### Nazis Pour Stream Of Reserves Into Russia; Troops Total 525,000

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 2.—(AP)—The Nazi High Command today poured a stream of reserves into Russia, bringing the total number of German troops in the Soviet Union to 525,000.

The reserves included several divisions of the German Army, as well as units from the German Air Force and the German Navy. The reserves were sent to the front lines to replace troops who had been killed or wounded during the fighting.

The German High Command also announced that it had received reports that the Soviet Union was preparing to launch a major offensive against the German forces in the Soviet Union.

WICKARD SAYS LABOR SHORTAGE AFFORDS CHANCE TO UTILIZE ALL FERTILE LANDS

PEORIA, Ill., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Secretary Wickard, addressing the National Catholic Rural Life Conference, said today the shortage of farm labor gives the United States an opportunity to eliminate rural slums by transferring farm families from sub-marginal or crowded land to better land.

He said some land is so poor farmers can hardly produce for themselves, while some growers on such small farms can not get full use of their labor.

Estimates show that 2,000,000 acres of land are sub-marginal, and that at the same time get on land which is productive enough to support large families.

Unless something is done, some good lands may be left idle next year while poor land will be worked. He suggested that families could be moved to better land.

### Tourist Trains

Although last week's announcement that there would be no tourist trains to Florida this winter was the final blow to the tourist business for most of us, not so with Tom Griffith, St. Petersburg's boundlessly enthusiastic advertising promoter, who hastens to point out that while there may be no special trains as in former years there will still be plenty of trains running on regular schedules and that thousands of tourists can come on them.

Or rather, he does not say "tourists", as he admits that "tourists", as such, are out for the duration, but he calls them "winter residents" and these people he insists have a right to return to their winter homes, and will do so, tourist trains or no. "The regular trains to Florida will continue to run as usual," he insists.

"According to all information we have received from reports of the O. D. T. and from railroad officials," he continues, "the regular trains to Florida will continue to run on schedule and these trains will be able to bring to Florida hundreds of thousands of winter residents who will help fill our hotels, apartments and furnished homes and to keep our cities active."

"We have discontinued the word 'tourist' for the duration of the war. We do not feel that there will be any 'tourists' in the old meaning of this term, but there will be lots of 'winter residents'—people who will come down for the entire winter season to save fuel, to protect their health and to get away from the cold weather. These 'winter residents' will contribute a large amount of income to the resort cities of this state and will help enable the people of Florida to pay their taxes and living expenses, to continue to maintain their productive value to the nation at war."

We believe Mr. Griffith has got something there. Probably half of Florida's annual visitors are not really tourists at all, but actually are part time residents of this state, and if they had to choose between their homes here and their homes back in the frigid north, there is little doubt which they would choose. As a matter of fact, many of these people would probably find themselves more comfortable spending twelve months of the year in Florida, than having to remain in the north for the winter.

### How To Meet Meat Ration

Methods of meeting the 2½ pound per week meat ration and at the same time helping to win the war are suggested by Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard in the American Magazine where he calls housewives, "the quartermasters of the home front" and suggests how they may best perform their important duties in feeding the nation.

"Statistically," Secretary Wickard writes, "there is no shortage of meat. Under rationing, there is only a shortage of 2½ pounds of meat per person per week, each of us would have about 150 pounds of meat a year. That compares with an average consumption of 181 pounds of meat for the ten years between 1930 and 1940, and is only 12 pounds under the 142 pounds which we ate per capita during 1941—hardly a mouthful less a day."

Secretary Wickard warns that fish will not offer a meat substitute because of restrictions on salt water fishing due to the war. He says that the country has a bumper crop of chickens on hand—let percent more than last year.

"There was a time," he says, "when a chicken in every pot stood for prosperity. This year it will signify patriotism. If every American family will have an eating chicken every so often instead of beef, and a choice dish now and then instead of pork, the pressure on our meat supplies will be eased a great deal."

The Secretary then gives the following advice to housewives of the nation:

"Housewives should always remember that in the management of the whole American food supply, they are the quartermasters of the home front. A great responsibility is placed upon them. If they let patriotism dictate their grocery purchases, they can help immeasurably toward solving the great problem of food distribution. The rules are simple and easy to remember:

1. Buy what is plentiful.
2. Buy what is fresh.
3. Buy what is produced locally.
4. Buy what the Government asks you to buy through its Victory Food program.
5. Don't hoard or waste food.

Observance of those rules is most important. This year's bounty will find us with more food on hand than ever before. The nation's farmers have broken all records for food production. But we must govern our use of nature's bounty by the necessities of wartime.

"Unlike industry, agriculture cannot be put on a double shift. Most fields will produce only one crop a year. In 1942 more farmers and farmers' sons will be wearing khaki than in 1941. There will be less rubber on farm tractors and farm trucks. Fertilizer will be less plentiful. The food needs of our Allies may be greater.

"Do not wish to be alarmed, but we must soberly consider all these facts. During the coming months our soldiers and sailors will continue to be the best-fighting men on earth. Our workers and their families will get all they want to eat. There is no reason why any American should be hungry this winter, but we must make the most of our great abundance."

## Three Nazi Divisions Held Off By Stalingrad Defenders In City Workers' Settlement

### Russians Say German Attacks Are Led By Swarms Of Dive Bombers And Tanks

MOSCOW, Oct. 6. (AP)—Stalingrad's defenders held today against three Nazi divisions in a battle for a workers' settlement and the Reds continued to stab at the German left flank. Swarms of dive bombers and 100 tanks headed the Nazi attacks trying to force the salient.

German prisoners reported that there is further delay. German losses in the last 24 hours were huge, the Reds said, and Nazi soldiers are demoralized. Several German batteries and 80 trucks loaded with troops were blown to pieces by Russian artillery and mortar in the day's fighting around the city. The Russian offensive in the Nikolayev sector, 25 miles north-west of Stalingrad, continued to make headway, the midnight communiqué reported, and another 200 Germans and seven tanks were destroyed there, while Soviet positions were "improved."

Newspapers in the terrific fight around Stalingrad were the Germans conceded any gains to the northwest suburbs had been reported in the Soviet Monday noon communiqué, but first dispatches said the city's defenders, responding to a warning that the fate of all modern Russia might be in their hands, were retreating more fiercely than ever. Twelve assaults by a Nazi sapper army estimated at 500,000 men were beaten back in one day. (Presumably Sunday, reports from the front revealed.)

### Supreme Court Puts Off Nazi Saboteur Trial

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6. (AP)—With the chair of former Justice Byrne, a black leather coat, the Supreme Court opened a new term Monday but deferred at least until next Monday its eagerly awaited opinion in the case of the U-boat Nazi saboteur.

The remaining eight justices, in uniformly good health after the long summer recess, were late in including Justice Murphy, who served as a lieutenant-colonel with the Army during the summer. For that reason Murphy disqualifies himself in the case of the saboteur, who were tried by fellow Army officers.

The court denied the Nazis' petition for a writ of habeas corpus at a special term during the summer. They then were convicted by a military commission and six were electrocuted. The court's opinion may constitute a clarification of the President's war-time powers in view of the issues raised by the defense counsel.

Chief Justice Stone officially announced Byrne's resignation at the opening of the court, wishing him, on behalf of himself and the other justices, "all success in his new and arduous undertaking" as a special term during the summer. Denmark rejected the demand that it be included in a "greater Germany" with Holland and Norway. Saboteur waves were reported.

This broadcast from Scandinavia reaching the Swiss press yesterday said rumors that a proclamation creating a "great Germany" to include Holland, Denmark and Norway, is to be supported soon were circulating in Scandinavia, chiefly in German circles.

It was stressed that such reports were merely "the category of rumors," and were being heard most persistently in Norway. Stockholm dispatches said that informed opinion in Sweden was that the reports "must not be given too much weight," but it was recalled that Adolf Hitler in his latest speech declared no sovereign state would survive the war.
