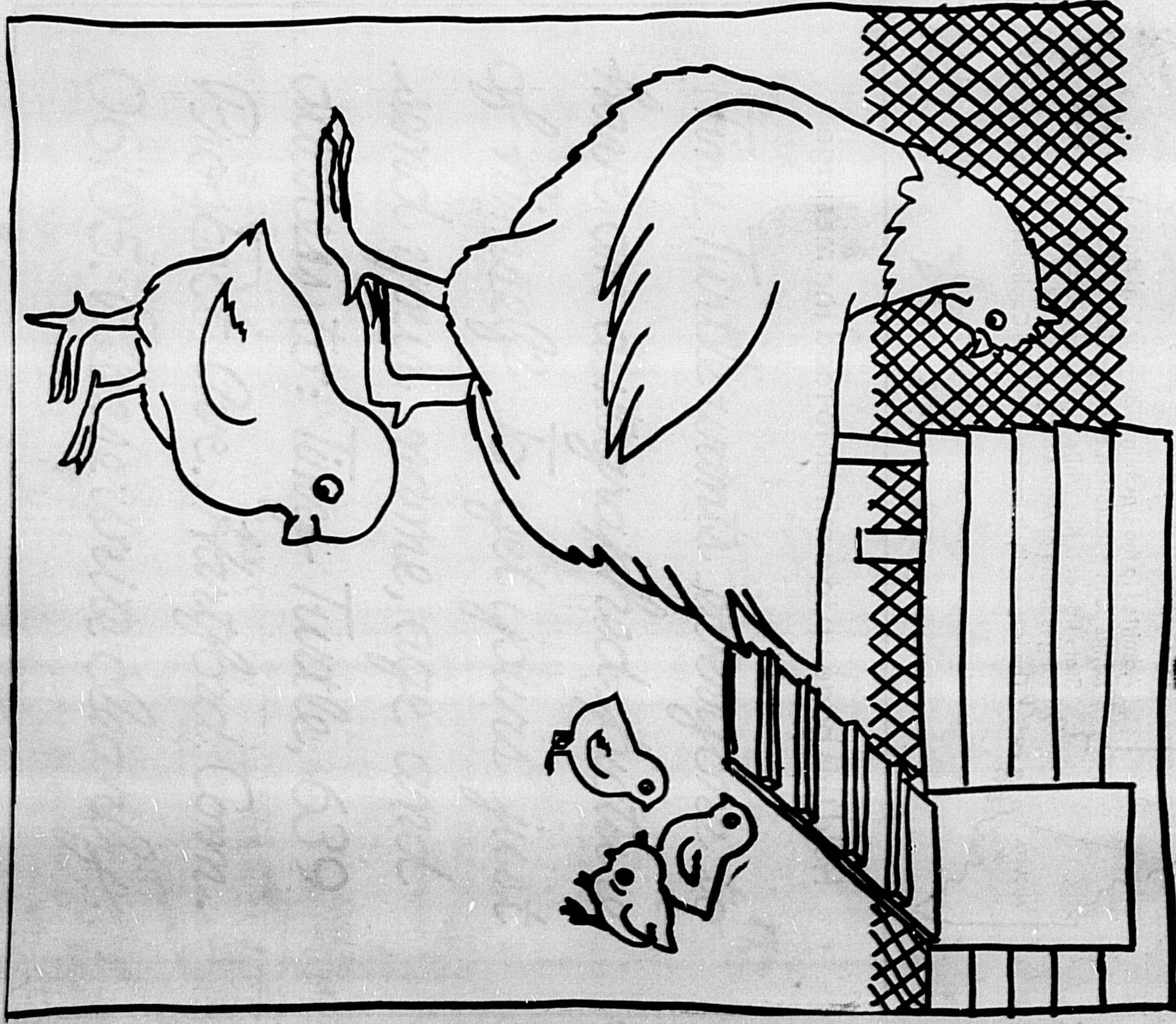

434, 436 Xing Lights Expedited By State

 The State Department of Transportation is expediting the installation of railroad crossing signals on SR 436 and SR 434, it was reported today by C. A. (Bill) Benedict, district engineer at DeLand. Seminole County Commission about four weeks ago approved a resolution urging that action be taken on its earlier request for railroad crossing signals.

Jay W. Brown, commissioner of the State Transportation Department, assured this reporter about three weeks ago at Tallahassee that he would take a personal interest in the matter but that he had no record of the county's request. Benedict said today that the county's earlier resolution had been located in Tallahassee files.

The engineer reported that the state has opened a 30-day study of the Seaboard Coast Line crossings on SR 436 and SR 434 and will present its findings to the railroad, with the request that installation be expedited. The railroad will be required to furnish the county with the cost of materials from its secondary road fund held by the state.

County Commission altered its earlier proposal for signals on SR 436 and SR 434 and requested that installation be expedited on SR 436 and SR 434. It will present another request for SR 434 at a later date.

Benedict also said that Brown, as a result of this reporter's visit to his office in Tallahassee, stated that a two-lane causeway across Lake Jessup, connecting Sanford and Florida Technological University, has been given priority in the department's five-year program and construction will be completed in the 1970-75 period.

\$1.4 Million Grant OK'd

 Construction of a low-rent public housing project, costing nearly \$1.5 million, by the Sanford Housing Authority, has been given the "go ahead" signal.

U. S. Sen. Edward J. Gurney informed The Sanford Herald this morning that the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has approved a grant in the amount of \$1,436,664. Application for the grant was filed more than a year ago.

Gordon L. Bradley, executive director of the Sanford Housing Authority since 1951, said the project will be for senior citizens 62 years and older. It will contain 100 units in one and two-story multiples of garden-type construction. John A. Burton IV is the architect.

The new apartments will be located between Third and Fifth Streets and between Chapman and Locust Avenues. Bradley said all the property has not yet been acquired and it may be that the Housing Authority would have to file condemnation suits.

The authority director said it probably will be March before the advertisement for bids to construct the apartment project.

Educator Appeals To Voters

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—State Education Commissioner Floyd Christian issued today what he called a last-minute plea to the people of Florida to please vote "yes" in Tuesday's special statewide bond election.

On the ballot will be a constitutional amendment to extend the bonding authority Florida had under the 1963 Education Building Amendment.

This authority expired on June 30, and if it isn't renewed, state officials say, Florida stands to lose at least \$25 million in state funds for university and college construction projects and an estimated \$20 million in federal, matching funds that would come with them.

"In the next five years," Christian said, "enrollment at our vocational-technical schools, colleges and universities will double. This proposed constitutional amendment will provide an estimated \$92 million a year for the next five years to help us meet this tremendous growth. And it can be accomplished without new taxes."

The alternatives are to go back to the Legislature for a large capital outlay appropriation—which would require new taxes—or to limit the enrollments at our existing schools. We must not do either," Christian said.

Hendrix Chandler, corporate secretary of the Board of Regents, said that "the amount of federal funds we will get between now and 1975 range between \$70 million and \$75 million" if the bond amendment passes.

The amendment earmarks revenues from the utilities gross receipts tax.

Zoning Questions Raised

Altamonte Facing Two Suits

 The city of Altamonte Springs is being sued in two separate zoning cases.

William Benika is instituting proceedings against the municipality because the city is attempting to stop his operation of a real estate office on Maitland Avenue.

The city contends that Benika is in violation of the zoning ordinance. Benika counters that the characteristics of the street have been changed, that it is no longer residential and that he should have the right to operate his business.

Benika filed for a temporary injunction against the city until it could be determined if he had the legal right to operate his office. The suit, which will be heard in Circuit Court, Judge Tom Waddell presiding, will have representing the city of Altamonte Springs Attorney S. Joseph Davis and representing the plaintiff will be attorney Orville Johnson. Intervenor will be represented by attorney Joseph Murasko.

Litigation is over the fact that Mrs. Anzaldo is operating a beauty parlor in the professional building on Maitland Avenue, known as Professional Coiffeurs.

City is attempting to cease her operation by stating that the area is zoned R3, which includes apartments, duplexes and professional offices.

City contends that the beauty parlor is a personal services establishment. Mrs. Anzaldo's rebuttal is that her establishment is a profession. Attorney Sam Murcell Jr. represents the plaintiff and Davis represents the city of Altamonte Springs.

Thrift Shop Is Robbed

Sanford police are investigating the Friday afternoon robbery of a gift shop by a man armed with a .32 caliber pistol, who walked into Jerry's Thrift Shop, 307 East Second Street, and took \$57 in one dollar bills and some change from the cash register.

Maria Parmeter and Stella Smith, store employees, said a six-foot male with sideburns ran out the door after rifling the register.

A man answering the description was later reported near a downtown bus station and fled on foot when he spotted a police car.

Arraignments Set

Several arraignments which were continued will be heard in Circuit Court at 4:30 Tuesday afternoon.

Among the cases will be Henry Bradshaw, charged with breaking and entering; Larry Brenner, breaking and entering with intent to commit a misdemeanor; Edgar Duffer, worthless check; Patricia Dykes, resisting arrest with violence; Earl Dupree, escape; Raymond Franco, worthless check; Zell Gillmore, aggravated assault; Rich Amerman Lee, and Earl Knowles, breaking and entering to commit a felony; Bernard McKinney, breaking and entering with intent to commit a felony; Johnnie Rostor, breaking and entering with intent to commit a misdemeanor; Harold Rouse, breaking and entering; and John Tindall, auto theft.

Other arraignments included Oliver Barfield, who entered a plea of not guilty to charges of incest; Bernard Gutrie, stop payment, nolle prosequi; Jerome Johnson, charged with three counts breaking and entering, pleaded innocent and requested a trial, public defender Ned Julian was given 15 days to file motions; William Long, worthless check, attorney given 10 days to file motions after Long entered a not guilty plea; James Rowe, charged with assault with intent to commit rape, pleaded innocent, his attorney was given 10 days to file motions.

Elizabeth Callaway, who has been charged with second degree murder in the death of her small daughter, Mabel, was also granted a continuance until today. She will be defended by Julian.

Also to be presented tomorrow will be the case of Hugh Hollar, charged with assault with intent to commit rape. Hollar is alleged to have raped a 17-year-old girl in April in an orange grove between Bunnell Road and SR 431 at Forest City. The grand jury returned a true bill against Hollar Friday.

2 Men Held For Murder

Two men are being held by Seminole County and Sanford authorities in connection with two deaths which occurred during the weekend.

Willie L. Phillips, 1121 West 12th Street, is being held for assault and battery pending filing of murder charges in the death of Samuel Tolbert, 45, of the same address.

Police records indicate that Phillips was arrested after Tolbert was struck several times on the head with a piece of iron drain pipe. The man later died after being removed to Winter Park Hospital for treatment.

Phillips' original assault and battery charge is expected to be changed to murder, Chief Ben Butler said.

According to L. Charles Fagan, a fight had occurred between the two men at a rooming house and police were called. Phillips was arrested by Sgt. John Noel and Patrolman Gary Swain.

L. J. Kriz, county detective, today completed his report in a 32-year-old Oviedo woman.

Carl Lee Bowers, 31, has been charged with first degree murder in the death of Bryllien Bess Bowers, 32, his wife.

Kriz said Bowers was being held without bond after his arrest by Constable Chester Boyd, who reportedly took a .22 caliber pistol from Bowers after rescuing him from a band of neighborhood residents armed with rocks and sticks.

Bowers was lodged in county jail to await the investigation of his wife's death.

Kriz reported the woman had been shot more than once and her face was a mass of blood and injuries from kicks or blows.

A coroner's jury assembled and viewed the body and an autopsy was performed to ascertain exact cause of death.

Youths Beaten

Seminole County authorities are investigating the Saturday midnight beating of three Longwood youths by approximately a dozen males as they walked Lake Howell Road near Club 436 on their way home from a late movie, and police were called.

Thomas Culver, 16, Calvin Allene, 13, and Kenneth Watson, 15, told Deputy William Chandler "a large group beat, kicked and choked us as we walked the road to Longwood."

One youth was quoted as saying the assailants appeared to be at least 21 years of age. After the beating the three were treated for bruised lips, heel marks on the head and bruised ribs and stomachs.

Cassellberry police investigator but reported the attackers had fled the scene and county authorities were called.

In another county report, a 25-year-old Altamonte Springs man has been jailed in lieu of \$20,000 bond in the Saturday rape of a 14-year-old girl.

Freddie Louis Veal was arrested in a Sanford parking lot by police on a warrant taken by the mother of the girl.

The rape is alleged to have occurred earlier in the day and is still under county investigation by L. J. Kriz.

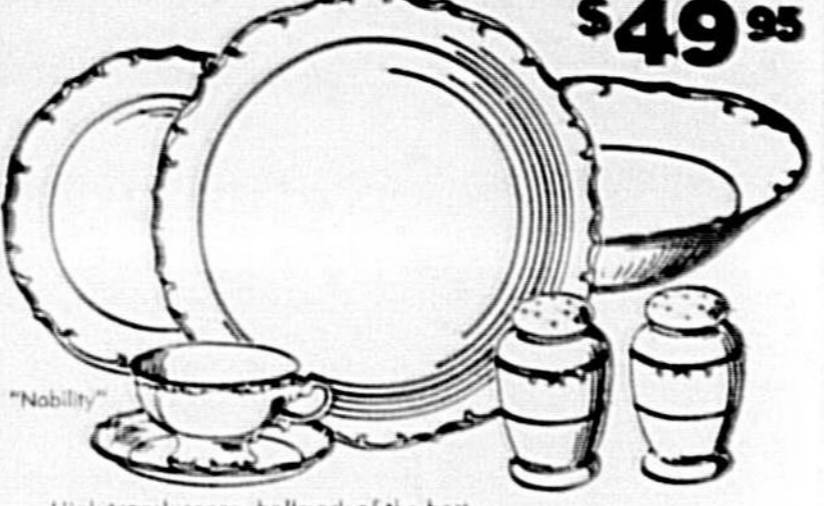

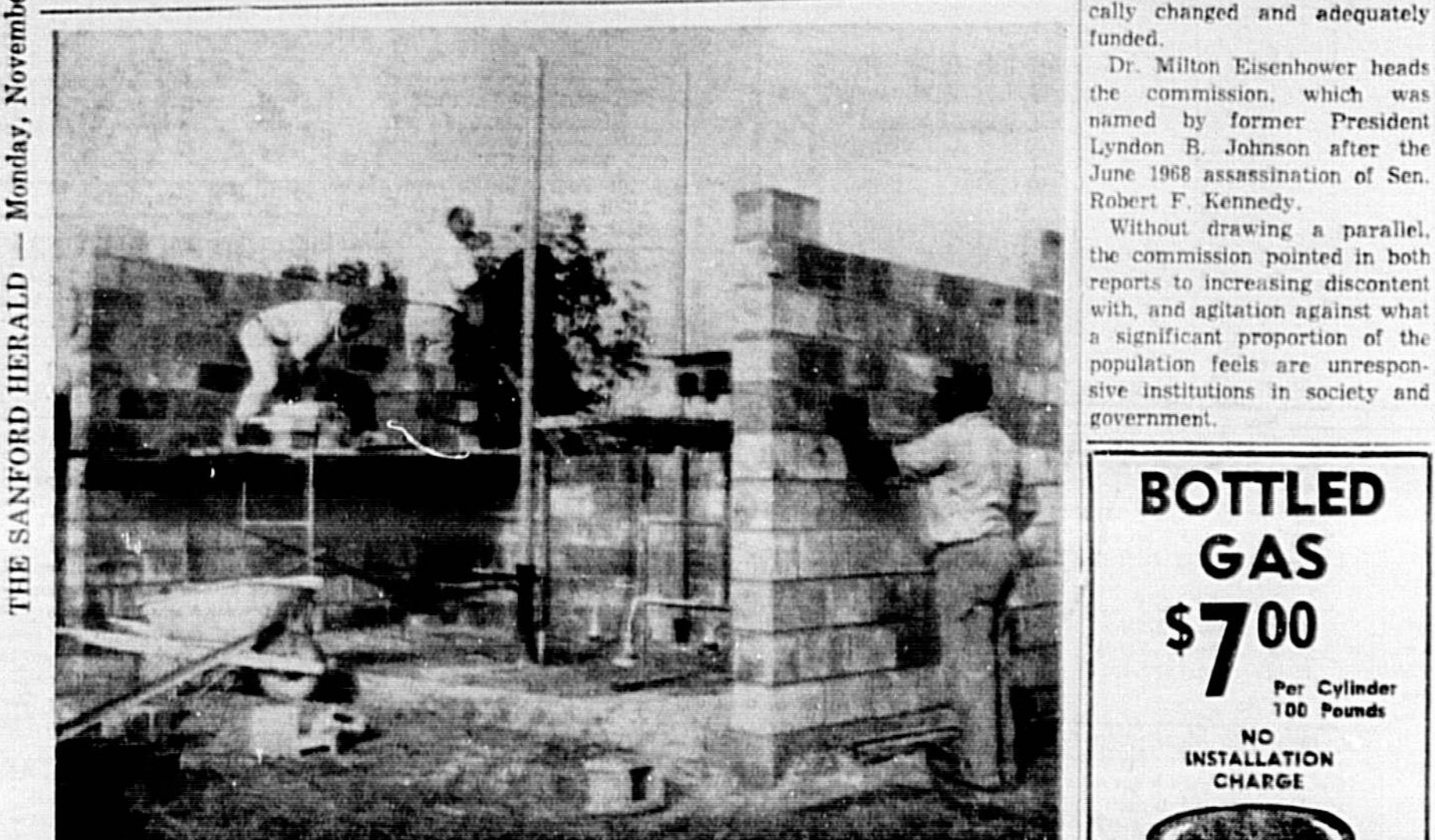

Nixon Will Air War Picture Tonight

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon tonight will air a television special on the Vietnam war, a move that will be the first since the president's inauguration in January 1969.

In Saigon, Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky was quoted as saying that "next year the (South Vietnamese) armed forces can be withdrawn from about 100,000 U.S. soldiers."

Ky predicted "nothing new" out of Nixon's speech, while Ford, addressing a Phoenix Camp David, Md., mountain retreat while working on it.

Originally slated to return to the White House Sunday, Nixon put off his helicopter flight back to Washington until today.

The original White House announcement of the speech just before the Oct. 15 Vietnam Moratorium protests. Its timing to night on election eve and approximately one year after the Nov. 1, 1968, halt to the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam, and the secrecy surrounding its preparation have led to wide speculation that a new Nixon move on Vietnam is in the offing.

"Great hopes and expectations are riding on this speech," the Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield said during the week-end. "I'm just living on a hope and a prayer that he will offer the American people and the Congress some light at the end of the tunnel."

But despite numerous recommendations for the policy speech which Nixon has solicited from his top advisers and government departments, many Washington officials doubted the President would depart substantially from the course he has charted.

Gradual U.S. disengagement based on Saigon's ability to take over more of the land, a lowered level of combat or progress in the Paris negotiations.

Senior administration officials have contended the South Vietnamese are making so much progress toward taking over the war effort that the only way the enemy can win now is through a too-rapid U.S. pull-out forced by U.S. public opinion.

Thus the Nixon address, as they see it, is primarily to win the battle on the home front against protesters demanding that America should get out of Vietnam now.

Commies Step Up Attacks, Capture Three U.S. Bases

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese forces launched new attacks on South Vietnam's central Highlands today after driving allied troops from three U.S. artillery bases at the opposite end of the region. American Special Forces officers said the loss of the bases was a "major success" for the enemy.

While U.S. and South Vietnamese troops along the Cambodian border in the southern part of the highlands braced for renewed North Vietnamese assaults, the enemy struck nearly 200 miles to the northeast, along the coastal region of the northern Central Highlands.

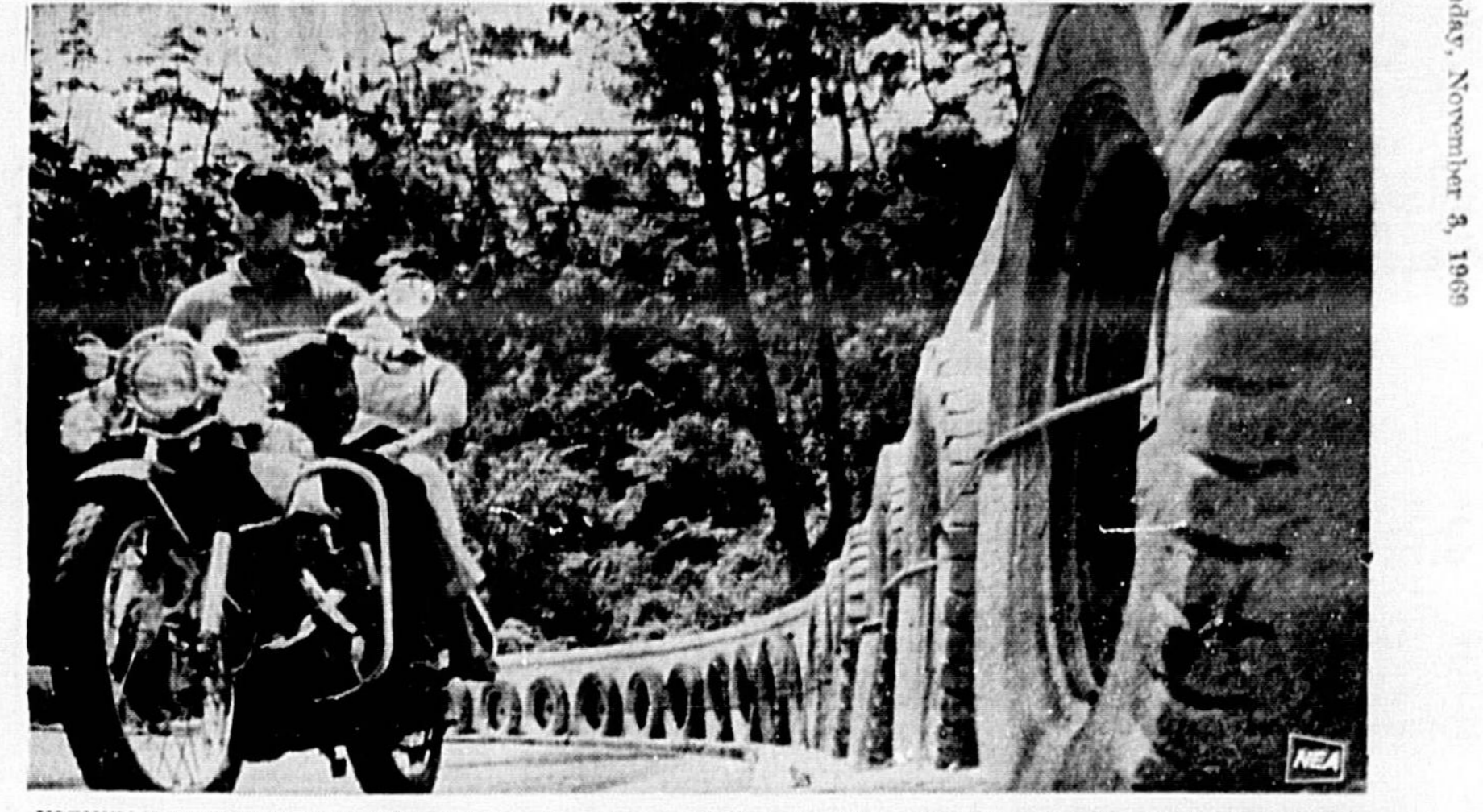
Some 200 North Vietnamese infantrymen and commandos launched coordinated assaults on two artillery bases of the U.S. 17th Airborne Brigade north of the provincial capital of Bong Son.

Firing rocket grenades, machine guns and rifles, the attackers pushed their way to the barbed wire perimeters of the bases before American artillery drove them back. The U.S. Command said at least two enemy soldiers penetrated the perimeter of one base but were killed or captured. The bodies of others were found in the barbed wire around the second base.

Headquarters said 26 North Vietnamese were killed in the two attacks. U.S. casualties were one killed and eight wounded, the command said.

Light rocket and mortar attacks were launched against other allied bases in the highlands, including the headquarters of a division of the U.S. 4th Infantry Brigade at An Khe, 200 miles north-northeast of Saigon.

American officers in the field told Associated Press correspondents that a heavy North Vietnamese force of attacks in the Highlands creates a large military campaign in the region, probably focused on the two important Special Forces camps of the Prang and Duc Lap near the Cambodian border and at the southwest corner of the highlands.

Red China's UN Chances Are Slim

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Communist China again has a slim chance of getting into the United Nations 21st General Assembly prepared to open its annual debate on the issue today.

The United States was expected to be successful once more in its fight to bar the Peking regime, diplomats believed that Italy and probably Belgium might abandon the Western bloc and obtain in the vote expected Friday.

Time is running strongly against the amendment, because the Senate will have its hands full for the rest of the year with the Supreme Court nomination of Judge Clement F. Haynsworth Jr., the massive tax reform bill, and a pile-up of delayed appropriations measures.

The first step is to get the amendment out of the Judiciary Committee, which has been sharply divided on electoral reform proposals. The issue was pushed aside by Haynsworth's nomination and no date has been set for taking it up.

Chinese Nationalist Foreign Minister Wei Tuo-yung was second on the speakers' list with a defense of his government's claim that it is the rightful spokesman for all Chinese, on the mainland as well as on Formosa.

Although Peking was not expected to get even a simple majority in the vote on the Cambodian resolution, the United States and other Western representatives of China to the United Nations and the expulsion from the world organization of the representatives of President Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalist government in Formosa.

Leukemia Cure Seen
GLASGOW, Scotland (AP) — A team of British scientists has found a virus which causes leukemia in cats and made it grow in human cell tissues.

The virus also has been grown in dog and pig tissues, and the researchers plan to test it next on monkeys.

"This is one of the biggest breakthroughs in cancer research in 30 years," said Dr. Robert Williamson of the Royal Brompton Hospital in Glasgow.

Having this virus isolated means that finding a cure is now a matter of hand-slogging."

But William Jarrett, a professor of veterinary pathology and head of the Glasgow University research team that announced the discovery, cautioned: "Don't get too excited about the possibility of a cure being found quickly. But the outlook looks promising."

"This is the first natural cancer virus to be discovered," Jarrett said. "It is the first virus ever shown to cross the species barrier. It will infect any human cell."

The discovery strengthens the theory that leukemia, cancer of the blood, may be caused in man by a virus.

Italians Question Top Hijacker

ROME (AP) — Italian authorities questioned hijacker Raphael Minichiello again today in his isolation cell as the FBI came under attack from the crew of the commandeered Trans World Airlines jet.

The pilot, Capt. Donald J. Cook Jr. of New York, charged that FBI men in New York ignored his instructions to keep away from the plane when it made a refueling stop at Kennedy Airport. He said this upset the 20-year-old hijacker and he fired a shot into the roof of the cockpit.

The FBI in New York declined comment on Cook's accusation. But an assistant district attorney who worked with the FBI, Albert T. Taub, said Cook's criticism was irresponsible and that the pilot was portraying himself as "the sole hero of the escapade."

Cook and the other three crew members—first officer Wenzel Williams of Shallowater, Tex.; engineer Lloyd Haloran of St. Charles, Mo.; and hostess Tracy Coleman of Cincinnati, Ohio—returned to the United States Sunday.

Minichiello, a U.S. Marine lance corporal and Vietnam veteran, commanded the plane over Fresno, Calif., early Friday. He allowed the 39 passengers and three other hostages to get off at Denver, and the plane went on to Kennedy. Refueling stops were also made in Bangor, Maine, and Ireland before the 17-hour, 6,300-mile flight ended in the hijacker's native Italy.

Minichiello studied police for a short time after leaving Rome Airport, but was captured near a chapel on the outskirts of the city.

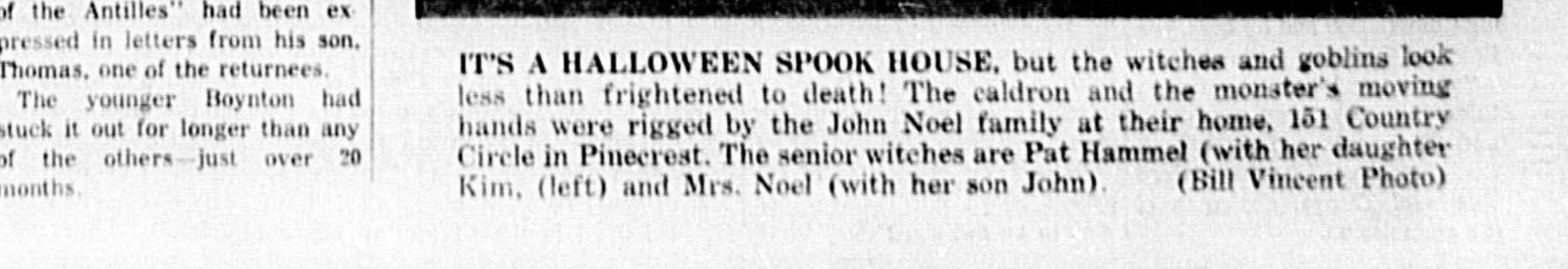
No Utopia In Cuba-Belief

Legislative Delegation To Consider Five Bills

At least five bills affecting Seminole County schools will be discussed during the Orange-Seminole Legislative Delegation Hearing on local legislation scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday in the county commission chambers.

These proposed acts include: a bill to prohibit discriminatory double school sessions in Seminole County; a bill requiring parental consent of health and sex education courses in Seminole County; a bill prohibiting the use of "Sullivan Reading Series" in Seminole County kindergarten, primary and secondary schools; a bill prohibiting standing in moving school buses in Seminole County and a bill prohibiting use of materials recommended by Sex Education and Information Council in Seminole County.

Other proposed legislation affecting Seminole County include: A bill to designate Welaka Springs Road and Redlog Road as state primary roads in Seminole County introduced by County Commissioner Greg Drummond; a bill to require movie theaters to display ratings of main features and pictures in Seminole County introduced by Representative A. Bill Toole; a housing authority referendum in the county introduced by Rep. Lewis Earle and Gibson.

Polk Asks Legislation Sheriff Wants Civil Service Action

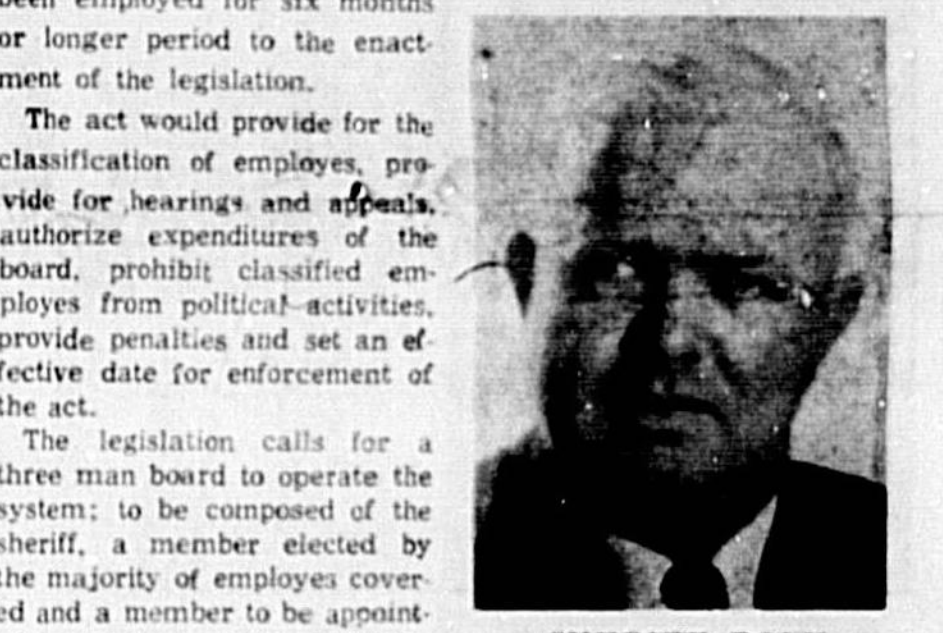

N. Orlando Tells GAC That Paving Is Must

North Orlando village attorney, Orlando Freeman, was asked to prepare a subdivision ordinance incorporating appropriate amendments as recommended by the Planning and Zoning Board at a meeting of the village council last night.
