

Young Sinatra His Own Sleuth

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The cool role of detective played by Frank Sinatra Jr. while he was held by his kidnapers was credited today for the speedy capture of his abductors.

Although the FBI continued to remain silent concerning the clues that led to the arrests of three persons last Friday and Saturday, Frank Jr.'s role was learned by United Press International for the first time Monday.

Blindfolded and nervous, the 19-year-old youth nevertheless was able to provide many clues to the FBI, including distances counted by footsteps, sounds heard at the hideout and — in a moment when his eyes were uncovered — the name of a hamburger stand on a wrapper.

The discovery of the hideaway where Sinatra Jr. was held in nearby Canoga Park from the time he was abducted a week ago Sunday night to his release on payment of \$240,000 ransom early last Wednesday has been credited as the major break in cracking the case.

And young Frank Jr. was apparently able to provide the clues that led to its discovery.

Saturn S-1 Rocket Goes To NASA

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — The first industry-built Saturn S-1 rocket booster, earth-bound now but soon to be thundering into the dark depths of space, goes to the federal space agency today.

The Chrysler-made booster, built at a plant that used to make engines for tanks, will be used in Project Apollo, America's project to put a man on the moon.

Rocket expert Dr. Werner Von Braun, director of the Huntsville, Ala., Marshall Space Agency, was named to accept the booster for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) from Chrysler President Lynn A. Townsend in the ceremony.

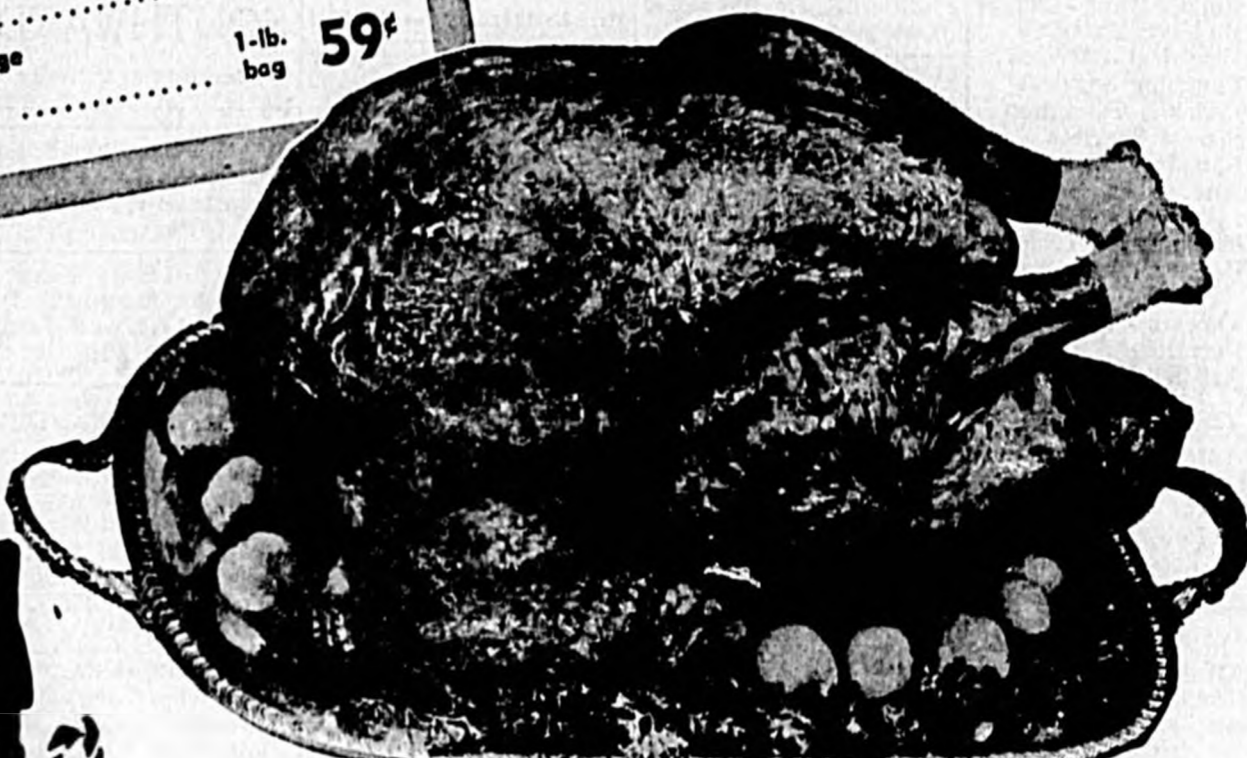

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Tried To Sway Lowdermilk Juror, Charge

William Ralph Strawder, 55, of 1206 Park Avenue, reputed to be one of five lottery bankers in Central Florida numbers racket, must appear before Circuit Judge Volle A. Williams at 2:30 p. m. Friday to show cause why he should not be held in contempt of court for attempting to tamper with a juror.

The citation, requested by State Attorney A. L. Steed and signed by Judge Williams, charges that Strawder sought to influence the verdict in last week's trial of C. R. Lowdermilk, who subsequently was convicted on five counts of bribing 11-Area Concentrate, Fort City, of \$200,000 in misrepresenting solids content of citrus.

A sworn statement by Percy Mero, New Smyrna Beach, reports that Strawder approached him with the view of having him influence his son, Thomas Mero, R. R. 1, who was foreman of the jury in the Lowdermilk trial. The elder Mero's statement reads that he did not speak to his son of the request.

Strawder is reputed to be one of five lieutenants under Harlan Blackburn, Lake Howell, said by federal agents to be the numbers racket king in Central Florida. Strawder and Blackburn, along with others, were arrested last October by FBI agents on gambling charges.

Blackburn and Lowdermilk were linked during the Strawder trial here last week. The U. S. Marshall's office at Orlando today reported that Strawder presently is free under two \$5,000 bonds, one out of Orlando and one out of Miami on similar charges of transporting gambling paraphernalia interstate.

2nd Disbarred In Hoffa Case

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — A second attorney was barred from federal court Wednesday in connection with the jury tampering case of Teamsters President James R. Hoffa.

U. S. District Court Judge William E. Miller and Frank Gray Jr. ordered the disbarment of Harry Beard Jr., a Lebanon, Tenn., attorney, mentioned in a Dec. 6 indictment returned against Z. T. Osborn Jr.

Beard was the alleged middle man in a reported bribe attempt made by Osborn, a Hoffa attorney, in connection with the union leader's 1962 conspiracy trial here.

The order said that Beard had "voluntarily" appeared for a hearing Dec. 13 before Miller and Gray.

Beard, according to the order, said he did not turn down Osborn's proposition, or report it to the court, because of "flattery," at being approached by someone of Osborn's professional stature, and "fear for my personal safety."

Johnson Signs \$527 Million Job Training Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson today approved a bill establishing new programs to train unskilled youths and unskilled adults as part of the fight against unemployment.

The President signed legislation amending the 1962 Manpower Training Act of 1962 to pour \$527 million in new federal spending into new job training courses.

Johnson also called an afternoon meeting with two advisers whom the late President Kennedy had appointed to study the financing of a program to develop a super-sonic jet transport plane.

Scheduled to meet with Johnson were Eugene R. Black, former president of the World Bank, and Stanley Osborne, chairman of the board of Olin Mathieson Chemical Co.

Black and Osborne were named to study the plan call-

ing for the government to put up 75 per cent and private industry 25 per cent of the estimated \$1 billion needed to develop a prototype plane. The industry feels its 25 per cent share is too high and Black and Osborne were reported to be working on a compromise.

The manpower legislation will set up new job training courses for jobless youths aged 17 through 19 and provide basic education for older workers whose inability to read and write makes retraining for jobs impossible.

It also would give states an extra year to start paying part of the cost of retraining courses and extend the entire program, originally three years, through June 30, 1966.

The 1962 act, first attempt by Congress to deal with growing joblessness due to

automation and other basic economic changes, set a target of 600,000 trainees in three years.

Officials believe the expanded, extended program will be able to handle 700,000 persons, about a quarter of them in the 17-22 age class.

Mrs. Kennedy, Children In Palm Beach

PALM BEACH (UPI)—The widow of President John F. Kennedy and her two young children arrived at the scene of some of the family's happiest times Wednesday night for a "quiet and sad" Christmas.

Black-clad Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, Caroline, six, and John Jr., three, flew to this winter resort from Washington on an Air Force jet. They were accompanied by Princess Lee Radziwill, Mrs. Kennedy's sister, and several Secret Servicemen.

The family stepped from the plane into a waiting car and went directly from the West Palm Beach airport to the walled-in, seaside mansion of C. Michael Paul, leased last year by the Kennedys. The arrival was in sharp contrast to last year's gathering of the Kennedys here for the Christmas holidays. On that occasion, Mrs. Kennedy and the children met the President on his return from a conference in Nassau with Harold Macmillan who at that time was British foreign minister.

Hundreds of spectators had watched as Kennedy greeted his wife, scooped Caroline and John Jr. into his arms and walked happily to a big, white convertible which Caroline, to the delight of the crowd, helped her father steer out of the airport.

The return of the slain President's family was their first since a reunion of the Kennedy clan here last Easter.

"Christmas will be a quiet and sad day for the rest of us, but for the children's sake, Santa Claus will come," said a family spokesman.

Miss Ann Gargan, niece of former ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy, the late President's father, said the children would open their presents at the Paul home Christmas morning and then go to their grandfather's house for a private Mass and dinner.

The elder Kennedy's ocean-side villa is about a mile south of the Paul mansion where the late President and his family relaxed in the sun in periodic escapes from Washington winters.

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Do It Now, Think Later

Rep. Richard Bolling, Missouri Democrat, is known as a solid student of Congress and its problems. But he acknowledged recently in an interview that he seldom ever has enough time to think long and hard about this matter that interests him so much.

In fact, says Bolling, the only occasion on which he found time to "think consecutively" about Congress or anything else was a brief period he spent in what amounted to academic seclusion.

His comment really is somewhat stunning. Congress these days is under heavy fire for its inadequacies, though it is a little difficult to separate its historic shortcomings from its more recent ones. Not too many legislators evidently give much thought to the matter. Bolling is one who wants to, but can't carve out the time.

This complaint is not a new one. Many a public figure in this country and around the globe speaks ruefully about the lack of time to think, to apply themselves creatively to the problems before them.

The pace of life today, and the great variety of pressures which play upon us all, make this an "activist" age. Everybody is running around talking to people, doing things, going places.

In the middle and upper echelons of government and business, much of this activity is done in the name of solving great problems. But the experience of at least the last two or three decades suggests we may be just nibbling at them. And the more we dash about the smaller the nibbles seem to be.

Thirty or 40 years ago special scientists were meaning that scientific invention was far outrunning "social invention," by which they meant the devices and institutions created by men to cope with the things they invented—like the automobile.

In the decades since, the scientific revolution has speeded up fantastically. Some inventions are virtually outmoded before modern society has a real chance to react to them in any organized fashion. The DC-7 aircraft, for instance, had a brief five years of life as the nation's principal commercial passenger carrier—and then came the jets in profusion.

Obviously there never was a time in history when society and its institutions in all major fields of endeavor needed to develop faster reactions to the products of the laboratory and drawing board. Changes are pouring forth with dizzying speed.

Yet this very fact contributes not only to an "activist" mood here and elsewhere in the world. It produces a sense of social disorder, of entrapment in swift-moving events, which further discourages the kind of "consecutive thinking" Bolling wisely sees as vitally necessary to a real assault on great problems.

Maybe the professor's fabled "sabbatical year" ought to be a compulsory thing for every executive, every junior and senior leader in every walk of life where solid, continuing thought on the imaginative, creative, original level is called for.

Political Notebook

WASHINGTON (NEA) — The way all the pressure groups are climbing aboard the Lyndon B. Johnson rath is a sign for conflicting reasons — is the political phenomenon of the age.

At first there were some predictions that President Johnson would have heavy opposition from the liberals who in 1960 didn't even want the all Texas for vice president. Just two months ago this sentiment was so strong that there was much speculation L.B.J. might be dropped as the presidential candidate in the 1964 Democratic ticket. It took a deal from President Kennedy to stop the rumors.

After Johnson became president, almost his first endorsement came from American Federation of Labor-Congress of Industrial Organizations, Americans for Democratic Action and the Democratic Leadership Con-

ferences on Civil Rights. That ended the liberal revolt against Johnson.

Since that time many special interest groups of all varieties have issued voluntary statements supporting Johnson. Some of these testimonials even come from opposing camps.

For instance, the Citizens Foreign Aid Committee — which is against it — says that since Johnson has pledged strict economy, he will "seize the golden opportunity" to curtail government foreign spending.

Supporters of AID, the government's Agency for International Development, however, cite a speech Johnson made just before he became president, in which he said, "The foreign aid program has been a success . . . We must turn away from those who counsel that the works of peace represent failure."

U. S. Chamber of Commerce President Edwin P. Mehan wrote Johnson that the Chamber was heartened by the President's emphasis on the need for a tax cut "to stimulate job creating investments."

But now comes James E. Carey of the AFL-CIO Industrial Union with a statement that, "the recently reported 5.9 per cent unemployment rate emphasizes the need for immediate passage of consumer-oriented tax legislation."

If the new President can satisfy both management and labor on a tax bill, he will indeed have to live up to his billing as the greatest compromiser and fixer of all times.

The curious thing about Johnson's support for fast action of civil rights reform is that it has not yet met serious opposition from the South.

"There," as one political leader puts it, "they recognize that Johnson is a wheeler and a dealer." They'll let him make civil rights speeches to the northerners to win votes. But southerners expect Johnson to soften the blow as it will affect them.

This penchant for wanting to make the new President "our boy" characterizes many endorsements the lobbies now put out.

Thus the American Public Power Assn., and the Co-operative League of the U.S.A., supporting rural electrification and public power, claim Johnson as theirs.

So do the National Education Assn., supporting federal aid for schools and teachers' salaries, the National Council of Senior Citizens supporting medical care for the aged under Social Security, the National Farmers Union, Committee for a National Trade Policy, AFL-CIO Committee on Political Education, National Association of Home Builders supporting private housing industry and others. But there are a few exceptions.

National Right - to - Work Committee has told its members that Johnson is clearly committed to repeal of section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act. This recognizes the right of the states to enact and enforce local right-to-work laws, which the committee wants retained.

And Rep. Jerry Ford, (R-Mich.) while endorsing Johnson's promises to defend freedom from communism from Berlin to Viet Nam, declares:

"On the other hand, it should be noted that the new President endorsed all of the federal spending policies . . . I reserve the right to oppose where conscience dictates."

These are but first straws in the winter winds to indicate that the honeymoon isn't going to last forever.

CASE R-422: Dr. Warren Walker is known to millions of you readers.

For he is the talented clergyman who appears on TV as the Cadiz Tabernacle pastor.

Recently he and his charming wife, Helen, attended the Board Meeting of our Scientific Marriage Foundation.

And Dr. Walker regaled us with some of his rollicking humor.

Having come from Atlanta, he can tell dialectal stories that really wow his listeners.

For example, Dr. Walker described a problem during World War II. A colored regiment was not taking advantage of the government's \$10,000 insurance policy.

You may document the truth of this remark when you remember Mark Antony's famous funeral address over the bier of Julius Caesar.

Cassius and Brutus were then being acclaimed as heroes and great patriots for having slain Caesar.

But within 20 minutes, Mark Antony changed that crowd into a lynching mob, so the audience started hunting for Brutus and Cassius to string them up to telephone poles (anachronism).

Skill in the deft use of proper words is now the acme of success in the booming field of Applied Psychology.

To motivate people properly nowadays, you must manipulate words skillfully, both spoken and written.

"Proper words in proper places," was Dean Jonathan Swift's definition of literary style in the early 1700's.

But that is equally good advice for "H.R." or Human Relations strategy, too.

That did it. From then until dawn's early light, I lay there drawing mental pictures of taxidermists starving in the streets because the fickle public had turned against stuffed owls.

Later that day, still haunted by those nocturnal musings, I began telephoning local taxidermists to inquire if everything were all right. As usual, my fears were groundless.

"Of course we're all right, silly," one of them told me. "The taxidermy business has never been better. But it was sweet of you to call."

"It's true that people no longer have stuffed owls in

their parlors," another said, "but you should see the things they put in their recreation rooms."

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Collins Race For Senate A Possibility

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Political observers are convinced there is a definite possibility former Gov. LeRoy Collins will return to Florida next year to run for the U. S. Senate.

No one can say for sure that he will. Collins himself does not know right now and will not comment publicly on future plans.

There are several factors that will figure into the final decision, which presumably must be made by late January when the board of directors of the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB), of which Collins is president, meets in Sarasota.

He and Sen. Spessard L. Holland, who is expected to seek re-election, are friends, although Collins has long disagreed with the conservative political philosophy of the 71-year-old senior senator from Florida.

The former governor has found his work as NAB president challenging. There presumably are financial considerations too. The NAB job pays \$75,000 a year while senators make \$22,500.

Balanced against all this is a life-long love of public service and a deep concern that Florida and the South "get back into the mainstream of American life and citizenship" by sending to Congress men who can speak for the "New South."

He had definitely decided a few months ago to pass up the 1964 campaign, despite frequent urgings of friends. That was before President Kennedy was killed in Dallas. The assassination set Collins to thinking about the atmosphere which could breed such violence.

He laid part of the blame on environments which encourage people to hate and on southerners, including himself, who have sat quietly back and allowed it to happen.

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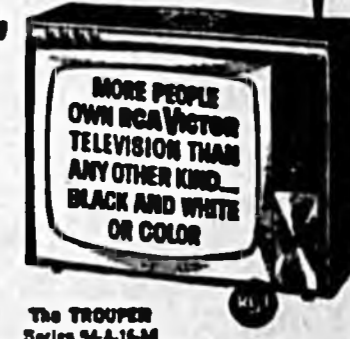

**Eye-catching Wall Plaques
Made With Pine Cones**

According to Mrs. William Rogers, a member of Woodrose Circle, Sanford Garden Club, there is now a use for squirrel-eaten pine cones. By adding them to a few other unlikely items such as ear tree pods, fungus, and a few sunflower seeds, it is perfectly possible to construct a unique and lovely wall plaque for your home.
In addition to such well-known materials for dried arrangements as sea oats, leaves, acorn cups, seed pods, and twigs, a plaque arrangement may include pine cones of all sizes, including those half stripped or fully stripped by squirrels.
Materials may be sprayed before an arrangement is made or may be left natural in color. Some of the filler materials may easily be tinted with food coloring. However, all of the materials must be thoroughly dry and this may be accomplished either by storing them for a time or by heating them in a slow oven. Such materials as ear tree pods should also be polished with a cloth unless they are to be painted.
A true decorator's touch may be achieved by using either paint or fabric on the background of the plaque in the room. After tacking or stapling a cord on the back for hanging, the design is worked out on the front and carefully glued in place where the dried materials lie flat on the surface. Small pieces of cotton may be glued underneath materials if they do not have enough flat surface to be glued directly to the plywood.
An eye-catching design may be achieved, Mrs. Rogers states, with a mat of textured beige fabric. The flower design on the center piece of stained brown wood a half of pine cone, sprayed gold, and used as the bloom of the flower, a pine twig for the stem, two seed pods arranged for leaves and a small piece of splintered wood for the base.

Homemakers Corner

Here are a few more recipes that have been tried by our County Home Demonstration ladies. First one is the

RIBBON SALAD
2 (8 oz.) pkg. lime flavored gelatin
2 cups hot water
1 (8 oz.) pkg. lemon flavored gelatin
1/4 cup miniature marshmallows, cut up
1 cup pineapple juice
1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese
1 (1 lb. 4 oz.) can crushed pineapple
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
1 cup mayonnaise
2 (3 oz.) pkg. cherry flavor gelatin
Dissolve lime gelatin in 2 cups hot water. Add 2 cups cold water. Pour into 14 by 10 by 2" pan. Chill until partly set. Dissolve lemon gelatin in 1 cup hot water in top of double boiler. Add marshmallows and stir to melt. Remove from heat. Add drained pineapple juice and cream cheese. Beat until well blended and stir in pineapple. Cool slightly. Fold in whipped cream and mayonnaise. Chill until thickened. Pour in layer over lime gelatin. Chill until almost set. Dissolve cherry gelatin in 2 cups hot water. Add 2 cups cold water. Chill until syrupy. Pour over pineapple layer. Chill until firm. Serves 24.

CRANBERRY-ORANGE CONGEALED SALAD
1 pkg. orange-flavored gelatin
1 1/2 cups boiling water
1 cup jellied cranberry sauce
1 cup diced celery
2 tbsps. minced onion
3 tbsps. white vinegar
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Chill until slightly thickened. Add cranberry sauce, cut in 1/4-inch cubes; celery, onion and vinegar. Mix gently. Chill until firm. Yield: 6 servings.

VARIATIONS: You may omit the celery, onion and vinegar. Chill until almost set and beat with rotary egg beater until frothy. Pour into mold and chill until firm. Serve with dressing of 1 cup mashed banana thinned with 2 tbsps. cream.

FRUIT SALAD
2 eggs
2 tbsps. sugar
1/4 cup light cream or evaporated milk
juice of 1 lemon
1 cup heavy cream, whipped
2 cups cherries, pitted
2 cups diced pineapple
2 cups cut orange sections
2 cups quartered marshmallows
1 cup chopped nuts
Beat eggs until light. Gradually add sugar, light cream or evaporated milk and lemon juice. Mix, cook in double

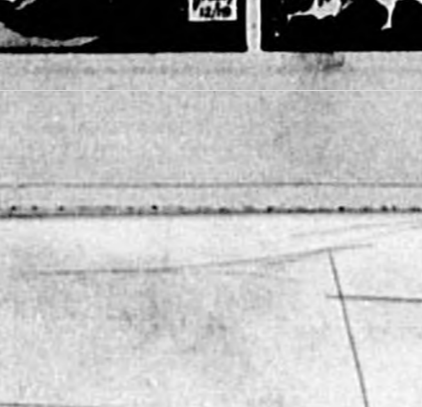
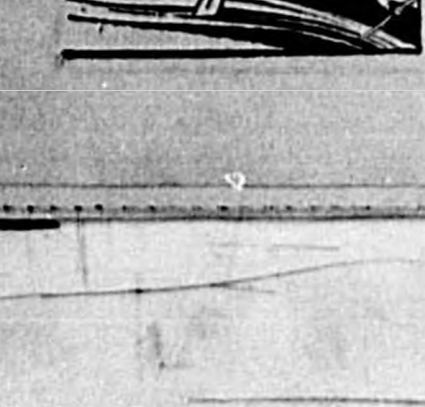

22 Go On Trial For War Crimes

FRANKFURT, Germany (UPI)—Twenty-two men accused of complicity in the murders of millions of inmates of the Auschwitz extermination camp went on trial today in the biggest war crimes case since the end of the occupation.

They include 21 former members of the Nazi Gestapo and one former camp inmate who allegedly joined them in the gassing, shooting, torture, and mistreatment of the prisoners in history's worst death factory.

About 40 armed policemen guarded the courtroom when the prisoners were brought in. One man, a former Nazi doctor accused of selecting victims for the Auschwitz gas chambers, fell ill and was excused from the opening session.

The other defendants uttered low, almost shy replies of "here" when the judge called their names.

Oswald Kaduk, accused of breaking inmates' necks with a pick, clicked his heels when called by the judges.

But his fellow defendants behaved otherwise.

Reds Open Wall To East Berlin

BERLIN (UPI)—Communist border guards passed West Berliners swiftly and politely into East Berlin today in the first mass visitation permitted on the other side of the wall since August, 1961.

But thousands of other West Berliners were jammed up applying for the Christmas holiday passes being issued by Communist officials in the Western sectors.

Never since the wall went up 28 months ago had traffic moved across the border so fast. Communist police dropped their usual controls and cleared the visitors in about a minute. This is from 29 minutes to an hour faster than normal.

Casselberry Mulls Zoning Ordinance

Discussion on the possible inclusion of additional zoning classifications in the proposed comprehensive zoning ordinance for the town of Casselberry took up most of a three-hour meeting Thursday night of the Board of Aldermen and Zoning Commission.

Congress Quits Work Today

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress was set to adjourn today with or without a foreign aid money bill. There was a growing possibility that it would be without one.

Democratic leaders expected to wind up the first session of the 88th Congress, even if no Senate and House agreement was reached on the aid measure. The lawmakers will return Jan. 7 for the second session to tackle such major issues as civil rights and a tax cut.

As the Senate House pushed toward adjournment, the main problem was a House-voted ban in the aid bill to forbid the Export-Import Bank from underwriting for U. S. wheat sales to Communist countries.

Fern Park Bank Yegg Sentenced

William E. Smith, of Georgia, confessed to armed robbery, was given an 8½-year prison sentence by Federal Judge George C. Young at Orlando this morning.

Smith held up and robbed Teller Doyle Olham, of North Branch (Fern Park), Winter Park Federal Savings and Loan Association, last Sept. 6 and escaped with approximately \$800.

He was arrested late the same day while walking in Winter Park when FBI noted his description tallied that of the robber.

Smith pleaded not guilty but about two weeks ago, after a half-day of trial, he changed his plea to guilty.

Consideration of individual and collective protests filed at the Nov. 4 public hearing was tabled until a later meeting for which the date will be announced.

No Damage To Citrus, Truck Crops Seen

A cold wave plumed north Florida temperatures into the low 20s early today, but weathermen said citrus escaped unscathed and predicted a slight warming trend over the weekend.

Truck crops in the Everglades and the South-Central part of the state also fared well as the freezing temperatures failed to dip into South Florida.

The official temperature at Sanford this morning was 39 degrees.

Little Cross City in Dixie county reported a state low of 21 degrees and the mercury dropped to 22 at Tallahassee. Jacksonville had a low to 27 and Ocala 22 with both cities reporting frost.

But temperatures in the citrus belt for the most part stayed in the mid 30s—not low enough to threaten the fruit. The mercury went down to 39 in Lakeland, 38 in Bartow and 39 at the Orlando airport.

Miami reported a cool 47 and a reading of 51 was reported at Miami Beach. Temperatures ranged from the high 50s to middle 60s in the Keys.

Although citrus grove owners waited on a standby basis all night in case "firing" and use of amudge pots was necessary, the Lakeland Weather bureau and frost warning service said that freezing temperatures failed to strike far enough south to warrant emergency action.

Only very light, scattered frost was reported at low ground locations around Lake Okechobee and in the truck farming areas south of Miami and valuable crops of tomatoes, peppers, beans, celery, corn and potatoes weathered the nippy air.

The weather bureau in Miami predicted partly cloudy and "not quite so cold" through Saturday with lows tonight ranging from 30 in the extreme north to the 40s along the southeast coast and in the Keys.

The five-day forecast calls for night temperatures in the high 20s and low 30s in the panhandle and along the Georgia border with scattered rain mainly over the weekend.

2,000 Troops In Eglin Drop

EGLIN AIR FORCE BASE (UPI)—About 2,000 paratroopers and heavy equipment dropped into the icy air over the Florida panhandle today in a special joint Army-Air Force maneuver utilizing live ammunition.

The exercise started in early morning with the landing of a vanguard team from Ft. Bragg, N. C., and the full assault started at 10:30 a. m. (EST) with the dropping of the paratroopers and their equipment.

The U. S. strike command called the special test suddenly Thursday.

The whole effect of this is to get these status symbols off the street," one official said. The number of limousines and what the government calls "heavy sedans" in the capital is scheduled to shrink from the present total of 131 to 20.

Navy Takes Issue With Jane's Report On Fleet

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Navy sources agreed today that the U. S. fleet needs modernizing, but they took issue with the pessimistic status report issued by Britain's authoritative Jane's Fighting Ships.

In the latest edition of the famous reference work, out today, editor Raymond V. B. Blackman said the United States has too much World War II naval deadwood and must modernize its fleet to counter the challenge from the Soviet Union. Blackman said the Russians already possess the most powerful submarine force in the world.

But U. S. authorities believe their comparisons with Russia are more favorable to the United States than those presented by Jane's.

As far as surface vessels are concerned, Jane's credits the Soviet Navy with a "new look" aimed at global influence, although the Russians have no aircraft carriers and as far as is known are not planning to build any, U. S. sources say.

Salesman Held In Plot To Insure, Kill

ORLANDO (UPI)—Police charged an insurance salesman Thursday with suggesting a Negro television repairman insure his family, kill his crippled child, then split the payoff.

Orange County solicitor James Rusa said 33-year-old Rufus Yarbrough was charged with conspiracy to commit the felony of murder.

Folk: Lt. James Goode said Yarbrough approached Dallas E. Daniels on Dec. 12 and proposed he insure his family, wait a decent interval, kill his child, then split the insurance payoff with him.

Daniels informed police of the proposal and was advised to "string Yarbrough along." At their next meeting, Daniels told the salesman he "didn't have the conscience to kill his own child." But he said Yarbrough told him he had a man who would do the killing.

Yarbrough was arrested after that second meeting.

Oswald Shot At Me, Says Walker

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI)—Former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker said Thursday Lee Harvey Oswald, accused of assassinating President Kennedy, was slain "to erase a Marxist-Communist conspiracy."

Walker told newsmen "many things" led him to his opinion about why Oswald died.

But Walker, to support his claim would point out only that Oswald was about three blocks from the home of nightclub operator Jack Ruby minutes after the assassination. Ruby shot Oswald to death two days after Kennedy was killed.

Walker, who was relieved of his division command in Germany because of alleged political indoctrination of troops, said he thought it was Oswald who fired a shot at him through the window of his Dallas home earlier this year.

An FBI report given to Dallas police concluded it was ballistically impossible to tell if the same rifle was used to fire at Walker and the President.

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Partisans of the carrier believe the American fleet-logs led by the huge, nuclear-powered Enterprise, are the basis of all modern surface power. Any Navy lacking them, they say, is limited to operations close to its own shores.

Jane's claims that the Soviets have 55 nuclear-powered submarines and are threatening U. S. superiority in that category.

U. S. intelligence credits the Russians only with "12 or more" nuclear subs, compared to 33 already on duty with the American fleet and 42 others built, building or authorized in the Navy's construction program.

Navy sources also took issue with Jane's figure for the U. S. fleet of "3,250 vessels, largely composed of older tonnage."

They said that to arrive at such a large figure Jane's must have included landing craft and other relatively small boats.

The Navy figures it has 650 vessels in service, more than half of them of World War II vintage, with another 650 ships in mothballs. All of those in the reserve fleet are older types.

3 Cuban Groups Join, But Deny Attack Date Set

MIAMI (UPI)—Three Cuban organizations here say they have joined forces and will soon launch a massive internal strike at the Communist regime of Fidel Castro.

The exile groups—the Second Escambray Front, Alpha 66 and the People's Revolutionary movement—declined to set a date for the strike in a joint statement Thursday, but added they were working on a plan.

The statement was issued to confirm and clarify an announcement made by their Los Angeles representative that the attack can be expected by March. Alfredo Rondon told a Los Angeles news conference Wednesday the strike "will be a big operation. We are going in to stay."

The Miami-based exile groups said "We have never fixed or approximated a date, but we are working actively on plan Omega."

"We shall soon go to Cuba and we are confident of victory."

2 Of 3 Plead Guilty In Club Holdup

Two of three Coconos Negroes charged with armed robbery in the holdup of the Two-Spot, Negro night club on Highway 46 East, Saturday night, pleaded guilty before Justice of the Peace Hugh Duncan Thursday afternoon.

Bobby Joe Fluker and Titus Walters pleaded guilty. Talice Jones pleaded not guilty. All waived preliminary hearing and were bound over to Circuit Court.

All are in county jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond each.

Old Road Past LBJ Ranch Takes On New Glamour

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (UPI)—The scenic old road that winds through the central Texas hills and past the LBJ Ranch once carried the proud name "U. S. 290."

But it was filled with curves and turns, following the snake-like path of the Pedernales River. The surface also suffered from the heavy traffic westbound from Austin, the state capital.

Progress finally won over scenery; U. S. 290 was rerouted and straightened in 1955. Gillespie County fell heir to the old road, but it was not important enough even to name.

The winding trail became a local route, used by the ranchers. It became no more important than in the pre-automobile days when cowboys drove live-

stock along the sparkling, spring-fed river. The former U. S. highway had fallen from grace.

Then a new man became President. He was Lyndon Baines Johnson, headman at the LBJ Ranch. Traffic spuried to near its pre-1955 level. Pickup trucks gave way to tourists' sedans.

And, justly, the winding road receive a name: "Ranch Road One."

The Texas Highway Commission, besides announcing the name Thursday, said it would spend \$40,000 on the 4.5-mile loop from new U. S. 290. The state assumed command of the road, noting the dramatic increase in traffic. A new surface is planned.

Along the 20-foot highway, tourists will see some of Texas' most picturesque hill and brush country which President Johnson loves. For a distance, the road forms a boundary for the LBJ Ranch.

The Texas White House, a two-story limestone and wood ranch home, can be seen across the Pedernales about 200 yards from the road.

There is a concrete slab, with a thin layer of water running over it, that forms the driveway from "Ranch Road One" to a wrought iron sign that reads: "LBJ Ranch."

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
