WASHINGTON (UPI) — False warnings from America's giant missile detection radar in Greenland were numerous over a period of five months, it was indicated today.

The Defense Department said in an annual report to the White House that "the majority of false reports which first plagued it were eliminated by February, 1961."

Congress Set To Vote On Aid To College Bills

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate was scheduled to begin voting today on a series of controversial amendments to the college aid bill supported by President Kennedy.

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., floor manager for the bill, said he would vote against two of the measures. One is a proposal to limit construction aid to public colleges and universities. The other would expand the college aid bill to include \$325 million over two years to assist states in building public grade and high schools.

Supporters of the \$2.6 billion bill have argued that such amendments would cripple the bill and cause its defeat.

The measure, far broader than the one passed last week by the House, would authorize federal assistance over five years for construction of college classrooms, grants to community junior colleges and scholarships for needy and talented American youths.

Under the bill, private and parochial schools would be eligible for low-interest construction loans.

Morse has said he doubts if a final vote on the bill would come before Tuesday.

Other congressional news: Trade — A special House committee planned to ask Secretary of State Dean Rusk about the \$122 million worth of goods American businessmen shipped behind the Iron Curtain in the last 30 months under government export licenses. The export control committee was also expected to ask Rusk to explain why an international system has not been set up to halt the flow of strategic goods to Cuba from the free world.

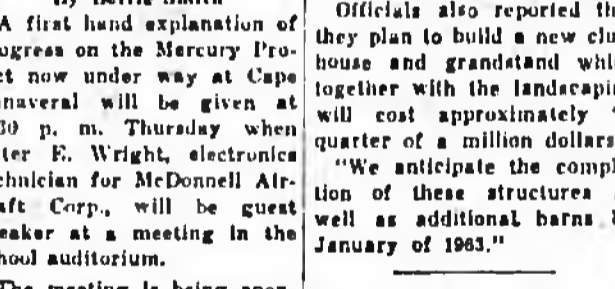

Oviedo Council OKs Fire House Plans

Plans for the new fire house for Oviedo, submitted by F. Wade Tye, Sanford architect, were accepted Monday night by the Town Council at its monthly meeting.

A committee composed of Councilmen W. E. Clouts and T. L. Lingo worked with Tye on the final plans of the building which will be constructed on property adjacent to the Town Hall.

The Council, at the request of the Garden Club, agreed to send a city crew out to the triangle at the cemetery and give two days work if necessary to clean off the ground preparing to beautification by the Garden Club.

Town Clerk Dorothy Courier was instructed to prepare the necessary papers and set a day for delinquent tax sales. The second Monday in June was suggested as an appropriate day for this, since the County holds its tax sale the first Monday.

The Council accepted the bid of \$2,200 from R. M. Wilkins Construction Co. to resurface Lake Charm Drive at its present width.

The Council voted to inform the engineering firm of Evans and Hammond that it is not prepared at this time to accept the offer to set up a town plan designed to attract small industry to the area.

At the suggestion of Council President Ben F. Ward the Council voted to ask its insurance agents, T. L. Lingo Sr. and W. J. Lawton, to institute a survey of the city's insurance needs, making a study of the present policies in force with a view to eliminating any possible overlapping coverage.

Councilman Ben Jones suggested that the Council consider the installation of a water system for the town. He pointed out that savings in insurance could be substantial and that at present only those properties which are near fire wells enjoy a low rate.

A proposal to appoint a Memorial Building committee was tabled pending further study of the situation. It was

President Calls It 'Imperative' To Enact Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy sent Congress today an "imperative" request for a \$5.7 billion, five-year education program including federal funds for public schools and teacher salaries.

The President, in a 4,000-word special message, drove head-on into powerful congressional opposition by renewing recommendations he made last year which were shelved by the lawmakers.

Early warnings that general aid for public schools and teachers is dead in the House for this session of Congress did not deter Kennedy.

"We cannot afford to lose another year in mounting a national effort to eliminate the shortage of classrooms, to make teachers' salaries competitive, and to lift the quality of instruction," the President said.

He urgently asked for the same bill passed by the Senate last year but killed in the House Rules Committee: "legislation providing federal aid for public elementary and secondary classroom construction and teachers' salaries."

Kennedy's five-year program included \$2.1 billion for general aid to education; \$747 million to improve the quality of education through special teacher scholarship and training program; \$2.1 billion for higher education, including college construction and scholarships for 200,000 students a year; and \$600 million for a vast medical and dental school building program plus scholarships for students in these specialty fields.

Calling elementary and secondary schools the foundation of the educational system, the President said there was little

value in attempting to improve higher education and increase the supply of scientists and technicians "without a greater effort for excellence at this basic level..."

His general aid proposal last year funded in the House Rules Committee, largely over the issue of whether federal assistance also should be extended to parochial and private schools.

Police yesterday took into custody a 14 year old boy, only a few hours after the discovery of the breaking and entering at Pinecrest School and theft of an extensive number of the exhibits on display at the Annual Hobby Show.

Sgt. Leo Rock, investigating officer, said that police became suspicious of the boy after he traded several of the stolen models to another boy, whose older sister recognized them as being part of the exhibit. The boy confessed.

Most of the stolen articles were recovered, except for a number of models which were found crushed on the playground, and a jar containing \$6 in class money.

Police are still investigating the possibilities of one or more accomplices having been involved.

The boy was turned over to juvenile authorities. Judge Vernon Mize said today that this boy has a long record of breaking and entering, vandalism and petty larceny.

Articles stolen were taken from the Annual Hobby Show conducted by James Motheral's sixth grade, and also from the room of Mrs. Kathleen Lee, where a large number of models belonging to the students were on display.

Castro's Threat To U. S. Cited

WASHINGTON (UPI)—U. S. officials said Monday that Fidel Castro may soon have ballistic missiles and Soviet jet bombers—all within easy reach of the United States.

The information was contained in a declassified Defense Department and State Department estimate of Cuba's Soviet-supplied arms buildup.

There have been unconfirmed reports for some time that mountain near Havana, in Pinar Del Rio Province and in Matanzas Province were being secretly excavated to house missile installations.

The estimate, based on intelligence information, said Castro has a \$100 million arsenal, the "most formidable military establishment" ever seen in Latin America.

He said that 25 patients afflicted with the virus—known as Herpes Keratitis—were treated with the drug, and all were cured within a week.

Record Reported By Navy Copter
STRATFORD, Conn. (UPI)—The Navy's HSS2 became Monday the first helicopter in history to break the 200-mile an hour mark, returning the world speed record to the United States.

Sikorsky Aircraft announced today that the HSS2, piloted by Navy Lt. Robert W. Crafton, 28, of San Antonio, Tex., flew a 19 kilometer straight line course along the Connecticut shore at a speed of 210.6 miles per hour.

Castro's 'Revolutionary Court' Judge Assassinated

MIAMI (UPI)—Cuban sources here said today a Castroite official was assassinated and two foes of the regime were secretly executed in Cuba over the weekend.

Travelers from Cuba said Lt. (j.g.) Agustín Rumbaut, chief judge of the Castroite

"revolutionary tribunal" in Santiago, Cuba, was murdered on the outskirts of the city Sunday. The precise method of the killing was not reported.

At the same time, refugee sources said two Cubans accused of plotting to assassinate Premier Fidel Castro were tried, sentenced to death and executed secretly Friday in Havana's Cabana fortress prison.

The two men—Octavio Barroso and a dentist whose name could not be determined immediately—were slain by a firing squad in the ancient fortress' dry moat, the sources said.

The two men were convicted of planning to block Castro's car with a jeep outside Havana's "sports city" stadium while tommygunners in another car poured a hail of fire into the premier's car.

One of Barroso's sisters and his wife are living here as refugees.

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UN Bonds Urged
