The amount of food in the warehouses is comparatively small and the cargoes on the docks are tied up because of financial conditions. The consignees are said to be financially unable to pay cash to release the shipments, while the consignors refuse to extend credit.

plained, a second appraisal would be made.

When the application is finally passed upon and found to be sound the person filing the application would then be asked to have his attorney send in abstracts covering the property in question. Checks covering the amount of the loan would then be forwarded through the local farm board, Mr. Chapman stated.

In his interview Mr. Chapman said that his organization has 113 applications evolving over \$500,000 which have already been forwarded to the bank in Columbia. Ordinarily, he said, it takes approximately 30 days for a loan to be made and that the average farmer could receive approximately \$300 per acre in the form of a loan with 13 or 15 years in which to pay the amount back to the government. The government, however, must be given the first mortgage on the property.

It was brought out this morning that the Farm Credit Association does not deal with crop production loans but only on farm loans and must in all cases be given a first mortgage. In the event the property already has a first mortgage the property owner can apply for a loan from the government sufficient to pay off the amount of the first mortgage which would then be clear before turning it over as collateral.

Government Loans To Russia To Buy U.S. Goods Looming

NEW YORK, Sept. 23—(AP)—Direct government credits on vast soviet purchases loom strong today with the disclosure that Henry Morgenthau, Jr., governor of the farm credit administration and Peter A. Bogdanov, chairman of the Amtorg Trading Corporation, have held several conversations in recent days.

Their meetings—in which the whole field of trade and credit has been explored—were regarded as the most important development in Soviet American relations inasmuch as Morgenthau, a trusted aide of the president for several years, was designated to direct personally Russian trade negotiations.

The naming of Morgenthau, and announcement of which followed the disclosure in New York that the administration expects to recognize Russia before Congress convenes, was interpreted here to mean the president is giving close consideration to the Soviet situation.

The Morgenthau-Bogdanov discussions have contemplated immediate extensive purchases of cotton, livestock and heavy industrial equipment.

While cotton sales to the Soviet Union may amount to around a million bales during the coming year, it was thought likely in well-informed quarters that sales at the outset—in the event of satisfactory credit arrangements—would not exceed half a million bales at the most.

Dairy cattle and cotton are needed badly in the Soviet states.
