

Dynamite, Money Orders In Cache

64th Year, No. 62

A cache of dynamite and money orders was unearthed Monday by sheriff's investigators outside Casselberry in a woods located at the rear of Sherwood Forest just off North Winter Park Drive, Sheriff John Polk disclosed today. There were 21 sticks of explosives buried with a number of post office and Western Union money orders, Polk added, The money orders, believed to have been stolen from Alabama, were concealed in an attache case, the

> sheriff stated. Information pin-pointing the location of the cache came from an informant.

> Polk said Charles Warner, sheriff's demolition officer, disposed of the explosives, after checking for fingerprints. Assisting the sheriff in the investigation are Lt. A. F. Davis, Sgt. Dan Lane, Lt. Roy Rice, Sgt. Roy Hughey and Warner.



At the Longwood Council meeting last week, Jaques said public acceptance of go-go entertainment is an indication of the decline of morals in the nation-





Thailand Premier Has Full Control

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - Premier Thanom Kittikachorn took over absolute power in Thailand today. He dissolved the Cabinet, abolished Parliament and suspended the constitution. An announcement broadcast nationwide said Thanom heads a new Revolutionary Council consisting of personnel from the army, navy, air force, police forces and some civilian elements. ROUND

Martial law was declared,

The premier, a field marshal who has headed the predominantly military government eight years, declared himself the head of the Revolutionary Council, The action amounted to a coup d'etat against Parliament,

It was in effect a return to the conditions that prevailed before Parliament was reconstituted in 1969.
