Two well-deserved honors have come to Louis Adamic within the past few weeks. He has been presented with the sixth annual John Ashfield Award of \$1,000 for his book "From Many Lands" (Harper & Brothers), as the outstanding book of the year on racial relations, and he has received the honorary degree of Doctor of Letters from Temple University in Philadelphia for his distinguished contribution to the field of literature. The Ashfield Award was established in 1934 by Mrs. Edith Ashfield Wolf of Cleveland, Ohio.

In memory of her father, John Ashfield, for the purpose of encouraging and rewarding good books in the field of racial relations either here or abroad.

Louis Adamic was born of parent parents in Slovenia, or Carinthia, now a part of Yugoslavia, in 1899. His formal education in his native country was equivalent to two years in high school. He came to this country in 1913, knowing no English, and he has never been in school here. In 1918 he became a citizen while serving as a soldier in the American army. At various times Mr. Adamic has been a sailor, a migratory worker, a pilot's clerk in Los Angeles harbor and a Slovenian language editor in New

York. He began his career as a writer in 1926, when H. L. Mencken began to publish his stories in The American Mercury. In 1928 he began his studies of the development of American life resulting from the influx of this country in the last hundred years of 25,000,000 immigrants representing more than fifty different national backgrounds. One result of that study is his latest book, "From Many Lands." Another is his editing of the magazine Common Ground, published by the Common Council for American Unity, of which he is one of the founders and directors. Still another is that he is attached to the Consumers Division of the Defense Commission as consultant to Commissioner Harriet Elliot on the expert on the problems of the new-immigrant groups. Mr. Adamic is the author also of "Laughing in the Jungle," "The Native's Return," "House in Antigua," "My America" and several other books.

Winston Burdett, the foreign correspondent whose radio broadcasts from Belgrade are featured every Sunday night in the CBS round-up of foreign capitals and who has been suspended temporarily by the Yugoslav Foreign Ministry for releasing information about which the Italian and German Governments have complained, is writing a book covering his experiences in the Balkans. It will be published in April by Modern Age Books under the title "Land Without Peace." Lee Burdett, the author's wife and also a well-known journalist, is co-author.

Mari Sanders, author of "Old July," "Capital City" and other books of recent years, has signed a contract with Alfred A. Knopf for the publication of her next work. It will not be a novel but a non-fiction book dealing with the Sioux Indians, whom her father knew when he was pioneering into Nebraska fifty-odd years ago. The book will not be ready for issue before the Spring of 1942.

Some weeks ago Charles Scribner's Sons reported that Julian Lee Rayford, author of the recently published novel "Cottonmouth" had molded a mule that Henry Wallace wanted to adopt as an ornament for the Department of Agriculture buildings.

Now it turns out that it was not a mule but a novel, and the publisher was blushing the author. Mr. Rayford's "Cottonmouth" is a story of the dignity of the House of Erlinger.

Doubleday's first edition of Daphne du Maurier's "Come Wind, Come Weather," published on February 21st was 100,000 copies. It is a collection of true war stories.

Doubleday looks forward to a big campaign of publicity in newspapers, magazines and over the radio. The low price of "Come Wind, Come Weather" will help, the publishers hope, to secure a sale in this country comparable to that in England. News stories and releases, as well as speeches and sermons by clergymen, will stress the "moral re-orientation" aspect of the book, for Miss du Maurier believes that "moral re-orientation" is as important to national defense as the building of armaments and aircraft.

London booksellers report a huge business with "Come Wind, Come Weather." The first edition was sold out on the day of publication, August 15. Air raid wardens have sold thousands of copies in air raid shelters and in the London Underground. The Lord Mayor of Bristol had asked to present a copy to every citizen of the city injured in air raids. Doubleday's London office reports that a tie-up with Alfred Hitchcock's movie version of "Habeck" accounted for the sale of thousands of additional copies.

THE HERITAGE OF HATCHER IDE, by Booth Tarkington

Whoever has read "Parrot" and "The Magnificent Ambersons" knows what Tarkington can do with the spectacle of a young man in love, with the problems of youth, both ludicrous and deadly serious, with contemporary American life. Now he pictures a generation caught in today's turbulence, and facing it as Americans, and tells the story of young Hatcher Ide's difficult coming-of-age in a world where "everything is crazy nowadays—business, government, war, and even love!"

Bewildered and somewhat baffled, Hatcher struggles to make his way—diverted, however, by his passion for a woman almost twice his age. Set against a background of social decay but

without tears or flag-waving, "The Heritage of Hatcher Ide" reveals again the uncanny insights into the human mind—especially the adolescent male mind—which distinguishes Tarkington's best work.

H. M. PULHAM, ESQUIRE, by John P. Marquand. Readers to whom the late George Apley was a living, breathing person will revel in this story of Harry Pulham's life. Many will react even more to this book than to that already famous novel, for George Apley was a member of an older generation while Harry Pulham is a contemporary.

"H. M. Pulham, Esquire" is the story of a man whose life is shaped by his surroundings in a mold formed by home, school, society, even business influences, smooth-fitting, comfortable—unbreakable. Many men and women live in such molds, and many do not without realizing it. For it is the unique quality of such a mold that one is unconscious of its existence until it chafes.

Mr. Marquand lets Harry tell his own story, from the vantage point of a man who is facing his twenty-fifth reunion, the story that will not appear among the class biographies. There is laughter in these pages. There is tragedy in these pages. There is the most appealing heroine, there is "justice without mercy" drawing of characters who are like people you know. There has been at least one American college. When the telephone rings in a business office, it is a fair chance that some "Dixie King" is on the line. These scenes may go into the language. Harry Pulham will be remembered for reasons close to the reader. Men will find themselves stopping to compare Harry's life with their own and women will find themselves wondering how well they know their own men.

Northwest Seeds Go South To Aid Worn Cotton Land

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 21.—Down in the cotton, corn and bean country of the deep South, plantations worn out in feeding and clothing a growing nation are building back with the help of little seeds from the Pacific Northwest.

The new bonds between the widely separated agricultural areas are hairy vetch and Austrian winter field peas, soil protecting and soil building legumes. They produce fields of purple and white flowers that check erosion and enrich soil sucked dry of nourishment by generations of crops.

Both crops grow luxuriantly on the northern Pacific slope, particularly in eastern Oregon.

Although seed crops are grown and harvested in the summer vetch and field peas used for cover and soil building in the South are planted in the Fall and plowed under in the Spring.

William Tutsch, assistant director of the Oregon extension service, recently completed a tour of southern states and reported "phenomenal soil improvement" from the seeds. At Cartersville, Ga., Robert M. Stiles told Tutsch that use of winter field peas had helped boost his cotton yield from 20 pounds

an acre in 1932-33 to 450 pounds in 1937-38.

Mrs. Olla Antman, operator of a 15,000-acre plantation in Worth county, Georgia, said that her corn yield increased 100 percent a year after she plowed under a crop of field peas.

Most of the Southern states use the legume crops from the Pacific Northwest, but Alabama, Georgia and Mississippi take more seed than do the others. Intermediary in his farm deal is the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, which helps to bridge the 3,000-mile gap between the two areas.

In the Pacific Northwest, the AAA encourages farmers to grow more legume seed (the new crop cuts down the wheat surplus) and guarantees them a reasonable price.

In the South, AAA gives financial aid to farmers "so they can buy the seed."

Alonso, Once King Of Spain, Dies In Italy

Ex-Monarch Passes In Room Of Hotel Following Series Of Heart Attacks

Ruler Lost Crown On April 4, 1931

Reign Marked By Political Turmoil And Civil Unrest

ROME, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Alfonso XIII, 64-year-old former monarch of Spain, died today in the hotel room which had been his home in exile for a decade. He had suffered a series of heart attacks beginning Feb. 15.

Alfonso, a king from birth May 17, 1884, reigned until April 4, 1931, a period marked by turbulence and political unrest which finally led to civil war in 1936, when Spain was a republic.

Personal courage, made plain when numerous attempts were made to assassinate him, plus his royal duties, marked Alfonso XIII as a man of Spain and of the world.

Alfonso came to the crown on May 17, 1902, when he was 17 years old. He was the son of Alfonso XII, who was the king of Spain from 1875 to 1885. Alfonso XIII was crowned in Madrid on May 17, 1902. He was the last monarch of Spain.

Japan's Ultimatum To French Expires; No Reply Is Made

TOKYO, Feb. 28.—(Saturday)—Japan's ultimatum to the French, that they agree to yield to Thailand (Siam) large areas of Indo-China provinces of Cambodia or suffer "terrible attacks" by the Japanese, expired at midnight Friday without a reply.

Italian Division On Juba River Crushed, British Claim

BERGAMO, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The mass movement through Habesch of German troops in battle uniforms was reported in diplomatic dispatches from the Rumanian capital today.

On the eve of Hitler's threat of a vast new U-boat offensive, beginning in March, the Germans reported today that Nazi warships had sunk or damaged 28 ships totalling 146,000 tons in the past two days.

In addition, the German High Command said 22,000 tons were sent to the bottom by a Nazi submarine.

British interpreted the government's warning to Bulgaria to avoid any act which might lead to a diplomatic break as an effort to force Germany's hand and disclose whether the Nazis meant to fight in the Balkans or were merely throwing up a smoke screen to veil an attempted invasion of England.

The fighting fronts, an entire Italian division was said by the British to have been shattered on the Juba River in Italian Somaliland, while the Greeks claimed to have inflicted heavy losses on an Italian force "trapped" by Greek fire in Albania.

Bad weather over the English Channel brought halt in the Black-Sea air battles.

A British column has driven down the Red Sea coast in Britain for 200 miles and captured Kolonel, 50 miles northeast of Berbera, in an Italian force "trapped" by Greek fire in Albania.

Troops which had fought to capture about 40 miles northeast of Berbera, sent along detachments back to the north to occupy Mile and also Nekka, 60 miles north of Berbera, it was reported. At neither place was resistance encountered.

The tactics indicated a rapid movement of Italian troops, heavily fortified railway station which has been attacked from the west to reach Asmara, Eritrean capital.

On the Somaliland front, meanwhile, Italian troops were reported to have been "trapped" and surrounded by thousands throughout the huge sandy area that has been overrun by south and west African forces.

Berbera, Italian headquarters on the upper Juba River in Somaliland was reported by air scouts to be deserted.

Berbera, wireless station, trucks and cars of Italian troops, one of the lower Italian posts in the Juba valley were reported to have been destroyed.

The British partially confirmed Italian and German reports of a clash between German and British armored detachments in Libya.

The British self-armed fighting vehicles believed to be German were driven back when encountered west of El Agheila.

Winston Churchill challenged his House of Commons opponents yesterday with demand that his government be given a vote of confidence and the House responded with a resounding and unanimous "yes."

It was the first time the British prime minister had made such a demand since his government then last formed amid the German invasion of the Low Countries.

Bulgaria Is Rumored Ready To Join Axis

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Preface For War

Just how easy it is for a nation believing in the philosophy that might makes right to establish a preface for war is indicated by the situation today in French Indo-China. There Japan is on the verge of openly attacking that little country, not because of a dispute between Japan and Indo-China but because Indo-China refused to cede about half her territory to Thailand in a dispute presumably arbitrated by Japan.

Japan has no special rights in either Thailand or Indo-China. Nearly two thousand miles of ocean separate Japan from the disputing parties. But because she had other axes to grind, Japan encouraged Thailand to make territorial demands on Indo-China, then submitted her good offices to arbitrate the dispute. Whereupon she gave more to Thailand than demanded in the first place. Now that Indo-China has refused, Japan attacks.

There are those who say that if Germany wins in the war with Britain, there will be no danger of conflict between our country and Germany because we have no conflicting interests and because the Atlantic ocean separates us from the continent of Europe. They forget that where a nation believes in using force to settle its disputes it is always easy to find something to fight about.

During the past hundred years the United States has had scores of disputes with Britain. There have been differences over boundaries, over insular possessions, over trade rights, over tariffs and currency stabilization. There have been three disputes despite the fact that Britain and all her possessions, with the single exception of Canada, were also separated from this country by thousands of miles of ocean.

Nevertheless, for over a hundred years there has not been the slightest danger of war between our countries because both have long since renounced war as an instrument of national policy. No matter how serious the dispute or vital to our interests, it must be settled by arbitration. Resort to force, or even threat of force, could not be countenanced by either side. As far as Britain and the United States are concerned war definitely has long since become a relic of barbarism.

But that is not the case with Germany, Japan, or Italy. War definitely is a part of their philosophy of government. They believe in it. They preach the virtues of brutality through every agency of propaganda and they practice violence as a means to an end in every phase of their family lives. As much as we abhor war, they love it. They love it because they see it as a practical means of getting what they want.

It is impossible, if the British Empire were removed from the earth, that the interests of the United States and the Axis powers would not clash at some point. When the war is over Germany will need food, not only for herself but for the entire continent of Europe. The United States has an excess abundance of food. Germany will demand that we sell it to her.

How will she pay for it? With worthless German marks, perhaps, just as she is buying things from France today.

IT IS NOT POSSIBLE to measure the cost of accidents and of the loss of life that may take the life of one great scientist and inventor. In the case of the late Dr. E. B.
