## Divided We Fall

"United we stand; divided we fall" - G. T. Morris.

That sentiment so true in the days of our founding fathers continues so today here in Seminole County. Our county is divided by the "telephone curtain." It is divided by a growing "north-south" feeling which should not be.

Seminole County should be united in that same drive and effort which existed in the campaign to have the new state university located here.

Now a new "difference" has come into being, another division against county-wide unity. The Sanford Herald believes this should not be.

The Seminole County Chamber of Commerce came into being in the early 1920's as the successor of the Board of Trade. For all these years the Seminole Chamber has worked toward one goal: The prosperity and growth of Seminole County. But now there is disunity: A few still paid-up members in the Seminole Chamber have organized the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, with the aim of

promoting a greater Sanford. The Orange County Chamber of Commerce suffered its demise some years ago because of the organization of the Greater Orlando Chamber of Commerce.

Seventy per cent of the budget of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce is in appropriations from the City of Sanford and the County of Seminole. The county community cannot afford to support two separate trade bodies. Without the contributions of both the County and City Commissions the Seminole Chamber could not carry out its present program.

Seminole County, being small, needs one centralized chamber. A Sanford chamber could only give rise to either "conflict" or "over-

lapping." The Seminole Chamber provides a place of service for any Sanford business and professional person. The Greater Sanford Merchants Association operates as a division of the Seminole Chamber.

The Sanford Chamber of Commerce has been rejected as a member of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce, Harold Colee, executive vice president of the State Chamber, says that "the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce has been a long time valued member of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce and, naturally, holds the respect and admiration of this organization. Regarding the matter of membership in the State Chamber for account of the recently created Sanford Chamber of Commerce, if the Seminole **County Chamber of Commerce feels** there is a need for the Sanford Chamber, and approves of their membership in the State Chamber, then we would have no objection to their becoming affiliated."

The Sanford Herald believes that sooner than we think our entire county will literally be a single community and people will need a map to really determine where one political subdivision stops and another begins.

A united front, through a united Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, should be the goal of all Seminole Countians.
