#### Strikes affect 90,000 students

Striking teachers agreed to return to the classroom today in three school districts in Illinois, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania, but the academic year still remained on hold for more than 90,000 students in six states.

The end of walkouts in the suburban Philadelphia school district of Spring Ford, and in Lowell. Mass., and Blue Ridge, fil., reduced the number of students out of school to fewer than 100,000 for the first time since the academic year began.

Last week, walkouts by 10,609 teachers affected 113.872 students in Michigan, Illinois. Ohio, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts. Nearly all the disputes involved salary issues.

# Geneva man in custody after minister shooting

GENEVA - A 60 year old Geneva man has been arrested and charged in the death of a Methodist minister who was calling on area residents Sunday

Joseph Carmichael Wallace, of 1955 Trail Ron Drive. was charged in the case at 1.55 a.m. today and is scheduled to appear in court at the Seminole County jail this afternoon.

The suspect reportedly accused the victim of trespassing and said the minister was visiting him for the second time. He termed the dead man as a "a Bible-thumping preacher.

Dead is the Rev. Richard A. Conner Sr., 48, of 280 First St. Geneva. Since June, Conner has been pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Geneva. He and his wife Pamela moved there from Tallahassee. They are parents of an adult son and daughter

Church member Lorraine Whiting said Conner was just making house calls at about 6:50 p.m. Sunday. when he didn't even get a chance to get out of his car-Whiting said the shot that fatally wounded Conner was fired through the window of the slain man's vehicle.

Seminole County Sheriff's Capt. Roy Hughey said Mrs. Conner told deputies her husband wasn't there making calls. He was in the area to visit someone else to have some papers signed, she said-

"It's so horrilying." Whiting said. "It's a tragedy for the church. Church was just packed yesterday.

The murder was discovered after neighbors of Wallace called Seminole County sheriff's deputy Todd-Rames to Wallace's rural, double-wide mobile home at about 7 p.m. The neighbors had heard a shot and remarks yelled about trespassing, a sheriff's report said.

When Raines first met Wallace near the front of his property at about 7 p.m. Wallace reportedly denied any knowledge of a shot fired and said there was no problem at his house. Raines went to the house of the neighbor who had called him to the scene and the witness sent Raines back to Wallace's house at about 7:30 p.m.

# **Budget the focus** of Sanford city commissioners

SANFORD - The city commission will begin to decide the late of the \$19.5 million 1988-89 fiscal budget proposal, tentatively approved in July, at tonight's meeting at City Hall.

The budget proposal represents a \$2.1 million increase over the current budget and includes a 20 6 percent property tax increase

Tonight's discussion is the litst of two public hearings on the budget, with the second scheduled for Sept. 26.

The budget was passed by a 3-2 commission vote July 11 after commissioners debared City Manager Frank Fatson's original \$18.7 million budget proposal for four days

Commissioners John Y. Mercer, Herbert "Whitey" Eclostein and Hob Thomas voted for the \$19.5 million hudget proposal, while Mayor Bettye Smith and Commissioner A.A. McClanahan voted

The 20.6 percent property tax increase will raise an additional \$526,954 in ad valorem tax revenue and represents a one-mill hike to \$5.85 per \$1,000 evs'uation

The additional tax would mean an extra \$54 per year on a home valued at \$50,000 after claiming the \$25,000 homestead exemption. Property taxes for the city on a \$50,000 home would be \$150 per year and \$296 per year on a \$75,000 home.

# Robbers have a bad day

SANFORD - Saturday was a bad day for 28 year old Earl Tinsley, 4564 Evers Place, Orlando. After allegedly robbing a Sanford grocery store of \$301 in cash, then being chased by two store employees, his car collided with a police patrol car-

Sanford Police Chief Steven Harriett said Tinsley entered the Winn-Dixte on 25th

Street and Airport Boulevard at 4 p.m. He stepped up to the register to purchase breath mints, pushed the clerk aside, grabbed the cash, and ran to the parking lot with one store employee in tow.

Two other men were waiting in the car for Tinsley. The men are identified as George Demps. 19, 2835 Santana Ave., Orlando, and Calvin A. Mas. agale, 22, of the same address. Meanwhile, another store employee, re-

# Christensen will remain active

Ousted candidate says she will work behind the scenes

SANFORD -- Barbara Christensen says her defeat at the polls last week doesn't mean the end of herinvolvement in politics just that the future holds a more behind the scenes role for her now than during her past 10 years of holding elected office.

I won't say I won't stay out of politics." says Christensen. "I'm just saying I won't be on the front. line getting abused

The comment is followed with a burst of almost girlish laughter belying the anger she feels at losing the tax collector's primary race to Ray Valdes, a chief-

member of an opposing Republican Seminole County power group.

Last Tuesday, after waging a powerful, sometimes bitter battle with Valdes. Christensen lost her primary bid with 6.163 votes to Valdes' 8.421. The voters' decision Tuesday ended a 10-year career in office for Christensen, which began with the Casselberry city council in 1978 and will end this December after eight years as the District T Seminole. County commissioner.

Christensen credits continuing rainfail as a deciding factor in her loss to Valdes Tuesday

"If the turnout was bigger, I would have done much better." Christensen says. "The weather didhave a deciding factor on the election.

Christensen also credits her loss to continuing media coverage earlier this year of a grand jury

# Hurricane Gilbert crashes into eastern tip of Jamaica

KINGSTON, Jamaica - Hurricane Gilbert grew in strength and smashed into the eastern tip of Jamaica today, then almed its dangerous 115-mph winds at the copital of Kingston.

At 9 a.m. EDT, forecasters at the National Hurricane Center in Mianut

Further strengthening was expected, hurricane center Director Bob Sheets said, Hurricane warnings were posted for Jamaica.

#### Cuban refugees greeted by relatives

MIAMI - Squeals of Joy and "refugee starter kits" greeted the first of three planeloads of Cuban extles arriving in Miami Sunday after years of waiting in Costa Rica and Panama to join their relatives in the United States.

The first planeload of 293 refugees landed at Miami International Airport abortly after 2 a.m. Sunday. After brief interviews with health and immigration authorities, the exiles were whisked by bus to Tamiami Park, where volunteers called them, one by one, to join the waiting families.

In all, 687 Cuban refugees were scheduled to arrive Sunday on three flights - two from Costa Rica and one from Panama. Their arrival was arranged by the Cuban-American National Foundation under a new federal program allowing up to 4,000 refugees to come to the United States if they have private

The foundation is the first private group in the United States to take advantage of the plan. It hopes to bring in 1,500 Cuban extles who have been waiting in third countries for a chance to immmigrate to the United States.

#### Trial begins for accused courthouse killer PENSACOLA - Lawvers for Clyde Melvin say they will try to show during his trial that he was mentally deranged on the day

he is accused of opening fire inside a courtroom and killing three people. But prosecutors are expected to maintain that the killings were a calculated act of vengeance for an unsatisfactory divorce settlement, and if Melvin is convicted, the distinction

could mean the difference between commitment to a mental institution and death in the electric chair. Court-appointed defense lawyer Henry Barksdale of Pensacola has said he intends to argue at the trial, which was

to begin today, that Melvin was temporarily insane when the three people were shot in a July 28, 1987, alimony-reduction hearing in Port St. Joe. The shots killed Circuit Judge Wilson Lamar Bailey, Panama City lawyer Tom Ingles and Melvin's former sister-in-law, Peggy White Paulk. Melvin also is accused of shooting and

wounding his ex-wife, Eleanor Inez Huckeba. The crime prompted tougher courthouse security across the state. The trial was moved to Escambia County after a seven-day attempt to seat a jury failed in Port St. Joe, a close-knit coastal community about 35 miles southeast of

# 'Man of a thousand personalities' charged

Panama City.

MIAMI (UPI) - A telephone salesman described as a con man with a thousand personalities and voices may have cheated businesses out of \$15 million. Florida investigators said.

Elliot K. Offen, 36, used more than 50 aliases and created voices and accents for each of them, said John Coffey, special agent supervisor with the Florida Department of Law Enforcement. Offen would use a pay telephone to persuade merchants

throughout the country to send him truckloads of goods on credit - everything from leotards to moccasins, Coffey said. He stored the merchandise in warehouses in Miami and Fort Lauderdale, then sold it quickly at cut-rate prices and disappeared, said Coffey, who has chased Offen for three years. New York police arrested Offen last month in a Manhattan phone booth as he was arranging to buy 250,000 light bulbs. The officers had traced the call through the businessman on

## Gibbons tops out-of-state donations list

TAMPA - Rep. Sam Gibbons, D-Fla., leads all Florida congressmen in campaign contributions received from outside the state since January 1987, a newspaper reported Sunday. Gibbons was fellowed closely by Rep. Bill Chappell, D-Flu., awarding federal defense contracts, the Tampa Tribune reported

Gibbons, a 28-year-veteran with influential committee posts. accepted \$331,750 from out-of-state donators. Federal Election Commission records show. Gibbons also received \$137,750 from in-state supporters

Chappell, chairman of the Appropriations defense subcommittee, received \$294,650 from outside Florida and \$169,645

Democratic Rep. Claude Pepper, the Rules Committee chairman who has become the champion of the elderly, had the third-highest out-of-state total. Pepper received \$207,600 from out-of-state sources and \$110,850 from Floridians.

Rep. Larry Smith, D-Fia., was fourth on the out-of-state list. Smith received \$170,450 from outside the state and \$214,350

Behind Smith was Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., who chairs the Foreign Affairs Committee. Fascell received \$139,915 from outside Florida and \$156,370 from In-state supporters.

# Lotto jackpot set at \$20 million

TALLAHASSEE - Florida Lottery officials set a \$20 million jackpot Sunday for the current Lotto game when no one matched the six winning Lotto numbers during the weekend.

Lottery Secretary Rebecca Paul said sales Saturday, traditionally the busiest day for the game, awamped the lottery's staff in Tallahassee as it counted up winners and losers, delaying the payout for bettors matching some numbers.

"We've never, never had the volume of sales we had on Saturday in a week in which we did not have a major jackpot." Paul said.

The winning numbers were 2, 10, 27, 31, Sales for the week exceeded \$21.3 million.

# Pope arrives in Zimbabwe

BULAWAYO, Zimbabwe -Pope John Paul II today carried his appeal for national reconciliatton to thousands of Zimbabweans in the tribal region of Matabeleland, where five years of unrest that claimed more than 1,500 lives ended only months

A crowd of up to 50,000 people jammed the Ascot Race Course at Bulawayo for mass with the pontiff, who was greeted on his arrival by Joshua Nkomo, the opposition tribal leader brought into President Robert Mugabe's government in January to end the factional fighting.

"We think of great suffering caused by war," the pope told the crowd on the third day of his 10-day trip to five "front line" states bordering white-ruled South Africa.

# Cooperation key in drug arrests

From the crack houses of America to the remote smugglers' dens in the Colombian jungles, the long - and in this case, international - arm of the law recently dipped deep within the worldwide drug trade.

It seized 11 tons of cocaine and \$3.8 million in cash. It destroyed 244 tons of marijuana, 118,000 cocaine plants, 13 drug labs and seven clandestine airstrips. It arrested more than 1,200 people.

Though that impressive haul likely represents only a small portion of the international narcotics network, the global sweep of the crackdown adds a new and important dimension to the war on drugs.

The unprecedented month-long effort spanned most of Europe, the nited States, and South and Central America. Under sponsorship of the International Drug Enforcement Conference, 30 nations joined in, laying aside other differences to couso m common enemy - the cancerous effect that illicit drugs are having on their societies

Virtually all the countries shared intelligence data. Panama and Costa Rica worked tagether at their common border to destroy marijuana and chemicals used to process cocaine. Drug agents from Bolivia and Brazil flew side-by-side on surveillance missions.

The international cooperation was a success all its own, breaking down territorial animosity and opening avenues for future cooperation. Planning is already under way for similar efforts.

Although on a smaller scale, the same cooperative apirit and unity of effort exists in Semimole County with the City County Investigative Bureau. A joint effort Friday night resulted in the arrests of 13 in Oviedo. all charged with selling cocaine. It is but one of many instances of cooperative efforts in this county. Arrests of individuals on drug charges are a daily occurance.

As long as people buy drugs, others will sell.. And it's a sellers market. Too often the assumption is made that drugs are the province of the poor or disadvantaged. Not so. The poor cannot spend hundreds of dollars for a high of only a couple of minutes. Cocaine use is found among the affluent the professinal people, successful businesspeople and highly paid athletes. Agents confiscate bundles containing millions of dollars yet not even a dent is made in the drug dealer's deep pockets.

Ultimately, the solution to the drug problem will not come from law enforcement, no matter how effective and broad based. The key is education. Few people will choose the path of drugs if they know where it leads.

Until that long-range goal takes hold, simultaneous International crackdowns supply a promising new weapon in a war that respects no territorial boundaries. Locally, citizens must depend on cooperating law enforcement officers who must a times feel that their efforts in reducing the flow of drugs in Seminole County is like trying to drain Lake Monroe one cup at a time.

And Vice President George Bush has taken up the rallying cry as they try to identify "liberal" with a card-carrying you know what. The use of "far out left" also has come into vogue in their

Ideologically speaking. Reagan has proudly identified himself as a "conservative" throughout his presidency. And he has advocated the conservative agenda from top to

The basic conservative agenda has stressed passage of a law for prayer in the schools and an anti-abortion amendment, neither of which the president achieved.

After painting liberalism of political thought in terms of something akin to leprosy. Reagan and Bush believe they have found fertile ground in portraying Democratic candidate Michael Dukakis as a "stealth candidate" who is indulging in a "masquerade" to hide his true liberal feelings. It's difficult to tell whether it has been the telling blow in Bush's meteoric rise in the polls to the point where he is now toe to toe with Democratic presidential candidate Michael

was once a Democrat, and a liberal one at that, until he saw the light in the 60s. He revised his

political philosophy in that era and opposed all the civil rights and voting rights measures that were the outgrowth of racial protest.

So what is liberal and what would Reagan and Bush change if they had the political power to do so?

There are a siew of laws on the books from past liberal administrations. particularly the New Deal and the Great Society. Among them to cite a few are Social Security and Medicare, Would any

presidential candidate dare to repudiate these laws?

The president identifies liberalism with the ills of the federal government

The president also reminds audiences that he advocate eliminating them would ensure defeat at the polls. Reagan suggested in the '60s that Social Security be put on a voluntary basis, but he backed off with some 35 million sentor citizens qualified to vote.



# Long summer's trip into fall

BOSTON-Labor Day has closed the season as if it were a summer cottage, and we have come home again. After weeks in the country, we spend our first night in the city listening to a car alarm instead of crickets. I lie in bed wondering if it is the mourning cry of an automobile wounded by some routine urban criminal. Or is this just the background noise of city life welcoming us back?

In the morning we are awakened, not by our own biological schedule, not by the sun, not by a seagull on the roof, but by a clock radio that floods our sensibilities with the tragedy from Bangladesh and highway traffic reports. The caffeine of news rouses us against our will.

We suit up for our back-to-work event like athletes for the big game. The familiar artifacts come out of the closet where they were stored. My husband ties regimental stripes around his neck. I put on such regulation items as puntyhose and eyeliner. Sullably costumed in our work uniforms, we mount our cars and drive dutifully, directly, into the new year.

It is new year's week everywhere. In a million, ten million, 20 million other houses. some variation of our ritual is being enacted. All at once, children who moved languidly through August are jump-started into September with urgent instructions to stop dawdling, stop daydreaming, in short, to stop

The school bus and bells cut through the lethargy and the peace. Summer doesn't just slip away. It is cut off before it becomes habit-forming.

Slow to re-enter, I wish there were a recompression chamber, some emotional suburb between summer country and autumn city. I don't want to be a permanent resident in the hammock. But my transition to an office with windows that don't open and air that gives no hint of the seasons is too abrupt, too final. I would like something of the summer to last longer than a tan.

A few days ago we sat at the table in Maine making our real new year's resolution, planning what we wanted to take home from the island. A bag of yellow pertwinkles. A sense of case. An even keel. Was it possible to put that on the ear roof? Would it last all the way back to the office? Into October?

I remembered a story from my mother's childhood. She spent one beach summer elaborately grinding stones into sand. She layered the sand deliberately and carefully One shade was sifted subtly on top of another in a jar until it made a picture. But her summerscape didn't survive the trip home. What she had left when she got back to the

citywasa monochromatic jar of beige sand.

Is there nothing from summer's design for life that can be protected from jostling insistence of this new year? Is there any way to prevent it from becoming business

beige? One of the joys of our Island is that there is no place to go no drycleaner. drugstore, movie theater. Our errands

there is no place to go were limited to the dump and the grocery store. Our entertainment limited to the porch and bay. We lived our lives within a few miles. We didn't run many errands, nor were our days run by errands. All we consumed was food. Isn't it possible, in real life as well, to shorten the list?

In the city the stores are open seven days a week. The supermarkets are open till midnight for the convenience of people who work. We no longer even have the enforced time off of Sunday laws. On weekends, we moonlight as shoppers and houseworkers. And there are times when we wish for the inconveniences that allow leisure.

So this is what to save from summer: some smalt personal pockets of time. A real Sunday, even a secular sabbath. A quiet half-day when the television is off and (heresy!) so is the phone. An afternoon, evening or hour when a family can be an Island.

I don't know if any of us could keep this sort of new year's resolution. But now, before the colors of summer are shaken into one dull hue, we should allot some small pieces of peace to be used in other seasons. Call them the summer times.

# Dealer slowed Iranian talks

WASHINGTON - The agentaing story can now be told about why President Reagan's secret overtures to Iran blew up in his face. with a backfire that turned a noble venture into a political scandal. The records, still under court seal, point an accusatory finger at one man = international finagler Manucher Ghorbanifar,

His treachery kept the United States from regaining a foothold in Iran and may have set back the peace efforts in the Persian Gulf by two years.

The story began in 1985 when the White House learned that the struggle to succeed Ayatoliah Khomeini had already begun. The Ayatollah's Byzantine regime was divided between the radicals, who wanted to carry on the revolution, and the pragmatists, who believed they should settle down to governing

The cantankerous Khomeint was an incurable revolutionary who blessed the radicals and anointed one of his clones. Ayatollah Hossetn Ali Montazeri, as his successor. But the wily leader of the pragmatists. Speaker of the Parliament Hashemt Rafsanjant. had managed to keep his head an inch below the purge line while he consolidated his power.

Reagan ordered his subordinates to establish contact with Rafsanjant, if

This was a warning circulated throughout the U.S. intelligence community that he couldn't be trusted and shouldn't be dealt with. But the Israeli covert specialist with whom the United States was dealing. Amirain Nir. insisted on using the

Ghorbantlar cheerfully submitted to CIA lie-detector tests that lasted five hours. "The only questions he passed were his name and his nationality," snorted George Clair of the CIA. Later McFarlane described Ghorbandia as "the most despicable man" he had ever

From the first, the ignominious but irrepressible Ghorbantur guided the negotiations in the direction of his bank account. He tried to promote an arms-for-hostages trade that would enrich himself as the middleman. Knowing that the frantans needed weapons and the Americans wanted their nostages back, he persuaded each side to offer what the other wanted as a "good faith gesture." He escalated the promises that both sides offered and heightened expectations until the frantans angrify accused the Americans of playing a "cheating game."

# Japan's trade surplus shrinks

#### United Press International

TORYO - Japan's global trade surplus for August shrank 31.1 percent from July to \$4.945 billion, reflecting continuing expansion of the Japanese economy, the Finance Ministry announced Monday.

The August surplus represented a 3.0 percent decrease from a year ago.

The ministry's preliminary report said exports increased 18.2 percent over a year ago to \$20.802 billion while imports rose 27.3 percent to \$15.858. billion.

Imports gained over a year ago for the 16th straight months, ministry officials said. In yen terms, Japan's experts totaled 2.769 trillion yen, up 4.3 percent and imports amounted to 2.110 trillion yen, up 12.4 percent, producing a surplus of 659

billion yen, they said. Japan's trade surplus with the United States totaled \$3.254 billion, marking the eighth straight year-on-year decline, the officials said.

#### Protesters disrupt motorcade, 20 injured

SANTIAGO, Chile - Riot police were called in when about 300 protesters hurled rocks and tried to block a motorcade carrying Gen. Augusto Pinochet, who marked the 15th anniversary of the coup that brought him to power with a speech attacking the United States.

Police sources said 20 people were injured when police fired water cannons and tear gas to disperse about 300 de-monstrators in the working-class neighborhood of Cerro Navia Sunday evening. Pinochet was in the area to attend a function in support of his bid to win eight more years as president in an Oct. 5 plebiscite.

#### iragi protesters march on U.S. embassy

MANAMA. Bahrain - Thousands of Iragis marched on the U.S. Embassy in Baghdad to protest Senate sanctions against Iraq for its alleged use of chemical weapons against Kurdish separatists.

State-run Baghdad Radio said Iraqi and Kurdish demonstrators, which Arab news agencies estimated at tens of thousands, marched on the U.S. Embassy compound Sunday waving placards and chanting anti-American slogans.

The official Iraqi news agency INA said an Iraqi Kurdish girl left a petition signed by 25,000 people at the gates of the mission, protesting "the American Knesset's hatred against Iraq and the Arab nation." The Knesset is the name of Israel's parliament.

#### German hostage to be free in 48 hours

BEIRUT, Lebanon - The pro-Iranian kidnappers of West German hostage Rudolf Cordes, held captive for more than a year, said today they will release the businessman within the next 48 hours.

The clandestine Strugglers for Freedom group said that a representative of Syrian President Hafez Assad and West German ambassador to Lebanon, Wolfgang Guttleman, should go to a hotel, apparently to receive Cordes.

Villagers in the West Bank town of Nuba erected barricades of burning tires and waved the outlawed Palestinian flag Sunday while chanting anti-Israel alogans to protest the slaying of a 26-year-old Arab man Saturday. Palestinian sources said No injuries were reported in the clash.

The death of Ahmed Dababseh brought the toll in the 9-month old uprising to at least 251 Palestinians killed. Three Israelis also have been killed since the violence began Dec. 9 in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip.

Palestinians demonstrated or clashed with soldiers in at least five other towns and U.N.-run refugee camps in the occupied territories. Palestinian sources said. At least 11 Arabs were shot and wounded with live ammunition during the clashes. they said.

Israeli soldiers shot and wounded eight of the Palestinians, including two 15-year-old youths, during fighting at the Beach refugee camp in the Gaza Strip. Palestinian sources said. They said the clashes erupted after soldiers took an Arab man into their jeep and beat him.

Merchants in Gaza City closed their shops to protest the fighting that began Sunday morning at the nearby camp, the sources said. The army said it had no reports on the clashes at the camp.

#### New fires rage, snow helps Yellowstone

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK. Wyo. - Firefighters cheered as snow dampened wildfires in Yellowstone National Park, but 50 mph winds in California fanned a half-mile wall of flames that destroyed at least 15 homes and forced 5,000 people to flee.

One of the half-dozen fires that have charred 1 million acres in Yellowstone, the 62,000-acre Hellroaring fire, was declared contained Sunday, and for the first time in weeks, firefighters went on the offensive with the help of the rain and snow, calm winds and temperatures in the 40s.

But in northern California's Gold Rush country 120 miles north of San Francisco, the weather helped spread a fire that broke out Sunday, doubling in size by the hour to 5,000 acres by midnight, destroying 15 homes.

#### U.S. relief envoy arrives in Dhaka

DHAKA. Bangladesh — A huge American cargo plane arrived today with aid for victims of Bangladesh's worst-ever floods and a special envoy sent by President Reagan to assess the disaster affecting tens of millions of people.

Special envoy Jay Morris was accompanied by a team of U.S. disaster relief specialists, including experts from the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

Today's arrival carried 2.2 million square feet of plastic sheeting for shelter, 10,000 5-gallon water cans, water tanks and two water purification units that can process thousands of gallons of water per hour.

# Oil spill endangers game

LOS ANGELES - Work crews Sunday repaired a ruptured Mobil Oil pipeline in the San Fernando Valley but not before thousands of gallons of crude oil flowed into the Los Angeles River, endangering ducks and fish, officials said.

State wardens and biologists observed some 200 mallard ducks that live in and around the river spattered with oil, some covered with the sticky substance, said Lt. Reed Smith, spill response coordinator with the California Department of Fish and Game.

State officials also saw bluegill and carp swimming in the oilcovered water, but they were alive. Smith said.

"It will take days to get a good feel for the real impact" on river wildlife, he said. The volume (of oil) involved and the distance covered will qualify this as a major spill."

About a dozen ducks were captured and taken to the Los Angeles Zoo for cleaning by volunteers, Smith said.

He could not confirm any deaths of ducks or fish, but said he anticipated such reports as the cleanup along the river progressed.

The oil came from an underground 10-inch Mobil underground pipeline that ruptured under a busy throughfare in the Encino area of San Fernando Valley early Saturday.

As much as 60,000 gallons of crude oil bubbled up through the asphalt into the street and storm drains leading to the river.

Cleanup crews hired by Mobil used vacuum trucks to suck up the oil from the street, while a half-mile stretch of the valley's busiest thoroughfare was shut

# Yonkers adopts desegregation plan, staves off huge fines

YONKERS, N.Y. - The City Council staved off million-dollar a-day fines by finally approving a court-ordered housing desegregation plan, and the mayor proclaimed, "We did nothing less than save the city of Yonkers.

Jeers and catcalls from the public echoed through the ornate, domed council chamber when the council voted 5-2 at 1:20 a.m. Saturday in layor of the bitterly contested plan-

Now, snatched from the brink of extensive municipal cutbacks. Yonkers reportedly plans to try and recover the \$1.6 million it already had paid in contempt-of-court fines.

The council's earlier rejection of the plan, which sparked one of the nation's most rancorous desegregation fights, led to the astronomical fines that threatened to bankrupt the city of 190,000 people just north of New York City.

The housing plan was ordered

by U.S. District Judge Leonard Sand in settlement of a descrimination lawsuit against the city by the NAACP. But the planwas rejected by a 4-3 vote Aug. I and Sand found the city in contempt, levying crippling. daily-doubling fines.

A meeting was convened minutes before the deadline, but it was another hour and a half when, in front of a battery of glaring television lights and nearly 100 angry residents in the council chamber, Republican councilmen Peter Chema and Nicholas Longo reversed their votes, citing the tremendous pressure of the looming layoffs and fines in explaining their reversal.

Since then, state Assemblymen Terrence Zaleski told the Times he had sent telegrams to both New York senators urging congressional action to return the the heavy fines paid, some of which went to the U.S. Treasury, although a portion was set aside for the city Board of Education.



# Wilander ends Lendl's reign

NEW YORK - At the moment Ivan Lendl's last shot fell into the net, he stopped being the U.S. Open champion and the No. 1 player in the world, and Mats Wilander stopped acting like a stoic Swede.

Throwing his hands in the air in exulation, the usually reserved Wilander shared his ectasy with the 20,000 fans who had watched his five-set. 4-hour and 54-minute duel with the Open's defending champion.

"The best victory that I've ever had," is how Wilander described his 6-4, 4-6, 6-3, 5-7, 6-4 triumph Sunday.

This meant so much because Ivan has wonthis so many times (three) and I was close last year (runnerup, in four sets). I had never wonthis tournament and the Swedes have never wonthis tournament.

By capturing his third major title of 1988, the reigning Australian and French champion supplants Lendl as the No. 1 ranked player

"It's an Olympic sport which is very fast-paced and exciting," Lyman coach Norman Ready said. "Right now, the our county are learning the sport but it will be definitely be something worth watching once they get all the skills down

The time stipulation is that with some of the volleyball standards currently used by the schools it takes too much time to adjust the net from the girls level to the boys level, and back to the girls level.

Three Seminole County teams had their inaugural games this past week, with Lyman topping Oviedo and Lake Mary routing DeLand. Lake Howell and Lake Brantley will open their schedules this week. Seminole High is the only school not to have a boys team in the Seminole Athletic Conference which will crown a boys volleyball champion in 1988 and it will count in the allsports trophy standings.

Ready, who found out he was the Lyman coach the first day of school, said no one on his team has ever played organized volleyball before. but he has 20 players who work hard and are interested to learn the sport.

"Most of them have played a lot of beach volleyball or likedplaying it in PE classes." Ready said. "They really don't have the fine points, as far as skills go, but they are picking it up pretty rapidly.

Lake Mary and Lake Brantley figure to have two of the stronger teams, mainly because many of their players are experienced in the sport. having played in USVBA leagues at Merrill Park in Altamonte Springs.

"Our boys definitely know what they're doing," Lake Mary girls coach Cindy Henry said. "I just hope the officials let them play because the USVBA leagues they play in is a little looser type of game."


#### Vikings 36, Patriots 6

#### Planning, limits will keep pounds off of those hips

Often, one's freshman year in college means not only a change in studying habits, but eating habits, said Ed Forristall, area manager for Weight Watchers of Central Florida.

A positive attitude should be enjoyed concerning eating habits, Carmen said. "There is no need to despair." he said. "You can enjoy college life without gaining 'The Freshman Ten.' The key is to plan ahead.

'Set realistic goals for yourself and stick with them. Don't let your college friends coax you into eating things you'd rather avoid. You'll be the one who has to pay the price!"

Weight Watchers offers these other tips to prospective or current college students who want to stay at high-school slimness.

#### In the cafeteria:

· Check out your choices before making a selection. Decide what looks good and is good for your figure, then make selections. When planning your meals, keep in mind variety and moderation.

 Try to eat three meals a day. A good breakfast starter is fresh fruit juice or fresh fruit. Supplement with a dry cereal and low-fat milk: whole-grain toast with cheese or peanul butter, or a muffin without butter. Avoid such typically high-calorie fare as bacon, eggs and home fries, and pancakes with syrup.

In today's deal. South opened one diamond, made a jump shift into clubs and then supported spades. So how many hearts. could be possibly have? Of course only one, and so East didnot need to put up the king of bearts on the opening lead from West. But he did

After winning east's heart king with his ace, declarer was able to reach dummy with a spade and lead the 10 of diamonds. East covered with the king and declarer won with the ace. When the queen of diamonds brought down the nine, declarer got back. to dummy with the eight-spot and played the tack of hearts. discarding a spade. The 10 of hearts then was a parking place. for a small club, and South only had to lose to the club king.

See the difference if East does not waste the heart king. Declarer will go to dummy with a


before. But he will have a spade loser, and a problem in the club suff. If he happens to play to the club queen, losing to the king. then East will most likely take the eventual setting trick.
