ormous property damage was done to towns, mainly by accurate Allied bombing, and that the general hospital situation is "more satisfactory than could have been thought possible."

Several small typhoid epidemics are prevalent and much malaria is expected in many districts. "Deplorable conditions" under which thousands of homeless people are living in caves are being alleviated, but "a serious housing and refugee problem exists in all parts of the island," the report said. One perplexing problem is the lack of central machinery for bringing lost children and their parents together. To combat effectively all these conditions, the report said, action under way or planned includes an island-wide study of relief needs; a study of social insurance programs; a study of the situation as it affects children; cooperation with other sections of the health division in relieving the housing situation; a survey of the refugee problem and development of a plan to assist prisoners of war released in Sicily. Every effort is being made to consolidate the medical situation as soon as possible. An initial shipment of three tons of medical supplies was sent to the island and some enemy socks were uncovered, but despite this, there exists a scarcity of narcotics and anesthetics, the report said.

Warning Issued To Beware Of Forgers By Chief Williams

Since many offenders in check cases are juveniles, the Secret Service is not only hopeful that their present campaign of "Know your Endorsers" will save the taxpayers money in reduced investigative time, and expense of keeping prisoners in penitentiaries, but will help keep juveniles out of trouble.

Also because of the effect on morale of the armed forces, the Government is extremely anxious that no allotment of allowance be dropped 97%. In addition to the great reduction in counterfeiting, the campaign has helped a great deal to keep down juvenile delinquency.

To Those Who Receive Checks

1. Never endorse a check until you are actually in the presence of the person who will cash it.
2. Have a good, deep mail box. Have your name clearly printed on it. KEEP IT LOCKED!
3. Whenever possible, have your mail carrier deliver checks in person rather than to your box.
4. If you change your address, notify the Post Office immediately.
5. Cash your check at the same place each month CASH IT YOURSELF! DON'T SEND CHILDREN TO CASH CHECKS! This encourages juvenile delinquency.
6. DO NOT FOLD, PIN OR MUTILATE ALLOTMENT OR ALLOWANCE CHECKS!

1 loaf stale bread
Butter
2 cups milk

Sugar
Powdered cinnamon
2 eggs
Dash of salt

Butter slices of bread, and arrange a layer of overlapping slices to cover bottom of buttered shallow baking dish. Sprinkle with sugar to taste and dust a little cinnamon over. Repeat layers of buttered bread, sugar and cinnamon until dish is filled. Beat eggs until very light, add milk and salt. Blend well and pour over bread. Top with sprinkling of sugar and cinnamon. Bake at 375 degrees for 20 or 25 minutes. The custard should be set and the top slightly browned. If not browned, place under hot broiler for a moment.

1,400 Killed When Italian Ship Explodes

Pride Of Mussolini's Navy, Roma, Blew Up Like A Bomb When Nazi Plane Struck

MAHON, BALEARIC ISLANDS, Sept. 23. (AP)—Survivors of the Italian battleship Roma said today that 1,400 crewmen were killed and some 500 others were burned seriously when a German plane struck the ship squarely in the vessel's stack as it was sailing to give up to the Allies. Italy's newest and largest warship "exploded like a bomb," the survivors said.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Sept. 24. (AP)—German torch and dynamite crews demolished the Naples waterfront, scattered 30 ships to black the harbor and wrecked industrial and rail centers in the great Italian metropolis in apparent preparation for evacuation as Allied armies lunged last night within sight and sound of the wholesale destruction.

The battle for Corsica was in its final stage. French troops and American Rangers closed in from the northeast, and Allied planes and air forces clamped on a tight blockade, cutting off German escape routes. French commander in chief predicted that all Germans on the island would be ousted or killed "from 10 to 15 days."

Advances of from 10 to 15 miles in central and southern Italy put great chunks of land behind the straggling Allied lines.

The whole German left flank in the Salerno area, 20 to 40 miles back of Naples, was pinned down and turned inland. The American Fifth and British Eighth armies were advancing and forcing March 24, 1943. The British Eighth army back on the interior approaches to flaming Naples.

(Ghino, Avigliano and Aversa fell.)

The British radio said Auletta and Centuri had been captured. Auletta is 30 miles southeast of Salerno on the road to Benevento. Centuri is 20 miles southeast of Salerno, and there the Germans admitted "a dent made by the enemy in our positions."

French command reported the Germans lost heavily in men and material near the tiny Corsican report of Solomara south of Rhodes and Crete without molestation.

Almost no Nazi aircraft were reported anywhere along the 1,000-mile Mediterranean front, and huge Allied ships roamed over the Mediterranean sea.

Civilian Shoe Rations Are Cut By OPA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24. (AP)—It will be six months instead of four between new pairs of shoes for civilians in the future, the Office of Price Administration announced last night.

The cut in civilian shoe rations is necessary, the agency said, because of "heavy drains for military purposes, greatly reduced leather supplies and manpower shortages."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24. (AP)—Preliminary steps to enable several million in the armed forces to cast absentee ballots in the 1944 state primaries and the presidential election were made in Congress today.

Chairman Green (D-RI) announced he had asked War Secretary Stimson and Navy Secretary Knox to give the Senate Elections Committee their views on the pending plan to permit overseas service men and women to use the simplified V-mail ballot. The hearings will be open. Rep. Green said, as soon as the Stimson and Knox statements are received.

Local Interest Grows In Proposed Plant

Thirty-six people of Seminole County have already expressed "tremendous" interest in the proposed co-operative cold storage locker plant where individuals may store food, and in an up-to-date, model canning kitchen, it was announced today by County Agent R. Dawson.

A meeting to discuss these projects will be held at 2:00 o'clock Monday afternoon at the City Hall. Mr. Dawson stated that this co-operative venture, to be financed by a loan from the Bank for Co-operatives, would follow the pattern set in the middle west where the idea has made great strides during the past few years.

He added that the plant would be financed by the government for materials for the cold storage plant or canning kitchen, he added.

Growers of strawberries and other fruits and vegetables would benefit greatly, Mr. Dawson said, from the cold storage facilities afforded.

Leo Butler, president of the Seminole County Farm Bureau, speaking in behalf of his group, signed the fully approved \$65,000 financing project, and added that the Farm Bureau would co-operate in every way backing up County Agent C. R. Dawson in his efforts to organize such a project.

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Clark's Fighting 5th Launches Great Offensive Against Nazis Burning Naples

The Red Army has reached the Dnieper River in force, Soviet dispatches said today, while from the Italian front the conquest of Corsica appeared imminent.

Allied warplanes there intercepted a German air fleet attempting to evacuate Nazi troops from the island stepping stone to the French mainland and shot down a transport plane.

In the air war RAF block-buster raiders pounded German war factories at Mannheim, Ludwigshafen, Harstadt, and Aschen last night and Vichy said U. S. planes set fires in Paris.

Regarding the Russian front a Berlin broadcast admitted that German troops are now fleeing the long embattled Kuban bridgehead after bloody defeats. Thus were collapsing Adolf Hitler's dreams of seizing the rich oil treasures of the Caucasus.

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LONDON, Sept. 24. (AP)—The Red army smashed to within artillery range of the German capital, further flanked Kiev and toppled the Ukraine capital of Poltava in Soviet German advances along a 200-mile stretch just short of the middle Dnieper river.

A Soviet communiqué announced the push to the east, the German central stronghold of Smolensk, and Pochinok, 19 miles to the southeast, as Soviet armies plunging westward overran 600 towns and villages along the huge front. Surging toward White Russia, the Red army also captured Uman, a rail junction midway between Bryansk and Gomel, and the Moscow radio said Soviet troops already crossed into the territory adjoining Poland.

A Berlin broadcast acknowledged the peril to Smolensk, Kiev, Cherkass and other eastern front locations, admitting the loss of Poltava, said Soviet troops had broken into Russia below Smolensk and also stated "a few small" Russian detachments had reached the Dnieper river.

Most Gigantic The German military commentators, Capt. Ludwig Serretius, said the Red army's offensive was "the most gigantic of the entire eastern campaign," and that the wide Soviet pincers move on the Ukraine capital of Kiev was being pressed with "extraordinary violence."

Serretius said German troops were "utterly demoralized" and "disengaging themselves," but gave no hint as to where the German high command would decide to make a desperate stand.

The Russians now have plunged so far westward that eastern Prussia, the Baltic states, Rumania and Axis targets in Poland and Hungary are within easy Soviet bomber range for the coming three-armed Allied effort to smash the entire German "roof" this winter. The Russian oil fields in Rumania are only 425 miles from the advancing Russians.

Moscow Kiev Aside from the center thrust at Gomel, Russian troops were mauling Kiev, Ukraine capital, which is 85 miles from the old Polish border, and had overrun Vellish at the edge of the upper White Russian border only 112 miles from Poland.

A Moscow radio broadcast told of the push toward Gomel by the Red army. The Dnieper river in that sector lies only 18 miles beyond the city.

Marshal Stalin's order of the day, addressed to the Kharov army of Gen. Ivan B. Konev, said Poltava had fallen after "a day of fierce fighting," and termed the city a "powerful German center of resistance on the left bank of the Verata river."

Los Angeles Strike Begins Despite F. I.

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 24. The strike of 3,000 Pacific Telephone employees began at 8 A. M. (Pacific time) today despite the conditions set by President Roosevelt. The union of the employees had fallen after a day of fierce fighting, and termed the city a "powerful German center of resistance on the left bank of the Verata river."

Finns May Repent

The worried Finns, as the long winter begins to settle down around them, are doing more thinking than usual. They begin to lose confidence in their trusted friends, the Nazis...

They are even ready to talk peace terms. Premier Linkomies says his country regrets being at war with England, and wants peace with Russia...

But, people who play with fire are generally burned. The Finns, whom Americans once admired for their heroism, have lost the friendship and trust of the Allied Nations...

which he legislates encourages the multiplicity of laws. The fact that he does not have to face a constituency makes him irresponsible to the people in the performance of this his highest function of sovereignty.

The promoters of centralization are more and more resorting to the exercise of another unlimited power against which no constitutional barrier will ever stand: the control of the purse strings by the units of state government financially dependent on the federal government...

This job will have been done with money sent by Washington in the form of loans and gifts to individual citizens. This money has been scattered in the form of grants, in the form of direct subsidies to the central government and make them subject to its power.

But we are approaching the day of reckoning. Up to now Washington has been borrowing money from the states, and the states, in turn, have been borrowing from the federal government...

In weakening the states we weaken the whole fabric of free government. The most destructive force in the world is none other than the central government of the states we will wake one day to find that self-government has passed irrevocably out of our hands.

Government is exercised best in the local community. There the problems are perceived with greater clarity because they are close to the people and on a scale within their grasp.

What shall we do about it? Change bureaucrats? Consolidate bureaus? Abolish bureaus and turn the whole intolerable load back to Congress? None of these makeshifts touches the real source of the trouble.

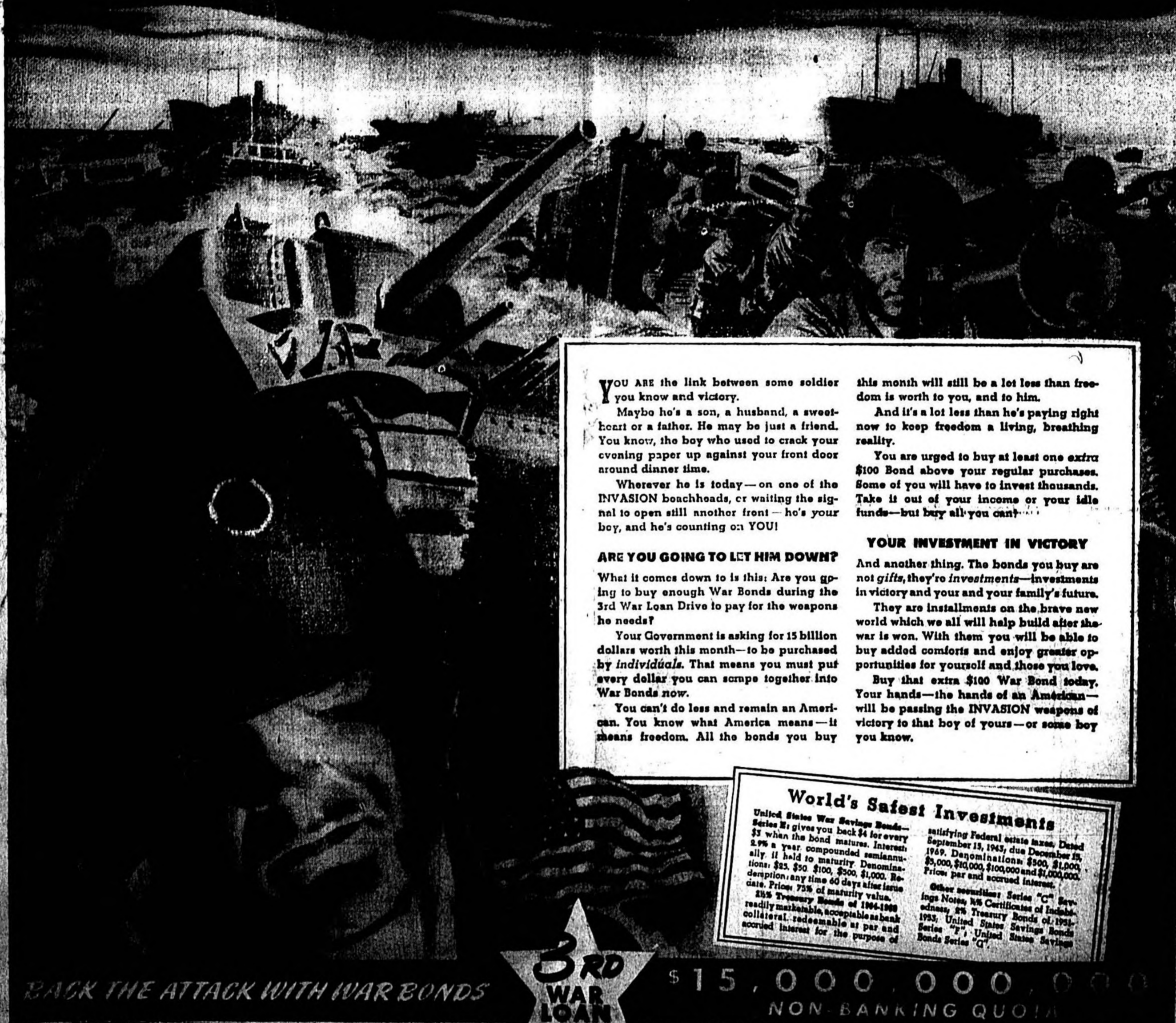
