## Feds' funds fuel Sanford projects

SANFORD - Barring any unforeseen change, slightly over \$95,000 in projects are to be funded for Sanford by the federal government's Housing and Urban Development. The money would come through Seminole County in the form of CDIBG (Community Development Block Grants). The county handles issuance of the money for HUD based on need.

Five separate projects were discussed by the Sanford City Commission during a work session Monday afternoon. The city selected three of the projects as preferred.

Tuesday, Community Development Director Charles Rowe announced he had received word from the county staff that the county will agree to finance three projects. "The best part," Rowe explained, "is that the grant is for the total project. Sanford won't have to put any additional money into the three projects."

## As the county squirms: Suber, vixen or victim?

SEMINOLE COUNTY - As the Clinton White House cannot make Paula Jones disappear, Seminole County government is having a devilish time getting Joyce Suber to go away.

Almost a year and a half since Suber was fired from her job as a land acquisition coordinator for the county, her name remains on the lips of just about everyone in local government.

She alleges that three county commissioners and other county officials sexually harassed her. She has sued the county for \$20 million. The county says she falsified time records and was insubordinate. Suber's allegations contained in volumes of testimony have caused a stir in the county, and there's more to come. Suber is scheduled to have a third deposition session on May 26 in Orlando.

"As long as she gets the press, her name will remain on everyone's lips," said Win Adams, one of three county

commissioners. Suber, 54, accuses of having sexually harassed her. Adams denies the charge. "I only met the woman 10 or 12 times, he said.

Former county commissioner Pat Warren describes Suber as having been a "very responsible, intelligent" county employee. "She never changed her style from the day she came to the county until the day she left. I considered her a professional friend."

Warren said she never noticed any wrongful behavior between anyone toward Suber. "In the hallways, there may have been warm expressions but that was all. Joyce Suber is an attractive woman and didn't try to hide it."

Jeff Mandel, the attorney hired by the county to defend it against Suber, opened the first deposition session with what became a bizarre series of questions about how many men Suber knew single had married.

Perhaps nervous, Suber stumbled when asked to name her husband before she was married to Bill Suber (County Please See Suber, Page 3A

## Internet kiddie porn lands Casselberry man in jail

SEMINOLE COUNTY - Ronald Scott Farham, 38, of 320 Lake Kathryn Circle, Casselberry, was arrested by Seminole County Sheriff's Investigator Bill McNett Tuesday. He has been charged with possession of photographs that

depict sexual performances by children. Officers say it appeared that the photographs were obtained from web sites on a computer at another person's residence in Altamonte Springs where the arrest occurred.

Sheriff's Lieutenant Jack Cash said authorities investigated after being notified of the existence of the photographs.

Farham is said to have made post-Miranda statements admitting the possession of the photos. Cash said he told investigators that he was compiling the sexually explicit photographs with the intention of delivering them to law enforcement.

He reportedly admitted downloading the photos from web sites, claiming that he was identifying the web sites for law enforcement to investigate.

He also is said to have told deputies that he had been aware of the web sites for five or six months.

## Country club, city talking through dispute

SANFORD - The dispute over money continues between the City of Sanford and Mayfair Country Club.

This week's Sanford City Commission meeting failed to resolve the matter although verbal indications were given which may lead toward a solution without taking the matter to court.

Both City Manager Bill Simmons and Charles Harrison, attorney for Seminole Club, Inc. (Mayfair), admitted it would be best if the dispute could be resolved without taking it to court. Harrison spoke on behalf of John "Jack" Daniels, president of the Mayfair organization.

At odds is the amount of money the city says the Mayfair owes. The Mayfair's lease stipulates that it will pay the city a certain amount of money, minus the amount it spends by itself for improvements and maintenance of the golf course.

The city has said the Mayfair owes \$255,346 in accrued rent. On the other hand, Warren E. "Pete" Knowles, who has

served as spokesman for Daniels and the organization, claims the Mayfair actually has a credit balance.

There has been some given-and-take. Sanford Attorney Catherine Reischmann, in a letter to the city, reportedly said that the city has re-worked the lease amounts owed from 1992 to 1997, resulting in rents due of \$159,979, significantly less than the \$255,346 demanded in a letter on February 26.

During commission discussion on the matter Monday night, Simmons said that the city had originally granted 60 days during which the Mayfair was to correct what was determined to be a default. The 60 days had ended Monday. "But I believe the city should authorize an extension until May 26," he suggested, "which will give us time for the staff, Mr. Daniels and his attorney to bring stuff back for further consideration."

"What I need now," Simmons continued, "is guidance from the commission. What kind of settlement do you want? We had believed Daniels owes the city almost \$260,000 in back rent, but he says he ac-

tually has a \$130,000 credit for capital improvements."

City Finance Director Donna Watt agreed with Reischmann's findings, explaining that she had once again studied the lease for the past 5 years and has determined that the amount owed the city is significantly less, possibly as low as \$160,000. "But personally," she said, "I don't see a penny's worth of improvements they made, other than from the money they were granted by Seminole County for improvements."

Harrison however, refused to acknowledge that the county had given the Mayfair a grant for improvements. "I don't see where it matters in regard to how Mr. Daniels got the money," Harrison responded. "He still has the money and he has used it to make improvements."

Commissioner Brady Lessard responded that he agreed both sides should do whatever possible to avoid going to court. "But you got money from the county, now you're asking us for more money to move fees twice. Are the taxpayers going to be torred

LAKE MARY - In and out, and in again.

No, it's not a sequel to the Kevin Kline movie; it's a description of the change of venue of the Lake Mary Heathrow Chamber of Commerce's foremost networking event.

A Taste of Lake Mary, started 9 years ago, was originally held at Timacuan Country Club, inside the clubhouse. An instant success, the event outgrew the space available at Timacuan and moved to Market Square (Goodings) in Heathrow, in the parking lot and on the sidewalks. The outdoor site gave the chamber more room to stretch out, but construction of a new two-story office building

## All Souls cares about the rain forests

It's one thing to learn about the world from a school teacher.

It's another when students are actually not only doing the teaching, but creating the lesson plans and helping out with classroom projects.

That's what's going on at All Souls Catholic School in Sanford. Mark Roberts' science classes are studying rain forests and the damages being done to them. To get his point across to the younger students at All Souls, he spent the first part of the year teaching his sixth-graders and then let them take over the teaching of the elementary

school students.

As a result, Roberts' classroom looks like a tropical rain forest, decorated brightly with cutouts of animals, plants and all kinds of other things you might see in an actual rain forest.

The hands-on experience has been helpful and the kids have picked up quickly on the plight of the forests.

Roberts said the hands-on experience is in line with a lot of modern teaching techniques.

"We're competing with mass media," Roberts said. "Our expectations when we were in school aren't what they are right now, so we have to take a unique approach. They learn better that way."

Roberts said the younger kids have been attentive and respectful to the older students and the project has been a success so far. The sixth-graders have had full control over the instruction and even prepare quizzes.

At first, the sixth-graders were divided into teams with two to four younger students. Then, they were given choices as to what they wanted to research and study. Subjects ranged from toucans and anacondas to piranhas and pythons.

Then, the students converted their classroom in to a rain forest for inspiration.

They learned some interesting and sad facts about the plight of the rain forests. They learned that the forests were being destroyed by thousands of acres of rain forest. Roberts said the forests are responsible for protecting the food chain, supplying oxygen to nature's beings, fresh water filtration and supply at least one-third of all properties contained in medicines used for man.

"We say that people should just stop destroying the rain forests," Roberts said. "But that's what we did to this country."

Roberts is having his kids write letters to President Clinton asking for laws and information about what they can do to save the rain forests.

Despite their age, many of the kids involved said they were sad about the future of the rain forests, even though they didn't know much about them before the class started.

Sixth-grader Patrick Jones said he's had fun and the kids are paying attention to his lessons.

"They listen really well," he said. "I've been teaching them all about the habitats and the animals that live there."

Sixth-graders Lara Oretsky and Natasha Pawlikowski are using sound effects with their lessons. They are teaching about tigers and have a tape recording of a tiger's roar that they play while teaching.

"It's a real attention-getter," Natasha said.

Lara expressed concerns about the future of the animal population that lives in the rain forests.

"People only want to use the animals for making things like pools, decks and pool tables," she said. "They only want to make money, but they should find another way to make money instead of letting the animals die."

Natasha added, "Half of the animals in the world won't have a place to live. If they need to make money, there are other ways than to kill animals."

First-grader Rachel Macher said she enjoyed learning from other students and has found out a lot about the animals.

"I'm really sad that so many animals are losing their homes," she said.

First-grader Nicole Pipitone added a final note.

"If we lose the rain forests, all of our animals are going to die."

Now that All Souls sixth-graders have taught the younger students, it looks like their next student will be President Clinton.

The three selected by the county however, differ from those selected by the city. The commissioners had suggested the money be requested for what are known as the "Strawberry Avenue Sewer Project" (\$121,009), the "Oleander Avenue Sidewalk Project" (\$14,000), the "7th Street Sewer Project" (\$40,000) and building improvements to the Boys and Girls Club.

The county has announced it will not approve the Strawberry sewer project at this time, but expanded work on the Boys and Girls Club. The city had hoped for at least sufficient CDBG funds for installation of a new sports floor. The county however determined that the entire project should be funded, which, in addition to the new floor, includes purchase and installation of HVAC (heating/ventilation/air conditioning) system, and purchase of a public address system which amounts to \$41,174.

In total, the amount expected to be approved by the county is \$95,177.

During work shop discussion Monday, Commissioner Kerry Lyons had suggested the Strawberry Avenue project be placed on hold because of the expense. "We could do much additional work in other projects if we didn't have the expensive one on the list," he said.

The 7th Street Sewer project involves plans to provide sewer service to 10 homes and approximately seven lots. It has been projected that the residents along Seventh Street will be immediate and direct beneficiaries of this project, with future residents who may occupy homes on the present vacant lots to be future direct beneficiaries.

The Oleander Avenue project would provide 1,350 feet of sidewalk along Oleander Avenue between 13th and 16th Streets. The application for the funds says, "The parents and students of Goldsboro Elementary school who traverse Oleander Avenue will be immediate and direct beneficiaries of this project."

The other proposed project which has been dropped from this year's CDBG request, in addition to the Strawberry Avenue sewer, is "Coastline Park Renovation." At a projected cost of \$93,750, it would have provided improvements to the city owned park including a picnic shelter with benches

and grills, additional basketball courts including lights, a multipurpose playground, restroom, parking lot, walkway, drinking fountain, benches and landscaping.

"The money Seminole County gets for the CDBG projects is strictly based on need," Rowe explained. "Where there is a clear need for improvements, the money is generally made available."

Rowe said he was extremely pleased on hearing that the county staff is recommending the full financing of the projects. There was no immediate word regarding when the projects would get under way.

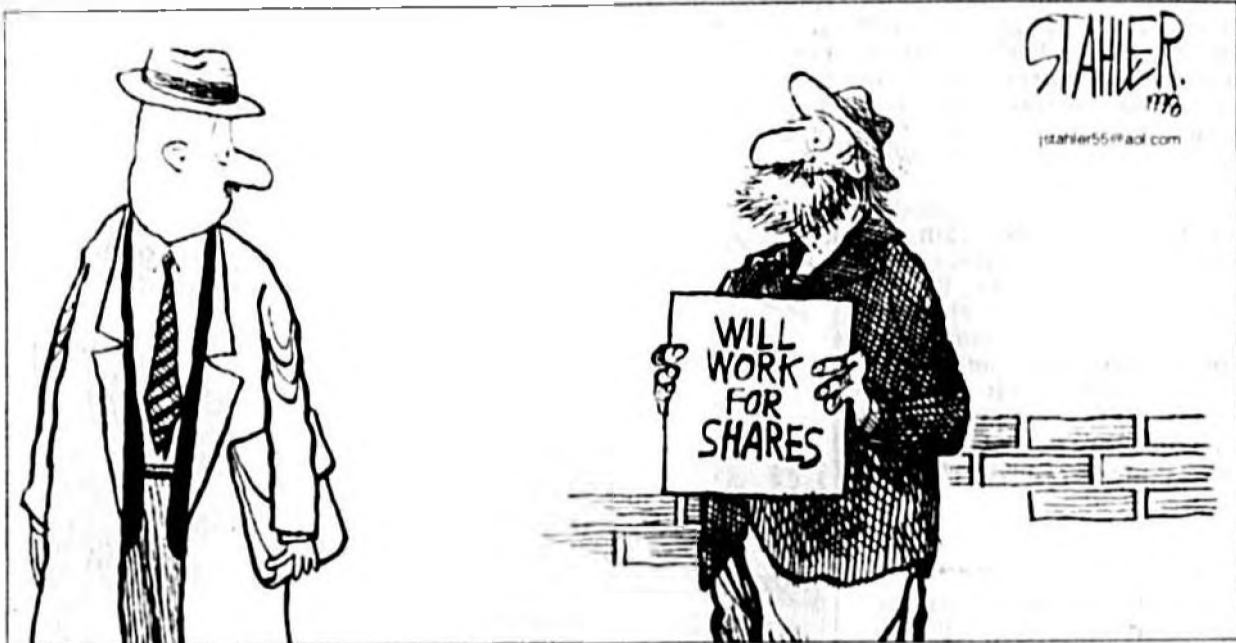

## 'Just say no' doesn't say enough

"Just say no" doesn't say enough. Back in the 1980s, prevailing wisdom held that a snappy, easy-to-remember slogan, recited often enough, might give young people the resolve to act out the message later--and refrain from drug use, including alcohol, and other harmful behavior as well ("Just say no" was a one-size-fits-all that applied to everything from premarital sex to cheating on exams).

But "just say no" turns a blind eye to why young people abuse drugs in the first place. And it never explained why we should "just say no," either.

Without addressing the cause of the problem, we can't begin to imagine ways to fix it. We have to focus on why. So why do young people turn to drugs? The answer is simpler than you think.

We are, all of us, boys and girls and men and women, emotional beings. We feel. That's the biggest distinction between human beings and armadillos. They have exoskeletons. We have feelings: excited, scared, betrayed, sad.

Emotions are very, very powerful, especially the first few times we feel them. And, as if adolescence wasn't hard enough by itself, many of our most deeply powerful feelings "reveal" themselves for the first time during this stage of the human journey. Ever feel like you're just running out of control? Welcome to adolescence. It's a scary time for just about everyone. And it only gets scarier.

Every adult you know went through adolescence once. Some of them seem like they're still at it. They felt the same sorts of things most young people feel right now--the same sorts of things you feel. The trouble with adults is that most of them developed amnesia--they forgot what it was like to be a young person. And that's not all.

Collectively, we adults comprise a powerfully influential "culture," and this culture we've created has some pretty strange ideas. In hundreds of ways every day, we try to tell young boys and girls to "control" their feelings. "Don't cry," we say. "Be a man. Big boys don't cry." Ever hear any of those phrases? All human beings feel, and boys feel just as deeply and just as powerfully as girls, but we "punish" boys who express their feelings by calling them sissies or worse. And it's not just boys; there are just as many ways to tell girls to "behave like girls."

So what happens? Young people--who are already contending with some of the greatest stresses they will ever experience--get a lot of misinformed, inaccurate messages from adults, from our "culture." In order to teach young people to "control" their feelings, we try to convince them they should ignore their feelings.

But young people know the truth: feelings won't be ignored (that's why we call them feelings).

And yet, we as human beings are taught that feelings are to be rigidly controlled. And eventually for some of us, if we fail to "control" our feelings, then we have to do something with them. Young people are not as savvy as adults in repressing or denying them; therefore, drugging those feelings becomes an option.

There really does exist a country that has a little place on every corner that you can go into and buy drugs. And in that country it is perfectly legal. For the equivalent of a few American dollars, you simply ask for

Adults use sleeping pills and tranquilizers, and how many times in your young life can you remember hearing some adult, in a movie or on TV or in your own living room, say something like "I need a drink."

So we already know that feelings boil and rage in young people, we don't tell them how to deal with those feelings (indeed, most adults don't know how to deal with them themselves) and to top it all off, we give young people lessons every day in how to deaden those feelings and the anxieties they produce with alcohol and other "legal" drugs. Is it any wonder that young people often turn to their own forms of "drug relief," from Ecstasy ("Ex") and Rohypnol ("roofies"), to "shrooms, acid, pot, pick your poison.

Until we learn to feel, until we learn to deal with how we feel, the lure of an easy fix will always be with us. "Just say no" doesn't tell you any of this. "Just say no" doesn't say enough.

the color and flavor and they give it to you. The country is the United States and these places are called bars.

Even adults often turn to drugs themselves in order to relieve the anxiety their emotions cause. Rather than feel their emotions and deal with them, they seek ways to dull them. That's what alcohol does, and that's what cigarettes and coffee do, too.

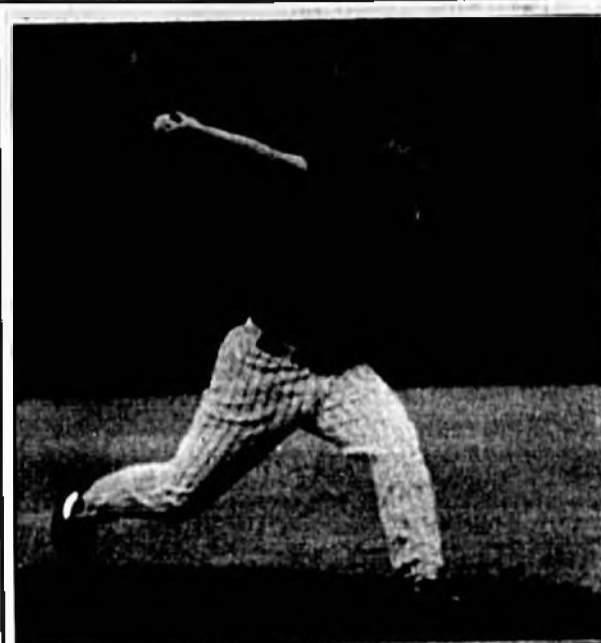

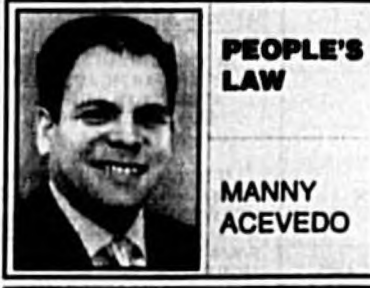

## To file or not to file for bankruptcy

People who are having trouble paying their debts oftentimes consider filing for bankruptcy. However, filing for bankruptcy is not always the best answer. Whether filing for bankruptcy is the best answer or not will depend on the debtor's income, his or her assets, and how far behind he or she is in making payments.

In situations where all or most of the income and the assets of the debtor are exempt, the debtor is essentially "judgment-proof" and the exemptions afforded by Florida law will provide most of the protections that filing for bankruptcy would. Therefore, in those situations, filing for bankruptcy will merely result in an unnecessary expenditure of time and money.

Likewise, in situations where the debtor is not too far behind in payments, filing for bankruptcy may be unnecessary. In these cases, by proposing a reasonable payment plan, a debtor may be able to convince his or her creditors to delay further collection action, wait longer for payment, or accept reduced payments. However, if a

debtor is unable to convince all of his or her creditors to go along with the payment plan, a debtor may opt to consult with a debt counseling agency. The agency will, for a fee, organize a "work-out" through which the agency will act as an intermediary.

First the agency will establish payment schedules with the creditors. Then, the agency will determine a reasonable budget for the debtor and require the debtor to pay to the agency all of his or her disposable income. Finally, the agency will make payments to the creditors in accordance with the "work-out" agreements.

In situations like the ones described above filing for

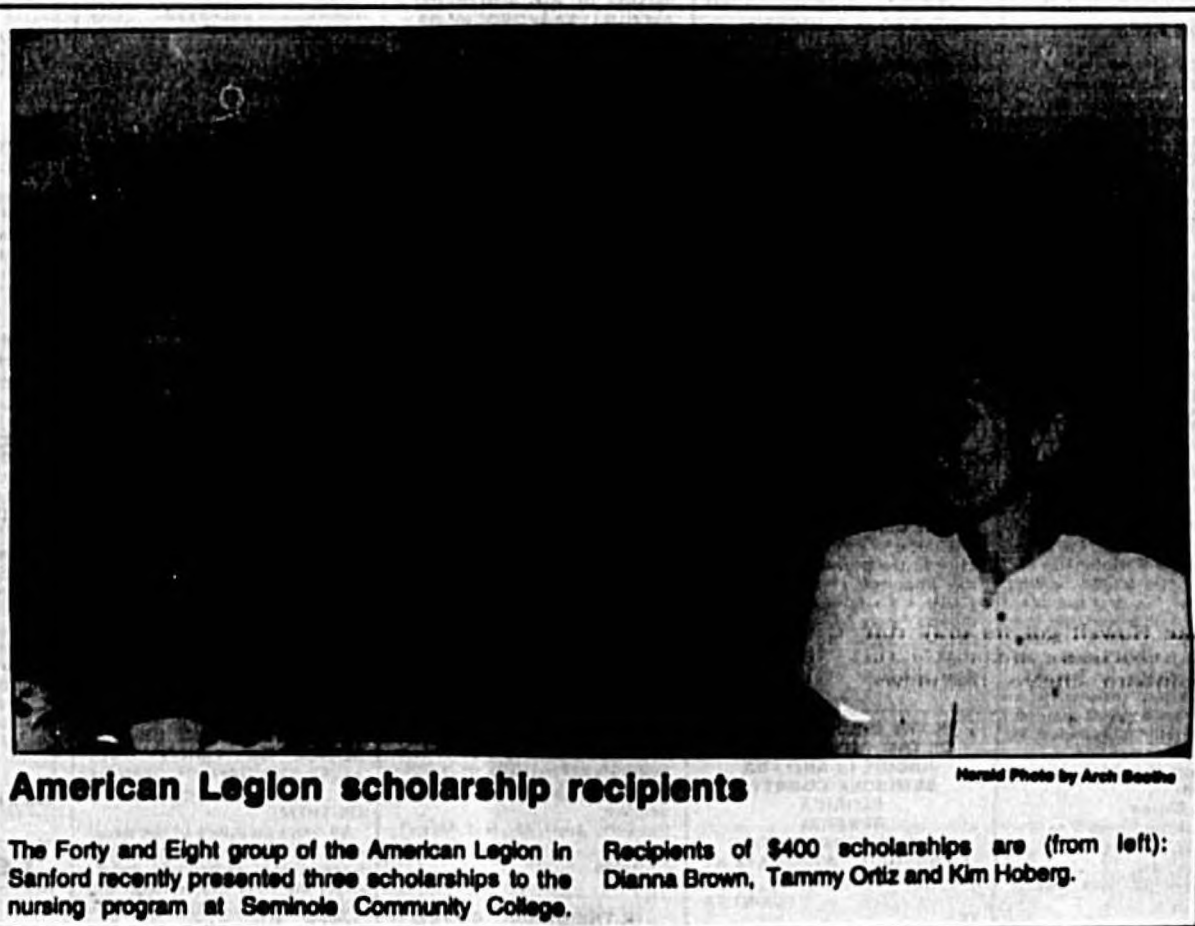
bankruptcy is probably not necessary and therefore probably not the best answer. However, when a debtor's financial situation is threatening his or her job, his or her health, and/or his or her ability to provide for necessities, filing for bankruptcy may be the best way for the debtor to deal with financial problems.

There are three main types of bankruptcy proceedings provided under the law. The first type is a Chapter 7 Bankruptcy which is known as "straight" bankruptcy or "liquidation." It requires a debtor to give up property which exceeds his or her exemptions so that the property can be sold to pay creditors. The second type is a Chapter 11 Bankruptcy which is known as "reorganization." It is used mainly by businesses but is sometimes used by individual debtors whose debts are very large. The third type is the Chapter 13 Bankruptcy which is known as "debt adjustment." It requires a debtor to file a plan to pay debts (or parts of debts) from current income. Naturally, the

type of bankruptcy proceeding to be selected will depend on a number of factors including the debtor's income, his or her assets and their form of ownership, and his or her liabilities.

People who are having trouble paying their debts oftentimes consider filing for bankruptcy because bankruptcy law offers a debtor a chance to start fresh. However, whether filing for bankruptcy is the best answer depends on each individual's situation. Therefore, a debtor should not rush into filing for bankruptcy without considering other options. In the coming weeks we will be discussing what filing for bankruptcy can and cannot do and other aspects of bankruptcy law.

**DEAR HAZEL:** I'd be delighted. Although chocolate is my preference, the penuche fudge is wonderful for people who are allergic to chocolate. It is in my second recipe collection, "More Favorite Recipes," and very easy to make.

### ABBY'S FAMOUS PENUCHE FUDGE

- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
  - 1 cup packed brown sugar
  - 1/3 cup light cream
  - 1/3 cup milk
  - 3 tablespoons butter or margarine
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
  - 1/2 cup walnut pieces
- Butter a 9-inch square baking dish. Butter the sides of a heavy 2-quart saucepan. Combine sugars, cream, milk and butter in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugars dissolve

and mixture comes to a boil. Cook to soft ball stage (238 degrees on candy thermometer), stirring only if necessary. Immediately remove from heat and cool to lukewarm (110 degrees). Do not stir.

Add vanilla and beat vigorously until very thick and mixture starts to lose its gloss. Quickly stir in nuts and spread into prepared baking dish. Score while warm, and cut when firm. Makes 3 dozen 1 1/2-inch squares. (P.S. You'll diet next week!)
