Teens arrested

Seminole County deputy sheriff's arrested six teenagers early this morning, charging them with burglary and grand theft in connection with two vehicle burglaries at the Wella Springs Apartments near Winter Springs.

The suspects were arrested at about 4 a.m. in front of Red Bug Elementary School.

One of the teens was carrying a backpack that contained about \$500 worth of stolen jewelry.

Five of the suspects, ages 15 to 17, were taken to the Seminole County Juvenile Detention Center in Sanford. Their names are being withheld because of their ages.

The sixth suspect, Jana Watt, 19, was booked at the John E. Polk Correctional Facility in Sanford.

Court orders use of racy ads

BOSTON (AP) — Condom ads with daring slogans such as "One of these will make you 11,000th of an inch larger" must appear unaltered in Boston's subways and trolleys, a federal judge ruled.

U.S. District Judge Rya Zobel said Tuesday that subways and trolleys are public forums and that the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority violated the First Amendment when it turned down the anti-AIDS messages.

The transit agency said it may appeal. "Whatever the decision is, it hasn't deterred us from our desire to maintain the MBTA as a G-rated transit system," said James E. Rooney, deputy general manager.

"The agency had said the ads would force a captive audience including children to see 'indecent sexual images.'" The six ads proposed by the AIDS Action Committee picture a wrapped condom.

The MBTA rejected or demanded changes in such slogans as "Tell him you don't know how it will ever fit" and "Even if you don't have one, carry one."

The judge's ruling "removes yet another barrier erected by government officials more concerned about public relations than about public health," said Larry Kessler, executive director of the AIDS organization.

Kids as rape victims

Sex assaults up; few reported to county hotline

SANFORD — The increasing number of children who are victims of sexual assaults statewide is changing the focus of some rape crisis centers. However, a Seminole County rape hotline gets few, if any calls from children.

Although specific statistics on the number of sexual assault victims in the county are not available due to the holiday, a spokesman for the

local hot line reports few calls, from adults or children on a monthly basis.

The crisis line, which is answered 24 hours a day, receives five calls or less each month, according to Robert Colbert in the communica-

tions department of the sheriff's office. The calls are answered then returned by volunteers who offer advice, if asked, and listen to the victims. Sometimes, the victims don't want to report assaults to law enforcement officials but need help finding counseling and other services.

Of the 13,429 sexual assaults from fondling to rape reported statewide in 1992, 63 percent of the victims were under 18, statistics from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement show.

Shot in arm for county healthcare

The county healthcare system received a big shot in the arm this year with the addition of services at local hospitals.

The Heart Center of HCA Central Florida Regional Hospital, Seminole County's first and only open heart surgery facility, made its debut in August of this year.

"The Heart Center will not only cater to Seminole and West Volusia county," according to Roy Vinson, executive director of the hospital.

"There are going to be some patients pulled this way from Daytona Beach in Volusia and also from Ocala in Marion County. I don't anticipate as much from Orange, but that is not to say that people who live in Seminole and work in Orange won't make the change."

Sanford OKs tighter control of bingo

SANFORD — Veterans organizations backing tighter control of commercial bingo in Sanford logged a victory Monday when commissioners unanimously approved new rules and regulations governing the game.

During Monday's second reading of the ordinance, and at the first

reading on Dec. 13, several dozen members of area veterans organizations were in attendance.

Many of the groups conduct bingo games on the non-profit basis, raising money for charities or to help finance special projects. Each time as the vote was taken to approve the measure, the spectators smiled or nodded in approval.

Veterans groups had supported the measure since commercial

bingo began operating in Sanford. The groups had complained to Sanford police and the State Attorney's Office that Sanford Bingo, a commercial venture, violated state bingo laws. Police have found no violations by the commercial hall.

During both preliminary discussions at work sessions, and the two public hearings, no one spoke against what was being proposed.

The matter originated in Novem-

ber, when Sanford Police Chief Ralph Russell told the commissioners he was disappointed that recent state legislation failed to tighten enforcement of bingo operations. Russell suggested the city enact an ordinance making restrictions stronger.

He suggested video cameras be required to record pay-offs, photos of checks be made, and require-

Lake Mary: New age of fire fighting

LAKE MARY — Gone are the days when firemen hung on the side of a truck en route to a fire. They must be located inside a firetruck.

The deterioration and age of an old Ford pumper truck, and the new safety requirements have brought about a major change in Lake Mary's fire equipment.

A new pumper unit was delivered to the Lake Mary fire station Tuesday. The unit, approved by the city commission several months ago, was obtained at a cost of \$188,795.

Fire Chief Duane Mehl said there is much to be done such as installing hoses, installing the radio system and other equipment. "But we expect to have the unit fully operational within just a few weeks," he commented.

Nancy Armstrong, director of the Seminole County Guardian Ad Litem program, said there has been an increase in the number of sexually abused children in recent years.

Dependent juveniles who are victims of abuse, including sexual abuse, are sometimes represented by a volunteer in the Guardian Ad Litem program in juvenile court. The volunteers represent the children in the system whose sole focus is the interest of the child. There are not enough volunteers for each dependent youth to have one at the present time.

"What they do is monitor the services the court orders for the child," Armstrong explained. "They do their own investigation and make recommendations to the court for therapy, or for psychologicals, or where the child should be living."

There are about 100 trained volunteers now and a new training program is being set up in January. Individuals interested in becoming a volunteer should contact Armstrong at 323-2500 extension 5370 for more details.

Armstrong said over the years, there has been an increase in the abuse that is reported. "There has always been abuse," she added. "It is reported more." She added many times, although not always, children who were abused become child abusers as adults, perhaps adding to the increase of abuse cases.

The Hillsborough County Crisis Center served only rape victims 18 years and older when it opened in 1974.

Today it serves victims of all ages with a special focus on children.

"We decided that if we were going to make the greatest impact and reduce the amount of sexual abuse in the community, we needed to start with the children," said Diane Smith, the center's associate executive

director. Dade County noticed more children and adolescents reporting incidents of sexual assault beginning in 1984. Ricardo Forbes, director of the Rape Treatment Center at Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami, said Wednesday.

Mehl said, "The members of our department are really looking forward to using this new equipment because it's one of the real advances we've had in fire fighting techniques."

ments for financial reporting be strengthened. All of the matters have been inserted into the wording of the ordinance.

"Problems are emerging about bingo not being properly conducted," Russell had said. "The city needs to do something to oversee such operations."

An annual regulatory permit will be required for both profit and charity operated bingo games. Applications must be made to the city which will investigate whether an applicant has met all the requirements of the new ordinance.

The application cost is \$500.

In addition to two open heart surgical suites, the center boasts 12 surgical intensive care unit (SICU) beds located adjacent to the surgical suites.

The structural addition was planned with the help of not only architectural specialists but also with the physicians and surgical team that will be utilizing the facility.

Cardiovascular Surgeons, P.A., a leading Central Florida open heart surgical group is providing surgical services. The group, led by Meredith Scott, M.D., who was raised in Sanford, performs over 3,000 open heart procedures each year.

In addition to Dr. Scott, the other physicians in the group include S. David Spector, M.D., Patterson W. Moseley, M.D., Paul D. Schumacher, M.D., Paul A. Thompson, M.D., Cary L. Stowe, M.D., Joseph H. Boyer, M.D., and Kevin D. Accola, M.D.

The hospital's other additions include a blood test which measures serum myoglobin, a protein that can be used for the evaluation of very early heart attacks. This test is helpful in emergency situations in the diagnosis of persons with acute chest pains and the expansion of the Emergency Department.

•HCA Central Florida Re-

gional Hospital, on U.S. Hwy. 17-92, Sanford, facing Lake Monroe, is a 228-bed facility which employs over 700, with a medical staff of nearly 200 members in 35 specialty fields.

Other major developments for the future will include a second cardiac catheterization laboratory, expansion of the radiology department and finally the construction of a new parking deck.

•South Seminole Hospital serves the needs of a rapidly growing population in the central portion of Seminole County.

The 126-bed acute care facility, with over 400 employees, is termed a "community hospital," because of the wide variety of services offered, the hospital provides inpatient and outpatient care, general medical, surgical, progressive and critical care, physical therapy, speech and occupational therapy, on-day surgery, dedicated mammography, radiology, endoscopy and cardiopulmonary services.

Insurance sales investigation

State probes sales practices of second insurer

TALLAHASSEE — State officials said Thursday they are investigating New York Life Insurance Co. after the company disclosed one of its agents used the same misleading sales practices as Metropolitan Life Insurance Co.

The Florida Department of Insurance will determine the extent of the sales tactics within New York Life, which becomes the second insurer to face regulatory scrutiny since the department began investigating MetLife last summer.

"As we are made aware of problems, we obviously investigate them," said Insurance Commissioner Tom Gallagher.

Officials said they have found no evidence that questionable sales practices at MetLife are nearly as widespread at New York Life or other insurers.

Earlier this week, the New York City-based MetLife said it would refund up to \$30 million to as many as 45,000 policyholders who may have been misled about the life insurance policies they purchased.

The company also fired executives in Florida and several other states following allegations that the company used deceptive tactics to sell whole-life insurance policies, primarily through its Tampa office.

Earlier this month, New York Life told the insurance department that one of its agents in the Tampa area sent a letter to 4,000 prospective customers that was nearly

identical to those used by MetLife. No one purchased life insurance because of the letter, officials said.

The letter talked about life insurance as a retirement investment but failed to mention it was an insurance policy, which agents are required to do.

Dan Sumner, assistant general counsel for the insurance department, said the letter was the same as the one used by MetLife but the department has not found any indication that other New York Life agents used the same tactic.

"We don't have any evidence that there's anything else, but it would be very naive to say that is all there is to it at this point," he said.

Jim Tolve, a spokesman for New York Life, said the company will not identify the agent and that the firm is conducting an internal investigation. He said the company has found no other agents who have used a similar letter.

Retiree wins big lotto \$\$ for 2nd time

TALLAHASSEE — Joseph P. Crowley's friends told him he'd never win another lottery drawing. He was already lucky enough to win \$3 million in the Ohio lottery.

But the retiree from Boca Raton ignored the advice and played the Florida lottery faithfully. Today, he's \$20 million richer.

Crowley won last weekend's Florida Lotto jackpot, making him the first person who has won both the Florida lottery and the top prize from another state lottery.

Crowley, 66, moved from Toledo, Ohio, to Boca Raton six years ago after he won \$3 million in Ohio. The retired construction contractor joked about his latest fortune after turning in his winning ticket at lottery headquarters Wednesday.

"I needed to win this," he said in a statement from the lottery department. "My (Ohio lottery)

payments were going to run out in the year 2007."

Crowley is the first Florida Lotto winner who has won another state's top lottery prize, lottery spokesman Ed George said.

"The odds to win in Florida are 13.9 million to 1," George said. "Even to win once, the odds are astronomical."

Crowley flew a chartered Lear jet to Tallahassee to turn in his winning ticket. He was accompanied by his wife, two sons, a daughter, and a grandchild.

He will receive \$1.01 million a year for 20 years, or about \$19,423 a week through 2012. The first payment will be made Thursday.

"This amount of money is kind of staggering," he said. "Now I can afford a new pair of shoes and I need a new wallet."

Crowley bought his ticket at Pointe Stationers store in Boca Raton. He said he cashed in a \$50 winning Instant ticket and bought 30 Lotto tickets for the Christmas Day drawing.

Ex-congressman to be released from prison

MIAMI — Former U.S. Rep. Larry Smith was scheduled to walk free from a federal prison camp after serving 88 days for tax and elections law violations.

"He had an obligation to meet," said Neal Sonnett, Smith's attorney. "He's met the obligation. He's entitled to go on with his life now. And I hope he'll be given that opportunity."

Smith, who spent a decade in Washington, was to leave South Dade's Metropolitan Correctional Center Satellite Camp today.

He still must pay \$5,000 fine, serve two years of supervised release and pay back income taxes. Further, the Florida Bar wants to take away his law license for good. And the Federal Election Commission is considering a fine.

Smith, a popular Hollywood Democrat,

represented South Broward and West Dade County before retiring from Congress last year amid questions about his dealings with former law partner Brian M. Berman.

Smith originally tried to explain a \$10,000 withdrawal from his re-election fund by saying it was used to hire Berman as a legal consultant.

But it was reported that Berman's true role was to launder the campaign money so that Smith could settle a \$4,000 gambling debt and pay \$6,000 in other personal expenses.

Smith pleaded guilty in May to charges of tax evasion and lying to election officials about his use of the campaign cash. Berman, who has been disbarred, cooperated with authorities.

After he was caught, Smith repaid the \$10,000 to his campaign and apologized to a judge.

"I'm terribly sorry for what I've done," Smith told U.S. District Judge Donald Graham at his sentencing hearing in August. "But I beg you to view the totality of my life in deciding what you wish to do to me now. I really want to go back to the community, earn their trust. ... Let me serve the community again."

It's unclear what Smith will now do for a living, particularly since he already has been suspended as a lawyer and faces disbarment. Sonnett said he wasn't sure what his client's plans are.

"Larry has a lot of friends in this community," Sonnett said. "That was made clear during the course of this case. And I think the judge's observations were quite correct — that he was held in very high esteem in this community and there is no reason why he should not be able to be held in high regard in the future."

Arrests made in bombings that killed 5

ROCHESTER, N.Y. — Two men were arrested Wednesday on federal charges in connection with a wave of bombings that targeted a family and killed five people across upstate New York. Michael Stevens and Earl Figley could face the death penalty if convicted of transporting across state lines the explosives used in the slayings of two victims in Rochester, Monroe County District Attorney Howard Rellin said.

Stevens, 51, of Rochester, and Figley, 56, of Farmington, were arraigned Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Rochester. Farmington is 25 miles south-east of Rochester.

No pleas were entered; both were ordered held without bail by U.S. Magistrate Kenneth Flaisher.

At the request of Stevens, Figley allegedly purchased 55 pounds of dynamite — about 184 sticks — and 50 blasting caps from the Kentucky Powder Co. in Mount Vernon, Ky., in June using a Vermont driver's license with an alias. He paid \$223.17 for the purchase.

Figley told police he brought the explosives to Stevens in Rochester and that both men "worked together to create with the same dynamite several explosive bombs," according to the criminal complaint.

On Sept. 22, authorities recovered 112 sticks of dynamite purchased by Figley that had been abandoned at a home in Irondequoit, a Rochester suburb, according to the complaint. Authorities declined to say whether an investigation was begun at that time.

Both men will likely face additional charges in Erie, Cattaraugus and Franklin counties following grand jury action, said Kevin Dillon, Erie County district attorney.

Authorities declined to comment on a motive for the bombings.

Killed within 90 minutes Tuesday night were a couple, their daughter, her boyfriend and a bystander. Six bombs hidden in tackle boxes were delivered to four homes, an armored-car garage and a prison. Four exploded; two were defused.

In Washington, a law enforcement source identified Figley and Stevens as ex-criminals.

"The motive is unclear at this point but it is probably something like vengeance," said the source, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The Buffalo News quoted unidentified law enforcement sources as saying the bombings apparently stemmed from a dispute between Stevens and his former wife, Brenda Lazore. Others identified her as his estranged girlfriend.

The newspaper said Lazore also was questioned but authorities would not comment.

The Washington Post, in Thursday's edition, quoted an unidentified law enforcement official who blamed tension between Stevens and Lazore's family over the upbringing of the couple's 2-year-old child. The Post identified Lazore as Stevens' common-law wife.

She is the daughter of Eleanor Fowler, who was killed at her home in West Valley, 30 miles south of Buffalo. She also is the stepdaughter of Robert Fowler, Eleanor's husband, who was killed along with co-worker John O'Donnell at a garage where they worked in Cheektowaga, a Buffalo suburb.

Pamela Epperson, another of Mrs. Fowler's daughters by a previous marriage, was killed by a bomb sent to her apartment in Rochester. Also killed there was with a friend, Richard Urban.

And Epperson's uncle, William Lazore, was wounded in the leg and chest by a bomb mailed to him in Hoganburg, hundreds of miles away in northeastern New York.

The bombs were dropped off by delivery services or the U.S. Postal Service in brown cardboard boxes measuring about 3 by 12 by 18 inches, authorities said. Inside were metal tackle boxes containing the homemade bombs.

Cheektowaga Police Capt. Thomas Rowan described the bomb sent there as "an anti-personnel device" filled with shrapnel.

"It was made to kill," he said, adding that security cameras at the Armored Motor Service of America depot captured the explosion on videotape.

The bombs apparently were detonated by opening the boxes, several of which carried a return address of "The Liberty Iron and Metal Company" of Erie, Pa.

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

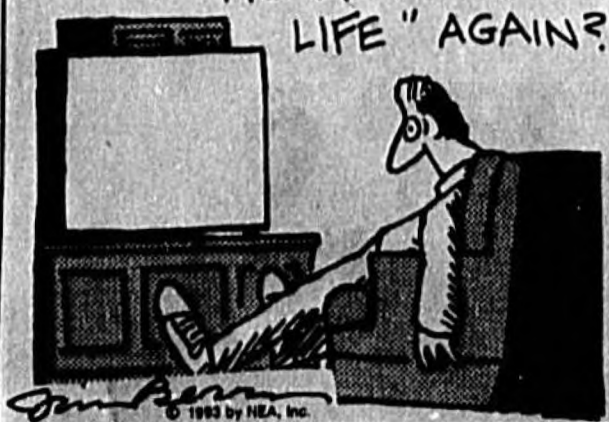

Russia is still rewriting its history

The strong showing of Vladimir Zhirinovsky's ludicrously misnamed Liberal Democratic Party in the recent Russian elections has at least silenced various ill-considered proposals recently popular in the West. Muted now are the formerly noisy criticisms of Boris Yeltsin for not being sufficiently devoted to democracy. Hushed are the calls for forcing still stronger economic medicine down the throats of the long-suffering Russian people. Gone, for the moment, is any suggestion that the Pentagon's budget should be slashed still further.

Zhirinovsky is often called a "fascist" — as if that told us something useful about him. But the word "fascist" has always been a grab bag, useful mostly to communists as a means of smearing anybody they didn't like. London's "Economist" recently listed among fascism's characteristics "a virulent form of nationalism, a militarist streak, anti-Semitism and a belief in the corporate state." But these characteristics are not invariable (Mussolini's Italy, by general consent the first fascist state, wasn't particularly anti-Semitic), and they do little to explain Zhirinovsky, let alone predict his course.

Zhirinovsky's support in the elections reminds us how useful it is to occupy a defeated country militarily. The Allied powers overlooked that

detail in Germany after World War I (save for a brief and partial occupation of the Rhineland), and paid dearly for the omission. National humiliation and a ruinous inflation left Germany's lower middle class prey to the hypnotic appeal of Adolf Hitler. The nation's generals and businessmen saw in him a means of recouping their staggering losses. The result was World War II — and a second defeat for Germany. This time the victors occupied the whole country, "de-Nazified" it, and turned it into a flourishing democracy.

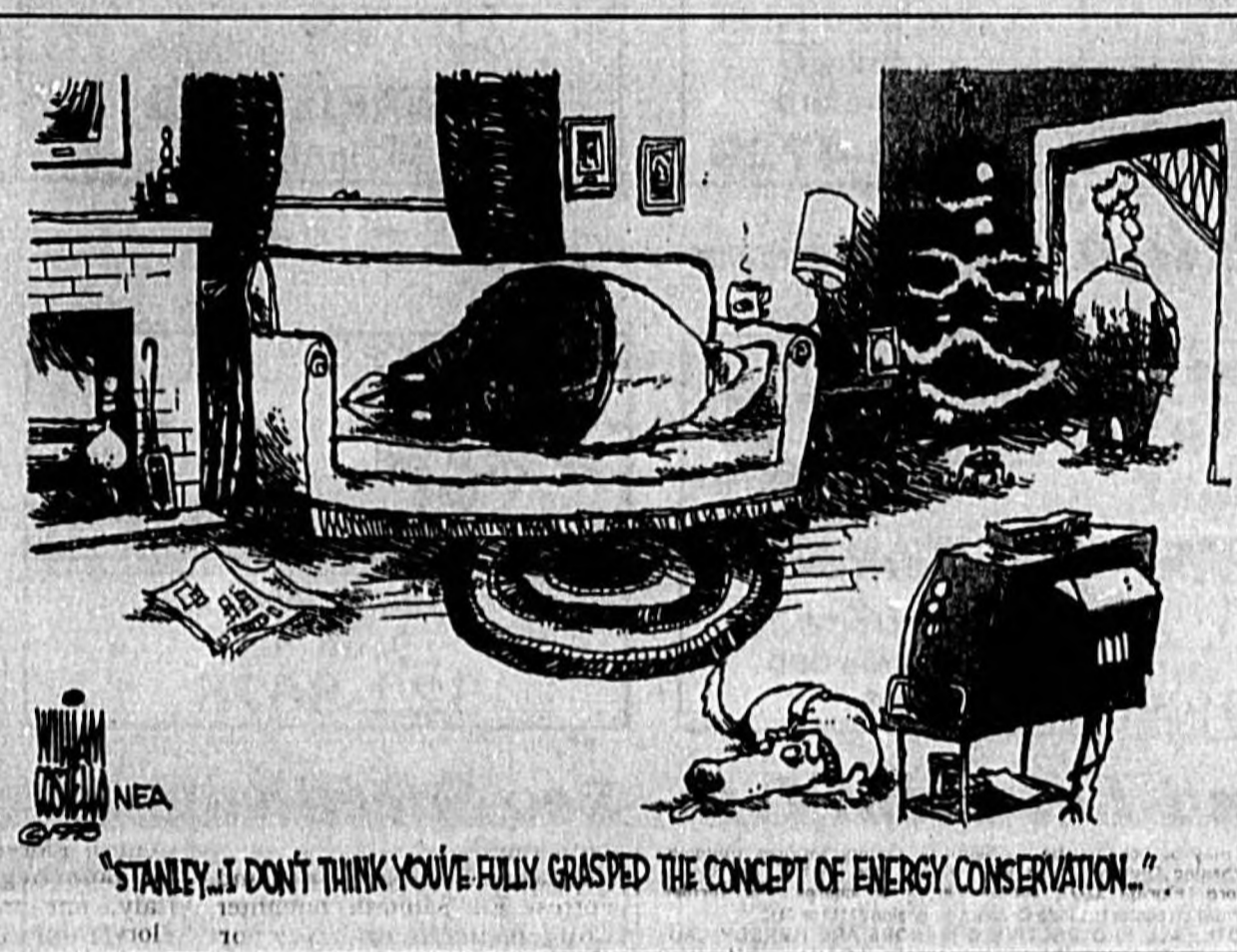
Will Germany's disastrous history now repeat itself in Russia, where occupation wasn't possible? In the first place, let's remember that history never repeats itself precisely. Russia has just emerged from its own long innings with dictatorship, and it beggars belief that many Russians are eager for a return to that particular "lifestyle." In addition, while there may well be Russian generals willing to back Zhirinovsky in the hope of better days, there is no viable Russian equivalent of the German industrialists who put their chips on Hitler.

Probably Zhirinovsky himself has only a vague idea of exactly where he wants to lead Russia. He certainly seems to be willing to sound almost any theme he suspects voters of wanting to hear. That being the case, both he and we would do well to remember that only 54.8 percent of the Russian electorate bothered to vote. What do the others want? Are they democratic liberals, too disgusted with the pervasive corruption to vote for any of the available choices? Or are they Russian nationalists, dismayed at the defeat and humiliation of their country and too scornful of democracy to play its games? Or are they, yet again, simply the silent, long-suffering peasantry of Russia, too beaten down by oppression to believe in the possibility of anything better?

We are going to have to wait for definitive answers to these questions.

Russian demagogue's list

The media is our time machine, but suddenly, just as we were exiting 1993, it has jammed — beaming us simultaneously toward fascist hate-mongers of the past and future.

One minute, we are implored by media film critics to see "Schindler's List," the movie so powerful it will transport us back to the horrors of Hitler's Holocaust. We're told we will more than merely see — we will feel — how it was when anti-Semitism became a policy and 6 million Jews were systematically massacred by a nation whose people pretended not to notice.

The next minute, we are shocked by news from Moscow of the strong electoral showing of a one-time fringe politician and ultimate demagogue, Vladimir Zhirinovsky, whose Hitlerian ravings remind us that a hateful past can be a future. Zhirinovsky captured the votes (but hopefully not hearts or minds) of so many Russians that shocked experts from the Kremlin to the White House plunged into mass recaptulation.

Now even the experts can see what was clear to lesser lights long ago: Yeltsin's economic shock therapy was doomed to produce widespread discontent before even modest comfort could be felt by the public. Enter Zhirinovsky, riding the wave of Russian rage that the inevitable result of Yeltsin's policy. Zhirinovsky's appeal comes from waving an iron fist at a people that historically have known only that way of governing. And mainly, he tells the people the blame rests with foreign demons — and the responsibility for fixing it rests everywhere but with themselves.

And faster than you can say "xenophobia," you get Zhirinovsky's List. It is nothing like Schindler's List, which meant a job in Oskar Schindler's armament factory in lieu of a one-way trip to Hitler's death factory. "Zhirinovsky's List" is the documented hates of a demagogue — a stream without conscience that meanders from anti-Semitic master-race mouthings to Russian lebensraum.

Gleanings from Zhirinovsky's List:
● Anti-Semitism 1 — Jews Cause It: "At a certain stage of development, a wave of anti-Semitism arises.... This is provoked by those who consider themselves part of the Jewish nation. We don't need provocations like this" — from his post-election press conference.

● Anti-Semitism 2 — TV News Needs Aryan Anchors: "Our voters are constantly asking us, saying they're sick and tired of the fact that TV announcers are representatives of a non-Russian nationality. They would very much like to see kind Russian faces who talk to them in good Russian.... (Asked if he was referring to Jewish television announcers) "If

people of a certain kind speak to the nation every day and every hour, this creates anti-Semitism" — *ibid.*

● Back to the Old Empire: Has advocated retaking the now-independent states of the old Soviet Union.

● Beyond the Old Empire — Germany: In a radio interview broadcast in Hamburg this month, he said if Germany (a prime supplier of aid and investment in Russia) interferes in Russia's internal affairs, he wouldn't hesitate to create "new Hiroshimas and Nagasakis... (or a) Chernobyl in Germany."

● Beyond the Old Empire — Japan: "The same goes for the Japanese.... Zhirinovsky continued. "They already experienced Hiroshima and Nagasaki; 50 years have gone by, and maybe they've already forgotten this. We will create new Hiroshimas and Nagasakis. I will not hesitate to deploy nuclear weapons."

● East to Alaska: Has advocated making Alaska a part of Russia, from whence it came.

So it is no wonder that this demagogue, whose party captured perhaps one-sixth of the legislature, has captured five-sixths of the election media aftermath.

Now Clinton spokesmen from Vice President Gore down sum up Zhirinovsky with one word: "Anathema" (to all we stand for) — it's their daily public reaction. Privately, they are feverishly reassessing whether U.S. policy and aid should be so unwaveringly tied to one man: Yeltsin. It's about time. For the new political reality in Russia is crisis in perpetuity. And, an anathema a day may not be enough to keep the dictator away.

A good year for Serious Worriers

My choice for Seer of the Century is Edward Cornish, president of the World Future Society. More than three years ago, he made this prediction: "The 1990s will likely be the most worry-filled decade that mankind has ever experienced."

Is that spooky, or what? I mean, it's downright metaphysical. So far, the 1990s have been excruciatingly fretful and there's no sign of a letup either. What with the

millennium approaching and the prospect of cataclysmic cosmic events in the offing. If you are a Serious Worrier in the 1990s, friend, you are swimming in deep water.

All this comes to mind, of course, because Serious Worriers are about to go boldly into the second half of the

worrying season. The cycle began the Tuesday after Labor Day (the Second New Year's). We've just had our catch-your-breath pause between Christmas and New Year's, and now we're worrying about what we're going to worry about until Memorial Day, when our long but well-deserved summer respite begins.

The last three years have brought us some especially taxing things to brood about. I speak not of such mundane sources of anxiety as war, economic downturns, the ozone layer, asbestos, pestilence or North Korea's nuclear arsenal. Any Normal Person can work up a sweat about routine worries like that. I am talking about esoteric material, stuff that only Serious Worriers can get in a stew about. Witness:

— In 1990, we were told that cremation is polluting the air with vaporized mercury from fillings. Two years later, we were told of the dangers of chewing, because every little bite releases a small amount of mercury mist from your fillings and you breathe it in. Mercury poisoning abuses the brain, you know.

— Does God frown on sex? Time magazine took a look at this perplexity in 1992, but was unable to determine what God thinks. Time somehow forgot to ask the Rev. Pat Robertson.

— Is the world more evil now? Time tackled this one in 1991. "Is there more evil now, or less evil, than there was five years ago, or five centuries?" the magazine's intrepid probes asked. Once again, a definitive answer somehow eluded them.

It is completely fitting that the worrisome '90s would produce solutions that are every bit as dreadful as the problems. The best way to avoid sexual disease and pregnancy, we are told, is to remain celibate. Then comes a University of Chicago shrink to warn us that celibacy can bring on bouts of "irritability, insomnia, somatization or clinical depression." Buy cars with air bags, we are told, they can save our lives. Then comes the Institute for Highway Safety to caution us that "drivers who sit close to the steering wheel can be hurt or killed by the force of air bags inflating in a crash."

Will things ever get better? Not in the '90s. Consider just a few items that have come to light in recent months:

Commuter airplanes are five times more likely to be involved in fatal accidents than larger aircraft.

Let me sum up the current decade for you with two headlines. The first, from the Baltimore Sun of Aug. 19, 1993, captions a story about heart disease: NEARLY 60 PERCENT OF ADULTS AT RISK BECAUSE OF INACTIVITY. The second one is from the Washington Times three months later: STUDY LINKS RISK OF HEART ATTACK TO HARD WORK.

That's the 1990s for you: A Serious Worrier's smorgasbord.

gave him the bicycle on a Saturday. Unfortunately, on his way to school he lost the money. Sad and devastated, McClanahan told his friend about the problem and that he would give the bike back on Friday. To his surprise his friend told him not to worry about it. His friend explained that someone had learned about the situation and the price had been paid. An elated and ecstatic McClanahan jumped for joy. Yet, who was the mystery person? McClanahan later found out that the Kiwanis Club was the savior of his day. After that incident, McClanahan vowed that when he was able he would help other children fulfill their dreams of a bicycle.

McClanahan came to Sanford in 1953. It was about 20 years ago when he began working alone on his bicycle campaign. He would contact Marie Taylor who was a social worker with the Seminole County School Board and she would supply names of children who either didn't have a bicycle or any transportation to school. Although he had joined Kiwanis in 1954, it wasn't until 1990 that Project Bicycle was formed. Since then, he chairs the committee that works with underprivileged children. He felt more strides could be made if

supported by a group versus an individual effort.

McClanahan was very quick to acknowledge the many organizations that have contributed to this work as well as the Sanford Fire Department's involvement in repair of donated bicycles. New and refurbished bicycles have become a part of the program. Even though the master of this charity was McClanahan, he humbly credits others for its success.

Some of the groups named were the Helen Stara Realty, who donated new bicycles along with used bicycle parts. Bud and Scott Kirk, attorneys in Orlando, were raised in Sanford and now help financially with the work. Conklin, Porter and Holmes donated \$300 last year and this year. Helig Meyer donated four bicycles last year and this year. Phil Roche, of Lossing Moving and Storage, has been a tremendous help in distributing the bicycles. McClanahan has personally delivered 40 bicycles.

At least seven trips with his pickup were made in town and each trip contained six to seven bicycles per load. He told of the bicycles delivered all over the county. Like a proud new father, McClanahan lovingly displays photos of some of the recipients. The social workers only supplied

25 names of the 70 this year, so numbers show that word of mouth was the key ingredient to getting the bicycles in the hands of the ones that needed them most. Concerned individuals should call the Fire Department, City Hall, Kiwanis clubs or McClanahan will personally see that a child receives the bicycle they long for. McClanahan recalled a memorable delivery this year to a crippled girl with spina bifida. He expresses the desire to know if she had begun to ride yet. The bicycle was equipped with training wheels. He referred to her as "a bundle of joy." Last year each child in a family of nine received a bicycle. The number of bicycles distributed to needy children grows every year. It has become a service provided at Christmas time now even though originally it began as a year round endeavor. Three years ago 60 bicycles were given, two years ago 60, and this year, so far, 70 bicycles received new homes for the holidays. In fact, five people came to the Fire Department on Christmas Eve.

McClanahan would tell you, as well as anyone else involved in this wonderful work, the children not only reach for the bicycles with their hands, but they reach into your heart.

School advisory committees, comprised of parents, teachers, administrators and community members, have created strategic plans for each school. The board will approve those plans soon and the schools will put them into effect next school year.

"We are excited about the plans the schools have developed and about the potential for the students in the district," Dr. Marion Dalley, executive director of instructional services for the district, said.

Meanwhile, schools have been implementing programs to better serve the students in the community, Dalley said.

At Seminole High School, the Academy of Health Careers opened its doors to about 100 students from across the district in August.

The Academy of Health Careers is designed to prepare students for careers in the health care industry, from medical receptionist to physician.

In addition to their regular academic classes, students in the program take classes in their chosen field.

"This is a unique opportunity for the students in Seminole County," said Gretchen Schapker, principal of Seminole High.

It is part of the district's effort to prepare students for employment after graduation.

While the district has been cheering its own accomplishments, some parents have called for even more changes in order to make schools safer and more effective.

"We only want what is best for our children," said Linda Johnson. "We will continue to work to improve Sanford schools but we had to do what's best for

our children first." Johnson and her husband, and three other families chose to rent apartments in Lake Mary so their children could attend Greenwood Lakes Middle School rather than Sanford Middle School.

Sanford Middle, they said, was an unsafe, and therefore unsuitable, learning environment for their children.

"We were afraid for our children having to go to school there," Johnson said.

Though the district contends learning opportunities are the same at all schools, test scores showed otherwise.

Reading and math levels at Sanford Middle and Lakeview Middle (also in Sanford) have been considerably lower than at Greenwood Lakes Middle and Rock Lake Middle (in Longwood), for example.

Additional resources of both money and time have been infused into the Sanford schools. Reading teachers have been added to the staffs. A new priority has been added to bringing up the test scores of the students.

"We are putting a renewed effort into making sure our students can read at the appropriate grade level when they leave here," said Jim Shupe, principal of Lakeview.

At both Lakeview and Sanford Middle, student movement has been restricted and access to campus has been limited. More adult presence in all areas of the school ensures that students are well-supervised and that people who do not belong on campus are not allowed to remain there.

"The students are better able to learn when they are able to

concentrate on their work and not on other distractions," said Bill Moore, principal of Sanford Middle.

The administration at that school also assisted members of the Goldsboro community which surrounds the school in organizing a Neighborhood Watch program which meets at the school.

"The students have to be safe at home, at school and in between," Moore said.

The U.S. Department of Justice is currently investigating several complaints against the school district, including some in which the parents of students who may need to be in special education classes have been denied access to testing that would determine their need. District policy was changed this year to try to reduce the number of costly tests provided unnecessarily to students who did not qualify for special education programs.

School psychologists recently won a victory in that area when the state sided with the psychologists and said the district could not restrict tests that psychologists deemed necessary.

The justice department is investigating the parents' complaints.

Investigations are continuing into allegations that the district has failed to comply with the 1970 desegregation court order at Seminole High School and other Sanford schools.

The school district is continuing to make strides to improve conditions Hagerty said.

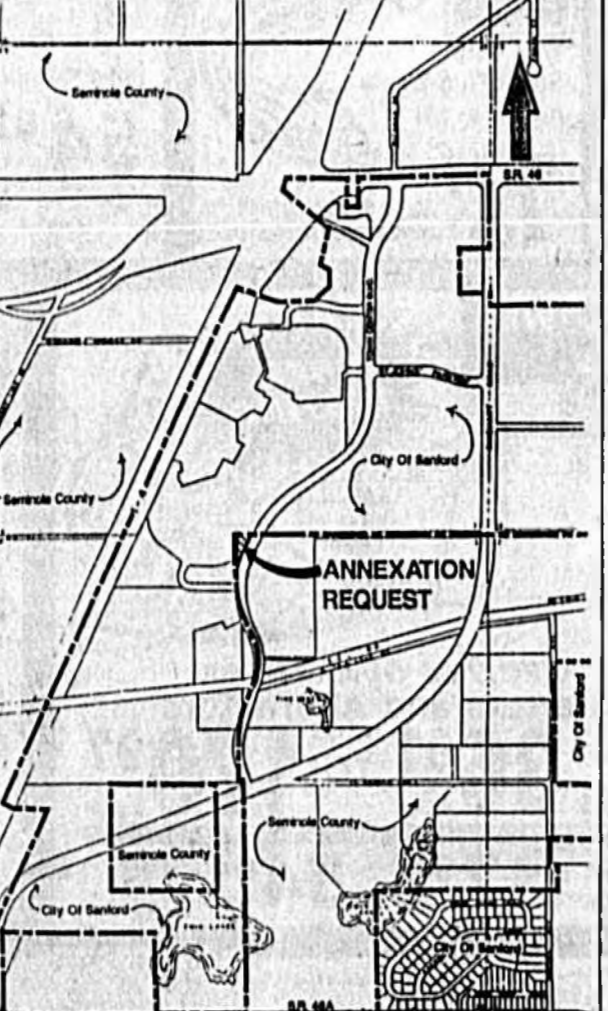

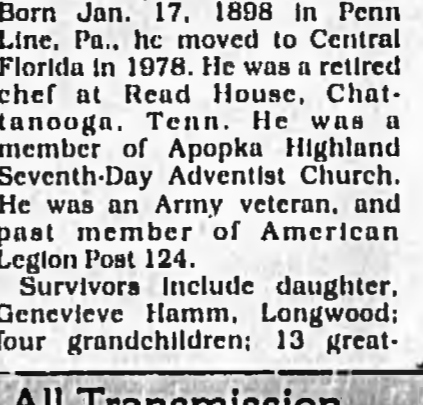

Poll finds wide support for gun control

WASHINGTON — Americans by a wide majority want tighter controls on the sale of firearms and a ban on assault weapons and think handguns should be registered, according to a poll published today.

But the USA Today-Gallup Poll found that six out of 10 people oppose an outright ban on handguns.

The poll comes a day after USA Today, the nation's second-largest daily after The Wall Street Journal, devoted a significant portion of the paper to articles focusing on gun violence in America.

In an editorial Wednesday, the newspaper called for the creation of a national system to register firearms and license gun owners. Just as cars are registered and drivers are licensed after demonstrating they can drive safely.

"Treat guns as cars and shooters as drivers, and then watch the blood mist slowly, surely, lift," it said.

The poll today found wide support for gun control.

Sixty-seven percent of respondents said they favored stricter laws controlling firearms sales, with only 7 percent saying the laws should be less strict. Twenty-five percent said the laws should stay as they are.

And with 81 percent favoring the registration of handguns, only 18 percent opposed such a move. The rest had no opinion.

Fully 87 percent of respondents said they approved of the new Brady law requiring a five-day waiting period for a background check before the purchase of a firearm.

Eighty-nine percent of those polled said people

should be required to take safety classes before qualifying to own a gun, and 69 percent said people should be limited to purchasing no more than one gun a month.

Seventy-seven percent favored a ban on assault weapons. And 60 percent would ban all handguns, while 30 percent opposed such a move and 1 percent had no opinion.

Well over half — 59 percent — said they wouldn't feel any less safe if only police officers were allowed to have handguns. Twenty-five percent said they would feel more safe, 34 percent said they would feel no difference and 25 percent said they would feel less safe.

The poll was conducted between Dec. 17-21 and sought the opinion of 1,014 people. Its margin of error was plus or minus three percentage points.

In USA Today's Wednesday edition, the newspaper devoted 18 pages of stories in all four sections to a comprehensive exploration of the

gun issue. It reported that there are now 211 million firearms in the United States, one for every adult and half the children. It said 22 major American cities have set homicide records this year.

The newspaper said 15,377 people were killed in firearms homicides in 1992 — 12,489 of them with handguns. That is twice the number killed by handguns in 1966.

And it said homicides among Americans under 18 rose by 143 percent over six years, from 602 deaths in 1986 to 1,468 in 1992.

"A handgun homicide is committed every 42 minutes in the USA," the newspaper said. "In 1982, it was 62 minutes."

David Colton, the USA Today deputy managing editor who helped direct the coverage, said the newspaper's unusual single-edition focus on guns in America was energized by the Dec. 7 rampage on a commuter train in New York in which a man shot 23 people, six of them fatally.

Air crashes: Where to place blame?

WASHINGTON — People are prone to mistakes — we leave our headlights on when we park the car, we forget to turn off the oven — and the consequences are mostly minor. But for an airline pilot, forgetting to lower the landing wheels can be a deadly mistake.

If to err is human, can humans ever be completely safe in the air?

John Lauber thinks so. He sees human error as the last frontier in aviation safety, waiting to be conquered.

A psychologist, Lauber has devoted his career to learning why smart pilots — and mechanics and air traffic controllers — do dumb things.

As a member of the National Transportation Safety Board, he leads efforts to use that knowledge to compensate for human weakness, whether by designing better cockpits or adding back-up safety systems.

From his office at the safety board, Lauber, 51, likes to watch planes float down toward the runway at Washington National Airport, just across the river. He expects them to land safely.

"The odds of being killed on a U.S. commercial jet are about one in 11 million flights," Lauber said. But that's not good enough.

His is a higher goal: eliminating all plane crashes.

Over the years, the jet engine has improved, computers do wonders, but there's still the human factor. Since worldwide record-keeping began in 1959, almost two-thirds of major airline accidents have been blamed on flight crew error.

"We virtually never have 'act of God' accidents, caused by forces somehow beyond reasonable control," Lauber said. "They are all controllable, manageable things we're learning how to handle."

Dec. 29, 1972: An Eastern Air Lines jet plunges into the Florida Everglades, killing 99 people.

The crew was distracted by a burned-out light on the instrument panel. As they tried to change the light bulb, the altitude hold on the auto pilot was accidentally shut off. The plane began to drop, but the pilot and co-pilot didn't notice until it was too late.

"They were all concerned with this little 59-cent light bulb," Lauber said. "They forgot to fly the airplane, and they crashed into the swamp."

At the time, "human factors" study was in its infancy. Lauber was working on pilot training for the U.S. Navy, about to move to NASA's Ames Research Center near San Francisco.

That crash was still seared in his mind when he arrived at the space administration. "That really triggered what we looked at," he said.

Lauber led a research team that put airline crews — a pilot, co-pilot and flight engineer — in flight simulators for a series of mock emergencies. The way they worked together — or didn't — was revealing.

"Some of them really worked as a cohesive team," Lauber said. "Others were just a shambles, a three-ring circus with nobody knowing what anybody else in the group was doing."

Researchers created a portrait of a successful flight team: a strong leader, good communication, clear priorities.

And they discovered problems that made some cockpit crews dangerous: lack of discipline, crew members overloaded with duties, co-pilots too intimidated to tell the captain when something goes wrong.

"The scientific evidence corresponded with people's gut feeling," Foushee said.

Diary should not be an open book

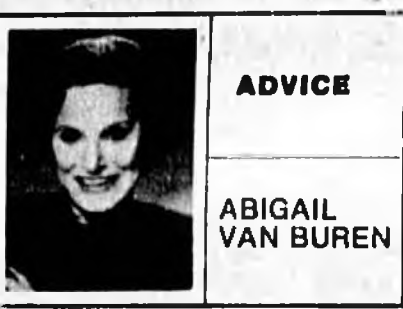

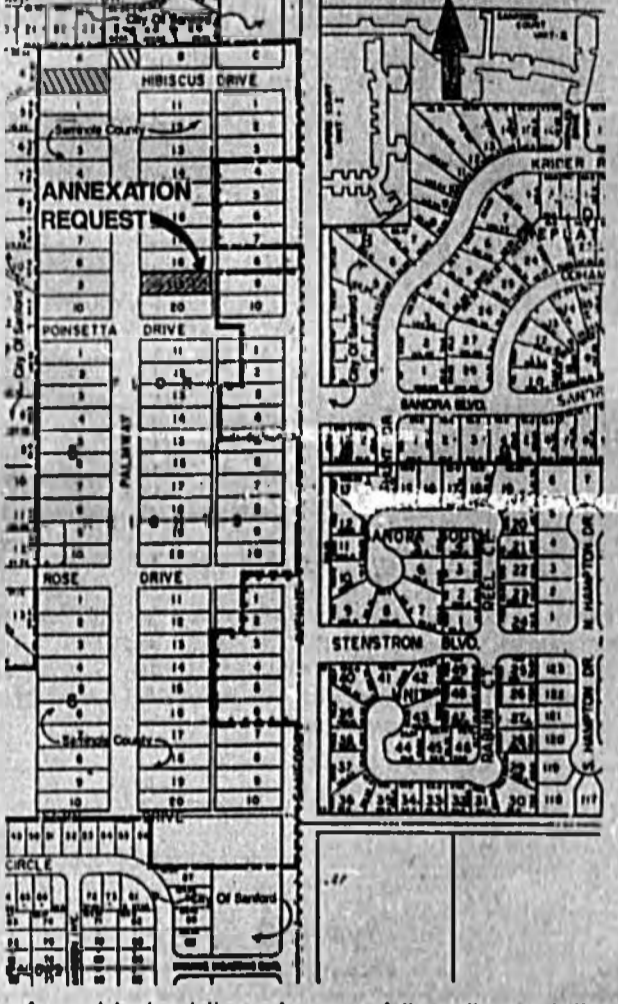

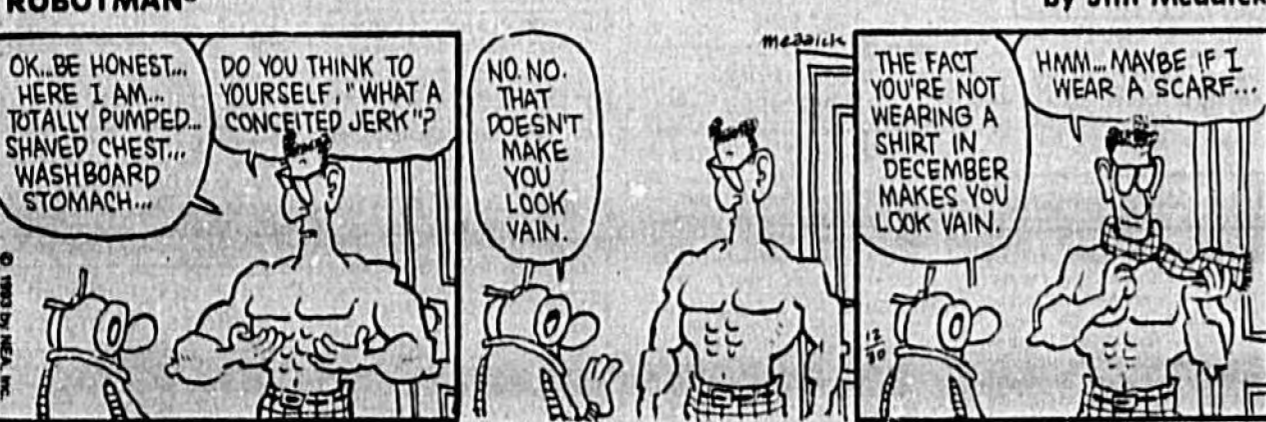

DEAR DR. GOTT: A neighbor suffers from chronic fatigue syndrome. She's 35 and barely able to care for her two children. She cannot find any help and her condition appears to have worsened recently.

DEAR READER: Chronic fatigue syndrome is a terribly challenging problem. Customarily, it is considered when no other physical ailment (such as mononucleosis or Lyme disease) can be found to explain the patient's symptoms of periodic exhaustion, weakness, lassitude, depression, sore throat, swollen glands, and other symptoms.

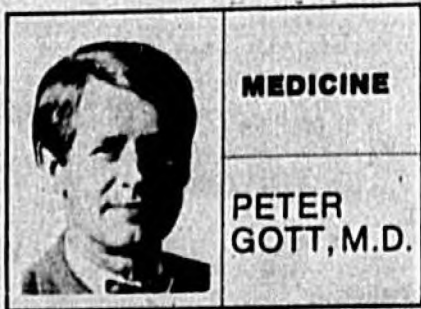
The cause of chronic fatigue syndrome is unknown. The important issue in diagnosis is to discover any treatable physical condition, such as anemia or hypothyroidism, that may be present. Many people, especially women, suffer from the syndrome. Treatment is far from successful. This has led some researchers to conclude that chronic fatigue syndrome is merely the end result of multiple, diverse factors, including infection, immune dysfunction and depression that should be diagnosed by a specialist in internal medicine.

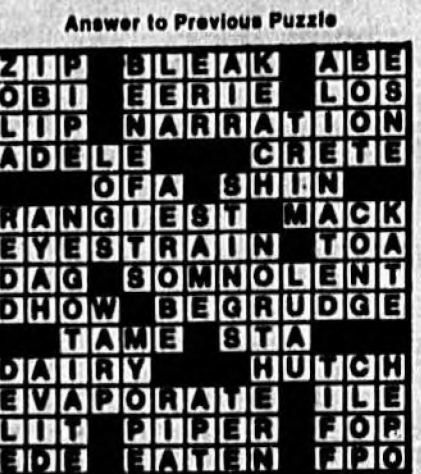

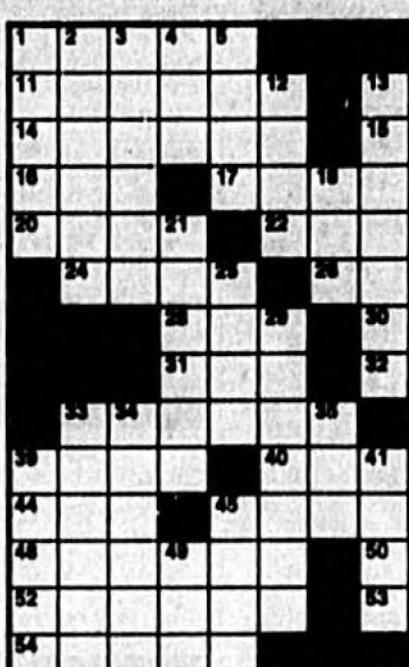

WIN AT BRIDGE

G.K. Chesterton wrote, "What a glorious garden of wonders the lights of Broadway would be to anyone lucky enough to be unable to read." In bridge, though, we must watch all the lights — the cards — and read the information they are broadcasting.

North's response of two no-trump was the Jacoby Forcing Raise. Holding such a powerful hand, South launched into Blackwood and bid the small slam.

West led the heart jack. If the dummy had included a third heart, the contract would have been laydown. With the actual layout, it seemed that South needed to find East with the club ace. As you can see, that wasn't the position, but South gave it the old college try.

After winning trick one with dummy's heart queen, declarer drew two rounds of trumps. He cashed the diamond ace, played a diamond to dummy's king, ruffed the diamond seven in hand and played the heart king over to dummy's ace. His preparations completed, South led a club to his king.

West paused to take stock. South was known to have started with six spades, two hearts and two diamonds. Therefore, he held three clubs. West saw that if South had the club queen and he, West, won this trick, the contract would make. A club lead away from the jack would be won by dummy's 10; a heart return would concede a ruff-and-discard. So West played his club eight. Now South couldn't avoid losing two club tricks and finished one down.

Was that well defended? Here, yes — but wait until you see tomorrow's deal.
