Wants Standard Box

Tallaha see, June 2 - Mr. Wilder of Hillsborough county waste standard shipping hox for frint and all over the country.

In the house this morning he introduced and secured the passage of a memorial to congress looking to the securing of such a box. The resolution follows:

Concurrent resolution Memorializing the congress of the United States to pass such a law or laws as will fix a standard size for hoxes or carriers in which oranges, grape fruit and other citrus fruits are shipped.

Whereas apples, and other like fruits are required to be shipped in barrels and boxes of standard size fixed by law and, whereas, there is no such law regulating the size of boxes or carriers in which oranges, grapefruit and other citrus fruits are shipped, on account of which the growers and shippers of citrus fruits from the state of Florida are made to suffer loss in the sale of their products in the markets of the country, therefore be it resolved by the house of representatives, the senate concurring, that the congress of the United States be memorialized to pass such law or laws as will fix a standard size for boxes or carriers, for the shipment of citrus fruits, defining the dimensions of such boxes or carriers and requiring all shippers to have stamped on such boxes or carriers in a conspicuous place the number of pieces of fruit contained in the box or carriers.

Be it further resolved that the Florida delegation in congress be and are hereby requested to use their best endeavors to have congress of the United States pass such law as referred to in the foregoing resolu-



LIME-SULPHUR SPRAY. -----

The simplest form of lime-sulphur solution and probably the best for you to experiment with is the so called self bolled solution, says the Orange Judd Farmer. This is made of eight pointils of stone lime, eight pounds of powdered sulphur and lifty gallons of water. It is best made to large quantities bechuse a larger amount of heat is developed by the lime than if only a small amount is made at once.

Supposing you want to make 200 gallons of the mixture, put thirty-two pounds of stone time in a barrel or tub with five or six gallons of water. As soon as the lime begins to slake vigoronsly put in thirty-two pounds of powdered sulphur. Stir constantly and add more water as needed, so that it forms a thick paste and is thoroughly heated. When the boiling has stopped and before any red or orange streaks appear in the misture add several gallong of cold water to cool it Strait it, dilute the 200 gallons and the mixture is ready to put in the spray ma chine and apply. The other forms of lime-sulphur solution are somewin almiller that are made by boiling the mixture in a kettle.

USE OF FERTILIZERS.

A Great Shortage of Imported Grades, but an Ample Supply of Domestic. 



Cauliflower is the most delicate mem ber of the cabbage family. With it the flower is the part used for food. H does best in cool, moist climates.

The greatest success is likely to come if the heads start to form before or after the long hot summer days. It is raised in practically the same manner as cabbage.

Celery should be kept growing steadily all through the season. Any check in its growth-such as frosting. wilting at transplanting time or in sufficient supply of moisture-is likely to cause it to go to seed.

****** LIME-SULPHUR SPRAY.

The simplest form of time-sulphur solution and probably the best for you to experiment with is the so called self bolled solution, says the Orange Judd Farmer. This is made of eight pounds of stone lime, eight pounds of powder ed sulphur and tifty gallons of water. It is best made in large quantities because a larger amount of heat is developed by the lime than if only a small amount is made at once.

Supposing you want to make 200 gallons of the inlature, put thirty-two pounds of stone lime in a barrel or tub with five or six gallons of water. As soon as the lime begins to slake vigorously put in thirty-two pounds of powdered sulphur. Stir constantly and add more water as needed, so that it forms a thick paste and is thoroughly. heated. When the boiling has stopped and before any red or orange streaks appear in the mixture add several galtons of cold water to cool it Strali it, dilute the 200 gallons and the mixture is ready to put in the sprag ma chine and apply. The other forms of time-sulphur solution are somewhasimilar but are made by boiling the mixture in a Kettle.





Scientific Farming

CORN THAT BEATS FROST.

This Can Be-Grown In the Northwestern Wheat Regions.

After nearly twenty years of work by the Agricultural college of Wash Ington and co-operating farmers two varieties of corn adapted to the rigorous climate of the Pacific northwest - hake: are making strong blds for a permanent place in the farming of those states whose climate is characterized by occasional late spring frosts, cool nights, even in midsummer, and fairly early fall frosts, writes J. L. Ashlock in the Country Gentleman. The problem of western and northern corn growers, whose exclusive interest till lately has been the wheat, has been to find or develop a type of corn that will stand the late spring frost and the cool midsummer nights and ripen up ahead of the fall frosts.

The two new varieties of corn are distinct types, known in the work of the Agricultural college as Thayer Yellow Dent and Windus White Dent. Oddly enough, authentic facts relative twenty years ago C. H. Thayer, now who is still living, were growing one

them in Whitman county, Wash Win dus grew the white and Thayer the yehow Each man had obtained his seed from a neighbor. The neighbors, how dead, apparently had obtained the жeed "somewhere in the east" and had done à good deal of field selecting. which in turn was taken up by the Agricultural college.

As years passed by Thayer and Windus grew their corn with increasing success. In the early nineties the agricultural college was founded in the state of Washington, and when at tempts were made a few years later to introduce corn Windus and Thayer. who lived near the new institution, enthusinstically donated seed for trial. the other.

In succeeding years many varieties of corn were tried out and climinated by late frosts or the cool nights of midsummer Several kinds escaped the frosts and coolness of summer. only to be alpped in the fall even before they could be siloed. The white and yellow dents, however, promptly gave evidence of their worth. Still, it was several years before the agricultural college felt safe in recommending the corn to the farmers. In 1907 it seemed advisable to offer limited quantities of the seed for trial. By this time one was called Thayer Yellow Dent and the other Windus White Dent.

But men who were successfully engaged in the production of wheat and knew corn only as seen in the great corn states of the middle west and east looked askance. Only by the utmost coaxing could the agricultural college induce thirty farmers to try small patches of it. The results were so good that in the next year, 1908, it was possible to distribute 275 samples of seed among farmers who promised to give it a fair trial. In 1009 700 samples of the corn were distributed. Each year since then has marked au additional step in overthrowing the wheat farmer's prejudice against corn. till the present year fluds corn quite well established in northwestern wheat regions. In January, February and March of the present year the agricultural college distributed more than 5,000 pounds of Windus and Thayer Dent, representing only a fractional part of what will be planted.

On the state farm at Pullman, Whitman county, Wash., the Thayer Yellow Dent grows from five to seven feet high, ears well and produces four to seven tons of slinge an acre. Yields running all the way from thirty to sixty bushels have been obtained, which is pretty good for a region far too rigorous for corn as found in its natural habitat. Planted from the 10th to the 15th of May, the yellow corn usually is ready to cut by the middle of September. Under like conditions the Windus White Dent grows about a foot taller than the Thayer Yellow, with correspondingly heavier stalks and follage. It sars well and by October or a little enrier'yields six to sight tone of
