According to the chamber, the program offers the opportunity for people to

give support directly to the classroom to enhance and enrich the learning environment.

A minimum contribution of \$50 is being asked. For this donation, a teacher/team will be able to acquire

materials or equipment not normally available, making a big difference in public education.

People are being asked to make checks payable to the school they wish to adopt, and submit it to the Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, 400 E. First Street in Sanford, 32771.

There is a form to fill out identifying the individual and the classroom/team/school they wish. Contributions are tax-deductible and

National Weather Service asks: Are you ready?

With hurricane season officially underway and the season's fourth tropical disturbance off the coast of Cape Canaveral, the National Weather Service says it's time for residents to review their hurricane safety knowledge in case the storm becomes a serious threat to Florida.

"Everyone living along the Eastern Seaboard and Gulf Coast States should know the answer to the question; 'What will I do if a hurricane threatens my area?'" said retired Air Force Brigadier General Jack Kelly, director of the National Weather Service. "Hurricane activity has begun in the Atlantic and local officials, heads of households, and businesses have a responsibility to be aware and be prepared."

Locally, the American Red Cross of Central Florida is gearing up in Seminole, Orange and

Osceola counties, to help anticipate, survive, prevent and recover from disasters. Over 3,000 trained disaster relief workers are ready to respond to the needs of people affected by disaster.

Top hurricane forecaster William Gray has cautioned that hurricanes in coming decades will cause five to ten times more damage than in the past.

Gray however, recently reduced his original prediction by one in each category. He has now predicted that at least 11 named storms will approach North America this year, including seven hurricanes and three major hurricanes. Last year, there were 12 tropical storms formed with eight forming into hurricanes. "We believe we are entering a new era for increased storm activity and for East Coast landfalls by major storms," Gray said.

General Kelly made a num-

SANFORD — The Central Florida Zoological Society's 11th annual Black Tie on the Wild Side event has been announced. It will be held Saturday, Aug. 19, at Sea World's Ports of Call in Orlando.

The theme this year will be "Escape to Rio Carnival 2000" and will feature Brazilian cuisine, spicy rhythm and dancing, and fun for all.

According to the zoo's Public Affairs Director Andrea Farmer, the festivities will begin at 7 p.m. with a reception and silent auction featuring wild tropical gifts, exotic trips, wildlife art and many items donated by area merchants.

Guests will experience the fantasy and foods of the Rio Carnival through Brazilian themed entrees, entertainment, music, fireworks and games until 11 p.m. One lucky guest will win a round-trip ticket for two to London during the Virgin Atlantic Airways raffle.

Actually, the concept of "black tie" is misleading. Farmer said as parts of the event will be indoors and parts outdoors, "the black tie formal dress concept may be too warm for people."

She suggested, "Dress as you will, but try to be on the wild side in colorful carnival style. Add a Rio twist with colorful beads, sequins, fun costumes or interesting masks. Dress for the tropical setting of Ports of Call."

The two best dressed guests will be crowned King and Queen of "Escape to Rio Carnival 2000."

Proceeds from Black Tie on the Wild Side will be used to support the zoo's innovative education programs for children and its efforts to help save threatened and endangered species through conservation and public awareness programs.

This will be the second consecutive year the event is being held at Sea World. Farmer said the event last year provided over \$86,500 in net profits for the zoo's programs.

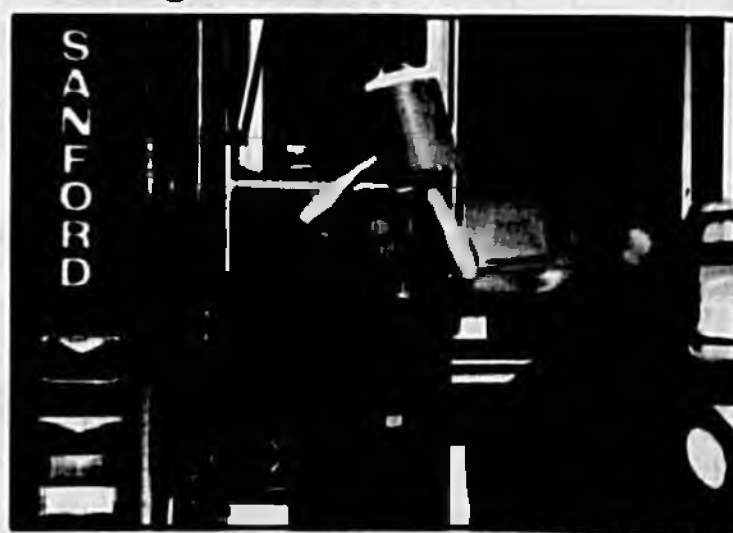

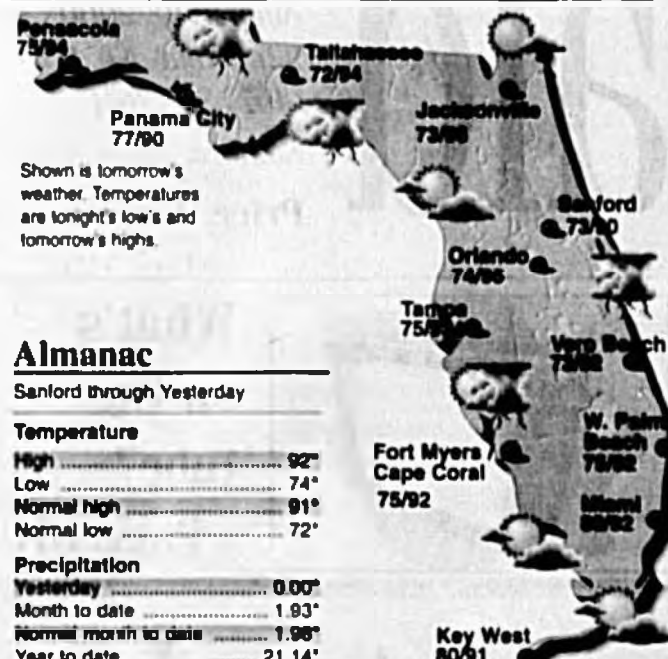

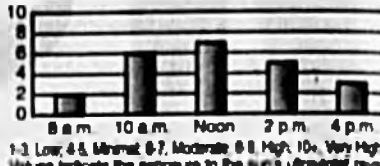

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Private school scholarship program established for students with disabilities

Florida Education Commissioner Tom Gallagher has announced that parents of students with disabilities can now take advantage of new educational opportunities for their children.

Parents of students with disabilities may obtain information on a statewide scholarship program for the upcoming school year by calling a special toll-free phone line.

Approximately 50 private schools have notified Gallagher's department of their intent to participate and accept students with disabilities. Center Academy located at 470 Central Parkway in Altamonte Springs is a Seminole County school participating in the program.

"The program is an expansion of last year's Sarasota Pilot Program," Gallagher

said, "and differs from the A+Plan Opportunity Scholarship Program in that eligibility is determined by the parent based on the individual student's performance of progress, not on the public school's annual performance grades."

He estimated that 350,789 students may qualify for the "special needs" scholarship, however the legislature has placed a limit on participation of only 5 percent per district for the first year. Approximately 17,539 students with disabilities will be eligible to participate this year.

By the second year of the project the number will be increased to 10 percent, or slightly more than 35,000 students, and by the third year it will increase to 20 percent.

If the program is successful, the limits will be lifted during

the fourth year.

To be included in the list of private schools involved in this project, the schools must notify the Department of Education of their intent, demonstrate fiscal soundness, submit a fee schedule, accept scholarship students on a random and religious-neutral basis, accept fees paid in the program as full tuition's, and agree not to make any scholarship student pray, worship or profess to a specific belief.

According to Gallagher, the vast majority of students involved will receive approximately \$5,600.

For students with the most severe disabilities, the maximum scholarship amount would be between \$13,000 and \$19,000.

may be made anonymous if preferred.

Schools which are involved in the Adopt-A-Classroom project include Crooms Academy, Goldsboro Elementary and Millennium Middle Magnet schools, elementary schools of Hamilton, Hopper, Idyllwilde, Midway, Pine Crest, Wicklow and Wilson, Sanford Middle School and Seminole High School.

"Items which might be purchased at the schools through this money would be things that normally wouldn't be possible," Lane said. "Many times we hear of individual teachers who

spend money out of their own pocket to help buy certain things for their classrooms."

She said the spending and/or allocation of the money for individual schools would be up to that particular principal or administration.

"We hope that once people get involved in this, they will get in the spirit and become involved in additional partnership with our schools," Lane said. "There are many things we could do to help in the future, and this could involve not only chamber members but local

businesses and individuals who may not even have a connection with the schools.

"They would become part of that school's family," Lane said, "and they would be invited to functions and other events even though they may not be a parent."

In addition to her role with Dividends, Lane is a member of the Sanford/Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, but its Educational Committee as well.

with the development of a progressive educational system in the state," Strickler said. "We need to look at it as being one issue."

Strickler has 28 years experience at BellSouth and four years as a Seminole County School Board member. He was the initial chairman of Florida's School To Work Task Force in 1996 and was appointed last year to the Florida Youth Council as part of Enterprise Florida.

Strickler is one of 40

Floridians asked to serve on the Workforce Florida board. It will oversee the spending of over \$1 billion federal and state money earmarked for career development and welfare transition programs. Senate President Toni Jennings will act as chairperson.

"Larry is experienced in a key area that needs to be addressed by the board; the education component," Jennings said. "Having an educated workforce is essential in filling current and future workforce needs. As a former school board member,

having Larry on the Workforce Florida Board gives us expertise in an extremely critical area."

"Our accomplishments will have far reaching effects throughout the entire state," Strickler commented. ber of suggestions which he believes should be heeded immediately. "Number one, give hurricane safety some forethought and have an emergency plan in place. Number two, stay aware of the weather everyday through the media or NOAA Weather Radio and be ready to react. And number three, pay attention to local authorities. If you have to evacuate, do so as soon as possible in an orderly manner. If you don't have to leave, don't, so as to avoid overtaxing the local infrastructure."

Kelly said his safety message is to people living inland as well as on the coast. "Tropical systems are notorious producers of heavy rain and fresh water floods hundreds of miles from the coast," he said. "Damaging waves and storm surge may be the bane of coastal communities, but millions of others living with the very real threat of inland flooding."

"Hurricanes and tropical storms are an ongoing threat to some of the nation's most populated areas," Kelly concluded. "I urge everybody to take the time now to think about hurricane safety and be prepared for the worst of whatever the hurricane season has to offer."

A rough start to the season had Scott Pruett doubting his move to Winston Cup, but a new crew chief seems to have changed all that

Scott Pruett thought long and hard about quitting. His stock-car racing experiment just didn't seem to be panning out. He wasn't the type to give up easily — racing in open-wheel cars hadn't exactly been a cakewalk — but enough was enough.

In May, Pruett thought he had endured enough. Another dismal finish, this one at Richmond International Raceway, had beaten him down. Tired and road weary, he wondered about his decision to switch to Winston Cup cars.

He remembered his two Championship Auto Racing Team victories, his International Race of Champions victory and his three 24 Hours of Daytona wins. He hadn't spent a year rehabilitating from a 1990 wreck to come back and not make races. He was used to being a factor in a race.

Pruett saw no reason not to expect the same when he moved to the Winston Cup Series this season. Such drivers as Tony Stewart, Kenny Irwin and Jeff Gordon had made the transition look easy.

But for Pruett and his owner, Cal Wells, it wasn't working out quite that way. He's not the only former open-wheel driver struggling in Winston Cup this season. Open-wheel legend A.J. Foyt, a new Winston Cup team owner, started the season with Mike Bliss as his driver but since has switched to Rick Mast.

So Pruett looked around and found little hope. Quitting didn't sound so bad.

"After Richmond I was ready to give it up," said Pruett, who left the race 40th in points after missing three events. "I mean, I ran the slowest I could ever imagine driving. I worked harder than I could ever remember driving in a race, and at the end I was just done. I mean, I was physically spent. Physically and mentally spent."

He finished 27th, but went home to discuss his future with his wife. Pruett couldn't handle the thought of more weeks of just running around the track. His best finish of 19th had been in the season opener. It was May, and Pruett had seen the top 20 only once more.

Wells expressed confidence in the team's ability to turn things around, but Pruett had trouble matching that confidence.

"I talked to my wife that night and I go, 'I can't do this. There's no way. I can't drive these cars. ... I've made the wrong decision, and I'm just ready to pack it in.'"

Once personable and outgoing at the track, Pruett's expression had slowly changed to grim. He seemed to be just gutting it out. He stayed in the car, but the following weeks only produced more disappointing results.

The improvement was coming. At Michigan in June, Pruett started 16th and finished 19th. At Sears Point, he ran well before being involved in a crash with Jeff Gordon.

The team hired Brad Parrott as crew chief during the July weekend at Daytona. Pruett and

Wells think that Parrott was the final piece of the puzzle, the last ingredient needed to pull the team together.

"It was just that missing link," Wells said. "We had a very, very strong team and were just missing one piece of it, but Brad has been the piece. He's like the turnbuckle that keeps drawing it together and drawing it together, and I think the proof is in the pudding."

They finished a season-best 10th last weekend at Indianapolis Motor Speedway, a track special to both Wells and Pruett.

"I competed in the Indy 500 and finished in the top 10 and I competed in the Brickyard 400 and finished in the top 10," Pruett said. "To be in that group, I'm very proud of that."

He's not discouraged anymore, not even considering quitting. Pruett is a competitor at heart, a man who has faith in his team and his abilities. The tough start to his season may have bruised his confidence for a while, but he and Wells are rebounding. They're bonding with their new crew chief and finding new enthusiasm. More than just performance is turning around for this team.

"We're gonna follow that up with a victory, I guess," Parrott said after the Brickyard 400 run. "We improved our best finish by nine spots, so right there, if we can improve it by another nine spots next week, I guess we'll be in victory lane, won't we?"

NASCAR officials search for answers to safety issues

NASCAR drivers are pushing hard for "soft" walls after the deaths of Adam Petty and Kenny Irwin at New Hampshire International Speedway.

In fact, many drivers on the Winston Cup circuit have been quite vocal about the topic, and they haven't cooled off yet. The issue of soft walls may become a rallying cry, despite NASCAR's continued reluctance to make quick moves in that direction.

What NASCAR has done so far is to order teams to add safety stops on their carburetors, to keep the secondaries from locking wide open, and to add an emergency engine-cutoff switch to the steering wheel.

"I was one of the people who suggested it," Jeff Gordon said of the cutoff switch. "But I don't think it's the solution. It's something that's quick, something that can be done right away without a bunch of testing. If the throttle sticks and you hit the switch, you're still going to hit the wall, but you might not hit it as hard."

"To me the solution is more in the walls than it is in a switch. We're looking at doing everything we can to protect the driver. But the impact is the issue."

Dale Earnhardt said: "Anything you can do for safety will help. If the speedways want to step up to the plate and put some Styrofoam barriers in the corners, like Flemington did, that's great."

Whether NASCAR would make it mandatory, it would be hard for them to do that."

Reactions in the Winston Cup garage and in the media to the two deaths remain intense, somewhat surprisingly, since death is a part of the sport. Indeed, the reaction to many issues this season seems to have caught NASCAR officials by surprise. It is, Mike Helton, NASCAR's senior vice president and CEO, says, just part of the changing shape of the sport as it grows and hits new markets and new fans.

"I guess it's a sign of the times, it's a different world," Helton said. "That goes along with the growth of the sport and the exposure. When you want to be a big player in the world of sports, you have to take all that goes with it."

"I think it has been a surprise from the perspective that it would seem to me it would be a lot better environment if we had a chance to answer the question before an opinion was formed about it and an answer created for us that might not be correct."

So does NASCAR need to be more out front on these issues, more proactive instead of reactive? "Maybe so. Maybe we need to work on our relationships with everybody in this sport," Helton said. "Maybe we need to get our story out front."

The issue of who should investigate racing deaths might be worth considering.

"Every state and every city has different rules and regulations, and NASCAR is not in a position to overrule the police," Helton said. "They're the police. We can't use a black flag on them."

"We talked with the police at New Hampshire, and there were those who spent a couple of hours with the race car. And they told us they were happy and 'See you later.'"

Police Chief Robert Fiske has criticized NASCAR for releasing Irwin's car to owners Felix Sabates and Chip Ganassi so soon after the crash. The car has since been shredded. Fiske says that if there is a similar accident at the track, he will treat it like a highway crash, shutting down the track to take photos and measurements. And he would hold the car.

"It doesn't take a lot of time to see what you can see," Helton said of the crashed cars.

And soft walls?
 "We're open-minded to the right chemistry, the right recipe to make it work," Helton said. "But in motorsports, and not just NASCAR, there are a lot of incidents where cars brush against the wall. In most cases, it's just a matter of driving back to the garage or being towed back to the garage. And what you don't want to do is create a barrier environment to where those incidents become catastrophic. That's a big issue with the material you use in walls. 'The cure can't be worse than the disease.'"

Hunting permits on sale Friday

Special to the Herald

PALATKA - Permits go on sale tomorrow (Friday, Aug. 11) to allow hunting this fall in five Type II wildlife management areas (WMA) that are owned or managed by the St. Johns River Water Management District.

The five areas are:

- Upper St. Johns River Marsh Type II WMA (Brevard, Indian River and Osceola counties).
- Emerald Marsh Type II WMA (Lake County).
- Dunns Creek Type II WMA (Putnam County).
- Bayard Type II WMA (Clay County).
- Ralph E. Simmons Memorial State Forest Type II WMA (Nassau County).

Permits to hunt at the Emerald Marsh, Dunns Creek, Bayard and the Ralph E. Simmons Memorial State Forest are \$25 plus a \$1 handling fee. Permits for the Upper St. Johns River Marsh cost \$15 plus a \$1 handling fee.

Purchased with the ultimate goal of protecting the state's water resources, these properties continue to provide public opportunities for quality hunts and other outdoor recreation.

Emerald Marsh Area 3 will be closed to hunting this season to allow for improvements to the marsh filtration system. These improvements should enhance habitat for waterfowl and other fish and wildlife in the future.

Quality quota hunts are established at Dunns Creek, Bayard and the Ralph E. Simmons Memorial State Forest Type II WMAs by limiting the number of permits issued for each area. The permits are distributed on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Twenty permits will be issued for each hunting period for Bayard WMA and 15 permits will be issued for Dunns Creek WMA, which includes Archery I (Sept. 23-Oct. 8), Archery II (Nov. 18-Nov. 26) and Muzzleloading Gun (Oct. 28-Nov. 5).

Hunters can buy one permit for each of the fall Bayard hunt periods at the Clay County Tax Collector's office in Green Cove Springs. Hunters can buy one permit for each of the fall Dunns Creek hunt periods at the Putnam County Tax Collector's Office in Palatka.

Thirty permits will be issued for each hunting period at the Ralph E. Simmons Memorial State Forest WMA, which includes: Archery (Sept. 23-Oct. 1), General Gun for the mobility impaired (Oct. 14-Oct. 17).

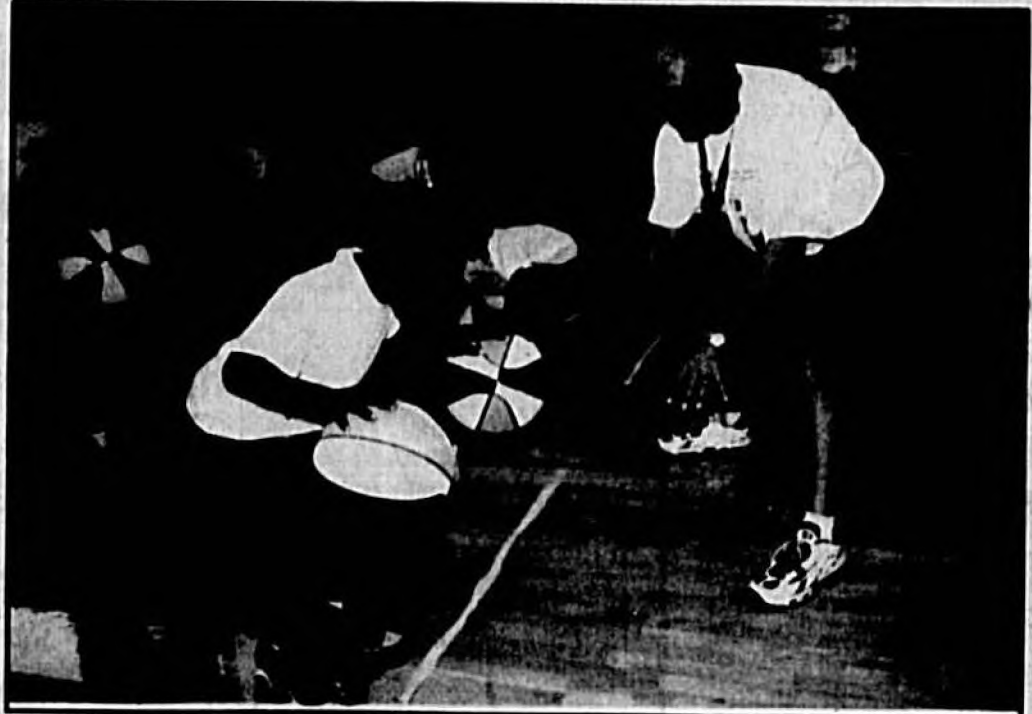

MIAMI - The game was meaningless, but neither the Miami SOL nor the Orlando Miracle wanted to give it up.

Rookie Kristen Rasmussen hit two free throws with 21 seconds to play in the second overtime and Sheri Sam hit 1-of-2 from the line with 9.5 seconds to go, icing the SOL's 68-64 victory over the Miracle in the final regular season game for both squads Wednesday night at the American Airlines Arena.

Sam finished with 24 points and nine rebounds and Marlies Askamp had 20 and 15 to lead the expansion SOL (13-19) to their third straight victory, ending the season on a positive note.

Taj McWilliams had 23 points and 13 rebounds, Adrienne Johnson scored 13 points and Nykesha Sales 12 for the Miracle (16-16), who finished third in the Eastern Conference and open the playoffs against the Cleveland Rockers Friday at home at the TD Waterhouse Centre starting at 7 p.m. The game will be televised by ESPN.

Shannon Johnson was held to only six points, but did have nine rebounds and six assists. Carla McGhee pulled down 11 rebounds for Orlando.

The SOL had a chance to ice the game in the first overtime. Askamp followed a miss by Black, giving Miami a 55-53 lead with 1:49 left. Rasmussen blocked McWilliams, who

had beaten Askamp in the paint, and Sam was fouled on the break.

Sam hit just 1-of-2 from the line to leave the open for Orlando and McWilliams took advantage. She took a pass from Shannon Johnson, dribbled to her right along the arc to the top of the key and knocked down the jumper, tying it at 56-56.

Colleton had given Miami a 48-46 lead, scoring off an offensive rebound with 45 seconds left. The Miracle tied it when McWilliams was doubled inside and found Sales open for a jumper.

Orlando is locked into the third seed in the Eastern Conference. It matched Cleveland's overall record but lost two of three to the Rockers during the season and will host the opener before the series shifts to Cleveland.

The SOL's three-game winning streak is a franchise record. They were coming off home victories over Charlotte and New York in which they allowed a combined 91 points.

Back-to-school Florida eye safety urged

TALLAHASSEE - Thousands of Florida students will suffer sports-related eye injuries during this school year because they failed to wear protective eyewear while playing various sports.

The grim back-to-school forecast comes from the Florida Optometric Association Charities, which warns that with the start of another academic year will come a flurry of eye injuries due to seasonal increases in the participation of contact, non-contact and racquet sports.

Florida's optometric physicians estimate that 90 percent of all sports-related eye injuries in the state last year could have been prevented had the victims been wearing protective eye goggles.

The FOAC, the public service arm of the Florida Optometric Association, is urging parents and team coaches to insist that

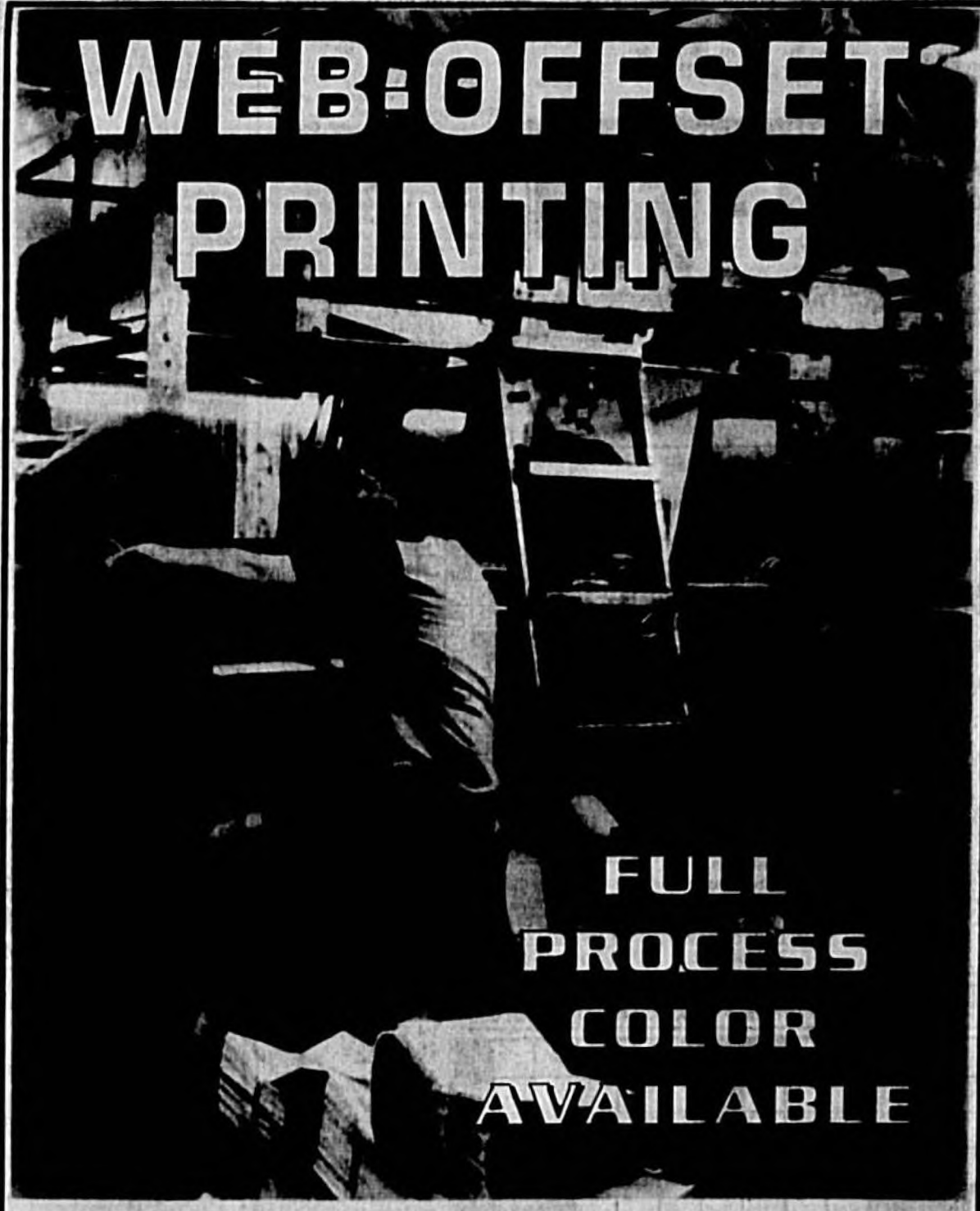
