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

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

Drunk driving is a primary cause of at least half of all traffic fatalities. The odds on a drinking driver being involved in a collision rise dramatically with successive drinks. Chart, based on a 160-pound man consuming one-ounce drinks of 86-proof within a two-hour period after eating, shows the cumulative effects of alcohol, with accident probabilities doubling and tripling with successive drinks.

# U. S.-Trained Tribesmen In Control Plain Of Jars Seized

SANFORD (AP) — The army of Meo tribesmen trained and equipped by the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency has seized virtually complete control of the Plain of Jars in eastern Laos and encountered no significant resistance from Communist forces, American sources in Vientiane reported today.

Except for five months in 1969, the Plain of Jars has been held by North Vietnamese and Pathet Lao forces since 1964. American sources, who arrived in Vientiane from the plain 100 miles north of the Laotian capital said Meo commandos teams have covered most of the area in search of enemy supplies and uncovered large underground food stores, including canned pork, condensed milk, coffee and candy.

# 10 Rebels Executed At Rabat

RABAT, MOROCCO (AP) — The government announced today 10 army officers have been executed in connection with the attempt to overthrow the monarchy of King Hassan II.

The leader of the coup, Gen. Mohamed Medbouh, was shot by his own men at the site of a five-hour bloodbath at the king's summer palace at Skhirat, 18 miles south of Rabat.

A communiqué said all were executed this morning but reliable Moroccan sources said some of them—including three generals—were shot at sunrise on Monday.

# Vietnam War Report Adds Statistics To Debate

Coming from the Congressional Research Service of the Library of Congress is a parade of statistics on the Vietnam War which is astounding and horrendous.

They supply a background of hard facts, unbelievable in number and shocking in breadth, against which the current maneuvering of the Nixon administration to cope with the Hanoi peace proposals seem even more inexplicable.

Did you know that this undeclared war has cost you — yes, YOU — \$400? That the total budgeted cost of the war, so far, is \$120 billion, of which \$98 billion is for defense which would have been unnecessary in peacetime?

The report was made to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee of which Senator J. William Fulbright (D) is chairman. This senator has been a persistent and constant critic of the conduct of the war.

When some of the other salient and amazing statistics in the report are lined up, this grave interpretation by Senator Fulbright appears quite inexcusable.

"It is ironic that the war which started ostensibly as one to defend freedom and democracy in South Vietnam may have the effect of seriously undermining democracy in the United States."

Dollar costs, already noted, however are matched by casualty figures which are given as 827,000 for U.S. South Vietnamese and allied military personnel. Over a million civilian casualties in South Vietnam and uncounted thousands in Cambodia and Laos.

Use of herbicides by the United States has affected nearly one-seventh of the land area of South Vietnam, destroying forests that could have supplied that nation's lumber needs for 31 years and crops that could have fed about 600,000 persons for one year.

Use of air power has been and is a continuing tactic of the United States and the report highlights

which have been allowed to fester in urban, racial, political and social arenas.

What this report does for the reader, who will look at it clearly, is to make the immediate cessation of this tragic adventure essential.

What it will do in the councils of the mighty is something else again. But there is at work the yeast of the 1972 presidential election year.

And at least one aspect of the Hanoi peace proposals which can be counted on to be respected in the GOP strategy planning is that of the POWs. Families of these imprisoned American heroes have listened to the accent President Nixon has given their fate. Now, they say, the way is open to free them.

Thus the Vietnam War issue continues to be acute, vital and explosive. Settlement of it in 1971 would tend to free the 1972 campaign from its emotional and disruptive impact.

We believe the Vietnam-Indochina war should be ended at once. We believe that such reports as this are strong factors which cannot safely be ignored.

A hospital is a place for healing, and the doctors, nurses and others are dedicated to that purpose. It is natural to assume that the doctor in question is suffering sharp pain from a chronic but unrelated ailment. He walks out to see the attractive, smiling head nurse and asks if she can get authority to give him anti-pain-kills he uses regularly.

The smile fades and she snarls harshly: "Absolutely not!" End of appeal for relief from pain.

One of the few things that the United States of America has done right so far as the issue of Cuba is concerned is its support for a Havana-to-Miami airlift for Cuban refugees since 1965.

The airlift is in keeping with the historic image of the United States as a haven for the oppressed.

It also serves as a reminder to the world that people who cherish freedom and self reliance are willing to pay almost any price to free communism.

East Germans risk their lives and abandon their fortunes to flee to the freedom of West Germany. Jews in the Soviet Union leave their loved ones and their homes to flee to Israel.

Chinese by the thousands leave their precious land to escape the oppression of the Communists.

Despite more than a decade of promises by Fidel Castro of the Caribbean paradise he would create, about 3,600 Cubans flee his dictatorship each month, preferring the freedom of the United States. It is a point that is not lost on the world.

Finally, the airlift has given the United States some valued and substantial citizens, persons who know and appreciate the value of freedom and democracy.

For all of these reasons, the U.S. Senate should reject the recommendations of its appropriation committee that the Cuban airlift should be discontinued because it is too costly in terms of money.

In reality it may be the most productive foreign assistance that we give.

### "Welfare" Becoming "Workfare"?

WASHINGTON — Before the end of this year the country may begin to speak of "workfare" instead of "welfare relief."

President Nixon's proposed new law to reform the vast unemployment system as it is run now stands a strong chance of passage by both houses of Congress. The House of Representatives has already enacted the Nixon Plan. The Senate which has refused its approval in past years, now is inclined to vote for the Nixon type reform in some form.

The heart of Rik I, the White House proposal, would change "welfare" to "workfare" by requiring able bodied unemployed to get jobs or sign up for job training in order to qualify for government assistance. To encourage the working poor to take up work, the bill would reduce the unemployment benefits to the poverty level of \$2,400 per year.

Rep. Wilbur Mills of Arkansas, chairman of the powerful Ways and Means Committee, favors the new system. It would move us toward the goal of making welfare "nothing more than a temporary way station" instead of "a way of life."

As we know, this is not the case today. A House report on the need for a change of direction in the program concludes that "the welfare system in the United States has been moving toward a state of crisis and chaos."

The Ways and Means Committee back the Nixon bill, amended, because it believes the bill will make the change less difficult — will care for the needs of the helpless — and make sure that "all those who are capable of working do so."

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



State Elections Director Don Glisson said Monday Shevin has told her it will probably take him until Aug. 1 to finish a requested legal opinion on the residency question. ## U. S. Agencies In Conflict Over 'Glades'

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — At odds with the U.S. Corps of Engineers, two federal agencies have recommended either suspension or outright elimination of two canals bordering Everglades National Park. The Corps in its central and southern Florida flood control district environmental impact statement dated May 24 urged completion of the \$1.3 billion project in south Dade County.

A decision by the Cabinet that could either kill or complete the 76 per cent finished C-109 and 60 per cent done C-116 canals is expected a week from today. Joe Brown, Everglades National Park superintendent, said his agency supports "efforts to terminate construction of these canals." "Further, we suggest that the canals in the south Dade area be studied to determine what measures should be taken to provide a system which minimizes damage to the environment," he said. Brown pointed out in his statement that the canals would drain a section of the vast natural park containing 60 per cent of its roseate spoonbills, 60 per cent of the reddish egret, 40 per cent of the wood ibis, 23 per cent of the great white heron, 15 per cent of the American egret and 93 per cent of the coccodriles. All are rare and endangered species. "If these populations are to be maintained there must be no deterioration in water quality," Brown said. "We are certain that with construction of canals 109 and 116 inferior quality waters will be poured into the area and that this will affect the wildlife populations adversely."

### Love Bug Is Here To Stay

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The love bug is here to stay and a state legislator says there is no feasible way of exterminating the insect. Rep. Earl Dixon, R-Jacksonville, said Monday he had researched the possibility of a war on love bugs but could not discover a safe, inexpensive and successful means of eradicating the pest. "For the time being we're just going to have to live with the problem and be glad they don't bite or sting," Dixon said. "After all they are beneficial in producing employment for innumerable service stations attendants who are kept busy wiping windshields." A pest control business operator Dixon researched the possibility of love bug eradication with the help of the University of Florida's Department of Entomology. He decided to make the study after the Florida Farm Bureau urged the 1971 Legislature to explore the possibility of attacking love bugs. "The bugs got their name by mating in flight, which is what some are doing when drivers squish through a thick roadside swarm of the gregarious insects. They produce twice a year, and a female love bug is capable of laying 230 eggs. "At the moment there seems to be no idea of what it would cost, even if we knew how to eliminate this insect," Dixon said.

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
### Canal \$\$ Reduction Sought

### 'Special' Students Face School Loss

Seminole County students attending classes at three Orange County schools for the handicapped, deaf and blind will have no other facilities after this next term. This was disclosed at Tuesday's School Board meeting by Walter Teague, school finance officer and associate superintendent. Teague said some 30 students now going to Rock Lake, Forest Park and Princeton Schools will not be allowed to attend the school after the 1972-73 school year "because Orange County has all it can take care of."  
Seminole has no such facilities and has been paying a yearly supplement to the neighboring county to school handicapped, blind and deaf children. This year, the supplement will amount to \$70 for each child or a total of \$21,000, which Teague said was higher than past years.  
The finance officer said the only hope for schooling these children after next year will be for the Legislature to provide additional money to Orange County to allow facilities there to educate students from surrounding counties.  
Teague said handicapped children have been going to Orange County for more than 20 years and "it would be a wonderful thing if the Legislature would act to continue this arrangement."

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
