partially closing their caliber, and thereby raising their blood pressure, and throwing additional work upon the heart which in time results in hypertrophy (enlargement) of that organ. After this goes on for some time and the blood pressure goes above two hundred millimeters of mercury, the patient begins to enter the danger zone and often nature begins to throw out signals of distress in the shape of dizziness, ringing of the ears, and an aching and painful sensation in the back of the neck, and sometimes a feeling of pressure in the top of the head. If relief is not speedily forthcoming, the patient suffers what is known as a stroke, which simply means that the arteries of the brain, being unprotected by muscles as in other parts of the body, crack under the unrelenting blood pressure, and causes paralysis of some part of the body. If it happens to be the center of the breathing or heart centers, death is instantaneous. If it happens in arm or leg center it results in paralysis of the limbs on that side, generally resulting in temporary loss of speech. Even after this, if a patient is properly treated and efficient treatment is immediately instituted, there is a probability of restoring the patient to practically normal health.
