The Associated Press lists the following facts about fatal injuries in Florida in 1993:

 Firearms (used in murders, suicides and accidents) were the leading cause of injury death, claiming 2,229 lives.

 Suicides exceeded car accidents as the single greatest cause of injury death, 2.081 compared to 1.960.

 Overall injury death was 33 percent higher for blacks than whites.

• Black teen-age boys and young black men between the ages of 15 and 24 had a murder death rate 12 times higher than the overall state murder rate.

Sanford budget: No new taxes

SANFORD — Taxpaying residents can breathe a sigh of relief; Sanford City Manager Bill Simmons has issued the proposed budget for fiscal year 1996 and in the opening paragraph of his letter of transmittal he clearly states, "No tax or rate increases are proposed in this budget."

The proposed revenues and appropriations for operating funds are balanced at \$31,391,406. The millage rate proposed is the same as in the past few years, 6,8759. Simmons has suggested the city not adopt the proposed roll-back rate of 6,8001 as determined by the Seminole County property appraiser.

From this point on, the proposed budget will undergo a series of workshops with the city commissioners meeting with various department heads, to go over various requests.

City Clerk Jan Dougherty said the workshops will begin Monday, July See Budget, Page 8A

Missing retired sheriff's captain is found, returned safely home

SANFORD — The human drama ended happily Monday, after law enforcement officers on an all-out intensive search for one of their own located the retired Sheriff's Department captain who was missing.

James Quincy "J.Q. Slim" Galloway was reported

missing after the fireworks Sunday night.

According to police, Galloway's wife, Ina, said he had left his Poplar Avenue residence in Sanford about 8:20 p.m., Sunday, to attend the fireworks at the Sanford

p.m., Sunday, to altend the lireworks at the Sanford lakefront.

Sanford police Cmdr. Dennis Whitmire said an all points bulletin had been issued, and sheriff's deputies were reportedly searching the waters of Lake Monroe

The Volusia County Sheriff's department helicopter also conducted an aerial search of the lake, but these efforts proved negative.

Galloway was reportedly driving a white 1990 Chevrolet van, license number KXG-66U. The van is said to have a three-foot dent in the right side, and has an American Legion sticker on the back window. The van had also not been located.

At noon yesterday, the sheriff's department received a phone call from an employee at the Midway Fish Camp on State Road 50 in east Orange County. The employee said a man answering Galloway's description had been at the camp at approximately 9 a.m. Monday, asking for directions to Sanford.

Longwood Police spotted Galloway on State Road 434 near Grant Street about 4 p.m. Monday. Sanford Police. See Galloway, Page 8A

New street light stops a bullet

MIAMI - Florida Power & Light has introduced a street light that can stop a builet.

The lights, shielded by bulletproof glass, have been installed in Fort Lauderdale and Miami and are being proposed for other areas FPL serves

The Armored Luminaire Shield was designed to stop drug dealers, vandals and others from shooting out the lamps, the company says. It can stop a .44-magnum bullet.

"You know, it's not the old days of rocks and BB guns anymore," said Joe McAdams, the utility's senior product engineer, "We were really caught off-guard by the number of high-caliber weapons employed against our lights. We have this theory that drug dealers are doing it to darken the street corners where they do their deals."

A 1993 FPL study showed that 4,680 of its 525,896 light fixtures across the state were targets of gunplay. That's one in

On the average, repairs cost of \$113 per lamp. It has cost the utility - ergo its customers - more than half a million dollars to fix the shot lamps.

Cocaine lawyers

Ex-prosecutor pleads guilty in cartel case

MIAMI - Before accepting a plea agree-ment, the judge asked former federal prosecutor Donald Ferguson if he knew he was breaking the law while representing leaders of the Cali cocaine cartel.

The silver-haired, 48-year-old Ferguson thought for a minute and carefully measured his quiet answer: "At some point, I knew it was illegal."

Ferguson, an assistant U.S. attorney in Miami in the mid-1970s, pleaded guilty Monday to conspiring to obstruct justice and money laundering.

"If you go forward with the agreement, you lose the right to remain silent." U.S. District Judge William Hoeveler reminded Ferguson.

The Boca Raton defense lawyer agreed to cooperate fully with the government's case against two other lawyers for Colombian leaders of the cartel.

One defendant, former Justice Depart-ment extradition expert Michael Abbell of Washington, represented Colombian cartel leaders on legal matters since 1985 and recruited Ferguson in 1990 to help him represent them in Florida.

The prosecution contends the lawyers crossed the line and committed crimes in helping their clients.

Abbell and William Moran, a Miami defense lawyer, face racketeering and cocaine conspiracy charges.

"If Donald Ferguson tells the truth, we have nothing to worry about," Roy Black. defense attorney for Abbell, told The Miami Herald. Black did not return calls by The Associated Press.

Ferguson could have faced life in prison if convicted of the original racketeering and cocaine conspiracy charges.

He pleaded guilty under a criminal information carrying a possible 25-year sentence, but federal sentencing guidelines provide for a range of seven to nine years.

No sentencing date was set, and Ferguson was allowed to remain free on bond. Ferguson's attorney Neal Sonnett said he will argue for a sentence well under seven years. Assistant U.S. Attorney William Pearson said sentencing should wait until Ferguson has testifled for the government.

The money-laundering count covered Ferguson's delivery of \$75,000 in drug profits from cartel leaders to the wife of a jailed drug defendant in Miami.

After the hearing. Sonnett said he entered the plea for his client with strongly mixed feelings

"I'm very disappointed," Sonnett said, noting he would have preferred to go to trial. The government has broken his will. His law practice has fallen apart.

Ferguson, married with a 10-year-old son, could have faced thousands of dollars in legal fees and a trial that could have lasted up to a year.

July Fourth no longer disastrous date to Southerners

TUSCALOOSA, Ala. - Independence Day is back in vogue among Southerners, but for decades after the Civil War, July 4 was little more than a disastrous date for the Confederacy.

"The Fourth of July was always associated with Vicksburg," said Charles Wilson, professor of history and southern studies at the University of Mississippi.

Vicksburg fell to Ulysses Grant on July 4, 1863, forever splitting the Confederacy in half. Meanwhile, 900 miles to the north, thousands of Southern soldiers lay rotting under the Pennsylvania sun as Gen. Robert E. Lee retreated from Gettysburg, his army mortally wounded.

After the war , white Southerners preferred to celebrate Confederate Memorial Day, which was observed in the spring, Wilson said. And fireworks were unheard of south of the Mason-Dixon line until after World War I. "We didn't do firecruckers on the Fourth of

July," said Gwyn Turner of Demopolis. "We did firecrackers at Christmas." Unlike many Southerners, A.K. "Temo" Callahan, 92, remembers celebrating the Fourth

with baseball and barbecue in Holt, Ala. They always had a baseball team in Holt and they always had baseball games and barbecues," he said. "They'd have hundred and hundreds of people and they'd all gather around the ball diamond and it would never fail to rain." But for 84-year-old Paul Garner, a retired

college dean grew up at a rural crossroads in North Carolina, July 4 was treated just like any other day until World War I.

"I didn't hear much about July 4 until I got into school and found out it was a very prominent date in American History," he said. For blacks in the South, Independence Day has

always been a special day. Mrs. Turner recalls black laborers at her family

farm near Demopolis taking off for Independence

"I remember it was the one day of the year when we washed dishes," Mrs. Turner said. "It was so close to Emancipation Day. My father said

turned to its old distaste for the day "That attitude lingered until World War I, that

SANFORD — Several largesize land changes are to be considered Wednesday and Thursday, during public hearings by the Seminole County Local Planning Agency/Planning and Zoning Commission.

Among items listed on the agenda for Wednesday is a rezoning request by Sanlando Land, for approximately five acres on the east side of Eden Park Road, south of McNeil Road, and north of Bunnel Road. The rezoning from agriculture to single family dwelling district would permit 1,300 square-foot homes on 11,700 square-foot lots.

A plan amendment has been requested by Donald McIntosh. This involves approximately 39.2 acres of land on the south side of Slavia Road, between Bear Gully Canal and the Central Florida GreeneWay. The rezoning would be from low density residential to high density residential, and agriculture to multiple-family dwelling district.

In the Bear Gully Creek area, a plan amendment is on the agenda, to change approximately 798 acres from low density residential to suburban estates. The property is south of Red Bug Lake Road, cast of Tuskawilla Road, north of SR-426 and west of the Central Florids GreeneWay. Additional 61.8 acres of property located south of this area may also be subject

to the amendment request.

A number of other plan amendments, mostly dealing with suburban estates property are also listed on the agenda. Most of the area is in the GreeneWay/SR-434 area in Seminole County.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 6 p.m. this Wednesday, July 5, in the board chambers, room 1028, at the County Services Building, 1101 E. First Street in Sanford.

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
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

GOP's legal reforms are long overdue

Tick. Tick. Every three seconds another—think that such reform is superfluous, let them civil suit is filed in federal or state court. Do you know where your lawyer is?

Barristers don't like to hear suggestions that they have caused a litigation explosion in America, and that lawsuits are a \$100 billion a year drag on the economy. They prefer to think of themselves as instruments of justice. As defenders of the downtrodden.

That's why the American Bar Association has strenuously opposed efforts by Republicans on Capitol Hill (whom the ABA's president referred to as "reptilian bastards") to pass much needed legal reforms.

The lawyers lobby warns that if the GOP's

reforms pass - like limits on product liability and a cap on punitive damages - Americans no longer will be guaranteed "their day in court." The very underpinnings of the civil justice system will be imperiled, they say.

But here's the real story. When and if the GOP reforms take effect. America's lawyers will be discouraged from filing their usual 18 million civil suits each year. They'll probably settle for only 17 million new fllings.

The point of the reforms is not to drastically reduce the number of laws itts. Just to curb the number of outlandish court cases and outrageous jury awards. And if the lawyers out there

Rufo, who lives in St. Louis, and who divorced Ron's father Fred ages ago, had not seen her dearly departed son in the five years preceding his murder, and had not even spoken to him two

But this did not stop the grieving mom from being first in line at the courthouse door with a wrongful death action against Simpson, ahead of Nicole Brown's family and ahead of Ron Goldman's real family.

It will serve Johnnie Cochran right, in the wake of his specious Oklahoma City damage claim, if he has to waste his billable hours defending his client Simpson against such a frivolous suit.

Thomas Jefferson supported an end to slavery

The Declaration of Independence is 219 years old today, July 4, 1995. The author of the Declaration was Thomas Jefferson of Virginia and throughout this trivia report it will be emphasized that Thomas Jefferson wanted to put into the Declaration a refutation of slavery as an institution. The actual statements made by Jefferson in the original draft of the declaration were: "cruel war against human nature ... captivating and carrying them into slavery in another hemisphere or to insure miserable death in their transportation hither." This statement was made to the King of England to "end the slave trade."

It must have been an extraordinary man. during these times of 1776, to be so bold as to make such statements to the King of a country who held the very lives of its subjects in his hands.

But the statement was made and was edited out of the ratified declaration that was presented to the members of the Continental Congress July, 1776.

Many of the men who were members of the Congress were Southerners and that part of the declaration would have been subject to undeniable personal hardships. We must remember that the original 13 colonies were more than half southern in nature and most of the members of Congress at that time owned slaves and large plantations.

it should be recalled, however, that three Virginians who signed the Declaration of Independence were opposed to slavery: Richard Henry Lee, George Wythe, a teacher of Jefferson, who emancipated his slaves in his will in 1806 and Thomas Jefferson who fought for this freedom in letters and deeds throughout his

However, three other signers of the Declara-tion were Arthur Middleton, whose family owned over 800 slaves. Thomas Nelson Jr. of Virginia who personally owned over 400 slaves and William Whipple of New Hampshire who went to sea as a boy and became a shipmaster in his 20s. It is believed that he dealt in slave

Although most of the signers were slave owners, these were the most prominent owners. Most signers were born into families where slavery was the only way of life they knew. Most of the southern signers were born on their plantations which they later inherited from their

With Thomas Jefferson it was the same, born into a family that owned slaves and in his "Farm Book" Jefferson kept a detailed account of the names and ages and even death dates of his 100 slaves. In the 52 years that he kept this

record, he noted the fish and beef the slaves ate, and the beds and blankets that were doled out to them. This record is probably the most complete document kept on slaves owned by any slave owner up to Jefferson's death in 1826.

Jefferson wrote on his "Notes on the Site of Virginia" that all black youths should be educated (to tillage, arts or sciences) until age 21 and all black girls to age 18 at public expense.

Jefferson believed "marriage and family" to be above all other institutions and it was stated he often bought and sold slaves so they could be with their "mates." It was stated that Jefferson also had 25 house slaves and six stayed with him during the later years of his life ... relying

upon one slave giving noney for food.

As a lawyer, defferson took a case (almost a year before the first abolition slavery unit was organized in America) of a mulatto whose grandmother had been the daughter of a white woman and whose father was a slave. Jefferson felt that the man's mother was then free because she was white (or part white) and that all of that woman's descendants should also be

Jefferson's statement at this famous trial was "under the law of nature, all men are born free, and every one comes into the world with a right to his own person, which includes the liberty of moving and using it at his own will." In 1770 isix years before the Declaration of Independence) this was an "explosive statement" in Virginia or any other state. The judge presiding over this trial was not in favor of such radical approaches so he ruled in favor of the mulatto's owner, not the plaintiff.

The statement Jefferson made was such a radical approach to the contrary thought of the day that it cost that slave his freedom. From that point in Jefferson's life, the idea was set. and Jefferson made slavery his infamous project that even his attempt to write it into the Declaration in 1776 failed.

Jefferson's "Farm Book" record showed that during the American Revolution 22 of his own slaves fled to the British in hopes of freedom and were ill treated. At that point in his life he considered those slaves his "enemies" and so stated it. However, of the 22 who fled, 12 were reported dead from camp fevers and six returned to his home, later to infect eight other slaves at Monticello. It was later learned that out of the 30,000 Virginia slaves, 27,000 died of fevers and camp diseases. Three thousand were exchanged by the British for rum, sugar and coffee to the West Indies and a portion of them where shipped to Africa by way of Nova Scotia

and England. A great deal more can be learned from reading

Without the members of his black "family" that cared for his thousands of acres of land and kept Monticello so well cared for, cooked his meals and tended his sick wife all those year, he may not have had time to do the writing of the Declaration of Independence, nor would be have had time to start up the University of Virginia in 1819, nor would be have had time to be an author, statesman, diplomat, scientist, architect or educator. He dabbled in law, art, geography, music, agriculture, botany, meterorology, geology, and was also an inventor. His time was that of a "country gentleman" only because of his birthright and his place will always stand out as a man whose visions wanted his time to be 200 years ahead of itself and that included the release of the bondage of slaves ... his and his fellow man's. We know from written history that he ordered his overseer "never" to beat or "whip" his slaves. We know that his life was closely and intimately related to one of the slave women and that children came from this union. We know that when a slave stole from him he

was treated like any thief. No one will ever know the real stories of the men who were signers of the Declaration of Independence, but I would say that because of slavery, time was allowed the signers to attend Congress and meet when they could to discuss

release from England's rule over them. No black man or woman signed the document that makes us free, but each in a silent way contributed by their labor of steadfastness, and made it possible for these 56 men to make history for our United States.

Although Jefferson may have always wanted to abolish slavery ... he continued to live off the "labor" of his slaves which totaled 60 at this

AARP seeks voice in Medicare debate

WASHINGTON -- When America's most powerful special interest group is left mumbling, stumbling and unsure of what to do for its 33 million elderly members, one can be certain that Washington's political climate has undergone a drastic change.

The American Association of Retired Persons has been thrust into disarray over the prospect that Congress may trim as much as \$250 billion from Medicare over the next

seven years. After sufferinga humiliating defeat with the demise of health care legislation last year, AARP has taken a defensive posture regarding Medicare.

The alarm is evident in internal AARP memos, reviewed by our associate Dale Van Atta, regarding an upcoming conference that's pegged to coincide with the 30th anniversary of Medicare. The most interesting is a con-fidential memorandum written March 22 by AARP's top

lobhyist, John Rother, to his boss, Executive Director Horace Deets.

In the memo, Rother admits that the failure of health care reform last year - and the blow it delivered to AARP's Democratic ailies on Capitol Hill -- may have crippled any hopes of halting the rollback of Medicare.

"The Medicare debate, both in Congress and in the press, is now completely onedimensional and one sided," Rother wrote. "Those who traditionally have supported the program are 'out of gas' intellectually, because all their work over the past few years has focused on comprehensive reform, not Medicare alone. This is an extremely dangerous situation, and must be remedied as soon as possible - preferably before the Congress votes in late summer on unprecedented Medicare cuts...

The AARP has traditionally been unyielding in its defense of Medicare, resisting any and all attempts to cut the program - often with great success. Medicare currently benefits two-thirds of its membership. With Republicans in charge on Capitol Hill, however, Rother told his boss that the association would probably have to give some ground in the debate lest it become irrele-

"The Association is east, inevitably, in a defensive posture when major cuts in Medicare are being considered," Rother wrote. "But our posture is widely viewed in the current environment as not credible, given the imminent financial shortfall facing the Medicare Hospital Insurance trust fund.... We are at risk of not being seen as a constructive voice."

Unfortunately for AARP, its greatest strength may be its biggest liability in the Medicare debate. With 33 million members, the organization and its lobbyists carry considerable clout on Capitol Hill. But the size and diversity of the membership also makes it hard to please everyone. Thus the association is often slow to respond when bills move rapidly through Congress.

Despite the numerous membership surveys It conducts each year, Rother wrote, AARP has little idea what the members want on an issue like Medicare reform, which could move quickly through Congress in late summer.

"We do not currently have 'permission' from our members to get too far in front of them, in terms of advocating a preferred program ourselves," Rother wrote.

Above all, the AARP wants to avoid a debacle like the one that occurred last summer, when it endorsed a compromise health care bill authored by then Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, and then-House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo.





Shuttle, Mir go their separate ways after historic docking

By HARRY F. ROSENTHAL **Associated Press Writer**

SPACE CENTER, Houston -After five days of whizzing around Earth under the flags of two nations, shuttle Atlantis and space station Mir separated today with a gentle push and moved into their own orbits again.

But first, two cosmonauts left the Mir in a small Soyus transport ship and moved 250 feet away to record the undocking of the shuttle and space station which had flown as one large spacecraft - the largest ever. In turn. Atlantia made its own circular flight to photograph the Soyuz reattachment to Mir.

"The button is pushed, the hooks are driving," said shuttle commander Robert "Hoot" Gibson, telling Houston that the mechanism that linked the two craft was being released.

At that point, springs cased the shuttle away from the Mir, which had been anchored to the docking mechanism in the shuttie cargo bay. Slowly the two giant spacecraft - the 100-ton Atlantia and the 123-ton Mir separated. The crew on the Soyuz reported it had a good

view of the process. The three spacecraft performed an intricate ballet, sparkling in the sunshine

against the blackness of space. The sun was so bright that it obscured the docking target on Mir, but the Soyuz was reattached successfully to the station. The cosmonauts also had to contend with a shutdown of the main computer on Mir, which in turn failed to turn on the station lights.

"Atlantis, it has been an inspiring visit with our neighbors in space," said Mission Control. "We look forward to returning." the Houston control center

added. agree 100 percent," Gibson replied.

The space-to-ground radio link crackled with several sets of conversations, with Mission Control in Kaliningrad speaking to the cosmonauts on Soyuz In Russian.

Atlantis carried up seven people, and it is returning with

Thagard had been flying on the Mir with two Russians for nearly four months, and all three were returning to earth on the shuttle.

Two cosmonauts carried aloft "We agree with that. ... We on Atlantis remained behind for a three-months stay on Mir. It was they who manned the Soyuz for the picture taking.

The five days of joint flight, with crews moving back and forth between the two spacecraft, exercising and carrying supplies back and forth generated a bountiful supply of good feelings.

Don't be so quick to put down something you apparently have no knowledge of.

DEAR READER: As I've written before, testimonials don't cut it. If you want to use honey and vinegar for arthritis, go ahead. But no scientific study has ever shown that the combination is beneficial for the vast majority of arthritis patients. Therefore, in good conscience, I cannot recommend this therapy to my reading public.

You may recall that, on several occasions, I have written about the pectin product Certo. When two tablespoons in unsweetened grape juice are taken three times a day, it appears to relieve the pain of arthritis in some people. Nonetheless, I explicitly indicated that Certo has not been scientifically validated for such a use. However, it is safe and inexpensive - rather like honey and vinegar - so if people want to try it, fine. Same with your concoction.
