## Faircloth Is Ruled Winner Over Kynes

#### TALLAHASSEE (UPI)

The state canvassing board today officially declared Mayor Hayden Burns of Jacksonville and Robert King III of Miami as the runoff candidates for governor May 29.

#### The board also declared state Rep. Earl Faircloth of Miami as the first primary winner of the race for state attorney general, naming incumbent James W. Kynes by less than 600 votes.

#### The board heard a lengthy protest by representatives of Sen. Scott Kelly of Lakeland, number three man in the six-man race for governor on the Democratic ticket, who alleged voting irregularities in four counties.

#### But the board had told Kelly at the start that it had no authority to inquire into alleged irregularities, order a recount or go behind the official results as certified by the election officials of the 67 counties.

#### Kelly, who came in the room midway through the hearing accompanied by his pretty wife, Margie, said he would confer with his attorneys before deciding if he will attack by a statement of yesterday in which he said he would accept the decision of the board and would not challenge the results in court.

#### The reason for the conference may have been a statement by Secretary of State Tom Adams, canvassing board chairman, that he felt Kelly's attorneys had impugned the integrity of election authorities in several counties if they made charges of irregularities and then did not do anything about it.

#### He suggested they take the matter to court.

#### Kynes, a member of the canvassing board, disqualifies himself because he went into court yesterday to challenge results in his race and to ask the court to declare him the winner over Faircloth.

#### The official canvass, unless upheld by a court, makes Faircloth attorney general-elect of Florida since he has no Republican opponent, and he would take office next January.

#### The hearing threatened to grow heated at several points, as attorneys for Kelly pushed and prodded to try to get the board to take some action on a batch of affidavits from electors asserting irregularities in Monroe, Manatee, Dade and Alachua counties.

#### At one point, Kelly stood up and went over and talked to Tallahassee attorney Worth Moore, apparently calling him down for personal remarks he made to Secretary Adams because Moore quit and apologized saying he meant no offense and if Adams were offended "please blame me, not Senator Kelly."

#### Moore several times said Adams had a "hard rough face and rough voice" which might intimidate a timid man.

At another point, D. A. Troiano, attorney for Kelly, was told by Adams to sit down, saying the attorney was out of order.

#### Troiano had turned over to Adams a key which Troiano said was the key to a voting machine in Monroe County. He said he received it from a person who was unauthorized to have it in his possession.

#### "I am amazed at the casual way in which the board received this key," Troiano said. "I think this is shocking."

## Commandos Hit Cuban Mill, Refugees Report

MIAMI (UPI) — Seaborne Cuban commando forces early today attacked and heavily damaged a Castro sugar mill at Pilon, on the southern coast of Oriente Province, exile sources reported from an unidentified Caribbean base.

The telephone reports said the raid was carried out by commando forces of Manuel Artime, a leader of the abortive 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion. Artime heads the movement for revolutionary recovery (MRR) exile organization.

Early information said the attack was carried out between 2 a. m. and 3 a. m., and the commandos, after pushing inland to hit the sugar mill made a successful escape.

There was no indication of casualties inflicted, if any.

## Broader Baker Hearing Asked By Senator

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. John J. Williams, R-Del., asked the Senate today to broaden the Bobby Baker inquiry to cover the conduct of its members and the handling of campaign contributions.

The Delaware senator, who investigated the investigation into the business and financial affairs of the former Senate Democratic secretary, introduced an amendment to his original resolution to specifically include senators on the probe.

Williams said he was prompted by a ruling given Tuesday by special counsel Lennox P. McLendon, who said the original resolution did not contain authority for the rules committee to investigate activities of senators.

Williams also amended the original resolution to keep the investigation alive until Sept. 1. It was scheduled to expire at the end of this month.

Sen. Clifford P. Case, R-N.J., urged the rules committee Tuesday to question each senator about any business dealings with Baker. Sen. H. Everett Jordan, D-N.C., chairman of the committee, charged that Case had reached the "height of demagoguery" and said his proposal was an insult.

## Two Killers Die In Raiford Chair

RAIFORD (UPI) — Two killers, one of them a "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" personality, died for their crimes Tuesday in the state prison's electric chair.

Emmett Clark Blake, 32, was the first to die and was followed by Sie Dawson, 53, a one-legged Negro who paid the penalty for killing a 2-year-old white child with a hammer near Chattahoochee in 1949. He had also confessed killing the mother.

Blake died for the 1963 hold-up murder in Panama City of elderly grocer Johnny Beverly.

He also killed a customer in the store with the sawed-off shotgun but was not tried for this.

A friend of Blake's, Houston attorney Vernon Lowry, had described Blake to the State Pardon Board as a man of extraordinary intelligence and ability who occasionally goes on week-long drunks and experiences a reversal of personality . . . truly a Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde."

## Fatal Beating Case Declared A Mistrial

A mistrial was declared Tuesday afternoon in the second degree murder case brought against Alton Williams. The case was heard in Circuit Court here.

Judge Volle A. Williams declared the mistrial after a six-man jury stated it was "hopelessly deadlocked."

The defendant is accused of causing fatal injuries to a four-year-old boy last Nov. 5 by beating him with his fists and a switch. Death was attributed to massive internal hemorrhages.

Williams denied the charge. His defense counsel, Public Defender David Flaxer, contended during summation that the injuries could have been caused by Williams' wife.

The trial began Monday morning, continued throughout the afternoon, then recessed all Tuesday morning. The jury got the case shortly before noon and at 2:25 p.m. reported the deadlock.

Judge Williams set bail at \$7,500 and the defendant was remanded to the county jail pending a new trial or until bail can be posted.

Prosecuting the case was Atty. Mike Hoeman.

While the jury was considering this case, Judge Williams ordered another jury chosen to hear a breaking and entering and petit larceny charge lodged against a man identified as John Grubbs.

It is alleged that Grubbs, with the help of two accomplices, took a safe containing valuable papers from the house occupied by Alex Wynn of 1015 W. 10th St. The theft is alleged to have occurred on Aug. 5, 1962.

The defense and prosecuting attorneys were the same for the previous case.

**Mikoyan In Tokyo To Purchase Japanese Machinery For Reds**

**TOKYO (UPI)**—Soviet First Deputy Premier, Anastas Mikoyan, who arrives Thursday for a two-week visit, is believed to be seeking to buy a billion dollars' worth of Japanese machinery and chemical plants, business sources said today. Japanese authorities put 20,000 policemen on special security duty for the Mikoyan visit, giving the Mikoyan party the same protection as that of a visiting head of state. Mikoyan, Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's trouble-shooter and trade expert, was believed to have been sent here to counter the influence of Communist China, which has been moving toward better business relations with Japan in recent months. By placing large orders with Japanese firms, he could accomplish two things at once: improve Russia's trade ties here and get equipment for Khrushchev's industrial development plans, including the seven-year crash program to increase the production of chemical fertilizer. But Japanese business leaders believe Mikoyan will make any equipment purchase deal contingent on the sale of Soviet oil to this country. Lane County, Ore., still has 48 covered bridges in use.

S. spokesmen, such vitally important information revealing the true nature of Communism tends to be discounted as Yankee propaganda and capitalist fabrication."

Jack Miller (R-Iowa), and will have to be acted on ahead of the leadership proposal, along with any other "perfecting" revisions.

The Miller proposal is similar to one defeated in Wednesday's closing voting. It provided for trial by jury whether the defendant faced possible jail term or fine.

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## Rio Pact Would Be Invoked

CARACAS, (UPI) — Former Foreign minister Marcos Falcon Briceño said last night Venezuela will press for an early meeting of new-world foreign ministers to discuss plans for collective defense against red Cuba.

Falcon, who just returned from a tour of Latin America, said he found enough support elsewhere for Venezuela's demand for action against Cuba to warrant the holding of a foreign ministers' meeting. He said Costa Rica has offered to provide facilities for such a meeting in San Jose, its capital. He would not say how soon he thinks a foreign ministers' conference could be organized. Venezuela's charge that Fidel Castro's Cuba has been arming and advising Communist terrorists in this country was confirmed by inter-American investigators in February, but no action has been taken by the Organization of America States.

Venezuela wants western-hemisphere nations to act under the terms of the Rio (mutual defense) treaty, which provides penalties such as economic sanctions or joint military action to deal with menaces to their security.

Falcon said Venezuela believes action should be limited to "defensive measures," ruling out a military attack on Communist-held Cuba. He would not say whether this country will press for economic sanctions against the Castro regime.

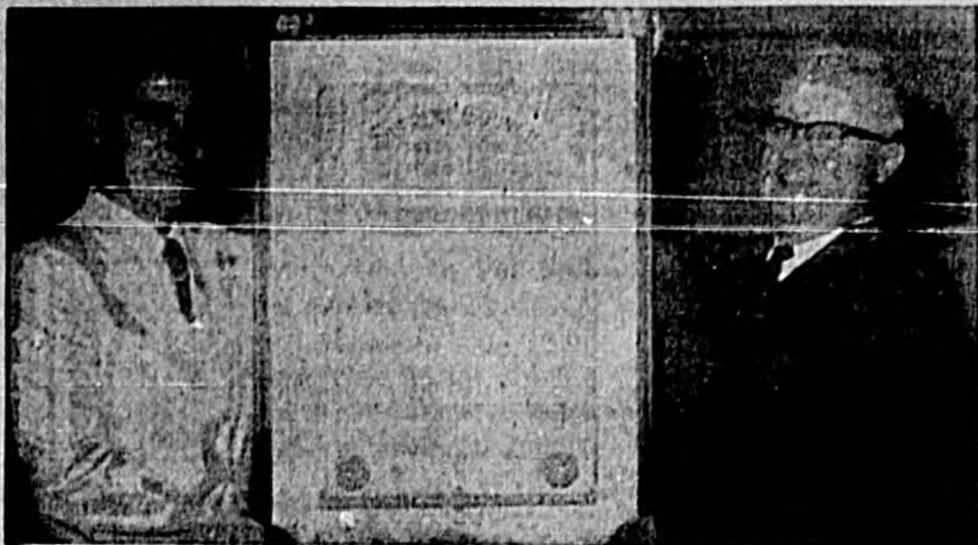
# Charter Presentation Held For KC Council

Shelden insisted the Public Utility Commission makes a "continuing process of studying utility rates" and the PUC can perform an unbiased job.

Miami contended in its letter to the Sanford Commission that Hirsch stated Southern Bell telephone rates are, in his opinion, among the highest in the various states serviced by the system.

Hirsch further contended, the letter said, that "the rates charged by Florida Power & Light Company are among the highest in the nation."

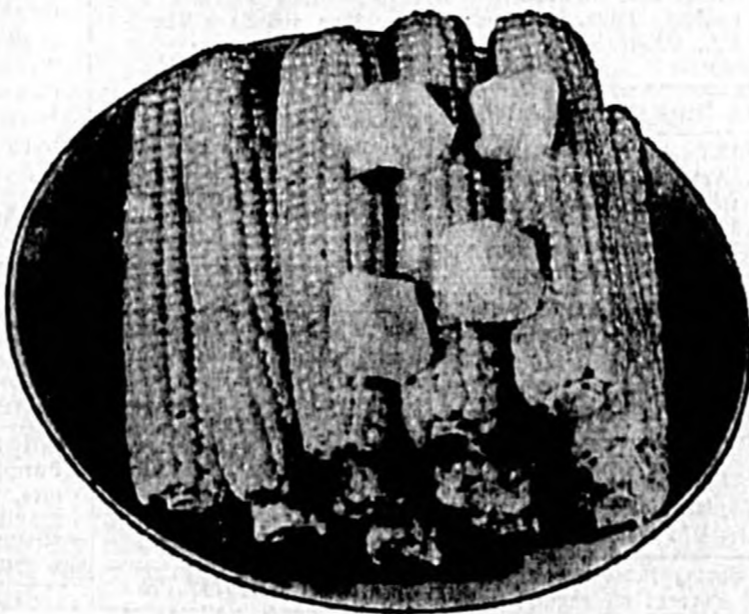
