### FAMU students arrested on drug charges

TALLAHASSEE - Gos current and two turner members of the Florida A&M University football team were arraigned on charges related to an alleged drug ring at the university.

Six people have been arrested so far in the alleged drug network, campus police said Tuesday, adding that they are looking for three others, including two FAMU students. They

refused to identify the suspects still at large.
"We do not feel the problem exists on the football team in any widespread numbers," said Jefferson Walker, the

university a chief of police.

### **Gunter accusers sentenced**

MIAMI - Jose and Carlos Pina were given stiff four-year sentences for skimming money from their insurance company despite prosecution statements that they cooperated extensively in an investigation of state officials.

The Pina brothers have accused insurance Commissioner Bill Gunter and aides of demanding a job, legal fees and campaign contributions in exchange for favorable treatment from the state for their Universal Casualty Co.

Gunter denied the allegations, but they became a central

issue this fall in his unsuccessful campaign for the Democratic nomination for the U.S. Senate.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Richard Scruggs said the reason no charges were brought against state officials was that the statute of limitations had expired.

Jose and Carlos Pina pleaded guilty earlier this year to one count each of tax conspiracy, admitting that they skimmed of hundreds of thousands of dollars without reporting it on their returns. In exchange, the government dropped the remaining counts of a federal indictment.

The two started Universal in 1981 and built it into the state's third largest auto insurer before it collapsed in 1984. Motorists across the state were stuck with more than 860 million in

### University of Miami student wins lottery

TALLAHASSEE - A 22-year-old University of Miami student became the youngest person to win the Florida lottery, por letting a Lotto jackpet of \$8.4 million.

Carlos Eduardo Sanabria, of North Miami, a fifth-year architecture student, guessed the six numbers chosen in Saturday night's Lotto drawing. He traveled to Tallahassee Tuesday to pick up his first check.

Sanabria, the first student to win the grand prize, will collect 84 19,000 a year - \$6,057.67 a week - for the next 20 years. Sanabria, a Costa Rica native who moved to Florida when he

was 6 years old, said he is already talking to financial advisers and accountants, but has not decided how to spend his new

fortune.

See 1 to 1 to present the winning numbers — 7, 15, 24, 30, 51 and 49 — at random and bought the ticket at a 7-Davin store to North Miami. Michael Stanton, a professor of architecture at the University

of Miami, described Sanabria as a very good student, well-liked by fellow students in the fifth-year design class.

### Philadelphia fugitive caught in Miami

MIAMI - The 31-year-old man wanted for questioning about two murders and a rape in Philadelphia and unlawful flight from prosecution charges was arrested without incident

Anthony Birdsong, 31, was wanted for questioning in the July 17 murders of two people who were shot to death at a Philadelphia home in a drug dispute. Four others at the scene, ranging in age from 16 to 26, were wounded, while two teenagers were severely beaten.

A 16-year-old girl was taken to a nearby park after the attack. She was severely beaten and raped.

Birdsong's brother, Ralph, who was living in Davie, was arrested Nov. 14 on charges of unlawful flight to avoid prosecution in connection with the July murders.

The unlawful flight charges against Anthony Birdsong stem from cocaine charges.

Authorities said the shooting spree at the Philadelphia house began when people freebasing cocaine started a fire, damaging the home and destroying 9 pounds of cocaine.

# Legislature organizes for austere year

TALLAHASSEE - The Florida House and Senate convened in the state Capitol to doje out committee chairmanships amid warnings state government must trim \$735 million from next year abudget.

The Senate Tuesday unanimously elected Democrat Bob Crawford of Winter Haven as its president, and gave the post of Senate president pro tempore to Sen. Armette Girardeau, D-Jacksonville, the first black to hold the post since Reconstruction.

In the House, Tom Gustafson, D.Fort Lauderdale, was elected speaker and vowed to open the political process to more Republicans and rank-and-file Democrats. Rep. Sam Mitchell, D-Vernon, was elected as the new speaker pro tempore.

Gustafson and Crawford have been close friends since both were elected to the House

"He's probably more cautious than I am," Gustafson said of Crawford. "He's a quieter person than I am. The differences between us are small in degree, and there are many more similarities.

Change was in the air in both chambers as newcomers took places of veteran lawmakers who moved on to other positions in government or to retirement - some voluntarily, others at the insistence of voters.

In a potent symbol of the change, Crawford said he will press for new fees on salt water fishermen to raise money to protect Florida's marine resources. Such fees have won support in the House and the governor's office in past years, but were always blocked by former Sen. Dempsey Barron.

Now the only evidence of the power Barron once held was his portrait painted when he was Senate President in 1974-1976, which hung mute on the chamber wall. Barron, D-Panama City, was defeated for re-election by newcomer Vince Bruner, **D-Fort Walton Beach.** 

Change was in the air in both chambers as newcomers took places of veteran lawmakers who moved on to other positions in government or to retirement \* some voluntarily, others at the insistence of voters.

In the House, retiring former Speaker Jon Mills presided only long enough to hand the gavel over to Gustafson. Noticably absent was Sam Bell, who had been slated to become speaker in 1990 before losing his re-election bid.

Crawford warned that although the state's problems continue to mount, lawmakers expect taxes to fall below costs of existing state programs, for a shortfall of \$735 million-

Gov. Bob Martinez has warned he will accept no major tax increases, so lawmakers must prepare for some difficult choices. Crawford said.

"This Senate must change, not only in structure but in disposition. We must become an activist Senate," Crawford said in his inaugural address.

"At this stage in our state's history, we cannot afford to sit back and wait to see what is laid at our door by the governor, by the House or by the agencies of government. We don't have that luxury. The state that we represent demands more.

Despite the prospect of spending cuts. Crawford announced new priorities in education, the war on crime, the environment and insurance reform.

Gustafson, who said he would be leaving public service when his two-year term as speaker ends, vowed to run a worksholic House, beginning with his promised arrival at 7 a.m. each day of the session.

Qustafaon hammered away on the theme

of unity, saying all House members must work together to cope with the problems presented by Florida's Iremendous growth. He repeated his plans to address four basic areas he considers of prime importance human resource development, structural and natural resource development, business growth, and government efficiency and effectiveness.

in a break with tradition. Gustafson said he would wait until after a mid-December "issues conference" with other House members before announcing most committee chairmen and assignments. He did name supporters and old friends to a lew key committees, including Fred Lippman, D Hollywood, as Rules chairman, Anne Mackenzie. D-Fort Lauderdale na Finance and Tax committee chairwoman and T.K. Wetherell, D-Daytona Beach, as Appropria-

Crawford expanded the number of Senate standing committees from 16 to 22, with new committees created for insurance; economic, professional and utility regulation! higher education: health care: ethics: and regulated industries.

Crawford, a Democrat, was elected president with the support of Republicans, who will hold nine committee chairmanahips and the Appropriations subcommittee on Health and Rehabilitative Services. Sen. Jim Scott, R Fort Lauderdale, takes

Barron's place as Rules chairman. Sen. Tim. Deratany; R-Indialantic, remains as Finance and Taxation chairman. Sen. Gwen Margolis. D-North Miami.

becomes Appropriations chairwoman, with more power than any other woman has held in the clubbish Senate And with Republicans sharing power.

Crawford created a new position of majority leader, providing a staff member to help Democrats plot legislative strategy - a chore formerly handled by the president himself.

Sen. Jack Gordon. D Miamt Beach, was chosen to fill the majority leader slot.

# **Tourists** on wing

GAINESVILLE - Last summer's drought in the Midwest combined with Florida's rapid development may cut into the Sunshine State's winter bird population. a University of Florida bird experi mays.

"Biologists are gravely concerned because the drought decreased the amount of prairie marshland, prime breeding habitat for waterfowl, resulting viving to make the trip south," said J.W. Hardy, curator of ornithology at the Florida Museum of Natural History.

The number of waterfowl migrating to Florida has already greatly dininished during the past few decades because wildlife biologists in many Northern states have been providing food in winter refuges for birds, he said.

Northern waterfowl that migrate to Florida may arrive to find the shallow lakes on which they spent past winters drained or otherwise altered for development, he said.

The destruction of Florida's woods and wetlands is probably to blame for the continued decline of many bird species, Hardy said.

"We're seeing the numbers of our resident bird species decrease as their habitat is destroyed," he said. "Northern species that migrate to Florida for the winter suffer the same fate if their habitat is completely replaced with parking loss and bouning subdivisions.

The white-breasted nuthatch. a common North American bird resident in peninsular Florida 30 years ago, no longer is found there although it still breeds in the l'anhandle, he said.

The white-throated sparrow, once a common winter visitor to the Gainesville area, is in a uncommon in the early part of the Bachman a. Warbler was at times a common migrant in the state and now may be extinct, he said.

The winter migration of birds to Florida from Northern states begins as early as August with neveral varieties of insect-eating songbirds and ends in late November with seed-eating birds, Hardy said.

Migratory bird patterns in Florida partly depend on the weather in the North, with peak movement frequently not occurring until after the first cold spell. Relatively mild northern weather this fall probably explains why birdwatchers this season have so far seen few American robins, one of Florida's most popular and abundant wintering birds, he

The song sparrow and white-throated sparrow are among the species that commonly arrive in Florida during



### Woman said she was in porn movie

LONGWOOD - A 29-year-old Sanford woman reported to Seminole County sheriff's deputies Tuesday that on Oct. 15 she was given an injection of an unknown drug and made to perform in a pornographic movie.

The woman said she and a friend were in the parking lot of the Post Time Lounge, Dog Track Road, Longwood, when they were picked up by two men in a white limousine at about 2

The friend was taken home and dropped off, but the victim said as she rode around with the men, who identified themselves as "Terry Limo" and "Bronx," she drank champagne.

They took her to a house at an unknown location and she drank more alcohol and said she was injected with a drug. The woman told deputies she was made to perform in a pornographic movie with other persons.

At about 5:30 a.m. Oct. 15, she said she awoke in the limo and "Terry Limo," returned her to the lounge.

### Deputies said the case is under investigation. Hitchhiker charged as prostitute

CASSELBERRY - Two Casselberry policemen report picking up a hitchhiker, whom they recognized as a suspected prostitute. They charged the woman with soliciting for prostitution.

### Commission listens to bids for city hall phone systems

SANFORD - After a preliminary decision more than a month ago to buy a city hall telephone system from Southern of Southern Bell and Ken Medlin Bell, city commissioners again heard proposals from three telephone system representatives Monday afternoon.

The commission decided at an Oct. 17 work session to follow the staff's recommendation to accept the Southern Bell bid. However, when action on accepting the bid came up at the commission's Oct. 24 meeting. three commissioners balked.

After the initial work session one of the three finalist bidders. Jarvis Isotech, submitted additional information about their proposal. Commissioners John Y. Mercer, Whitey Eckstein and Bob Thomas Jr. voted to delay accepting a bid and invited the three finalists to another work acasion.

Monday, the three representatives, Isotech, Southern Bell and American Telephone and Telegraph, presented summaries of their bids and the city staff stuck by its recommendation to accept Southern at its meeting Nov. 28.

Jarvis Isotech contended its line fees would save the city \$48,000 over 10 years compared with the Southern Bell proposal.

However, both Larry Strickler of AT&T said Isotech's lower rates, currently allowed by the state Public Service Commission, are being challenged in court and that the system was different from theirs and would not serve the city as well.

Mercer said, despite staff recommendations, he favors accepting the Isotech bid because of the lower cost. "I haven't heard unything that convinces me that one system is any better than the others," he said.

However, Commissioner A.A. McClanahan said it was a mistake to re-open the bidding among the three finalists. He said more offers could be submitted indefinitely and the commission must make a decision. Thomas said he is now willing to support the staff recommendation.

The commission will again be scheduled to vote on a proposal

# A good day to smoke turkey

LAKE MARY - The skies cleared early this morning just in time for Lake Mary's Sixth Annual Smoked Turkey event.

It is one of a number of elforts to help provide food for the needy. Charitable organizations and churches in the area also will offer Thanksgiving dinners at no cost.

By 5:30 a.m. today, just like every year, a crew of five Lake Mary men were preparing approximately 100 turkeys, some up to 14 pounds, in the kitchen at the Lake Mary Community Improvement Association (CIA) building on Country Club Road.

After a few touches of seasonings and a wrapping of aluminum foil, the turkeys are ready to be placed on the 30-foot long barbecue pit on large. covered pana over a fire that took about 360 pounds of charcoal and another 50 pounds of sawed, live green oak, according to John Connelly, chairman of the event this year. Connelly serves on the CIA

board of directors. The oak lends a mild smoked flavor to the turkeys. Connelly

Connelly busted himself the evening before purchasing the turkeys, 400 pounds of charcoal. eight quarts of lighter fluid. aluminum foil and paper towels.

By early this morning, the turkeys were thawed and several men were seasoning and wrapping them. Finas Selock, owner of Cafe Sorrento in Lake Mary, provided his professional cultinary skills.

"I've been doing this since the first one," he says leaning over a sinkful of turkeys.

Frank Liberatore, a roofer. received a little guidance with his turkey-wrapping technique. This was Liberatore's first year to be involved with the event but he said it beat having to do construction work on such a soddy day.

Others involved included Commissioner Tom Mahoney and Vern Feddersen. CIA president. Police Chief Charles Lauderdale was called out for some weather-related emergencies and did not appear this morning. Also, Commissioner Randall Morris and Ed and Ronnie Pratt, who are involved with the event, were not present.



### Blue ribbon budget squabble

A year ago, in their budget summit following the stock market crash. Congress and the president agreed to create a bipartisan National Economic Commission of distinguished citizens to recommend — after the election — a way out of the nation's budget deficit mess. The move was less of an evasion than it looked. Early in the Reagan administration, the president and Congress used a similar commission on Social Security as political cover for producing needed reforms for which no politician wanted to claim authorabip. The hope was that the NEC would forge a budget compromise a new president and Congress could gratefully accept.

That hope is now fading. Commission members are discovering what Congress has long known: There are no painless deficit-reduction measures. And as they have made that unremarkable discovery, the commission is showing signs of disarray, going public to defend narrow positions.

First Caspar Weinberger, the former secretary of defense whose uncontrolled spending helped put America in the hole, suggested using a portion of the Social Security payroll to protect the Pentagon budget. Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynthan and AFL-CIO President Lane Kirkland vowed, in turn, to block any tampering with Social Security. Dean Kleckner, president of the Farm Bureau Federation, then criticized his colleagues for being biased in favor of a tax increase, which he will oppose. Co-chairman Drew Lewis replied that farm subsidies will have to be abolished. Now, because of that bickering, co-chairman Robert Strauss has announced that the commission will not have its recommendations ready by the target date of Dec. 21, and may not be ready to report until March.

If so, why bother? March will be too late to have any impact, either on the writing of the first Bush budget or on the political debate over it. The NEC was intended as a reality check on the new president's plans and a yardstick for the new Congress in its budget decisions. If the commission members are not prepared to produce such recommendations before Jan. I, putting the goal of deficit reduction ahead of personal and political agendas, they are wasting their time, and the nation's.



# A great politicians's legacy

AUSTIN - It was sheer coincidence to be back in the Texas capital 25 years, almost to the day, after I had flown here to report a story on the political problems that faced John F. Kennedy in the Lone Star State. The President was to arrive later in the week for a two-day swing through five Texas cities, winding up here in Austin. The journey was deemed necessary to begin repairing Kennedy's damaged political fances well in advance of the 1964 campaign.

Alan L. Otten of the Wall Street Journal was on a similar mission, so we went in together to see Gov. John Connally. It was a very different time. The high-tech revolution had not transformed Austin's economy and skyline. The political revolution which would carry Connally and many other members of the Texas establishment into the Republican Party was somewhere over the horizon, as well.

Connally was candid as always that day, ascribing Kennedy's political problems in Texas not only to the growing assertiveness of the civil-rights movement but to what Connally saw as a leftward administration drift on everything from economics to arms control. Even with Lyndon Johnson on the ticket, he said, it would not be easy for Kennedy to carry Texas in 1964. And if there were any truth to those rumors about "the Kennedys" dropping Johnson from the ticket, they could forget about Texas.

The interview remains vivid after 25 years, clearing away the clouds of sentimentality that have gathered about Kennedy's "final journey." He did not come to Texas as a conquering hero; he was a politician on a political mission, doing vital groundwork for a processhing comparison.

an approaching campaign.

The fitnerary had been constructed with that goal in mind. He flew into San Antonio, the political capital of south Texas with its emerging lispanic vote. He went on that evening to Houston, where an ambitious, attrative young businessman named George Bush was making the Democrats nervous by improving the Harris County Republican organization and preparing for a 1964 Senate bid.

He stayed overnight that Thursday in Fort Worth and began Friday at a breakfast for Rep. Jim Wright-aiready a rising power in Congress and Texas politics. Then the schedule called for him to show the flag in Republican Dallas, with a luncheon address to business leaders at the Trade Mart, before the final event — a Texas Democratic Party dinner at the municipal auditorium here in Austin.

Even the "nonpartisan" events had a clear political purpose. But for Kennedy, politics was always one part exhortation, one part education and one part celebration. He made it joyful, exhilarating.

Like almost no one else. Kennedy could mock the rituals and rhetoric of politics even as he showed himself the graceful master of the art form. In Houston, for example, where he was paying tribute to Rep. Albert Thomas, a notoriously skillful taper of the federal pork barrel who had just snagged the NASA space flight center for his district. Kennedy "stumbled" as he bragged that the United States was about to

fire "the largest payroll — payload — into space." As the audience roared, Kennedy smiled and said innocently, "Well, it will be the largest payroll, too."

At the Friday morning breakfast for Wright, Jacqueline Kennedy was conspicuously missing from her place at the head table. Her husband brushed away any intimations of a snub by remarking, "Mrs. Kennedy is organizing herself. It takes

be petty when our cause is so great self. It takes

So let us not

longer, but of course, she looks better than we do when she does it."

At Dallas' Love Field, as at previous stops, there was a visible commotion as the ranking Texas potentates. Johnson, Connally and their battle-scarred liberal antagonist. Sen. Ralph Yarborough — milled around, jousting to see who would ride in which car in the motorcade. Grinning, Kennedy sent a staff aide over to the press bus with a message that the President hoped reporters were noting "the wondeful demonstrations of unity" in the Texas Democratic Party.

As everyone knows, it was Connally who was in the car with Kennedy when it rounded the corner in Dealey Plaza, when the shots were fired, and when the mad dash to Parkland Hospital led to the announcement that cut short the laughter.

Many remember and revere Kennedy as a President. I think of him in those last days and moments of his life as a politician, a man who enjoyed and enhanced politics as much as anyone II has been my good fortune to cover.

In the prepared text for the Austin speech Kennedy did not live to deliver, he was to tell his fellow-Democrats:

"Our duty as a party is not to our party alone, but to the nation, and, indeed, to all mankind. Our duty is not merely the preservation of political power but the preservation of peace and freedom.

# Bank board chief lacks credibility

WASHINGTON — For a few people in the Reagan administration, a Michael Dukakis victory would have spelled freedom from the hot seat. Karl Hoyle, the chief spokesman for the Federal Home Loan Bank Board put it this way: "I hope Dukakis wins so I can get the hell out of here."

Hoyle, an executive director for public affairs for the bank board, has tried to put a happy face on the savings and loan crisis. That half-hearted remark made to high-level agency officials underscored the bunker

mentality that has gripped the bank board, which is charged with containing the worst financial crists in a half century.

Hoyle may get his wish, even without Dukakis in the White House, Hank board chief Danny Wall, although a Republican appointee, has lost his credibility with Congress, the administration and even with many on his own staff.

his own staff.

Wall may be the bureaueratic equivalent of Captain Bligh — oblivious the starters married to

the storm warnings that threaten the ship of state.

President-elect George Bush would be well served to read the lips of his advisers, some members of Congress and the financial regulatory community: "Make Wall walk the

Members of both the House and Senate banking committees complain that every time they get briefed by Wall, they take his words with a hefty grain of salt, and frequently find the information he gives to be

inaccurate and self-serving.

"The bank board is engaged in sham resolutions," said Senate Banking Committee Chairman William Proxmire, D-Wis, "Many of the most heavily insolvent S&Ls are conducting Ponzi schemes that take in new deposits to pay their bills." Proxmire added that Wall has "consistently underestimated" what it will cost the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. to bail out the thrifts.

Time is money when it comes to the thrift crisis. Insolvent thrifts are losing \$1 billion a month, some \$40 million every business day—losses that will be tacked on to a taxpayer bailout estimated at more than \$60 billion. Since Wall has been in office about 17 months, that's \$17 billion added to the taxpayers' burden, in part because he chose to be an industry cheerleader rather than a regulator.

Wall should be relieved of his command at least because he has consistently understated the size of the crisis. If "Don't Worry, he Happy" wins a Grammy, Wall should collect the award.

The question is simple: How much would it cost to rescue the 505 insolvent thrifts and 435 more that are barely afloat? Wall can't seem to settle on an answer.

In late summer, 1987, he stated flatly that \$10.8 billion in horrowing authority that Congress authorized would be enough, and he ridiculed the legions of industry experts and fellow regulators who disagreed.

Our associate Michael Binstein obtained a document that suggests Wall was worse than wrong — he was saying one thing when he knew another. The document was the bank board's secret briefing book prepared for Wall on Aug. 1, 1987, in large print, it said that 183 of the worst thrifts would cost the depositor insurance fund a minimum of \$16 billion.

Not until February of this year did Wall revise his math — up to \$15 billion for more than 500 thrifts. And he accused those who didn't agree of being too negative. Wall's estimates have been creeping up since then — more out of embarrassment than candor.



### Bush urges Reagan to sign ethics bill

WASHINGTON - President-elect George Bush urged President Reagan to sign a controversial ethics bill that would tighten restrictions on lobbying by former federal officials. The Washington Post reported Wednesday.

Bush, who approved of the bill during the election campaign, has privately recommended to Reagan that it be signed, the Post said, quoting sources. Bush had publicly been noncommittal Monday about what he would recommend.

The Post-Employment Restriction Act, popularly known as the "ethics" bill, would limit for one year government contacts by former federal officials and members of Congress and bring them under the same ethics restrictions that apply to high-level administration officials under the 1978 Ethics in Government

The measure overwhelmingly passed Oct. 21, the last day of

Reports surfaced over the weekend that Cabinet officials, led by Interior Secretary Donald Hodel and Transportation Secretary James Burnley, are urging Reagan to veto the bill, and the Post reported Wednesday that Attorney General Dick Thornburgh, Secretary of State George Shultz and Secretary of Defense Frank Carlucci also have weighed in against it.

While White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Tuesday there is "no decision on the ethics bill," he added that Reagan will make his choice by Friday, the deadline for action.

### Guild, Sun-Times reach agreement

CHICAGO - Two days of hard bargaining paid off and a threatened strike was averted at the Chicago Sun-Times.

Negotiators for the newspaper and The Newspaper Guild reached tentative agreement Tuesday on a new 40-month contract, retroactive to June 1.

"The agreement provides for no salary increase for 13 months, a 3 percent increase for the next 13 months and a 3 percent increase for the final 14 months," a statement issued

"Although the company's basic wage proposal did not change (from Monday's final offer), the Sun-Times was able to add a one-time \$500 payment to editorial employees in July of 1989 in return for the four months which were added to the term of the contract."

### Goetz conviction upheld

ALBANY, N.Y. - Lawyers for New York City subway gunman Bernhard Goetz say they will ask the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn a state court decision that upheld Goetz's gun possession conviction.

"We will ... ultimately vindicate Mr. Goetz," Barry Slotnick. Goetz's chief lawyer, said Tuesday after the Court of Appeala rejected Goetz's argument that the trial judge improperly influenced the jury to convict him.

Goetz, who is white, admitted shooting four black youths on a subway car on Dec. 22, 1984, but said it was in self-defense because he feared they would rob him.

After a lengthy trial in 1987, he was acquitted of attemped murder and assault charges, but convicted of carrying an unlicensed, concealed gun - a silver pistol he had bought after being mugged in 1981.

Ron Kuby, a lawyer for Darrell Cabey, the most seriously injured of the four youths Goetz shot, said Goetz deserved to be convicted. "I don't know if he wanted to win some sort of civic award for blasting away at four black youths." Kuby said.

Cabey, who was left paralyzed and brain-damaged by the shooling, lives with his mother in a Bronx housing project. Kuby said. He has a civil suit against Goetz, seeking payment for his injuries and medical treatment.

### Government seeks help in AIDS fight

WASHINGTON - The government has decided to enlist the help of ordinary doctors in its effort to get more AIDS-infected minorities and intravenous drug users involved in tests of new AIDS drugs and treatments.

Dr. Anthony Fauci, director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases, announced Tuesday that \$6 million will be allocated in flacal 1969 for private and clinic doctors to perform clinical AIDS research. Most of the government's human testing of potential AIDS treatments now is performed at university-affiliated medical centers.

The government scientists said private doctors generally are better able to gain the trust of patients than physicians at large research institutions. That trust is particularly important, he said, in persuading members of some target groups, such as intravenous drug users, blacks and Hispanics, to participate in

The Human Immunodeficiency Virus, which causes AIDS, is spread by sexual or blood-to-blood contact, such as when intravenous drug users share needles. It also can be spread from mother to child.

Although the incidence of acquired immune deficiency syndrome is disproportionately high among blacks and Hispanics, most of the 5,400 people who have participated in federally sponsored trials for AIDS drugs have been homosex-

Steinberg, 47, a disbarred lawyer, was arrested with his lover. Hedda Nussbaum, 46, a former children's book editor, and charged with beating to death Lisa Steinberg, the 6-year-old girl they raised in their Greenwich Village apartment.

Charges against Nussbaum were dropped after prosecutors decided she too was a victim of abuse at the hands of Steinberg, and she is expected to testify against him next week.

### Auto brake adjusters sought for heavy trucks

WASHINGTON - The National Transportation Safety Board wants the federal highway safety agency to require that new heavy trucks and trailers come equipped with automatic brake adjusters.

The board's recommendation, adopted unanimously Tuesday, followed a study of 32 truck accidents in which brake problems were a factor.

The board also voted to ask the American Trucking Associations and the National Private Truck Council to recommend that their members adopt written policies about who is responsible for adjusting brakes when a truck is on the road, and if the responsibility falls to the drivers, be sure they are properly trained for the job.

The panel - whose reconsmendations do not carry any legal force - also saked the associations to ask members to replace worn brake assemblies with a newer variety which contains a visible indicator to show a driver or mechanic when the brakes need adjusting.

The recommendation to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration that new vehicles start carrying the automatic adjusters asked that more.

NHTSA adopt the rule before June 1990.

NTSB staffers said NHTSA is considering taking the first steps in drafting such a rule, based on a long study that the agency has been making of truck accidents.

The highway agency etimates that about 20 percent of the trucks in use now have the devices to sutomatically take up the slack in brakes caused by wear and keep them in proper adjustment.

Claude Harris, an NTSB staff member, said Ford Motor Co. already has begun installing the automatic adjustment devices in some of its heavy trucks as standard equipment and offering it as an option on others. He said the devices, in cases where they can be retrofit on older trucks. cost about \$83 per axle to

Out-of-adjustment brakes produce different braking preseures on the various axles and wheels and can contribute to control problems and longer stopping distances. A higher braking demand on a particular wheel or axle will heat the brake pade and make them less ef-

# Eerie 'Stealth' bomber rolls out

PALMDALE, Calif. - The B-2 Stealth strategic bomber will take to the air for the first time by early January, the Air Force said after showing off the revolutionary \$450-million plane for the

Tuesday's carefully orchestrated and heavily guarded public debut of the boomerang-shaped "flying wing" capped a decade of multibillion-dollar research and development by government and private contractors.

"The B-2 bomber represents a stabilizing system in time of crisis and an essential component of our strategic nuclear forces as we progress down the path of nuclear arms reductions," Air Force Secretary Edward C. Aldridge Jr. said at the ritual rollout of the plane, which is designed to be invisible to enemy radar.

"The unique operational capabilities, both nuclear and conventional, that the B-2 will give our strategic forces will promote deterrence of auclear conflict," he said. "Its stealth

capability will permit it to penetrate the most sophisticated air defenses and survive well into the 21st century."

Aldridge said he hopes "that the B-2 will strengthen the cause of peace - and that this magnificent aircraft will never fly in anger."

The crowd of reporters, aerospace workers, dignitaries and military officers was allowed no closer than 200 yards to the strange looking black-and-gray plane, which officials said was positioned on the tarmac so it would reveal as little as possible of its unique features to any spy satellite that might have been overhead.

It took three minutes to low the plane from its hangar at Northrop's high-security Plant 42 in the Mojave Desert about 50 miles north of Los Angeles,

The crowd cheered at the first glimpse of the plane, which is virtually all sweptback squared-off wing with no traditional fusciage or tail assembly.

NEW YORK - Sexual harasement costs the average Fortune 500 firm \$6.7 million annually in absenteeism, lowproductivity and employee turnover, over and above actual litigation costs, a new reported.

Nearly all Fortune 500 companies received complaints, with 42 percent involving pressure for sexual favors or dates, 26 percent involving deliberate touching, leaning over or cornering, according to the survey. which was released Tuesday.

Actual or attempted sexual assault was involved in 1 percent of the cases.

The survey, conducted for Working Woman magazine. showed one-third of the complaints were from men.

'Sexual harassment can no longer be viewed as the stereotype of the horny boss chasing the secretary around the desk." said Anne Mollegen, Working Woman editor-in-chief, "It has business costs and it has human costs. Sexual harassment is a financial time bomb for American business.

Based on her own research. Dr. Freada Klein, the management consultant who analyzed the magazine's survey, said sex-

ual haramment, whether or not it is reported to management. annually costs the average Fortune 500 firm \$6.7 million in absenteeism, low productivity and employee turnover, in addition to any actual litigation costs.

was paid by one company to nettle a single case, while out--of-court settlements can cost hundreds of thousands of dollars. Klein said.

Most of the aggressors were superiors, while previous surveys of government employees have found most of such complaints involved co-workers.

In the survey, 160 of the country's 500 top industrial and service firms answered the questionnaire.

Almost 90 percent of the companies responding said they had received at least one complaint of sexual harasement in the previous 12 months, and 64 percent of the executives said they considered most of such complaints to be valid.

Eight out of 10 offenders received oral or written warnings, and two out of 10 eventually were fired, sometimes after warnings.

### Intervention stops Lebanese battles

BEIRUT, Lebanon - Syrian officers and Moslem leaders intervened to stop new street fighting between rival Shille militia groups in southern Beirut, where a 19-day truce was shattered in a barrage of rocket and artillery fire.

In southern Lebanon, Israel's air force Tuesday struck guerrilla positions in the first such raid since Palestinians proclaimed an independent state in the larueli occupied territories.

Syrian officers, accompanied by field commanders from the rival pro-Syrian Amal movement and the Iranian inspired Hezbollah organization, late Tuesday toured the darkened roads and alleys of impoverished southern Betrut in a bid to end fighting that crupted earlier in the day.

Witnesses said the officers called on fighters for both sides to halt the violence, yelling, "All armed elements must stop shooting and clear off the streets immediately."

### Soviets test nuclear device

MOSCOW - The Soviet Union exploded a 20-kiloton nuclear device in an underground test at the Semipalatinsk range in Siberia, the official Tasa news agency reported Wednesday.

The test was conducted to check the results of research in the physics of nuclear explosion." Tase said in a brief dispatch. The radiological situation in the explosion area and outside the test range is normal."

The news agency said the test was conducted at 6.57 a.m. Moscow time.

### Chun in internal exile after apology

SEOUL. South Korea - Former President Chun Doo Hwan. who ruled South Korea with almost absolute power until February, apologized for wrongdoings under his government. returned his wealth to the state, and abandoned Seoul today to live in internal extle.

But opponents said the extraordinary public apology was not enough and demanded Chun be arrested or forced to testify at hearings into alleged corruption by his former government.

Chun, accompanied by his weeping wife, Lee Sonn-ja, left his home in Yonhee-dong in western Seoul by car at 10:20 a.m. for an undisclosed destination to "reflect upon" his past mistakes

Before leaving Seoul, Chun addressed the nation on radio and television and offered explanations and apologies for government policy mistakes and irregularities committed by his relatives while he was in power.

### South Africa accepts peace plan

PRETORIA, South Africa - South Africa's acceptance of a U.S. mediated plan for ending foreign military involvement in southwestern Africa has cleared the way for a permanent settlement in the troubled region, officials say.

Pretoria Tuesday formally announced its acceptance of the plan, which calls for the withdrawal of 50,000 Cuban troops from Angola and the granting of independence to Namibia after

73 years of South African rule. Cuba and Angola had already accepted the proposal, which was hammered out last week by negotiators in Geneva.

Botha said his government informed the United States of South Africa's acceptance of a proposed timetable for Cuban troop withdrawal reached in talks mediated by U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Chester Crocker. Disagreements over the

timetable had posed an obstacle in previous negotiations. Boths said the accord could be formally signed in the Congolese capital of lirazzaville "hopefully in the next week or

### Oll prices soar amid OPEC agreement

VIENNA - OPEC oil ministers, in a bid to cut the cartel's free-flowing oil output, pressed fraq to accept a lower official production quota than its archenemy Iran in return for oil outputs.

Iranian Oil Minister Gholamreza Aghazadeh Tuçsday reaffirmed that his nation would not agree to quotas that granted Iraq official parity of production, damping hopes that OPEC was close to an agreement on cutting back oil output.

Aghazadeh did not rule out the possibility of accepting effective production parity with Tehran's gulf war foe if other OPEC members were prepared to cede part of their output to

Iraqi Oil Minister Issam Abdul Rahim Al-Chalabi said the main proposal under discussion would boost OPEC's official total production ceiling by about 1 million barrels to 18.5 million barrels a day from 17.5 million barrels a day.

WARSAW. Poland — The Solidarity labor union's human rights commission has classified as a political prisoner a police officer who was jailed after he refused orders to attempt to kill a pro-Solidarity priest.

Police in Chandigarh, the joint capital of the Haryana and Punjab states, blamed the assault on the Khalistan Commando Force, one of the most

groups fighting to create an independent Sikh nation in police said.

The Tuesday night explosion. the capital's first deadly terrorist attack in 18 months, devastated the building's interior and obliterated a 15-foot section of an outer wall, police and witnesses said. The blast was heard several miles away.

Witnesses said the force of the explosion hurled cars 200 yards. uprooted trees and shattered windows nearly half a mile away from the civil guard headquarters. They said the streets surrounding the building were littered with the twisted debris of

# Hundreds of thousands protest in Azerbaijan

MOSCOW - Hundreds of thousands of Azerbaijanis held anti-Armenian demonstrations in the capital of the Azerbaijan republic in a new outbreak of ethnic unrest that left scores injured, dissident sources said

Sergei Grigoryants, editor of the unofficial publication. Magazine Glasnost, said there were no reports of deaths in the unrest Tuesday, but authorities had sent special forces to the Azerbaijan capital of Baku to protect Armenian homes and neighborhoods.

"Baku is a city of about 2 million people, and we have heard that hundreds of

thousands of people, some from outlying districts and towns, poured into the city yesterday and started chanting anti-Armenian slogans, such as 'Armenians go home.' Grigoryants said today in Moscow,

"We have heard scores of people were injured, but have no figures yet." he said.

The official media made no mention of the incident, but Western diplomats in Moscow said they also had heard of the trouble.

Sources said they also understood, but could not immediately confirm, that a meeting of the local Supreme Soviet, or parliament, in the Armenian capital of Yerevan was stopped when news of the unrest spread.

"It appears they did not want to provoke any further trouble over Armenia's demands that the Armenian enclave in Azerbaijan of Nagorno Karabakh be incorporated as part of Armenia." a source said.

On Sunday, the Communist Party newspaper Pravda carried a lengthy report on the ethnic violence, demonstrations and strikes which have plagued Armenta lot of the year. The Armentans, who are mainly Christian, want Nagorno Karabakh either incorporated with their republic or separated from Azerbaijan.



The meetings were arranged to help the president decide who should form the next government following the inconclusive Nov. 16 elections.

Bhutto's Pakistan People's Party gained the largest number of National Assembly scats in the elections, finishing ahead of the goverment-backed Islamic Democratic Alliance, but failed to secure an absolute majority.





# NIT biggie: Syracuse vs. indiana

NEW YORK - During basketball season. Jim Boeheim awakens each morning with a

haunting vision:

Keith Smart pulls up, 12 feet left side of the basket. Smart jumperover Howard Triche and. with four seconds left, swishes a shot to decide the 1967 national title. Indiana 74. Syracuse 73,

"I wake up and think about it almost every merning."
Boeheim said. "During basket-ball season I think about it every day. It came down to the end and they came down and made a great play. They won. We didn't lose. Of course, I wanted it to end the other way, I wanted us to hit some free throws in the end ar (Smart) to miss the shot. But I remember it as a great game."

Boehelm's memories of that game are especially vivid these days because his Orangemen are about to play Indiana for the first time since then.

No. 8 Syracuse and the No. 17 Hoosiers will meet in the Big Apple National Invitation Tournament semifinals Wed-nesday night after No. 3 North Carolina faces No. 13 Missouri.

The semifinals and Friday

night's championship game of the 16-team tournament will be at Madison Square Carden.

In Boeheim's 12 seasons as coach, the Orange have reached 10 NCAA Tournaments and two postseason NITs. But during Boeheim's reign Syracuse gained a reputation as a choker at NCAA time, not advancing beyond the second round the first eight times. But then came 1987 and a run to the finals and Indiana and Bob Knight

The victory over Syracuse marked Knight's third NCAA title as Indiana's coach.

"I know people want to say it's my team versus the other guy's team." Boeheim said. "I don't put a lot into it. Bobby Knight hasn't made a baske since he started coaching. He didn't make too many when he did

Boeheim contends he won't even see Knight during the

"I never look at the other bench." Bocheim said. "I prepare for his team, for what he's used of doing. When we were in the Final Four (two years ago) against Providence everyone asked about Rick (Pitino) because we were such close friends and he was a former

# Auburn needs win for Sugar Bowl bid

As far as Auburn is concerned. the road to New Orleans leads through Birmingham, Ala., where on Friday the No. 7 Tigers take on their arch rival. No. 15

Alabama. Auburn, 9-1 and a onetouchdown favorite, must beat Alabama, 7-2, to win a share of the Southeastern Conference championship and earn a berth, opposite No. 5 Florida State, in the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans Jan. 2

An upaet by Alabama, which is going to the Sun Bowl, would give the SEC title and the Sugar Bowl bid to No. 17 Louisiana State and relegate Auburn to a Hall of Fame Bowl meeting with No. 19 Syracuse.

In the past, Birmingham was considered a neutral site for the Auburn-Alabama "Iron Bowl." But, starting this year, Birmingham, for ticket purposes, is a home game for Alabama with the series to be played at Auburn every other

SCHOOLS'S "We have to take the crowd out of the game early," says Auburn linebacker Quentin Reynolds. "This year's Iron Bowl is just like any road game because of the way the tickets are divided up. We have to try to shut them down early, but against a team like Alabama.

nothing is as easy as it sounds."

Alabama Coach Bill Curry is 0-8 against Auburn, seven of those losses coming while he was coaching at Georgia Tech. But Alabama Athletic Director Steve Sloan says that mark is misleading.

"I think it's unfair to compare Bill's record at Tech against Auburn." says Sloan. "That's like a guy playing eight matches against Jack Nicklaus with a 10 handicap. It's different, personnel-wise. But I do think being at Alabama, having similar personnel, the need to win this game becomes more important."

No. 3 Miami, still hoping for a chance to repeat as national champion, is heavily favored to knock No. 8 Arkansas out of the ranks of the unbeaten Saturday. The Hurricanes, 8-1, are hampered in their title bid by their 1-point loss at top-ranked Notre Dame in mid-October, But if No. 2 Southern Cal beats Notre Dame Saturday and then loses to No. 10 Michigan in the Rose Bowl, Miami could be playing for No. I when it takes on No. 6 Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

There are too many things involved that we have no control over," says Miami Couch Jimmy Johnson. "All we can do is keep winning, keep impressing people with how good we are, and hope other things fall our way.

In other Southeast action Saturday, Florida is at Florida State. Tulane at LSU, Georgia Tech at Georgia. Tennessee at Vanderbilt and Ole Miss vs. Mississippi State at Jackson.

Florida State, 9-1 and winner of nine straight since its season opening 31-0 loss at Miami, is a two-touchdown favorite over Florida, which was invited to the All-American Bowl in Birmingham even though expected to wind up its regular season at 6.5 - the worst record of any of the 17 bowl teams.

LSU, 7-3, which has a big stake in the Auburn-Alabama game, is a three-touchdown favorite over Tulane, an independent which is 5.5 overall, but 2-0 against SEC competition. While the outcome doesn't appear to be in doubt, fans should be treated to an aerial duel between LSU's Tommy Hodson, a juntor who is expected to wind up as the leading passer in SEC history, and Tulane's Terrance Jones. who is among the top 10 in the nation in total offense for the third year in a row.

Georgia, 7-3 and headed to the Gator Bowl, is a two-touchdown favorite over Georgia Tech. 3-7. which has beaten only one 1-A foe (South Carolina) since 1986. Key interest in that game will be the running of Georgia junior Tim Worley, who leads the SEC in rushing with 1,173 yards in 10 games, but only holds a half yard per game edge over Florida sophomore Emmitt Smith (the 1987 champ) who has 934 yards in eight games.

Worley, who has indicated he may skip his senior season to turn pro, also has 17 touchdowns - three shy of the SEC record.

Tennessee, 4-6 after a lourgame winning streak, is a slight favorite over Vanderbilt. 3-7 after a four-game losing streak. but featuring two-time SEC total offense champ Eric Jones, who is averaging 257 yards per

DELTONA - Mom tried her best to teach our Cook of the Week how to cook, but only television personalities could inspire Mike Neal to culinary greatness.

Neal, of Deltona, was born in Miami, but has lived all over the United States and the world. With his father in the U.S. Navy, the family moved frequently. "I never had time for my friends because we were always on the move," Neal said.

Neal's mother was a housewife who stayed home to take care of the family. 'Mom usually was too busy packing out belongings to go to work." Neal said. "She was always home when we would come home from school and had baked some of our favorite cakes and cookies."

'My dad was in the Navy so we traveled quite a bit." he said. "When we were smaller, we got to see a lot of the United States and a lot of interesting places around the world." After 23 years of Navy life, Neal's father retired and has since passed

Neal has one older brother and two younger sisters. "Since we moved so much my brother and sisters were my best friends." Neal said. His brother lives in Deltona and one of his sisters lives in Tampa, while the other one lives in Gulf Port. Miss.

Neal is proud of his grandfather, who worked on the L&N Railroad in Pensacola for 60 years. "Grandad used to come visit us frequently, and he would take my brother and I fishing." Neal said. "I really enjoyed those times I spent with him. It is something that I will cherish the rest of my life."

Neal was tutored by television in cooking. "I use to watch Justin Wilson, the Cajun Cook, when he was on, and then I would go and try his recipes," Neal said. "Some of the recipes would turn out and tasted pretty good, but some of them tasted just awful."

Neal acknowledged that TV's Julia Child also helped him. "My mother taught me the basics of cooking, but I really didn't care if I learned to cook or not back then," he said.

Neal said he remembered one time when he was about 5 years old, he got up before the rest of the family to fix their breakfast as a surprise. He turned on the stove to fix eggs as he had seen his mother do and left the skillet of oil on the stove. It overheated and caught on fire.

"It smoked the kitchen up pretty good, so I didn't get to cook that day," Neal said. "I used to help my granny in the kitchen when I went to visit her," he smiled. "I

remember her letting me help fix the combread that we were going to have for supper instead of putting a small amount of salt in the mixture. I put a lot of salt in it. It tasted awful but we ate it anyway.

Neal once owned Mike's TV and Appliance Repair, located on French Avenue in Sanford. There, he met his future wife,

"She worked in the beauty shop that was next door to my business," Neal said "She came over and brought me a doughnut one day and we got to talking. I asked her out on a date."

Ruth is a beautician but is staying home at present to take care of their child. "Ruth is a terrific person." Neal said.

The Neals have a very active 4-year-old son. Little Mike enjoys playing outside and really likes playing in his sandbox.

Neal works as maintainance engineer for the First United Methodist Church of Sanford. "I really enjoy this job because I like to fix things and to keep myself busy."

His hobbies include playing the guitar and the plano. He also enjoys listening to all types of music. He and his wife also sing in

the Chancel Choir at First United Methodist. Another of Neal's hobbies is fixing up old cars. "I have been working on the motors of cars and changing the oil in them since I was about 10. Neal said. The whole Neal family also enjoys camping.

Neal's philosophy in life is "You can't get something for nothing unless someone, somewhere, somehow is getting nothing."




