School lunch policy announced

The Seminole County School Board has announced it's policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs.

The policy may be reviewed by any interested party by con-tacting the Educational Support Center of the Seminole County School Board, 400 E. Lake Mary Boulevard, Sanford, or by contacting the school the stu-

dent is attending.
Eligibility is based on house-hold size and income. The total incomed before taxes, social security, health benefits, union dues or other deductions must

Application forms are being sent to students' homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, household should fill out the application and return it to the school.

Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used to determine eligibility.

dren are also eligible for these benefits. If a household has foster children living with them and wishes to apply, contact the achool the student is attending for more information.

If a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size changes, the school should be contacted. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for the reduced price meals or for additional benefits such as free meals.

Construction at Sanford airport scheduled to begin in September

SANFORD — Construction on the Orlando Sanford Airport's domestic terminal expansion program is set to begin in September, and the \$24 million project could be complete in January of

tail, as part of her class work at Seminole Community College.

The first phase of construction is expected to last six months and cost \$5.5 million. The second phase is expected to last eight months, and cost \$10.4 million. By the end of the first two phases, in October of 2000, the airport will have five operational gates for loading and unloading passen-

The third phase will focus on the terminal's apron, and last 3 1/2 months at a cost of \$7.6 million. A ramp will be designed to give the airport greater flexibility in servicing a variety of planes.

By the end of the third phase, the airport will

have at least seven gates. The domestic terminal will be expanded by 103,000 square feet if all goes as airport officials are planning. The domestic terminal will also

handle overflow international traffic. "We're not doing something here today that precludes us from expanding down the road," said Victor White, executive director of the Sanford Airport Authority, adding that another seven to eight gates could be needed in the

The airport has a shortfall of \$7 million toward the project, meaning that officials will seek Federal and State grants and other revenues to fund the third phase.

Schools map plan to bring up grades

SANFORD - The six Seminole County elementary schools that received "D's" from the state are taking steps to improve test scores and other areas where the state said the schools are weak. Wicklow, Hamilton and Midway elementary schools

have the lowest Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test (FCAT) scores in the district in both reading and math. The three schools were given "D's" on the state report card. Pine Crest Elementary School also received a "D" based on its FCAT scores for reading and

writing. Five of the six schools with

"D's" in the state report are located in Sanford, while

English Estates is in Fern Park. **Idyllwilde and English Estates** received "D's" based on Florida Writes! test scores. The Seminole County School Board is considering several options to improve the six schools with "D's."

The Seminole County School Board on Tuesday will begin


discussing options on how to use available state grant funds to improve the six schools.

Among the options the board will discuss are establishing Reading camps at Hamilton, Wicklow, Idyllwilde, and English Estates elementary schools. The five-week program would cost a total of \$453,000 in grant funding. Midway and

Pine Crest would also hold reading camps, but would not

additional grant funding. Another option is to start after school programs at the six schools, at a total cost of \$1.2 million. The state would give \$675,000 in grant funding for the program, and the District would spend \$540,654. See Schools, Page 4A

The best ballplayers of yesterday and today reached out to say hello to the All Star and All American — Ted Williams.

Feller, Musial, Mays. Aaron. Banks, Reggie, Yaz.

McGwire. Sosa. Ripken. Gwynn. Griffey, Jr. Jeter. Martinez.

Williams, The Kid at 80. beamed.

Assisted by his son, John Henry, Williams rose proudly from the golf cart which had brought him from the outfield to the pitcher's mound.

He double clutched a brand new baseball and mustered the strength to throw it into the waiting mitt of former Boston Red Sox catcher Carlton Fisk.

Ah, the joy as the Fenway baseball fans bid The Kid anew. , Baseball is many things to many people. It's peanuts and crackerjacks. Hot dogs and pop. It's strike three, you're out. Ball four. Curves and sliders. Squeeze bunts and grand slams. Opening Day. Double Play. The Seventh Inning Stretch.

For 12 precious minutes on Tuesday, it was all Teddy Ballgame — the name Ted Williams has enjoyed calling himself for many years.

By honoring Williams at the last All-Star Game of the 20th Century, Baseball honored one of its greatest players and one of America's greatest patriots. Williams, a Navy pilot, the next day.

Williams melted at the sight of children. He supported charities such as the Jimmy Fund in Boston. He didn't want anyone to know just how generous he was. But he couldn't hide this anymore than his talent at bat. The greatest hitter who ever

There were tears in Teddy Ballgame's eyes on Tuesday night - just as there were in those who hugged him. Ted has always insisted that no matter what a man did with his life he should do it enthusiastically. He made up a word -"ginergy" - a combination of ginger and energy.

He admired people who gave it their best. I asked Ted once who was his favorite movie actress. I was expecting he would say Lana Turner, Lauren Bacall or Katherine Hepburn.

His answer: Bette Davis. "She threw herself into her job," he said. "She was the

owners Disgusted Over Government) group that protested the urban sprawl in District 5 of the county will continue its campaign.

"If we have to, we'll go to court," she said. "Instead of playing by the rules, they've (the BCC) decided to rewrite the rule book. Three of these men are up for election in 2000. Well, they can't expect much support from this part of the county."

Although Commissioner Randy Morris was not present for the evening BCC meeting Tuesday, but he upheld the reasoning by the others on the board.

"What these residents don't understand is that their area is

already in transition," Morris said. "There are warehouses going up out there. There could be more along Orange Ave. Warehouses and strip malls. They've got mobile homes, too - eight to 10 on a single acre."

Morris said that county planners worked for strategies that would benefit the residents.

"They worked at keeping the area residential. That's the key word, residential, not rural. Industry is creeping in from every side.

"There are going to be people in the area who will want to sell property," Morris said. "They've lived there a long time and they're ready to move on. They could sell to business people.



In addition, the six principals are recommending that the Board seek grant funding to provide after school tutorials for students in grades three through five. After providing tutorial support, any remaining money would be used to hire additional personnel, the principals said.

The six schools may receive state grant funding for a computer-assisted instructional program for reading and math. The software of the Computer Curriculum Corporation can be individualized to meet the students' needs.

The board will also discuss starting a home-based reading instruction program called Parents to Kids for at least 50 children and their parents, with funding from a State grant.

As part of the initiative to improve learning, each school is will form an individual improvement plan.

We want to do more for students after school," said Marion Dailey, executive director of instructional support services. "Every child can be taught, but some children need more time and more attention."

Dailey said that all six schools are struggling with high poverty levels, absentee rates, and with a large portion of students that are mobile, moving in-andout of school during the school

Four of the schools -Midway, Hamilton, Pinecrest, and Wicklow - have poverty levels above 70 percent. **Idyllwilde and English Estates** elementary schools have poverty rates of 48 percent.

Wicklow Elementary School has a 60 percent mobility rate, which reflects the number of students moving in-and-out in a year. The remaining five schools with "D's" all have mobility rates ranging from 30-to-36 per-

"When you have a highly mobile student population and a high poverty rate in a school, those are very difficult barriers," Dailey said. "It's not impossible, but it is difficult."

The six schools with "D's" also have high absence rates. For instance, 20 percent of Pine Crest Elementary School students were absent for 20 days or more last year. The state's is 8.7

Hamilton, Wicklow and Midway elementary schools have absentee rates ranging from 10.4 to 11.7 percent. English Estates has an 8.3 percent absentee rate, while Idyllwilde has a 7.1 percent absentee rate.

"If the kids are in-and-out of class and their mobility is high, it's very difficult to show progress," Dailey said.

Casselberry police begin on-site security checks

CASSELBERRY - The Casselberry police department feels an ounce of prevention is

worth a pound of cure. Or in the case of home and business safety, and ounce of inspection beats filling out a police report for burglary. The department is bringing back a program designed to have police officers visit homes and businesses and conduct security surveys to help home and business owners make their locations more secure and less attractive to criminals.

"We call it 'target hardening," explains Officer John Catiller, the department's Community Relations Officer.

"We check windows, doors, hinges, locks, shrubbery that

block visibility, exterior lighting, house numbers, you name

"Unfortunately, most of the requests we get for security surveys come too late, after a home or business has been the target of a crime and the residents or owners are in a stressed frame of mind," he said. "We'd much rather prevent a crime than pick up the pieces."

Catiller, a 15-year veteran of the Casselberry force took classes in home security surveys at Seminole Community College. He says there have been a few instances where, as a police officer, he's had to make forced entries into homes.

"You'd be surprised how easy it is to get in," said Catiller. "What we try to get accomplished during the security surveys is to get homeowners and

property like a criminal would and investigate ways to get in."

Home and business security surveys are conducted during normal business hours of 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday by Catiller and other Casselberry police officers. There is no charge for the survey. Appointments can be made with the department by calling 262-7616, extension 1051.

"The security surveys actually have positive benefits in a number of ways," Catiller said. "They give homeowners and business owners a little more piece of mind and some sound suggestions, and it gives our officers a chance to personally

meet and get to know city residents in a positive way rather than a distressed situa-





Construction begins on Oviedo elementary school

By Bill Kerns Staff Writer

OVIEDO - Construction began this week on John W. Evans Elementary School in Oviedo. However, when the elementary school opens in August, 2000, the school district will still have overcrowding concerns.

Designed for 800 students, Evans Elementary School is being modeled after Highlands Elementary School in Winter Springs Total costs of building the two-story school are estimated at \$10.5 million.

The school will ease crowding in Carillon, Stenstrom, Lawton, and Rainbow elementary schools A school principal will. High. School are already be named by the School Board in enrolling in spring semester the spring of 2000.

Without accounting for the county's expected growth, school officials estimate the district needs three-to-five new elementary schools to relieve overcrowding and move students out of portable classrooms. The trouble is that there is not enough income for the district to build additional elementary schools, said Dianne Kramer, director of facilities for Seminole County Schools.

The need for new schools exists district-wide. Kramer said growth is most rapid in the southeast area of the county, including. Oviedo, and in the northwest portion of the county, including Sanford and Lake Mary.

"You can't just put new schools in those parts of the county with the most rapid growth," Kramer said. "That still leaves the central part of the

Construction costs are rising, up 20 percent since Highlands

Elementary was built in 1995, Kramer said.

Meanwhile, work continues on a number of major projects in schools throughout. Seminole

The district recently completed a six-month project of repainting every classroom at Seminole High School. Construction is underway on the Olympic-sized community swimming pool at Seminole High School, scheduled to open by January, 2000, at Seminole High School

The pool is expected to cost \$1. million to build, with funding shared by the School Board, Serninole County, and the city of Sanford, Students at Seminole swimming classes.

"The day the heavy equipment rolled in we were ecstatic," said Seminole High School principal Karen Coleman.

Seminole High School is also receiving 100 new computers. Soon after the coming school year begins, every classroom in Seminole High School will have

The \$40 million renovations to Lake Brantley High School are nearing completion. The project has been on-going since January, 1998, and is expected to be completed in the spring of 2000.

This summer, a new administration suite and interior courtyard are under construction. The so-called "Round Building," constructed in the 1970's with open-pod classrooms, is being replaced by three academic buildings.

softball and baseball fields have also been relocated.

In June, the School Board agreed to a five-year plan that includes \$20 million for renovations at Lyman High School. However, school officials say the district still has \$160 million in unfunded needs.

Board members, also decided in June to add one elementary school during the next five years.

Kramer said she is concerned that the state legislature will possibly add further difficulties to financing school construction with a revised statewide building code that will be discussed in Tallahassee in January.

School districts currently use a uniform building code for schools that differs from the codes used by local governments. The state legislature is considering eliminating the separate uniform code for schools in January.

One of the changes in the code that will affect school systems is the inspection process. Life-safety inspections are performed before opening a school, and sometimes work continues on a building while it is in use. By contract, local governments do not open a building until the work is virtually complete, including the landscaping.

The reform could force school districts to hire additional building officials and create another layer of bureaucracy, Kramer said. She noted that the school system already takes steps to ensure students are not in danger.


