#### People warned not to use 809 area code

The Seminole County Sheriff's Office issued a notice last week warning residents about using an 809 area code.

According to the Better Business Bureau and AT & T, this scam, also known as a "pay-per-call abuse," has been circulating for some time. This area code originates in the Caribbean and the unwary can run up very large bills in a very short amount

This type of scam is not unique to the 809 area code and has involved other area codes in the past.

If you are not sure where a long-distance phone number is, call 00 and ask the operator for assistance. You may also look a number up online

It is recommended that if you receive an unsolicited or unexpected call from an unfamiliar source, disregard it. If you have further questions or concerns, contact your local or long distance telephone service provider.

#### Feds claim Dixon harassed employee

SANFORD — A federal investigation has determined that there is "reasonable cause to believe" that Interim City Manager Roger Dixon sexually harassed an employee at City Hall.

The city's human resource director, Joe Denaro, was informed of the determination in a May 8 letter from, Federico Costales, district director of the U.S. Equal **Employment Opportunity Commission** 

The investigation centered on claims made by Paula Freytes-Torres, a contracts

coordinator with the city. On Feb. 26, 2002, but had a co-worker, Stacy Tebo, retrieve the Freytes-Torres complained to former City document when she learned it was a public manager Tony VanDerworp that Dixon, who was then deputy city manager, began calling her daily in April 2000 and made vulgar and suggestive comments about her and other employees.

City documents indicate that Freytes-Torres wanted to pursue the matter in an informal manner. At one point, however, she provided the city with a written complaint,

About one week prior to Freytes-Torres complaint, Dixon was given direct supervisory authority over the Community Development department where Freytes-Torres worked. The change was made to accommodate the departure of the depart-ment's director, Charles Rowe, who left to take a private sector job.

In reaction to Freytes-Torres allegations, VanDerworp shifted Dixon out of a supervisory role in the Community Development department VanDerworp also reorganized the department and placed it under the umbrella of the director of engineering and

Denaro and VanDerworp met with Preytes-Torres on March 12, 2002, and informed her of the changes being made. City documents indicated Freytes-Torres was advised she could pursue the city's formal complaint procedure if she believed the matter was still not resolved.

tary personnel.



#### Community gathers to honor Naval Air Station

riday was a day of memories for the men and women of the Vigilante community.

As a U.S. Navy formation of F-18s flew over Naval Air Station Sanford Memorial Park, many of the former pilots attending the park's dedication remembered their days behind the controls of a RA-5C Vigilante. For those who never flew the airplane, Friday's ceremony gave them a glimpse into the past when it wasn't uncommon to see Navy jets flying in the skies

above Sanford. More than a thousand people were on-hand during the dedication of the Naval Air Station Sanford Memorial Park. Located at the entrance of what is now the Orlando Sanford International Airport,

the focal point of the park is a Vigilante that took more than two years to restore.

"There are two reasons why we are celebrating today," said U.S. Rep. John Mica during Friday's ceremony. "This is a symbol of the strength shown by this great nation and a symbol of the importance of our defense.

This also recognizes an effort between the community and the city, along with the federal government," he added.

More than three years ago, the Sanford Airport Memorial Committee was established in order to find a way to honor the relationship between the Sanford Naval Air Station and the area. In 2001, the committee acquired the Vigilante from the National Museum of Naval Aviation in Pensecola. With support from local government, as well as many private donors, the group raised more than \$265,000 to restore the aircraft and to build the memorial park.

Tuesday. Seven "A lot candidates' of the 89 candidates resumés we will be received are good at what considered durina a they're doing in special their city or county, Monday

Bettye Smith. "However, the city manager position is unique in that it requires experience in all areas of city government, including parks and recreation, engineering

and planning." Smith, along with the other nine members of the City Manager Selection Advisory Committee, was prepared to offer commissioners eight candidate names. However, Scott Schrader removed his name from the shortlist after accepting another job offer. Two other candidates are also on the shortlist for other jobs.

For this reason, Smith encouraged commissioners to make a decision quickly to ensure they don't lose any more candidates to other government entities.

City commissioners will hold a special meeting at noon Monday to review the list of seven candidates and determine whether they would like to make addi-

Although time is of the essence, commissioners expressed concern about moving too quickly.
"We do want to move things

along, but still be very cautious," said Commissioner Kevin Hipes. "We have competent people at the helm. We don't want to rush into anything, because in the long haul we will be glad we spent the time."

During the Commission will select candidates to interview for the city manager position and determine the interview process. They will also establish dates, times and locations for the interviews, and

#### Signs point motorists in the right direction

SANFORD — Businesspeople along State Road 46 in Sanford received a much-needed break from the Florida Department of Transportation last week.

Less than two weeks after the FDOT told local businesspeople to deal with profit losses caused by incorrect and missing directional and logo signs, many of the signs have been installed. Originally, FDOT said the group would have to wait for the signs until after con-

struction on Interstate-4 and the exit ramps ended sometime in the fall or early winter.

Fred Ferrell, district traffic operations engineer with DOT, was unavailable for comment last week regarding the sudden change in plans. However, businesspeople welcome the signs just the same.

"I think it shows really good intentions to improve the situation at our exchange," said Paul Temple, general manager of Comfort Inn & Suites on State Road 46 in Sanford. "The directional confusion as to where State Road 46 is has been climinated." In order to alleviate the confusion when traveling eastbound on 1-4, FDOT installed a brown Sanford Historic District sign about a mile before exit 101 to show drivers to take 101C for the district and Amtrak Auto Train. Once drivers reach the traffic light at State Road 46, another sign directs them to the right to reach the Sanford Historic District and to

the left to travel to Mount Dura. Although Temple, and other businesspeople along State Road See Signs, Page 7

Missing documents: If the city is interested in getting to the bottom Interim City Manager Roger Dixon's sexual harassment case, then they should take a hard look at whether there was an attempt to hide the documents from the public.

Loyal readers of Around The Clock will remember my lame attempt at poetry on March 10, 2002, (I'm no poet don't you know it) when I raised the issue of a sexual harassment case involving a top city official. The genesis for my poem came from the lack of information coming from Former City Manager Tony VanDerworp and Human Resources Director Joe Denaro. When no one wants to talk, reporters try to find a paper trail and request documents using a freedom of information (POI) request.

The Herald filed a POI request with Denaro at the beginning of March 2002. Denaro responded

there was a written complaint. In a letter to the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) dated Sept. 16, 2002, Denaro says soon after hear of the complaint on Feb. 26, 2002, he "asked the complainant for information in writing to assist (Denaro) in making the accused aware of the specific nature of the complaint ...."

So where's the record? It's no longer in the city's possession. Stary Tebo, a co-worker of the complainant, Paula Freytes-Torres, retrieved the document from Denaro. How do I know this? One, Denaro admits to this fact in the Sept. 16, 2002, letter to the EEOC and in a statement he provided the agency on March 14, 2003. Second, and admittedly this is less provable, I was in the human resource department checking on the status of The Herald's POI request when Tebo picked up a document from Denaro's office.

I had no way of knowing then, and still don't, what Tebo was picking up. Tebo may have had other business to conduct, but she works in the code enforcement department and as a matter of routine would not conduct daily business with human resources. When contacted Friday, Denaro would not provide the date Freytes-Torres submitted the written complaint or the date Tebo picked it up. Looking at the timeline the city provided EBOC, it appears the document was in the city's possession at the time The Herald made it's POI request.

Denaro appears to back up this claim in his Sept. 15, 2002, letter to EBOC. "In point of fact," he should not have been released back to (Freytes-Torres) as the document may have been under state law, a public record."

Is this a conspiracy to protect Dixon? I don't think so. I believe Denaro was attempting to follow the city's procedure regarding the very sensitive subject of sexual harassment. In doing so, however, he may have broken the law by failing to disclose public documents.


In fact, the general consensus among city commissioners and officials in City Hall is VanDerworp and Denaro, in an effort to not make waves, mishandled the entire investigation, leading Preytes-Torres seek resolution through the Florida Commission on Human Relations and eventually the EEOC.

Return to sender. Memo to the city of Sanford's law firm, Stenstrom McIntosh: Whitey Eckstein is no longer a member of the city commission. Correspondence for the District 4 commissioner should be addressed to Kevin Hipes.



## Tis the season for hurricanes

Here we are, beginning the month of June this Sunday. June is one of the most named months of the year. It marks such events as Happy Women's Month, International Men's Month, Dairy Month, Turkey Lovers' Month,

But the one that should stand out to all of us is the beginning of the Atlantic (and Gulf) Hurricane Season. We'll be in it from now until Nov. 30.

Of course we would like to know what kind of year we are facing. Judging by which hurricane forecaster one prefers, it could be anything from a calm

year with hardly any trouble, to a pure disaster. Who is correct? No one will know for certain until Dec. 1.

There are several approaches to hurricane season:

No. 1 - Forget it until something looms off in the distance. Then, only give it minor consideration. Wait until the 100 mile per hour or so winds are heading directly toward you, possibly a hundred miles away - THEN do something. (This is the way many people react who don't own their own dwelling. They'll just get in the car and leave.)

No. 2 - These are those who will be overly concerned. They will immediately stock up on duct tape, plywood to cover their windows, flashlights and extra batteries, a house full of canned goods, and enough bottled water to fill a swimming pool. These are the over-reactors.

No. 3 - People who understand that hurricanes are dangerous, that there could be one heading our way. They will make plans to obtain needed items, discuss emergency procedures with members of their family, and keep watch of weather forecasts. Then, when one does threaten us, there will be no need for panic.

We can generally expect most of the severe hurricanes will come in September or October. That's the norm. However, they can come any time, from any direction.

I've been in hurricanes before. I don't want to be in more of them. If you are new to Central Florida, talk about the threat with some of the folks who have survived hurricanes Donna, Cleo, Dora, Michael, and others. Listen and learn. And above all, don't be complacent.

Want to do something really frightening? Call up hurricane information on your computer. Just in predictions along there are almost 300 sites. There are dozens and dozens of suggestions on how to protect yourself. There are hundreds of other sites to


call up if you are interested.

Do so if you wish, but basically, just remember, Hurricane Season is now here.

Give it some serious consideration - talk it up with your family - do what you can to begin preparation - but whatever you do - don't ignore it. The Seminole Herald doesn't want to write you up as a casualty.







#### Have Americans checked out on our wars?

When I turned on the computer on Thursday to write about the president's latest tax cut, I was stopped by the headline on AOL's mall page: "Do you think the rescue of Jessica Lynch was hyped to boost the war?"

Surprised to say the least, I forgot about getting rich and punched a key to get the totally Richard unscientific answers to AOL's question. By then, Reeves 40,366 people had voted. Twenty-nine percent of them said, "Yes, it was a Hollywood-style stunt." Fiftyfive percent said, "No, the troops did what they had to do." Two percent had no opinion. Fourteen percent checked the answer I would have picked, "We may never know."

My second choice would have been that the soldiers did what they had to do. I know that doctors at Nasiriyah General Hospital told The Associated Press that they gave the Americans the key to Private Lynch's room and said there were no Iraqi soldiers at the hospital. But if I were one of those Gls, I would have taken no chances.

That said, it seems pretty clear, at least to me, that the military tells the public what it wants us to know, the way it wants us to know it. Truth is the first casualty of war, particularly television wars ably fought by voluntary forces. There were, in fact, two other small stories in the papers the same day that made it seem as if the Pentagon certainly knows what it is doing in making and reporting news, even if citizens

and journalists are a bit bewildered.

The first one, a four-paragraph Reuters dispatch, said that the famous bunker we blasted from the sky to begin the war—the one that was supposed to have killed or wounded Saddam Hussein and one of his sons—never existed. The news agency was confirming a CBS News report that neither the Army nor the Central Intelligence Agency and find any evidence that

could find any evidence that there was a bunker under the house obliterated by the war's first missile.

So it goes — the fog of war. Who remembers that the Pentagon has been using that incident to promote the need for new nuclear weapons programs — the first in more than 20 years — to blast bunkers even deeper than this one was supposed to be? And who even remembers the hours of excited coverage from Washington and Baghdad that perhaps the war would be over before it began?

The second item released on Thursday seemed to answer that last question. The Center on Policy Attitudes and the Center for International Security Studies at the University of Maryland released a national poll showing that almost half the respondents across the country, 41 percent, believed (or were unsure whether) our troops have discovered the "weapons of mass destruction." Those are the same WMD, it was once said, that were the reason we had to attack Iraq before it

attacked us.

For the record, of course, we have not found any — at least yet. Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld has been trying to explain where the fields of missiles and the tons of poison gas and biological weapons have disappeared to, but perhaps he doesn't have to bother. The poll also indicated that almost one-third of respondents, 31 percent, believed (or were not sure whether) Iraq had used such weapons against us.

That could mean that if eternal vigilance is the price of liberty, we're in trouble. Or, it could mean that significant numbers of us are not paying any attention to the war, to the

Pentagon or to the media — at least not since we declared victory. You may have noticed that the cable channels interrupted the war to send their swarms to cover the murder of poor Laci Peterson.

If by chance you think I exaggerate, then ask people around the neighborhood or the office what is going on these days in Afghanistan. You remember Afghanistan, don't you? It was a famous victory. Or was it just famous reality television? Does anyone know?

#### Working poor can't expect any help from Washington

It is unfashionable to be poor in America. Even workers just a paycheck away from being poverty-stricken themselves — an illness, a layoff, a car accident away from having the electricity turned

accident away from having the electricity turned off — are contemptuous of those just beneath them on the socioeconomic ladder. The myth of Horatio

Afger success is so powerful that few concede they live at the lower levels of financial attainment. If they do, it's just a temporary condition—or so they believe. A Time-CNN poil conducted during the 2000 presidential election asked voters whether they were in the top 1 percent of income earners. Nineteen percent responded that they were, a statistical impossibility.

Perhaps that explains why it has been remarkably easy for the GOP to launch an all-out assault on the poor. With little opposition from advocacy groups and less interest from average Americans, the Bush administration and hard-right Republicans in Congress have squeezed or eliminated essential social programs that assist the poor — from the HOPE VI program, which has razed

slums and rebuilt them as mixed-income communities, to Medicaid, which provides money for health

Now Congress has excluded millions of families earning just above minimum wage from the increased child tax credit in the new \$350 billion tax-cut hill.

After denouncing critics of his tax cuts for engaging in "class warfare," President Bush passed a huge tax-cut bill that will, indeed, benefit

mostly the affluent. But the bill did hand a bone to those among the working and middle classes with families — an increased child tax credit that will send many families a check this summer for about \$400 per child. That tax break was among the few provisions in the gargantuan tax-cut bill that even resembled economic stimulus, since working families are more likely than the rich to spend the money right away on necessities.

But guess who won't be getting the new child tax credit? Millions of working families making between \$10,500 and \$26,625 a year. In the lastminute negotiations conducted between ultraconservative Republicans and their moderate counterparts, millions of families were cut out of the new child tax credit to make room for other giveaways. That includes 11.9 million children, or one of every six children under 17, according to The Center on Budget and Policy Priorities.

In other words, that child tax credit will not go to those who need it most. (Families earning less than \$10,500 a year were not eligible for the tax credits because they pay no federal income taxes.) It was a deeply credical management.

cynical maneuver.

Let's be clear: The families denied the child tax credit work for a living. Still, they barely earn enough to keep a roof over their heads and food on the table. It's difficult to pay the bills when you earn little more than \$5.15 an hour.

Yet, those workers do essential jobs: They feed, bath and change the elderly in nursing homes; they dig ditches for construction sites; they clean bathrooms in alriports and school buildings; they scrub floors in hotels; they cut poultry and pork on grueling assembly lines. They are hardly layabouts.

Once upon a time, their labor was considered honor-

able. Hardworking men and women who earned a living with their hands and their backs were celebrated as the heart and soul of the American economy. But that was before Ronald Reagan changed the terms of political debate, castigating the poor as lazy, un-American louts responsible for their own sorry lot. It was the most dramatic refashioning of political thought since FDR's New Deal delivered working Americans to the Democratic Party.

Senate negotiators claimed they couldn't extend the increase in child tax credits to minimum-wage families, which would have cost an additional \$3.5 billion, because they had to — just had to — keep the tax cut package to a mere and manageable \$350 billion. Of course, they could have balanced the books by rescinding the deficit-feeding tax cut on stock dividends, which stuffs the purses of the overstuffed.

But that was never seriously considered. Not in America — where, if the myth is to be believed, those poor families just need to dig a few more ditches to earn their own stock dividends.

The project would be a collaboration between the city, county

and the private developer, Suncor. "Very shortly the lakefront will be what it use to be and what it deserves to be," said Lessard. "If God was ever looking down on us, it is now. It's all coming togeth-

If approved, the project would include a multi-level hotel, renovations and additions to the existing Sanford Civic Center, retail space, an outdoor amphitheater and a 500-car parking garage.

"Not any single thing, but all these things working together will create a big wheel that will be

hard to stop," said Horian.
The motion by Commission, however, doesn't mean a conference center is in Sanford's future. That will be decided in the coming months. Commission, led by commissioners Carlton Henley and Dick Van Der Weide, said that more information was needed before a decision could be made.

Commissioner Grant Maloy agreed, saying more input should be gathered from the Seminole County Tourist Development (TDC) and the Central Florida Lodging and Hotel Industry.

"Quite honestly, we haven't seen all the details of the new proposal," said Frank Fry, chairman of the nine-member TDC. "If it requires less TDC funds, like they say it will, that will be a huge plus."

According to Fry, even with the funding issue out of the way because of the addition of the private developer, the city and county will be responsible for less than half of what was originally planned - the location of the venue is still a concern.

"It's away from the I-4 corridor," said Fry, general manager of Holiday Inn of Altamonte Springs. "It will support very few hotels. It's honestly not fair to ask hotels in southern Seminole County to contribute to funds [hotel tax revenues] that will be used in the northern part of the county.

According to Fry, the TDC will most likely meet with Horian dur-

ing its June 12th meeting.

Fry says he will not take a starid regarding the project until he's heard the developer's presentation. However, the council has voted against previous conference center proposals in February 2002 and as recently as

Another concern raised by Henley and Van Der Weide was the loss of an undisclosed amount of money used to explore a previ-

ous proposal. Last year, Commission approved a proposal stating that the county would build a conferusing up to \$700,000 a year in hotel tax revenues. The plan also called for the city to fund a new parking garage estimated at \$6 million and operate the conference center at a minimum cost of \$400,000 annually.

In preparation of this venture, the county retained an architect, general contractor and an owner's representative. However, Commission decided Tuesday to place those plans on hold while

the new proposal is analyzed. Further discussion regarding the conference center is scheduled during the County Commission's July 22nd meeting. According to County Manager J. Kevin Grace, that will be the first time the entire board will be in attendance.

On Friday, Hill Goodspeed of the National Museum of Naval Aviation announced his admiration for the restored Vigilante.

"This shows the tremendous results our Navy loan program has," Goodspeed said. "In my opinion, it is the most beautiful aircraft to have ever graced our skies, and it represents the final chapter of Sanford's affiliation with the Navy."

The Vigilante first took to the skies in the 1960s. Originally designed as a nuclear bomber, the aircraft was later used for photographic reconnaissance

During the Vietnam War, Sanford was home to the families of many POWs and MIAs from Vigilante squadrons. The family of Friday's guest speaker, Capt. Gerald L. Coffee, was one of

After training at the Sanford Naval Air Station, Coffee was the pilot of a RA-5C Vigilante reconnaissance aircraft assigned to Reconnaissance Squadron 13 onboard the USS Kitty Hawk. On Feb. 3, 1966, he was on an intelligence-gathering mission of North Vietnam when his aircraft was hit by enemy fire and destroyed. He ejected from the aircraft, and was eventually picked up by militiamen.

"For seven years and nine days, I was a prisoner of war," Coffee sald during Friday's ceremony. He was released in 1973 and returned home to Sanford to be reunited with his family. Sanford's naval air station, however, closed five years before his

"There couldn't have been a more embracing environment for my family than Sanford," Coffee said. "They consider Sanford more of a home town than any other place they have known."



utation as the world's best female soccerplayer, Akers captured the attention of a nation when she led the United States to its first-ever Women's World Cup Championship in 1991, earning the Golden Boot as the tournament's leading scorer. Five years later she led the U.S. team that won a Gold Medal at the 1996

In 15 years as a member of the U.S. National team she played in 153 matches and scored 105 goals. The Oviedo resident was a four-time All American at the University of Central Florida from 1984-88, leading UCF to three NCAA tournament appearances, including Final Four berth in 1987. She received the 1988 Hermann Award, collegiate soccer's ver-

sion of the Heisman Trophy. Corso, who now calls Lake Mary home, was an All-State performer in football, basketball and baseball at

Miami Jackson High in early '50s, and starred in football and baseball at FSU.

A versatile two-way player, Corso led the Seminoles in total offense, passing, punt returns and interceptions in 1957, his senior year. He served as an assistant coach at Florida State, Maryland and Navy prior to a head coaching career at Louisville (1969-72), Indiana (1973-82) and Northern Illinois (1984). He coached the Orlando Renegades of the United States Football League in 1985 and served as general manager of the World League's Orlando Thunder in 1991.

He joined ESPN in 1987 as a football game analyst, then moved to the studio in 1989. In recent years his seasoned Seee Hall, Page 12





#### Disadvantaged children can overcome early hardship despite environment

QUESTION: Tell me why some kids with every advantage and opportunity seem to turn out bad, while others raised in terrible homes become pillars in the community? I know one young man who grew up in squalid cir-cumstances; yet he is a fine person today. How did his parents manage to raise such a responsible son when they didn't even seem to care?

DR. DOBSON: That illustrates an important point. Neither heredity nor environment will account for all human behavior. There is something else there — something from within - that operates to make us who we are. Some behavior is caused and some plainly isn't.

Several years ago, I had dinner with two parents who had unofficially "adopted" a 13-year-old boy. This youngster followed their son home one afternoon and asked if he could spend the night. As it turned out, he stayed with them for almost a week without so much as a phone call from his mother. It was later learned that she works 16 hours a day and has no interest in her son. Her alcoholic husband divorced her several years prior and left town without a trace. The boy had been abused, unloved and ignored through much of his life.

Given this background, what kind of kid do you think he is today? A druggie? A foul-mouthed delinquent? A lazy, insolent burn? No. He is polite to adults; he is a hard worker; he makes good grades in school and enjoys helping around the house. This boy was like a lost puppy who desperately wanted a good home. He begged the family to officially adopt him so he could have a real father and a loving mother. His own

mom couldn't have cared less. How could this teenager be so well-disciplined and polished despite his lack of training? I don't know. It is simply within him. He reminds me of my wonderful friend David Hernandez. David and his parents came to America illegally from Mexico more than 50 years ago and nearly starved to death before they found work. They eventually survived by helping to harvest the potato crop through-out the state of California. During this era, David lived under trees or in the open fields. His father made a stove out of an oil drum half-filled with dirt. The open campfire was the centerpiece of their home.

David never had a mof over his head until his parents finally moved into an abandaned chicken coop. His mother covered the boarded walls with cheap wallpap and David thought they were living in luxury. Then one day, the city of San Jose condemned the area and David's "house" was torn down. He couldn't understand why the community would destroy so fine a place.

We'll talk more about David's story next week.

QUESTION: Our family lives an exhausting lifestyle we just can't seem to find a way to slow down! It gets depressing at times. Do you have any words of advice for

DR. DOBSON: Let me share something that may help you and your husband make the tough choices on which a slower lifestyle could depend. Do you remember Vince Foster, who committed suicide during the early days of the Clinton administration? He was deputy counsel to the president before that tragic night of his theath on July 20, 1993. Just eight weeks earlier, Foster had been asked to speak to students graduating from the University of Arkansas School of Law. This is what he told the students on that occasion:

A word about family. You have amply demonstrated that you are achievers willing to work hard, long hours and set aside your personal lives. But it reminds me of that observation that no one was ever heard to say on a deathbed, I wish I had spent more time at the office. Balance wisely your profes-sional life and your family life. If you are fortunate to have children, your parents will warn you that your children will grow up and be gone before you know it. I can testify that it is true. God only allows us so many opportunities with our children to read and say our prayers together. Try not to miss a one of them.

Vince Foster's words now echo back to us from eternity. While you're climbing the ladder of success, don't forget your own family. Those years with your children at home will be gone in a heartbeat. Do whatever is necessary to grab those precious moments. whether it requires changing jobs, getting a smaller house, or turning down lucrative and exciting opportunities. Nothing is worth losing your kids. Nothing!

#### Poisonous plants in your Central Florida garden

Many gardeners and homeowners are not familiar with some garden plants that

contain poisonous compounds. Most of them cause irritation of the skin but, some others are poisonous if ingested; this is especially true for children and pets. You should always

keep in mind that the concentration of toxic Ferrer compounds varies from one plant to another and that not everybody is susceptible in the same degree to the poisons.

Yellow Alamanda

The bark, leaves, seeds and juice have been used for their cathartic effect. In Florida. the fruit is considered to be dangerously poisonous, but no known polson has been extracted from the plant.

Castor-Bean

The seeds of this plant contain the poison ricin, that has been recently mentioned as a biological weapon and for which there is no known

antidote. Other toxic compounds such as ricinoleic acid and oleic acid are also

produced by this plant.

Rosary Pea The seed contains a toxic substance known as abrin, which is a toxalbumin. This substance is slowly absorbed from the gastrointestinal tract. One seed, if chewed, can cause death of an adult human being. Entire seeds may be swallowed without

Crape-Jasmine

any consequences.

The roots and bark of this plant contain an alkaloid that has been used in the treatment of cataracts and cardiac diseases.

Crown-of-Thorns

The milky sap of this plant is very irritating to the skin of many individuals, and will induce the formation of blisters. It consists of complex terpenes specially euphorbol. The plant has been used

sometimes as a purgative. Dieffenbachia

Swallowing chewed leaves may result in swelling of the throat and temporary loss of speech; hence, its name dumb cane". It is also believed to cause temporary sterility. The nature of the toxic compounds is unknown, but it is known to contain enough calcium oxalate to be irritant to mucous membranes.

Climbing Lily (Gloriosa)

The entire plant contains toxic substances, but the tuber contains the highest concentration of these compounds. Death has been reported to occur within 4 hours after eating tubers of this plant. A mixture of alkaloids mainly colchicine are responsible for the toxicity of this plant.

Carolina-jessamine

This plant contains the crystalline alkaloid, gelsem-ine, and other alkaloids such as gelseminine and gelsemoidine. These alkaloids depress and paralyze motor nerve

endings, their action on the brain and spinal cord can result in respiratory arrest.

Angel's Trumpet

This plant contains the toxic alkaloids, atropine, and scopolamine. All parts of the plant are poisonous, specially the seeds. Children can be poisoned if they eat the fruit, drink tea from leaves, or by sucking the flowers.

Pencil Cactus

This plant contains a vesicant that is quite irritating to the skin of susceptible individuals. It has been used as a fish poison in India.

Oleander

All parts of this plant are poisonous if ingested. Dry eaves are as toxic as the green ones. Children can be poisoned when sucking the flowers.

Poisoning has occurred when roasting meat on oleander stems over an open fire at picnics. Inhaling smoke from burning oleander plants has caused symptoms of poisoning.

All parts of this plant are considered toxic, specially the berries and the roots. Young leaves are frequently cooked (in two waters to eliminate toxins) but this practice should be avoided in view of new investigation on other chemicals produced by the plant.

St. John's-Wort

This plant contains hypericum, a toxic substance activated by light.

Humans ingesting the plant in herbal medicine preparations may show susceptibility to the toxic principle.

This column is dedicated to a man who did the same - Deputy Sheriff Gene "Stetson" Gregory, who was killed in the line of duty July 8, 1998, in the place he was sworn to protect, but which could not protect him. Geneva will never be the same because of Deputy Gregory...it will be better.

While other area cities are offering a taste of their cuisine, the town of Geneva quietly goes about the business of creating a flavor of its own.

The first Saturday of May found many Geneva residents at the annual May Day Picnic on the shores of Lake Harney. Hosted by the Geneva Historical & Genealogical Society, the event offered locals a look back at the past year as well as years gone by. Attendees shared a megapotluck lunch with fried chicken and lemonade (What more taste could one ask for?) while sharing stories about life here in the country.

After lunch, I had the opportunity to visit with Vic Jones, son of GH&GS charter member Amoret (Peters) Jones and nephew of the late Ruby (Peters) Bauer. Jones had

traveled from Nashville, gathering up his mother in Louisians, to attend the picnic and reunite with other friends and family members. All were enjoying the feel of being back in Geneva with its small town ways and peaceful pace. Rumors were even heard of a reunion between Amoret and an old high school beau!

Over the next few weeks I'll feature stories from the GH&GS Yearbook, which included some great memories from what used to be Osceola, Florida. For now, I'll welcome the sixteen new families to join the Historical Society this year. The membenship of the GH&GS now



To arrange salad, spoon onions onto plate, spreading into 10- to 12inch round. Make overlapping circles of glazed sliced potatoes over ordina. Spoon remaining dilled mayonnaise into center. If desired, garnish with fresh herbs or a few anugula leaves.



and a cup and ball game. The ninepins, the marbles and the jacks were the big hit for the indoor games. Many of the children had seen jacks before, but not ones made out of metal, the way they were originally. Girl Scout volunteer Debbie Swearingen worked with the children with the indoor

Outside toys included jump rope, "Graces" and propeller. The children especially enjoyed the rhymes that went with playing jump rope. The French game called

"Graces", wasn't as big a hit. It was a little too old for that age group. The children loved the propeller, which is a simple wooden toy you twirl and watch fly into the sky. Lake Mary Historical Society member Lois Jackson was in charge of the outdoor games.

For musical instruments, the children got to try a violin ukelele (a very different looking instrument that was only made for about 10 years), a dulcimer, a penny whistle, an ocarina, a train whistle and a kazoo. A couple of the children had played a kazoo before, but they thought it was "neat" the way this one sounded.

It was made of metal, the way kazoos used to be, not plastic, the way they are now.

For clothes, there were hats, gloves, vests, long skirts and Native American outfits. The latter seemed the most popular with the boys and the purple gloves seemed the most popular with the girls. Historical Society President Peggy

Wolfe assisted with the clothing and took a picture of every child in their outfit.

This was a trial run for the Historical Society's Elementary Education program. With the coming school year, the society will be inviting Kindergarten and 1st grade classes from all over Seminole County.

Up next for the Historical Society is a stamping and scrapbook workshop on Thursday, June 12 from 6 to 9 p.m. at the Lake Mary Historical Museum. The museum is located on Country Club, behind Lake Mary City Hall.
